### McEgan College Updates

SVP Food Appeal: McEgan College's Annual SVP Food Appeal was launched at the beginning of December. Every year students and staff collect as many non-perishable food items as possible. The food is given to SVP Macroom, who in turn, distribute it to needy families in the area over Christmas. McEgan College is happy and proud to be associated with this yearly initiative.

'Pass The Bucket' for Cork Penny Dinners: Fifth Year Pupil Sheena Sheehan is a young person who is to be greatly admired for her fundraising activities. Sheena was recently awarded a West Cork Garda Youth Award for her local fundraising activities here in Macroom, most notably The Fairy Garden. She is currently fundraising for Cork Penny Dinners and will be passing the bucket in local businesses throughout Macroom. The idea of pass the bucket comes from the well known phrase " to pass the buck" i.e. to blame someone else or make them responsible for a problem that you should deal with yourself. She is asking local businesses to take the bucket for one day to collect funds. Sheena chose a local non-profit organisation that helps local Cork people. She wants to contribute towards their Christmas dinners. Cork Penny Dinners is one of Cork's oldest charities and currently serves up to 2,000 freshly prepared dinners per week. Her mum Anna Sheehan Sheena is supporting her with her latest fundraising venture. After her first week she has raised over one thousand euro!!! The bucket will be on display in local Macroom businesses until Christmas. 



Work has started on the Cork County Council development in Oakwood where fifty new houses will be built. The first items to go were the entrance walls of the estate, a once lovely feature. The entrance road is to be moved three metres west to facilitate the safer access/ exit of lorries, dumpers, diggers, machines etc. As line-of-sight on the Cork side was the aim, one wonders if a similar outcome could have been achieved with cutting back, perhaps, ten feet of of a row of trees and moving back, towards the estate, the entrance wall, Cork side? Already there has been disruption of residents' access and parking, the roads have been muddy and there has been an increase of noise at the street junction and at the building site. And we are at the very early stage. But the greatest concern is the increased risk of injury to all, but especially the elderly and the young. Thankfully there has been no accident or injury to date.

The residents would have preferred a smaller number of units built and site access from a side rather than through the estate. Despite several meetings with local councillors and T.D.s, and council officials none of the concerns raised by the residents were addressed. Indeed the number of units was increased. Council officials tried to negotiate a lateral entry to the site but failed in their attempts.

There is a housing crisis and people urgently need to be housed. However there is also a need to balance developments with the concerns of prior residents. Adding fifty houses to an estate of 76 houses - Oakwood has 58 residences and Oakwood Court 18 - is a lot, an increase of 65.7 %. Every person in need of accommodation should be housed as quickly, as well and as soon as possible.

The scandal of keeping people in Reception Centres for long periods is indefensible. According to one local observer, Oakwood was a difficult site twenty five years ago, and the 'new' building area is higher and rockier. Finally and coupled with the above is the issue of Macroom's unoccupied houses. In 2017 there were more than 200 in the town, many in the town centre. Compared to years ago the number of people and families living in the Square, Main Street, Railway View and Castle Street has dramatically fallen. Nonoccupation of town-centre premises invites dereliction, decay, and anti-social behaviour.

If the money for the Oakwood scheme could have been spent on renewing and reviving the town centre what a wonderful difference it would have made. It is arguable that more accommodation could have been provided more cheaply and more quickly while providing work to many local smallbuilders and tradesmen, and simultaneously facilitating integration of new residents to smaller communities. This not a new idea - it is called urban renewal.

All the above points were repeatedly put to our public representatives and council officials but alas in vain.

The result is that residents of Oakwood will have to 'grin and bear' the discomfort of the next few years and wait for the effects of fifty new families coming to the estate. Despite overlooking the residents' concerns and suggestions, the hope is that all will be well, that the new residents will fit in well and that Oakwood will continue to be a lovely place in which to live.

### **Cork County Council Construction Contracts** Signed for N22 Baile Bhuirne to Macroom

Cork County Council has signed contracts with two Irish firms, Jon Civil Engineering Ltd and John Cradock Ltd, for the construction of the longawaited Baile Bhuirne to Macroom Road Development, signalling the expected commencement of works before the end of the year. Contracts were signed today in the presence of An Tánaiste Simon Coveney TD and Minister Michael Creed TD.

