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



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Macroom Food Festival 2019

MACROOM FOOD FESTIVAL SEPTEMBER 19TH - 22ND 2019

The town of Macroom readies itself for its 8th Annual Food Festival on Thursday 19th to Sunday 22nd September. Food, drink & entertainment events will take place at a number of indoor & outdoor venues across Macroom town centre, including the Main Square, The Castle Hotel, various pubs, cafés, restaurants, shops & pharmacies. It will have plenty of food, live music & lots of fun for all the family: Comedy Capers at the Castle Hotel; Meet the Buffaloes at Toonsbridge; Teatime Swing Dance; Macroom's infamous Taste Trail including the Outdoor International Flavours event & Busking Competition; Saturday Night Session on the Square with Hot Guitars & very special guests; Sunday's Monster Outdoor Food Market, Cork & Kerry Schools cook-off competition, interactive children's entertainment, live music & more.

Kicking off with Comedy Capers at the Castle Hotel on Thursday 19th September, the festival will see the town of Macroom come alive with food, drink, music and all sorts of fun entertainment for four jam packed days in September. This year's festival will feature a mix of the old favourites with some new events such as the Comedy Capers event and a Busking Festival to accompany Saturday afternoon's Taste Trail.

On Friday there will be a tour of Macroom Buffalo Farm, an insight into the cheese making process and a delicious tasting of their award winning cheeses. Meanwhile, back in town, C103 will broadcast live from The Castle Hotel, featuring lots of local producers, on-air tastings, interviews and music. Later that evening, we'll be dressing up for a stylish, foot-tapping Teatime Swing Dance spectacular, complete

with tea, coffee, light bites and sweet treats at The Castle Hotel.

Saturday morning is one for the kids: the main square will be transformed into the Clowning Around Kids Zone, with Conor the Clown, facepainting, dancing, balloon magic and storytelling. Saturday afternoon there'll be orienteering for taste buds on the Taste Trail participants follow balloons and bunting to taste their way around sixteen different venues in town. This year, the trail will include a mindfulness station at the Library, special dietary needs stations at a number of pharmacies, the always popular International Flavours and some more surprises, along with the usual favourite

Macroom Food Festival is also now accepting entries from musicians for their chance to play at a number of **Busking Stations** around Macroom during the afternoon of Saturday 21st September and will be holding an open voting competition on Facebook over the coming month. First prize

winner will also get to open for Hot Guitars later that evening at the Saturday Night Session on the Square. Musicians should send their demo videos now to info@macroomfoodfestival.com As always, Sunday will see the square transformed into a massive outdoor food market, complete with wacky entertainment from Circus Outside the Box, live music from the Army Band of the Southern Command, face-painting and lots more. Students will get competitive at the Danone Nutricia Annual Schools' Cook-Off and as always, there will be plenty to eat and drink all round - from local organic meats to vegetarian and vegan delights, baked treats, seasonal produce, artisan ice cream and everything in between, from Macroom, Cork, Munster and beyond. Macroom Flower & Garden Club visited Áras an Uachtaráin recently for a guided tour of the gardens. The weather was prefect on arrival at the Phoenix Park. We proceeded to the gates of the Áras and waited for the Garda to announce our arrival.

Kevin Rafferty, Social Worker: He works in Macroom for the Clovne (Catholic) Diocesan Youth Services. He came to talk to transition year students on the 13th of Sept. about young people's relationships surrounding alcohol. He explained that we do not need to drink alcohol to have a relationship with it. Having a relationship with alcohol can be anything from drinking it yourself to living in a house where

your parents or siblings drink. He said that no matter how little alcohol we consume there is never a safe amount at age 14-17. Drinking when young has many effects. From the ages of 14-20 our bodies and brains are still developing; when you consume any amount of alcohol it kills off brain cells which do not repair. Alcohol is a toxic and addictive substance which should only be consumed safely and responsibly by over 18 year olds. Alcohol not only affects you it affects the people around you, and can lead to you or others to being in an unsafe situation. Alcohol is considered to be a depressant which means though it gives you a high for a while but then leads you to feel bad about yourself. Everyone in transition year learned a lot from Kevin and we thank him for giving us advice about how to deal with situations responsibly surrounding alcohol. 


Residence, Denyse Woods, will regroup in early October.






