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






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
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The Lee Valley Players were back in Cork Opera House on May 29 for the staging of a new musical, 'The Blarney Stone', written by John McDonagh in New York in 1928 and finally staged in Macroom in 2019. Hollywood star, Patrick Bergin, was made aware of the work when he visited the McDonagh home in Cloughjordan some years ago. The Lee Valley Enterprise Board agreed to stage it. It ran for five nights in the Riverside Park Hotel, Macroom before attracting a huge and appreciative audience to the Opera House. There it received a standing ovation and many curtain calls.

The staging of The Blarney Stone was a big undertaking and Cathal MacCabe of RTE is to be thanked for his wonderful arrangement of the music and direction of the show. The whole cast and crew benefited hugely from his expertise and coaching. Patrick Bergin, the star attraction, promoted Macroom and the Lee Valley in many television, radio and newspaper interviews prior to the staging of 'The Blarney Stone', giving the town's reputation a much needed boost. A Dub by birth, he claims Macroom as a second home and lauded the warmth, kindness and wealth of talent in the Lee Valley. Ann Dunne, Musical Director of the show, put years of thought into the production and intense work over the past months. She pays heartfelt tribute to parents and other volunteers who helped with child care, costumes, makeup and heavy manual work.

The event at the Opera House was greatly enhanced by the pre-performance recital from the Army Band of the Southern Command. They played a toe tapping selection from musicals and traditional numbers, not least of which was The Boys of Fair Hill! Fritz Brase, who composed

the original score of 'The Blarney Stone', was the founder of the Irish Army Band in the 1920s. 'The Blarney Stone' marks a milestone in drama and musical productions in Macroom. With no discernible progress in the restoration of the Briery Gap, the difficulties of preparing and presenting pantomimes and shows with a large cast have become insurmountable. The Briery Gap fostered music, drama, dance, stage craft locally and nationally and the future now looks bleak for the promotion of the arts and culture in the town.

Local Council

The first meeting of the newly designated Macroom Municipal District Council will be held in the Council Chambers at Macroom Town Hall on this Thursday, June 13 at 11a.m. The newly elected Councillors won't have far to travel as most of them are from the town or environs. They are Michael Creed, Ted Lucey and Eileen Lynch F.G., Gobnait Moynihan and Michael Looney F.F. and Martin Coughlan Independent. Their first job will be to elect a Cathaoirleach and Leas Cathaoirleach for the coming year and that should be an interesting process. Martin Coughlan, Independent, has already been appointed Leas Cathaoirleach of Cork

County Council. We urge the new councillors to be pro-active and dogged in the clarification and promotion of developments in area. First and most urgent regards actual work on the proposed bypass of Ballyvourney and Macroom. Traffic congestion is making Macroom town a place to be avoided and is seriously impacting business and life quality in the area. Other projects proposed for the area - a new Garda Station, Fire Station, school and hospital extensions as well as the restoration of the Briery Gap should provide the councillors with ample worthwhile projects during their term in office.

Not so Tidy Town

The second round of Cork Inter Town Litter Challenge sees Macroom languishing in last place in its category. Having easily won last year, expectations were high and have now been dashed. They are 25 points behind their nearest rival, Schull and 85 points behind the leader, Dunmanway. Again, it was the town centre was the problem. The residential estates judged -An Gleann, Sally Gardens and Oakwood - were practically litter free, losing just 2.2 marks in total while Chapel Hill area from the school to the Church lost 7.2 marks.

The Pieta House Amber Flag initiative recognises the individual efforts of primary and secondary schools, companies, and groups to create healthy, inclusive environments that support mental well-being. It involves working together toward a happier, healthier Ireland and eradicating the stigmas associated with mental health issues. To be awarded the Pieta House Amber Flag, applicant groups must host a mental health awareness event, a fundraiser, and a mental health initiative. McEgan College has run Positive Mental Health Week for three years now, which has been a great success. The dragons consulted and decided that the lifestyle book, with its activities, puzzles, interviews and recipes, would be the product to go forward. Boys were divided into groups, depending on their own strengths in a certain area. The boys had different roles in finance, marketing, book design, sponsorship, cover illustration, interviews, recipes, photography etc. The book was designed and edited using blurb software. The boys worked hard at the design and the general layout and theme of the book. They were keen to make this book a reality without any professional help from graphic designers etc. Our sponsorship team visited the many businesses in the town. Their sales skills were excellent and the collection of money even more impressive! A select group of boys set up Facebook and Instagram accounts to advertise their product. A website was created so the book could be sold online. On completion, a PDF file of the book was sent to Waterman Printers in Little Island with an order for 300 books. We had a very successful launch day on Friday May 17th. A large amount of books were sold and the boys prepared well by making their own snacks and treats for the event. We sold 300 copies in a number of days so the boys decided that, due to popular demand, they would print another batch. These books are now available for sale.

