# Christmas Christian Greeting: Fr. Joe Rohan, P.P. Clondrohid.

"Christmas" or "Christ's Mass" is the name we give to the great Christian feast we celebrate on the 25th of December. The name is handed down to us over the centuries and is a form of "Cristemaesse" and "Cristesmesse" both of which were names used in the 11th and 12th centuries. On the 25th of December we gather in church to offer the Holy Eucharist (Mass) to God the Father in thanksgiving for the gift of his son the God-Man, Jesus, whose human birthday we celebrate on that day.

But can we celebrate it? "I hate Christmas"; "Christmas has lost it meaning for me";,"It's just one big occasion for the shops to make money" and "it's a very expensive time". It is a time of financial stress for many, it's trying to buy the right presents to keep everyone happy, it's having enough food and drink at home for the day; for many it's getting into debt, a debt they spend the rest of the year clearing. "It's a very lonely time for me", "Christmas makes me very depressed" and "how I wish Christmas was over". I'm sure that some or all of the above phrases and issues which are said and arise concerning the Christmas season are familiar to you; and from my experience as a priest one reason for thinking like this, though not necessarily the only one, is that the meaning of Christmas has been forgotten. One of the reasons for this is that the modern world has gotten rid of the true meaning of Christmas and replaced it with lights and tinsel, food and drink, money and presents, all of some importance in themselves, but which will never give meaning to people's lives, and certainly will never bring people real true and lasting happiness.

So what is Christmas about then? It is about JESUS. The God and Creator of the whole universe thinks that you are so so special as a person, he loves you 100%, he is crazy about you and he wants to show you this. There is no greater way for God to do this than to become a human being and join us on our journey of life. He was born as a baby like us. He lived on earth for 33 years in a human body, he suffered pain and cried tears as

we all do, he experienced loneliness and abandonment. At the end of his 33 years he died as you and I will, but that is not the end of the story. On Easter Day he rose from the dead and told us that for all who daily pray to him, believe in him and trust in him he will bring them to his heavenly home at the end of their journey. As they go from day to day, He will be with them in an invisible but very real way and He will, in a powerful way, come to them every time they receive Him in Holy Communion at Mass Holy Communion is Jesus under the form and appearance of bread and wine. Surely this person Jesus, the God -Man, who does all these things for us is worth celebrating. It is His human birthday we are remembering. Over my 28 years as a priest I've had the privilege of journeying with many people and families as they go from day to day through life. All those who have coped with tragedy, illness, disaster, loneliness and hassle are those who have had a belief and a trust in Jesus Christ. I have seen the power of Jesus Christ working in people's lives in amazing ways in my priesthood. This is why Christmas is important to me. Not for the money, the presents, the drink, the food, decorations etc. but to celebrate the gift from the Father of his Son, the God- Man, Jesus.

And so my friends let us pray to Jesus. Let us trust in Jesus. Let Jesus be your number one no matter what the issue or how big the problem may be we have the best helper possible with us 24/7 Jesus Christ – "Come to me all you who labour and are overburdened and I will give you rest". No matter how I am feeling this Christmas let me always remember that "Jesus is the reason for the season".

I wish all readers the constant companionship of Jesus Christ everyday of the year. I also pray for the companionship of Jesus to be always with your loved ones who may be far away from home at this time. May He whose human birthday we celebrate give to you and your loved ones, all whatever it is you need each day to cope with day to day living and may our constant daily prayer be "Jesus I trust in you".







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# Reeling in the Years - 1969

The World in 1969: Pic 67. If a week is a long time in politics, 1969 was a very significant year in the twentieth century. Richard Nixon was installed as the 37th president of the U.S. The Vietnam conflict dominated international news and there was outrage as the widespread bombing of North Vietnam continued. Henry Kissinger, U.S. Foreign Secretary, held fruitless secret talks with Viet Cong representatives. Lieutenant William Calley was charged with the premeditated murder of 109 civilians at Mai Lai, Vietnam thanks to horrific photographs. On July 14th Neil Armstrong became the first human to walk on the moon. President De Valera sent a congratulatory telegram to Nixon. Russian and Chinese forces exchanged border fire. Honduras fought El Salvador in a 'Football War' sparked by a World Cup qualifying game. Dr. Denton Cooley implanted the first temporary artificial heart. A police raid on The Stonewall Inn, an LBGT venue, led to rioting and this resistance is credited with starting the LGBT rights movement. Edward/ Ted Kennedy admitted fleeing Chappaquiddick when Mary Jo Kopechne died in an accident. 'Robert R', an American teenager died in St Louis of a baffling illness. It was 1984 before the HIV/ AIDS virus was established as the cause of death.

