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
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EDITORIAL

St Joseph's Primary School



Macroom Tidy Towns

Tidy Towns Update

Many people associate Tidy Towns activities with litter picking and planting flowers during the Spring and Summertime, but Tidy Towns work has now broadened out so much and is a year-round commitment. To gain marks in the national competition it is necessary to score highly under all eight judging categories. Last year's detailed report was copied, and hand delivered to 1,450 houses and businesses all around town in November to inform people of the judges' comments, both positive and negative and to raise awareness. The Macroom Tidy Towns Facebook page has been the main means of communication throughout the year. In the last four months of 2018 we were joined by extra volunteers from the ranks of the asylum seekers that came to the Riverside Park hotel. These helped out in litter picking, planting flower bulbs, in erecting the Christmas lights and in distributing the newsletters.

The Fairy Garden has been one of the highlights again in 2018 with various new additions all over the park and new shed, officially opened by Patrick Bergin. In the Autumn, there was an updated brochure produced and distributed all over town by the new volunteers from Riverside Park and copies of this are available in the Town Hall, Macroom.

Community involvement continues to grow with schools' activities relating to Green Flags and such being taken into account. Other groups like Foroige have also got involved. The Men's Shed have been a great support for Tidy Towns in many different ways.

The biodiversity area continues to take on added significance. In 2018 a swift Tower, 5 metres tall with 28 nesting sites was erected in the Mart property close to LIDL. This project was in conjunction with IRD, Duhallow. This has a bird caller installed which is solar powered and will be used to attract the swifts to use these nesting sites. There are swifts already frequenting this general area every Summer, while they return like the swallows to the warmer climates for the Winter months. Another developing area is the focus on maintaining the natural habitats, and each of the green areas in estates etc. are being encouraged to retain an area for biodiversity. This could be an area where heretofore grass was being cut, but there was no real need for this time and expense, when a natural environment could offer more in the line of biodiversity. The biodiversity garden in the Fairy garden will be enhance with the upgrading of signage and the addition of some semi-mature fruit trees being sponsored by McEgan College. Almost 200 trees and shrubs were planted along by the riverside at the rear entrance to the Fairy Garden. In this area also work has commenced on a sensory garden with support from a significant sponsor and works will be ongoing here in 2020.

The painting of houses and business premises was very noticeable last year on the main thoroughfare, and the Council must be commended for their support here. This makes





a noticeable difference and the new murals add significantly to this.

One of the difficulties that the Tidy Towns faces is that so much of the desired works are outside their control and places that need upgrading are owned by business people and private individuals. Another difficulty is the continued reduction of council staff. This is gone below acceptable levels and there is a growing dependence on Tidy Towns volunteers to carry out essential work on the streets, thus limiting the potential for further enhancement of the town in other ways.

Another category that is judged is sustainability.... doing more with less. This focuses on reduction firstly (energy, water etc.), the reuse, and there are quite a number of 2nd hand shops now in Macroom, then maybe recycle as the 3rd option.

The Tidy Towns major project for 2020 is the completion of a storage shed and have base in town to operate out of. The site, at the corner of Coolehane Road and Masseytown Road has been cleared and levelled. Planning permission has been obtained and work has commenced on putting in the base. This will be the central meeting point and will store the tools and equipment and help free up some of the organisers on Saturday mornings Macroom Tidy Towns, John Lyons and Paul Kingston. © Con Kelleher etc. . It will help on wet days when work can be carried out indoors on painting equipment, repairs etc. It is adjacent to the Men's Shed and adjacent to the Fairy Garden and really is something to look forward to. Over the years Tidy Towns has had more access to council facilities and yards for storage etc. but



with Irish Water now and changing council operations this facility was very limited. The future looks positive for Tidy Towns and the volunteer numbers were never as big, so it is a very positive start to 2020.

Both student teachers are in their fifth and final year of College. They have been a huge asset to the school community and have been very involved in many school initiatives. Both teachers praised the staff of McEgan for being extremely helpful and giving them great guidance and support as they carry out their teaching duties.