With funding approved by Government last month and a total budget of €280m, the development is expected to take between three to four years to

The 22 km of new road commencing at the Cork side of Macroom at Coolcower, will bypass the town of Macroom, the villages of Baile Mhic Íre and Baile Bhuirne, the infamous 'Ballyvourney Bends', and will finish west of Baile Bhuirne before the County Bounds with Kerry.

The development is expected to bring a significant economic boost to the area during the construction phase and in the longer term reduce journey time in the region, improve access to rural areas and greatly enhance quality of life for people living in and around Macroom.

Mayor of the County of Cork Cllr. Christopher O'Sullivan welcomed the signing, saying, "This development has been in the pipeline for a number of years and we are delighted to see it progress to this stage. It will be a significant improvement in road safety and journey times on the N22 and

will enhance connectivity between Cork and Kerry. The N22 By-Pass will free towns and villages of congestion allowing them to grow and rejuvenate promising significant benefits for the people of Macroom, Baile Mhic Íre, Baile Bhuirne and surrounding areas."

Chief Executive of Cork County Council Tim Lucey commented, "Signing the N22 Macroom By Pass contract marks a significant step for the Cork Kerry region. Advancing such a major piece of strategic infrastructure to this point is a complex process and this is an extremely important development for the entire region. The construction phase will mean an economic boost locally and substantial social and economic benefits for the future. Preparatory works by engineers including ground investigations and archaeological excavations have been carried out and the route is primed for construction. Now that the construction contracts are signed, the commencement of this long awaited and critically important infrastructural scheme and the largest single investment by government in this region to date will soon begin." Chief Executive Officer of Transport Infrastructure Ireland Michael Nolan went

on to say "Today's contract signing highlights the importance of delivering on needed national road infrastructure improvements for both the Cork and Kerry regions.





### KILMURRY - 'CUNTAIS'/ACCOUNTS

#### Béalnabláth National School (1884-1968) and the Community it Served book launch

On Friday November 29th Kilmurry Independence Museum hosted a very successful book launch of the above.

The book deals principally with the National School while exploring the cultural, archaeological and historical backgrounds of the area. The book is very well laid out and includes articles on Béalnabláth in 1916, the Michael Collins Ambush, profiles of past pupils, local archaeological sites and sports clubs near Béalnabláth. There is also a large collection of photographs, including school groups taken between 1924 and 1968.

#### Junior A Hurling:

#### **U21A Hurling:**

In U21 A Hurling, with Blarney and Ballincollig playing in the Premier 1 grade, Inniscarra, Cloughduv and Aghabullogue in Premier 2 there was only 1 team in the Muskerry A competition, Eire Óg. To date they have not played their County Semi Final.

#### U21 B Hurling:

Four teams entered in this competition with Ballinora playing St Malachys in the final.

#### Mid Cork Championships

Ballinora proved too good on the day in a very close final. To date they have not played in the county competition. (Since defeated by Castlemartyr)

#### **Junior A Football:**

Our Junior A Football Championship is still the number one attraction with 15 teams entering the draw. This year, Aghinagh and Uibh Laoire reached the final, where they competed for ultimate honours in the superb venue in Macroom. In a disappointing final victory went to Iveleary, to the delight of their huge following. Under the new system both teams proceeded to the 16-team county championship. Aghinagh restored pride, losing narrowly in the first round to Boherbue but Iveleary suffered heartbreak again - losing the semi final to Kilshannig who went on to win the county.

#### Junior B Football:

#### **U21 B Football:**

Seven teams entered this competition and each team was guaranteed two matches. After some very close games Aghabullogue and Canovee got to the final with Aghabullogue coming out on top. In the county section they defeated Buttevant in the recent county semi final.

#### U21 C Football:

Five teams took part in this competition and each team were guaranteed two matches. Aghinagh and Iveleary reached the final which was postponed due to a serious injury crisis in Iveleary. Aghinagh went on to compete in the county section where they created history, beating Robert Emmet's in the County Final.





## **Club Development Works** (report of John Crean, Development Officer)

The following is the report of work undertaken by the clubs in Muskerry in 2019

As in previous years the clubs did lots of development in 2019. Listed below is some of the good work that has been completed to date.

Cill Na Martra development update: 'Fencing off and development of training area

underway on land recently purchased which will also combine as underage pitch'.