Nearer home De Gaulle lost power and Willy Brandt became Chancellor of West Germany. Concorde had its maiden flight and the Boeing 747 jumbo jet made its first passenger flight. Gadafi led a coup in Libya and nationalized the banks. In the UK the halfpenny ceased to be legal tender. Violence erupted in Northern Ireland and it was international news. Butch Cassidy and The Sundance Kid (starring Paul Newman and Robert Redford) was released as was Midnight

Cowboy (John Voight) – the latter was X-rated. The Beatles Abbey Road was released in September and was followed by the Rolling Stones' Let it Bleed album in December. John Lennon and Yoko Ono had a 'bed-in' Montreal in May-June on the theme of 'Give peace a chance'. Elvis Presley recorded In the Ghetto and Suspicious Minds. Despite the seriousness, importance and fame of the above events another item probably

had more significance. On October 29th a first message was transmitted over ARPANET, the forerunner of the internet. On November 21st an ARPANET link was established and it was the progenitor of global Internet.

All this happened just fifty years ago and when the writer was sixteen. Fifty years before that again, in 1919, Ireland was involved in the War of Independence and all of Ireland was still part of the U.K. C. Kelleher


Ireland in 1969: While decimalisation was introduced on lan 1st it was the escalating Northern Troubles that dominated Irish news. On Jan 4th Loyalists attacked a People's Democracy march at Burntollet. Terence O'Neill won an election in the North in February but resigned in April. Jack Lynch won the General Election in June but trouble was brewing in Fianna Fáil. Bernadette Devlin was elected an MP. She was quoted as saying "Security forces called me a stupid 'b. . . .'; I objected to being called stupid". As rioting continued in Belfast and Derry, Lynch made his 'the Irish government can no longer stand by' television speech. He ordered the Irish Army to make contingency plans - Exercise Armageddon – to enter into the North to defend Catholic communities if necessary. The B-Specials began handing in their guns. British troops were first deployed on Aug. 16th and were at first welcomed by some nationalists. Peace walls were erected. The Hunt Commission recommended an unarmed police force and the disbandment of the B-Special. In Dec. the IRA split into the Provisionals and the Officials

Other news included the withdrawing of the farthing, halfpenny and half crown coins from circulation. Charles Haughey, Minister of Finance, introduced tax exemptions for artists' earnings from works of cultural merit. RTE broadcast the Moon-landing and extended the transmission past midnight. President De Valera sent President Nixon a congratulatory telegram. A date was set for the full implementation of the 1967 policy of free secondary education. Fianna Fáil paid tribute to Sean Lemass for forty-five years in public life. Samuel Beckett was awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature. The Thin Lizzy rock band was formed in Dublin, Kerry won the Sam Maguire and Kilkenny brought home the Liam McCarthy Cup.



M O'Leary and Sons were appointed to erect flower beds at the gates. The committee wrote to An Taisce with a view to retaining the Castle Tower and purchasing the Castle Lodge from the Castle Demesne, to be used as a public convenience.

