

The LOO wishes a Happy and Healthy New Year to all our readers

'Health' is the easier to define and means an absence of sickness, a sense of well-being and an ability to both function day-to-day and within the wider community. 'Happiness' is a more difficult state to categorize. For people at different stages it means different things; the baby,child needs security, approval and love; the teenager wants that and more – peer approval looms large. Later successful college/training and relationships dominate and for young adults the hurdle of home-ownerships is formidable. Healthy and happy children who will become good people is the next phase in parents' quest for contentment; an ability to meet adversity along the way is often needed. Death and disability sometimes rear their heads and one marvels at the ability, and resilience, to cope of those so afflicted. One thinks of the bereaved, especially families who have suffered premature loss. Most families and communities support superbly.

'Happiness' for Macroom and the Lee Valley will mean seeing progress in the Bypass, the restoration of the Briery Gap, the renovation of Macroom Community Hospital and the provision of decent homes, social and affordable, for those who need them. Renovation and use of existing buildings should be considered. On a voluntary level the paradox of generosity is that the givers often benefit more than the receivers. Macroom's decency to our new residents in Riverside Park is an example of that. Local voluntary work is another. Most if not all clubs and organisations could do with more help.

Finally while much good is happening there is more to do. We need a Day-Care Centre for the Elderly, a new building for De La Salle College, a Heritage Centre/Museum in the town and the development of The Gearagh for ecological and tourism reasons. Socially we need to address issues like alcohol and drug-abuse, and anti-social behaviour. Modern life is no doubt difficult and complex but with good community spirit many issue can be tackled and improved.

It will be interesting to review progress at the start of 2021.

Macroom Tidy Towns Update

Many people associate Tidy Towns activities with litter picking and planting flowers during the spring

and summer but Tidy Towns work has now broadened and is a year-round commitment. To gain marks in the national competition it is necessary to score highly under all eight judging categories. Last year's detailed report was copied and hand-delivered to 1,450 houses and businesses around town in November to inform people of the judges' comments, both positive and negative, and to raise awareness. The Macroom Tidy Towns Facebook page has been the main means of communication throughout the year.

In the last four months of 2018 we were joined by extra volunteers from the ranks of the asylum-seekers who came to the Riverside Park hotel. These helped out in litter picking, planting flower bulbs, in erecting the Christmas lights and in distributing the newsletters.

The Fairy Garden has been one of the highlights again in 2018 with various new additions all over the park. A new shed was officially opened by Patrick Bergin. In the autumn, an updated brochure was produced and distributed all over town by the new volunteers from Riverside Park. Copies are available in the Town Hall, Macroom.

Community involvement continues to grow with schools' activities relating to Green Flags etc. being taken into account. Other groups like Foróige have also become involved. The Men's Shed has been a great support for Tidy Towns in many different ways.

The biodiversity area continues to take on added significance. In 2018 a swift Tower, 5 metres tall with 28 nesting sites was erected in the Mart property close to Lidl. This project was undertaken in conjunction with IRD, Duhallow. This has a bird caller installed which is solar powered and will be used to attract the swifts to use these nesting sites. There are swifts already frequenting this general area every summer, while they return like the swallows to the warmer climates for the winter.

Another developing area is the focus on maintaining the natural habitats; each of the green areas in estates etc. are being encouraged to retain an area for biodiversity. This could be an area where heretofore grass was being cut, but there was no real need for this time and expense, when a natural environment could offer more in the line of biodiversity. The biodiversity garden in the Fairy garden will be enhanced with the upgrading of signage and the addition of some semi-mature fruit trees being sponsored by McEgan College. Almost 200 trees and shrubs were planted along the riverside at the rear entrance to the Fairy Garden. In this area also work has commenced on a

sensory garden with support from a significant sponsor and works will be ongoing here in 2020.

The painting of houses and business premises was very noticeable last year on the main thorough-fare, and the Council is commended for their support. This makes a noticeable difference and the new murals add significantly.

