

SIOBHAN DUGGAN, ARTIST **A DAILY PAINTING PRACTICE THAT BROUGHT LIGHT TO LIFE IN LOCKDOWN**

A personal challenge for Macroom based artist Siobhan Duggan to create a piece of art every day for the month of March has left her followers looking for more to cheer up their inboxes during lockdown.

Throughout the month of March, Siobhan created an original piece of artwork as a personal challenge but little did she know the effect it would have for her email subscribers which grew from 150 to more than 1/2/3.000 across four continents. Each morning at 7am, Duggan sent an email with an image of her piece of art accompanied by a positive quotation capturing her mood from the previous day, which to her surprise struck a chord with many. The subject of her works included the countryside around Macroom including The Gearagh as well as west Cork scenery and wildlife paintings. Through a simple silent bid system people bid what they were happy to pay with the artwork sold to the highest bidder of the day.

Speaking of the project Siobhan said "I was amazed at how well the project was received and little did I know at the beginning how much the world would change in those four short weeks. I think the email each morning was a little brightness in what was

otherwise a strange time. It was a break from the news of Covid-19 when the world was at the cusp of change. The best part of the project was the emails I received from people to say how they looked forward to the email each day with many asking me to keep it going for as long as lockdown continued!

She continued, "Landscapes and wildlife are my favourite subjects, I love to capture the colour and light of the landscape, and the essence of an animal, and the project has given me the impetus to continue to create many more such pieces in the future."

For now, Siobhan is continuing to build her collection after packaging off 31 of the sold artworks to Canada, USA, England, Netherlands, Australia, Scotland, Northern Ireland and Ireland. Her current work is focusing on another project that began in January and will continue until December; the same scene from the Gearagh which shows its ever-changing landscape throughout the year, a beauty spot that she believes is undiscovered by so many.

May 2020 - Unfortunately, Ted Cronin passed away, after a short illness, on April 30th 2020. He is bereaved by his wife, Joan, and his children, Michael, Clare and Catherine (Cathy), his grandchildren and a huge circle of friends and acquaintances, all of whom had such fond memories of him. His funeral mass was watched by many and Clare, in her lovely eulogy, captured his essence. As a tribute, Macroom streets and golf course were lined with friends to say 'Goodbye' to a true gentleman.

While we were blessed to have had Ted so well for so long, we will never see his like again.

I interviewed Ted in 2015 and what follows is a record of those

conversations. Because of modesty, Ted did not allow publication at the time. This was another one of Ted's many virtues which made him so well liked and respected. The family has now agreed to have the article published.

From an interview in March 2015 - Ted Cronin's, Middle Square and 'Coosey' Hall, Macroom.

Ted and Joan Cronin's drapery shop in Mid Square, Macroom, has traded since 1922. Ted Cronin's father, Michael, a Rusheen man, had served his time as a draper's clerk, and he bought the premises. Michael died in 1942, and his wife, Margaret (neé O'Leary, Ballinagree), took over the business. In 1945, Ted, aged 16, stayed at home and he has served his customers since, a span of 70 years. Joan and Ted are very fit and well, and they have had a long, happy and active life together.

Born at home in 1928, Ted was one of three children, with John the eldest and Rita the youngest. Ted attended the convent and the Boys' National School, where Dick Farrell and Danny Kelleher were classmates. Times were frugal but happy. He spent first year in De La Salle, Macroom and he then went to St. Colman's, Fermoy. Contemporaries were Monsignor O'Donnell, now a golf partner, and the deceased Mick Goold, Canon Bertie Troy, Fr. Abernethy, and Fr. Colman O'Donovan. Although the regime was tough, he was young, and he endured and enjoyed his time there. Hurling was the school's principal game and Ted excelled to the point that, in 1946, he played with Munster Schools in Croke Park and Cork minor hurlers – one of the very few if not the only Macrompian to do so.

Ted's father died in 1942 and having spent 3 and half years away, it was decided that Ted would stay home and run the family shop; he was now almost 17. He is very certain that this was the correct decision and he is very happy that he lived all his life in Macroom.

