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
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EDITORIAL

What is Biodiversity?

It is short for Biological Diversity.

Biodiversity is the variety of life we see around us every day - trees, flowers, insects, mammals, birds and fish.

Biodiversity also includes the habitats or places where plants and animals live. Everything from hedges to woodlands, from tiny streams to large rivers, from your back garden to farmers' field. All these habitats provide a place to live for the many plant and animal species that can be found in the local area.

Why is Biodiversity Important?

Although we may not readily appreciate it, biodiversity provides us with many of the essentials that sustain our own lives - our oxygen, water, food, clothing and places to relax in.

It is important that we protect the wealth of wildlife and habitats in our local area because we are depended on these for our survival and our well-being. The value of biodiversity also

includes the spiritual benefits to be gained from contact with nature in your garden or local park or wherever.

What are the threats to biodiversity?

The main threat is habitat loss, resulting is less plant and animal species. Years of economic development, with increased construction for houses, roads and the likes combined with hedgerow removal for larger farms, and drainage of wetlands have all served to reduce suitable habitats.

Invasive species of non-native plants is a threat, particularly the Japanese Knotweed that is quite common now and being controlled by the Co. Co. The much-admired rhododendron is another threat as it spreads as it kills off the various habitats that existed due to its dense canopy so close to the ground.

One of the local bird species in decline are the swifts, largely due to a reduction in the type of nesting sites that they frequent. They still return to Macroom and can be seen at this time of year. A swift tower has been erected in the mart area with 28 nesting sites, and to date this year these sites are being actively used by sparrows.

What can you do to help?

Another area where there is habitat loss is well manicured lawns and green areas, with grass cut regularly. In terms of biodiversity, these are like deserts. The Government, the Co. Co. and Tidy Towns groups are actively encouraging people to look again at this practice and asking that each estate leave an area dedicated to biodiversity. Likewise, peoples gardens can dedicate some area for biodiversity and plant this with a variety of suitable plants and shrubs. This adds interests, reduces work while at the same time can provide a haven for wildlife, and bees in particular which are essential to our very own survival.

Some practical tips, advice and information will follow in a future Tidy Towns update.

Let's Cook!

The countryside looks beautiful at the moment with the sweetly scented creamy-white flowers of the Elder tree blooming to profusion. Elderflowers are not just pretty they make a delicious, fragrant and refreshing elderflower cordial. If you would like to dip your toe into foraging Elderflowers are a great place to start. The lacy flowers are in bloom for the month of June.

Tip for picking Elderflowers

- Make sure you have identified the elderflower correctly
- Choose a tree away from the dusty roadside
- · Get permission from the landowner before
- Gather on a warm, dry day (never wet)
- · Snip off the flower heads with as little stalk as possible
- Shake off any insect (Do not wash)
- Put gently in a bag
- Use the flowers as soon as possible

ELDERFLOWER CORDIAL

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 dozen heads of Elderflower
- 1.8 kg granulated sugar
- 1.2 litres water
- 2 lemon & 1 lime
- 75 g citric acid
- * Note citric acid may be bought in a chemist.

METHOD:

- 1. Shake the elderflowers to expel any lingering insects, and then place in a large bowl.
- 2. Put the sugar into a pan with the water and bring up to the boil, stirring until the sugar has completely dissolved.
- 3. While the sugar syrup is heating, pare the zest of the lemons and lime off in wide strips and toss

into the bowl with the elderflowers. (A swivel potato peeler does a good job!) Slice the lemons & lime, discard the ends, and add the slices to the bowl. Pour over the boiling syrup, and then stir in the citric acid. Cover with a cloth and then leave at room temperature for 24 hours.

4. Next day, strain the cordial through a sieve lined with muslin (or use a new J cloth), and pour into thoroughly cleaned glass or plastic bottles. Screw on the lids and pop into the cupboard/fridge ready to use.

Dilute with water or sparkling water. A splash can also be added to fresh fruit salads.

