

The Blarney Stone – New Musical for the Lee Valley

The Lee Valley and Macroom have a strong tradition of presenting successful musicals. Over the years, and while the Briery Gap was still available, a talented group staged shows that ranged from Oklahoma, to South Pacific, to Oliver, Show Boat and the Sound of Music. More recently, they have presented new works. Murder at Shandy Hall and Sir Henry, in the Riverside Park Hotel and taken them on to the Opera House. For a third successive year, Lee Valley Players are embarking on a totally new musical production - The Blarney Stone.

This enchanting musical was written by John MacDonagh, brother of the Thomas new musical, 'The Blarney Stone', in the Lee Valley ©Lee Valley Outlook McDonagh, poet and patriot and hero of the 1916 Rebellion. The musical score

is based on the work of Fritz Brase, a German composer who was brought to Ireland in 1923 to establish our Army Bands. The musical is an ingenious mixture of real-life drama and the magical world of Irish mythology, with the local band of leprechauns showing just who holds the upper hand in Blarney. Fritz Brase's natural musical style is Central European operetta and he has cleverly blended this with Irish traditional songs and dances in a toe-tapping score.

The musical was written in 1928, aimed at the



American market and plans were well advanced to present it on Broadway when a sudden illness caused it to be cancelled. The script and score disappeared in the intervening years and only surfaced again when Patrick Bergin, no stranger to Macroom, found them by chance in Cloughjordan. Patrick forwarded the script to Ann Dunne and they decided that this was a musical that must be staged – with the help of a first class director. Cathal McCabe, another friend of the Lee Valley, was the obvious choice. He revised the script and score and the work is now ready for casting. This means that the Lee Valley presentation will be a World Premierl

The Blarney Stone is full of laughter and tears, clouds and sunshine. It's a gem of a musical that is suitable for all the family.

Auditions for leading roles and Male and Female Chorus will take place at Riverside Park Hotel on Sunday 13th January 2019 from 4pm. All the main characters sing. Applicants will be required to sing a song from a musical and read some show extracts if necessary. There are ten main characters. Patrick Bergin will play the male lead.

Maurice Armstrong- son of the owner of Blarney Castle. Andy Harkin-garrulous doorman at the Blarney Castle Hotel. Grollach, Festy and Teague-leprechauns.





MACROOM UPDATES



A meeting of all Tidy Towns volunteers was held in the Castle Hotel on December 12th. Most of the volunteers were able to attend and also present were Danny O'Keeffe, NPWS, and two girls from St. Marys who are doing their Gaisce Awards. Guest speaker, Ellen O'Sullivan from IRD Duhallow, spoke on Biodiversity and told the group of some funding opportunities. Secretary, John Lyons outlined the major activities ongoing or planned, such as the murals planned for Canty's gable end in New Street and one for the entrance to the Town Park. The Good Lives Project is painting an old house in Coolehane at the entrance to the Fairy Garden. The Council has informed the Tidy Towns that planning permission is required in order to erect a storage shed in Massytown on the site that is leased to the group. An application for funding is being made to the council under the Community Initiative grant scheme for assistance toward our development here. The grass cutting machine which is in operation constantly for the last four years cutting acres and acres of grass on a regular basis is to be traded in for a new machine and a funding application has been made to the council for this replacement.

Tidy Towns volunteers recently visited St Marys secondary school to meet girls doing their Gaisce Awards and were back again in St Mary's to meet with their new Green Schools Committee which are full of ideas and enthusiasm. Chairman and secretary are also to visit the De La Salle also soon to talk to them about their green flag competition.

Works on the paths and area in town centre were ongoing and will continue in 2019. The Phoenix monument will be re-erected in Fair Green, the post boxes to be removed, the defibrillator unit will be set back. The seat is removed and in storage and available to erect in the Town Park on the riverside walk. New seating is being provided in town centre, and this includes replacing the current seats at town hall and at the monument. Again, the seats being removed will be refurbished for use elsewhere in the

Martin and John have a meeting scheduled with the council engineer to follow up on a wide range of items.

There was a good discussion on grass cutting management and leaving areas for biodiversity and a special meeting will be called around Feb next to pursue this project and other related ideas and initiatives with IRD Duhallow. It is hoped that all estates will allocate some area for biodiversity. This will reduce grass cutting, and the focus will be on planting pollinator friendly flowers, shrubs and trees and information on the recommended plant typed will be made widely available.