In 1946, Macroom had a very good minor football team, and under the captaincy of the outstanding Tommy Daly, it won the county championship. Later Ted played junior football and junior B hurling for Macroom and played for Cloughduv when they lost a junior county final to Castlemartyr in 1952.

Davey Hennessey, his cousin, joined Ted in the shop in the '40s and they became a great team, enjoying much fun in their witty repartee. Darrin Ring has been Ted's assistant for many years and Martin McSweeney, Carriganime, has lately worked in the shop. Ted feels he has been very fortunate to have had them both.

As well as being a general drapery shop, Cronin's had a women's section, and this was run by Ted's mother. Unfortunately, Margaret his mother too became ill and she died in 1947; thus, at 19 years, Ted had inherited the family business and had the onerous task of running a very busy shop. He attributes the survival and success of the business to hard work, service, excellent staff and enjoying meeting people. His excellent memory for names and faces, his calm disposure and his enjoyment of people's company have stood him in good stead.

Country people had a great affinity for Cronin's shop and felt very comfortable there. The shop was well renowned for great value, and without divulging trade secrets, he felt that early payment for merchandise held him in good grace with the wholesalers.

Ted married Joan O'Leary, a local lady, in 1955 and they have three children – Michael, an engineer, Clare, a journalist and Catherine who is co-owner of Riverside Park Hotel. Joan had qualified as a pharmacist/chemist and provided 'cover' for Brennans's pharmacy (now a bookie's) in South Square. Joan took over the women's section of the shop and the writer, often much embarrassed, has memories of being sent by my mother to collect various female items. Ted remarked that some Macroom men who married Cork city ladies soon found themselves living in the Western Road! This year Ted and Joan celebrate their 60th anniversary. A shared locality and interests, affection, respect and patience are the ingredients of their happiness.

The shop/house had to be rebuilt in 1965 – renovations were due, and it was easier to knock and build again. This is the only period that the shop was closed for business in 93 years.

Golf has played a big part in Ted's life. Joan's father was a founding member in 1924 and she has been a member its entire existence. It was there she met Ted and they continue to play golf together to this day. Joan was Lady Captain twice; in 1952 as Joan O'Leary, and in 1971 as Joan Cronin. Ted was honoured with the men's captaincy in 1956. Apart from that, he was very active in the committee and oversaw the bar for many years. Together with Seán McSweeney, Richard Goggin, Sam Swanton and others he was very involved in having a new clubhouse built in 1973. Later he was thrilled to see the course extended to 18 holes in 1994 and the fine current clubhouse added in 1997. Ted played his first Captain's prize in 1946 and this year he hopes to play his 70th. The President's prize was initiated in 1964 and he has played in every one since then. Unluckily he has won neither, but he continues to hope. Ted was a very good golfer, his lowest handicap was 6, and he was 'steady' on 8-9 for many years. As well as being champion of the course four times, he and Joan were twice runners-up in the Cork Examiner Munster Open mixed foursomes. With Maura Forde, the 2015 lady captain, he won the club mixed foursome competition in 2013.

Always very fond of dogs, Ted has kept springer spaniels for many years. His brother-in-law, Harry O'Leary (vet/hotelier), deceased, was interested in shooting and used to borrow Ted's dog. As very little golf was played over the winter, Ted had free time and so he took up shooting. This too has become an abiding interest and passion and he can be seen heading off with his gun and his dog for a day's shooting. He has done some fishing and he swims on a regular basis.

There have been many changes in Ireland and Macroom since his youth. He remembers the 'Emergency' 1939-1946, the mass emigration of the '50s, the improvements of the 1960 and 1970s, the '80s recession, the boom of the '90-'00s and again the current downturn. Overall, Ted thinks that life is much better but feels that the viability of small shops is under

serious threat. The shopkeeper thrived because he/she gave good service and having a very good rapport with customers; Ted epitomised those virtues. He remarks that nowadays he sees very few people chatting on the street – a reflection of our times. From a local historian's point of view, he was an invaluable source and very generous with his time and knowledge.

