
St Michaels 3-12 Macroom 1-14



COGNITIVE BEHAVIOUR THERAPY (CBT)

Cognitive Behaviour Therapy (CBT) and Acceptance and Commitment Therapy (ACT) are researched and proven models of therapy. These sister therapies are very popular at this time, because they are 'issue' focussed, client-centred and time limited. In my own private practice the average number of sessions needed to cover the course of therapy is five. In a busy world this makes perfect sense, simply because it saves time and cuts down on cost.

CBT/ ACT can be used successfully to treat a wide spectrum of psychological and emotional presentations. For example anxiety, phobias, depression, relationships and work issues. These two therapies focus on the here and now, even though some emotional problems can traced back over many years its only in the present moment, the here and now that we can bring about change in our lives.

In the first session CBT/ ACT principals are explained to the client, where we look at thoughts, feelings, body sensations and behaviours, using a basic diagram. The client is then helped to understand how we humans function from a cognitive behaviour point of view. This understanding is

necessary as we move through the course of therapy. In the first session we also practice mindfulness meditation and moment-to-moment awareness. Learning to live in the present moment can be a useful skill in this fast moving world of ours.

In subsequent sessions we look at and identify our life values, for instance, what's important to you? who is important to you? What kind of person do you want to be in your relationship with other people. This is the part of the therapeutic process where we concentrate on behaviour change,

again using a diagram the client is helped to identify and understand the concept of behaviour change. Progressive behaviour change will lead in time to a change in mood. In the last section of CBT/ACT commitment to change is fostered and encouraged, using positive re-enforcement that's gained during the course of therapy.

DISMISSING AN EMPLOYEE

Unfair dismissal is governed in Ireland by the Unfair Dismissals Acts 1977-2001, and two fundamental principles should be noted.

- 1. An employer must have substantial grounds for dismissing an employee;
- 2. In doing so, the employer must apply fair procedures to the process. The Unfair Dismissals Acts cover people who have been in employment for at least 52 weeks continuous service and have not yet reached the normal retirement age for the employment in question.

Certain reasons for dismissal are considered to be automatically unfair. These include:

- membership or proposed membership of a trade union or engaging in trade union activities
- legal proceedings against an employer where an employee is a party or a witness
- race, colour, sexual orientation, age or membership of the Traveller community.
- pregnancy, giving birth or breastfeeding or any matters connected with pregnancy or birth
- availing of rights under legislation such as maternity leave, adoptive leave, carer's leave, parental or force majeure leave
- · unfair selection for redundancy

To dismiss fairly, you need a combination of one of the five potentially fair statutory reasons plus a procedure that is fair and reasonable.

The five potentially fair reasons to dismiss an employee are:

- 1. Conduct or Behaviour
- 2. Capability
- 3. Redundancy
- 4. Breach of Statutory Restriction or;
- 5. Some other substantial reason

Normally before a dismissal, the employer should arrange a disciplinary

hearing. At the hearing, the employee should be given the opportunity to relay their side of the story to the other side and to challenge the evidence. Employees should also be allowed to be accompanied by a colleague or a trade union representative, who can ask questions and represent them.

Employees cannot be sacked for a first offence unless their behaviour is so serious and it amounts to gross misconduct.

If the issue relates to an employee's performance, they should be warned and given time to improve before being dismissed. They must be given informal and formal warnings. They must be given an opportunity to appeal against the dismissal too, and most employers will allow staff to appeal against written and final warnings.

It is also important that every business has a disciplinary policy. The question as to whether or not your employer had a dismissal procedure in place will be taken into account when deciding if a dismissal was unfair. It is very important that as an employer you seek legal advice before dismissing an employee.




