

Cork area. A very moving account from a father of a girl who lost her life in a traffic accident some years ago brought the audience to tears.





### January 1972 - Bloody Sunday and MACROOM'S PROTEST MARCH: A MEMORY

Memories of Bloody Sunday, January 30, 1972 and the Macroom March: It was during the evening of Sunday January 30, 1972 when news of the dreadful events in Derry filtered through via TV and radio, the only means of mass communication in those days. In Macroom we were totally dependent on Telefís Éireann and Radio Éireann for any news from distant places. A feeling of total shock, horror and disbelief spread throughout the whole country and Macroom, a small town in county Cork, many miles from The Troubles, was no exception. Mixed feelings of raging anger towards Britain and impotent helplessness at the inadequacy of our response were typical of our reaction.

was a student at UCC at the time and used to commute to Cork during the week. On Monday (January 31), on arrival at UCC, there was a tumult of anger and rage among the student body. A protest march was hastily organised by student leaders and a large number of people, students and lecturers alike, poured into Cork city centre to vent their anger. The numbers were swelled by hundreds of Cork citizens who wished to vent their anger at the senseless savagery of the previous day.

For the most part the crowd was noisy but well-behaved. Two memories stand out. One, somebody climbed up on top of a phone box and addressed the crowd. The tone of his speech was that something urgent, and possibly violent, needed to be done to show the "Brits" that they would not be allowed get away with blatant murder. Second, the crowd made its way to the docks where a cargo ship with a Union Jack flag was boarded, the flag removed and, subsequently,

set alight much to the appreciation of the accompanying crowd. Thankfully no one was hurt or manhandled during this episode. Later the crowd dispersed peacefully but the overwhelming feelings of grief, anger, disbelief and the sense of helplessness remained. On the following Sunday (February 4) a protest march was arranged for Macroom. It was well attended by people from all backgrounds, young and old alike. Somebody had made a mock black painted coffin in memory of those who had died in the massacre and this was paraded at the front of the march. The parade culminated in the Square and several fiery speeches were made by local politicians. One even suggested that people should head to the North immediately in solidarity with our nationalist brothers and sisters. An effort was made to burn a symbolic Union Jack on the steps of the Town Hall. However no Union flag was available so the organisers improvised by tying together three handkerchiefs - coloured red, white and blue - to represent the Union Jack. This was doused in petrol and set alight. However due to the pouring rain the "flag" failed to ignite (a somewhat farcical end to a very dignified protest!). This episode brought home to people like us, who were quite far removed from the conflict in Northern Ireland, the grim awfulness of the violence, discrimination, injustice, sectarianism, gerrymandering which was the daily reality of the ordinary decent nationalist community of that benighted province.

It would seem that The Three Romeos and Jen Company have come up with an excellent business idea and model. We wish them every success with their venture. We also thanks the students, SNAs, teachers and parents for their support. On Tuesday 21 st of January, the Leaving Cert Physics class, attended a Laboratory Practical

Physics Workshop, The Science for Life Programme in Cork Institute of Technology. This programme is offered only to students of its linked schools of which McEgan is lucky to be a member. Students got the opportunity to carry out seven experiments on the leaving cert. course in one of the specialist laboratories available at CIT. They got the opportunity to use equipment not available in school laboratories, and which furthers their understanding of the experiments involved. Other Science initiatives available to students at McEgan through our linked schools programme include a Science Camp for First Years which takes place in May each year.

Second year students then have the opportunity annually to attend a joint camp - 'The Experience of a CIT & UCC Camp'. This is a two day camp that is held in June when students get to spend a day at each of the colleges. These opportunities give the students

a chance at an early stage to sow the seeds of thought for third level education. Outside of Science McEgan is provided with many other great opportunities through our linked schools. All 5th year students travelled to CIT on the 21st to carry out a study skills workshop in the college. Four workshops were held in total which consisted of: 1. Why Study, 2. Nutrition and Study, 3. Study Strategies, and 4. Assistive Technology. Every student returned to school armed with a pack of materials to get them kick started on their new study regime.

Paired Reading: This is a reading initiative which Bishop McEgan ran through our Junior Cycle School Programme (JCSP). Ten of our second-year students are working as part of a cross-age paired reading programme where they act as the tutors to primary school pupils in Clondrohid N.S. Paired reading is an ideal way of improving reading skills among young children. Paired Reading can also be used to build oral skills so that reluctant readers can work toward reading in front of a large group.



