



## Tidy Towns Update

**Biodiversity Project.** This year, the Tidy Towns is putting a major focus on the planting of native trees and shrubs for biodiversity and on Saturday, 16th February, a massive total 290 Trees and shrubs were planted by a large group of Volunteers. The holes had been dug on a previous workday. The particular species were all selected for their pollination benefits, their feed value for birds and wildlife and also, for riverbank stabilisation. These were planted downstream from the main bridge over the Sullane, along by the back of the Fairy Park in Masseytown, as far as Coolehane.

The following were planted; 50 Crab Apple, 50 Willow, 50 Alder and 50 Hazel, and ten each of the following trees: Elderberry, Blackthorn, Sweet Cherry, Hawthorn, Mountain Ash. Ten each of the following shrubs were also planted: Viburnum. Pyracantha, Berberis, Dogwood. Labelling of the trees will soon be carried out to increase awareness of this project and this will include the Latin names of each species.

Tidy Towns Public Meeting. The Tidy Towns held an open public meeting in the Castle Hotel on February 13th. This was well attended, with people coming from all over, from Glanmire to Ballyvourney, from Donoughmore to Ballingeary. Margaret Griffin was guest speaker and gave a most interesting talk and slide presentation that stimulated the audience and had some

interesting proposals for aspects of Macroom. The talk focused on the theme of planting for biodiversity and use of natives and pollinator friendly varieties. All householders were advised that they can make a positive contribution to protecting the bees and helping pollination. In cases this will involve less grass cutting and this will be part of the Tidy Towns work plans from here on. Each estate in Macroom is being requested to identify areas within their residential area that can be managed for biodiversity, whereby grassy areas will be allowed develop as part of the plan to provide habitats for bees, insects and wildlife.


## Cope Raises €3,500

## Remembering a World War 1 Soldier from Inchigeela

Private Patrick J O'Sullivan of the 168th Infantry Regiment, 42nd Division was born in Inchigeela in 1893 and lived where the Briar Rose Bar stands now. As a young man growing up in Inchigeela, he was very actively involved in local sports and athletics and was a national champion, winning the long jump at the All Ireland Track and Field Championships in 1914. He also held the National long jump record at the time and competed in the Hop Step and Jump (now known as the triple jump) at these championships.

Little is known about his early life but in 1915 Patrick emigrated to America at the request of his uncle, to help run his business, and while living in Massachusetts, he signed up to the American Army in 1917. After training in Boston for a few months, he was stationed in Northern France and fought in the Battle of St. Michel. This was a very important battle in WWI and played a huge part in ending the war. Patrick played his part in this battle and suffered gas poisoning in the trenches of St Michel and died on November 22nd 1918, ten days after the war ended. Patrick is buried in St Michel American Cemetery along with 4,200 other soldiers from seventeen different countries, all who fought for America. There are approximately thirty other Irish men interred there also.

Patrick was one of three brothers who fought in WWI, including Con – a ship radio officer and Dan who was stationed in North Africa. A fourth brother was Doctor Tim O Sullivan who worked in Macroom as a G.P. Patrick also had two sisters – Mrs May O'Callaghan, Inchigeela and Mrs Peg Grace who lived in Waterford. Dan and Con survived the war and, on returning home to Inchigeela, both settled down to normal life. Dan subsequently married Nora Lucey, Ballingeary

and had three daughters – Ann Kelleher of the Briar Rose Bar Inchigeela, Margaret Forde, now in Midleton and Kathleen O'Leary, Clondrohid. Dan was also a fine sportsman and while working in Thurles in the Post Office, he was captain of the Thurles rugby team that won the Garryowen cup three years running.

On the 20th November 2018, on the 100th anniversary of his death, Kathleen O'Leary fulfilled a lifelong ambition and travelled to France with her sons, Michael and Fintan, and her granddaughter, Neve, to pay their respects at Uncle Paddy's Grave. As we made the 3 hour drive to St Michel, we were struck by the monuments and signposts all over this area of France pertaining to WW1. There were British, German, American and French monuments at various locations along the roads, all of which heightened our sense of what happened 100 years ago in this area. On a bitterly cold November day, it was sobering to stand in the

midst of 4,200 white crosses and reflect on what it must have been like for these brave men as they gave their lives to free Europe from the Germans. This was the war that changed how armies fought. The British started the war still charging on horseback, waving swords, but soon realized that this way was over, given the firepower the Germans put on the field. Trench warfare was the order of the day and the losses were enormous on both sides.

It was very gratifying to see the respect and care that the American people take in looking after the cemetery As we prayed and laid a wreath at his grave, we could not help but think on the futility of war and came to the conclusion that, as the Archduke Ferdinand and politicians of the time played their games, it was the ordinary people like Uncle Paddy who suffered the consequences.