Overall, the JEP process was an excellent learning tool for the boys of 6th class. They picked up valuable entrepreneurial and life skills that will serve them well in the near future. 

'The Brigade', a historical documentary on the activities of The West Cork Brigade during The War of Independence 100 years ago, will show for an hour on RTÉ 1 at 10.15p.m. tonight, Thursday June 13, with the second part on June 20.

Clonakilty historian, Sam Kingston, along with Niall Twomey, Sean A. Murphy and Alan Quirke, ex Army and Cork footballer, inspired the series and went about it in a most professional manner, with Army personnel involved throughout.

With a view to dramatising historical events,

twelve 'Volunteers' were needed - young, motivated and above all, physically fit. The planners advertised in local and social media and 60 men aged 18-30 auditioned in Clonakilty in February. An extremely rigorous physical test, designed and supervised by the Army, halved that number. The remaining 30 were interviewed at length about their motivation, historical knowledge and connections and understanding of the mentality and dedication of the men and women of 100 years ago.

While the initial ad had sought men from West Cork, the hotbed of activity in the War of Independence, two of the final dozen are from mid Cork. Joseph Twomey is a 20 year old student from Donoughmore and Daire Ó Ceallacháin is ex-Army and from Blarney.

Joseph claims that the initial week of training and the filming were the hardest days of his life to date. The twelve men were all cold, wet, tired, hungry and afraid. Lines between reality and history blurred. Their safe houses and camps had sentries posted and escape routes planned and they never knew when their repose would be disturbed by an 'Auxie' raid. It did not seem like playacting - they felt real fear and the accompanying adrenalin rush. Joseph said that the experience gave him a better understanding of the mentality of the original Brigade. They suffered unbelievable hardship and he feels they were fighting as a last resort. It wasn't an adventure but dedication to country and justice. Joseph has a fine voice and he helped to relax his comrades with songs such as Mo Ghile Mear and The Boys of Kilmichael. He hasn't got to a preview of the documentary and so, doesn't know how much is included in the programmes.

The documentary will also include research by students from Essex University, the home place of the infamous Essex Regiment, responsible for many atrocities in West Cork during the War of Independence. It should be a fascinating series and compulsive viewing for everyone with an interest in history.

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History

Macroom Minors (St. Colman's) - 1969 Country Football County Champions

In 1969, Neil Armstrong became the first man to walk on the Moon and the Vietnam War was still in progress, albeit with some tentative peace probes. In Northern Ireland, The Troubles were brewing and the Burntollet ambush occurred. Terence O'Neill won an election but resigned a month later, and in the Republic, Jack Lynch had a landslide general election victory. Kerry secured their twenty-first All-Ireland football title and Cork minor footballers won the All-Ireland and a three-in-a-row for the first time. Cork underage football's reputation was never so high and the possibilities seemed boundless. Christine Keeler - of Irish extraction - was giving her side of the Profumo scandal in The News of The World. Locally, the Junior Chamber was preparing businesses for decimalisation and Macroom Soccer Club was formed.

The late 1960s was a tough time for Macroom senior footballers but successful minor teams ignited the flame of hope. Macroom seniors had won the county in 1962 and made the semi-final the following year. (1) However they failed to win a championship game between 1964 and 1969. The Barry O'Brien-captained 1964 minor team had contested a county final against St. Michael's but were beaten, having led by 2-5 to 2-0 at halftime. (2) Macroom had won the Mid-Cork minor championship the previous year, the first time in four years. Many of that team were over-age and nobody knew how the 1969 minors would perform.

In the 1969 Mid-Cork Minor Football Draw, it was Ballyvourney v Cooldure; St. Lacteen v St. Augustines; Mac Aodhgain v St. Olan's; Ballinora v St. Coleman's; St. Helen v Kilmichael; Inniscarra v Éire Óg; Carriganimma v Ballincollig; Coolmona

I recently spoke to Tony 'Saga'O'Sullivan, our captain, about the minors' 1969 campaign and he very kindly shared his recollections. Tony was a clever and tough player, with a great eye for goal.