# Rolling In the Years -

#### The World in 1999:

The Euro currency was launched on Jan 1st in Ireland and most EU countries. Britain and Denmark opted out. Tony Blair was British Prime Minister. The China News Service announced internet restrictions on the 20th of Jan.. President Clinton was acquitted in impeachment proceedings in the U.S Senate. Rawandan Hutu rebels killed and dismembered tourists in Uganda. Picard and Jones become the first to circumnavigate the Earth in a hot air balloon. The war in Yugoslavia continues; Yugoslav authorities closed the border with Albania. In June the hostilities ceased when NATO and Yugoslavia signed a peace treaty and NATO stopped bombing Yugoslavia when Milosevic withdrew troops from Kosovo. Scotland and Wales had their Parliaments restored. Napster, a music downloading service, debuted. John F. Kennedy Jnr., his wife Carolyn and her sister died in a plane crash. Europe and Asia witnessed a total solar eclipse. An earthquake in Athens killed 143 people, injured about 12,000 and left 50,000 homeless. Australia rejected a referendum proposing an Australian Republic. Macau reverted to Chinese control from Portugal after


442 years. Yeltsin resigned as Russian President, leaving Putin as acting President. Glenn Hoddle was dismissed as England manager because of controversial remarks. Chelsea paid £10 million for Chris Sutton

Those who died included King Hussein (Jordan), Dusty Springfield, Stanley Kubrick, Dirk Bogarde, Yehudi Menuhin, Joe Di Maggio, Oliver Reed, Alf Ramsay and Frankie Vaughan.

New English words/phrases were 'blog', 'carbon footprint', 'texting' and 'vape'.

#### Ireland in 1999:

Bertie Ahern was Taoiseach, Mary Harney Tánaiste and Mary McAleese was President. The government was working ferociously and fruitfully on the Peace Process. It ratified changes to Articles 2 and 3 of the constitution and Westminster direct rule in Northern Ireland ceased. Peter Mandelson became Secretary of State for Northern Ireland. The George Mitchell Peace Bridge opened across the border. The Euro became legal tender in Ireland. Britain opted out of the Euro project. RTE broadcast Mary Rafferty's 'States of Fear' was broadcast and it revealed the extent of institutional abuse in Ireland. The Taoiseach apologised on behalf of the state and set up a Commission of Inquiry into Child Abuse. The FAI refused to travel to play Yugoslavia and was fined €2,000 by UEFA for not fulfilling the fixture. There was a multi-sided civil war in (the former) Yugoslavia at the time. The war saw concentration camps and mass genocidal massacres reappeared in civilized Europe for the first time since WW2. Gay Byrne hosted his last Late Late Show on May 21st. A week before he had interviewed Terry Keane when she spoke of her relationship with Charles Haughey. Pat Kenny became the programme's new host in September. Former Taoiseach Jack Lynch, aged 82, died and

President McAleese led the tributes. Des O'Malley gave the graveside oration. In November the first North/South Ministerial Council took place. Inez McCormick became the first woman President of the Irish Congress of Trade Unions.


Robbie Williams played to 80,000 fans in Slane. Westlife had five number ones in the UK Singles Chart. RTE screened 'Bob the Builder' for the first time and TV3 'Ireland AM'. Sergio Garcia won the Irish Open Golf Championship, St Patrick's Athletic the League of Ireland. Cork beat Kilkenny in the All-Ireland senior Hurling Final but lost to Meath in the senior Football Final. Ireland was disappointingly eliminated by Argentina in the Fourth Rugby World Cup.

Those who died included Jack Lynch, Dónal McCann (actor), Iris Murdoch (novelist), Lord Killanin (ex chairman Internatinal Olymoic Committee), Victor Bewley (cafe owner), Fred Tiedt (Olymic boxing silver medallist), Raonid Murray, victim of an unsolved murder and Josef Locke (singer).

#### Macroom in 1999

Macroom UDC Chairman Pat O'Connell ushered in the New Year by reminding people that 1999 was the centenary year for Local Government in Ireland. Later Michael Creed (Codrum), Dónal Moynihan and Frank Metcalf were elected to Cork County Council. Martin Coughlan just lost out but topped the poll in the UDC election and became Chairman in July. Others elected to the UDC were Evelyn McSweeney, Pat O'Connell, Breda Cullinane-McCarthy, Michael O'Riordan, Denis Buckley, Ted Lucey, Owen McCarthy and Paul Kingston.