### Cork County Council Construction Contracts Signed for N22 Baile Bhuirne to Macroom

Cork County Council has signed contracts with two Irish firms, Jon Civil Engineering Ltd and John Cradock Ltd, for the construction of the longawaited Baile Bhuirne to Macroom Road Development, signalling the expected commencement of works before the end of the year. Contracts were signed today in the presence of An Tánaiste Simon Coveney TD and Minister Michael Creed TD.

With funding approved by Government last month and a total budget of €280m, the development is expected to take between three to four years to

The 22 km of new road commencing at the Cork side of Macroom at Coolcower, will bypass the town of Macroom, the villages of Baile Mhic Íre and Baile Bhuirne, the infamous 'Ballyvourney Bends', and will finish west of Baile Bhuirne before the County Bounds with Kerry.

The development is expected to bring a significant economic boost to the area during the construction phase and in the longer term reduce journey time in the region, improve access to rural areas and greatly enhance quality of life for people living in and around Macroom.

Mayor of the County of Cork Cllr. Christopher O'Sullivan welcomed the signing, saying, "This development has been in the pipeline for a number of years and we are delighted to see it progress to this stage. It will be a significant improvement in road safety and journey times on the N22 and

will enhance connectivity between Cork and Kerry. The N22 By-Pass will free towns and villages of congestion allowing them to grow and rejuvenate promising significant benefits for the people of Macroom, Baile Mhic Íre, Baile Bhuirne and surrounding areas."

Chief Executive of Cork County Council Tim Lucey commented, "Signing the N22 Macroom By Pass contract marks a significant step for the Cork Kerry region. Advancing such a major piece of strategic infrastructure to this point is a complex process and this is an extremely important development for the entire region. The construction phase will mean an economic boost locally and substantial social and economic benefits for the future. Preparatory works by engineers including ground investigations and archaeological excavations have been carried out and the route is primed for construction. Now that the construction contracts are signed, the commencement of this long awaited and critically important infrastructural scheme and the largest single investment by government in this region to date will soon begin." Chief Executive Officer of Transport Infrastructure Ireland Michael Nolan went

on to say "Today's contract signing highlights the importance of delivering on needed national road infrastructure improvements for both the Cork and Kerry regions.

## Macroom GAA History Maker - Jimmy O'Donoghue (1943 - ).

Jimmy was the elder son of Jeremiah (Muddy) O'Donoghue and Josie (neé McCarthy), the first of three children. He was born on 4 June 1943 and he first lived in Sleaveen Road. His sister Eileen was next in the family and Danny was the youngest - born in 1953. Jeremiah was employed for many years in O'Brien's Mill, Macroom. Jimmy thinks his O'Donoghue forebears may have come from Glenflesk, Co Kerry: his mother was from Ballyvourney. Neither of his parents played sport.

Like most Macroom town boys Jimmy attended the Convent of Mercy and St. Colman's Boys' National School; he left school at fourteen. He was taught by, among others, Brothers Leander and Ferdinand. His classmates included Tim Golden, Murty Kelleher, Michael Twomey, Joe Downey and Colman McSweeney. Jimmy was always a good footballer and won School Shield, juvenile and minor Mid-Cork medals with Macroom. Jimmy's first job was as a Post Office messenger boy; later he became a postman and 'doubled' as a cleaner there.

He continued to develop as a footballer. Although modest of stature Jimmy was a tough classy footballer who read the game well and was almost always in the right place at the right time. Inter-firm GAA competitions were very strong in Cork in the late 1950-60 period and as The Post Office did not have a local team Jimmy played with the ESB. He did well and one of their mentors, a Bantry man, brought Jimmy to the notice of the Cork minor selectors. Jimmy made the team and that 1961 side became the first Cork minor team to win an All-Ireland minor football title, a team that included six from Coláiste Críost Rí. Thereby Jimmy became the first Macroom man to win an All-Ireland minor medal. When the All-Ireland cup came to Macroom Jimmy was ferried from school to school by Jerry Lucey, Railway View and the Palace Cinema, and the young footballers idolised the sporting hero – I know, as I was one - standing on the shed displaying the gleaming All-Ireland silver cup. Jimmy doesn't remember much about the final but how easily Cork beat Mayo – the final score 3-7 to 0-5. Other team members included Flor Hayes, Clonakilty, Frank Cogan, and Dónal Barrett, Nemo, Denis

Philpott, St. Finbarr's and Tommy Burke, Millstreet.