Inniscarra GAA: for 2019 continued with the development plan. We had the opportunity of leasing some property adjacent to our main club pitch and took this opportunity. We are in the process of developing this much need extra pitch for the 2020 season. A five year plan is in place and we are well on track to making the much need improvements in the club."

Macroom Development Report: Castle Grounds
- In April the Castle Grounds was vertidrained
and again in October. In May we bought a new
mover which has helped with the cutting of the
grass and improved the quality of the pitch.

Tom Creedon Park - In early January the construction of the third pitch in Tom Creedon Park was completed with drainage installed and slits put in with 60 tonnes of sand put out on it and seed sowed into it. We installed a lighting pole in pitch 3 with 4 new led lights. We installed

a lighting pole in pitch 3 with 4 new led lights. In September 2019 we replaced all 24 lights in pitch 2 with new LED's. We were allocated an Amenity grant €3,500 from the Macroom-Blarney Municipal District.

Clondrohid Development Report: Clondrohid GAA Club widened the entrance to the grounds, knocked the trees that aligned the laneway, laying a footpath and erecting fencing for a

cost of circa €58.000.

Eire Og 2019 Development: Éire Óg GAA Club has officially opened there new stand and playing facilities. Over recent years we embarked on an ambitious plan to provide facilities for the growing number of members at our club. The final piece of the jigsaw was the opening of our stand in June by Tracey Kennedy. Thank you to all those who contributed to the various fundraising activities over the years. This would not have been possible without your help. Also this year we carried out remedial works on our car park adjacent to the

western pitches and replaced the lights on our Astro and training pitches with LED lighting spending €40k on the two projects.

Aghabullogue 2019 Development: 2019 saw the Official opening of our New Astro All Weather Pitch in Coachford. Measuring approx 80x40 it has enhanced the existing facilities at our GAA grounds in Coachford in a massive way. It is the culmination of 4 Years planning. Funding and completion in late 2018.It is part one of a 3 phase development for the club over the next number of years. The facility was agreed as part of a wider consultation process in the parish and it is a tribute to the people who had the foresight and vision for such a project and indeed to a strong and determined group who have seen the project come to fruition. A big thank you to to Martin Corkery and Daniel Crowley who oversaw the development on our behalf, and to the club officers and committee who did the

hard yards as regards the fundraising. Also to our many fine patrons within the parish who supported this venture financially and to Munster Council, Cork County Council and Sports Capital funding to complete the facility that cost in excess of 350k. We give a big 'thank you' to Kelly Contractors Ballydesmond who completed the project in a timely manner.

We are grateful to Tracey Kennedy, Cathaoir leach Cork County Board for performing the official opening at a special ceremony early in 2019. We also thank Fr Peader Murphy for blessing the facility and to Board members from both Cork County Board and Bord

Mhuscrai who attended. A thank you to Michael Creed, Minister for Agriculture for speaking and to all our local representatives, whose endeavours to help with this project we really appreciate. We also appreciate the support of Pearse Murphy, Treasurer Munster GAA Council for his assistance.

This is a fine facility and is in constant use throughout the year. It is available for use by all clubs. During the year, we also repaired goal areas in both pitches and continue to enhance our playing areas for all patrons.

Venues: My thanks to all clubs who hosted our games during the year. Without your help, our championships could not run as smoothly as they do. Despite the huge amount of games that are now played, most clubs are always willing to accommodate this board. However a small minority of clubs never seem to be available to host games. This is hardly fair on the rest of the clubs as the concept of neutral grounds for championship matches is based on clubs agreeing to host. Also, my thanks to those

people who collect money at the gates, as this is not an easy or popular task.

Media: My thanks to all our local media who do so much work to promote our games locally, especially, Brendan Kenneally, Lee Valley Outlook, who also provides match reports for website, Aubert Twomey, Southern Star and County, Kevin Murphy and John O'Shea, Echo, and Michael Scanlon of C103, all of whom provide great coverage of Divisional activities. ## Noel Murphy, Macroom's Professional Boxer

Noel Murphy (25), Massytown, Macroom and New York, is a professional boxer. He is one of the few if not the only professional athlete to come from the town or parish. In 2014 he moved to New York and joined the paid ranks. Athletes and players such as Ciarán Ó Líonáird, Olive Lougnane, Colman Corrigan Fintan Goold, Noel O'Leary, Briege Corkery and Rena Buckley devoted enormous chunks of their lives to their disciplines but were amateurs. James Cronin, Ballincollig, the rugby prop forward has Annahala connections and is a professional with Munster and Ireland. Noel has a very important title eliminator on the 14th of December and this will take place in the world-renowned Madison Square Garden, New York. His preparations

are going well and a win will shoot him up the rankings and open many doors. Recently I spoke to this modest and grounded young man about his life and career. Because of the necessity to renew his visa he had to return home: that hitch is now resolved.

