

They will also witness, from the passenger seat, the immediate aftermath of a serious incident from when first responders arrive on the scene. This experience, hopefully, delivered the vital message of road safety into the minds of our students.

Alcohol and Illegal Drug abuse. The 4th year students had a talk recently with community worker, Kevin Rafferty, on the impact of Alcohol and illegal drugs. This was a very informative presentation and we would like to thank Kevin

Daffodil Day's 25th in Ballyvourney

As Daffodil Day approaches once again, Ballyvourney will be celebrating. You ask why? Well, this will be their 25th Daffodil Day Coffee Morning. But for the first steps taken by Fionn McSweeney and Mary O'Connell, we wouldn't be here celebrating a quarter of a century later. Fionn McSweeney gives a trip down memory lane and relays how it all began:

"Well, way back in 1994 cancer awareness was nowhere as high profile as it is now. My Dad had died in 1986, aged 55, of Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma, just 11 months after I got married and moved to Ballyvourney. The first Irish Cancer Society Daffodil Day was in 1988 and a few

years later, Coffee Mornings started to creep in as fundraisers on the day. Once my daughter Saorlaith started school, I had the idea of running a Daffodil Day Coffee Morning and a friend suggested Lapproach Mary O'Connell (formerly of O'Connell's Pub) to see if I could use the back room in the pub as a venue. Coffee Mornings weren't a thing in the area. Mary wasn't 100 per cent sure what exactly I was up to but she threw herself into it with great enthusiasm, brought out all her best china and was literally taking scones out of the oven and straight to the table on the day. I did the sweet stuff as well as scones but, after that first year, Mary did all the scones

and I did the cakes. I think if that first morning wasn't such a phenomenal success, it would have been a once off. I never expected it to still be going 25 years later. I really do take my hat off to the community because it's their support over a quarter of a century that has made this day what it is".

Motor Neurone Fundraisers

This amount was raised through various fundraising events and donations made in Kerry and Cork to support the work of the IMNDA.

These events included Flag Days in Killarney in 2017 and 2018, Cheque Presentations from Tralee Lions Club for 2017 and 2018, Killarney Soroptimists, Ring of Kerry Charity cycle, Ballinagree Vintage Club and numerous ceili's

and coffee mornings to raise awareness and funds for Motor Neurone.

Marie Reavey, IMNDA said, "We cannot thank everyone from Kerry and North Cork enough for their fantastic support. Kerry Friends of Motor Neurone have been tirelessly fundraising for the IMNDA since 2011. We would be lost without their continued support as over 83% of our income comes from fundraising and donations. Without support such as this, we would be unable continue providing vital services for people living with Motor Neurone Disease."

Motor Neurone Disease (MND) is a progressive neurological condition that attacks the motor neurones, or nerves, in the brain and spinal cord. This means messages gradually stop reaching muscles, which leads to weakness and wasting. MND can affect how you walk, talk, eat, drink and breathe. MND is often referred to as the 1,000 day disease as most people die within 1,000 days of symptom onset. 1 person dies every 2 days from MND.

The national charity is the primary support organisation for those affected by Motor Neurone Disease. The IMNDA provides specialised services for people affected by this debilitating disease such as equipment on loan, financial assistance towards home help, advice and home visits by MND Nurse. There are currently over 360 people living with MND in Ireland, 11 of which are from Kerry.





Kilmichael Ambush, 28/11/1920

Second in a three part series of articles by Con Kelleher in which he studied Kilmichael Ambush in depth under the following headings: Context, Combat, Casualties, Controversies and Conclusions and considers 'Our boys' and 'the other boys'.

CASUALTIES 1: However, Kilmichael had casualties. Jim O'Sullivan, Michael McCarthy and Pat Deasy were killed - two died at the scene, Pat Deasy later; two more IRA men were injured. Another volunteer died after some months. Sixteen Auxiliaries were killed in the ambush. Guthrie, the driver of the second lorry, escaped. He was subsequently caught, tried, shot, first buried in Annahala, and later re-interred in Inchigeela. Forde was the only Auxiliary survivor; he was presumed dead at

the site. The following day he was found to be alive, but his injuries left him permanently braindamaged. Several local houses, including Kelly's and O'Donoghue's, were burned down in the following days. Men fled from their homes in the

Kilmichael and Macroom areas. The following week both Macroom Boys' National School and Droumleigh (from Wednesday) were closed and the latter did not re-open until Dec. 13th (1).