One of the difficulties that the Tidy Towns faces is that so much of the desired works are outside of their control and places that need upgrading are owned by business people and private individuals.

Another difficulty is the continued reduction of council staff. This is gone below acceptable levels and there is a growing dependence on Tidy Towns volunteers to carry out essential work on the streets, thus limiting the potential for further enhancement of the town in other ways.

Sustainability is another category that is judged is.... 'doing more with less'. This focuses on reduction first, (energy, water etc.), then reuse - there are quite a number of 2nd-hand shops now in Macroom, then maybe recycle as the 3rd option.

The Tidy Towns major project for 2020 is the completion of a storage shed and to have a base in town from where to operate. The site, at the corner of Coolehane Road and Masseytown Road has been cleared and levelled. Planning permission has been obtained and work has commenced on putting in the base. This will be the central meeting point and will store the tools and equipment and help free up some of the organisers on Saturday mornings. It will help on wet days when work can be carried out indoors on painting equipment, repairs etc. It is adjacent to the Men's Shed and to the Fairy Garden and really is something to look forward to. Over the years Tidy Towns has had more access to council facilities and yards for storage etc. But with Irish Water now and changing council practices this facility is very limited.

The future looks bright for Macroom Tidy Towns Committee and the volunteer numbers were never as big; so it is a very positive start to 2020.

Dr Clióna Murphy, Macroom: GP and Businesswoman



DR CLIÓNA MURPHY FROM MACROOM, GP AND BUSINESSWOMAN

While recently reading The Sunday Business Post I noticed an article about a Macroom person and the person in question was Dr Clióna Murphy, The Square. The piece was about her new health product. RSVP magazine had previously carried a feature on her new venture. Her company is called "ivitamins LTD' Supplements with a Purpose". Last October (2019)Clióna launched 'Cholestero-Low' onto the market. It contains three ingredients - oat beta-glucan, inulin and coenzyme q10 - that act singly and in combination to reduce our Total and 'bad' cholesterol (LDL - low density

lipoprotein) and thereby reduce the risk of heart and blood vessel disease and pre-mature death. Heart attacks, strokes and limb-loss are the most dramatic expressions of these. Cardio-vascular (heart and blood vessel) deaths remain top of the causes of deaths in Ireland.

The Murphy family has had a pharmacy in Macroom since 1925, for more than ninety years. Like her siblings Henry, Sinéad and Eimear, Clióna served in the shop. Her sister Sinéad is also a doctor and Henry and Eimear are pharmacists. Clióna qualified in medicine in NUIG (National University Ireland Galway) and did her General Practice Training in UCC. Dr John Sheehan, the current Lord Mayor of Cork, was one of her trainers. Always anxious to expand her knowledge, she has added Masters in Bio Innovation and Public Health from NUIG as well as Diplomas in Geriatric Medicine and Forensic Medicine to her academic portfolio.

To survive and prosper in small-town business the art of listening and talking to people is essential. Perhaps this is the most valuable lesson Clióna learned when serving in her parents' shop and she absorbed as she watched Matt and Christine engage with customers. This art stood her in good stead for her career in medicine where 'attentive listening' is perhaps the guintessential virtue. While attending her patients, Clióna noticed an increasing interest in the concept of living healthily and well. This involves exercise, a healthy diet and mindfulness. Recently added to this formula is the idea of 'food as medicine' and food supplements. Doctors are justifiably sceptical about many of the touted virtues of supplements and are aware of their potential pitfalls. During her time studying Public Health Clióna researched the topic of supplements in great depth and discovered that many sold are ineffective and can even sometimes cause harm. However there are some scientifically validated and medically proven agents that are effective and beneficial in cholesterol-lowering. It is items from this range that feature in her product. Public Health knowledge demands an

expertise in statistics and rigorous assessment of scientific papers, and she has put this skill to good use in her research. Clióna grew up on the Main Street/The Square and the street was the local children playground. Together with her sibling, the Grahams (Castle Bar), Maureen Burke (AIB), the O'Learys (Tom and Phil's and Jerry and Sheila's) and others they played 'hop scotch', 'tip the can', chasing etc. It was in The Square that she and Caitríona Graham learned to cycle.

