

Local Government in Macroom

The May 2019 local elections have resulted in very strong local representation for the town in the newly drawn Macroom Municipal District. In the previous Blarney - Macroom Municipal Council, the representatives were Michael Creed and Ted Lucey F.G., Gobnait Moynihan and Bob Ryan F.F., Kevin Conway, Independent and Des O'Grady, replaced by Ronnie Morley, Sinn Féin. Many felt the town was being neglected and now, have great hopes for the new Council: Michael Creed, Ted Lucey and Eileen Lynch F.G., Gobhait Moynihan and Michael Looney F.F. and Martin Coughlan Independent.

Thirteen candidates contested the Macroom Municipal District, five women and eight men. There were 17,311 valid votes and the Quota was 2,474. First preference votes in numerical order went to: Michael Creed F.G. 2,954; Gobnait Moynihan F.F. 2,665; Michael Looney F.F. 2,234; Eileen Lynch F.G. 1,770; Martin Coughlan, Ind. 1.666; Ted Lucey F.G. 1,452; Áine Collins F.G. 1,338; Síle Ní Dhubhghaill S.D. 716; P.J. Feeney AON 602; Nigel Dennehy Ind. 584; Jason Fitzgerald F.F. 526; Ronnie Morley S.F. 512 and Mary O'Callaghan – Hallissey, Ind. 292.

Having exceeded the quota, Michael Creed and Gobnait Moynihan were elected in the first count; Michael Looney in the 6th count; Martin Coughlan in the 10th count and Ted Lucey and Eileen Lynch in the 11th count

Importance of Local Markets

The vital role that market places play in the life of rural communities will be celebrated and explored with local communities in four towns as Free Market embarks on a National Tour. Macroom, Castleblayney, Mountmellick and Killmallock are the chosen towns. Curated by a team of six architects and designers, Free Market aims to reassert the declining rural market square as a public place of social, political and cultural exchange, central to community cohesion. Once the economic and social hubs of rural Ireland, many market squares in these towns have seen their function as a place for exchange and congregation diminished. Many others have surrendered their role as markets and are now used only for car parking. Free Market first launched in Venice in May 2018 as the Irish National Pavilion at La Biennale

Architettura, where it occupied a large space in the Arsenale as a space for exchange for six months. In November 2018 the pavilion and exhibition was shipped back to Ireland and the curatorial team have been preparing an evolved design of the pavilion which will be bespoke for each of the four towns that it visits, landing in public spaces, inhabiting vacant spaces, coinciding with festivals and market days and, on its final stop, setting up shop in Killmallock library.

A key aim of the pavilion is to provoke conversation and ideas about the future of towns and to listen and collect information, thoughts, ideas and dreams for towns. As part of its national tour, the curators have planned a series of events, unique to each town, which they hope will spark conversations around the subject of towns. Events include walking tours, historical town scavenger hunts, vox pop recordings, panel discussions and public lectures. Free Market will be in Macroom from 21-23rd July. Detailed schedules will be published in local press and online ahead of the tour. Original content from the acclaimed Venice Biennale exhibition will be included in the National tour - including architectural models and drawings describing both the historic and contemporary conditions of the towns. Specially commissioned photographs and drone photography from each town will also be included, as will audio soundscapes and recordings. Free Market News, which contains writings on rural towns from nearly 40 expert contributors, will be distributed in each of the towns.

Disastrous Litter Result for Macroom Town

Having won the 2018 Cork County Council Inter Town Litter Challenge by a comfortable margin, Macroom finds itself bottom of the pile after the first round of the 2019 adjudication. Of the eight towns involved, Dunmanway leads with 994.2 marks, followed by Charleville, Carrigtwohill, Crosshaven, Skibbereen, Ballincollig, Fermoy and Schull. Macroom is in an irredeemable last place with a low of 938.2 marks.

The Residential, Service and Green Areas judged were practically immaculate. They were Lios na

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Feá, Oakwood Court and Topaz Service Station. But the Town Centre was disastrous, with one particular area having 18 pieces of litter as well as 23 cigarette butts.

