

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






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MACROOM UPDATES



Briery Gap Restoration

The future of the Briery Gap Cultural Centre seems assured, according to reports given at the July meeting of Macroom Municipal District, Cork County Council on July 26th. Mary O'Brien, Executive Architect, gave her predictions, and Jim Molloy, who is now to be replaced by Nicola Radley as Senior Executive Officer, assured Councillors that funding would be made available for the completion of the project, which has a potential cost of €4m. The project, which is estimated to take 12 - 16 months to complete, is set to go to tender in November and officials hoped work could begin in January. After the Council meeting, the Board of Directors of the Briery Gap were invited to meet Cork County Council officials in the Town Hall. Noel O'Driscoll, on behalf of the Board, said: We were given a very comprehensive presentation by the project Architect, Mary O'Brien, in terms of the proposed plans. The Board is satisfied that every effort has been made in the redesign to accommodate the future requirements of both the Theatre and Library. It was stated that the project would proceed to tender in November 2019. As a consequence, we could not envisage the works to commence in January, by the very complex nature of public tendering.

Mr. O'Driscoll went on to explain: In relation to

the closing off of the roadway, it was explained to us that this would be for reasons of safety and to facilitate the Contractors with space to provide a compound for storage etc. but there would be pedestrian access and limited vehicular access. Whilst there will be some disruption during the construction project, the Council were keen to stress that they are endeavouring, as far as possible, not to discommode any businesses or residents and will be meeting any property owners who may be directly affected.

We are aware of two funding streams that are being pursued for additional Government grants and the Council is very hopeful that the projected financial shortfall will be addressed by Government. That shortfall will only become clear when the tenders are submitted and examined. We were advised that the project will proceed one way or another but if, for some reason, the additional funding did not materialise, the Council may have to consider some cost reductions, which could have an impact on the standard of the project. Hopefully, this will not be the case and we can all look forward to seeing the completion of a state of the art Theatre and Library in the near future.

On August 6, Mr. Jim Molloy, Oifigeach Feidhmiúcháin Sinsearach, wrote:

Cork County Council has submitted a Capital Grant Application to the Department of Culture, Heritage & Gaeltacht requesting that they increase their allocation for this project from the €250,000 that they have already committed to. In addition, Cork County Council has submitted an Application to the Department of Rural & Community Development's 2nd Call under the Rural Regeneration & Development Fund for support for the project.

With regard to how the works may take place, Council staff are meeting with neighbouring business with regards to proposals for a works area at the front of the property. So far, engagement has been very productive, with some alternative suggestions being put forward, which staff are examining. It is the aim of Cork County Council to minimise the impact of the refurbishment works on neighbouring properties and the town, so we are exploring all avenues to make this happen.

As stated at the July MD meeting, it is planned to tender for works in November, with the aim of commencing works in late January 2020.

Magic of Fairy Garden in Masseytown

The Fairy Garden, which opened in 2018, is a magical refuge on the bank of the Sullane. It offers peace, tranquillity and a delightful play area to all ages and is just a short distance from Macroom Bridge. It is the brainchild of a group of local activists, of whom Catherine Murphy is the chief motivator. Macroom Tidy Towns and the Men's Shed have all contributed hugely to the development of the garden and there are great plans for the immediate development of a Sensory Garden and a biodiversity area. The Fairy Garden is, magically, getting new additions every week. There's a 'parking area' for dogs of all breed and made from many materials. Fictional creatures from children's programmes are there. There's a mini library and another work in progress, a miniature streetscape. You can access the Fairy Garden from Masseytown, near Walton's Mill or through the Car Park by Macroom Bridge, via a lovely riverside path.

On a fine summer day, it was great to see families picnicking at the comfortable tables while toddlers ran freely and safely nearby; seniors sitting in the sun, reading books or newspapers or simply enjoying the peace and teenagers meeting up and socialising in a lovely environment. The Fairy Garden renews our faith in voluntary co-operation and goodwill.