Noel currently lives with his parents Linda (Kirby) and Anthony, and younger brother Eric in Massytown. As normal he attended St. Joseph's N.S., St. Colman's Boys' National School and De La Salle (DLS) College in town. His uncles were very good soccer players. While always interested in sport - his mother first brought him to football when he was five - he says he was not particularly good: in fact he said 'hopeless' but this, of course, is over-stated but reflects his modesty. He enjoyed his time in school and has particularly happy memories of his years in DLS. When young he played football, hurling - briefly - and soccer and tried judo before finding boxing. His group at under-age included David Horgan, Patrick Horgan, Michael Cronin, Pa Lucey, Darren Kelly and John Murphy and, under the guidance of Francis Horgan their team reached a county U-16 football final, losing to a very good Douglas team. The same lads, more or less, played soccer and their team was also good and played a cup final in Turner's Cross. Noel was a tough corner and full back in football and soccer respectively.

Dylan Dinneen is Noel's first cousin, a classmate and a very good friend. Around 2010 Dylan was going to boxing training and asked Noel to come. From the beginning Noel loved the sport and he was a 'natural'. By that he means that he was entirely comfortable boxing, loved the contest, was able to move and could give and take punches. Quick movement, avoiding punches and a natural boxing 'brain' are among his best assets. At Macroom Boxing Club he met great people and he was lucky to come under the guidance of John Desmond, John Casey, Don O'Leary and Tom Power. His 'apprenticeship' began with training, progressing to sparing and when ready he had his first bout, a non-

judged contest. He clearly remembers the

fight, he did well and loved the atmosphere.

As time passed Noel's love and appetite for boxing increased. Training and bouts became harder. Nothing came easily to him, and he took his first title in 2011 when he won the Irish U-17 welterweight (under 70 Kilograms) championship. He followed this by winning the Irish intermediate welterweight championship in 2012. A boxing trip to New York changed all. While competing there he was spotted by Kevin Crowley, a Corkman resident in New York, a building contractor with an avid interest in boxing. Discussions took place but nothing transpired. Kevin was looking for an Irish fighter. Noel's parents insisted that he sit his Leaving certificate which he duly did and qualified to do a Recreation and Leisure course in the Cork Institute of Technology. Meantime he continued to box and to dream. Having passed his first year college examinations he received a phone-call from Kevin mid-summer and hot-footed to the

Like a benevolent father Kevin Crowley was extra-ordinarily helpful and arranged lodgings, a trainer, gym, and work. Noel's daily routine consisted of work on the building sites and training, with a big increase in intensity. Before fights work was dropped. The change from small-town Macroom to huge New York was hard and lonely. His accommodation was reasonable at the beginning, and later improved when he shared an apartment with three girls. His trainer Lucas was a decent man as were all his gym mates. Many were from Puerto Rico, Latin America and Mexico; they were great lads but they had difficulty understanding Noel's Macroom English and Noel's Spanish was modest. Noel came under the guidance of promoter Lou De Bella and he arranged Noel's first professional bout. Still only 21, Noel won it 'easily enough'. As more fights came the quality of his opponents increased. As he went he gathered support, mostly Irish, and sponsorship, essential elements in the boxing business. Noel's run of 12/0 fights - that is he won twelve and lost none - included a contest in the small but famed Times Square Boxing Arena. This run led to a match with Michel Lestierre who had a record of 18/0. Unfortunately Noel lost on a split decision and his opponent subsequently fought but lost a world title bout. Disappointed but not dismayed Noel regrouped and worked harder.