The Castle Grounds, for his golf and his walks, was his Mecca, and he was always very content and happy in its environs, and indeed just to be in Macroom.

When Ted was asked about Macroom's past he not only knew the answer almost instantly but was able to put the person or incident in context. A great raconteur, he told his stories with aplomb, insight and fun. He was always able to see the human and humorous sides of situations but always through the lens of kindness and compassion. He had a rare knack of making people feel important and liked.

The good news is that he intends to continue his business and his pastimes for many more years.

LEARNING DURING LOCKDOWN

Firstly – we would like to say well done to all of our students, parents and staff on another fantastic week of remote learning. We are all so busy with Google Classroom assignments, Loom Videos of Topics and Live Zoom classes. Thanks to all of our girls who are working so well. We are working ahead and keeping on track! Keep up the good work girls!!

We will always remember Thursday the 12th of March when An Taoiseach, Leo Varadkar announced that schools were to close.

These are very strange times indeed for us all. Since the schools closed, we have all had to get used to a very adjusted way of continuing with education. Students and teachers in St Mary's have been using digital technology platforms such as Google Classroom, Google Meet, Zoom and Loom to stay connected and continue with education to great effect. 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COVID 19 UPDATE By Dr. Dr Con Kelleher

Covid News on May 5th 2020.

Unfortunately, Covid is still active in Ireland, and by May 3rd it had caused 1,303 deaths and we had 21,506 confirmed cases.

On May 1st Taoiseach Leo Varadkar announced plans on the easing of restrictions concerning Covid. It was a badly awaited piece of good news about the illness. Included in the plan is that from May 6th cocooners could leave their houses for short period and the radius of travel from home was raised from two to five kilometres. Later, and provided that there will be no setbacks, businesses will gradually reopen, some social activities including sports will re-commence. While certainly not a GAA man, Varadkar's comment about the possibility of playing the All-Ireland senior finals this year drew widespread attention and comment. At least people could see the possibilities, and turned to discussing its merits, for and against. People were talking about pitch activity rather than its absence.

However, before raising our expectations too much about unwinding the lockdown, we should reflect on the facts.

Numbers in Republic of Ireland: (These figures are taken from the Irish Times and refer to the day previous to the day of publication).

A brief look at the numbers will show that the numbers of confirmed cases has increased by a factor of (nearly) five. This may be due to more testing. As against that not everybody is tested and there probably is a large number of people positive for Covid but nobody knows because they are not. Some experts say that there may be up to 10 times as many asymptomatic carriers compared to confirmed cases. The number of deaths due to Covid has increased by ten from April 3rd to 30th. The % of deaths in relation to the number of confirmed cases has increased from 2.8% to 6.0%. Certainly there are no grounds for complacency. By April 15th more than half of Covid deaths had taken place in residential settings. Other figures are that the median (average) and the median (half way on the scale) ages of victims are in their 80s.

DEVELOPMENTS: Politics.

1. A detailed road map has been published detailing a five staged return to near normality by August 10th. Details are widely available on the media. Intervals are three weeks and progression depend on no adverse outcomes. No doubt many groups and sectors will cry 'foul' at their treatment.

2. Further, the Greens are entering/have entered talks with FF and FG about forming a government but they (the Greens) need a 2/3 majority of members to vote for the agreed terms to allow participation.

3. Tensions were reported between the government and Dr Tony Holohan's committee (NPHET).

Medical.

Medically there are three approaches to tackling the Covid epidemic: Medicines, a Vaccine and Prevention/Public Health measures.

1. Remdesivir, an anti-viral drug, is doing well. According to Prof. Luke O'Neill (Sunday Independent, 3 May 2020) reported that Remdesivir is working on Covid. Dr Fauci, the world renowned immunologist (immunology is the science of the body's defence system) and with the difficult and unenviable task of advising President Trump on medical and scientific

matters, made the announcement on Wednesday 29th April, 2020; he said "The data shows that Remdesivir has a clear-cut and significant positive

effect". The trial was properly run and had adequate numbers. Fauci was involved in research that changed Aids/HIV from a fatal to a treatable condition. Again one commentator said that Remdesivir is not a wonder drug.

