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
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
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EDITORIAL





She has won many awards including Fleadh Cheoil All-Ireland titles on flute and whistle, playing slow airs. She is very involved with the annual Féile Chois Cuain traditional music festival in her hometown. As well as traditional music, she's also a beginner on saxophone! A freelance translator, Jillian is currently living in Carrick-on-Fergus, Co. Clare. She will take up a translation position in the EU in Brussels in April. Esteemed musicians and judges Michael Tubridy, Mary Bergin and Gary Hastings were united in their decision on the winner. "The music came very naturally to Jillian. It was clear that she was really enjoying playing for us, and the music had great lift and energy. We congratulate Jillian on her award." Jillian was thrilled with her win. "Tonight has been a very special night. I had the opportunity to share the stage with some fantastic musicians, and to perform my music on a national platform, and it's an honour to take home the gold medal."

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





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History


Hurling in Macroom in the Twentieth Century: Some Background and Details

'It (the GAA) not only revived the Irishman's local pride in his county but his national pride in his country.' 1

The Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA) was founded in 1884 in a welter of nationalistic fever and hope. 2 lt is, and has been almost since its inception, not only Ireland's biggest sporting organization but also more than that. 3 From the outset it set itself the task of reviving Ireland's heritage and nationhood. Gaelic football and hurling are easily its major games while it also regulates handball and rounders. Sister games are camogie and Ladies Gaelic football. By including hurling, both Irish and ancient, the GAA became more than a 'mere sporting body'. 4 Rouse notes that if Gaelic football was 'invented' by Maurice Davin, hurling was more ancient. 5 This section examines the history of hurling in Macroom in particular, and why hurling, the GAA's second most popular game, has played but a minor role in the history of the club. Many other clubs excel in both hurling and football. 6 The 'claim' to its lone Mid-Cork junior hurling title in 1937 is dubious and is not listed in O'Brien's Macroom GAA Club History 1886 1987 Roll of Honour. 7 As Junior B winners Macroom played and beat Aghabullogue, Junior A official victors, in a replay, in some sort of

Many civilisations developed 'stick and ball' games and native North Americans played a predecessor of lacrosse. 'In Ireland written records suggest hurling .. was played from 1200 BC, a key component in the male journey to adulthood that prepared them to be warriors'. 9 It became part of Celtic mythology, a concept later exploited by Cusack, the visionary cofounder of the GAA. Kelly's Sport in Ireland 1600-1840 devotes thirty-one pages to hurling, giving wonderful details. He mapped where hurling 1700-1800 was principally played - in Kilkenny, Tipperary (and south Galway). 10 Hurling was a regional and not national. To complicate matters further there was winter/ground

hurling (camán, commons, shinty), played in Ulster and summer/catching (iomán or báire) hurling which was played in the Munster/Leinster. 11 Present day hurling derives from the latter. Seven Munster-Leinster matches took place between 1748 -1773, and about 10,000, including Hartington, 'the lord lieutenant' (sic), attended a Dublin-Kildare match in 1755, 12 Kelly later references governmental banning, the antagonism of some clergy - more deferred to in the early eighteenth century - , increasing sectarianism and loss of patronage as some of the probable causes of the loss of hurling's popularity and status pre-Famine. 13 To understand the 'geography' of hurling both Kelly and Whelan provide explanations. 14 In 'hurling' maps Macroom barely squeezes into the areas contiguous to the core hurling areas in the eighteenth century. Whelan associates the area of the ash/fertile land with hurling and the rush/rougher land with football. 15 The land west of Macroom is generally poor while to the east it is mostly fertile where hurling has thrived in parishes/clubs like Aghabullogue, Cloughduv and Éire Óg since the 1880s. 16 Large flat fields facilitate hurling and were less common in western areas. 17 An absence of seventeenth/eighteenth century local landlord patronage is another factor. The opposition of landlord, priest and magistrate and the impact of the Great Irish Famine almost wiped out hurling in the nineteenth century. 18