Mary Hourihan (neé O'Mahony) and Kate McSweeney (neé Murphy) shared recollections of the day and the weeks following the ambush (2). Mary recalled that they heard gunfire and later saw smoke rising in the distance. Kate was staying with her sister at Kilmichael Bar that night and recounted that she heard footsteps on the road and seeing a solitary soldier - Guthrie presumably. At the intervention of a local priest, a widow's house was spared. Within 14 days - and following an ambush at Dillon's Cross - on the night of December 10/11, in reprisal, Cork City centre was set ablaze by out-of-control Auxiliaries (3). Martial Law was declared on Dec 10th. On Dec. 15th, Canon Magn(i)er, the elderly Catholic P.P. of Dunmanway, and Tadhg Crowley, were shot and killed outside Dunmanway (4). An innocent man, Denis O'Sullivan, was shot at that time at the rear of Kilmichael Bar, what is now Collins' pub/shop/ P.O in Kilmichael (5). Intensified coercion on the local towns, villages and country-side followed, and Macroom itself was lucky to escape burning. Lady Ardilaun - she was the owner of Macroom Castle and of many properties in the town and surrounding areas - intervened with Major-General Sir Henry Tudor, Auxiliary Police Commander, and her intercession was probably crucial (6)

CONSEQUENCES: The significance Kilmichael is undoubted. Victory at Kilmichael was the first military success of its kind by the IRA in the War of Independence and showed that the IRA could beat British officers in the field (7). It demonstrated that the IRA, with proper preparation and organization, could defeat British military units. Volunteers, despite little training but with courage, discipline and the support of the people, could prevail. The victory improved the morale


and confidence of the I.R.A.; it made Barry's and the column's reputations, and led to the legend of Kilmichael. But perhaps the greatest effect was in London. Britain was war-weary and hugely in debt. The economy was depressed and the heroes of WW1 were disillusioned and often poor. Lloyd George adopted a policy of coercion and conciliation as his government was alarmed by the capacity of the IRA to win in the field. It was going to be a difficult, if not impossible, war to win. Guerrilla tactics, and in particular ambushes, have the element of surprise and the idea is to apply maximum force in a small area within a concentrated time and to kill and injure as many as possible; you then escape as quickly as you can. Backing the military threat was Sinn Féin's huge election victory in 1918, the establishment of the Dáil and an alternative Irish government, the functioning of Sinn Féin courts (8), the almost total breakdown in normal Crown policing and the threat of civil war between Orange and Green. The aspiration of Home Rule was well superseded and what was now for negotiation was much more substantial. Some suggest that Bloody Sunday and Kilmichael and the ongoing violence delayed the inevitable truce and peace talks.

CONTROVERSIES: There are several contested aspects of the events at the Ambush. The major ones refer to the 'false surrender' and the allegation of mutilations of the British casualties. In 1998 Peter Hart, a Queen's University Belfast lecturer and military historian, published the book 'The IRA and Its Enemies Violence and Community in Cork 1916-1923'. He asserted that Barry's account of what happened at Kilmichael is wrong; that there was no 'false surrender'. If Hart is right, what happened was a massacre.

Hart claims Barry gave several different accounts (9). in Atlas of the Irish Revolution uses the word 'massacre' also in relation to the ambush (10).

'The circumstances of this massacre have caused considerable debate in vears '

General Crozier, **Auxiliary** еχ Commander, at the time accepted that

there was a false surrender and 'blamed' the Auxiliary(ies) who opened fire again for the deaths of his Auxiliary comrades - 'The men did so were called upon to surrender and did so throwing up their hands and grounding their rifles' (11). Meda Ryan, in particular, (and several other historians including Brian Murphy), in her books examines the basis of Hart's allegations and fiercely contests them (12). She guotes the testimony of IRA volunteers at Kilmichael. Dan Hourihane was beside Jim O'Sullivan and Jack Hennessey was beside Michael McCarthy (13); both McCarthy and O'Sullivan were killed in the ambush. Experts on both sides of the argument have weighed in. At times the debate has become heated and sometimes bitter. Rvan cites the anonymity of Hart's witnesses, whether his 'reporters' were still alive when he says he spoke to them and the fact that Barry's version was verified by the Kilmichael IRA men (14).

LEE VALLEY UPDATES

In his book, The Transformation of Ireland 1900-2000, Diarmuid Ferriter wrote 'Hart's revision served to illustrate the murky reality of such exercises, militarily and morally. If such detailed document hoovering was done for other events, it would doubtless rattle the bones of other heroes' (15).

