

Most importantly, he stressed that each of us has made and continues to make valuable contributions, in some capacity, everyday. We sincerely thank Dessie for visiting our school. We also thank Mr Fergus Ryan for organising the presentation.



UCC French Tutor: Ms Isabelle O'Driscoll, originally from Montpellier in the south of France, is currently undertaking a Ph. D. (a doctorate and highest academic degree) in UCC, spent the day at McEgan College working with our 6th Year French students, Isabelle has worked with Senior French pupils in McEgan many times in recent years and helps them improve their fluency in the French language. The project is funded by the UCC Plus Scheme and each pupil was provided with one-onone tuition. Isabelle will again work with the pupils prior

to the Leaving Cert Oral examination. She will provide further support online to the pupils.

The UCC Plus scheme provides Leaving Cert pupils with free extra tuition in many Leaving Cert subjects and it is happening throughout the academic year at McEgan College. This is a wonderful opportunity for 6th Year pupils as it provides extra academic support, enabling them to reach their potential.

Transition Year pupils were fortunate to spend a day at the Cork-based Online Security CompanyTrend Micro on the Model Farm Road, where they attended a very informative and interactive workshop on the importance of internet safety. The workshop provides education to both pupils and teachers to help prevent and address online risks among young people. As part of the workshop, the pupils were trained in how to deliver a presentation to their peers on the importance of safety when using the internet, especially when using social media. Trend Micro will provide ongoing support to the pupils in delivering the presentation and provided the pupils with an information pack and power point presentation

Dr. James Pittman, a past student of McEgan and currently of CIT spoke to DCG students about his experience in education. He highlighted the importance of following your passion and how it is possible to succeed with supports such as The Higher Education Access Route (HEAR) regardless of what barriers may be before you along your journey. This year much focus was put on the growing opportunities in the area of Apprenticeships. Many new ones have been introduced and include Accounting Technician, Auctioneering and Insurance Practitioners among many more. Those students interested in entering the workforce immediately on completion of the Leaving Cert were encouraged to look at this area as combining such work with study will increase not only ones qualification status but earning potential into the future. Damian Butler, Mature Student Officer of UCC, began the week by visiting our QQI students in Macroom Business Park. He gave a very informative talk on the wide range of opportunities available to adult learners at UCC and encouraged all OOI students to attend an open evening in January held specifically for adult learners. All teachers throughout the week shared their own college experiences with their classes, something which is often a highlight for the students. The week ended on a high, when past pupils of McEgan returned with great vigour on the afternoon of Friday.







Missions, Mass Rocks and Mass Houses – handing on the faith in Macroom. Jack Kelleher, Castleview

The recent Parish Missions, held in Kilnamartyra and Macroom, each began with a "Pilgrims' Walk" or "Camino". The walkers set off along familiar streets and roads, retracing the footsteps of previous generations who had sacrificed so much to hand on the faith. For some it may have reminded them of mass-goers who, in the not so distant past, walked cross-country along "mass paths" and, on drawing near to the chapel, would have stopped a while to change into their "Sunday shoes" - as at Carraig-namBróg in Kilnamartyra. Of course you'll see something similar happening among today's mass-goers as they stop and check to see if they have turned off their mobile phones. Yet another part of that shared Catholic heritage is the many "mass rocks" dotted all about the countryside. During the dark days of the Penal Laws the people of Macroom had to head west as far as Dundareirke in Kilnamartyra to hear mass. And when the persecutions grew even greater, many were forced to travel further still, to one of the mass rocks located in the nearby townlands of Shanballyshane and Cahirkereen. As the massgoers made their way along the High Road they passed a large flat stone at a place known as "Luibínna-gCoirp" (The Bend of the Corpse). At this particular




stone it became the custom during local funerals for the "hunted priest" to recite the committal prayers of Christian burial since it was not safe to do so at the graveside. Thus any funeral cortege heading to the cemetery stopped there, with the coffin being placed on the stone, until the committal prayers had been said. Only the mass rock in Cahirkereen still survives. It sits on the northern slopes of a deep glen through which a stream runs, which explains how it came to be known as "Glaise-an-Aifrinn" (The Stream of the Mass). The "mass- rock" consists of a shelf of rock jutting out from the hillside with a small area of level ground surrounding it. Here priest and faithful gathered early in the morning to offer mass. It is said that the mass rock was sometimes screened on all sides by a canopy so as to protect the Blessed Sacrament from the elements. And posted at various