2. Plaquenil/Chloroquin or Hydroxychloroquin, the anti-malarial drug, has received bad press in treating Covid Trials have shown that it may interfere with the heart's rhythm (Prolonged QT) and cause cardiac arrest. Its clinical benefit has not been established. (Journal of Medical Virology, 16 April 2020).

3. Vaccine – see below.

o The status of SARS-CoV-2 vaccine development (Univadis Medical News).

The World Health Organization (WHO) has announced that 83 potential COVID-19 vaccine candidates are being assessed, including seven approved for human clinical trials. A report in BMJ highlights what we know so far about possible COVID-19 vaccines. CanSino Biological and the Beijing Institute of Biotechnology currently has the only vaccine candidate in a phase II trial, which uses an adenovirus vector. However, its phase I trial results are pending.

Sinovac's 'PiCoVacc' inactivated-virus vaccine is undergoing a phase I trial and pre-clinical studies report that it confers "complete protection".

The Beijing Institute of Biological Products and the Wuhan Institute of Biological Products is also evaluating a candidate, although information is scarce.

The University of Oxford, UK, has begun a healthy volunteer study for their ChAdOx1 nCoV-19 adenovirus vector and the SARS-CoV-2 spike protein.

Inovio Pharmaceuticals is testing a DNA platform, while Moderna and the US National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases have developed an mRNA-1273 vaccine. The first patients were injected in March.

BioNtech and Pfizer have approval for a trial to evaluate BNT162, which involves four vaccine candidates using different mRNA formats and target antigens.

Despite these advances, the WHO says, countries should not rely on a vaccine to control this pandemic but also on public health measures.

4. Public Health Measures. This is by far our most effective and proven weapon so far. Hopefully the easing of restrictions will not increase the rate of Covid infection. We still need to practice social distancing, hand hygiene, coughing and sneezing protocols etc. I note on the road that mask-wearing when shopping will be on the agenda. It begs the question that if it will be good then, why is it not good now? Czechia/The Czech Republic, with compulsory mask-wearing, has had, compared to its neighbour Austria, very good outcomes. Taiwan also saw great benefits from wearing masks in public.

Message:

1. There are no 'magic bullets' on the immediate horizon.

2. Proved, effective and safe vaccines are some way off.


3. We need to continue to do what works, that is to observe the current public health advice while minimizing the personal and economic damage as much as possible.

With the current lockdown manv companies are placing the resilience and flexibility that technology offers into sharp focus. The benefits of a flexible approach to work will, without doubt, allow a different lifestyle to emerge. As we move back to a 'normal' life it will be interesting to observe how attitudes towards home and work will shift. The benefits of removing the commute to the office will allow more time with family and domestic life. Think of the reduction in our carbon footprint alone, if we collectively reduced commuting miles by 20% or 40% by working from home one or two days per week.

COVID-19 and how it affects Planning Permission

Q&A with Michael O'Keeffe BSc(Hons) MCIAT MCIOB C.Build E MCABE Chartered Architectural Technologist and Director of Kerry-based award-winning architectural practice, healycornelius design ltd. Councillor for the Republic of Ireland Centre CIAT Executive Board Trustee CIAT

In response to the current COVID-19 pandemic, the Minister for Housing, Planning and Local Government issued an order on March 25 which has affected applications for Planning Permission. The order introduced restrictive measures which allows planning departments to pause the progress of planning applications.

This order took effect from 29 March and was due to end on 20 April but has been extended by an additional 19 days, up to and including 9 May 2020.

What does this mean?

A planning authority will now have the normal period of eight weeks, together with an additional period of up to six weeks i.e. up to fourteen weeks in total, to determine a planning application.

Can I submit a Planning Application during this period?

Yes, Local Authorities will continue to register, validate, and upload new applications as

resources allow but, for now, will generally not be processed beyond that.