Macroom Man wins Law Book of the Year Award

Dr Albert Keating BL of Coolnadane, Macroom, won the prestigious award of Irish Practical Law Book of the Year 2019 for his book, The Law of Wills Second Edition, published by Clarus Press Dublin in 2018. His book was adjudged worthy of the award by the Dublin Solicitors and Bar Association (DSBA) and a leather bound edition of the book was presented to him by Josepha Madigan TD Minister for Culture, Heritage and Gaeltacht at the DSBA Annual Midsummer Dinner and Law Book Awards at the Conrad Hotel Dublin on July 21.


Dr Keating is a barrister and author of over twenty law books on such subjects as probate law, wills, succession law, equity and jurisprudence. He is also the author of numerous articles on the foregoing subject areas. He was Senior Lecturer in Law at Waterford Institute of Technology until he took early retirement in 2015. He is now a

member of the Cork and Munster Circuit.

The author's children, Grattan, Sarah, Eddie and George, were all reared in the family home at Coolnadane. His beloved wife, Ruth, died in the family home over nineteen years ago at the age of forty-six. The author's children were all educated in Macroom, UCC, CIT and Crawford School of Art. His late wife Ruth also attended the Crawford School of Art. Grattan, his eldest son, regularly exhibited his paintings in Macroom, Cork and Oxford where he now resides, and his daughter, Sarah, worked for a number of year in TSB Macroom. Sarah is now married and resides with her husband Jeremy and two children, Harrison and Rowan, in Ballincollig. His son Eddie resides at Coolnadane with his wife, Tina and two children, Aaron and Ruby, and his youngest son, George, continues to reside with him at Coolnadane.

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History Camogie in and around Macroom 1917-2019 Part 2

Re-formation 2. The Macroom Camogie Club must have ceased to function about the late '30s/ early '40s as the next record of Macroom Camogie Club is from the Southern Star in August 1948, just after The Emergency, when 'a decision was taken to establish a Camogie team in Macroom'. The officers elected were: Chairman Jerry Murphy; Miss Mary O'Sullivan, Sec. and Treas. P. O'Keeffe. The team made its debut on 28 September against Lee Valley (Coachford) 'when they went down fighting to a superior side'. (1) The team had lost to Enniskeane in August 1948.

Browne a goal and a point. Camogie Challenge.-The Macroom camogla team travelled to Enniskean on Sunday last to play Enniskean in a friendly. Although they lost to a more experienced side they put up quite a good show.

Figure 3; Southern Star 14 August 1948, p 6 Re-formation 3. In 1967, the camogie club was reformed and this time the launch made the front page of the The Southern Star - see photo. More than thirty players attended the inaugural meeting as did some County Board officials. The girls/ladies had played in St. Mary's, using the convent pitch 'up the hill', and hopes were high. Miss Julia Mary O'Leary was elected to the chair. However, the club played perhaps one challenge match only; this was in Cork - in spite of enquiries, I have not been able establish the opposition. The Macroom team was well beaten. Mrs Julia Mary O'Sullivan, neé O'Leary, cannot recall the team playing again and the club quickly disbanded.

St. Mary's. Secondary School Camogie: While a club has not existed in Macroom since the 1960s, camogie has continued to be played at St Mary's and, periodically, the school has been very successful. Miss Angela Higgins taught Physical Education in the convent in the 1980s/1990s and her tenure coincided with the presence of many excellent players such as Lynn and Stephanie Dunlea. Angela had won four senior All-Ireland camogie medals with Cork and she imparted her camogie skills and nous to her pupils. Training

