Briery Gap: Macroom Theatre and Library

The Briery Gap Theatre and Library occupies a very prominent location on the Main Street in Macroom and was a hub of activity on a daily basis, serving the needs of the Macroom hinterland, until a major fire devastated the building in May 2016. Despite the best efforts of all the stakeholders, including the local community, the building has remained untouched since then, but we understand that this scenario will take a turn for the better in the very near future. Cork County Council engaged the services of a Professional Design team approximately 18 months ago to 'scope' the site and redesign the building with a view to having it refurbished as a modern, contemporary and state-of-the art building, capable of accommodating a Library and Theatre. It also required the Design team to take into account the regulatory changes which came into effect since the building was converted to a Theatre and Library in 1998, including Health and Safety, Fire and Building Regulations, Disability access, etc, making it a challenging job within the footprint of the existing building.

The proposed works were formally considered and recommended for planning by the Macroom-Blarney Municipal Council and formally approved by Cork County Council in 2018, clearing the way for the detailed design to be finalised and ultimately for the project to proceed to tender. Throughout this process regular briefings were provided by the County Architects Department to the Board of Directors of the Briery Gap and any concerns were taken on board with a view to achieving the optimum solutions. It is also understood that this process is now finalised and Cork County Council will



proceed to tender in the coming weeks.

Due to the scale of the project the estimated cost of the entire project will be in excess of \in 4.2m. Cork County Council advised the Board of Briery Gap some time ago of this situation and indicated that as a result there would be a significant shortfall in funding and sought the assistance of the Board in lobbying for significant Government funding. The Board met with Local Councillors and Minister Michael Creed on numerous occasions to lobby for funding, given the importance of the Theatre and Library to

Macroom and its hinterland. The Board also assisted Cork County Council in preparing submissions to Government and also lobbied Management of the Council to prioritise the project. Ultimately this helped in securing the required investment, with confirmation about three months ago by Minister Josepha Madigan of funding amounting to €600,000 by the Dept. of Arts, Heritage and An Gaeltacht. This was a very welcome development and was followed in the last few days by a further announcement by Minister Michael Ring of funding amounting to €2m from the Rural Development and this was conveyed to all the stakeholders by Minister Michael Creed, and was very much welcomed.

Noel O Driscoll, Chairman of the Board of Directors of The Briery Gap, said that the total Government funding of €2.6m was an indication that the Briery Gap Cultural Centre was a very significant project for the region, and would have a very positive influence on the economic, cultural, social and educational well-being of not only Macroom but also the large hinterland. Mr O Driscoll also acknowledged the tireless work of Minister Michael Creed in securing this major Government funding for the Briery Gap and thanked local TD's and County Councillors for their support and lobbying throughout the process. He also thanked the Management of Cork County Council for their belief in the project and for committing to project-manage the development and, even more importantly, for supplying the balance of the funding required. The Briery Gap when completed will be a testimony to their commitment.

Cork County Council Investment announced for Macroom and Kanturk

The Mayor of the County of Cork, Cllr. Christopher O' Sullivan today welcomed news that Cork County Council has been successful in securing government funding of over $\in 2.6$ million for rural regeneration in the towns of Macroom and Kanturk. The Government's Rural Regeneration and Development Fund (RRDF) was established to support rural renewal and build resilience in rural communities. Today's announcement by the Minister for Rural and Community Development, Michael Ring, includes an allocation of $\notin 2.6$ million to Cork County Council's commitment to invest over $\notin 2.7$ million in the project, and the recent allocation of $\notin 600,000$ from the Department of Arts, Heritage and the Gaeltacht. Funding of $\notin 619,500$ was today announced by the Minister for the town of Kanturk in North Cork towards the delivery of infrastructural development works that will

facilitate the future growth and development of the town. Speaking following today's announcement, Mayor of the County of Cork, Cllr. Christopher O' Sullivan noted that "This is great news for County Cork. A huge amount of work has gone into bringing both projects to this stage and credit is due to everyone involved. The significant sums awarded to these projects reflect Cork County Counci's investment in and commitment to the regeneration and development of our rural towns." Commenting on both allocations, Council Chief Executive Tim Lucey welcomed the news and commended the work of Council staff and local stakeholders in securing this funding from government. Macroom Parish Mission, October, 20th - 25th

A year of planning came to fruition recently with the conclusion of a very successful Parish Mission. The theme was 'Come as you are; all are Welcome' and those old enough to remember missions in days gone by were full of praise for the modern approach which was so refreshing and inclusive. The new parish hall proved invaluable not only for planning meetings but for also the social side, where people mingled after the services. The missioners emphasised the social side and the camaraderie that was part and parcel of being a part of the community of faith.


