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
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
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Macroom Artist Feature

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

Access; Six people only allowed in the Library at any one time. Internal layouts in many of our libraries have changed, with less or no seating available. Please follow signage. Children under 12 years of age must always be accompanied by

Check in; There will be Return bins inside the door so please drop your returns into these bins. All returns will be quarantined for 72 hours.

Limited Browsing; There will be 20 minutes allocated to each person to choose their book. It may be a good idea to think what you want in advance by visiting the online catalogue or browsing "Who writes like?" and "Who else?" on our website; corkcoco.ie/en/library-services

Services: Study spaces, newspaper/magazine reading, and events are not currently available. If you wish to read The Corkman, The Irish Independent and The Examiner, come to the library and open Pressreader on your phone or tablet using the library WiFi and you will be able to access these papers from anywhere for five days. There are many other papers you can read also.

I.T Services: 20 minutes Internet/WiFi sessions will be available only. It is advisable to book in advance. Printing and Photocopying services will be available but please make sure that you have exact change.

Also, you will be expected to wipe down any equipment that you touch during your visit such as computers, photocopier etc. before and after use with the hygiene items provided.

Check out: Please follow instructions from Staff. Please remember to sanitize your hands as you enter the library and perform good respiratory hygiene.

Remember to social distance at the entrance, the public counter and throughout the library at all times. Do not visit the library if you or someone in your household has symptoms of COVID -19 or you are a confirmed case.

If you have borrowed items and then you, a household member or a close contact of a confirmed case develops symptoms, you should not return borrowed items until you have completed a 14-day isolation period and are fever free for the last 5 days.

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MACROOM DISCUSSES: Macroom Community School, Overdue, Planned?

The Community Schools concept developed in 1970 from the Comprehensive Schools of the 1960's, these were designed to fill gaps in second level education supply in new towns (Shannon) and isolated locations (Cootehill, Tarbert). The Comprehensives were just that - The School for All.

Revision of the plan in the 1970s under Sean O'Connor, Secretary of the Department of Education, gave the school planning more local -'community'- involvement. There was then a list of about 100 locations in Ireland where a Community School was needed or would be required, places where there was no school or where replacement of smaller existing schools would be necessary.

The Department stopped promoting the community schools project in the late 1970s as the idea, had literally, taken off. From those beginnings there are now 80+ Community Schools including Cork County, Ballincollig, Kinsale, Millstreet. Castletownbere, Passage West, Carrigaline and Youghal.

And most recently Skibbereen. Skibbereen, where the three amalgamating schools were a VEC College, a Mercy secondary ad a DeLaSalle Secondary.

Why not Macroom?

It is very clear that the idea of a 'single sex school' is out of date where equality is the word of the 21st century. Equal opportunity for all, equal access to all the subjects for all young people. Engineering for girls and Food Industry for boys are not unreal directions, it rather makes sense where roles are no longer defined by gender. We live together, we argue

together, we give and take together. Why should we go to schools dividing "Girls, Over here" and "Boys, over there"? Social and psychological research today indicates that single sex schools do their own students no special favours, either in mental health or social skills.

Gone are the days when the nuns and the brothers and the tech prevailed independently. Certainly, good work wad one by both the religious and lay teachers – for the girls and the guys who got there! But ideal for today

Times change. Who would have considered a "Lady Teacher" in DeLeSalle in 1970? Or what was a board of Management or a Parents association in 1970? All the Staffrooms have all since been integrated, it is time the classrooms were also.

In recent decades, Macroom has had three separate new schools built. No marks for vision there.

Economically, a Community School makes unarguably good sense, the Department builds one school instead of Three, the enrolment numbers of about 900 allows the development of so many things smaller schools cannot do. A Community School provides an equality based non selective, comprehensive, co-educational, practical and academic programme.

A community the size of Macroom is ideally placed to benefit.

It is time this issue was actively considered, planning immediately might deliver Macroom Community School in this decade.