The late Jackie O'Callaghan, Main Street, Dan 'Baskie' O'Callaghan, Barrett Place and New Street and Thayda Healy, Barrett Place, were in charge. One of the team's major assets was Emmet Hallinan, New Street, who, in my opinion, was as good as any minor who ever played for Macroom. Emmet was very lively and quick, had a great leap and was a good finisher. He attended Coláiste losagáin, Ballyvourney, then a powerhouse in Munster Colleges' football. Playing at midfield, Emmet made a major contribution to Cork minors' All-Ireland victory that year when Cork completed a three-in-a-row. (3) Tony does not remember any heavy or special training apart from regular practice in the Castle Grounds.

Competitions were on a knock-out basis and fifteen teams entered the Mid-Cork minor competition and included Carriganimme (sic). (4) The first round of the Mid-Cork minor championship was played in Cloughduv where Macroom easily accounted for Ballinora. (5) Canovee (MacAodhgáin) had a good minor team that year but Macroom comfortably beat them. Naomh Abán awaited in the semi-final and the game against them turned out to be a tough tense affair. The game was levelled 0-6 each on the 50th minute through a Davey Casey point, and two late points swung the match in Macroom's favour. Tony had an infected fingers and was sent to the late Dr Michael Cronin by Dan O'Callaghan; the good doctor's treatment worked and Tony played well. Macroom gave a very good display in the final against Ballincollig and ran out easy winners. Delighted with its success, the team celebrated appropriately. Once after a victory, the team was treated with ice-creams - it may have been after that final. Oranges were given as halftime refreshments and woe betide any selectors who did produce them.

The team travelled to matches via taxis. Liam Walsh, Dónal 'Mariner' Murphy and Danny Hallinan were the usual drivers, and Jerry Cronin's and Dennis Dinneen's cars were sometimes used.

Liam Walsh's taxi was popular as his homeward journey songs were popular and earthy. Tony remembers sharing the front seat with Emmet, in his father's, Danny's car, and discussing tactics and plans for the match. Two players sat in the front seat with four or five in the back. Showers were not generally available and we were lucky to have cold water to wash down afterwards. One local club's dressing-rooms were shared by sheep which left their calling card. Dressing-room facilities in The Athletic Grounds, an inter-county venue, were basic.

In 1965, Millstreet had 'destroyed' Macroom in the first round of the U-14 county championship, largely due to the excellence of Leo McSweeney. By 1969, two other Millstreet stars had emerged and both John Coleman and Con Hartnett won All-Ireland senior medals with Cork in 1974. Although behind at half-time, Macroom did very well in the second half and ran out deserving winners. Feature of the game was the excellence of David Casey when switched to centre forward and his unorthodox style caused many problems for John Coleman. Victory was a bonus and expectations began to rise. Our next opponents were Bantry and they were strong favourites; they had Declan Barron and another Cork minor panellist. Barron later scored two goals in Cork's All-Ireland minor final victory over Derry and won an All-Ireland and All-Star in 1974. Arquably, he was one of Cork's best ever footballers: think of what he might have achieved if he had lived across the border. Again, Macroom were behind at the break. Willie O'Riordan's introduction revitalised Macroom and he showed the path to victory by kicking some lovely points. Macroom were in the country county minor final for the first time in five years and Fermoy were the opponents.

Macroom felt confident facing Fermoy despite the fact that our adversaries had two Cork minors, Patsy Lonergan and Danno Moloney. The country final was played in The Athletics Grounds, the precursor to Páirc Uí Chaoimh.

Ted Coakley was detailed to mark Lonergan, their danger-man, and he did a splendid job. With Fermoy's scoring threat blunted, Macroom were in control for most of the hour and won by a wide margin. The Curry O'Shea Cup, donated by the O'Shea family (mineral waters), New Street, Macroom in commemoration of the great Curry who had captained Macroom to Senior County glory in the early part of the century, was presented to skipper, Tony O'Sullivan. Macroom had won two trophies and qualified for the county minor county final proper.