sentry points on nearby hills were lookouts whose duty it was to scan the surrounding countryside for the approach of any "priest hunters". A local story handed down from those times tells of one such attack at Glaisean-Aifrinn. It so happened that the priest had not yet vested for mass when the raid began and so he was able to make his escape by concealing himself among the congregation, which at that stage was beginning to scatter in every direction. He made his way to a nearby field where earlier his pony had been tethered. Here was a large boulder and it was his custom to step onto this stone before aetting onto his mount. However, on this occasion, as he climbed onto the rock, his feet left behind two deep imprints on its surface. And not only that, even the hooves of the pony left their mark at the side of the same rock. From then on the place became known as "Carraig-an-tSagairt" or "The Priest's Rock", with the surrounding land being regarded as sacred ground. Later on, it became a place of prayer - particularly so by married couples who sought God's blessing for the birth of a son. Some brave priests who risked their lives in the service of the faith sometimes staved in a small cabin at the southern edge of Prohus

Wood, Kilnamartyra. When the time of persecution finally came to an end, the cabin was no longer needed and soon fell into ruin. By the late 1850s it was little more than four crumbling walls, with a large ash tree growing at its centre. Then, when a fierce storm uprooted the tree, it caused such damage to the structure that the landholder decided to have it demolished. It was while this work was being carried

out that a hidden wall niche was uncovered. In it was found a fragment of cloth which, upon being unfolded, revealed two small silver spoons. Clearly the spoons had been concealed there by one of the hunted priests and must have been part of the set of sacred vessels traditionally used in the mass. The era of the mass rocks definitively drew to a close on July 27th 1782 when the second "Catholic Relief Bill" was enacted. This bill gave legal toleration to Catholics thereby allowing them to practice their faith in public once more. There were, however, irritating clauses included in the bill: a Catholic church could not have a steeple or a bell, nor could it be erected beside a main thoroughfare – which explains how the new chapel in Macroom came to be built up a steep, narrow lane away from Main Street. Craftily the people of Macroom found a way around the Act by hanging their bell from a tree on Sleaveen Hill. Priests were still not allowed to officiate at burials, and members of Religious Orders were excluded from the benefits of the Act. Those in the country when the Act was passed could remain provided they registered their names and place of residence. But no others were permitted to enter the country. For some decades preceding the Act the practice of families hosting a "Station Mass" had become well established among rural communities. When the first wave of construction of new chapels got under way these simple structures became known as "mass houses" – since they were low buildings, with whitewashed walls both inside and out, and covered with thatched roofs. The locations of the various mass houses within this district were as follows: in Macroom where St Colman's Church now stands, in Kilnamartyra where now we find An Crois public house; in Inchigeela village where today we find the national school; in Clondroid village where now stands St Abina's Church; and in Ballyvourney near Desmond's farmyard in Ballymakeera. Later on, when funds were more plentiful and laws were more favourable, fine new churches were erected in every parish, as befitted the worship of God in the sacrifice of the mass.

Kilmichael Ambush – 99th Anniversay

November 28th 1920 is when Kilmichael Ambush took place and this edition of LVO is published on its 99th anniversary. The ambush became an iconic symbol of the War of Independence. It was just seven days after Collins's squad had executed British intelligence officers in Dublin and British forces responded by shooting players and spectators at a Dublin-Tipperary match in Croke Park. This incident is remembered as the Bloody Sunday massacre. The country was on edge. On a miserable Sunday day in 1920 sixteen British men and three Irish men were killed at or near the battle scene. One auxiliary who escaped was captured and shot. Another auxiliary was left for dead but survived and had permanent injuries. Pat Deasy, IRA volunteer, was sixteen when he lost his life in the fight.

In recent years the late Peter Hart's controversial book, The IRA and its Enemies, ignited a bitter argument between learned historians on both sides. In particular Meda Ryan, Tom Barry's biographer, took issue with many of Hart's statements and conclusions. Seán A. Murphy, a retired Irish Army officer and ammunitions expert, analysed what likely happened at Kilmichael. Later again a British historian Andrew Nelson, in a journal article, examined the 'other boys of Kilmichael', that is the ambushed British auxiliaries.