At St. Joseph's Primary and St Mary's Secondary contemporaries included Lynda Hurley, Clare Kinston, Chrissie Dervin, Helena Vaughan, Michelle Sweeney, Marie O'Mahony and Cathy Vaughan. Outside of class Clióna enjoyed basketball, badminton and waterskiing in Carrig Water-ski Club. Lynda captained a St. Mary's basketball side that ran up an All-Ireland final and that was very exciting. An outstanding memory was going to Lourdes with Cathy as helpers and this created a strong bond as a result. Having skipped Transition Year, Aisling Buckley (Raleigh), Eliz Cronin (Glen Park) and Emer Horgan (Gurteenroe) became friends and shared the on-going innocent 'shenanigans' of the time. Now yoga, paddle boarding and water sports are her interests. She also follows the Munster Rugby team and is concerned at their current form. She has many friends in town; however many more are well dispersed and she now lives away.

When developing her idea Clióna brought all her experiences together; her family background in the 'chemist' business, her training as a doctor and GP, and her further education in Business and Public Health. However that was only the background. As well as conceiving the idea she had to satisfy herself on the efficacy and safety of her agents, source reputable manufactures to formulate pleasant products and all the while she was working. Further aspects involve financing, distribution and marketing. To date Clióna is self-financing and unfortunately fell between stools in looking for start-up state aid. For marketing she uses a very young Galway company – a group of smart young lads who decided to skip college and set up in business. Their photographer is just eighteen years old.

Advertising is done mostly by short online videos on Facebook (@ cholesterolow); sales are also done online. All in all it makes the company very modern indeed. A further feature of the marketing is that Clióna is the 'face' of the products. She modestly says this is to save money but her image adds authenticity and authority to the product. As time passes Clióna feels less uncomfortable in front of the camera and recently she had great fun preparing her products in the kitchen. The resultant videos will appear soon.

So far business is going well and Cholestero-Low is sold in 48 pharmacies and is available in Macroom.

Some customers have returned and related how effective her product is, with one man saying his Total

Cholesterol dropped from 7.8 to 5.8 (m. mols) in two months and another going from 6.7 to 5.7 in one month, a great improvement {Under 5 is the target for Total Cholesterol}. Clióna plans to gather evidence as she proceeds.

Short term her business goal is to further establish and expand the sales of Cholestero-Low. After that she hopes to develop and bring to market further health products, all the while ensuring that they are safe, effective and reasonably priced. Medium term her plan is to wait and see how her first venture goes and take it from there. In the Chinese tradition long term is a long ways away and so it is 'parked' for the moment.

As per medical ethics and the Hippocratic Oath, summed up in the Latin phrase – 'primum non nocere' – that can be roughly translated as 'first do no harm', Clióna is very conscious of her responsibility, and her reputation and good-standing as a doctor. She deserves great credit for developing a reputable, effective and safe product and making it available. Hopefully her reward will be business success and personal satisfaction that she will have helped further in the fight against disease, disability and death.

She has been courageous in taking on this project, and thoughtful, diligent and thorough in developing it.

She is another Macrompian doing well and making a difference. We 'Wish her Well' in her endeavours.

Cork County Council Construction Contracts Signed for N22 Baile Bhuirne to Macroom

Cork County Council has signed contracts with two Irish firms, Jon Civil Engineering Ltd and John Cradock Ltd, for the construction of the longawaited Baile Bhuirne to Macroom Road Development, signalling the expected commencement of works before the end of the year. Contracts were signed today in the presence of An Tánaiste Simon Coveney TD and Minister Michael Creed TD.

