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
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
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EDITORIAL

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Macroom: Sayings, Sean-phochaill and Droverds: their origin?

1. Macroom, the town that never reared a fool. 2. Is iad na bailte is gallda in Éireann na Daingean Uí Cúis is Máchromtha. (The most foreign {= Anglicised) towns in Ireland are Dingle and Macroom).

When telling non - Macrompians where we are from we are often greeted with 'Ah, the town that never reared a fool'. As a Macrompian I would like to think that the first quotation is true and the second is not. Perhaps I would be foolish if not a fool to fully accept the first and not recognize some truth in the second. Recently I was trying to find both the proper versions and their origins and although I did not find the answers, the search did yield some revelations. I would be very grateful if someone out there had further information on their source and explanation and shared their knowledge. The following are some of the items that came to

While sayings, saws, 'sean-fhocail', proverbs, and clichés can be trite they often distil a truth or an aspect of the truth, or express an idea succinctly. Their origin and provenance are often interesting. "Daft as a brush" is one such. There is no absolute explanation for this but one offered is that a fox's tail is also called a 'brush' and is soft. In the North of England 'soft' was another word for 'mad' or 'daft' and so led to the expression. The "real McCoy" is another well known phrase and denotes 'the genuine article'. In the nineteenth century a MacKay family in Scotland produced a whisky and promoted it as the real 'MacKay' meaning that their version was the original and the best. The family may have come from Reay and that may have been corrupted in time to 'real'. Later 'MacKay' became 'McCoy'. Another explanation relates to a lubricating machine that was invented by Elijah McCoy and was much superior to any copy that followed; hence the 'real McCoy'.

'A woman needs a man like a fish needs a bicycle'

was coined by Irina Dunn in 1970, a famous American educator and feminist. She modified a previous saying that "God needed man like a fish needs a bicycle" was the previous proverb and Dunn produced a memorable and lasting spoof: it drew much support from the feminists. Men may or may not like it but there is more than a grain of truth there.

Seanfhochail - literally meaning 'old words' have a very strong tradition in the Irish language. UCD holds the National Folklore Collection and within that is The Schools' Collection. The latter was gathered and recorded from school children, getting information from their parents, grandparents and neighbours all over the country in the 1930s. It has about 740,000 pages. Children were asked to bring old stories, folklore, customs and traditions to school for the purpose of recording. The children then wrote their findings and these records are now digitized and available on the internet. Many seanfhochail were recorded. "Is maith an t-anlann an t-ocras' means hunger is a good sauce, 'Ní thagann de'n driseóg ach smear' can be translated as only the berry comes from the briar, meaning further 'that that is all you can expect'. 'The apple doesn't fall far from the tree' has the same meaning. 'Níl aon tinteán mar do thinteán féin' is rendered there is no hearth (or home) like your own, a refrain often expressed by emigrants in the U.S., Britain and many other places. Incidentally Seán Ó Cróinín, Casement St., and father of Proinsias/Frank, Eibhlís, Dónal, Micheál and Fr. Seán, was a distinguished folklore collector in 1950-1960s.

Macroom/the Lee Valley is home to many of us and brings us back to the sayings quoted above. Distinguished historian, North Square man Professor John A. Murphy, U.C.C. College Historian and Professor Emeritus of History in U.C.C has a slight variation 'There was never a fool that came out of Macroom'. In a Cork Examiner office version the saying had a second

part 'Macroom, the town that never reared a fool and where every penny was a prisoner'. Another wit in response said, tongue-in-cheek, 'if we never reared one, then we must have imported some'. Tim Martin O'Leary has composed and sings a song with the title and you can hear this on YouTube.