The Great Irish Famine 1845-52 caused about one million extra deaths and forced about another million to emigrate. 19 Ireland's population shrank from 8.2 to 5.8 million 1841 - 1861. De Búrca noted the enormous social dislocation and how 'the game (hurling) was severely disrupted'. 20

Macroom GAA Club was founded in May 1885, within six months of the GAA'S birth. 21 Its first match was a hurling contest. The Cork Examiner(CE) 19 July 1886 recorded that Macroom played Cork Nationals' a few weeks ago'. 22 The game was not completed due to serious injuries to Macroom players. 23 The game seemingly deflated Macroom hurling interest to the extent that hurling's next mention was a Macroom-Green Nationals (Cork) match in 1901, in Denis Leahy's field. Daniel Corkery, later an Irish Republican Army leader and Fianna Fáil TD, played that day, 24 Macroom won four senior county football titles from 1909 to 1913. 25 Periodically junior and underage teams played hurling. 26 & 27 Rangers beat Macroom in a minor match in April 1918. 28 A Macroom battalion team lost to Midleton in September 1923 four months after the Civil War ended but this was a Free State army side and many of the players' surnames are unfamiliar to Macroom. 29 The Evening Echo noted that 'Hurling (minor) is going on apace in Macroom town'. 30 Crookstown hosted a Macroom-Ballincollig tie the following March (1928).

Macroom football's second 'golden era' lasted from 1926 to 1935 when it won four senior county championships. Despite this hurling also featured and Macroom won its only Mid-Cork junior title in 1937 under the influence of Brother Benignus Cuddihy. Before that there were some good performances. In 1931 Macroom juniors beat Cloughduv 6-2 to nil. Later the hurlers unluckily lost to Éire Óg in championship with Denis' Mutty' O'Brien and Matty Callaghan playing well. A School Shield team lost a county semi-final to Ballincollig in 1932. 31 1937 was Macroom hurlers' year of glory. Br. Benignus trained the 1937 team. Although the newspapers reports are ambiguous, the hurlers initially competed in the Junior B championship and accounted for Éire Óg (5-3 to 4-3), Inniscarra and Blarney (5-6 to 3-1) in the final. 32 In a replayed junior final (presumably A) Macroom overcame Aghabullogue by 5-6 to 3-1 and the Southern Star's Macroom Notes recorded that the team had 'brought a series of splendid triumphs to a glorious climax'. 33 The team lost heavily in championship to Aghabullogue

the following year and to Shournagh Valley in 1939, 34

Macroom juniors were beaten in 1940 and failed to field against Ballincollig in 1941. 35 Rare bright spots in the 1940s were a 4-1 to 0-0 defeat of Cloughduv in a challenge match in 1945 and the 1946 selection of Ted Cronin (Mid Square) and St. Colman's, Fermoy, for Cork minor hurlers against Clare, a rare Macrompian achievement. 36 & 37 After a game against Canovee (1948), a press report noted an 'interest that prevailed' about hurling. But that was not borne out as there was little club hurling activity in the following decade. 38 Hurling is next referenced in O'Brien's book in 1965 when Macroom beat Aghabulloque but lost to Cloughduv in the Junior B championship. 39 Blarney easily accounted - 5-1 to 1-3 - for Macroom in the same grade the following year. 40 In 1967 Macroom U-14s, St.Colman's - one of two Macroom teams - won a hurling competition for teams from 'weaker' areas. Those teams never played again. Thereafter it was local schools, De La Salle and McEgan, who kept the hurling flag flying with the former winning a 'Special Competition' in 1975 and the latter reached some county Vocational Schools' underage finals. 41 Most players were drawn from traditional hurling clubs like Aghabullogue, Cloughduv and Éire Óg rather than the town. Danny O'Donoghue won an All-Ireland Vocational medal with Cork in 1970 and played hurling in Croke Park, a rare if not a unique achievement for a Macrompian, 42

Macroom re-entered a Junior B team in 1990 but were beaten by Clondrohid. 43 Players such as John O'Mahony and Declan Kelly from 'hurling' areas provided the spark to form a team. In 1992 Macroom won a special Junior B competition. 44 The following vear Macroom won its first hurling championship since 1937, a Junior B title. McEgan College won a schools title in '93. 45 Macroom competed at Junior A in 1993 but struggled; Ballinora easily beat them in championship. After a torrid year Macroom re-graded to Junior B in 1995 and continued at that level until 2000. Gerry Gray, Denis Keating and Gerry Hall, from hurling heartlands, strengthened the team.