On 19th October, Kinsale hosted the county final and St. Nick's provided the opposition. Nicks had regained the city minor championship after a lapse of eleven years. Their outstanding player was Martin Doherty, a huge man and a very skilful footballer (and hurler). They also had Pat Barry who had won an All-Ireland minor football medal that year and Mick Corbett. Generally, city teams were more 'even' and very cute, and the 'trick' was not to let them get ahead. Anybody living west of the county hall was regarded as being from the 'wilds' and if the city boys got ahead, they played with great confidence, perhaps even arrogance. At least that was our belief. Unfortunately, Nicks goaled in the 4th minute and Macroom were always chasing the game thereafter. Macroom put the ball in the Nicks' net but were called back for an earlier infringement and had to

settle for a pointed free. Down 2-2 to 0-2 at the break, Macroom made a concerted effort on the resumption and Tony pointed within a few minutes. Another turning point occurred when Dónal O'Callaghan's brilliant shot came back off the crossbar and was cleared. Macroom battled bravely to the finish but lost on the score 2-7 to 0-5. Goals win matches and that was certainly true that day. The score-line was perhaps harsh on Macroom


Since that time, Dónal Buckley, Kilnagurteen, John Lucey, Railway View, and Dónal Lucey, The Bridge, have passed to their reward. Dónal Buckley was a speedy, tenacious corner /wing back, John was a skilful scoring forward and Dónal Lucey (U-16 that year) was a young, promising and clever forward. The three were popular, respected and valued members of the squad. Why did the team do well? Tradition, wise selectors, some good players, commitment, luck, the interest and support of the town, and a fierce will-to-win were the ingredients. Many of the lads on-the-age were great friends and had a very firm, cohesive bond. Ted Coakley's arrival in Macroom was a huge bonus. John /Seán O'Riordan and Willie O'Riordan strengthened the side enormously. Michael Lynch, another losagáin 'graduate', was excellent in goal, and the backs were very tight. Gus Kelleher was very solid at centre-back. Emmet won most of the mid-field battles and we had forwards such as Davey Casey, Dónal Ó'Callaghan, Danny O'Donoghue and Liam Quinlan who could score, and none more so than Tony, a great finisher and an inspiring captain. Danny, Chris Cronin and Connie Kelleher were U-16 that year. Perhaps the main ingredient of success was that it mattered and it meant - and still does - a huge amount to the group.

Macroom went on to contest three more consecutive county minor football finals, 1970-72, but alas, without ultimate success. They were great times - fun, enjoyable and innocent all at the same time. In hindsight, we didn't realise how good the times were and even how good the team was. Today's equivalent achievement is running-up the Premier Minor grade. Hopefully similar fun, enjoyment and success will return again at minor, indeed at every level, to the club in the near future. Tony 'Saga' O'Sullivan is currently a selector for the U-16s, with his son Mark, and he has given absolutely wonderful services to Macroom G.A.A. Club for well over half a century. Ní bheidh a leithéid ann arís.

Cork claimed a 12th Lidl National League Division 1 title at Parnell Park on May 5, running out 1-12 to 2-7 winners against Galway. Cork are also preparing for a TG4 Munster Final against Waterford at Fraher Field, Dungarvan, next Sunday evening (June 16) at 6.30pm. Cork beat Waterford and Kerry in the round-robin phase of the provincial series. The Round 3 Munster Senior Football Championship game on June 1 was against Kerry and Cork had an easy win Cork 3-16 Kerry 0-9, with Cork in control from start to finish at Páirc Uí Rinn. Cork scored 3-10 in the second-half and set up a date in the final against Waterford. Scores were hard to come by early on as both defences were on top and the opening point didn't come until the 14th minute when Cork's Orla Finn pointed a free. Finn, Cork's only points scorer in the opening

half, added a second point in the 17th minute with Kerry packing out their defence. The first point from play came in the 19th minute when Finn was on target again and she got her fourth, to make it 0-4 to 0-0 with 22 minutes gone. Kerry eventually got off the mark a minute later when Louise Ní Mhuircheartaigh pointed from a free for what was their only score of the half. Finn added another free before Cork got their first goal with Noonan starting and finishing the move. On the stroke of half-time Finn got her sixth point to see her side lead 1-6 to 0-1 at half-time. In the second half, Finn and Noonan increased Cork's lead, with Aoife O'Callaghan replying for Kerry. With 42 minutes gone, Cork got their second goal, when Libby Coppinger caught a long ball in from Ciara O'Sullivan to turn and blast to the back of the net to make it 2-9 to 0-3. Finn and Aine O'Sullivan all pointed for Cork, with Ní Mhuircheartaigh replying for Kerry. With time running out Cork led 2-16 to 0-9, but in the last minute a superbly worked move, involving several players, saw O'Sullivan get their third goal to round off an easy win for Cork.