was in Murray's field at lunch-time, and first to Miss Higgins's car, got a lift back to the school. St Mary's were Munster Champions in 1988, 1996, 1999 and 2012 and county title winners in 1995 and 2005. Lynn recalls the great reception the team got when departing the school for the All-Ireland Colleges' Final in the newly acquired minibus, driven by Principal, Sr. Mary. She also vividly remembers the endless singing of their school song/chant on the bus and the saintly and stoical forbearance of Sr. Mary. Unfortunately, the school lost All-Ireland Senior Schools' finals in 1988 and 2012. Lynn Dunlea and Mr John Murphy, current Principal of De La Salle, Macroom, trained the 1996 team. The Dunlea sisters went on to win Senior All-Irelands medals with Cork; Lynn was a prolific scorer (unfortunately for her, pre All-Stars, which began in 2004) and won four All-Irelands. Stephanie won seven All-Ireland senior medals and an All-Star award. Much decorated Briege Corkery, a record holder of senior All-Irelands medals in camogie and football and a multiple All-Star recipient in both games, also played for St Mary's. Una O'Donoghue is another distinguished St Mary's 'old girl' and she captained Cork seniors to an All-Ireland victory in 2002. Katherine Corkery also won an All-Ireland senior camogie

Canovee Camogie Club: Canovee competed from 1960 to 1979 and won the County Junior Championship in 1962 and the Intermediate County in 1970. (2) Prominent players included Kathleen Healy, Noreen and Sheila Dunne, Tessie and Mona Dunlea, the Moynihan sisters, Siobhán, Eileen and Margo, and the Lyons' sisters, Noreen and Chrissie. Sheila Dunne won four All-Ireland medals with Cork as well as Ashbourne titles with U.C.C. Meda Ryan, neé Coughlan from Bandon,

the noted historian and author of Tom Barry IRA Freedom Fighter, also played for the club. Tessie's and Mona's Aunt Kate captained Cork to an All-Ireland in 1934; Kate's sister was also on the team. Tessie and Mona, aunts of Lynn and Stephanie Dunlea, also won All-Irelands medals with Cork. Kitty Buckley was on the 1972 team and is mother of Briege, Katherine and Marie Corkery.

Cloughduv Camogie Club: It was founded in 1982 and since has produced many fine teams, players and All-Ireland winners. These include Lynn and Stephanie Dunlea, Una O'Donoghue, Joanne and Ora O'Callaghan, Briege, Katherine and Marie Corkery, Aoife Murray, who is still Cork's goalkeeper, and many more. Aoife's brother, Paudie, is the current very successful Cork senior

manager. The club won a Junior county in 1989, an Intermediate title in 1991 and its first Senior blue riband in 2005. In 2002 four Cloughduv players won senior medals with Cork; Una O'Donoghue was captain and John Cronin was the manager. 2006 saw the club win five medals. The club competes at senior level, has teams from U-6 to U-18 and shares magnificent facilities with Cloughduv hurlers.

Laochra Óg Camogie Club: Liam Slattery informs me that the club began juvenile camogie in 2016. Macroom businesses like Murphy's Pharmacy, Mulcahy's Insurance, as well as Macroom Tidy Towns' Committee have sponsored teams. Laochra Óg currently fields camogie teams from U-6 to U-16 and aspires to have

adult teams in the near future. Girls come from Macroom, Ballyvourney, Kilnamartyra, Coolea and Clondrohid. Matches/training sessions are held in the Town Park, Macroom, Teerbeg, Clondrohid and in Coláiste Ghobnatan's pitches in Ballyvourney. In 2017 The U-12 team reached the County final but lost to Watergrasshill by just two points. That year, the U-14s played at Féile in Carlow, and reached the Shield final. Róisín Murphy, Macroom, representing Clondrohid National School, played for Cork at the primary Go-Games in 2017. She is currently a member of the Cork U-14 camogie development squad.