Health and Well-being Week at McEgan: Health and Well-being week took place recently in McEgan College. There was a wide range of activities available throughout the week with the focus being on physical as well as mental health. It kicked off on Monday 2nd of March with TY and 5th yr. students completing day one of a four-week Resilience Programme facilitated by Aware, an organisation that supports individuals and their families to overcome mental health difficulties. McEgan were one of four Cork schools lucky enough to access this invaluable programme this year. A 'Connect Cafe' was set up in the school for two mornings which allowed all year groups mingle with different students for a tea and chat. Students present were asked to work in teams to excerise their architectural skills to assemble a tower using spaghetti and marshmallows, the aim being to enhance teamwork skills. Year groups from 2nd to 6th had access to kickboxing classes with SNA Colm O Carroll throughout the week and the entire school community had great fun demonstrating their 'zumba' moves with past pupil Danny Payne on the Wednesday. Personnel from Cork Sexual Health Centre came and set up their information stand for a day and delivered age appropriate information on issues such as consent to all year groups throughout the day. A pop-up salad bar was available at lunchtime on Wednesday and a smoothie bar on Tuesday under the guidance of Ms Hazel Burke. First year students had weather on their side on Thursday when they went on a Biodiversity Walk facilitated by Karen Loxton of SECAD. Mindfulness walks were carried out at lunchtimes and many in class meditation activities took place during RE classes. A great week was had by all and once again money was raised for Pieta House, an initiative which is a key part of McEgan retaining their Amber Flag which signifies the work the school does throughout each academic year to support Positive Mental Health.

Macroom Musical SHAME THE DEVIL

Landmark ambush to be brought to life in new musical. Shame the Devil to tell the story of The Dripsey Ambush and to be staged at Macroom Castle April 15-1

An historic and intriguing ambush which saw a group of local men captured and sentenced to death and a local informant and one of her staff kidnapped, never to be found, will be brought to life in a musical which is to be staged as the centenary of the stand-out attack Stephanie Shine who plays the role of Maria Lyndsay approaches.

'Shame the Devil' will be staged in the grounds of Macroom Castle in April 15 to 19 county Cork from April 15 to 19 and

tells the story of The Dripsey Ambush. The landmark IRA ambush on January 28, 1921, in an area between the villages of Coachford and Dripsey led to an intriguing trial which saw the Irish men captured afforded legal representation for the very first time.

In its aftermath, local woman, Maria Lindsay, who had strong Loyalist convictions, and her driver were captured by local volunteers. To this day, their bodies have never been found.

The musical includes many of the production team and cast which were also responsible for the sell-out 'Murder at Shandy Hall' and 'Sir Henry'. Both previous productions were based on stand-out historical events and characters in Cork and were so successful that both were also staged at Cork Opera House and received very favourable reviews. It is hoped that Shame the Devil might also follow suit.

Shame the Devil is written by Alan Kiely and Kevin Connolly. Kiely says the target of the Dripsey Ambush was the muchhated Auxiliaries based at Macroom Castle and that it's an added twist that the musical is based there on the eve of its centenary. Booking is now open on https://www.shamethedevilmusical. com/ and tickets can also be reserved on 087 9978572. They cost €20 each.

As dress rehearsals continue, Alan Kiely said: "The cast is the biggest to date and we're thrilled so many of the original cast were willing to come back and work with us on our third production. Shame the Devil is based on an historic ambush and we've been very careful not to take sides. "We're building a theatre inside the venue in the grounds of Macroom Castle with tiered seating. The stage, the lighting, sound and everything will be top notch and the live band features a fully acoustic piano, violin cello, flute and whistles and more. We're pulling out all of the stops to make it our best production to date," he promised.

The Dripsey Ambush unfolded as a party of men from the 6th Battalion Cork No. 1 Brigade lay in wait for a convoy of British Ballincollig Barracks and Macroom.

in Shame the Devil, a musical based on the Drispey Ambush which runs in Macroom Castle Grounds from

common local knowledge. Mary Lindsay lived locally and made her way to Ballincollig where troops from the 1st Battalion of the Manchester Regiment were based. Their commanding officer, Colonel Dowling, immediately decided to launch an attack against the IRA.

A column of British troops under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Garret Evans left the barracks for Dripsey village. There they divided into groups and set out to surround the ambush party.

The IRA scouts saw the approaching troops and alerted their comrades. The officer in charge of the ambush ordered a withdrawal but firing soon broke out. Eight members of the IRA and two civilians were captured. They were brought to Ballincollig barracks.

Less than two weeks later, the trial of eight of the ten men captured at Dripsey opened. The two others were still being detained in the military hospital. Republicans who were captured and brought to trial traditionally refused to recognise or acknowledge British courts and claimed that they, as citizens of the Irish Republic, were only subject to laws that were passed by Dail Eireann.