Conclusion:

Due to strong nationalist sentiment, Macroom GAA club was formed within six months of the GAA's founding. Macroom was not a traditional hurling area probably due to geography, dictating that football dominated. Serious injuries in the first match dampened enthusiasm and early football success - a first county senior appearance in 1889 and eight senior football titles won from 1909 to 1935 - reinforced a concentration on football. Town new-comers such as Br. Benignus Cuddihy and John O'Mahony periodically re-invigorated hurling. Macroom boys attending St. Colman's had little effect on the popularity of hurling in Macroom. 34 The two Macroom boys' secondary schools were GAA schools, but football again dominated. Periodic GAA initiatives to revive hurling in 'weaker' areas had a limited impact. Cork's inter-county success was positive. Neither newspaper, radio or television coverage increased the playing of hurling in the town. This explains why hurling played a secondary role in Macroom in the twentieth century.

Addendum:

Some other notable hurlers associated with Macroom. Seán Ó Síochain, Cill na Martra, played hurling and football for Macroom, and football for Cork and Dublin. He later became Secretary-General of the GAA. As weel as being a household name for his ballad singing due to his radio performances he also sang with the Dublin Grand Opera Society.

The recently deceased Eddie Downey, Mashanaglash was an accomplished hurler, and played with

Aghabullogue and Muskerry. The late Mick Goold won a Harty Cup (Munster A Colleges') medal with St. Colman's, Fermoy in 1948 with Canon Bertie Troy, Fr Abernathy, both deceased, and Monsignor O'Donnell as team-mates. J.J. Hinchion (deceased) was a fine hurler and played with Aghabullogue. Frankie Twomey, Coachford and Macroom excelled at hurling and soccer and Noel, his son, was a good hurler as well being a top-class footballer.

Macroom had a Junior B team in 1965 and Hugo Casey, captain of the 1962 senior county-winning side was a member. Other footballers who played were Mickie Dunne, Jimmy Deasy, Dónal Lucey and Cathal (Charlie) Buckley, Well House. Charlie later became Chairman of the Munster Branch of the IRFU (rugby). Jim Morris was also a team member.

Seán Noonan, a delightful hurler, Aghabullogue, played football with Macroom and went on to win many Junior A Mid-Cork hurling titles with his home club. He was a loval and faithful servant over many years. When playing with Macroom, he played championship football against Muskerry.

John Allen, Aghabullogue, played minor football for Macroom and Cork, minor hurling for Cork, and U-21

and senior hurling for St Finbarr's and Cork. He won senior All-Ireland medals with Cork in 1977 and 1978. Later he managed Cork to a second consecutive All-Ireland in 2004. After he managed Limerick. wrote for The Irish Times and was a hurling commentator on TG4.

Brendan Kenneally. long-time doyen of Macroom GAA Club, won a Fitzgibbon (intervarsity hurling) medal with UCC. He played and won two senior hurling county medals

with St Finbarr's, and also contested a final with Muskerry. Having moved to Macroom he played with Aghabullogue and was a major figure in the club's success and progress.

Liam Quinlan also shared in many of those Aghabullogue victories and he too has many Muskerry Junior medals. In his time, Éire Óg was the main opposition and Mick Malone its star. Liam and Mick had many tough battles and Liam's success or otherwise had a big bearing on the result.