Highlight of the year for Macroom was Geraldine O'Grady's selection as Rose of Tralee - a first, and a feat that will be difficult to emulate. She was well supported, especially by her parents, Garda Pat and Maureen, her sisters, and the Gardaí before, during and after the Festival, and she was honoured with two civic receptions. When she visited St. Mary's, her alma mater, in November she was given a rousing reception. Principal Jim O'Leary spoke of Geraldine and her school accomplishments but especially her attitude and kind disposition. Geraldine in turn expressed her gratitude to the teachers for her treatment and the quality of her education.

# Geraldine O' Grady, 1999 Rose of Tralee, Recalls and Reflects

It doesn't feel like twenty years since I stood on stage in the dome and was announced as the 1999 Rose of Tralee. When my name was called out, I was frozen in a dumbfounded daze. The host, Marty Whelan, explained to the crowd that I was in 'complete and utter shock'. The wonderful Gay Byrne, who was Chairperson of the judging panel, came to my rescue. He gently took me by the arm and guided me forward, directing me to wave at the cheering crowd. Amid the celebrations that night, my mother Maureen remembers me asking 'is this real?' She answered 'I don't know!'

It all began when the Macroom Gardaí asked me to represent them in the local heat of the Rose of Tralee. My father, Pat, was a Garda in Macroom at the time and I happened to be the right age at the right time. I took some convincing but ultimately you can't really say no to the Gardaí! Over the course of the next year, I had experiences that I could never have dreamed of as a 22 yearold recent college graduate. My homecoming in Macroom just a week after my win is one of the stand-out moments of that extraordinary year. 5,000 people lined the streets where I grew up to welcome me home with a fantastic celebration. I recognised so many people in that sea of faces and I was overwhelmed with gratitude for such amazing support. That night I wore a hooded cloak which had been made especially for me to represent my home town at the Rose of Tralee Festival.

Another major highlight of my Rose of Tralee experience was my trip to Jordan with the Irish Heart Foundation. The trip was a walking tour of the country to raise money for the Foundation. One evening, after a long day's trek, I lay floating in the Dead Sea under the setting sun, watching the lights of Jerusalem twinkling on the horizon. I am profoundly grateful for the twists of fate that brought me to that unforgettable moment in time.

 $One of the oddest \, moments \, of the \, year \, took \, place$ in an airport in Belgium. I travelled to Brussels to attend the Belgian Rose selection but neglected to bring my passport under the very much mistaken impression that it was unnecessary. To my horror, I was escorted to a border control section at the back of the airport. The agent I spoke to was very nice but baffled about my complete lack of any identification whatsoever. He asked me if I could produce anything at all with my name and photograph on it. I didn't have a single thing....except a copy of the CD I had recorded for the Irish Heart Foundation. I sheepishly produced the CD and pointed to my name and photograph. Fortunately the agent was highly amused and insisted on playing the

song over the sound system. Listening to my song being played over the sound system in the border control section of Brussels airport remains one of the most surreal moments of my life! Luckily for me, the agent let me continue on my journey once my passport was faxed through from home.

The wonderful thing about the Rose of Tralee is that the journey doesn't quite end when you hand the title to your successor. I still very much feel like a part of the Rose of Tralee network. The former Roses of Tralee stay closely connected with a WhatsApp group and annual reunions. They are a fantastically supportive and fabulous group of women and I'm so proud to call them my friends.

A month after I handed back my title in 2000, I met a very talented and charming musician and songwriter called Martin at a comedy show. We had a great conversation about music and went on to set up a band together. We also realised we had more in common than just music and





It was a special night for all of us and I'm sure that the memories will be just as vivid and powerful in another twenty years.



# A REFUGEE REPORTS; NADIA RASHDAN'S STORY

(NADIA RASHDAN IS SYRIAN AND A RESIDENT OF RIVERSIDE, GURTEENROE MACROOM AND A NIGHT PUPIL OF MCEGAN COLLEGE).