De La Salle, Macroom – 1-07 Coláiste an Chroí Naofa - 1-09

De La Salle fell agonisingly short in the final of the Cork U-16 Hurling Championship in Páirc Uí Chaoimh, on Thursday 13th. Albeit very disappointing, the hard-work, skill and courage showed by the entire panel must be recognised. Coláiste an Chroí Naofa got off to a guick start, striking over two points within the first 10 minutes. The DLS defence were under major pressure from a lively half forward line, but astute efforts from Jack Devine and Brian O'Riordan prevented the scoreboard from ticking over. However, the opponent's forwards continued to press, eventually scoring a goal. Keeper, Eoin Healy, was giving a great performance, standing

strong to the inrushing forwards. De La Salle bounced back, and the hard-work earned Brian Healy a free which was converted. This started a flurry of scoring, with Healy striking another point. Shane Hodman rose the highest to claim a brilliant catch from a puck-out and took off up the pitch. LEE VALLEY UPDATES



Sean O'Leary, Glen Park - Man of many Parts

Born in Shandangan, Carrigadrohid, in 1936, Sean O'Leary has resided in Macroom since 1961. During that time he has lived through many changes – personal and familial. The 1930s were harsh and the time of the Economic War with Britain. It was 20 years pre-rural electrification and 30 years before free second-level education. Now we are post recession and in the computer era. Going to Australia is nowadays easier perhaps than travelling to Sligo in the 1930s.

The youngest of four children, Sean, and his sister, Sheila, and brother, Pat, while all well into their eighties, are in good health. Con, another brother, died following a road traffic accident, at 32, leaving a widow and 2 young children, aged 2 and 1. Their father, John, (Leary, The Wood) was both a council worker and a small farmer. His wife was Mary Lehane from Liscarrigane. Times were tough and money was tight. Farm work was done mostly manually or with the aid of a horse; milk was taken to the creamery with a horse and butt. In 1941, Sean first attended Canovee National School and he was very happy there. He recalls his teachers, the principal Mr Dick Young, two Mrs O'Sullivans - known as 'Joanie' and 'Mrs Charlie' - and Mrs Healy, formerly Miss Lynch, as being particularly nice. After completing his Primary Certificate, he attended Macroom Vocational School for 1 year. He was happy enough there too. An opportunity to work arose and his family decided that it was best to take the job.

Sean's first employment was in O'Leary's/

O'Shea's, North Square. It was a very pleasant place in which to work and he learned a lot there. Jim O'Sullivan, Railway View, and Jerry Casey, Chapel Cross, were on the staff and they were very helpful. Household goods, floor coverings and clothes are what they sold and it was a very busy shop. The system of paying was different, maybe unique. An invoice and the money were put in a small container, disappeared into a tunnel and magically returned with the receipt and change after a few minutes. Unfortunately, Mr O'Leary died, the shop was sold and Mrs O'Leary returned to Dublin. The staff lost their jobs. It was 1952, Sean was 16 and out of a job. He next turned his attention to the agricultural scene. Having procured a horse-drawn spraying machine, he was self-employed, spraying potatoes with anti blight chemicals. Blight was of course the fungus – Phytophthora infestans - that caused the Great Irish Famine in 1845-49(52). Sean worked all over Muskerry. The work was seasonal but was more or less non-stop when the time was ripe for spraying. Although it was hard, he was paid well and he enjoyed the guieter times. In some of the less busy periods, he worked at Carrigadrohid dam in the mid 1950s - tending a carpenter.