Aghabullogue won many minor Mid-Cork titles in the late 1960s and early 1970 seventies, and three in 1968, 1969 and 1970. Because of the St. Colman's College, Fermoy link Macroom was well represented on those teams with players like Dominic Cashman, John P. Murphy, New Street, Ted Coakley, Gus and

Con Kelleher. Together with Liam Quinlan and Danny O'Donoghue, they were part of successful teams. As mentioned above, Danny has an All-Ireland Vocational Schools' medal.

Darren Kelly, playing with Cloughduv, was a Cork minor hurler. He now plays with Iveleary and trains Laochra Óg under-age teams. One of his protégés, Brian Healy, Clonfadda, plays for Macroom and Laochra Óg and has been on successful Cork U-16 teams.

The talent is there – it just needs an outlet.

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

Reigning champions Éire Óg are back into another final of the Macroom Motors Mid Cork U21 A football championship and their opponents will again be Ballincollig who had the satisfaction later last year of dumping their neighbours out of the county championship at the semi final stage. This year, the Mid Cork championship final is being played on a 'winner takes all basis', only the champions going on out into the county and the final promises to be a close affair. Because of this defeat, following on from an earlier loss to Ballincollig, Aghabullogue are out of contention, as are Inniscarra with two losses, and the final round in the round robin divisional competition is now of no consequence and so unnecessary. Aghabullogue will possibly consider themselves the unlucky team of the championship. They lost by the minimum to Ballincollig and even though short David Thompson and the injured Paul Dilworth here, looked to have Éire Óg in trouble early in the second half when they came from a point behind at the interval to take a two point lead ten minutes into the second half. The pivotal moment in the game came at the three quarter stage when Aghabullogue lost the outstanding Conor Smith to an undisputed black card after pulling down Éire Óg's fellow Cork U20 teammate, the flying Jack Murphy, and just before Smith re-entered the fray ten minutes later, the pendulum in this always finely balance affair had swung in Éire Óg's favour when the only goal of the game from Joe Cooper gave them a major edge as the finishing line came in sight.

Conditions for this game under lights at Cloughduv were good and the teams served up a fine contest, not surprising considering that there were quality county players on both sides. Aghabullogue struck first with a point from Eoghan Maher but Éire Óg soon got into their stride and after Dylan Foley kicked an equaliser, they followed with points from Joe Cooper and Rian O'Flynn, the latter after a fine double save from Aghabullogue goalkeeper Daniel Lane. Éire Óg lost Colm O'Callaghan to a black card, Luke Casey, a fine leader of the Aghabullogue attack, struck a beautifully judged free kick into the wind over the Éire Óg bar in the 17th minute and Keelan O'Sullivan quickly pointed to level the scores at 0-3 each. Jack Murphy and Luke Casey exchanged points from frees as the winners were back at full strength and in the 24th minute Joe Cooper and Luke Casey each had fine scores from play to maintain equality, 0-5 each the score. Five minutes elapsed before Éire Óg got a point back from the boot of Matt Brady and then followed Smith dismissal, a major setback for Aghabullogue. KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: SCHOOL TRANSPORT SCHEME

Question: My daughter is starting secondary school in September and we live 5 kilometres from her school. Am I eligible for the School Transport Scheme?

Answer: You may qualify for the School Transport Scheme. The scheme provides subsidised school transport for both post-primary and primary pupils. Bus Éireann runs the school bus service and the Department of Education and Skills decides the annual

The service is only provided where there are at least 10 eligible pupils in a distinct locality that can be economically serviced by a bus route. Even when a pupil meets the age and distance criteria for school transport, there is no legal entitlement to it.

Your daughter is eligible for the Post-Primary School Transport Scheme if she is attending her nearest school and lives 4.8 kilometres or more from the school. The Department and Bus Éireann determine the appropriate nearest school with regard to ethos and language. Parents must arrange to bring their child to the nearest pick-up point on the bus route. Generally, bus routes are organised so that no pupil has more than 3.2 kilometres to travel

There is a single annual charge of €350 per pupil. However, a family does not pay more than €650 per year. The charge is due to be paid in full by the end of July or else in 2 instalments: by the end of July and the start of December. Pupils who are eligible for school transport and who hold a valid medical card are entitled to free school transport to

Since your child is enrolling in post-primary school for the first time, you should either apply for school transport online or download the form from Bus Éireann's website, buseireann.ie. Applications are now being accepted for the 2020-2021 school year. You should apply by Friday, 24 April 2020.