## Kilmichael Ambush, 28/11/1920

A three part series of articles by Con Kelleher will study Kilmichael Ambush in depth under the following headings: Context, Combat, Casualties, Controversies and Conclusions and consider 'Our boys' and 'the other boys'.

**INTRODUCTION:** Kilmichael is a guiet isolated parish in West Cork and is crossed by the main Macroom-Dunmanway road. Perhaps the most notorious and celebrated action of the Irish War of Independence took place in the intersection of its town-lands of Shanacashel, Cooleclevane and Haremount. The Kilmichael Ambush occurred on the 28th of November 1920, a little over 98 years ago. In the ambush, 36 Irish men killed seventeen British men and permanently damaged one more; the British killed three Irish volunteers. The Ambush is commemorated in song, story, articles, books and films. 'The Boys of Kilmichael'(1) is its most famous commemorating ballad and is learned by many school children, including the writer when young, and, for most people, it is the story of the ambush.

The narrative of the ballad suited both sides. The British forces – the Auxiliaries - are cast in the role of the mighty foe, an elite corps of soldiers; their reputation alone was a weapon. Paradoxically, it fitted perfectly with the needs of the IRA because, slaying a 'Goliath', carries great kudos. I examine why 20 young men were killed that day and suggest that they were as much victims victims of violent republicanism on one hand and British policy on the other..

CONTEXT: 1918 saw the end of World War 1; the Spanish 'flu raged across the world and killed fifty to one hundred million people; women voted in Ireland and Britain in general elections for the first time; Sinn Féin's sweeping victory in the General Election of December was mirrored by the Unionists' hegemony in the North-East. The first Dáil sat in January 21st 1919. That day in an unauthorised IRA ambush at Soloheadbeg, Co. Tipperary, two RIC men, John O'Connell and James McDonnell, were killed. John O'Connell was from Coachford. The encounter is traditionally regarded as the opening action of the War of Independence (2). Assassinations accounted for much of the killing

in 1920-21. From early 1920, many unoccupied barracks were destroyed and occupied ones attacked, principally to obtain arms. The unlawful killings of IRA volunteers followed and Tomás Mac Curtain was assassinated at home on March 20th 1920. Terence McSwiney died in October following a seventy four day hunger strike. The gaze of the world was on Ireland. The Restoration of Order in Ireland Act in August

1920 placed many crimes under the jurisdiction of military courts. An unintended consequence was the emergence of IRA 'flying columns' or elite service units. After that, successful IRA attacks became more destructive (3). Kilmichael Ambush fell within this framework.

#### **COMBAT 1 - A DESCRIPTION**

The ballad 'The Boys of Kilmichael' contains the following lines:


And they met with the boys of the column Who made a clean sweep of the lot and

Then here's to the boys of Kilmichael Who feared not the might of the foe (4).

The previous Sunday, Nov. 21st 1920, was 'Bloody Sunday'. In the morning, Michael hit-squad assassinated Intelligence officers and others - fourteen in all -; that afternoon in Croke Park at a challenge football match between Dublin and Tipperary before a crowd of about 5,000 (5). Auxiliaries fired indiscriminately and killed a player and spectators - 16 in total died as a result - In the following week the country was feverish and on edge. Tom Barry, a World War 1 veteran, was 22 years when he commanded the IRA column at Kilmichael. The contingent of 36 riflemen had trained for a week before at Clogher (6) and all but one, apart from Barry, were inexperienced. Pat Deasy, only 16 (4), 4 tagged along behind the group and, fatally for him, it was too near the ambush site, or Barry was too soft, for him to be sent home. The IRA unit had assembled at 2.00 a.m. at Ahalina, Ballineen, and marched the 15 kilometres to Kilmichael. The weather was wretched and the men were soaked and

cold. Their only 'food' all day was bread and tea supplied by local sympathisers. Barry set up his group as per the diagram (7)










#### LEE VALLEY UPDATES

Two lorries carried eighteen Auxiliary Division Royal Irish Constables (ADRIC) in convoy and they were searching for IRA volunteers in Coppeen. Inspector/Colonel Crake was the leader. By November 1920 most of the local rural RIC barracks had been abandoned. The Crown policed the area in patrols and had succeeded, to a large degree, in quietening the district. Perhaps complacency had set in; the patrol routes were predictable (8) and possibly information was supplied. It was about 4.05 p.m. when the vehicles reached the ambush site and light was fading.