Sean continued at the agricultural work until 1960 when he was hired by South Western Services (Artificial Insemination etc.). 'Weeshie' Murphy (father of Dr Con Murphy, Cork GAA doctor) was Manager/ CEO. Ireland had now changed. Electricity was available almost everywhere. The economy, under the political leadership of Seán Lemass and the planning of Ken Whitaker, was developing. Agriculture practices had progressed, and accession to the Common Market was a great stimulus and advance. Agriculture, in particular, enjoyed a boom. At South Western, Sean's first job was milk-recording and he 'covered' the Mid-Cork area. His agricultural background stood him in good stead. He knew about farming and he knew the area. The milk testing was fascinating. Sean drew up milk with a pipette and put it in a beaker. Sulphuric acid was added and the result was recorded. Later, this was collated with the quality of milk produced by the cows. The sire of the cows was then matched to these results. If the sire's daughters did not produce enough quality milk, then the sire was 'retired'. Later, Sean worked in the insemination side and became expert in that. Farm accounts and taxation became an issue for farmers about 1970 and Sean was asked to take on the role of financial adviser. Always good at maths, Sean easily settled into that job. He received training but mostly learned on the job. He enjoyed the contact with farmers and they were, by and large, very pleasant to deal with. Getting the job at South Western meant that he had security for himself and his family; he was in a position to think about buying a house. In time, he became Manager of Mid and West Cork Farm Relief Services, covering an area from Kinsale to Ballyvourney, and Blarney to the West Cork Islands. Making friends all over the county was an added bonus. To be continued







The Tom Creedon cup was presented by Macroom GAA Club, Muskerry Division, and Cork County Board in memory of Macroom and Cork footballer, Tom Creedon, who died tragically in

Tom Creedon was born in 1954, and played football from underage to senior level for Macroom. He was a member of the Macroom team that won the under 14 County Schools Shield in 1967. He won mid-Cork medals at U16 in 1970, 5 minor medals from 1968 to 72, and 2

U21 medals in 1972 and 1974. At adult level, he won Muskerry Cup medals in 1981 and 82, an Intermediate Football League medal in 1981, and captained the Macroom team to win the County Intermediate Football Championship in 1982 to return to Senior ranks in 1983. He played his last Championship game with Macroom against St. Nick's in May 1983, with Macroom winning by 1-9 to 0-7.

His intercounty career began in 1972 when he was a member of the Cork Minor Football team that won the Munster and All-Ireland titles. He also won a Munster U21 Football medal in 1974 when Cork beat Kerry in the Munster Final. He

played on the Cork Senior Football team from 1975 to 1983, winning a National Football League medal in 1980 and played in 9 Munster Football Finals (including 2 replays in 1976 and 1982). He was a member of the Munster team that won the Railway Cup in 1981. Tom also played with UCC and was a member of the combined Universities team in 1976. He played with Muskerry from 1978 to 1982. Tom was a natural leader and captained Macroom at all levels. His much lamented death in August 1983 deprived Macroom of one of its greatest ever players.

Macroom GAA Presentations

At a very pleasant function in the Castle Hotel, Macroom GAA marked the recent retirement of their long serving secretary Pat O'Connell with a presentation to Pat and his wife Peggy. Club chairman, Joe Carroll, praised the work that Pato had done for Macroom GAA and also for the town of Macroom since becoming club secretary in 1992, 26 years ago. Pato, he said, was efficiency personified, and had dealt with weekly lotto, pitch bookings, grounds developments, grants procedures and procurements, as well as the everyday workings of the club and its many teams. The chairman revealed that Pat had missed only one committee meeting in all of the 26 years he acted as secretary and Joe said that the Macroom club and the town of Macroom would be forever indebted to Pat for all he had done for both. Joe made a suitable presentation to Pat and Peggy on behalf of the club and presented Peggy with a bouquet of flowers and wished them both well in the years to come. A photographic tribute, compiled with the assistance of Seán McSweeney, was

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: ADVOCACY SERVICE IN WEST CORK

QUESTION: If I feel I have been treated unfairly or have been refused an entitlement what support is there to enable me to assert my rights?

As part of its work, the local Citizens Information Service provides a free, independent and confidential advocacy service to people who need support or non-legal representation in accessing their rights and entitlements. Citizens Information may be able to advocate and help you if you find yourself in difficulty including finding yourself in any of the following situations:

- You feel that have been treated unfairly and need help to assert your rights
- You been refused a social welfare payment or have you had your payment stopped You feel that you are being treated unfairly at work
- You are having housing difficulties or at risk of homelessness
- You have a consumer problem

Advocacy helps you to have your voice heard on issues that are important to you. In doing advocacy, the Citizen Information Service moves beyond providing information and advice to supporting you with more difficult issues. It is a partnership between you and the Information Provider who will work with you to achieve the best possible outcome and will take no action without your consent.