Here is a recipe to make the most of seasonal rhubarb and local strawberries which have so much more flavour than their foreign jet-lagged imported relatives!

RHUBARB AND STRAWBERRY **CRUMBLE**

INGREDIENTS:

For the Filling

2 bunches rhubarb stalks, trimmed and sliced 2cm

1 punnet strawberries, hulled and halved

100 grams granulated sugar

1-1/2 tablespoons cornflour

For the Topping

100 g flour

100 g light brown sugar

2 tablespoons granulated sugar

Pinch of salt

85g unsalted butter, cut into 2 cm cubes

75 g porridge oats

60 g chopped pecans/almonds

METHOD

Preheat the oven to 175°C.

For the Filling

In a large bowl, combine the rhubarb, strawberries,

sugar and cornflour. Mix until the fruit is evenly coated with the sugar mixture, and the sugar mixture is no longer white.

Transfer the fruit mixture to a 2 litre or 20-cm baking dish and set aside while you prepare the topping.

For the Topping

Combine the flour, brown sugar, granulated sugar and salt in a mixing bowl. Add the cold butter and rub-in until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs, with a few pea-sized clumps of butter within. Stir in the oats and chopped pecans.

Spoon the topping evenly over the fruit without packing down. Bake for 45-55 minutes, until the fruit is bubbling around the edges and the topping is golden brown. Serve warm with whipped cream or a scoop of ice cream.

Note: If your baking dish is shallow, place it on top of a foil-lined sheet pan to catch any spills that might bubble over the edges.

As both rhubarb and strawberries have a highwater content the cornflour helps to thicken the released juices as the fruit cooks.

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COVID 19 UPDATE

Introduction: Tuesday 26th May 2020 was a red-letter day for the Republic because no new Covid-related death was recorded since the country's first confirmed loss on March 11th. It took seventy six days to reach that point, and it felt like a heavy burden was lifted, and yes, we could see days like this again. It gave a pep to our step, and collectively cheered the whole country. All sorts of possibilities opened up; we might get a government, maybe Cork will do the All-Ireland senior double and Ireland will win world cups in rugby, soccer and ladies hockey. But we better get back to reality.

Our current situation:

at the moment and while the urgency is great, care has to be taken that the research is of a high quality. There has been news on testing and more good studies on the use of remdesivir have been published. And there has been a reaction to President Trump's use of chloroquine or hydroxychloroquine.

Most at risk of getting Covid?

The New England Journal of Medicine (NEJM) published a diagram outlining the risk of contracting Covid and what advice to following re precautions, mask-wearing and work.

As the figures in Table 1 confirm, Ireland's greatest dangers were in residential care centres which had the biggest concentration of elderly people,

diagnosis. Faecal or anal tests may confirm diagnosis. III (PCR = polymerase chain reaction). 2. Our immune system is our bodies' defence system. Antibodies are formed to attack invaders like viruses. There are three types of antibodies and they work in different ways; they also take a while to get going and different people produce antibodies to a different degree. There is no established correlation between what one measures and how effective it was/is. So there is no simple blood test that has all the answers. All tests of antibody tests have some false negatives and some false positives. Dr Mary Keogan, an Immunologist in Beaumount Hospital, Dublin, made the above and following points in an ICGP webinar on Wed. 27 May 2020. She summarised the situation as follows:

- A. A positive result in a well performing test indicates probable exposure.
- B. Does a negative result mean that the person is not infected? NO.
- C. Does a positive result mean the person is no longer infectious? NO
- D. Does a positive infection mean that the person is immune? We Do Not Know.

So you can see this is not a simple field. Coupled with the above is the quality of some of the tests. The Covid virus is new and already has shown an ability to mutate and change. As an expert in Nature wrote 'The immunology of Covid is a mystery' and much work is needed to unlock its secrets.

Tests have value as part of a clinical assessment, assessing how much infection there is in the community, or in specific groups such as health-care workers, and measuring response to vaccination.