In Seán Dunne's The Cork Anthology (1993) Prof. Murphy wrote 'The Piano in Macroom'. This is a reflection on his home, his childhood homelife, his family and especially on his mother, and refers to the 1930s-1940s. She was given a present of a piano on her marriage and she was a very talented player and singer. Her tastes were broad - she liked Gilbert and Sullivan arias, Irish ballads and the latest pop songs of the day. For her with regard to singing, the 'mortal sin' was being 'off key'. Of course singing modern songs was frowned upon by the fíor Gaeilgeóirí and for crossing the line, their sentiment was expressed by ' Go bhfóire Dia orainn, priomhbhaile Ghaeltacht Muscraí, an baile is gallda in Éirinn' which can be translated as 'My God, Muskerry Gaeltacht's principal town, is the most foreign {= Anglicised} town in Ireland'. The explanation probably lies in the fact that proximity to the Gaeltachts provoked antipathy to Irish and Irish culture and an equally trenchant counterreaction from the pure and true Irishians'.



Over the next few weeks and months I hope to run events in the library in association with some of the national initiatives supported by Cork County Library service, such as Healthy Ireland, Spring Into Storytime, and Your Good Self. I will also be supporting the CETB Lifelong Learning Festival. I will always try to give advance notice of events being held in Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne in the Lee Valley Outlook, through local event posters and on Facebook and Twitter.

Lá Fhéile Gobnatan: On 11th February we celebrated Lá Fhéile Gobnatan in Baile Bhúirne. Naomh Gobnait, or St. Abbey, is considered the patron saint of the area. She lived around the 6th century and her burial mound can be found in the local cemetery where there is a beautiful statue portraying her close to the area where she founded her abbey. My favourite story around the legend of Saint Gobnait is the story about how she set her bees on thieves who were trying to steal her cattle and the bees protected the herd. There are also stories about how she used honey and bees wax in medicines to cure the local people of illnesses and infirmities and she used the honey to protect against illness. In present times it is the bees who need protection and I hope that with Gobnait as the patron saint of bees and beekeepers they will get some protection. But if we all are more careful we can become more protective of bees because bees play an integral part in pollinating all our food crops. They, and other pollinating insects, are an essential link in the food chain. Over development of land and over use of insecticides are endangering our bees so give some thought to how you can help prevent this. If you would like to learn more about Naomh Gobnait, Bees & Beekeeping or natural medicines please call to Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne where there are books on all of these subjects. There are books available on how to establish pollinator friendly gardens and pollinator and bee friendly community gardens. You can even find information on bee friendly weed killer if it is really necessary to use a weed killer. If you think that not having a garden means you can't help, there's a book for you too on how to create small gardens in containers.





KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: NATIONAL MINIMUM WAGE AND USC

Question: I'm a full-time minimum wage PAYE worker. Does the increase in the national minimum wage mean that I pay more Universal Social Charge?

Answer: The minimum wage increased from €9.80 to €10.10 on 1 February 2020. A person working full-time (39 hours per week) and earning the minimum wage was previously earning €19,873 per year. They now earn €20,484 per year.

From 1 February, USC rates also changed slightly to make sure that this increase in pay for minimum wage workers is not subject to the 4.5% USC charge. This was done by increasing the income threshold of the 2% band. The new thresholds now look like this:

	Standard rate of USC (up to 31 January 2020)	Standard rate of USC (from 1 February 2020)
Rate	Income band	Income band
0.5%	Up to €12,012	Up to €12,012
2%	From €12,012.01 to €19,874	From €12,012.01 to €20,484
4.5%	From €19,874.01 to €70,044	From €20,484.01 to €70,044
8%	From €70,044.01 and over	From €70,044.01 and over

So, in 2019, if you earned €19,874, your total USC for the year was ({0.5% of €12,012}) €60.06 + {2% of €7,862} €157.24) = €217.30. This meant your USC was €18.11 per month, or €4.18 per week.

From 1 February 2020, if you earn €20,484 per year, your annual USC will be ({0.5% of €12,012} €60.06 + {2% of €8,742} €169.44) = €229.50. This means your USC is €19.13

per month, or €4.41 per week.

So, with the increase in the national minimum wage, you will pay €12.20 more USC per year. This deduction will be made from your gross salary. Your increased salary will continue to be subject to the standard rate of income tax. This means you also pay slightly more income tax after 1 February 2020.