Comórtas Peile na Gaeltachta

Bhí Comórtas Peile na Gaeltachta ag comóradh 50 bliain i mbliana i Páirc Ghallarais i gCorca Dhuibhne.

The 50th annual Comórtas Peile na Gaeltachta festival was hosted by An Ghaeltacht, Gallarus, Co. Chiarraí over the June Bank Holiday weekend. Gaeltacht Mhuscraí were represented by Cill na Martra in Peil Sinsear. Cill na Martra defeated Oileáin Árann in the quarter final on the Saturday afternoon, extra time being necessary before the Gaeltacht Mhuscraí men won on a 0-16 to 0-13 scoreline. Cill na Martra had been trailing by 0-10 to 0-3 in the second half of normal time but had earned extra time with seven points in a row to draw level. 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






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About Me

My name is Brian, I run the RunninginIreland.com website and blog. I am not an elite athlete; I don't think I'd consider myself a fast runner either. I just love to run. But I have done a lot of races, including Killarney and I will draw n this experience to help you on your way.



Luckily there are two very good options, either the half-marathon or the 10K. You may be part of a group with novice runners who are used to distances of 5k or less. For this group, the 10K option is perfect. It may feel like a big jump, but with a good training programme, anyone can get up to the 10K distance.

Perhaps you have done a 10K before and are worried about the step up to the half. This may seem daunting as it is quite a jump from 10k to 21k. However, it is definitely doable with the right approach. There are really good training plans available on the Run Killarney website that will help you with this increase. Most importantly for me as regards Killarney is that, if this is your first attempt at a half-marathon, this is probably one of the best ones in the country (and beyond) for a 'first timer' to try. The course really helps you along (starting in Molls Gap and bringing you down the National Park), and there is a super atmosphere among the runners on the route and at the finish line. You may have done a half before, and you run regularly. Well then you need to think about your longer term goals for this year. Do you have a big target for later in the year, are you focusing on lowering your times? Will the 10k or the half help you towards other goals? Award-winning event

For both distances you will receive a beautiful medal and finishers t-shirt. Run Killarney won "Event of the Year" in the Running in Ireland race awards last year, "Editor's Choice" category. So you are literally going for one of the best events in the country.

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If your child has special needs they may be able to get an exemption from the upper age limit. If you have a child with a disability, you can also apply for additional supports under the Access and Inclusion Model (AIM) - you can find more information on aim.gov.ie.

Children can only enrol in pre-school in September. The ECCE Scheme runs from September to June for 3 hours a day, 5 days a week. If your child attends a childcare service (crèche, playschool, naionra, Montessori or parent and toddler group) for longer than this each day or for extra weeks outside the school year (38 weeks) you have to pay for these extra hours.

To get a place for your child, apply to a participating playschool or day care centre. You can get a list of participating services from your local City or County Childcare Committee (CCC) on myccc.ie. You will need to provide a copy of your child's birth certificate or passport and their PPS

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

A PALM OIL ALTERNATIVE FROM USED COFFEE

Two Scottish Entrepreneurs Are Working to Replace Palm Oil With the Oil From Used Coffee

Since palm oil has been linked to deforestation. the prosecution of native people, dangerous sources of greenhouse gas emissions, and the destruction of wildlife habitats, food and cosmetic companies have been coming under increasing pressure to ditch palm oil from their ingredients lists.

Now Scott Kennedy and Fergus Moore are honing a chemical technique that extracts oils from used coffee grounds. The young men first got the idea to use coffee waste oil when they were working in cafés during their time in college. According to the duo, the bulk of café waste is made up of used coffee grounds. In Great Britain alone, used coffee grounds collectively add up to about half a million tons of landfill waste every year.

"There are oils in coffee with a wide range of uses in different industries - cosmetics, pharmaceuticals, food and drink, household products - you name it, there's probably a use there and the coffee grounds have all the same components as palm" Fergus Moore said.

The two young men started the Revive Eco startup company to begin implementing their procedure in Scotland, and they already have plans to start expanding into additional European cities.