The next time someone is pushing a test that will give a 'definitive' answer, please keep the above in mind. $\ensuremath{\mathsf{IV}}$

Treatments:

Remdesivir is an anti-viral drug and was noted to be effective in vitro, that is in the laboratory, against the Covid virus. It has proved, so far, to be the best anti-Covid drug but is not a 'magic bullet'. Recently ' the results of a phase 3 manufacturer-conducted trial suggest that remdesivir had an effect on patients with

- The figures are taken from The Health Protection Surveillance Centre, and most were published in the Irish Times. The figures refer to the previous days' total.
- 1. By I June 1,652 people have died of a disease first identified in China in December 2019.
- 2. Almost 55% of deaths have taken place in residential settings. If we had got that right, our numbers would be even smaller.
- 3. The numbers of new cases and newly reported deaths have fallen dramatically.
- 4. Our current strategy is working.
- 5. Some figures are inconsistent; this is due to later corrections and refinements.

Other facts:

- 1. The Reproductive Rate or Infectivity Rate is 0.4 0.5, which means the virus is spreading at a very slow rate. (It takes two infected people to infect one other, ten to infect five and so on).
- 2. Dublin has about 48% of recorded cases. (Cities and densely populated centres have the greatest concentrations of cases).
- 3. Cork has about 6% of recorded cases.
- 4. Seven residential care settings have had each more than 20 Covid-related deaths.
- 5. The mean/average age of those who died was in the mid-80s.

Development/New Research:

There is a huge amount of research on-going

and in many cases, the staff were inadequately protected. About 30% of Irish hospital carers were infected. Some staff circulated between several care centres. Thankfully this situation has been addressed and improved.

One of the reasons why children under 10 have low rates of infection lies in the fact that they lack ACE2 receptors in their noses – the receptors acts as gateway. For the Covid virus to cause damage it must enter cells. We are all familiar with pictures showing spikes on the virus and the virus uses these spikes to attach to cells and gain entry. Younger children do not have the 'doors' to allow entry. As people age more receptors develop.

This is not the full story as some children are badly affected by a Kawasaki-type illness where blood vessels become inflamed, and is a serious, often fatal disease; {inflammation – 'red, hot, swollen and tender' - and think of getting a kick in the shin and the body's reaction to it}. I

Covid Testing:

1. Swab testing: This is called a PCR-Screening test and its reliability and accuracy depends on its timing and how well the sample is taken. It is not 100% accurate - some Chinese studies suggested 30%inaccuracy rates -, and may need to be repeated several times. Sometimes CT scans may be warranted to establish the

moderate COVID-19 who were hospitalized with pneumonia but didn't have reduced oxygen levels. Patients who received 5 days of remdesivir had a higher rate of improving at least one point on a 7-point ordinal scale by day 11, compared with those who received standard care alone (76% vs. 66%). Findings for 10 days' remdesivir were not statistically significant'. v According to this, our best drug has a moderate effect in some cases.

In another NEJM piece on Remdesivir treatment in more severely affected patients this appeared: 'Remdesivir treatment duration: For patients with severe COVID-19 not requiring mechanical ventilation, 5 days of remdesivir may be as beneficial as 10 days, according to an open-label, industry-supported study in the New England Journal of Medicine. Nearly 400 patients with severe COVID-19 pneumonia were randomized to intravenous remdesivir for 5 or 10 days. At 14 days, 65% of patients in the 5-day group and 54% in the 10-day group had a clinical improvement of at least 2 points on a 7-point scale. After adjustment for baseline differences in disease severity, there was no significant difference in clinical improvement between the groups. The authors caution that "with no placebo control ... the magnitude of benefit cannot be determined." Editorialists advise "In our current era of limited remdesivir supplies, priority should be given to a 5-day remdesivir regimen for patients at the early stages of severe disease."