Cork continued their winning start to life in Division 3, the visitors to Carrick-on-Shannon recording their second league victory to remain firmly in the hunt for promotion.

Cork defeated Tipperary in a fine contest under lights at the magnificent Páirc Ui Chaoimh. Cork needed a performance after a defeat to Waterford the previous week and the players gave it a right lash and delighted the big support present. When time was called after 80 minutes, the end delayed by an injury to Tipp's John Bubbles O'Dwyer, in front of a crowd of 9,821 it was Cork who had the scoreboard cushion that delivered the victory.

History

Macroom Judo Club History Part 2 C. Kelleher.

Macroom Judo club was founded in 1975 and had achieved a World Record before the end of 1976. The following pucks up the story from there.


World Record: In August 1976 six club members set a judo world endurance record of ninety hours: the six were Donal O'Callaghan, Noel Lehane, Sean Buckley, Gerard O'Callaghan, Johnny Sheehy and Peter Leahy. The feat drew widespread admiration and publicity. 1 Donal O'Callaghan outlined some practical difficulties encountered. When they began training for the attempt the world record stood at about 46 hours. Shortly before the actual attempt word came through that an English club had pushed the record to more than ninety hours. The attempt was to take place in the Castle Ballroom and over a weekend. Dances were scheduled for Friday and Sunday nights. However both obstacles were overcome and a world record was created. 2 Surprisingly little is written in the minute books about the event apart from the need to add a P.R.O. to the club. 3 A big influx of members ensued. See Photo.

Buoyed with confidence the club organised the biggest Irish judo event that year. In October about 600 judo enthusiasts converged on Macroom for the Samurai (South West) Judo Open. National coach John Curtin brought the event to Macroom because of space and a good local organisation. 4 Much work went into the preparations; McEgan College provided showers and the nearby Irish Countrywomen's Association's (ICA) Hall provided catering.

As judo was still exotic in rural Cork Macroom Judo Club gave successful demonstrations in Bantry, Kilnamartyra and at the Macroom Mountain Dew Festival (1976). 5 Dónal O'Callaghan won the Cork Indoor Sports Association Judo Award in 1977 for his involvement in co-founding Macroom Club and in setting the world record. He was later elected Chairman of the Cork County Judo Board. 6 John Curtin, a Cork city black belt, came to Macroom weekly to give lessons. At that year's Macroom's AGM Peter Leahy became chairman. John Creedon, Coolcower, had made a film To Beat A World Record about the world record achievement and it won a national award. 7 The following year saw many attending training in Sept./Oct. '77. The club arranged school demonstrations in Feb. '78. Further exhibitions at carnivals, including one given during the 1980 Macroom Mountain Dew Festival, were given. 8 A clash of times resulted in a difference of opinion with Youth Club committee members. The result was the suspension of Peter and Ted Leahy from the Youth Club. However the matter was settled amicably. John Buckley became chairman in 1980 and he was succeeded in the chair by

Martina O'Callaghan, the first lady to hold the office. Because of business commitments, Dónal O'Callaghan became less active in the club in the late 1970s.

In January 1981 Macroom Judo Club was reported as 'one of the most thriving clubs in the town'. Training had transferred to the Town Hall and the club was/is grateful to the Macroom Urban District Council (now Macroom District Municipal Council) for its co-operation and generosity. Thirty seven members were upgraded. 9 In February seven men/boys and two women/girls were successful at the Munster Judo championships in Tralee. Jerry Lehane won bronze at the All-Ireland Junior championships Macroom Judo Group 1980s. in Dublin. 10 In January 1982 forty men and twenty women attended for grading. May saw the club win a silver and two bronze medals in All-Ireland competitions - Allen O'Connor. silver and Jerry Lehane and Nora O'Sullivan bronze.