Corner Health Shop or the reception at The Mills Inn marked for Mary Greene's attention and all items will be very gratefully received.

De La Salle started their senior football campaign with the Corn Uí Mhuirí first round in Mallow on Wednesday October 23rd against a strong Clonmel side. De La Salle got off to a good start with Jack Kelleher scoring two early points. Shortly after Chris O' Connell played a great ball through to Dylan Twomey who hammered it into the Clonmel net to put De La Salle up 1-02 to 0-01 inside the first ten minutes. Soon after Clonmel began to fight back and scored four points in the space of six minutes to level the game. Towards the end of the first half, corner forward Daniel Cotter broke through the Clonmel defence but failed to finish and instead blasted it over the bar. Some great spells of defending from the Hunt brothers David and Mark allowed minimum scores to be conceded. Full forward Jack Kelleher added another point before the break which allowed Macroom to leave the pitch with a two point lead 1-04 to 0-05. The second half resumed with Clonmel winning the throw in and scoring two unanswered points to level the match including an effort on goal that came back off the post. Despite playing against the wind, Clonmel looked to be the more threatening side. Mid-way through the second half Clonmel were reduced to fourteen men when they received a red card for a high tackle

Book Launch; Macroom Union Workhouse 1841-1921 & Other Pieces, Dr Con Kelleher

The book was launched on Nov. 7th 2019 by Mrs Joan Creedon in Macroom Community Hospital. Mrs Creedon provided the link and the inspiration for the book. Ms Bernie Buckley, Director of Nursing, invited Dr Kelleher to interview Mrs Creedon during the course of which she disclosed that both her father- and uncle-in-laws were among the last Masters of Macroom Workhouse. On the night Mrs Creedon shared her memories of how people felt about the famine and workhouses and that they were largely taboo subjects. Further research revealed the scale of the disaster and the central place that workhouses, including Macroom, played in the tragic Great Irish Famine 1845-1852 story. The Famine was the crucial event in modern Irish History and the greatest natural European catastrophe of the nineteenth century.

While statistics can be dry it is sobering to remember that the population of Ireland dropped from 8.2 to 4.5 million between 1841 to 1911, and that of Macroom Workhouse Union - roughly present-day Muskerry less Ballincollig, Blarney and Kilmichael - from 58,818 to 21,414. The drop was caused by death, emigration, delayed marriage and decreased fertility. One third of the extra approximate one million Famine deaths occurred in workhouses. Exact figures are not available for those who

died in Macroom Workhouse 1845-1852 but it is in the region of 2,500. The history of the Workhouse was the sober topic of the book. Jeremy Kelleher was MC for the night, the author spoke, and Michael, Jerry, Mary and Gus Kelleher read book excerpts. Bernie Buckley read Quarantine, Eavan Boland's poem based on the Buckley Family's experience in Mountmassey House, an auxiliary workhouse during the famine. Declan O'Rourke's song Poor Boy's Shoe closed the presentation. Intelligent contributions and questions were taken from the floor. The staff of Macroom Hospital and Teresa Kelleher provided lovely refreshments afterwards. Claire Creedon and Dylan Molyneux expertly guided parking. 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History Dan Murray, 1934 –

Dan Murray, Kilmichael man, Teacher and Principal; Kilmichael, Kilmurry, Canovee, UCC, Macroom, Cork & Munster Footballer, by Con Kelleher.

Dan Murray was one of the best footballers ever to play for Macroom. Born in Kilmichael, he played for Kilmichael (School's Shield), Canovee, Kilmurry and Cloughduv (hurling) minors, De La Salle Macroom, Munster Colleges, Darrara College, Carbery, UCC, Macroom, Cork at minor, junior and senior levels, Munster and the Combined Universities. With Cork he contested two All-Irelands senior finals in '56 and '57, won two Munster senior medals, a National League medal 1955/'56, and an All-Ireland junior medal in 1953. He was a member of two Macroom county senior winning sides in '58 and '62, and won the Kelleher Shield with UCC and Macroom. He was named in Colman Cusack's (John O'Sullivan) Macroom Team of Teams, around 1959. A knee injury in 1959 curtailed his playing career and he regrets that he never got a chance to play again with Kilmichael.