Cork G.A.A. supporters had much to cheer about at the weekend as the u20 footballers brought home the All Ireland U20 Football Championship Trophy, the Clarke Cup, with Paul Ring, Aghabullogue and Colm O'Callaghan and Jack Murphy, Éire Óg, playing their hearts out and Mícheál Ó Cróinín, Naomh Abán as Selector. Dr Aidan Kelleher of Clondrohid was their Medical Officer. This was Cork's first major trophy win since the start of the decade and is proof positive of the benefits of the fresh outlook and new faces in the Association. And a win over Dublin, perceived as football kings in recent years, is a major boost to Cork hopes for the future.

Cork Minors won a Championship quarter final, defeating Monaghan 3-19 to 2-10.

In hurling, Cork's defeat of Kilkenny in the semifinal of the u20 Championship came as a great relief as supporters had reeled after their narrow defeat by Tipperary in the quarter final. They now face a rematch with Tipperary in the final and the chance of another All Ireland Trophy. Denis Paul Ring of Canovee is their Bainisteoir.

Meanwhile, Cork women keep the Rebel flags flying, just as they have done during the past grim years. The Minors won All Ireland Football

Armagh held off a powerful final quarter surge by comeback specialists Cork, to earn a precious victory in Group 1 of the TG4 All-Ireland SFC Round 3. The Ulster finalists were rank outsiders for this contest. However, with just 13 minutes remaining on the clock, they led 4-9 to 1-8 and then held out to book a place in the quarter-finals. Cork recorded 2-3 without reply in a tension-filled finale, but it wasn't enough to deny a gallant Orchard side, although Cork still qualify as group leaders.

Following a tentative opening, Rhona Ni Bhuachalla's unstoppable shot gave the Munster champions their first goal on 12 minutes. Armagh kept in touch with two points and Doireann O'Sullivan, fully recovered from a recent back injury, added a two-point salvo. Trailing by nine points after a nightmare start, you'd have been forgiven for concluding that it wasn't to be Cork's day in Portlaoise. They conceded 1-6 without response initially and looked down and out. Yet, in what will go down as one of the great EirGrid U-20 football championship fight-backs, the Munster champions ultimately prevailed by eight points. It was an emphatic response from Cork whose comeback was kick-started by Blake Murphy's 13th minute goal when he volleyed in from close range. Cronin added a second goal in the 16th minute when he caught Cathal O'Mahony's long delivery from the left at the far post and slammed home and they were, remarkably, level in the 18th minute when Colm O'Callaghan finished a fine flowing move that involved Brian Hartnett and Daniel O'Connell with a blast from just yards

out. Cork eventually took a two-point lead at the interval as they closed out the half with scores from Damien Gore, O'Mahony and O'Connell to lead 3-06 to 1-10.

Dublin restarted with two points to level it for the fifth time in the game but it was all downhill for them from there and in fact, they were outscored by 0-10 to 0-2 from there on as Cork sizzled with attacking intent and kicked some beautiful scores. It amounted to a 17-point turnaround on the scoreboard and a sea of red covered the Portlaoise pitch after the epic win as supporters celebrated a win for the ages. It was a great win for Cork and Mid Cork made a valuable contribution with Aghabullogue's Paul Ring, Colm O'Callaghan and Jack Murphy, both of Éire Óg, outstanding on the field and Micheál Ó Cróinín of Naomh Abán one of the selectors under manager Keith Ricken. Dr Aidan Kelleher of Clondrohid was also on the support team.

It was Cork's 12th title at the grade - previously U-21 - and their first since 2009 having been beaten in the 2016 and 2013 finals.

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

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: REGULATION OF SHORT-TERM LETTINGS

Question: I have a second property, which I would like to rent out to visitors for short stays? Are there any procedures I need to follow?

Answer: Yes, there are new regulations for short-term lettings that you may need to follow. These regulations came into effect on 1 July. They aim to bring properties used for short-term tourist lettings in Rent Pressure Zones (RPZs) back to the long-term rental market. The regulations cover people who let out property for short stays (less than 14 days) in RPZs, which are areas where rents are highest and rising quickly. The Residential Tenancies Board has a rent pressure zone calculator where you can check if your property is in an RPZ to see if the regulations apply to you.