September 1982 was a red letter month as four members - Peter and Ted Leahy, Eugene O'Riordan and John Buckley secured black belt status. Their success did wonders for recruitment and eighty juniors enlisted the following September. 11 Later that year Ted Leahy attended the Scottish Open and experienced international competition. 12 An October headline proclaimed 'Judo Thrives in Macroom' and the club had its highest recorded

membership. 13 Membership stood at 160 in 1983. Eugene O'Riordan became chairman that year. For St. Stephen's Day 1984 the club organised a mountain climb in Carrantwohill. In February Gerry Lehane, Ballytrasna, won the U-15 All-Ireland championship. Kevin Sheehan and Stephen Buckley came third in their weight categories. A Southern Star photo shows Peter and Helen Leahy receiving a presentation on the occasion of their marriage 14 (photo). In 1985 Ted Leahy, Johnny Sheehy, Eugene O'Riordan and Peter Leahy won medals at the All-Ireland and Tralee Judo competitions. The club held its tenth AGM on 25 Jan 1986 and all was well. Michael O'Leary was the new chairman and Anne Foley was wished well on her departure



from the town. Macroom brought home eight trophies from the Munster championship in Tralee. In the men's U-71 Kgs class, Ted Leahy won gold, Eugene O'Riordan silver and Peter Leahy bronze. 15 Eugene O'Riordan became a Black Belt Second Dan in Jan. 1989. Money was garnered with a club draw. Noel and Colm O'Laoire, Ré na nDóirí were successful in competition in Jan 1990. They were sons of Dónal, and Noel became an iconic Cork senior footballer and won an All-Ireland senior medal with Cork in 2010.

Meetings, training and competitions continued in the nineties. Peter Leahy's move to Drogheda was a big loss but was off-set to a degree by the emergence of new talented members. Brothers Con, Denis and Henry Delaney won many local and national medals as did Maura Twomey, Clondrohid. 16 Margaret O'Kearney-Flynn joined the club in 1993 and represented Ireland. The club welcomed Eric Deschamps, the French national coach, in August 1993. Carmel Ryan with Con and Henry Delaney and Martina were successful in a Dublin open competition in September. 17 Matthew Neville won a bronze medal at the Irish Junior Open in December 1993. 18 In 1994 Martina moved to Coventry to pursue full-time training for the 1996 Olympics. 19 She became the first club member to win an international medal in London in 1994. 20 In 1995 she represented Ireland at the European Judo championships. Henry Delaney was selected for an Irish under-21 team to compete in the US in April 1995. 21 Con, his brother represented Ireland at the European Youth Olympics that year. 22 Joey Robenser Turner and Tom Curtis won Munster medals in December. Brothers Dean and Daniel O'Driscoll were members of the Cork Junior under-16 team, Al-Ireland bronze medallists. In February 1996 the club organised a fund-raising tournament for Martina O'Kearney-Flynn's attempt to qualify for the Olympics.

The club continued to train, recruit new members and participate in competitions to 2000. Indeed the club survived the rocky times of the recession and is still active and competitive in 2019.

Conclusion

Judo was once considered exotic in rural Ireland. In Macroom it just another sports club. This change was facilitated by local people leaving the area and bringing a new sport home. This allied to enthusiasm, dedication and intelligence allowed the establishment and flourishing of the club. Media exposure and the loosening of social attitudes enabled people to try new things, including new sports. Success for the club can be measured on survival and the knowledge of the good that it did. Among that good is the introduction of a new sport to the area, the unfolding of a new way of thinking about sport and competition, and the values it espouses. The club trained and unleashed hidden potential of many, and on the way numerous achieved local and national successes. Several members represented Ireland.

The success of the club depended on the vision of the founders and the on-going dedication of its officials and members. The sheer excitement and enjoyment of the sport cannot be overstated. The friendly controlled competitive nature of judo is hugely attractive. This can be readily understood by its underlying principles of politeness, courage, sincerity, honour, modesty, respect, self-control and World Record Report. friendship. Happily these traits have been honoured and exemplified in Macroom Judo Club's journey from 1975 to 2000.

In spite of many difficulties the club continues to thrive and to provide the magical opportunity that is judo to the youth of Macroom and surrounds.