Subsequently Jimmy played for Cork U-21s in 1963 and was a substitute when Cork beat Kerry in Clonakilty in 1964 in a Munster final. In the following years Jimmy played with Cork juniors - one game was against Cavan in an All-Ireland semi-final in Breffni Park, Cavan and he also played some senior challenges with Cork against Down and Wexford. Perhaps Jimmy's finest year as a footballer was 1962. That year Macroom beat Muskerry in the senior county final, the last time Macroom won that competition. Jimmy was wing-back and played well in the final. He recalls the raucous reception when the team paraded the Cup to the square. That team was laced with exceptional footballers. Mickie Dunphy was excellent in goal, and brothers Jimmy and Timmy O'Callaghan and Dan Murray formed an incredible full-back line. Mick Goold and 'Gunner' were superb in the half line while Eric Ryan and Pat O'Sullivan were fine footballers at midfield. The brilliant Niall Fitzgerald was centre forward and Hugo Casey captained the team with force and guile from full-forward. Joe O'Brien and Eoin Lynch were speedy and effective wingers and John 'Farmer' Murphy and Richie Graham were sharp and tough corner forwards. All were good footballers and well able to take care of themselves. Because it

was a local derby, it was a tough game Muskerry had many good footballers including the late Dinny O'Mahony and Dáithí McSweeney who had won a county medal with Macroom in 1958. Nine of that Macroom team played senior inter-county matches with Cork.

A second senior county medal came Jimmy's way when Muskerry won their only county in 1970. Jimmy had by then transferred to Canovee and made the Muskerry panel. In one game in that campaign, Jimmy marked 'Gunner' O'Leary who was playing club football with Douglas and the two Macroom men were direct opponents when Muskerry met Seandun in an early ro Jimmy and Br. Leander with the All-Ireland minor cup in St. Colman's BNS in

Jimmy had serious health issues, exacerbated by his wife Rosie's illness and early death. When he was left to care for six children, Jimmy and his family suffered. However he overcame his problems and found happiness again. He was greatly aided when introduced to Pitch and Putt and quickly became a scratch player. He played in Macroom when the Macroom Pitch and Putt club was active and is now a member of Kilmichael club. He continues to win prizes regularly. Only six of Macroom's victorious 1962 team are still alive: Mickie Dunphy, Dan Murray, Tim 'Gunner' O'Leary, Richie Graham, Eoin Lynch and Jimmy. Only Richie and Jimmy live in Macroom. James Kelleher, Mickie Dunne and Tony Dromey of the panel also live locally. Jimmy holds a unique place in the history of Macroom football; he is the only Macroom player to win an All-Ireland minor medal and senior county medal when playing with the club. Well done Jimmy.

I spoke to Jimmy several times in 2019 and finally on 21 January 2020. He was reluctant to tell his story and I'm glad he did, and his cooperation is very much appreciated.

#### **KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: PAYE INCOME TAX RATES 2020**

Question: I'm a PAYE worker. What income tax will I pay in 2020?

Answer: The amount of tax that you have to pay depends on your personal circumstances. Tax is charged as a percentage of your income. The amount that you actually pay depends on your income and on the tax credits and reliefs that you are eligible for.

The first part of your income, up to a certain amount, is taxed at 20%. This is known as the standard rate of tax and the amount that it applies to is the standard rate tax band.

If you have income above the standard rate tax band, it is taxed at the higher rate of tax, which is 40% (also called the marginal rate). The amount that you can earn before you start to pay the higher rate of tax is your standard rate cut-off point.

There were no changes to tax rates and bands in 2020. The standard rate of tax is 20% and the higher rate is 40%.

# Macroom Judo Club History 1975-2000, Part 1

This article was facilitated especially by several interviews with Ted Leahy, Coachford, and by Liam Fitzgerald, Farnanes and Donal O'Callaghan, Lissarda.

#### Introduction

Judo is a modern sport that arose from the ashes of the Japanese Samurai tradition. After a struggle it spread through Japan, then to other countries including the United States of America and Great Britain. Irish emigrants to Britain of the 1950s sampled judo and some brought it back to Ireland. Because of its closer ties with Britain, Belfast was Ireland's earliest centre for judo and Belfast judoists were very helpful when Dublin clubs were establishing themselves. The advent of television and coverage of World Cups and the Olympics opened Irish people's sporting horizons; often they liked what they saw and wanted to try for themselves. In Ireland Judo was such a sport. This article outlines how a Japanese sport came to Macroom in 1975 and continues to flourish.