The second big controversy is whether the bodies were mutilated or not. Shortly after the Ambush, the British Army published a press release accusing the IRA of post-mortem mutilation (16). On Dec. 2nd 1920, The Times (London) newspaper published an official report from 'a senior officer' of the police in the Cork neighbourhood which included the following: 'The dead and wounded were hacked about the head with axes, shot guns were fired into their bodies, and they were savagely mutilated'. Tom Barry countered this with: 'This mutilation allegation was a vicious and calumnious lie' (17). Crozier accepts that 'the battered condition of the police' was as a result of the 'hand-to-hand combat of the fiercest kind'that ensued (18). Hart quotes the evidence of Dr. Jeremiah Kelleher. South Square, Macroom (19). Dr Kelleher was very much a Loyalist, whose son, Phil aged 23, an outstanding rugby player and who had won a Military Cross medal in WW1, had been shot and killed by the IRA in Kitty Kiernan's family's hotel in Granard, Co. Longford, on October 31st 1920, just 28 days before the ambush. Dr Kelleher performed the post mortem examinations and was the coroner at the inquest. Prof. John A. Murphy noted that Dr. Kelleher was well known in local IRA circles for confidentially treating their wounded volunteers (20). Hart accepts that ... 'the medical evidence does not support the accusations of mutilation' (21).








Cork secured their first win of this season's







KNOW YOUR RIGHTS:

OUESTION:

My son is exempted from studying Irish. Can he still go on to study at third level?

Students must have the academic entry requirements (also called matriculation requirements) for the third level course they want to take. You can get detailed information on these requirements directly from the universities, technological universities, institutes of technology and colleges of education.

If a certain mark in the Irish Leaving Certificate exam is a matriculation requirement, students who had an exemption from the study of Irish may also be exempted from this requirement. Exemptions from Irish matriculation requirements may be granted, for example, to a student who was born outside Ireland, was educated wholly or partly outside Ireland or who has a specific learning disability. This is a matter for each individual college.

All students applying for a third-level course through the Central Applications Office (CAO) should send a copy of their exemption certificate with their CAO application form.

The college may also ask the student to complete a separate exemption application form and to submit supporting documentation. You should check with the individual college for details on how to apply for an exemption.

Welcome back dear reader, continuing on the subject of Peace - where do you feel it most when you are worried and anxious - your mind and head right? But Jesus also knew that it was the will of Father God to make a way for mankind's sins to be forgiven and washed away by a sinless sacrifice one time for all - and HE was the sacrifice (Romans 5:6; Hebrews 10:8-18). When you ask Jesus into your heart and make Him Lord over your life you are accepting all the benefits He won at the Cross, where He became cursed so that we could be blessed as a result of His sacrifice (Galatians 3:13). Jesus defeated every curse, torment, fear, anxiety and worry for you and me there - He endured a death that no one has ever experienced and came out the other side victorious (Hebrews 2:14-15). You may be going through hardship and torment at the moment but listen friend, Jesus knows what that is like and He wants you to be delivered from it, and give you His Peace because He already paid the price to set you free. All you have to do is come to Him, and call on Him as Lord (Acts 2:21) and receive His Peace. "Come to Me all you who are weary and carry heavy burdens and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). 

he spring education open day is set to take place in Clonakilty Agricultural College on Friday, 8th

This past September has seen the revised education programme for Level 5/6 courses implemented in Clonakilty Agricultural College based in Darrara just outside the town of Clonakilty. For students attending these courses there is a greater emphasis on farm safety, grassland management sustainability.

People coming to see the college and what's on offer will be brought through the different programmes that lead to qualifications from Level 5 up to Level 8.

For students starting at Level 5 next

September, there are a couple of changes to the programme which should help with the learning experience. In 1st year, students will go on short 4-week placement early in the course, in October, and return to that farm again in the following spring. During their time in the college between September and May they'll get the foundation training in areas of livestock husbandry, grassland management, farm business and more specific training in areas such as pesticide application.

In 2nd year which starts the following September the course specialises in either Drystock (Cattle and Sheep) or the longer-established Dairy Herd Management course. Both courses would have longer periods of on-farm training incorporating the calving/lambing periods on farms but also the breeding season on cattle and dairy farms.

Graduates of Clonakilty's Level 6 programme have many routes of progression after the two years with us. The Level 6 in its own right is required for applying for jobs with the Department of Agriculture. By 2020 there will be an apprenticeship route in place with a Level 7 qualification. This will be an important extension to the current programmes as there is an everincreasing demand from farmers in the region to have enthusiastic, forward-thinking young people looking to manage the farms of the next decade. In this respect it is one area of the rural economy where it is a sellers' market.

The higher education routes still exist and continue to expand with graduates of Darrara able to gain "advanced entry" to degree courses in agriculture in all of the Institutes of Technology in Munster; including Cork, Tralee and Waterford.

For people who have a nonagricultural qualification there is the option of gaining a Teagasc Green Cert (the Specific Purpose Certificate in Farming) through a part-time route.

The Open Day starts at 11am on the morning of March 8th and all are welcome to explore their options in agricultural education and job prospects that can arise from coming to Darrara in 2019.