Citizens Information provides advocacy in the following ways:

- Writing letters with you and on your behalf
- Negotiating with third parties such as employers, landlords, retailers or Government Departments on your behalf
- Preparing submissions for formal appeals such as Social Welfare appeal hearings or employment hearings Supporting/representing you in meetings with third parties
- Supporting/representing you in a formal hearing such as Workplace Relations Commission hearings, Social Welfare Appeal Hearings or Residential Tenancy Board hearings

However, Citizens Information cannot provide legal advice or represent you in civil or criminal courts. If you have a solicitor or trade union already acting for you on an issue, Citizens Information cannot offer an advocacy service

If you require advocacy support, you should contact your local Citizens Information Service and speak with an Information Provider, who will discuss your situation and ascertain if you have grounds for a case. The Information Provider will then explain the advocacy procedures to you.



TOP 10 TIPS FOR WINTER DRIVING

Taking a number of simple precautions can ensure safety on Irish roads during winter.

Don't get caught out if severe weather hits, make the necessary checks on your vehicle now. There are a number of simple precautions the RSA advises for driving over the winter months:

- 1. Check your tyres... they are your only contact with the road. Tyres should be at least the minimum legal thread depth of 1.6mm but need to be changed before they get this worn. Tyres need to be to the correct tyre pressure to give the motorist the best chance in extreme conditions
- 2. Use your lights. As we come into the winter months, motorists are advised to use dipped head lights during the day so you are easily seen. Headlights and taillights should be in working order.
- 3. Understand your brakes. Check your car manual and find out if your vehicle has safety assist technology such as Electronic Stability Control (ESC) or Anti-Lock Braking System (ABS). Learn how these technologies can assist your driving in harsh weather conditions.
- 4. Safe Distance. It takes longer to stop a car during the winter weather so slow down and allow extra distance between you and the car in
- 5. Make sure you can clearly see. All too often motorists do not de-fog or de-ice windows and mirrors which can compromise visibility. This winter ensure windows and mirrors are clear, and carry a de-icer and screen scraper. Do not use boiling water as this can crack the windscreen.



- 6. Beware of "Black Ice". Black Ice is one of winter's biggest hazards as it is difficult to see. Watch out for sheltered/ shaded areas on roads, under trees and near high walls.
- 7. Be prepared. During these winter months it is advised that motorists carry a number of essentials in the boot of their car.
- 1) High visibility vest
- 2) Spare fuel
- 3) Appropriate footwear in case you need to leave your vehicle e.g. boots
- 4) A hazard warning triangle
- 5) Spare wheel (Check that your spare wheel is in good condition and is fully inflated. Some cars may have an inflation repair kit instead of a spare wheel. Make sure that you know how to use it.)
- 6) Tow Rope
- 7) A shovel
- 8) De-icing equipment (for glass and door locks)
- 9) Spare bulbs
- 10) First aid kit

- 11) A fire extinguisher
- 12) A working torch
- 13) A car blanket, additional clothing & some food and water
- 8. In the event of a breakdown. Drivers need to ensure their vehicle is well in off the road so as not to obstruct other vehicles. The driver should also put on their hazard warning lights. If the vehicle breaks down on the motorway pull in as far as you can, alerting traffic behind you with hazard lights. The driver should leave their vehicle, get behind the barrier (on the embankment) and call the Gardaí, on their mobile phone or roadside telephone.
- 9. Keep up to date. Listen to local weather and traffic reports. Pay heed to the weather warnings alerting drivers of unsafe and dangerous driving conditions
- 10. Check out the RSA's publication 'Severe Weather Advice for Road Users' for more detailed advice on what to do if severe weather strikes!

ARE YOU WINTER READY?

Bad weather such as torrential rain, severe winds, fog, ice and snow can strike suddenly catching road users off guard.

If Severe Weather Strikes! Before setting off on a journey check to see if there are any problems on your intended route.

Is Your Journey Absolutely Necessary?: In extreme weather conditions you should ask yourself if making a journey by road is absolutely necessary? If it is not you might consider delaying your trip until the weather and road conditions improve. If using the roads in such conditions is unavoidable be prepared. The golden rule is to drive, cycle or walk with care and caution and expect the unexpected.