Macroom Judo Club was founded in 1975. The idea came from Donal O'Callaghan (D 0'C), his cousin Dónal O'Leary (D 0'L), Kilnamartyra and Liam Fitzgerald. The club was part of Macroom Youth Club. 1 Donal O'Callaghan had practiced judo in Dublin and Limerick and Dónal O'Leary, a brown belt, and Liam Fitzgerald were Cork City Judo Club members. During his travels Donal O'Callaghan had met fantastic exponents when in Dublin, Limerick and Cork. In Dublin Pat Hickey, recently President of the Irish Olympic Council, was one of his trainers. Later John Curtin, a Kerryman, was a member of the Samurai Judo Club in Cork and became a fifth Dan Black Belt. He was an extraordinary man and bonded well with the Macroom members. As well as his interest in judo he was fascinated by Asian countries and culture, and particularly Japan. Donal O'Callaghan imbibed this influence and has been to Japan many times. Added to this background was the influence of Donal's father, Denis, a shoemaker in Main Street, wise and widely-read who had a keen interest in geography and foreign places

Liam Fitzgerald's influences were different. After sitting his Leaving Certificate in 1969 Liam went to work in the Aer Lingus office in Patrick Street, Cork and stayed in the city. 'Chesty' as a child he was not able to run easily and did not feel strong or robust. He saw an advertisement for judo classes and enrolled. He also shared a flat with Donal O'Callaghan in York Street for a while, and it was dingy. The rent was £3-10s-0d each a week, they had no central heating and a fellow renting on the same floor had first preference for using the cooker in the evening. 2 Judo was strange to Cork and Liam recalled being interviewed by Donna O'Sullivan (RTE) for Cork About, a

local radio show. Liam enjoyed judo and helped bring it to Macroom. The Donals and he gathered group fellow enthusiasts such as Margaret Cullinane, Peter Leahy,


Deasy and others, discussed their proposal with Macroom Youth Club committee and organised a meeting. The foundation meeting took place in March 1975 and the first AGM was on 19th September. Donal O'Callaghan was the first chairman and Margaret the first secretary. The club continues.3

The 1970s saw Macroom becoming more open to new ideas and new sports. Donagh O'Malley's 'free' second level education initiative in 1967 enabled easier access to secondary education.4 Increased travel and media exposure, especially television, broadened peoples' horizons. 5

Television coverage of the Olympic Games ignited an interest in 'unusual' sports such as gymnastics, volleyball, weight-lifting, diving etc. Irish audiences found these 'new' sports exotic and exciting and some wanted to try them. The Macroom Mountain Dew Festival, Ireland's first open-air rock festival, was initially held in 1976; Macroom Youth Club/judo club members such as Donal and John O'Callaghan and Paudie Murphy were centrally involved. 6 New ideas, new projects and new sports were on Macroom's agenda.

#### The History of Judo (means gentle way).

Jigoro Kano (1860-1938) is the founder of judo (1882). 7 Judo is a form of martial arts that had its origin in Japan. From the twelfth to the nineteenth century Japan was ruled by the samurai, a caste of professional soldiers. They developed jujitsu different styles emerged - to fight enemies at close quarters. Samurai control of Japan ended with the Meiji Restoration of 1868 and

western influences increased. Jujitsu and martial arts went into decline and became unfashionable. Kano effectively rescued jujitsu and his story is interesting. Kano was clever but small and was bullied at school. His remedy was to find, after much searching, a master of jujitsu and he learned his martial arts skills. At twenty one he founded his own school, taking the best of what he had learned and he added mental strength and thoughtfulness - do means 'way, road or path' - to jujitsu technique and thus judo (ju do) was born. According to Kano 't(T)he spirit of judo which has as its ideal, world peace, concurs with international peace, . . . . . 8 For him judo was 'competitive exercise'. Central to his judo philosophy were maximum efficiency, minimum effort and mutual welfare and benefit. 9 He believed that these ideals would lead to self-improvement and a better society. Kano was educated and outward-looking and was aware of the Ancient Greece tradition of sport and the ancient Olympics. The founding ideals

of the Olympic movement chimed with his, and in 1909 he became the first Japanese member of the International Olympic Committee. Kano travelled to Europe and the US to spread judo. Barton-Wright first brought Japenese martial arts to Britain in 1899 and Koizumo opened Europe's and Britain's first dojo, the Bodokwai, in 1918. 10 The European Judo Union was formed in 1948 and a year later the International Judo Federation was founded, and although not alive to witness it, Kano's dream was realised when men's judo was first accepted as an Olympic sport at the 1964 Tokyo Olympics. In 2019 184 countries were affiliated to the International Judo Federation, including Ireland.11