THE WORLD'S MOST EXPENSIVE CHEESE IS MADE FROM BALKAN DONKEY MILK

Pule is a crumbly white cheese that is not even available on the commercial market. Its high cost is attributed to the considerable time and resources needed for production. While most cheeses are made using cow, goat or sheep milk, this cheese is made from the milk of a Balkan donkey, native only to Serbia and Montenegro, and requires 25 litres of milk to produce just one kilogram (2.2 pounds) of cheese and no expensive ingredients are added during the cheesemaking process. The donkeys milked for the cheese aren't wild, either. They're domesticated and live on a farm in a Serbian natural reserve called Zasavica. But donkey milk is exceptionally rare and difficult to produce. A female donkey produces only about 1.5-2 litres of milk per day. Donkey milk also contains significantly fewer solids than cow milk, meaning far more milk is needed to make the equivalent amount of hard cheese.

Costs of labour also influence Pule's sales price. Donkey milking—which occurs three times per day-must be done by hand, as no milking machinery exists to accommodate such a small, specialised industry.

Normally priced at around €1,000 per kilogram the cheese is produced in cupcake-sized mounds, has a yellowish tinge and is less crumbly than goat cheese. Its flavour has been described from "sweet, clean and mild," to "intense, with a natural saltiness". Currently the cheese is made only on advanced order basis and you will have to travel to the Zasavica reserve to collect it.

Zasavica donkey reserve is a donkey farm inside Zasavica, about 80 kilometres from Belgrade



which produces the donkey cheese from a herd of about 100 endangered Balkan donkeys. By selling the donkey cheese at €1,000 per kilogram (app. \$576 a pound), the Zasavica donkey reserve plans to sponsor their conservation work.

MAN CARRIED HIS BLIND DOG FOR 800 MILES SO SHE COULD BUILD CONFIDENCE TO WALK THE REST OF THE EPIC HIKE

Kyle Rohrig and his dog Katana had been halfway through completing the 2,650-mile hike of the Pacific Crest Trail when Katana's left eye started to cloud over from glaucoma, they took a break from the trail so she could undergo surgery for her vision loss, but they quickly returned to the west coast so they could finish the hike.

Two years later, Katana was blind in both eyes - and Kyle was heartbroken to see his onceintrepid hiking companion anxiously attempting to manoeuvre their living room.

Instead of resigning his dog to retirement, however, Kyle started formulating a plan to help Katana regain her confidence and after doing some initial training with Katana, Kyle resolved to take her on the Florida Trail: a gruelling 1,100mile hike through the swamps and rivers of the Everalades.

Despite her disability, Katana would walk a few miles of the trail on her own every day but whenever the companions encountered marshes or floodwaters, Kyle strapped the 21-pound dog on top of his backpack and carried her through the treacherous terrain.

After 72 days of hiking, they finished the trail in late March. Collectively, Kyle had carried Katana for 800 miles - but since Katana had also walked 200 miles of the trail all on her own, she had undergone a noticeable transformation.

THERE'S A SECRET APARTMENT AT THE TOP OF THE EIFFEL TOWER

When Gustave Eiffel and his team built the landmark in Paris it was intended as a temporary exhibit meant to broadcast France's industrial power to the rest of Europe. Eiffel knew that the terms of the construction project meant the tower was going to be demolished in 1909, so he contacted the world's most prominent scientists in an attempt to provide the tower with a legitimate scientific purpose that would save his namesake creation from being destroyed.

Upon the tower's completion, the apartment served as a laboratory for atmospheric measurements, astronomical observations, and physics experiments and he finally found the perfect accomplice in Captain Gustave Ferrié, who used the tower for the French Army's wireless telegraphy experiments in 1903. The tower was able to broadcast wireless signals as far as North America, making it indispensable to the city that would otherwise have torn it down only six years later.

5 HELPFUL HINTS:

*Remove water-marks from wooden surfaces with a small amount of mayonnaise or toothpaste on a damp cloth.

*If your children have showed off their creativity by marking the wall with their fingertips, rub slightly moist, stale white bread onto the area.

THE WORLD'S LARGEST OFFSHORE WIND

The world's largest offshore wind farm which is is located 120 kilometres off the coast of Grimsby, England has officially commenced operations and started generating electricity for more than 287,000 British homes.

The huge scale of the project means that operations are beginning before construction is complete. As of right now, only 50 of the 174 turbines are operational, and turbine installation. is expected to continue until the end of summer. Once the farm is fully operational in 2020, the wind farm will be able to power well over a million British homes with clean electricity, which is more than twice the energy capacity of the previous wind farm to hold the world record.








The Camino Voyage