MA in Local History (School of History, UCC); Applications are now open.

Applications are now being accepted for admittance to the MA in Local History degree programme, beginning in September 2020. Applicants must have an honours degree in History or a cognate subject, or its equivalent. Candidates with relevant experience in **School of** local history study (e.g. membership of a local history society and/ or a heritage group, publications, etc.) are also invited to apply. Such candidates are subject to the approval of the College of Arts, Celtic Studies and Social Sciences.

The part-time MA Degree in Local History is offered by coursework and assessment and runs for two years (part-time) from the date of first registration for the programme. Coursework consists of a

taught component of weekly evening lectures (Wednesday 6.30 - 8.30 pm) in Year I. Evaluation is by a 5,000 word essay and continuous assessment, to be completed by the end of the second semester, Year 1 (c. May 2021). A dissertation of 25,000-30,000 words on an approved topic to be submitted by the end of year 2. Lectures are specially tailored to provide a practical guide to the writing of Irish local history, indicating the main sources, their location and how best they might be exploited. Lectures will cover the introduction to sources and archives, approaches to Local History, reading the landscape, maps, census and parish records, Valuation Office records, Estate Records, sources for urban history, oral history and folklore, historiography, landscape and material history, gender and history, labour



history, military and political history, cultural history, economic history, demographics, religion and much more. Applications are made through the Postgraduate Application Centre (PAC) in Galway. Further details and application forms are available from http://www.pac.ie/

NOTE: There is no age barrier and a degree is not necessary in cases where evidence can be provided of an applicant's interest in local history, e.g., if an applicant is a member of a local history society or has publications on local history topics.



COLLEGE EDUCATION OPEN DAY



riday, 6th March sees the spring education open day taking place in Clonakilty Agricultural College.

Clonakilty Agricultural College, based in Darrara just outside the town of Clonakilty, provides agricultural education and training in through its own full-time and part-time QQI programmes and also in conjunction with three higher education Institutions in the region, CIT, IT Tralee

People coming to see the college and what's on offer will be brought through the different programmes that lead to qualifications from Level 6 up to Level 8.

For students starting 1st year next September, they will follow on with the changes to the programme that were implemented this year and have helped with the learning experience. Students will go on a 4-week placement in October, and return to that farm again in March. During their time in the college between September and May they'll get the foundation training in areas of livestock husbandry,



grassland management, farm business and more specific training in areas such as pesticide application. There is a large emphasis on farm safety, soils and the environment and sustainability.

In 2nd year (Level 6) which starts the following September the course specialises in either Drystock (Cattle and Sheep) or the longerestablished Dairy Herd Management course. Both courses have longer periods of on-farm training incorporating the calving/lambing periods on farms but also the breeding season on cattle and dairy farms.

Graduates of Clonakilty's Level 6 programmes have many routes of progression after the two years with us. The Level 6 in its own right is required for applying for jobs with the Department of Agriculture, By 2021 there will be an apprenticeship route in place with a Level 7 degree qualification. This will be an important extension to the current programmes as there is

an ever-increasing demand from farmers in the region to have enthusiastic, forward-thinking young people looking to manage the farms of the next decade. In this respect it is one area of the rural economy where it is a sellers' market.

The higher education routes still exist and continue to expand with graduates of Darrara able to gain "advanced entry" to degree courses in agriculture in all of the Institutes of Technology in Munster; including Cork, Tralee and Waterford.

For people who have a non-agricultural qualification there is the option of gaining a Teagasc Green Cert (the Specific Purpose Certificate in Farming) through a part-time route.

The Open Day starts at 11am on the morning of March 6th and all are welcome to explore their options in agricultural education and job prospects that can arise from coming to Darrara