THE PERSON

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History Dan Cronin - Macroom Collector Extraordinaire Part 2

Strongly featured among Dan Cronin's large selection of sports books are GAA club histories, record books and books relating to the history of GAA. Barry O'Brien's The History of Macroom G.A.A. 1886-1987 is one of his favourites, perhaps rivalled only, because of his father's loyalties, by the late Con Dunne-edited 'From Carrig to Croke Park - A History of Canovee GAA'. He has many of the histories of other local clubs including those of Kilmurry, Millstreet, Clonakilty, Ballingeary, Ballincollig, Ballinora, Cloughduv, Aghabullogue and The Dohenys. Clondrohid GAA history is covered in Denis O'Connell's book. Jim Cronin's series of books on the records of Cork GAA are highly valued. 'A Celebration of Gaelic Games in Muskerry' is also on his shelves.

As a student, Dan worked in Kilmichael Pitch & Putt Club. He had already played P & P and, when he got a chance to perfect his art; he discovered that he could play the game well. As Dan's skills grew, his handicap shrank, winning

much on the way. His lowest handicap was scratch and he now plays off 8. Kilmichael P & P Club is in a beautiful location and the club is doing well. On August week-end Seán O'Leary, his uncle-in-law, ran a very successful Open Week-End. Unfortunately, Macroom P & P club is defunct. Dan was a member and an officer at a very young age. Falling numbers, a course too public, especially for beginners, and some unwelcome attention led to its closure. Dan joined Macroom Golf Club and got his handicap down to 7 but nowadays he mostly plays P & P.

A Fianna Fáil man through and through, Dan has many histories of the party including Noel Whelan's outstanding 'Fianna Fáil - A Biography of the Party'. Importantly, his copy is signed by former Taoisigh Albert Reynolds and Bertie Aherne and by current leader Micheál Martin as well as Eamon Ó Cuiv. Noel Whelan died



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


recently at a young age and his wise comments on politics will be acutely missed. Coins and medals are other items collected by Dan. His items include The 1966 Rising Commemoration medal, The John F Kennedy medal, the 1990 Cork Double-Winning medal and a Queen Victoria visit medal which dates from 1847. Pitch & Putt photos and cuttings fill a folder and a photo album. Golf items include ball-markers and Irish Open Golf 'Keep Quiet' signs from the years Dan was a steward at Fota Island and Killarney. He found the day long and it became quite boring after three or four hours. He enjoyed waving his 'No cameras' sign at me as I took a photo.

Adorning Dan's library walls are Liverpool FC pendants and photos and he is chuffed that The European Cup is again 'at home' in Anfield. The

2019-20 soccer season is one of rich promise and for Liverpool, the Holy Grail is to win the Premiership. He has full confidence in Klopp but is concerned about their 'blue' rivals from Manchester, with City's practically limitless resources. There is concern about 'state' owned teams (owned by Qatar and the UAE) in terms of finance and politics. He thinks Man. United and Everton probably will not rate at 'the business end of the season'.

While Dan has immensely enjoyed his collecting over the years and through it, has made many friends, he has also performed a very valuable service for the town. His collection is an important and precious part of local history, especially the sports history of the town. It is a pity that Macroom does not have a museum (or indeed a History Society) or a stage or venue

where items such as Dan's collection could be seen, appreciated and enjoyed by a wider audience. He hopes that this article might stimulate an interest in other collectors 'out there' or might encourage more to begin. Collecting combines history, contact with fellow collectors and the enjoyment of the chase. Dan would welcome any contact. Modern history the uses phrase 'from the bottom up'. Essentially, this means that the lives and experiences of

ordinary people are important. Latterly, sport has been duly recognised as a 'respectable subject' of historical enquiry and research. Normal everyday items of today may become historic and priceless (especially in the non-monetary sense) in time. Dan is to be commended for his meticulous work; more collectors like him would enrich our local heritage.

On a lighter note, Dan's partner, Hilda, has commented that Dan's library could also accommodate many racks of ladies', of course, shoes!


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History Williams Family Gathering at Coolcower and Macroom

The occasion, organised by Diarmid and his wife Prue Williams, marked the coming together of the representatives of three generations of the descendants of Richard Christopher Williams and his wife, Emily, who purchased Coolcower House, lands and fishing rights in 1905 from St. George Garde Browne and which, at the time, was under lease to members of the Warrens of Warrenscourt House and Warrensgrove House, Richard C. Williams was a remarkable man and contributed hugely to the economic, social and cultural development of Macroom town. He was the proprietor of Williams's Hotel on the Main Street and, apart from his farming enterprise of breeding a pedigree herd of prize-