But my Planning Application has already been lodged - what happens now?

Applications already in the system and where the 5-week period for public submissions has passed these applications can be processed to a decision. However, the period for deciding these applications may be extended by a further 6 weeks (i.e. if a decision is due 27 April, it now becomes due on 8 June).

As for applications in the system that are still within the 5-week consultation period – these applications cannot currently be processed to a decision as the consultation period has been extended (i.e. if the application was submitted after 29 March 2020, the 5 week consultation period now commences on 10 May 2020, meaning the earliest a decision could be made would be 15 June 2020).

Does the emergency legislation affect other planning processes?

Yes, the extended time periods also apply to Development Plans, Planning Enforcement and Planning Appeals (An Bord Pleanála).

What if I decide to wait until the restrictive

measures are lifted?

The statutory planning timeframes will apply as normal, however the planning authorities will have to manage the backlog resulting from the measures introduced in the emergency legislation. It's best to get in the queue as early as possible as a 'first come, first served' policy applies.

Can I extend and alter my home without requiring planning permission?

Irish Govt should champion EP Agri vote to extend CAP by two years at EU Council - Kelleher

Ireland South MEP, Billy Kelleher has said that yesterday's vote by the European Parliament's AGRI Committee to extend the current CAP rules by two years, and to demand a stronger budget should be taken up by the Minister for Agriculture and championed at EU Council level.

The Fianna Fáil MEP was commenting after the Agriculture and Rural Development Committee voted on a report put forward by his Renew Europe colleague, Elsi Katainen from Finland that extends the current Common Agricultural Plan by an additional two years to give stability and certainty to farmers.

"Importantly, the report passed by the Committee also calls for a strengthened budget. This is something that is desperately needed by rural communities - not only because of depressed prices but also because of the economic hardship that the Covid-19 pandemic will bring.

"Farmers want and need regulatory stability and financial certainty if they

are to invest in their futures, and also protect their livelihoods. Now more than ever, food security is on the agenda - without farmers, there is no food let alone security.

"This decision will only matter if it gets approved swiftly by the Council, and I am calling on Minister Michael Creed, the current Irish Agriculture Minister, to take up this opportunity and seek support from across the other 26 member states.

"Right across Europe, farmers and rural communities are suffering. Not only do they need to know what rules will apply to them from the 1st Jan 2021, they also need additional funding. If we want farmers to help deliver a climate-neutral Europe, they need to be in a financially strong position – this proposal gives that ambition hope.

"The European Parliament has done its job. It's now up to national governments, Ireland included, to do theirs," concluded Kelleher.

MISCHIEF

We were great friends and couldn't wait to meet up after school as usual. Ideas for fun might come from something we heard in school, or something we read, or something seen on television that could develop into an adventure of some sort. Television itself was limited and news of the troubles up North was common, but the odd image would catch our mind's eye. Having an equal level of imagination and merging interests we made our own fun, as two twelve-year-old boys.

Our usual activity was playing with our bikes. They were refurbished machines we assembled from old frames, old wheels picked up somewhere, homemade handlebars, and bits of brakes that never seemed to work, to make up what we thought were better than anything new in the shop. They made for fantastic fun, especially when something failed at a critical maneuver. Walking home before dark dragging the bikes behind us was a great time for a chat. We would make plans for the next day to continue a particular trick that wasn't entirely mastered, or more likely one that flopped due to mechanical failure. We would go our separate ways to go home to our dinner and some homework, happy with our few hours play.

Almost all the houses in the estate had televisions with one channel, so we all watched the same thing. I recall being allowed up to watch the news before bedtime. The petrol strike was to continue and my Dad's store of petrol in the corner of the garage next to the house was more important than ever. Politics was over my head at that young impressionable age, but I was very taken by the troubles in the North. We all got to see the black and white images and grainy video footage of the street battles.

The images of the petrol bombs kept playing in my mind as I cuddled up for sleep and I wondered what my buddy would think, he no doubt would have seen the same on the television.