Chloroquine: President Trump is reported to take Chloroquine as a preventative against contracting Covid. There is no evidence to support that it works either to prevent or cure Covid illnesses. His use and his advocacy were met with incredulity by most doctors and scientists. Not only is it not effective, sometimes it can interfere with the heart's rhythm and cause death through cardiac arrest. His comments were attacked in the reputable medical journal,

The Lancet. Trump's announcements led to a huge upsurge in the use of chloroquine causing a scarcity of supply. Chloroquine is very effective and useful in conditions such as Lupus, and its scarcity may lead to these patients being left without an appropriate and necessary drug. This is another NEJM extract:' Surge in hydroxychloroquine prescriptions: In the week that President Donald Trump promoted use of hydroxychloroquine and chloroquine in a press conference, prescriptions for the drugs (less than 28 tablets) surged nearly 2000% compared with the same week the previous year, researchers report in JAMA. In total, there were roughly 500,000 excess fills of hydroxychloroquine/ chloroquine from Feb. 16 to Apr. 25, 2020, compared with a similar period in 2019. Separately, a survey by the Lupus Research Alliance found that 36% of some 330 patients with lupus had difficulty filling or could not fill their regular hydroxychloroquine prescriptions during this time.

Recent Research on Social Distancing;

In May 2020 the Journal of the American Medical Association reported that Stay-at- Home orders were 'associated with a slowing of Covid hospitalizations in Colorado, Minnrsota, Ohio and Virginia'. Science journal reported a German study comparing the effectiveness of cancelling large events, school closures and, lastly, contact banning and closure of nonessential stores. Only 'contact banning and closure of nonessential stores . . stopped exponential growth of the epidemic'.


Summary and what to do?

- 1. The data tells us that Covid hasn't gone away but it much less widespread and causing less havoc than in February to April 2020.
- 2. Remdesivir is the only drug that is partially effective in treating Covid illnesses. Chloroquine has no proved clinical benefit, and can be fatal in some.
- 3. Social Distancing, isolation, hand hygiene,

proper cough/sneezing etiquette, surfacecleaning and mask-wearing are the only proven effective tools in our battle with Covid.

Finally there are reports coming from Italy that the virus there seems to be weakening. However these need to be verified and evaluated, and see if they apply to Ireland. In the meantime care, caution and doing what works semms to be our best option.

Home Again - By Mary Harmon

Our house was full of laughter. It was a house that attracted visitors of all types and ages and at the core of this attraction was my parents. They worked hard all their lives but never lost their sense of fun and both enjoyed a good joke so when you entered our home, you did so at your own peril. Strange tasting tea, exploding cigarettes and itching powder down-the-neck were all part of the norm. My mother was a keen frequenter of joke shops and liked to use friends and family as her human guinea pigs. The first timers made the easiest targets, the long-time sufferers would generally be more cautious but could still find themselves falling for some new prank.

My father was very interested in the 'affairs of the heart' and was in the habit of making matches for his daughters, the older and uglier the man the better. 'Marry a rich old farmer with a bad cough' was his constant refrain. He never got excited or panicked about anything and like my mother, he believed life was to be enjoyed not endured.

Like most Irish emigrants, my parents longed to return home and their wish was granted in the late 1970s when we left England and moved to Ireland to live. My father built a bungalow and we lived on a farm with cattle, sheep, hens, dogs and cats and best of all, pet lambs and calves. We had one cow whose milk we used for the house. The cow had to be milked by hand every day and then the milk was strained through a muslin cloth. My father tried to teach us all how to milk the cow but only my sister was successful in this endeavour.

To encourage an interest in farming, we got a calf each, on the condition we got up early every Saturday and fed and looked after them. My brother and I, had identical twin Aberdeen Angus calves, totally black and very tame. I named my calf Mathilda and my brother named his Sooty. Poor Sooty got louping-ill and afterwards could no longer walk straight so he was rechristened Wibbly-Wobbledy.