winning Aberdeen Angus cattle at Coolcower, he also had insurance and other enterprises attached to the Hotel and also at Massytown. One of his most remarkable achievements, on behalf of the people of Macroom, was his deputation, with a few other business individuals in the town, to visit Lady Ardilaun in Dublin. His intervention succeeded in acquiring Macroom Castle House and Demesne for a contribution of £1,500 in trust for the people of the town. Both Richard and Emily are interred at the rear of St. Colman's Church of Ireland on Castle Street. Their family of Samuel Erbery, James, Percy and George Arthur all grew up at Coolcower and it was Samuel (known locally as Sam) that inherited Coolcower House and also Williams's Hotel, which was run for a short time by his brother, Percival Williams, too until the 1940s. The hotel was then sold to Thomas Ronan of Ballingeary and he, in turn, sold it on to Dan Buckley, a native of Killarney, in 1951, who changed the name from Ronan's Hotel to the Castle Hotel. The present-day members of the Buckley family continue to run the hotel and undertook a major extension and refurbishment of the entire premises in recent years.

The gathering in the former Williams home in the lovely sunny setting of Coolcower House on the banks of the Lee, was truly notable in bringing together the family members of brothers, Samuel Erbery Williams, James Valentine Williams and Percival Williams. It was especially poignant to note the attendance and interest of grand-children and great grand-children, sharing and adding to the magnificent Family Tree parchment that was compiled by Diarmid, elder son of the late Dr. James Valentine Williams.

The latter, on retirement, was appointed as Honorary Physician to Queen Elizabeth. Also in attendance were Ruth Williams (Kenny), only daughter and child of Samuel and Edith Iris Williams (née Tilson) with Adrienne, daughter of Percival and Esther Elizabeth Williams (née Taylor) and Audrey Williams (Nicholson) the niece of Richard C. Williams. There was a phenomenal interest in the various strands displayed on the family parchment and Diarmid Williams, in his address, appealed to the assembled gathering and reaped a host of additional information and entries that will further extend the various branches of the tree. Diarmid also commended the excellent publication entitled 'Salmon of the River Lee' by author, Dan O'Donovan, who was also in attendance with his wife Bernie, as guests for the evening.

An outline of the Williams's connection with Coolcower was presented by Barry O'Brien who had collaborated with Diarmid in tracing the background of the William's connection with Coolcower and also Williams's Hotel in the Main Street. A Powerpoint presentation highlighted the remarkable attainment of both Richard C. Williams and his son Samuel Williams at the annual Royal Dublin Society's Cattle shows and a picture of a perpetual silver trophy tray, studded with medallions, revealed that the Williams's dominated the first place rosettes each of the years with their Aberdeen Angus prized animals. Highlighted too, was the beginning of the end of the Williams family association with Coolcower and Macroom. The decision of Government under the Programme for Economic Expansion in the 1950s presented a need to harness the power of more major rivers for the production of electricity and a move towards a more industrial


based economy. The Shannon River hydroelectric Scheme had been harnessed in the 1920s, at Ardnacrusha and, in the years between 1952 and 1957, two hydro-electric dams were brought into commission at Carrigadrohid and Inniscarra on the River Lee.

The initial announcement that the Carrigadrohid Hydro-electric Plant was to be built by the ESB, commencing in 1952, had enormous implications for the upper lands of the Lee Valley and, in particular, for the Williams Estate at Coolcower. Samuel Williams was deeply disturbed at the potential impact that the impending flood-water would have on the salmon-fishing pools and spawning grounds, as well as its associated tourism attraction, together with the environmental damage that would be inevitable on the fauna and flora across areas of his lands as well as on the ancient alluvial woodland at the Gearagh. The Williams Estate comprised 1,650 acres at the time and, despite the objections lodged against the Carrigadrohid Dam Project, it proceeded and a deflated Samuel Erbery and his wife, Edith Iris, decided to part with their pedigree herd, sell Coolcower House and lands and go to live in Carrigaline. The house and lands then came under the ownership of Andrew Casey in 1958, having been in the custody of Richard Christopher and subsequently, his son Samuel Erbery Williams, for more than half a century. Sam died in 1976 and Edith Iris (née Tilson) died in 1998 and both are interred in St. Luke's Church of Ireland, Douglas.

One of the great tragedies endured by Richard Christopher Williams was the malicious burning of the then beautiful castellated Coolcower House in July 1921. However, undaunted, he

endured, and re-built the present day building which has been modified by the Casey family over the decades. The opportunity for Diarmid, Ruth, Adrienne and Audrey to re-visit and no doubt recall nostalgic moments, together with the members of the extended Williams families, was a wonderful informative and sharing experience amidst the hallowed walls of their ancestral home. The excellent facilities of Coolcower House were placed at the disposal of the gathering by Bernie Casey O'Callaghan, family and the staff. The rippling waters of the nearby River Lee were joined in a chorus by the strains of the magnificent Branflakes Jazz Band who travelled from the UK to entertain the quests.