Bring Him Home The Search for Ronan

My brother Ronan, a long-term chronic depression and schizophrenia patient, was admitted to Cork University in the summer of 2005 to undergo treatment with the breakthrough drug, Clozapine. However despite our family's misgivings and protestations and against our wishes, he was discharged before he had time to become fully accustomed to this new medication.

Shortly afterwards he disappeared. He had very little money and no mobile phone. He had no passport and since all he had was a bus-pass, we convinced ourselves that he had just gone to Dublin for a few days. However following two weeks of no word and futile searching in Ireland, we took a

decision to go to the national media to appeal for help.

As a result of intensive media coverage, including the RTE News and the national press, we finally discovered that Ronan had somehow managed to fly to the UK on the day of his disappearance. Our search then moved

Although forewarned of the seemingly insurmountable difficulties involved, my elder brother Martin and I, managed to crack the London

media, garner the assistance of Scotland Yard and bluffed our way into the Irish Embassy in London.

During our search we witnessed at first hand the appalling isolation and despair of the homeless in Ireland and London. We saw the darker side of London. We also encountered enormous support, assistance and goodwill from the most unexpected quarters. Against all the odds, we broke down wall after wall and with perseverance and some good fortune, we eventually found our brother, Ronan.

Following a period of care in London, Ronan returned home to Cork, where he lives to this day, safe and sound – a dearly loved member of our large family.

Ronan's story is timeless and is not only about mental health and homelessness. It is also about love, despair, hope and determination. It is about achieving the impossible.

I have been asked may times to write this story, but I feel this is the moment to do so. The story deals with the two biggest human-interest topics in the public and media forums at the moment. The homeless situation in Ireland and is now at crisis point. While there are numerous causes and reasons for homelessness, research shows that it is related to and often overlaps with the growing incidence of serious mental health issues, particularly in young men.

This is a unique and special story which I intend to market aggressively through radio, television and other media platforms as a means of highlighting the current crisis in Irish mental health care and the growing number of people needlessly living and dying on the streets of Ireland.









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

When I was much younger than I am now we just called it going on holidays because most of us holidayed in Ireland if we holidayed at all. For many the holidays consisted of day trips to the beach or to visit relatives in 'the country'. I was a city girl of city parents and by the time I was about 6 years old my family had settled on a 2 week holiday in West Cork every summer. We rented a house in Reenogreena, Glandore. The people who owned it lived and worked the adjacent dairy farm and I was lucky because they had three daughters around my age. I had the best two weeks of the year there every summer. I helped the girls with the work they had to do on the farm and once the jobs were done we were off! Down the lane to the little cove where we swam and we picnicked, we built forts out of ferns, we climbed rocks, we laughed, we talked, we sang, we read and we had such fun. Other days we'd tackle up the donkey and cart and take churns of milk to the creamery – yes really!! We were children growing up in the 70's - and for two weeks every summer, regardless of the weather, I was living the dream!!

When I think back on those days I realise we were, what they now refer to as, staycationing, we were trend setters!! So if you are disappointed not to be heading abroad this summer I strongly recommend a staycation!! I also suggest that you visit your local library before you head off and stock up on some reading material and also check out the large selection of books available on the various scenic drives, cycle-ways, walks and activities around Ireland, as well as information on local attractions and places of interest. You could even check out some audio books to keep everyone entertained during car trips. Bring your library card on holiday too and drop into any library along your way to return the books you've finished and to replenish your stock.