Sheila (neé Lucey), his wife and Dan graciously received me at their home in Bishopstown, and I enjoyed their tea, biscuits and beautiful apple tart. Although his movements are slower, his mind is quick, bright and sharp. The purpose of the visit was to talk to Dan about his childhood, his education and career, and especially, his exploits on the GAA fields. His sporting successes are outstanding but perhaps are superseded by his off-field achievements. Dan thinks both are two sides of the same coin. We spoke in their lovely garden and Dan is the chief gardener

Childhood: Born into a small farm in Balina, Toames, Dan was the youngest of ten children; he and his sister Nellie Finnegan are the only two still alive. Just over a month ago, his brother Jerry died in Galway. (Jerry's daughter's sons play soccer with Hibernians, Scotland, Cork City, Shamrock Rovers and Galway United - and the Irish clubs recently clashed). Dan was taught by Master Jerry Murray who was married to Dan's first cousin - Peggy Burke, also his teacher. Dan has very pleasant school memories. Jerry Murray won county senior football medals with Macroom and was a fine golfer, as is his son, Kevin. Gaelic football was the Primary School's game and Dan's first match (School Shield) was against Kilmurry. Beaten, he remembers crying after the game and being consoled by Master Burke who told him that he 'would yet win many matches'. That prophecy certainly came true. Skills were honed in the fields and on the road, often using home-made footballs, sometimes made from pigs' bladders. Dan won his first medals in 1946 at the Macroom District Schools Sports when he won the 11-12 eighty yards race and U-12 thirty yards dash. Joe O'Brien was second in the former and his cousin, Jackie Higgins, second in the latter. Jackie was his centre field partner in the All-Ireland minor semi-final against Galway; he also won an All-Ireland junior medal with Cork and Dan in 1953.

Education-Football. For Dan, football and education





went hand-in-glove. De La Salle, Macroom, was his next educational port-of-call. Dan did well both academically and football-wise. DLS lost a Simcox (Cork Colleges) final. He was a Cork minor in '51 and '52. In the '51 Munster minor final he played full-forward and was marked by Kerry fullback, Eric Rvan, later a Macroom and Cork colleague, and who became a great pal. The following year he played at mid-field. Cork lost in '51 but won in '52. As Kilmichael did not have a minor team, Dan played first with Kilmurry and then Canovee. Following his Leaving Certificate, Dan attended Darrara Agricultural College where he received his basic Rural Science training. The College



reached a Carbery Junior final but lost. He played championship for Carbery but they were well beaten by Macroom. In 1953 he had one of his best sporting moments. Dan and his bothers Jerry and Connie, played in the backs when Cork won the All-Ireland Junior Championship, a very rare if not unique occurrence to have three brothers on a winning All-Ireland team. As stated above, his cousin Jackie Higgins also played. That same year, 1953, Canovee qualified for the county senior semi-final and were beaten by the Army. After Darrara Dan did a two year Diploma in Rural Science in UCC. While there he played championship, Kelleher Shield and Sigerson football with UCC and was selected on the Combined Universities side that played the Rest of Ireland. Although UCC won a Kelleher Shield, he did not receive his medal as the manager, a fellow student, thought he had played poorly in the last game, ironically against Macroom. Liam O'Brien, New Street, was then heavily involved in Macroom GAA club and a Rural Science teacher. That connection facilitated Dan's transfer to Macroom in 1957 and that was the beginning of a fruitful mutual relationship. He was on the Cork senior panel 1953-59 but a bad knee injury, sustained against St Finbarr's in the '59 senior final, prematurely finished

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his inter-county career. This was at a time before arthroscopies and cruciate ligament repairs etc. were available. With Cork he won a National League, two senior Munster championships and played in two All-Ireland finals, 1956 and 1957. Cork unexpectedly and probably undeservedly lost to Louth in 1957 and that of course is a major regret. One major incident from that game stays with him. Dan fielded a side-line ball near his square, but the ball was knocked from his hands, finished in the Cork net and that goal proved vital. Louth won 1-9 to 1-7. Cork lost, perhaps because of complacency and many missed scoring chances. That incident has never left him. Together with other Macroom players, Mick Goold, Niall Fitzgerald, and Eric Ryan, Dan played Railway Cup for Munster but he does not have a Railway Cup medal.