If your property is in an RPZ and you want to let it out on a short-term basis for the first time, you will need to get planning permission so it can be used for tourism and short-term letting purposes. If you are already renting your property on a short-term basis, you will need to apply for retention permission. You apply for planning permission to the local planning authority, who will decide on your application within eight weeks. However, it should be noted that in areas of high housing demand, where there is high rent inflation, insufficient supply and lots of applications, it is unlikely that permission will be granted.

The regulations do not apply if your property is outside an RPZ. They also do not apply if your property is a holiday home, or is used for longer-term flexible lettings, or is a normal letting used for longer stays of more than 14 days.

The Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government website has an FAQ document about the regulations, which includes further information.

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Enjoy your garden...



Gardening should be fun, but there is no such thing as totally labour free gardening. Growing plants necessarily involves some work but this can be reduced to a minimum if the right approach is taken. Plants want to live but too many people fuss over them unnecessarily. Not only do they make extra work for themselves but they also harm their plants in the process and even kill them with kindness. For example, many plants succumb each year through the use of too much fertiliser or too much water. Growth of trees and shrubs is often checked for decades by too deep planting. Much of the hassle can be removed from gardening in the following ways:- Work With, and Not Against, Nature. If a plant dies or fails to thrive, it is often because it is not suitable for that area.

Consult your local garden centre and look around gardens in your neighbourhood to find out what plants are right for your location and suit your soil and climatic conditions. For example, don't plant rhododendrons and other acid loving plants on limey (alkaline) soil.

Plant the right plant in the right place.

Providing shelter from strong wind is a major aid towards hassle free gardening. If the garden is exposed, most plants will fail to thrive until suitable shelter is established. Plants such as Escallonia macrantha, Griselina litoralis, hebe spp and elaeagnus are good shelter plants.

Don't plant wind susceptible plants, such as Japanese maples and rhododendrons, in an exposed situation. Give preference to wind resistant species such as heathers, hebe, cistus, olearia and sorbus.

Use native shrubs and trees, especially around the boundary. Native plants are particularly beneficial for wild life and are generally trouble free. In rural areas they link the garden with its surroundings.

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Déan Curach as Gaeilge

In August, a curach building workshop will take place on the shores of Lough Allua in Cork's Muskerry Gaeltacht. A new group called "Curach as Gaeilge" will run the workshop primarily through the Irish language in the local community centre in Ballingeary village. The course runs each day from Saturday the 10th to Sunday the 18th of August, with a day off on Wednesday the 14th. Pádraig Ó Duinnín, Paul Lynch and Eoin Ó Leidhin will facilitate the workshop. Pádraig is a well known curach expert and presenter of TG4's "Muintir na Mara. Paul & Eoin first collaborated with Pádraig on a curach build in the Erris Gaeltacht in Mayo in 2015. Pádraig said: "If you love our language, join us in Béal Átha, creating a beautiful curach with a comfortable mix of different levels of Gaoluinn and woodworking ability."

Full 8 day tickets are €175 and four day tickets are €90, with lunch included. Group member Paul Lynch said: "Curach making has been recently recognised for its significance in Irish cultural heritage, and what could be a deeper cultural experience than building a curach in the language it was developed through over thousands of years?"

Each afternoon from 2.30pm there will also be a section of the hall open free to the public with a curach display, tea station and sitting area. Paul continued: "We thank Comharchumann Forbartha Mhúscraí, Creative Ireland, Cork County Council and Údarás na Gaeltachta for their financial support in making the course possible".



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RIGHTS OF SUCCESSION

When the Succession Act 1965 was enacted. times were very different. Often, children were educated only to primary or secondary level. Some families could only afford to educate one child to the third level due to the costs of education. Nowadays, most children are completing third level education and have boundless opportunities. Parents are living longer. There have been significant improvements in people's quality of life, the medical treatment available and the professional care and facilities provided for the elderly. Older people now have more financial responsibilities for themselves than in the past. This means, naturally, that the 'pot of assets' that form part of an estate can be greatly eroded on death. The traditional familial intergenerational relationship or dynamic has changed.