There were a lot of big changes for us children to get used to, our parents had returned 'home' but it took a long time for us to adjust to leaving our home in England and moving to Ireland, from living in a big sprawling town and all the amenities and activities it offered, to moving to a small rural village. The biggest change was in the modern school we left behind us with hundreds of pupils to the old-fashioned school we now attended, where the only source of heat came from a turf fire at the top of the classroom and in winter it was so cold we had to wear our coats to keep warm.


We soon made new friends and we gloried in our new found freedom, the joy of been able to run around the fields shouting out loud and no neighbours to complain!












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History

Mrs Joan Murphy, Maynooth and Sr. Bernard (Murphy), a Macroom and Presentation Nun, Maynooth

Interview by Con Kelleher

Mrs Murphy (75) made contact with Ms Josephine Cronin-Lovell, Lee Valley Enterprise Board, regarding a good news story about a Macroom nun she first met when she was in second class in Maynooth convent. Macroom in this case probably means the wider area. Mother Borgia was a nun and a cousin, and this connection may help to identify Sr Bernard. Sr. Bernard left a lifelong impression on her young pupil by giving her a love of books. Joan was anxious to tell the story of great work done by a kindly nun many years ago. In recent times nuns have often had a 'bad press' and little is heard of the fantastic good that they and other religious did. This piece relates a nun's good deeds in the 1950s.

Joan's personal history is fascinating and told beautifully and gives a window into the era in which she was a child. She herself was a surprise as her mother was forty-five when she was a born. Her elder by 61/2 years was not pleased at her arrival. For example, she said that there was no secondary school in Maynooth (population of about 2,000-3,000) in the 1950-60s, just a commerce school that lasted only a few years. It gave it the town the unusual distinction of having national schools and a university but no second level school. St Patrick's College, Maynooth, the national seminary, was cut off from the town and especially young females. The gates were open to the public only during the summer months when the clerical students were home on holidays. Although her mother was a teacher and her father a Garda sergeant, she attended Lucan Vocational School when it had had a two-year cycle. In spite of her love of books and intelligence, it was decided to send her to Lucan Vocational.

Sr. Bernard was a 'phenomenal person', a great teacher and a very kindly pleasant person. She was a tall strong lady with a gentle voice and infectious enthusiasm. She loved books and transmitted that affection to her pupils. Books were then scarce and expensive, and Joan's greatest pleasure was to get a book for Christmas or as a birthday present. Sr Bernard set up a library in the convent school for children and adults - and adults came on Saturdays. She sourced books from Foyles Library, a bookshop in O'Connell Street, Dublin - westerns, detectives, romances and so on. Enid Blyton, Agatha Christie, Conan Doyle, Daphne Du Maurier are some of the authors mentioned and read by Joan. Further, Sr Bernard brought and showed films to her audiences. These measures opened the minds and imaginations of her young charges and townspeople to the vast world outside - its geography, cultures and literature. For a young girl with a love of reading it was like being given the keys to heaven. Joan must have been very keen as Sr. Bernard asked her to help with library work. Joan was delighted with the 'honour' and appreciated the recognition.

There was a sewing factory in Maynooth, and Joan's ambition was to work there after school. However, at age fifteen, in 1960, Joan's first job was in Foyle's Library and this was arranged by the good nun. Later Joan moved to another book shop in Dublin in which there was a locked cupboard. Book censorship was operating at the time and authors such as Edna O'Brien, Ernest Hemingway, Frank O'Connor, James Joyce and John McGahern had books banned, but some books could be ordered. These 'special' books were kept in the cupboard, literally under lock and key, and Joan was tempted to, but never bold enough, to read secretly the material.