Teaching Career: Dan taught first in Kanturk and Charleville. In his second year Dan was appointed teacher-in-charge of a small thirty pupil school in Lombardstown. He had digs with a single farmer who was a fine man and Dan enjoyed his company. He later taught in Dunmanway and Bandon. He was Principal of Millstreet Vocational School (1966-1973) before it coalesced to become Millstreet Community School. That September he became Vice-Principal of Mayfield Community School, appointed by the Board of Management. Three years later (1976) he was appointed first Principal of Ballincollig Community School (BCS) and in its first year it had about 100 pupils. In a short number of years the enrolment went to 1,100 thereby becoming the second biggest post-primary school in the country. Coláiste Choilm, Ballincollig was then set up and BCS numbers dropped to about 700/800. Some years before retirement in 1999 Dan was honoured with the Ballincollig Person of the Year award.

Family: Sheila Lucey, Castle Street, Macroom married Dan in 1963 and they live in Bishopstown. Fittingly enough they first met at the 1958 victory dinner (Dec. or Jan.) but Dan had to wait until July for their first date. Sheila's father, Dan, had previously been chairman of Macroom GAA. One of nine children she was the middle child, with two boys and two girls both older and younger than her. She remembers one incident from her childhood and it revolves around Fossett's circus. At that time it was taboo to enter a Protestant church or graveyard. A childhood friend assumed that the Fossetts were Protestant and suggested that she and Sheila could pretend to be Church of Ireland in order to play with them and gain entry to the Protestant church just across from the Lucey home in Castle Street. A member of



Macroom Golf Club, she enjoys her golf and also maintains contact with Macroom. Sheila qualified as a nurse in the South Infirmary and after marriage stayed at home and looked after the family, and with great success. Their five children have all done well and all are living in Ireland with their daughter, Lucy, the farthest away, in Dublin. She works for the Bank of Ireland. Vincent played football and hurling with Bishopstown and hurling with Cork minors and under-21s. He teaches in Christians, Cork. Deirdre is a doctor and works for the Health Service Executive (HSE). Michael is a department head in Eli Lily. Fergal is marketing with Dell in Cork.

Outside Activities: Dan trained Millstreet senior footballers one year and they reached the county senior semi-final. He was also involved with some Bishopstown underage GAA teams. Bridge has been a hobby for about sixty years and he finds it very good socially and it mentally challenges and stimulates his brain. He plays on-line and he finds this very enjoyable.

Since retirement Dan is involved with Probus, a Bishopstown-based social club that meets regularly. It is composed of retired professional and business

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people. It is a discussion club where the events of today, yester-year and the future are thrashed out. An eavesdropping fly on-the-wall would shortly become very wise and knowledgeable indeed. He has also written a number of Family Histories, one about the Murray family and the other about his mother's family, the O'Connell's. He also has recorded the minutes of Probus in print and these run to four volumes. Gardening has always being a great interest and his farming background, scientific education and meticulous nature has resulted in a very lovely garden.

Reflections on Football and Life: Dan enjoyed enormously his football career and he met and played with and against many fine players such as Mick Goold, Eric Ryan, Niall Fitzgerald, Joe O'Brien, Hugo Casey, Timmy O'Callaghan, Tim 'Gunner' O'Leary, Seán Murphy, Seán Purcell, Frankie Stockwell, Frank Lynch (Louth) and many more. He marked Frankie Stockwell, one of the 'Terrible Twins', in the '57 All-Ireland semifinal and his success in that role played a major part in Cork's victory. Few years ago when in Tuam he sought out Stockwell and they enjoyed a cup of tea together. That '57 semi-final was one of Dan's best games in a Cork jersey. Another game he remembers well is a county senior semi-final, Macroom v. Beara in Bantry. Mick Goold went off injured and Dan was switched to centre-back and he played very well to curb Joe O'Sullivan, a Cork senior. To add lustre to his display, he converted a 'fifty'. Achievement, maximizing his potential, solid relationships and friendships were the key ingredients to his life off and on the football field. It is great to see Dan and Sheila so well, so active and sharp. One can readily appreciate why they did well. In GAA style Dan and Sheila certainly deserve 'Three Cheers' for their achievements and contributions. Con Kelleher.