The previous evening (16th August) the family weekend had begun with a very lively Dixie/Swing Jazz event by the Branflakes at St. Senan's Church, Inniscarra, commemorating its 200th anniversary. St. Senan's has been the Williams family place of worship since the early 1800s' and is where Dr. James Valentine Williams and his wife Mary (parents of Diarmid, Richard and Jill) and other family members are interred. The event was hosted by Canon lan Jonas and raised €600 for the Irish Guide Dogs for the Blind. A further contribution was raised at Coolcower and includes a donation to the Macroom Branch of COPE.

Following the gathering at Coolcower, (which derives its name from the Irish Cúl Cobhair 'Recess of Froth' where the Rivers Lee and Sullane coalesce and which was also called 'Magh Ghlas') the group adjourned to the Castle Hotel (formerly Williams's Hotel) where Diarmid was met by Martin Fitzgerald, grandson of John Martin Fitzgerald who was one of the members of the deputation to Lady Ardilaun in 1924. The gathering concluded with an evening of music and dance with the outstanding Branflakes, entertaining the locals and visitors alike and they gave their final rendering with the band members lying almost horizontal and with perfect resonance and harmony from all instruments played in a vertical position. A measure of the enjoyment is contained in the expression of one local spectator who said the Castle Hotel will never be the same again. And so it was, the Williams Gathering, that commenced in Inniscarra, continued in Coolcower and Macroom and came to a joyful and memorable close.


Inniscarra now face Kilworth in the semi final and will be hopeful that their injured stars can be available for that test.

Aaron O'Donovan and Brian Cronin on target as Aghinagh were reeling under the onslaught and then in the tenth minute Iveleary struck for their first goal, Jones feeding Conor O'Leary who made ground under pressure and when the ball went loose Chris Óg Jones was lurking to slide it to the net from close quarters to make it 1-5 to nil.

Liam Twohig got Aghinagh on the scoreboard at last in the 13th minute with a point from a free but Iveleary quickly replied and when Two hig pointed another free early in the second quarter, Jones set up Cathal Vaughan for another point in reply and Brian Cronin had added another before Donal Corkery got a third point for Aghinagh, their first from play, in the 20th minute. Welcome back dear reader "weeping may endure for the night, but joy comes in the morning" (Psalm 30:5). Are you going through a season of weeping? God promises that no matter what the ordeal, joy will come as you praise and honour Him. Everyone goes through dark trials in life. Night time can be the hardest, when everything is quiet and we start thinking. But after every night there comes a dawn. It is true friend - whatever the circumstances you are going through light will come. But many things can prevent us from breaking out of darkness, grief and fear. In 1st Samuel chapter 7 the people of Israel were in trouble. Their enemies were terrorising them. Even though they were God's people, they had turned away from His Word and worshipped false gods and trusted in them. Now they were reaping the results of the demonic influence those idols brought. Many people are in dark places today and they have no idea why. They are living with curse, sickness and torment; suffering terribly and are clueless on how to receive healing. But God's Word is very clear - the second commandment tells us that we are not to bow down before images or statues of anyone who is in heaven or on earth, and we are not to worship idols because it brings curse. God is a jealous God and He does not share His glory with anyone (Exodus 20:3-6). His Son Jesus is our Messiah. He is the One Who died on the cross for our Salvation, but He is not on that cross any longer because God raised Him up and He is alive! KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: **CHANGES TO PARENTAL LEAVE**

Question: I heard that there will be changes to parental leave later this year. What are they?

Answer: A number of changes to parental leave are due to take place in 2019 and 2020. Currently parents (and people acting in loco parentis) can take 18 weeks unpaid parental leave on behalf of children up to age eight.

A phased extension to parental leave is planned. From 1 September 2019, parental leave will increase by 4 weeks to 22 weeks. From 1 September 2020, parental leave will increase again by 4 weeks to 26 weeks.

The age of eligible children will increase from 8 to 12 years of age from 1 September. Currently, if your child has a disability or a long-term illness, you can take parental leave up until their 16th birthday - there is no change to this provision.

If you have already taken some, or all of the current entitlement of 18 weeks parental leave, you will get the additional weeks of parental leave, provided your child is still under the qualifying age.

A new paid Parental Leave Scheme that will allow parents to take two weeks paid leave each during their child's first year is expected from November 2019. Legislation needs to be enacted before this change can come into effect. You can follow the progress on oireachtas.ie.



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
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


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