Before you go make sure you have enrolled all the children in the Summer Stars Reading Adventure so that they can keep track of their reading during their holiday. Here in Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne we have lots of books to keep our Summer Stars readers busy. I know some parents are finding it difficult to juggle library visits with everything else that has to be done and it's not as simple now to pop to the village with the children and do the shopping, library visit etc all in one trip. If it's easier for any parent to just pop in alone to enrol the children as Summer Stars and chose some books to take home that's perfect. Each child enrolled will get a reading card, bookmark, colouring/activity sheets and there will be some spot prizes. Carraig an Aifrinn is a symbol of the injustice people suffered in the not so distant past. It still stands as a reminder that restrictions and oppression are transient and will





History

CROOKSTOWN THROUGH THE YEARS TO THE LISSARDA **AMBUSH**

In an excellent article in the Southern Star in July 1978 on the place names of Kilmurry, the late Domhnall O Buachalla explains that 'the name Crookstown was first in the townland of Inchirahilly but following the transfer of the post office across the River Bride, the name has since been applied to the growing village in Lower Bellmount.'

Crookstown in a way tells its own story with the description of the various junctions around the village. On the eastern approach, Pound Cross refers to the field where animals were held in former times. The Minister's Cross refers to the junction at the former Rectory of the Church of Ireland. The New Line refers to the road to Bandon, opened by Daniel O'Connell in the 1820s, and the Stage Cross on the Cork-Macroom road refers to the junction opposite Crookstown House which was at one time the place where horses were changed for the coach.

The growth of the village probably began with the construction by the Herrick family of Bellmount Mills in the early 1800s and the decision in 1822 to construct a road from Moviddy to Bantry, the Bantry Line. When the Cork-Bandon railway opened in 1849, horse drawn coaches brought tourists from Bandon on trips to Gougane Barra with a refreshment stop at Crookstown.

The opening of the Cork-Macroom Railway in 1866 with a station at Crookstown Road, near Castlemore, presented a great opportunity for expanding trade and tourism and was used extensively by the existing businesses of Bellmount Mills and the Castlemore lime kilns. Sunday excursions to the extensive grounds of Ryecourt and Warrenscourt were very popular, especially with people from Cork City. The stationmaster at Crookstown in 1909 was Denis Lynch. He had occupied the position for 43 years since the inception of the line. Denis Lynch died on the 29th April 1909 but had suffered a period of ill health for some time. His daughter, Maggie, had faithfully and efficiently carried out his duties during this time and following his death, there was a widespread wish amongst locals, shareholders and the Parish Priest, Canon John O'Mahony, to have her appointed to the position. The directors of the company declined to appoint her, saying that 'while competency is not questioned, her sex alone is debarred'.

On the 29th December 1907, Archbishop Daniel Murphy of Hobart, Tasmania died. He was born at Bellmount on the 15th June 1815 and was consecrated Bishop at Kinsale on the 11th October 1845, just as the Great Famine began in Ireland. At this time he was the youngest bishop in the world and at the time of his death he was the oldest. He was one of the clergy that officiated at the funeral of Daniel O'Connell in Rome in 1847, at the church of Sant Andre Della Valle and made several trips to his homeland. He erected a headstone to his parents in St. Mary's graveyard, Kilmurry and a statue of the Blessed Virgin which the bishop brought home from Tasmania is in the collection of Independence Museum Kilmurry.

On Easter Sunday, April 23rd, 1916, Tom Hales and others of the Ballinadee and Bandon Companies stayed at Horgans Pub in Crookstown following the dismissal of the Volunteers at Macroom. They had been en route to Carriganima to take delivery of weapons from the Aud. The publican, Denis Horgan, a native of Banteer, had competed in the London Olympics of 1908, winning a silver medal for the shot-putt and had won numerous Irish titles

On the 18th June 1916, Patrick Howard of Bellmount Mills died and later that year, two local merchants, Peter Twomey and Jeremiah O'Regan, purchased the business of Howard Bros. Their names still adorn the premises of Michael and Bríd McSwiney (Twomey) and Kathleen Cahill (J. O'Regan). Peter Twomey, a native Irish speaker from Ballyvourney, had come to Crookstown in the 1870s with his cousin, Mike Kelly. Mike Kelly was the grandfather of Michael McSwiney, the present owner of Twomey's.