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POPE JOHN PAUL II'S VISIT TO GALWAY 1979 & THE KILMURRY CONNECTION

The 40th anniversary of the visit of the Pope to Ireland in September/October 1979 has passed without much media attention but for me it brings back great memories of the Youth Mass at Galway on 30th September, and the preparations that went into the journey when the youth of Kilmurry Parish attended.

Those in the 16 - 24 year age group were invited to attend and over 40 people from Kilmurry were amongst the total of 140,000 youth from every parish in Ireland. At a Mass celebrated by Fr. Gerard Kelleher, PP in Kilmurry on Friday 22nd we were given our train tickets and instructions. The cost of the trip was £8.50 - £6.50 for the train fare and £2 for soup and sandwiches at Galway which we never got! Mick Leahy, woodwork teacher at Macroom Vocational School and Joan O'Shea, a local nurse from Clodagh, were assigned to look after the group and we were all told to be at Kent Train Station at 1 a.m. on Sunday to board one of the three special trains bound for Galway.

Local Garda Sergeant at Farnanes, Jim Nyhan, was travelling on one of the trains and was in charge of a large number of Gardaí from Cork who were to provide security at Galway.

Also travelling by road that night were the Crookstown Red Cross bound for Knock to provide first-aid during the visit to the shrine. They travelled on the late Joan Donovan's bus. Joan was no stranger to this route as she regularly took pilgrims to Knock and further to Lough Derg, as well as her regular Sunday night runs to the Lilac Ballroom, Enniskeane. The train to Galway was packed, with many standing for the full journey and it took around six hours, due to the extra rail traffic, to get to our desyination. On arrival, we walked to Ballybrit Racecourse to await the arrival of the Pope, scheduled for 10 am. At 10.20 a.m., the Pope's helicopter landed quite near our area and he was then driven through the crowd in

the Cork-built popemobile before leaving for his next stop at Knock Shrine. Our elation at having participated in this historic event was tempered somewhat by the realisation that we had many hours to wait for our return train and also our soup and sandwiches were still nowhere to be seen! Luckily though, at the station Sgt. Jim Nyhan was at hand to ensure we got on the first train with the Garda group. We arrived in Cork after midnight, exhausted but with memories of a day none of us would ever forget.

In June 2018, I called to the late Mick Leahy at his home in Bridelands to reminisce about that day. Mick recalled that he and Joan O'Shea had little trouble minding the group, all being generally well behaved. Mick, a native of Ruan,

Co. Clare remembered being in a shop in Ennis with his parents in 1932 listening on a radio to Count John McCormack sing at Mass during the Eucharistic Congress in Dublin 37 years previously. Tessie Buckley, Cloughduv Church Sacristan for 47 years, was one of the Crookstown Red Cross group who travelled to Knock. Although it was a long trip, with heavy traffic at times, there was a lovely atmosphere about and they stayed at a boarding school in Claremorris before going on to Knock, leaving for home about midnight. The weather was foggy but while many slept for the journey, Joan Donovan, as always, got them safely home. Jim Nyhan who served as Sergeant in Farnanes for almost thirty years, recalls shaking hands with the Pope as he alighted from the helicopter as well as the long journey during which many guards spent playing cards to pass the time.

Reflecting on this time, great credit is due to the organisers of the three day papal visit at a time before motorways and

mobile phones, etc. and during one of the worst periods of the Northern Troubles. The visit went off smoothly and it's unlikely anything like it will ever be seen again.

I would like to thank Ann O'Driscoll, Tessie Buckley, Jim Nyhan and the late Mick Leahy for their memories of that day.



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: PUBLIC HOLIDAY ENTITLEMENT

Question: I work full-time, Monday to Friday, but the business will be closed on Monday 28th October. Will I get paid for the day?

Answer: Monday 28 October 2019 is a public holiday and as you would normally be due in work you are entitled to get your normal pay for the day.

If you did work on Monday 28, you would be entitled to your pay for the day and one of the following alternatives:

- An additional day of annual leave
- An additional day's pay
- A paid day off within a month of the public holiday

If you are not normally rostered to work on a public holiday you are entitled to one-fifth of your weekly pay as compensation for the public holiday.