The ambush was part of the conflict between Irish Nationalism and British Imperialism and occurred in the aftermath of World War I and severe economic hardship in both Ireland and Britain. Matters were further complicated by Ireland's divided society roughly along and overlapping religious and loyalty lines. About 10% of the population of what later became first the Free State and later the Republic was Protestant and Unionist. In the Six Counties about 60% were Protestant/Unionist.

The youth of the combatants at Kilmichael is striking as is the ferocity of the fighting and the numbers killed in a very short period of time. On one side were idealistic young men and on the other hardened, damaged and disillusioned war veterans. Five auxiliaries had significant medical or psychological problems. The Irish were there voluntarily and the auxiliaries were earning a living and acting for King and Empire.

It was the first time that trained British soldiers were beaten 'in the field' by the IRA. The UK government quickly realised that this was a war that would be difficult if not impossible to win. In the immediate aftermath Macroom was lucky not to be burned, possibly due to Lady Ardilaun's intervention and perhaps to safeguard her property interests in the town. Cork was not as lucky in the following week when British forces vented their anger and destroyed much of the city centre.

As The Boys of Kilmichael song goes, '(T) the tans left the town of Macroom' 99 years ago on that fatal day 28th of November 1920. What happened at Kilmichael changed the War of Independence and probably Ireland's history. Further reading:



All Ireland Title for Donoughmore Ladies

DONOUGHMORE 1-12 MACHALE ROVERS 1-11 (AFTER EXTRA-TIME)

Rena Buckley scored 0-7 as Donoughmore became the third Cork team in a row to claim the All-Ireland Junior Football title with victory over MacHale Rovers in the final, after extratime at Duggan Park in Ballinasloe.

Donoughmore were 1-7 to 0-6 in front at halftime after Niamh Lohan's strike. Cork legend Rena Buckley was inspirational throughout for her side while Rachel Kearns kept MacHale Rovers right in touch.

Mayo star Kearns picked up a yellow card at a vital stage in the second-half but she scored a key goal after she returned to set up a grandstand finish. Kearns then equalised and the game went to extra-time.

Donoughmore were 1-11 to 1-10 ahead at halftime in extra-time, and Rena Buckley added another point to seal the win.

MacHale Rovers started slowly and Donoughmore raced into a 1-4 to 0-0 lead after just nine minutes. Rena Buckley was selected at midfield but started in the half-forward line and she opened the scoring in the second minute. She doubled her tally from a free moments later, and then Lohan tagged on her first point before Donoughmore really hit their stride in the eighth minute.

Rena Buckley took a free short to Lohan and her long looping effort evaded the grasp of MacHale Rovers goalkeeper Niamh Larkin to finish in the net. It was a huge score and Rena Buckley quickly followed that up with her third point, and second from a free.

All-Star award winner, Rachel Kearns finally got MacHale Rovers on the scoreboard in the 12th minute and four minutes later she doubled her tally. Aileen Buckley and Lohan combined to cancel out those scores but MacHale Rovers hit four of the final five points in the half to go into the break right in contention. Aileen Buckley scored her second point but two from Kearns and Rebecca Maughan reduced the arrears to four points at half-time.

The Muskerry Cup final, the last game of the 2019 junior football season in Mid Cork, was decided at Annahala, and Aghinagh, runners up in the divisional championship, gained some silverware for their season with a fairly comprehensive victory over the home side in what was an entertaining game of football. Kilmichael started in impressive form and had three points on the board in the opening minutes but conceded a goal to Aghinagh in the 5th minute and were 1-3 to 0-4 in arrears at the end of the first guarter and beginning to struggle to contain the fleet footed Aghinagh attack. Two goals within a minute for Aghinagh followed and the winners were firmly in control and remained so until the break. Kilmichael staged a mini revival on the restart but the loss of a forward to a red card and a fourth goal for Aghinagh fairly settled the issue and there was little doubt about the outcome thereafter, though to their credit, Kilmichael battled bravely to the finish and were rewarded with a late goal.