Married in 1965 at age twenty Joan had five children. When circumstances allowed, she worked as a cook/housekeeper to priests first, and later nuns. The nuns even changed their dinnertime to ensure Joan was doing the cooking. As well as being a superb cook, Joan was gifted at dressmaking. She had only some national school sewing lessons and went to the Grafton Academy for night-lessons, after she began working. She made 'every stitch' the children wore including school clothes, and communion and confirmation outfits. When the children were reared, she travelled widely with her husband, Jim, who was an ESB supervisor. New Zealand and Australia were among her destinations. Jim's father worked with the Gore-Booths and later was a manager-cumvalet to Count John McCormack, the great singer. Jim's mother, much younger than her husband, and again later in her life, worked for Lord and Lady Carew of Celbridge, and their daughter Diana Connolly-Carew represented Ireland in showjumping. Joan's children went to university and one is currently an intensive-care nurse and one of our angels of mercy.

Unfortunately, Joan lost Jim, her husband, to cancer six weeks ago and is in mourning. Jim had been very ill and survived some very low points to rally and improve. However, he passed away in February 2020. They had a good life together and she described him as a great husband, father and provider, and she had the consolation of having travelled the world with him. Her children are mostly nearby and are very supportive. Allied to that she has many friends and she enjoys bridge in person and on-line. Covid 19 and cocooning doesn't bother her much and she makes great use of modern technology to keep in touch.

It was a pleasure to talk to Joan, to hear her

story and that of Sr Bernard. She must have 'exchanged atoms' with Sr. Bernard, like one of Myles na gCopeleen's characters, because she sounded so sharp, pleasant and interesting. It would be great to establish who Sr. Bernard was and whence she came, but at this remove, that may not be possible. To hear one great lady, talk about another was uplifting and it was rewarding to put on record the enduring influence that a kindly nun had on a young girl in Maynooth in the 1950s.

The interview was done by phone, and recorded, and amendments were made by e-mail; no bother to the intrepid Joan at 75.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: PUBLIC HOLIDAY ENTITLEMENT

Question: I work full-time, Monday to Friday, but the business will be closed on Monday 28th October. Will I get paid for the day?

Answer: Monday 28 October 2019 is a public holiday and as you would normally be due in work you are entitled to get your normal pay for the day.

If you did work on Monday 28, you would be entitled to your pay for the day and one of the following alternatives:

- · An additional day of annual leave
- · An additional day's pay
- · A paid day off within a month of the public holiday

If you are not normally rostered to work on a public holiday you are entitled to one-fifth of your weekly pay as compensation for the public holiday.

Part-time employees also qualify for a public holiday entitlement, when they have worked at least 40 hours in total in the 5 weeks before the public holiday.

If you are not getting your public holiday entitlement, you may make a complaint under the Organisation of Working Time Act within 6 months. You must use the online complaint form (pdf) from the Workplace Relations Commission.

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Applications open for Cork County Restart Grant for Small Businesses

Online applications can now be made to Cork County Council for the Restart Grant for small businesses. As part of the Governments package of supports, this €250m fund will give direct grant aid to micro and small businesses to help them with the costs associated with reopening and reemploying workers following COVID-19 closures. Between €2,000 and €10,000 of direct aid is available to businesses based on commercial rates bill from 2019.

The grant will be available to businesses with a turnover of less than €5m and employing 50 people or less, which were closed or impacted by at least a 25% reduction in turnover out to June 30, 2020. It is a contribution towards the cost of re-opening or keeping a business operational and re-connecting with employees and customers.

Mayor of the County of Cork, Councillor Ian Doyle commenting on the Restart Grant spoke of the importance of supporting local businesses, "Your local café, hairdresser, boutique or home store create that wonderful atmosphere that we have across Cork County. These small but very important businesses have had to close their doors for the last number of weeks but now we want to help them to reopen."

Chief Executive of Cork County Council Tim Lucey also highlighted how the Restart Grant will assist small businesses get back on their feet,

"Cork County has a wide range of businesses which are at the very heart of our communities. Cork County Council is investing in communities and our businesses, we can plan with a degree of confidence. As part of Project ACT, we are Activating County Towns and the Restart Fund will offer another level of support to businesses at a time when they most need it."