Macroom Tidy Towns Committee is most disheartened by the result. They have an extremely active voluntary team who spend every Saturday morning collecting litter and doing necessary maintenance. But the Council needs to be responsible for maintenance during the week. This is not happening and the results

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are to be seen. The Tidy Towns have sent copies of the Litter Report to businesses and residents in the town centre, appealing to them to look after their own area. This needs attention on a daily basis and would only take a few minutes if everyone was responsible for their own patch. But, as ratepayers, they should also be able to rely on a public service. It is hoped that the new Council will be pro-active in organising town centre cleaning. ŠTOP AND SHOP



History A Day to Remember

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Sacraments, important mile-stones in Christian families' lives, still retain their importance, even in this most secular, materialistic climate. In recent weeks, we have seen countless children decked out in all their finery for the reception of First Holy Communion and Confirmation.

First Holy Communion days are nostalgic occasions for parents and grandparents. Older generations remember when First Confession was a vital part of the whole procedure. One confessed one's many, scarlet sins on Friday and the strain of making sure one didn't commit even a 'venial' before the next morning was immense, particularly since the holy ones were subjected to an unprecedented scrubbing, in pre-bathroom days, so that the body could rival the soul in cleanliness. Girls suffered the added indignity of having their hair done in ringlets for the important day. This entailed tightly winding long wisps of hair around strips of rag and leaving them in overnight. This really tested the patience and submission of those who didn't indulge in vanity as well as ensuring a sleepless night.

Apparel for the day was the mandatory white dress, veil and wreath for the little girls. The dresses might be a trifle big or small, long or short, tight or loose, depending on whom they were inherited from. The veils might be off-white even before that became a designer colour. But all the girls were beautiful on the day, particularly in their parents' and their own eyes. Boys wore suits. This was a non-negotiable fact. The suits were usually made by the local tailor. The serge was bought in a draper's shop and the lining was a well-washed flour bag. Jackets were single-breasted or double-breasted, depending on the tailor's fancy but pants were short, coming to just above the knee. Even for Confirmation, when many of the boys could be thirteen years old, they still wore short pants. Their battle-scarred, knobbly knees were well scrubbed and they wore knee-length woollen socks, held aloft with the aid of elastic garters or the more privileged wore white ankle-socks.

All the children carried candles bedecked with flowers. Many had bluebells, buttercups and foxgloves in their bouquets but the aroma of lilyof-the-valley is an integral part of many people's memories of First Holy Communion Day.

Up to the time of the Vatican Council, one had to fast from the previous midnight when receiving Holy Communion. This meant that the ceremony was held early in the day but there was still a fair number of 'fainters'. The children were all together at the front of the church and well apart from their parents. Girls were separated from boys and the teachers were in charge. They would administer water to the weak but this was considered the ultimate indignity.

The children who had got First Holy Communion were often served breakfast in the local convent or teacher's house after the ceremony. This practice occasioned both delight and terror since most children were unsophisticated and unused to 'dining out'. Sticky buns and red lemonade were considered delicious and they enjoyed themselves every bit as much as the present-day crop, who frequent four-star hotels and demand Mexican, Italian and French cuisine. 'Collecting' was as prevalent then as it is now though inflation has taken its toll. A tanner or a bob was the usual 'stand' in bygone days, but a favourite uncle, aunt or godparent might contribute a florin or a half-crown. Medals and holy pictures were the usual gifts from the many nuns, priests and brothers in the extended family and were much prized and displayed by their recipients. Children loved to visit relations in convents on these special days as they got tea in the nuns' parlour and were the centre of attention.

Whilst town children were guaranteed to have their 'Communion' photograph taken, their country cousins had to wait until the school photographer turned up and then they dressed up again for the snap for the family album. The more upwardly-mobile had their very own box camera to record the occasion for posterity.

With the noticeable decline in church attendance, the pessimistic might wonder what the future holds for the children and grandchildren of the present First Communicants. But the optimistic will see the delightful participation of the present-day children in their First Holy Communion Mass; bringing the gifts, reading the lessons and prayers of the faithful and singing throughout. Perhaps quality will replace quantity in the decades ahead.

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



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

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KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: FORCE MAJEURE LEAVE

Question: My daughter was taken suddenly ill and I left work early to go to hospital with her. Can I take a half day as force majeure leave?