As expected, when we met up the next day, we were on the same wavelength. We had to make a petrol bomb.

We figured the principles were simple. Fill a glass bottle with petrol and attach a cloth rag as a fuse. You would light the fuse and throw the bomb at the enemy where the glass would smash into pieces and the petrol would explode just like on the television.

We worked as a well-trained team. The glass bottle and rag were no trouble to source, and we reckoned the few drops of petrol wouldn't be missed from my Dad's store. We even had a funnel to fill the glass bottle. I opened the five-gallon plastic drum of petrol and, while my best friend held the funnel, we filled the bottle to the brim with petrol. The rag was rolled up and stuffed into the top of the bomb and to make sure the rag would act as a proper fuse we doused it in petrol. We were ready to test our petrol bomb. My fellow soldier had the matches.

I can't remember which one of us lit the match, but I remember the sheer panic that struck us both. The fuse lit up and in an instant we realised we had nowhere to throw the bomb. In the heat of the moment the bottle was dropped to the concrete floor and petrol spilled across the garage floor. The flames flooded our thinking for an instant and we both froze, only to see that the flames travelled rapidly across the floor towards the stored drums. Mother of God, the top was left off the drum we used to fill our bomb and the flames had reached the side of the vessel, licking their way up to the open mouth of the looming explosion that would burn my house to the ground.

In the moment of fight or flight we acted together, to save my house, and pulled the nearby blanket from which the fuse was torn to quench the flames around the petrol drum and after what seemed an eternity we smothered the fire for good. It was going to be hard to explain the black flame shaped marks on the garage wall and, worse than that, the loss of some precious petrol. Mischief indeed.

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KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: COVID-19 AND FUNERALS

This news item was posted on April 3, 2020

If someone close to you has just died, or you know someone who has recently been bereaved, you may have concerns about planning the funeral during the COVID-19 pandemic. We have put together some information about wakes and funerals.

After a bereavement, you should contact your preferred funeral director as soon as you can. During the COVID-19 pandemic, funeral services will remain open as they are an essential service. Funeral directors and undertakers deal with the burial or cremation arrangements. Your funeral director will have the most up-to-date information and know the details of procedures during the pandemic.

Wakes, in homes or in funeral homes, are not advised during the pandemic.

Close family members can still attend funeral services burials and cremation provided the social distancing rules are respected. This relates to all funerals, including those of people who have died of COVID-19. There should not be more than 10 people in a church or at the graveside. This number may need to be smaller in small closed spaces and local churches may have other restrictions.

The Health Protection Surveillance Centre advises close contacts and relatives of the deceased to use their own transport to attend the funeral, where possible.

The Irish Hospice Foundation have suggestions about how to support family members through grief and remembering people we have lost during the pandemic. Following the funeral, you can arrange a memorial service for a later date when restrictions have been lifted. Visit hospicefoundation.ie or call (01) 679 3188.

Information for those affected by bereavement (pdf) is a publication for people who have been recently bereaved. It provides information and advice on practical and material matters that arise following a death. It includes information on what to do immediately after a death, possible social welfare entitlements, tax, financial and legal issues that may arise and where to go for further information and support. 

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

Covid 19 virus has dominated Ireland in almost every way for the past few months. Our hospitals and our nursing homes have been at the frontline in the battle with the dreaded virus. In Macroom, quietly, professionally and determinedly Macroom Community Hospital, Care Choice Care and Cahereen Care Centre have been operating in the teeth of the crisis. Residences like these care for the most fragile and vulnerable in our society.

By April 15th more than half of all Covid-related deaths had occurred in residential care and this gives an idea of the scale of their task. Further the extent of the effect on Residential Centres was initially underestimated and some centres were left short of Personal Protective materials, other medical resources and support which increased the risk to patients and staff. All this raised the stress on patients, their families, and staff members who already had very difficult work.