#### **Judo in Ireland**

According to the Irish Judo Association's website 'the story of Irish judo began in 1952'. Liam Brennan, Tommy O'Hara and Frank Collinge had returned from England, having done some judo there.12 They decided to continue judo and set up a dojo, a judo area, in an attic at the rear of 12 Infirmary Road, Dublin. Christy Fagan was twelve and tried to join; he was told to return when he was fourteen and had a long pants. They used a twelve by fifteen foot square carpet - the modern judo mat is eight metres square with a three metre safety area, and it needs a space of 121 square metres. The attic room was twenty metres square. Eventually a bigger building was secured. Judo was already established in Northern Ireland and The British Judo Association was very helpful through coaching and grading. In 1963 the Judo Association of Ireland was founded and became the Irish Judo Association. Jerry Nevin, Belfast, was the first black belt in Ireland and helped greatly in grading in Dublin. (Only brown and black belts can grade at lower levels). 13 Judo often does not get the recognition it perhaps merits either nationally or locally. Rouse's Sport and

Ireland A History is a very comprehensive sports book and covers many sports, their founding, evolution and developments, and their background histories. Unfortunately judo is not mentioned. Despite many attempts, including contacting the national office, very little information is available on the subsequent progress of Judo in Ireland and a history, academic or otherwise, is badly needed.

#### **Judo in Macroom**

Three judo belt-holders, Dónal O'Leary, Donal O'Callaghan and Liam Fitzgerald were the three original instigators and they organised a meeting for March 1975. Donal O'Callaghan became the first chairman, Margartet Cullinane secretary and Dónal O'Leary coach. Initial

committee members were Liam Fitzgerald, Gerry Connors (sic), Sean Buckley and Peter Leahy. The first Annual General Meeting was on 19 September 1975 and the following were elected: Dónal O'Callaghan, chairman, Margaret Cullinane, secretary, and Dónal O'Leary as coach.15 Selected for the committee were Norma Deasy, Liam Fitzgerald, Sean Buckley, Mary Moloney, Gerard O'Callaghan and Donal O'Leary. Later Peter Leahy and Gerry Connors (sic) were co-opted. The chairman said a judo mat was ordered and classes were to begin

immediately.16 Membership was equally open to men and women, adults and children and from all areas. Membership, classes, getting a proper mat and fundraising were the club's chief activities in the first year. The mat was priced at £500. The strategy to collect money was 1) to put the case to the Youth Club committee and 2) to "'educate" the people of Macroom'. 17 The Youth Club parent committee gave £250 but the balance had to be fundraised. Money was collected through town-business sponsorship, a Silver Circle draw and a bowling tournament organised by Masseytown Bowling Club. The first grading took place in November; of eight women Margaret Buckley and Margaret Cullinane were awarded orange belts. Of twenty four men only Maurice Cullen and Gerard O'Callaghan were granted orange belts. 18 The club continued to grow and training proceeded; nine committee meetings were held from October to 1 January 1976, with membership, classes and the mat dominating the agenda. From the beginning everyone was welcome. Members were mostly young and came from all walks of life.

In contrast to the GAA there was no interclub rivalry - there was no other local club. The sport was personal and individual, the aim was to achieve personal progress and development but in a club ambience. Contact with other clubs was always friendly and supportive, and great friendships with outside club members developed. Much difficulty was endured in obtaining the mat and it consumed a lot of time and energy. The mat's quality, binding and 'securing' were the main problems. Moving it caused damage and repairs cost money. Meetings, classes continued and Macroom staged the Cork County championships in February 1976. Good judogis (judo outfits) became available at a reasonable cost.

#### **World Record**

In August 1976 six club members set a judo world endurance record of ninety hours; the six were Donal O'Callaghan, Noel Lehane, Sean Buckley, Gerard O'Callaghan, Johnny Sheehy and Peter Leahy. The feat drew widespread admiration and publicity. Donal O'Callaghan outlined some practical difficulties encountered. When they began training for the attempt the world record stood at forty-six (46) hours. Shortly before the actual attempt word came through that an English club had pushed the record to more than ninety hours. The attempt was to take place in the Castle Ballroom and over a weekend. Dances had been scheduled

# Former TG4 journalist Grett O'Connor is running a series of Oral Irish Masterclasses designed for Leaving Cert students who are studying higher level Irish.