However, on this occasion, the defendants would be liable to suffer the death penalty if found guilty. Brigade headquarters therefore decided to test the legality of the military courts and sanctioned the appointment of defence counsel for the men. The defendants were volunteers Thomas O'Brien, Patrick O'Mahoney, Timothy McCarthy, John Lyons, Jeremiah O'Callaghan and Daniel O'Callaghan as well as civilians, Eugene Langtry and Denis Sheehan.

The proceedings lasted two days. Volunteer Jeremiah O'Callaghan together with Eugene Langtry and Denis Sheehan, both of whom had no connection with the IRA, were found not guilty and released. The remaining six young volunteers were found guilty and faced the firing squad. Jim Barrett, the 6th battalion quarter master died in hospital. One-man Dennis Murphy lost a leg, such was the severity of his gunshot wounds. He received a late pardon and was sentenced to 25 years in prison, in lieu of being executed.





Carriganima News

An tAthair Peadar Ó Laoghaire Carriganima Community Development invited everybody to the centenary celebrations for An tAthair Peadar Ó Laoghaire. An tAthair Peadar, who was born in the townland of Liscarriguane, spent his formative years here. He was a renowned Gaelic scholar and a champion of the spoken Irish of the people. He wrote several works, and his novel Séadhna was the first novel in modern Irish. An tAthair Peadar wrote in 'everyday Irish' – in the language of the people with whom he grew up and to whom he ministered, rather than the more formal tones historically associated with academic literature. As a cleric, An tAthair Peadar was also an advocate for the so-called 'ordinary people'; he supported the poor especially tenant farmers, and was an advocate for land reform. At times, this commitment to social justice provoked reprimands from the authorities, but he remained steadfast in these principles. He died in March 1920, and it is only fitting that we, his own people, mark this important centenary.

The commemoration will commence on Friday, March 20 with an opening ceremony and a gathering of musicians in 'The Pub' – beginning at 8.30pm. Representatives of Carriganima Community Development will speak. Tim Joe O'Riordan will be the anchor musician, but all others are very welcome to join in.

On Saturday, March 21, there will be a guided bus tour to sites associated with An tAthair Peadar and his ancestors, including Carrignacurra Castle, Carraig na Madraí and Liscarrigane (the family homestead). The bus will leave the village at 12 noon and return at approximately 4pm. Soup and sandwiches will be available for purchase in The Pub afterwards. All those on the tour must stay together and comply with the Country Code. Carriganima Community Development is very grateful to the affected landowners for their permission to allow people to access sites as part of this tour. Prior booking is essential via Eventbrite (Tour An tAthair Peadar) or by phoning Cáit Ring on 086-8736614. This guided tour is compliments of Carriganima Community Development.

At 6pm, Rt. Rev. Msgr. James O'Donnell will lead a concelebrated bilingual Mass, before which he will bless a commemorative plague, which is due to be installed in the Church. After Mass, there will be a social gathering in The Pub, and refreshments will be served. Murt Kelliher will lead musicians, and again, others are welcome to join in.

The community has, under the stewardship of James O'Leary, compiled a book 'Ár Scéal Féin' – brimming with genealogy, stories, tales, heritage, history and folklore from the wider locality over the past one hundred years. This will be formally launched after Mass. Copies will be on sale, on the night, and patrons will have to be quick to get their copy of this momentous publication.

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

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: CHILDCARE SUBSIDY

Question: I am due to return to work after maternity leave in a few months, and I am looking into my childcare options. Our income is modest, and I'm afraid that we will struggle to meet the cost of a full time crèche. My friends tell me there is help available, but the information I've found so far is very confusing. There are just so many different schemes! Can you help?

Answer: Returning to work following maternity leave can be stressful, and the high cost of childcare is something that worries many new families. However, there is help available, and you will be pleased to hear that the system for receiving childcare assistance has been greatly simplified with the introduction of the new National Childcare Scheme (NCS).

The National Childcare Scheme offers two levels of funding:

- A universal subsidy that is available for children aged between 6 months and 3 years. You must be legally resident in Ireland, be the parents or guardians of the child and provide a PPS number for both you and your child to qualify. The universal subsidy is €0.50 per hour. When your child reaches 3 years, he or she will be eligible for the Early Childhood Care and Education Programme (ECCE), which is also a universal programme.
- An income assessed subsidy that is available for children aged between 6 months and 15 years. As well as satisfying the conditions for the universal subsidy, your reckonable income must be below €60,000 per year.