Kilmichael opened enterprisingly with points from Peter Kelleher, Chris O'Connell and Micheál Masters but were rocked by a 5th minute goal from Adam O'Leary who fisted home a Diarmuid Crowley centre. Kilmichael edged back in front from a Chris O'Connell free, Michael O'Brien equalised and then two pointed frees in succession had Aghinagh in front and beginning to get on top. In the 16th minute William Coakley set up a goal for Micheál Horgan and a minute later, Declan Ambrose fed Coakley who slammed to the net from close range to put Aghinagh 3-3 to 0-4 in front. Aghinagh remained on top and led by 3-6 to 0-6 at the break, Kilmichael making little impression up front where Peter Kelleher was starved of possession.

A goal from Conor Cotter after an incisive drive at the defence gave Kilmichael a boost on the restart but within a minute, the home side lost Micheál Masters to a red card and lost momentum again. Aghinagh's Trevor Burns had a fourth goal for the winners in the 34th minute with a well judged lob to the far corner of the net, Kilmichael replied with two points from the reliable boot of Chris O'Connell. Con Buckley, star of the Aghinagh U21's in their county final win a week earlier, belted a fifth Aghinagh goal through the legs of defenders in the 48th minute to put ten points between the teams, 5-6 to 1-8, and the final stages were not going to change the result but Kilmichael never gave up and after Aghinagh points from Liam Twohig and a long range effort from Micheál Corkery, the home side finished the scoring with a goal from close range from Danny Twomey, swooping on a ball broken down by Peter Kelleher, and a point from a late free.


Gavin Walsh got a point back for Cloughduv in the fifty-fourth minute and Liam Wall got a consolation goal for Cloughduv in the dying seconds.







KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: CHRISTMAS BONUS 2019

Question: I am getting a social welfare payment. Will I get a Christmas Bonus this year? Answer: The Christmas Bonus is paid to people getting a long-term social welfare payment. It is paid the week beginning 2 December, to people getting the following payments:

- State pensions
- Widow's/Widower's/Surviving Civil Partner's pensions
- Invalidity Pension, Blind Pension, Disability Allowance, Carer's Allowance, Carer's Benefit, Domiciliary Care Allowance, Guardian's payment, Partial Capacity Benefit
- Jobseeker's Transitional payment, One-Parent Family Payment, Farm Assist, Deserted Wife's Benefit and Allowance, Magdalene Laundry Payment
- Community Employment, Rural Social Scheme, Tús, Gateway, Back to Work Enterprise Allowance, Job Initiative, Back to Work Family Dividend
- Back to Education Allowance (BTEA), VTOS and Further Education and Training (FET) training allowance (people coming from jobseeker's payments must have been on their payment and/or BTEA or VTOS or FET training allowance for 15 months)

For Jobseeker's Allowance (JA) or basic Supplementary Welfare Allowance (SWA), you must have been getting the payment for 15 months (390 days) to get a Christmas Bonus. However, if you were getting another eligible payment immediately before claiming JA or SWA, and your combined time on both eligible payments is 15 months, you will get the Christmas Bonus.

In 2019, the Christmas Bonus is 100% of your normal weekly payment (including the Living Alone Increase, the Island Allowance and the Over-80 Increase). Fuel Allowance is not included when calculating the Christmas Bonus. The minimum Christmas Bonus payment is €20. For Domiciliary Care Allowance (DCA), which is paid monthly, the bonus is 100% of the weekly amount.

Hedge Cutting: The Cork County Council wishes to raise public awareness and to remind landowners, under the terms of the Roads Act 1993, that it is their responsibility to carry out any necessary tree or hedge cutting where their lands about the public road or public footpath. Uncut hedges are a serious road safety hazard and are causing substantial damage to vehicles, particularly heavy goods vehicles. Work should be carried out while hedges are dormant, between now and the end of February next year. Landowners are encouraged to protect wildlife and promote biodiversity on all their

hedgerows (including non-roadside hedges) and information is available on www. pollinator.ie

The All-Ireland Pollinator Plan recommends that when hedge-cutting to leave one new whitethorn tree in every routinely trimmed hedgerow – a strategy to address the decline in bees. According to Teagasc, hedgerows are the most important source of flowers in the Irish farmed landscape, but are only of value to pollinators if flowers are present. 