Answer: The Parental Leave Acts 1998 and 2006 give employees a limited right to leave from work in the event of a family crisis. This is called force majeure leave. Force majeure leave is paid leave and it arises where, the immediate presence of the employee is indispensable owing to an injury or illness of a dose family member. As a rule, an employee cannot plan the leave – it must be unexpected. Force majeure leave applies to the illness or injury of:

- · Your natural or adopted child (or a child whom you are acting in loco parentis)
- · Your spouse or partner (provided you are living together)
- Your brother or sister

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Your parent or grandparent

· A person who otherwise lives with you in a relationship of domestic dependency

You are not entitled to force majeure leave following the death of a close family member. You are entitled to up to three days of force majeure leave in any 12-month period or five days in any 36-month period. If you are absent for only part of a day on force majeure grounds, it is still counted as a full day of force majeure leave.

You must give written notice to your employer as soon as possible after taking force majeure leave. The notice must include the date you took the leave and why the leave was necessary. You must sign the notice.

You cannot be dismissed for taking force majeure leave or proposing to take it. If you have a dispute about force majeure leave, you should make a complaint to the Workplace Relations Commission within six months of the dispute. The time limit may be extended for up to a further six months, but only where there is a substantial cause which prevented you from bringing the complaint within the normal time limit.



BUYING A SECOND HAND PROPERTY

Buying a second hand property

Due to the recent recession and the lack of construction of new homes the majority of homes bought and sold in the past few years have been second hand properties. Second hand properties can represent good value for money and are a popular choice among purchasers, however, it is crucial to carry out due diligence on the property prior to purchase. Purchasers may feel like they are getting a good deal with a reduced price but may end up being stuck with a 'pig in a poke'.

Planning and Maps

It is advisable to instruct an engineer to check that there are no planning issues in relation to the property, for example, that an extension to a kitchen has the benefit of planning permission and complies with that planning permission. It is important to ensure that the boundaries of the property are correct and that there is no one adversely encroaching on to the property. Your solicitor will need to check that there is no litigation or disputes in relation to the property. Carrying out a full due diligence of the property can help avoid any future unforeseen problems arising that you may have been unaware of such as illegal extensions or additions to the property, difficulty in accessing the property, the existence of a Compulsory Purchase Order over the property etc. You should attend to any planning queries you may have before execution of contracts.

Tenants

It may sound obvious but it is important to check that there are no tenants in the property. Some people buy property at auction without ever viewing the property beforehand. Tenants in a property have statutory rights, and the appropriate notice periods need to be served providing them with the correct time period to vacate. Otherwise, a notice will be deemed to be invalid and can delay an owner obtaining vacant possession of a property, and consequently, the sale. It is equally important to view the property on more than one occasion to ensure that there is no one 'squatting' in the property.

Management Company

A purchaser should assess how well managed a property is particularly if they are purchasing a house in an estate or an apartment in a block. It is common that estates or apartment blocks are not well managed and in some instances may not have common areas transferred or a management company in existence. Enquiries should be made as to whether common areas are transferred, if not, when are they expected to be transferred. Another important consideration to take into account is who is running the common areas and more importantly that they are insured. Managing agents may be appointed but without a formal management company structure with equal voting rights, larger unit

holders or the developer may hold sway over smaller units. Managing fees can be high and this cost must be factored into budgets when acquiring a property. If buying a whole property that does not have common areas transferred, one should factor the cost of having them transferred as there is a legal obligation to do so under the Multi Unit Developments Act, 2011.

Condition of the property

The doctrine of "caveat emptor" ("buyer beware") applies to the physical condition of the property. The purchaser must satisfy him/herself as to the boundaries and condition of the property. This is why a purchaser must have a full structural survey carried out prior to signing the contract. The vendor is not under a duty to disclose any physical defects in the property. The purchaser's solicitor needs tocheck that the purchaser can acquire good marketable title, that the title being provided is contracted for in the contract for sale and that the property in the contract is properly and adequately identified in the title documents. Carrying out a full structural survey may represent excellent value for money if it saves you thousands in the long term, for example, if the property is subsiding etc. There may be smaller issues with a property that can easily be rectified, such as heating problems or poor ventilation but it is best to be aware of theseproblemsand the costs associated with rectifying such problems, before signing the contract so at least you have made an informed decision.

Once you execute contracts you will be bound to purchase the property and as you are intending on making the house your home for many years to come it is important that you are satisfied with the property.

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

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