With funding approved by Government last month and a total budget of \in 280m, the development is expected to take between three to four years to complete.

The 22 km of new road commencing at the Cork side of Macroom at Coolcower, will bypass the town of Macroom, the villages of Baile Mhic Íre and Baile Bhuirne, the infamous 'Ballyvourney Bends', and will finish west of Baile Bhuirne before the County Bounds with Kerry.

The development is expected to bring a significant economic boost to the area during the construction phase and in the longer term reduce journey time in the region, improve access to rural areas and greatly enhance quality of life for people living in and around Macroom.

Chief Executive of Cork County Council Tim Lucey commented, "Signing the N22 Macroom By Pass contract marks a significant step for the Cork Kerry region. Advancing such a major piece of strategic infrastructure to this point is a complex process and this is an extremely important development for the entire region. The construction phase will mean an economic boost locally and substantial social and economic benefits for the future. Preparatory works by engineers including ground investigations and archaeological excavations have been carried out and the route is primed for construction. Now that the construction contracts are signed, the commencement of this long awaited and critically important infrastructural scheme and the largest single investment by government in this region to date will soon begin."



The renowned priest, scholar and author was born in the townland of Liscarrigane, in the parish of Clondrohid & Carriganima, and he spent his formative years there. The locality had a profound impact on his work. An tAthair Peadar, was a strong advocate of vernacular Irish - the language of the people. His most beloved works include Séadna and Mo Scéal Féin. These stories, among other works, are much loved by students and scholars of Irish to this day. Following his clerical formation in St Patrick's College, Maynooth, An tAthair Peadar, served as a priest in the Diocese of Cloyne, and was acurate in Macroom. He died in Castlelyons in 1922, and he is buried there. An tAthair Peadar is widely regarded as one of the founders of modern Irish literature.

The centenary commemoration will begin with a music session, in Carriganima, on Friday evening. All are welcome, especially impromptu musicians, singers, dancers and storytellers. On Saturday, there will be a guided tour to sites associated with An tAthair Peadar and his family. These include Carrignacurra Castle (Inchigelagh), Carraig na Madraí and other significant heritage sites. Booking for the tour will be essential. Cuireadh chun Ceoil started at the end of the seventies, and at that time Peadar used to travel from his home in Cúil





The annual Seán Ó Riada Gold Medal competition was established by Peadar Ó Riada in 2010 and has now become an integral part of the programme. The instrument changes each year, and this year flute and whistle players will be competing in the final in February for the coveted medal and €2500 prize money.



Kilmurry – 'Cuntais'/Accounts IRA Attack on Kilmurry RIC Barracks Jan. 1920

Dr Borgonovo's Lecture on IRA Attack on Kilmurry RIC Barracks in January 1920. Kilmurry Historical and Archaeological Association (KHAA) continued with its series of winter lectures on Thursday 10th of January. Dr John Borgonovo, senior lecturer in UCC's History Department and an acknowledged expert on the War of Independence, delivered a superb presentation. He has several books published on the period.

Dr Borgonovo outlined the context of the period and the immediate circumstances. He made the points that 1919 had been relatively quiet and that the IRA had few arms and little ammunition. Dublin, Cork and Belfast were the major centres of republican activity and influence spread from these foci. Cork was especially active in this regard and Macroom was an important rural centre. After Sinn Féin's spectacular 1918 election victory and the anti-conscription campaign the numbers of IRA activists soared, from about 1,000 to 12,000 in county Cork. Exercise and drilling continued but IRA leaders like Florrie O'Donoghue thought it would be difficult to maintain interest and cohesion in the force without action. Cork had three brigades, and Kilmurry and Macroom were in the Mid-Cork one. Initially their requests for action were refused by GHQ but towards the end of 1919the brigades were eventually and reluctantly given permission to go ahead with attacks. Thereafter many of the actions were decided, planned and executed locally. Three attacks on Royal Irish Constabulary barracks in county Cork were scheduled for 3rd January 1920 and the premises selected were Carrigtwohill, Ballygarvan and Kilmurry. The Carrigtwohill action was a great success and yielded many much-needed guns and ammunition. The Ballygarvan assault was called off and later those responsible were stood down from officer positions. The attack on Kilmurry barracks was executed by the Macroom battalion under Daniel Corkery. Many were involved in the attack - perhaps as many as twenty on the actual assault with many more in the back-up. However the raiding party was unable to breach the target and had to retire after an hour of engagement. The proximity of British troops in Ballincollig a short distance away confirmed the wisdom of that decision. The event made national and international headlines and the organisation and co-ordination of the attacks were especially acknowledged.