The Law Reform Commission has recently proposed changes to the Succession Act 1965, most notably Section 117. Unlike a spouse or civil partner, children have no absolute right to inherit any part of their parent's estate if the parent makes a Will. However, as the law currently stands, if a child considers that he or she has not been adequately provided for, he or she may make an application to court to seek a declaration that the parent has "failed in his moral duty to make proper provision for the child in accordance with his means." This is known as a Section 117 application. Each case is decided on its own merits and the court examines the situation from the point of view of "prudent and just" parent.

An example of such a successful case is a case which took place in 2000 where a child brought a Section 117 application against his father's estate. The son of the deceased had been taken out of school at the age of 14 and put to work on the family farm due to his father being unable to work as a result of injury sustained in an accident. The son received no remuneration for his work and was eventually ordered to move off the farm after he married. The father had made a Will in which he gave his other son some of the farm and had, during his lifetime, sold another section of the land. When his father died, the son brought a section 117 application. The court held that the son was entitled to the remainder of the farm on the basis that his father had deprived his son of

an education and a chance of an independent

Where there is a valid Will

The Law Reform Commission is maintaining that Section 117 should be retained but in an amended form. The Commission considers that Section 117 should be amended so that its focus would be firmly on a needs based approach. It shall presume that proper provision has been made by a parent for an adult child subject to three exceptions, as follows:

In the case of an adult child whose health needs or capacity has not been properly provided for in the parent's Will. In the case of an adult child who has given up other opportunities in order to care for the parent in the parent's last years. In the case where the adult child shows that the parent left something that is of sentimental value. The Commission's report proposes to remove references to "moral duty". This new legislation will provide circumstances whereby the child would need to prove significant need or hardship and that this need or hardship should not be based on a failure of the parent's moral duty.

Intestacy

At present, a Section 117 application can only be brought where the parent leaves a valid Will. If there is no Will and there are children, then their surviving spouse has a legal right to two-thirds of the estate with the remaining one-third to be distributed equally among the children. If there is no surviving spouse and no Will, the estate is shared equally among the surviving children.

The Commission proposes to include a Section 117 in cases of intestacy (no valid Will). The courts have no power at present to vary the shares that a child may be entitled to in the event of intestacy.

In 1965, the Oireachtas decided not to extend Section 117 to include intestacy because it might give rise to additional litigation. Valid arguments shall be made that a child is already provided for in the event that their parent does not leave a valid Will under the rules of intestacy, and that in that circumstance, no such Section 117 application should be made

Any person at present who intends to bring a Section 117 application against a parent's estate would have to weigh up the pros and cons carefully in advance of bringing such an application as prospective applicants should always be aware that the costs of such an application is at the discretion of the court and an unsuccessful applicant is not necessarily entitled to have the costs of the application paid out of the estate of the deceased. In some cases, a court can refuse the applicant the costs of the claim.

Any proposed changes to the legislation will take some time and it will remain to be seen how exactly the proposed changes would be worded and interpreted through case law.

However, it will lead to interesting questions. Many children are staying at home to care for their elderly parents. Some are giving up their careers and other opportunities and it may well prove interesting to see if such children will make Section 117 applications on foot of this proposed new legislation. What about a child who lives with a parent for other reasons and provides no care in reality for the parent? Should the child at home who cares for his or her parents without pay be entitled to bring a Section 117 application? Will a family farm or a family home be regarded as an item of sentimental value? What about the child who stays at home to work in the family business to his detriment? Will a child who suffers with depression or alcoholism be entitled to bring a claim on the basis of health needs? These are all questions that remain to be answered. Only time will tell.

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

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