Part-time employees also qualify for a public holiday entitlement, when they have worked at least 40 hours in total in the 5 weeks before the public holiday.

If you are not getting your public holiday entitlement, you may make a complaint under the Organisation of Working Time Act within 6 months. You must use the online complaint form (pdf) from the Workplace Relations Commission.

Welcome back dear reader "anyone who wants to serve Me must follow Me, because My servants must be where I am. And the Father will honour anyone who serves Me" (John 12:26). Servant-hood is almost a dirty word today. It holds a nasty meaning because of man's inhumanity to man, but Jesus often referred to it, in relation to Himself and those who desire to follow Him. On the negative side - some people have a servant-mentality due to mistreatment from others - where they have been so beat down that their self esteem is shattered from being abused. This is not what Jesus means when speaking of His servants. Let's look at one; Mary, the sister of Lazarus whom Jesus raised from the dead. In Luke chapter 10 Jesus visited this family who were good friends of His. Mary sat at His feet, totally focussed on Jesus and His teaching. Mary's sister Martha had no time to listen because she was distracted by preparing food for Jesus and His followers. Poor Martha gets very bad press - I'm sure we can all understand her feelings! But Jesus gently told Martha that Mary had chosen to do the right thing when she criticised her. Mary was committed to serving Jesus by worshipping Him, and abiding in His Presence. Because of this, Mary later followed the Holy Spirit's leading and anointed Jesus with the wildly expensive oil to prepare Him for His burial - before His death! (John 12:1-8) She was again judged for her sold out worship of Jesus, this time by His betrayer Judas. There is a key here friend. Mary's worship of Jesus allowed her to hear in the Spirit what His other disciples missed, and it's an encounter that God uses to honour her forever in His Word (Mark 14:1-9). After Jesus had died on the Cross they put Him into the tomb, but, because the Sabbath was approaching, they could only partly prepare His body with some spices, and quickly wrap Him in cloth before they had to go home and observe the Sabbath rest. Then, early on the morning after the Sabbath was ended, Mary Magdalene and the others came to anoint the body of Jesus properly, but it was too late - because God had raised Him from the dead and He was gone! Mary fed on the Presence of God through her attention to Jesus because He is the God of the Living - not the dead. (Luke 24:5)



Gougane Barra is a beautiful holy place that has drawn people of all persuasions throughout the years they have found their way into the still valley tucked away in the Mhúscraí Gaeltacht. J.J. Callanan was one of these people and he wrote what was perhaps one of his most famous pieces of poetry about 'Gougane Barra' J.J. was born in Ballinhassig into a medical family in 1775. He received his first education in Cork City and later Trinity College Dublin. He decided to leave his education

for his news. He found passion in poetry and he was given a teaching position in Cork which gave him the means to travel around county collecting folk stories, ballads and creating his own. J.J. was drawn to the green valley in 'Gougane Barra' where St. Finbarrs hermitage lays by the water of the River Lee. It is said that he composed the poem 'Gougane Barra' to honour this picturesque place when he was taking cover under a large tree by the hermitage wall during a downfall of summer rain in 1826. J.J. travelled in all weathers around the country which contributed to his ill health in 1827. Then he left for Lisbon where he was offered a teaching position. He would

never have left Ireland but because of ill health he needed to escape to a much warmer climate. Sadly his stay in Lisbon would be cut short because he took a turn for the worse, determined to sail home to die in his native cork. J.J. made it on board the ship but his condition worsened so he was taken off the ship and died days later in Lisbon on the 29th of September at the age of 32 years. On ST. Finbarrs feast day when pilgrims do the round on

St. Finbarrs Island when they pass the head stone which does not mark a grave but remembers a man whose resting place is in another country this head stone marks the spot where J.J Callanan sheltered from the rain and was moved to compose the iconic poetry on the holy place. J.J. may lie in an unknown spot by the banks of the iconic Tagus River in Lisbon but in Cork J.J. Callanan will always be remembered by the good people of 'Gougane Barra' Inchigeela Ballingeary where a thousand wild fountains come down to that 'Lake' from their homes in the mountains when in Gougane Barra spare a prayer for J.J. Callanan