In early 1917, a Constable McCarthy returned to Castlemore Barracks in an intoxicated state and had to be locked in a cell for his own and the other constables' protection. His behaviour led to an internal inquiry which was conducted by District Inspector Wansbrough and District Inspector Swanzy. District Inspector Swanzy would be infamously involved in the murder of Tomás MacCurtain on the 20th March 1920. Castlemore Barracks was burned by the IRA on the 3rd April 1920.

Even in troubled times, normal life has to go on and during the 1916 - 1920 period, fairs, farm sales, hunting and sport in general carried on. There was a strong desire in Crookstown for a village hall to provide a venue for the growing interest in drama, Irish lessons and technical classes. A meeting was held on 21st April 1918 and a committee was formed to advance the project which had the backing of Canon Tracy. A site was donated by Howard Brothers and the new hall was opened on Sunday, the 4th August 1940, with a showing of the film, From the Manger to the Cross, based on the life of Jesus.

The end of the First World War in November 1918 saw the beginning of a pandemic known as The Spanish Flu. Captain John Reginald Tonson-Rye of Ryecourt, having survived the war, succumbed to the flu on the 25th May 1919, aged 39 years. He is buried at the Mazargues War Cemetery in Marseilles, France. In Crookstown, from the 12th November to the 25th November 1918, six

members of the McSweeney family, including two children, died of the flu and are buried in Moviddy graveyard. The McSweeneys' had a tailoring and drapery business but following their deaths, the business was run by Jeremiah Keane and his wife, Mary. This would become an important safe house during the War of Independence, frequented by Tom Barry, amongst others. In his book, Guerilla Days in Ireland, Barry describes using the alias Ted Ryder of Crookstown to travel to Dublin, posing as a medical student. Ted Ryder lived at Knockaneroe and like Tom Barry, his father had been an RIC man, James Ryder from Co. Mayo.

On Sunday, 15th August, at around 2pm, the Manchester Regiment, based at Ballincollig, drove to Srelane, Ovens where the Srelane Fife and Drum Band had their rehearsal hall. They piled stooks of oats from Casey's field against the hall and set it alight, destroying it. The apparent reason for their action was that members of the band had painted the tricolour on the chimney of the hall stove. This reaction by the British authorities to the smallest expression for independence was a frequent occurrence at this time.

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

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Following his arrest and imprisonment, Terence MacSwiney, Lord Mayor of Cork, went on hunger strike in Brixton Prison. On the 1st September 1920, a notice was placed in The Cork Examiner, by the residents of Crookstown and Farnanes saying that Mass would be offered that day at 2pm in Cloughduv Church for his release and recovery. A similar notice was placed by Kilmurry Cumann na mBan on the 27th September stating that Mass had been offered in Kilmurry Church on September 23rd for the speedy release of the Lord Mayor and his fellow hunger strikers. Terence MacSwiney died on the 25th October 1920, after 74 days of hunger strike.

The Lissarda Ambush

Orders were given by Kilmurry Company to occupy positions at dawn on Saturday, 21st August 1920. Although thirty-five men waited all day, no military vehicle passed. The IRA were stood down at 8pm and it was decided to reassemble the following week. However, on the Saturday night, Sergeant Maunsell of Inchigeela was shot dead. On the Sunday morning, the RIC County Inspector, Trevor Rigg, left Bandon with a lorry carrying policemen for Inchigeela. Local Volunteer, Billy Powell, observed the RIC passing and it was decided to ambush the vehicles on the return journey.

Because of the short notice, not all Volunteers were available and in place by 2.30pm when scouts observed the RIC returning from Macroom. As the police drove into the ambush site, they were forced to stop by a cart which the Volunteers had positioned across the road. The IRA gave a 'Call to Surrender Arms' but the RIC opened fire on the ambushers. As the ambush progressed, several RIC were injured, with Sergeant Ruane being the most seriously wounded.

29 year old Michael Galvin, Quartermaster, was fatally shot during the attack, he was married and the father of two young children. Volunteer Daniel O'Leary of Bellmount, Crookstown was injured when a handmade bomb he was throwing exploded.