My name is Nadia. I came to Ireland with my children, and my husband joined us three months later. We are a Syrian family who survived the bad conflict back home. We lost our home and when my brother was arrested for four years we didn't hear anything about him - he left behind his young wife and three lovely kids. We left Syria for the UAE and lived there for some years. Unfortunately we had to leave UAE as we lost our jobs and became ineligible to stay there anymore. Luckily we got a visit visa to Ireland and decided to stay here because we cannot go back to Syria as it is still an unsafe place to live in for the whole family. The conflict in Syria erupted in the wake of massive popular demonstrations in 2011, has, according to the UN, been marked by unparalleled suffering, destruction and disregard for human life. My whole town, like most of the Syrian cities, was bombed and destroyed. Over 0.5 million people including children have been killed and about 5.6 million people have fled Syria since 2011, seeking safety in Lebanon, Turkey, Jordan and in countries all over the world. Millions more are displaced inside Syria and, as war continues, hope is fading fast.

Now thank God we are here in the safest place in the world. This is our fifth month here in Macroom and gratefully things are settling more. I'm going to tell you about our experience here so far. Getting here was quite an adventure, everything here is completely different. We came to a small town where one can tell that we are strangers because everybody knows each other. Fortunately, here people stand out for their charming character, as they gave a genuine and proud welcome to the new residents, making everything easier for us than we had expected.

It was a surprise to us that we were moving here. We received a

letter at almost midnight that we are going to be

moved early next morning, to not only a different area but to a town in a totally different county. We were all shocked ... where are we going? How will we have enough time to prepare? Will we be able to continue our procedures from there? Yet, we had no other choice but to pack all out things and prepare for what comes next. And we found out that Macroom's community was also surprised at our sudden arrival; we saw them passing the hotel and staring and pointing confusedly - what is happening there? The next day we arrived at Macroom, the town seemed rather small and very quiet, the hotel was empty as we were one of the first families to arrive, it was a total change to the city traffic we had seen in Dublin. In a few days, more families started coming to the hotel and we began getting to know Macroom more. Yet, the next day, as we walked around exploring this little town people would pass by and greet us with smiles on their faces. It gave us a little hope. However, it was quite tiring to walk to the town centre as it took time and we didn't realise it was so far from the hotel. We were discouraged at the


thought of having to walk this distance every time we needed to go to town for anything. As for the hotel, most of us were satisfied because we had bigger rooms than the ones we had back in Dublin; and as well the food here was much better. The only problem was that there were no washing machines available for us, but after two weeks we were provided with

and dryers which made us a bit relieved. Before coming to Macroom most of the families had stayed in Dublin for months and were not able to integrate easily; but here in Macroom it was a different and a promising story. Macroom introduced itself to us as it welcomed us to joining its community. People began coming and offering us help, especially Macroom Friends of Asylum Seekers who provided all the residents with many things as needed! Then we were visited by Macroom soccer club coaches who were very keen to register all the children interested in soccer. This made the kids incredibly happy and helped them blend in and socialize and do what they're passionate about. As well as that, all the school principals where kind enough to come here personally to the hotel and helped register all our kids in their school. The children really enjoy and love the schools in Macroom. We adults were also lucky as we got the chance to join The Adult Education Centre and McEgan College to take a variety of different courses.



They tried, and are still trying to help us in every way possible to facilitate our stay.




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




## **GAA HISTORY, A FEW SNIPPETS**

Report of founding first meeting of Macroom GAA Club in 19 May 1885 (C Kelleher)


Michael Cusack Maurice Davin and others founded the GAA in Thurles on 1st November 1884. Its principal focus in its early years was athletics and control thereof. Within ten days the first athletics meeting under the GAA's auspices took place on 11th November 1884, and it took place in Toames, Kilmichael. It is likely that preparations were in train before the GAA was formally founded. Macroom had a train service since 1866 and railway

lines allowed easier transport and facilitated the development and spread of sport in the second half of the nineteenth century. Toames is about five miles from Macroom. Macroom GAA Club held its first meeting on 19th May 1885, within seven months of the founding of the GAA. The meeting was held in the Literary Rooms. Unfortunately I haven't yet established where these rooms were.