Mayor Doyle went on to say, "Cork County Council has established 23 Town Teams under Project ACT which will deliver individual plans and ensure, at the most local level, that we reopen and support our local economy. The Restart Grant is a very welcome addition to facilitate businesses in opening their doors

as part of our national phased roadmap."

of applications but, as far as possible, will be prioritised according to scheduled re-opening dates in the national roadmap.

The Restart Grant is part of the wider €12 billion package of supports for businesses of all sizes, which includes grants, low-cost loans, write-off of commercial rates and deferred tax liabilities, all of which will help to improve cashflow amongst SMEs.

CORK COUNTY OLDER PEOPLE'S COUNCIL URGES "C.A.R.E." AS TOWNS REOPEN

New guidelines designed to ensure older people feel comfortable after cocooning

As towns across County Cork prepare to re-open, the Cork County Older People's Council is asking the wider population, communities and business generally to be alert to the needs of older people. Project ACT, Cork County Council's initiative to help activate the county's towns during the COVID-19 crisis, has put support for the older population at the centre of its roll-out plans. Details are currently being finalised in 23 towns for the temporary redistribution of road space for motorists and pedestrians, usage of outdoor space, the need for temporary pedestrianisation measures, street furniture, repainting of pedestrian crossings, and parking management.

Each Town Team is to consider the Council's new CARE guidelines, which have been prepared through extensive consultation with the Cork County Older People's Council, in any decision made to ensure all members of society are treated equally with equal access to services. These guidelines ask people to observe the following; CONSIDER older and vulnerable people's needs

as they re-join our communities after weeks of cocooning and isolation.

ASSIST older and vulnerable people by respecting age-friendly parking spaces and accessible parking spaces for people with disabilities in our towns, villages and shopping centres.

RESPECT physical distancing for older and vulnerable people and give them space on our streets, parks and walkways.

EMPATHISE with older and vulnerable people and understand that they may feel especially anxious at this time.

Liz Maddox, Chairperson of the Cork County Older People's Council says, "People who have been cocooning are as eager as anybody to get back into towns and live the fullest life possible after weeks of isolation. There will be a natural anxiety amongst this more vulnerable group, and we are asking everyone across society to be conscious of this as our towns re-open. What we are asking is that people be considerate, assist where they can, respect social distancing and empathise with those who feel vulnerable. There has been tremendous community spirit in recent weeks."

The CARE guidelines have been drafted as part of the Cork Age-Friendly County Programme, an initiative of Cork County Council. The Cork Older People's Council is a representative group of older people from across the county whose role is to represent the "voice of the older person", and guide the Council in its policies, operations and service delivery.

Mayor of the County of Cork, Cllr Ian Doyle highlighted how the Council's CARE guidelines ensure consistently in terms of physical, economic

and social opportunities for members of the older population, "Ageing is a matter that will affect us all and I want to see such valued members of our society enjoy the very best quality of life. Following weeks of cocooning it is vital to ensure that when our older population venture into our towns, they feel supported and safe in doing so."

Chief

of Cork County Council Tim Lucey says, "When activating our county towns, we have to be conscious of all of those who will use them. Project ACT involves a €6 million investment in supporting communities and businesses, but most importantly, supports our citizens. Everyone should feel as safe as possible, and that is one of the key drivers for our Town Teams in the decisionmaking process. We have all rallied to support older people since the start of this crisis, and I am very confident that people will embrace the spirit of the CARE guidelines as normal activity returns in the weeks and months ahead."

The CARE message is being distributed via social media, signage in car parks and parks, and through support from other community bodies such as the GAA and an Garda Siochána.

Duhallow, despite playing against the wind, were on top early on and sorely troubling the stretched Muskerry defence, led by 0-5 to 0-3 at the end of the first quarter, Liam Seartan, Seán Kiely and Daniel Goulding the Muskerry scorers. Duhallow struck the first decisive blow in the 17th minute when a corner forward left loose at the corner of the square had the Muskerry net shaking. A Word of Victory

Welcome back dear reader last week we heard from someone whose life who transformed by the love of God - a wonderful testimony of God's goodness.