Is Your Vehicle Ready for Winter?

As the saying goes Prevention is better than cure', so take some time to prepare both your vehicle and yourself for the challenges of winter driving. Don't get caught out when severe weather strikes.

Your first step should be to get your vehicle serviced to ensure it is fit and safe for winter driving. Secondly you should carry out regular checks on the vehicle.

You should: Check for wear and tear on wiper

blades and replace them as soon as they start to smear rather than clean windows.

keep tyre pressure at the manufacturer's recommended level and check you have at least 3 millimetres of tread depth.

check that your spare wheel is in good condition and is fully inflated. Some cars may have an inflation repair kit instead of a spare wheel. Make sure that you know how to use it. Make sure all vehicle lights are working and clean and top up with anti-freeze and screen wash.

SAFETY TIPS FOR OLDER DRIVERS

For most, continuing to drive as they get older is important as it helps them stay active in their communities and access essential services. However, as we age there are particular driving risks to be aware of.





SETTING UP A FARMING COMPANY

Company Law. The farm business becoming limited liability company is something that has become increasingly popular in the agricultural sector. For the purposes of this article, I will outline some of the advantages and disadvantages of incorporation.

Advantages

Limited Liability: One of the most significant advantages to incorporation is limited liability. This essentially means that there is a limit put on the responsibility of the company shareholders to pay the debts of the company in the event the company runs out of money and becomes insolvent. The company is the farmer.

Succession Planning: A company can be easier to split amongst shareholders or successors by allocation of shares. It can be less complicated to divide shares in a farming company among children than to divide a sole trader farming business among them.

Tax Purposes: One of the most beneficial features of incorporating are the significant tax advantages. However, to benefit from the tax advantages it is important to ascertain as to whether your business and scale suits the move to incorporation. Essentially, if your farm business turnover is reaching the higher tax band, then it may well be more tax efficient to incorporate. For example, if a self-employed person's earning capacity was over the higher tax band then they could be taxed at 55%, whereas the corporation tax for a company's trading profits would be at the lower rate of 12.5%.

A farmer also needs to consider the amount of money he or she draws from the business for his or her own personal use. There may be income available to a farmer outside of the company, for example, rental income or a spouse's income, and then a farmer and his or her family has a reduced need to extract money from the company for personal use. This is important

because if a farmer draws large amounts of money from the business for his or her own use, then the benefits of incorporation would be significantly reduced. Money drawn down from a business would be subject to the normal tax regime and it is only money that is left in the company that benefit's from the 12.5% tax rate. One of the main issues in determining if incorporation is the right move is the essentially the turnover of the farm business. If the annual turnover in a farm business is reaching the higher tax band, then a farmer should seek advice from his or her solicitor in relation to the option of incorporation. The above are only a very brief summary of the tax issues to examine if considering incorporation.

Business expansion: If you are considering buying agricultural land in the future it is tax efficient to allow profits to build up through a company. Earnings can be retained within the company for the purposes of investment. Disadvantages

Bank loans: Existing loans would have to be renegotiated as the facility agreements would have been in the sole traders' name. In these circumstances, the Bank would have to draw up a fresh facility agreement transferring the loan to the company. This involves legal fees, land registry fees, time, inconvenience and negotiating a new loan with the bank. However, it can also be an opportunity to negotiate more favourable terms with your bank. The benefits of incorporation can also far outweigh any expense and inconvenience involved in the set up on incorporation.

Inheritance and Succession Planning. Consider the future and both your short term and long term plans for the business. If one is thinking of retirement soon, incorporation is not an option. A successor will not qualify for young trained farmer relief in the event that he or she takes the gift in the name of a company. He or she must farm for over 5 years. If farmland is in the name of a company, it may not be considered an agricultural asset for agricultural relief in respect of gifts or inheritances.

Costs and Administration. One must register the company name. One must register with the Revenue Commissioners. One must obtain clearance from the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine. One must arrange to transfer the herd number into the company name. Banks accounts will have to be set up in the name of the company. Annual accounts need to be prepared, which usually involve higher accountancy costs.

Farmers thinking about incorporating their farming business should obtain professional legal and tax advice in relation to their own business and set of circumstances.