On a recent visit to the National Library, I came

across some interesting photos. Cusack supplied genius, passion and even madness that sparked the GAA. He was born to Irish-speaking parents in Clare during the famine and became a teacher. He was an avid cricketer, rugby player and athlete and had taught in some elite schools. As well he was a gifted journalist. Somewhere on the road to Damascus, so to speak, he was converted to Irish culture. Cleverly he used the English format of codification of games to create, with Davin, the equivalent games of Gaelic football and hurling. Sure, hurling or a type of hurling had been around since the time of Cú Chullain, for centuries but that was only remotely related to the game codified by Cusack and Davin. However Cusack had his faults and poor attention to detail led to his undoing. He also fought with his friends as easily as his enemies. Once he received a conciliatory letter from a one-time friend and now an adversary and his reply was 'I received your letter this morning and burned it'. He founded the Dublin Metropolitan Hurling Club in Dec 1885 and claimed that all clubs originated from it.

Also included are sketches of early advertisements promoting footballs and hurleys. The hurley looks suspiciously like a hockey stick and similar sticks were used by the Trinity Hurley Club. Edward Carson, the Unionist Leader 1908-1920 attended Trinity and was a proficient hurley player. The football looks decidedly oval. Hurley, because it was based in Trinity, then a predominantly Protestant/ Unionist college, threw in its lot with the English Hockey Union. Dagg in 'Hockey in Ireland' gives a very interesting description of the origins and development of hockey, hurley and hurling and their later divergence.

The 2019 season in Mid Cork saw three teams retaining their championship title, Iveleary in Junior A Football, Cloughduv in Junior A Hurling and Gleann na Laoi in Junior C Football. The success of Iveleary was not as surprise, the feat of Cloughduv was, as this was the club's second team, their top team having won divisional and county honours the previous year. Gleann na Laoi had been allowed remain in the C championship, their request to the Board having been acceded to.

In the county championships, Iveleary were defeated at the semi final stage by Kilshannig, the eventual county champions. This was a disappointing outcome for a fine group of players and hopefully they will follow the example of Cloughduv and persevere in their quest for county honours. Football championship runners up Aghinagh were beaten in the quarter final of the county but restored pride in the club with a fine performance against Boherbue. In Junior Hurling, Cloughduv and Éire Óg came up against strong East Cork opposition and both fell at the first hurdle, as did Inniscarra in the B Football Co. championship. A strong Aghabullogue Junior B hurling team went on to take the county title and the success of the Aghinagh U21 footballers in the C County championship, and the manner in which it was achieved, will give that club great encouragement for the future. Éire Óg Premier Intermediate footballers won promotion to senior ranks with a great championship campaign and all rejoiced to see Daniel Goulding lead his club to a long desired destination. Cloughduv had a great intermediate hurling campaign, only defeated by a strong Blackrock side in the final and winning the Div 5 Hurling league in their first season back up in intermediate ranks. Cill na Martra footballers distinguished themselves in the top senior football league, reaching the final after many fine victories.

Ballincollig in U21 A football, Aghabullogue in U21 B Football, Éire Óg in U21 A Hurling are still in contention for county championship honours. The MJK Oils Junior Hurling championship produced a surprise with Cloughduv retaining their crown despite now fielding their second team. In the opening round, Cloughduv were too strong for Iveleary, likewise Éire Óg for Donoughmore and Blarney for Ballincollig, while Inniscarra edged out Ballinora by two points. Kilmichael then eliminated

Donoughmore from the competition in the second round, and got a bye to the semi final stage, Ballinora did the same to Iveleary. In the quarter finals, Cloughduv edged out Ballinora in a tight finish, 2-15 to 1-16, Inniscarra beat Blarney 4-12 to 0-13 and Éire Óg had a point to spare over Ballincollig. In the semi finals, Cloughduv had a two point win, 2-10 to 1-11, win over Inniscarra, the latter missing many scoring opportunities. Éire Óg saw off the challenge of Kilmichael and were back in a Mid Cork final for the first time since 1977, the year their first choice team won the Muskerry and county titles. The final was played under LIGHTS, before a big mid week crowd in Macroom, and was a close if uninspiring affair with Cloughduv causing a mild surprise in getting the better of their neighbours. Con Dunne's second half goal was crucial in a 1-12 to 0-12 win, Jack Kelleher was Man Of the Match and once again Eoin Lyons was in sharp form for Éire Óg from frees.