In Guerrilla Days in Ireland, Barry wrote that he was at the command post (9); wearing an Officer's uniform, he stood on the road and the first lorry slowed (10). The shooting started and Barry threw a bomb. The Auxiliaries in that truck

(Phase one, 1st lorry) were dealt with guickly and soon, all the men in the first vehicle were dead or badly wounded see diagram. When the firing had started, the second lorry tried to reverse and turn but a wheel got stuck in the side of the road. Section 2 engaged; the constables jumped out and sought cover as best they could. Several Auxiliaries were shot; Barry said a 'We surrender' was heard (11); the IRA men stopped shooting and some left their positions. Some Auxiliaries opened fire again. Jim O'Sullivan was shot and killed instantly: Michael McCarthy was very badly injured and died quickly at the ambush scene or on the way to Gortroe. Young Pat Deasy was also badly hurt and died later that night in Buttimers' house (12). Barry vehemently asserted that there was a 'False Surrender'8 (8) and his account is generally accepted as true.


The IRA men recommenced shooting and made a 'clear sweep of the lot'. Prof. John A Murphy, UCC, when speaking as Gaeilge in Pat Butler's documentary on the Kilmichael Ambush (13), said that there is another rougher version of the first quotation above and it was, perhaps, nearer to the truth and it went -

## And they met with the boys of the column Who made 's...' of the whole 'f...ing' lot.

Barry took responsibility for the command to keeping firing until he ordered 'Cease Fire'; and that was not to stop shooting until all the enemy combatants were dead (14).

#### KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: **TAX STATEMENTS REPLACING P45s & P60s**

#### QUESTION:

What is replacing P45 and P60 statements?

Since 1 January 2019, P45s and P60s have been abolished and replaced with an online system as part of PAYE modernisation. You will no longer get a P45 if you leave your job. Instead, your employer must now send this information electronically to Revenue. The P60 certificate will be replaced by an end of year statement.

Your 2018 P60 is the last P60 that you will get from your employer. Your end of year statement for 2019 will be available after 31 December 2019 through Revenue's myAccount service. An end of year statement includes details of all your pay and the income tax, USC and PRSI deducted by your employer during the year. It also records your Local Property Tax (LPT) deductions (if you choose to have the LPT deducted from your pay).

The beautiful Ballad "Grace" is base on true love story Joseph Mary Plunkett and Grace Gifford. Joseph

and Grace had planned to get married Easter 1916 but the marriage had been postponed

because of the Easter Rising in which Joseph was one of the 1916 leaders. Joseph's (Aide De Camp) in the GPO was Michael Collins one of our very own Cork men. Because of Joseph Mary Plunketts part in the 1916 Easter Rising he was arrested and placed in Kilmainham jail. Because of Joseph's arrest it was then left to Grace Gifford to plan the marriage and on May 3rd 1916 she made her way across Dublin to Mr. Stokes Jeweller shop on Grafton street to purchase a wedding ring. Grace wore a veil over her face and the Jeweller could see tears rolling down Graces face and her distress as he tried to comfort Grace she then told him that she was going to marry Joseph Mary Plunkett that evening.

She paid for the wedding ring and left for the prison at Kilmainham in which she arrived at 6pm that evening. But she had to wait in the dark until 11pm surrounded by men with guns at the ready, what a terrible atmosphere for a lady like Grace. Eventually Joseph Mary Plunkett was brought down stairs into the Kilmainham Chapel.

Joseph and Grace were married by candle light by Fr. Eugene McCarthy in the Briefest of Ceremony. They had no time together as Joseph Mary Plunkett was taken back to his cell. Grace then left the prison.

The following morning Joseph Mary Plunkett was taken out at Dawn and was executed.

The pop star Rod Stewart has recently recorded the Ballad Grace. Rod Stewart will be live in concert in Cork's Páirc Uí Chaoimh next May. When Rod Stewart will sing "Grace" in the park this will be a magical moment with the crowds singing along with him as a new generation will know the human cost and the price Joseph

Mary Plunkett and Grace Gifford paid for Irish freedom. Joseph Mary Plunkett was the youngest to sign proclamation (Poblacht Na hFireann) with wordings of fairness and equality. He is as relevant today as he Mary O'Callaghan-Hallisey was over a hundred Raleigh North, Macroom. vears ago.





# A Word of Victory

Welcome back dear reader, "...to obey is better than sacrifice...for rebellion is as the sin of witchcraft and stubbornness is as iniquity and idolatry...because you have rejected the Word of the Lord, He has also rejected you..." (1 Samuel 15:22-24). This is what Samuel the prophet told King Saul when he disobeyed God, and came under witchcraft because he did what the people wanted instead of what God had told him to do. Witchcraft, idolatry, sorcery and divination are as much alive today as ever - they are just dressed up differently. Many people who are deeply spiritual believe in God and desire to please Him, but get deceived into becoming involved in occultic things, and very often it's because it is presented in a nice way by those whom they trust. This is why it is so important to investigate things for yourself friend, so that you don't get swept along by what everyone is doing.