The NCS replaces all the existing schemes (with the exception of the Early Childhood Care and Education Programme (ECCE) which will continue to operate alongside the NCS), although parents and guardians who are receiving assistance through an existing programme can opt to stay on their current scheme until August 2021.

Subsidised hours

If you are working or studying, you will receive a max

imum of 40 hours per week of subsidised childcare. During school term time, this is decreased to reflect the time your child spends in school. If you are not working or studying, you will receive a maximum of 15 hours per week of subsidised childcare.

Assessable income

The income based subsidy is based on how much money you and your spouse or partner earn, less some allowable deductions.

The calculation is based on your take home pay. This is your pay (and your spouse or partner's pay) after tax, PRSI and USC have been deducted.

If you are receiving a social welfare payment (including Child Benefit), this is counted as income, unless it is an allowable payment.

If you have 2 children under 15, you can deduct €4,300 from your reckonable income.

If you have 3 or more children under 15, you can deduct €8,600 from your reckonable

You can also deduct allowable social welfare payments, including:

- Back to Education Allowance and VTOS Training Allowance
- Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance
- · Back to Work Family Dividend
- Blind Welfare Allowance
- Carer's Support Grant
- · Domiciliary Care Allowance
- **Guardians and Foster Care allowances**
- Rent Supplement
- Student Grant

You will be entitled to the maximum subsidy rates if your reckonable income is below €26,000 per year. The rate decreases on a sliding scale to the cut-off point of €60,000 per

County Cork Commemorations Grant Scheme 2020

Cork County Council, in recognition of the importance of the War of Independence and Civil War and acknowledging the enthusiasm that exists within the County to commemorate the centenary of this defining period of Irish history, has announced the opening of the County Cork Commemorations Grant Scheme 2020.

The County of Cork played a most pivotal role in this four-year period of Irish history that in the county alone saw the loss of over 500 lives. Many of the events spanning the period of 1920 to 1923 have great local significance, several having national and even international significance.

In County Cork during 1920 there were close to 100 significant War of Independence incidents including close to 20 ambushes alone, resulting in over 50 fatalities. That year in history and this year in centenary commemoration, Tomás Mac Curtáin from Mourneabbey in North Cork was assassinated and his successor. Terence McSwiney who had been a T.D. for mid County Cork in the First Dáil, died after 74 days on hunger strike. 1920 in County Cork saw the most significant Kilmichael Ambush, which resulted in 20 fatalities; the taking of the Military Barracks in Mallow and the official name change from Queenstown to Cobh in July 1920, to name but a few occurrences.

Speaking of the grant scheme, the Mayor of the County of Cork Cllr. Ian Doyle noted 'Cork County Council has already been approached by numerous community organisations throughout the county, looking to undertake commemorative centenary events and initiatives in their locality. This fund will allow the Commemorative Programme for County Cork to do justice to the past and provide

the support for those community groups, who today, seek to remember these important historical events. Cork County Council recognises the commitment of local communities in honouring the past and as Mayor of the County of Cork, I encourage communities to consider applying to the fund'

Chief Executive of Cork County Council, Tim Lucey welcomed the opening of the scheme

'The purpose of this fund is to support local groups, organisations and individuals who wish to commemorate significant events, through a variety of initiatives such as ceremonial events, school projects, the arts, documentaries and exhibitions. In 2016, Cork County Council provided support to over 160 different groups and organisations from throughout the County, resulting in the largest 1916 Commemorative Programme in the country with over 500 events. It is clear that the County of Cork prides itself in remembering the past and the people who made us who we are today.' 
Coachford Cycling Club Sportive

Dr Pereira, Mr O'Dwyer and Mr Reaney all expressed their thanks to staff in all areas of the service who have been working constantly to allow health services locally to respond to current events and prepare for the challenges ahead.

"We know that there are challenging times ahead, but with your continued commitment, dedication and hard work that we will meet those challenges," they said.

A contact centre was up and running in Cork last Friday to assist with the process of contacting and communicating with people who are







designated as contacts of confirmed cases of COVID-19.

This call centre was equipped, set-up and staffed in a very short space of time, and staff have worked constantly in recent days to continue that process of communicating with people in contact with confirmed cases of COVID-19. 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





A Word of Victory

Welcome back dear reader last week we spoke of fear of the corona virus, and how people feel powerless to defeat it, causing terror and panic as they face the fragility of life. This disease has not come from God, but from the devil who 'comes only to steal, kill and destroy', but Jesus came to bring us abundant life, and to destroy the works of the devil (John 10:10; 1st John 3:8).