In Football, champions Iveleary were drawn against Kilmurry in the first round and were beaten by two points, having given their arch rivals a 1-3 to nil early start. Canovee and Inniscarra had big wins over Naomh Abán and Donoughmore respectively, while Éire Óg, Kilmichael, Ballincollig and Béal Átha'n Ghaorthaidh were victors over Cill na Martra, Clondrohid, Dripsey and Blarney and Aghinagh got a bye to Round 2. Here Aghinagh got the better of Cill na Martra, Iveleary were too strong for N Abán, Clondrohid beat Donoughmore and Blarney beat Dripsey, all four losing teams exiting the competition. There were three third round game, Éire Óg beat Beál Átha with a late rally, Iveleary were too strong for Kilmichael and Aghinagh pipped Clondrohid by a point with an injury time goal giving them passage to the quarter final and a meeting with Kilmurry. In the quarter finals, Aghinagh put in a superb performance to see off the Kilmurry challenge by two points, Ballincollig got over a strong Éire Óg side, Canovee defeated Inniscarra, both by two point margins also, and Iveleary showed they were returning to top form with a big win over

Og side, Canovee defeated Inniscarra, both by two point margins also, and Iveleary showed they were returning to top form with a big win over Blarney. In their semi final, Iveleary put in a powerful second half display to see off Canovee on a 3-10 to 0-10 scoreline and Aghinagh continued their giant killing performances with a 1-14 to 0-13 win over Ballincollig in the second semi final. The final drew a huge Sunday afternoon crowd to the Castle Grounds in Macroom but Iveleary, appearing in their fifth successive final, simply demolished Aghinagh, yet to win this championship after three previous final appearances, being totally dominant in the opening quarter after which they led by 1-6 to 0-1 and they never lost their grip subsequently and ran out 2-21 to 1-10 winners at the end. Brian Cronin was chosen as Man Of the Match having contributed 1-6 from play and the team display was almost flawless.

The Macroom Motors Under 21 Football championships were run off in Springtime as usual. Seven teams contested the A grade and it quickly became evident that some teams were not in the correct grade. Ballincollig, Kilmurry and Éire Óg were first round winners, Inniscarra then beat Béal Átha and Cill na Martra beat N Abán but then were beaten themselves by Éire Óg in the lone quarter final. In the semi finals, Ballincollig beat Kilmurry, the beaten county finalists of the previous year, it took extra time for Éire Óg to shake off the Inniscarra challenge and the neighbours met in the final. Éire Óg won on a 3-12 to 1-14 scoreline and thus added to their only previous success of 2011. Both teams went out into the county, met at the semi final stage and this time, eight months later, victory went to Ballincollig who are now awaiting for opponents to qualify in the county final.

In the U21 B football, seven teams contestred, Aghabullogue, Ballinora,

#### KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: PATIENT ADVOCACY SERVICE

Question: I was in hospital recently and I was not happy with my experience there. When I complained to the nurse in charge I wasn't satisfied with the response. How can I take my complaint further?

Answer: The Health Service Executive (HSE) has a complaints system, called Your service your say, that you can use to make a complaint about your experience of a service provided by the HSE or on behalf of the HSE.

If you want to make a complaint about a public hospital to the HSE, you can get support from the new Patient Advocacy Service to help you make your complaint. The Patient Advocacy Service is fully independent of the HSE. It is a free and confidential service that provides information and support to people who want to make a formal complaint about an experience they have had in a public acute hospital.

The Patient Advocacy Service provides support by phone helpline, on 0818 293003, and on its website, patientadvocacyservice.ie, where you can find information and a contact form. The service can explain how to make a formal complaint, including what you should include in your complaint and how to write it.

If there is a delay with the processing of the complaint or if you are not satisfied with the outcome, the Patient Advocacy Service can give you information about your options.



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
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#### MEMORIALS & REMEMBRANCE