As a show of solidarity and support, and with prior arrangement and agreement, Macroom GAA Club members visited the forecourts of Care Choice and Cahereen on Sunday April 12th. There was a very good turn out and those present scrupulously observed social distancing. It was heart-warming to see former and current players, older and young, present as well as parents and supporters. Colman Corrigan spoke eloquently on behalf of the club and expressed the club's respect and appreciation for the work being done and to thank them for their dedication and valour. Flowers and chocolates were presented as tokens of regard. The patients and staff appreciated the support and Ms Catherine Buttimer, Director of Nursing in Care Choice, replied in reply. She outlined the difficulties they had had to endure, which included the especially hard ban on visits of relatives and friends, the dedication and excellence of her staff and the importance of public recognition and support for their efforts. This is a community problem and needs a community solution.

Iveleary responded to this reverse with three unanswered points in the final minutes of the half, Finbarr McSweeney, Barry O'Leary and Ciarán Galvin the scorers, and their lead of 1-6 to 1-1 at the break was fully merited.

Man of the Match, Barry Murphy, averted a Canovee goal with a superb intervention immediately on the restart and Cathal Vaughan sent a free high and curling over the bar a minute later to increase the lveleary lead. History Eavan Boland (1944-2020), Quarantine and Macroom



Eavan Boland died, aged 75, this week on April 27th, following a stroke. She was one of Ireland's leading poets and some

of her poems have featured on the Leaving Certificate syllabus. She has been described as a feminist but not a feminist

poet and credited with breaking the mould of Irish poetry by writing about the experiences of women - their strengths, frailties, their history and myths.

One of her most quoted poems is Quarantine which is set in 1847 during the Great Irish Famine, and its theme is the love between a man and a woman enacted in terrible circumstances. The background to the story is the fate of the Buckley Family, Derryleigh, Clondrohid. An t-Athair Peadar Ó Laoghaire, whose life and Cariganime is commemorated by the just published Our Own Story from Carriganime to Castlelyons, recorded the original story.

Patrick and Cáit had two children, Jeremiah and Sheila, and had a small holding in Derryleigh and lived in a cabin. When they Great Irish Famine (or the Hunger as Ó Laoghaire called it) came, the family was starving and had to admit themselves to the Auxiliary Workhouse in Mountmassey House. Conditions there were awful; first Jeremiah died and shortly after Sheila too passed away. Both were buried in the Famine Graveyard in Carrigastyra. After a period, Patrick and Cáit discovered what happened to their children and resolved to leave the Workhouse and make their way home. She at this stage had contracted 'the fever' and was weak. They walked to Carrigastyra and did their grieving over the big hole that passed as a grave. Cáit, weak from sickness and grief, could not walk further, and Patrick put her on his back and carried her home. The following morning both were found dead and her feet were against his chest. His final act of kindness to her was to try to keep her feet warm with the heat of his body.

Boland's poem beautifully captures this story in language that, as one commentator said, with words that most twelve years-olds could easily understand.

Quarantine by Eavan Boland.

In the worst hour of the worst season of the worst year of a whole people a man set out from the workhouse with his wife. He was walking—they were both walking—north. She was sick with famine fever and could not keep up

He lifted her and put her on his back. He walked like that west and west and north. Until at nightfall under freezing stars they arrived.

In the morning they were both found dead. Of cold. Of hunger. Of the toxins of a whole history. But her feet were held against his breastbone. The last heat of his flesh was his last gift to her. Let no love poem ever come to this threshold. There is no place here for the inexact praise of the easy graces and sensuality of the body. There is only time for this merciless inventory: Their death together in the winter of 1847. Also what they suffered. How they lived. And what there is between a man and woman. And in which darkness it can best be proved.

From New Collected Poems, 2008 by Eavan Boland.

The poem - both written and spoken - is available on Google.

Her skill and sensitivity leave a great poetic legacy, which includes chronicling what happened to the Buckley Family, local people in dark times. By capturing that humanity, she gives a pathway to us as to how we should behave in our dark times.

Decalan O'Rourke has a beautiful song, 'Poor Boys Shoes' based on the same story and can be heard through Google.

May Eavan Boland rest in peace.