Two months after the Lissarda Ambush, the Croookstown Volunteer Company was formed as the Kilmurry Volunteer Company

had reached more than 150 members. Lissarda Ambush Exhibition







In the last edition I wrote about "The Kerry Road" or as most people would know it as "The Butter Road", I made mention of where the Butter Road reaches its highest point over Mushera mountain, in the townland of Aubane, there is a large flat stone embedded in the fence, this stone is known as "The Kerryman's Table". It was the perfect place to rest and have a good view of the countryside which was also useful for the highwaymen as well as everybody else. Since I wrote that, I came across a story about a Simon Browne a highway robber, who plied his trade along the Kerry Road. The story is written by a Ballinagree man called Jerry Neilus O'Connor.

Jerry was born in nineteen twenty and lived with his parents in Carrigagulla which is about a mile north east of Ballinagree. His father Neilus (hence the name Jerry Neilus) lived on a small farm there and in 1917 he married Hannah Murphy from

Clondrohid. They had six children. He was born into a great scoraíochting (storytelling) house in Carrigagulla and it was around the fireside there, that many a song was sung, and a story told. He was able to recall all these, plus all the events that took place in his native Ballinagree during the twentieth century. He wrote many of them for local newspapers and books. Jerry Neilus never used a typewriter or computer but wrote with a beautiful longhand script. The stories he wrote are a true recollection of the life of his neighbours, friends and foes. They are part of our history. In 2005 Aghinagh Heritage Group published a large collection of his stories, entitled 'Tales of Yore from Ballinagree" by Jerry Neilus O'Connor. The following story about Simon Browne the highway robber was written by Jerry Neilus, but which I don't think is included in the above book.

"Patsy Lucey who lived in Ballinagree, often told the story about Simon Browne, the Mushera Mountain Highway Robber. He was, according to Patsy, a powerful man, with a great run. He robbed and plundered all around him, and it failed the Horgans of Carrigagulla, who were Yeomen at the time and were responsible for law and order, to capture him. They even offered a reward to anyone who would capture him or help in any way to capture him and bring him to their residence. This robber lived for some time in a hidden cave on the side of Mushera and used another smaller cave over across in Duggan's mountain. From Duggan's mountain cave, he had a great view of the Knockpogue road, which was a very busy road at that time, being used by the Kerry people as well as Cork people taking

their firkins of butter into Cork to their buttermerchants by horse and cart, or often a pony and cart and, according to Patsy, it was many the misfortunate person was robbed on their way back, travelling along this mountainy road. One of the stories Patsy told about this robber was that one morning early, the robber spotted a horseman riding a white horse coming on the road by Knockpogue. The robber ran across the valley from his cave in Duggan's mountain to get before him below O'Keeffe's, but the horseman, seeing him coming, galloped his horse. The robber came out on the road so close that he caught the horse by the tail, but failed to use his sword. He held on to the tail until he reached to top of Togher. Another time he went into a shoemaker's shop in Cork city, fitted on a pair of boots and, when he was ready, he rushed out the

door into the street, followed by the shoemaker with the hammer, shouting "Stop the thief'. But the robber kept shouting "Clear the way, boys. We are running for a wager'. Sometime after this, he was captured by two Horgan brothers, who were tenants on a farm Upper Ballinagree. This farm, according to Patsy, was owned at that time by Horgans, the Yeomen, who were also landlords, but had no relation to the Horgans who were tenants by them. It happened that one morning these brothers happened to be up early when they heard all the crying and roaring of a woman. The ran out to the road and there the robber was, after taking a £5 note from a poor woman who had spent all the night travelling the road with her donkey and cart coming from Cork. The two brothers rushed at him. He ran from them and turned around and took aim with his gun, but he was out of luck this time. The morning being wet, his gun powder was damp, so the shot failed to go off. He ran out for the mountain, followed by the two Horgan brothers. One brother was able to run faster than the other and caught up with the robber somewhere on the northern side of the mountain where a deadly struggle took