Although the Kilmurry attack failed in its objective it had a number of incalculable benefits. It raised the morale and confidence of the volunteers and the people. It demoralised the RIC. Shortly after the RIC abandoned their smaller country barracks in the area for bigger centres and left large swathes of the country without the 'eyes or ears' of the RIC on the IRA and its activities. Many RIC members resented this change and felt let down by the London government. Overall it accelerated the rate, already high, of resignations from the force. The British government saw the need for reinforcements and led to the introduction of first the Black and Tans and later the Auxiliaries. Dr Borgonovo brilliantly explained the nuances and details of the attack, its context and consequences and its importance in the broader scheme of things. He and Niall Murray, the Master of Ceremonies, answered many questions from a full and enthusiastic audience. KHAA Independence museum is a wonderful venue and together with the superb quality of the lecture provided a very informative and enjoyable night.



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Answer: On 12 November, a new offence of dangerously overtaking a pedal cyclist was introduced.

The Road Traffic (Traffic and Parking) (Amendment) Regulations 2019 builds on existing laws by specifically penalising the dangerous overtaking of cyclists. Previously, the law

made no distinction between cyclists and other road users.

Drivers who overtake a cyclist in a dangerous way can now be fined a fixed charge of €120 and will also get 3 penalty points on their licence.

There are recommended safe distances for overtaking cyclists. On roads where the speed limit is less than 50 km/h, drivers should leave 1 metre distance between the car and the bicycle and on roads where the speed limit is over 50 km/h, drivers should leave 1.5 metres.

The Road Safety Authority will put up road signs to indicate the recommended safe distances for overtaking cyclists. If you think you have been overtaken dangerously by a driver, you can contact the Garda Traffic Watch Lo-call number 1890 205 805.



Limerick were to score after 15 seconds but Cork had the better of those early stages with some quick kicks into their forwards. Once Limerick were able to slow Cork's supply of ball, those chances began to dwindle while Neville showed what he can bring to Limerick having taken a year out last year. In the Co-Op Superstores Munster SHL final at Limerick, the 2018 All-Ireland champions had 15 points to spare at the end, having dominated Cork totally in that second half.

Cork's second-half decline was "difficult to judge", said Rebel boss Kieran Kingston: "They took the game away from us, our intensity fell away with ten or 15 minutes to go. We haven't watched it or discussed it yet but if that's because we felt the game was going from us, that's not really good enough."

The 5,295 in attendance saw Cork hit five points in the first five minutes, with Conor Lehane impressing, but it was 1-3 to 0-5 on 11 minutes.

Cork restarted with a Lehane free but then Limerick simply took over. Their half-backs shut Cork down and further up the field they dominated, spreading the ball at will. At one stage Limerick hit seven points in a row,

later they hit six on the spin, and the game was over as a contest long before the final whistle..

Kingston was taking the positives from the Munster League while pondering the impact of the Fitzgibbon Cup on his NHL plans: "We didn't have the ability to introduce more senior players but that's the purpose of this competition – to give game-time to the senior players, some of whom haven't hurled since July, and some of the younger lads, to give them hurling at this level and it has worked well from that point of view. "We've 21 players away with the Fitzgibbon so we'll have to do without them for a while."