Although professional boxing is tough Noel is delighted with his choice of career. He has lived and experienced New York life, travelled to many parts of the U.S., has met great people and has earned decent money. He continues to live the dream while enjoying himself. And the big dream is to win a world title. In his experience the sport is straight and he is thankful that boxing is run so well in NY. Boxing there probably has the strictest protocols in the world with regard to safety regulations, sampling and especially oversight of medical fitness that includes full 'medicals', eye-sight testing and brain scans. Ireland's control of professional boxing is also of a very high standard. Gambling is illegal in New

While it is a truism in sport that the next fixture is very important, in Noel's case that maxim is correct. His next fight is in Madison Square Garden and his opponent is ranked well above him. To add salt to the fight, Noel knows his opponent and has sparred with him. If and, hopefully, when Noel wins his career will be transformed and it will put him up the rankings. His preparations have been excellent; he has trained exceptionally hard and intelligently, has had much sparring in Cork and Galway, and has been a model in dietary terms. Training well gives him confidence and great self-belief.

Talking to Noel was a pleasure and his enthusiasm, attitude, work-ethic and vision were a joy to hear. His heart and head are in the right place and with the support of his family and friends he is quietly confident of doing well. The Muskerry man Noel Murphy could well be about to light up 'The Garden' and give an extra boost to our Christmas cheer.



#### KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: GIFT VOUCHERS

Question: I usually get a gift woucher at Christmas. What are the new gift voucher rules that came in recently?

Answer: Gift vouchers are any voucher, coupon or other document (including an electronic document) that can be used instead of money to pay (or pay in part) for goods

Since 2 December 2019, the Consumer Protection (Gift Vouchers) Act 2019 sets out the following new rules for gift vouchers:

- · Gift vouchers must have no expiry date or be valid for at least 5 years.
- · Traders cannot specify that a gift voucher is spent in one transaction.
- · Traders cannot charge a fee to change the name on a gift voucher, (if you have to register a name on the voucher).
- . If the balance remaining on a gift voucher is more than €1 after you buy something with it, a trader must reimburse the balance to you. They can give you cash, make an electronic transfer or give you another gift voucher.

These new rules do not apply to:

- · Vouchers that you can only use to buy specified goods and services at a discounted price, from a specified trader on a specified date, or for a specified period of 3 months or less. For example, vouchers from deal websites such as Groupon or Pigsback.
- Vouchers issued as part of a customer loyalty or promotion scheme.
- Vouchers issued as a refund for goods you returned to a trader.
- · Vouchers and gift cards sold before 2 December 2019. The expiry period and the terms and conditions that applied at the time of purchase apply to these vouchers.

The new rules do not apply to electronic money gift cards (for example, One4all gift cards) which are already covered under the European Communities (Electronic Money)

## Fire Friends, Buddy Bears

Over 50 cuddly teddy bears are joining Cork County Council's Fire Service before Christmas and will be assigned a very important job. These bears will become part of the fire crew in each fire station in Cork and will ride on every frontline fire truck in Cork County. The 'Buddy Bears' will form an integral part of the Fire Service team and are there to help children that are involved in or witness to traumatic emergency situations. The job of all the Bears is primarily to reduce the suffering of children at incidents and to help children cope with the stresses that they feel from their involvement in a traumatic event.

When children are involved in emergency situations, it can be a very traumatic

experience for them. In order to soften the impact that a stressful emergency situation may have on our children, we have implemented this "Buddy Bear" initiative. This idea originated in Kilkenny Fire Service who have their Bears on the run on frontline fire trucks for many years and have told us that they are doing a great job.

It is hoped the Bears will help redirect the focus of the child away from the emergency situation as much as possible, to a comforting friend during the incident i.e. "Buddy Bear".

Hopefully emergency situations in which we need to utilise these bears will be few and far between, but we are pleased to be prepared to make a difference in the lives of our children during these difficult events with the help of our "Buddy Bear" friends.

Co-ordinating this initiative on behalf of Cork County Fire Service, Assistant Fire Officer Aaron Fahy has served in Cork County Council's Fire



Service for many years and brings great experience to this project. He is currently training the 50 Bears for this important job. Mr Fahy said: 'For the Bears to spring into action, a child may not necessarily need to be injured; it may be that the child is a witness to an incident that causes distress. It is often hard to predict how drivers, passengers and pedestrians will cope with being involved in road traffic collision or other emergency situation, and children may be particularly affected at these incidents. We want to do all that we can to alleviate the distress caused to children involved or witness to collisions on our roads or other traumatic even