According to my fathers stulement (Nelius O bonner) about his going to school in Ballinugue, he used to say that there was no Irish allowed to be taught by muster Coulding, it isent but he had plenty Apish, like all the others in their time, but when the national schools were built, under the British rule Irish was rallowed to be tought it was all now the English language that was taught, it was like the start of a new world to the children, learning this new English both reading and writing, they soon forgot the old language of their presents and it seemed to them, out of date, old fashioned way of telking and they became ashamed even to try to sheak it, - there was no Irish history turnel in the school eighter, as all those Isish patriots were looked upon by the British mule as traitors

place, but he held onto the robber until the other brother came up. The robber was over-powered and taken prisoner. But, for some reason, it was to the Kilcorney Yeoman they took him. He was delighted, but the Carrigagulla Yeomen were so mad that they evicted the Horgan family. The Kilcorney Yeoman took them in, however, and gave them a place where some of their descendants still live."

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





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Irish Music Legend Peadar Ó Riada is Cork Person of the Month



Irish Music Legend Peadar Ó Riada is Cork Person of the Month

Musician and Composer, Peadar Ó Riada has been named as Cork Person of the Month for June 2020. The award marks Peadar's contribution to Irish culture as a composer, musician, choir director and broadcaster. Peadar's interest in music began at a young age, as he was inspired by his father, Seán Ó Riada, who was one of the most influential figures in the revival of Irish traditional music during the 1960s. Peadar graduated from University College Cork with a Bachelor of Music degree in 1976. After his graduation, he spent a few years as teacher, co-op manager, festival director, commercial beekeeper, broadcaster and educator. He has lived his life in Cúil Aodha, near the Cork-Kerry border, where he raised his

family with his wife Geraldine Moloney. Over the years he has performed with many different groups. In 2008, he performed with the traditional Irish group, Triúr (with Martin Hayes and Caoimhín Ó Raghallaigh), in 2013 with the traditional group The Drôle (with John Kelly and Eamon McGivney), and in 2014 with Continuing Traditions (with Wajahat Khan). He has been taking his father, Seán Ó Riada's, place at the keyboards and directing Ceoltóirí Chualan since 1971. He also regularly performs in a duet with Seán Ó Sé.

The contributions that Peadar has made during his career have been invaluable to the traditional music community, at both a local and national level. In 1986, he founded the all-female choir Cór Ban Cúil Aodha. He founded the traditional University Acadamh Fódhla in 2000, the Irish Cultural trust Iontaoibheas Fódhla in 1999, and in 2011 the international festival "Féile na Laoch" commemorating his late father Seán Ó Riada. Peadar has also acted as Director of Cór Cúil Aodha since September 1971. His work has given more people opportunities to pursue traditional Irish music and acquaint themselves with the traditions. Peadar has also composed extensively for Cór Cúil Aodha and has accumulated a large body of liturgical and

secular works for Male Voiced Choir in the Irish traditional idiom. His compositions for Female choir are polyphonic and include several large works, as well as choral arrangements for traditional Irish songs. His body of traditional Irish Dance music compositions has made its way into the mainstream of Irish music and are recorded by many artists in this genre.

Speaking on his success Peadar said, "It's great to be recognised by the people of Cork who have supported me throughout my career. Irish traditional music is my passion and I am thankful that I have been able to do what I love every day." Ó Riada has also been working on his autobiography over a number of years and says "It's my intention to be very frank in it - so there's a lot of stuff in it."

Awards Organiser Manus O'Callaghan said, "Peadar Ó Riada's own contribution to the Cork cultural and artistic scene has been wide reaching. Of course, you can't mention the O'Riada family name, without thinking of Mise Eire. The emotional energy of that piece of music is deeply affecting in Ireland. Indeed many feel it should be our National Anthem." Peadar Ó Riada's name will now go forward for possible selection as Cork Person of the Year at an awards lunch on January 15th next at Rochestown Park Hotel.
