





A Macroom couple have been putting lockdown to good use by producing hand-painted ceramics under the name New Skin pottery.

One half of the couple is Chrissie Dervin, an artist who has been drawing for as long as she can remember. Over the years she has used various techniques for the production of her artwork including textiles, painting and printmaking. She also teaches for the ETB and has many art classes in Macroom Adult Learning Centre and environs. Her partner Steve, an economist in UCC and a hobbyist potter, recently bought a kiln and has been making pottery from home while the economy has been on hold.

During lockdown, they've had time to focus on their interests and have finally begun to collaborate on some pots. When the first batch came out of the kiln they were pleasantly surprised by the results and have been experimenting with different glazes and colours ever since. The pieces combine fine art illustrations with functional pottery shapes, with the odd quirky piece in there for good measure.



Our new **Opening Hours** are as follows;

Tuesday to Saturday 10 00 am to 5 30 pm

Closed between 1 00 - 2 00 pm, to facilitate cleaning and restocking.

New Book Stock – We have new book stock in the library – on display on our new Quick Pick stand inside the door on the left.

Access; Six people allowed in the Library at any one time. Internal layouts in many of our libraries have changed, with less or no seating available. Please follow the signage. Children under 12 years of age must be accompanied by an adult.

Returns bins; inside the library door so please drop your returns into these. All returns will be quarantined for 72 hours.

Limited Browsing; There will be 20 minutes allocated to each person/ visit to choose their items. It may be a good idea to think about what you want in advance by visiting the online catalogue or browsing "Who writes like?" and "Who else?" on our website; corkcoco.ie/en/ library-services

Services: Study spaces, newspaper/magazine reading and events are not currently available.

Access to newspapers online is available through PressReader on your phone/tablet or on using the library PCs or Wi-Fi. There is a full list of newspaper titles on PressReader.

I.T Services: 20 minutes sessions will be available only for Internet/ Wi-Fi. It is advisable to book in advance. Printing and Photocopy services will be available but please make sure that you have exact change.

Also, you will be expected to wipe down any equipment that you touch during your visit such as computers, photocopier etc. before and after use with the hygiene items provided.

Check out: Please follow instructions from Staff.

Please remember to sanitize your hands as you enter the library and perform good respiratory hygiene. Remember to social distance at the entrance, the public counter and throughout the library at all times. Do not visit the library if you or someone in your household has symptoms of COVID -19 or you are a confirmed case.

The Summer Stars 2020 is the public library national reading programme for children during the summer months. All children are invited to join the adventure, and to enjoy the fun and pleasure of reading and writing over the summer. It is a great incentive to get your child reading. Summer Stars is non-competitive, and every child who reads even one book is regarded as having completed the program and it is all completely free. 

Once your order has been delivered and is ready for collection you will be notified. Your branch library will hold items for two weeks so you should have plenty of time to drop in to collect them. Many children are not too happy when they are reminded that it's back to school time, although this year I think some students are looking forward to getting back to meet all their friends. UIBH LAOIRE NOTES

Croi na Laoi News

It is good to see the recent meetings well attended and supported. Those attending heard that the large grant acquired for the village had now been used up with the street tarring, the mending of the Lee bridge and a few other smaller job. It must be clarified that Croi na Laoi does not get any of this funding but it is held and used by the County council engineers as they see fit. The funding for painting the village was discussed and it was heard that people on the south of the Square were disappointed that they were not included in the scheme. The chairman, Dan Kelleher, informed the meeting of his visit to the City Hall, where he presented Inchigeela's vision and hopes for the future of the village and environs under the heading of village renewal. The meeting decided upon applying for grants to set up and equip an office hub for people working from home, for students etc. Other proposed jobs to be done were fencing the river Island walk, tarmac for the Island and eco street and park furniture. A sub - committee was set up to deal with this.

The Hall

For some time now Croi na Laoi has been examining the possibility of upgrading the Hall which has fallen onto disrepair over the years. Croi na Laoi got funding for an engineer's report and this investigation has been completed and costed. It has now been determined that the hall actually is the property of the diocese and this of course presents new challenges on how to go ahead.

Invitation

Croi na Laoi is a voluntary group whose objective is the renewal and development of Inchigeela and the environs. There is always a place for new members. And even if you don't want full membership why not come along and give your views on what you regard as priority work in the area. The organisation is a very positive one and would love to hear your views.

Tour de Munster

The tour scorched its way through the parish

on Sunday on stage 4 of their long 640 Km cycle. Stage 1 was Cork city to Killaloe. Stage 2 took them to Tralee. On stage 3 they reached Kenmare ,having cycled around the Dingle peninsula. And the last stage took them on to Glengarrif, Kealkill, Ballingeary, Inchigeela, Macroom and Cork, where they did a round of the city before finishing at the Silversprings Hotel. There was a difficult pull up from Kealkill through the Pass of Céim an Fhia in the blazing sun and they relished the short stop at Gougane Barra. The cycle was well managed with motor cyclists marshalling them on the way along with other support. They made a colourful spectacle but in the hot sun it must have been punishing for the riders. The event, open to male and female, is run annually for Down Syndrome Ireland and deserves support.



History Missionaries of Kilmurry Parish

Part 1 of 2 parts by Peter Scanlan

Kilmurry is a rural Roman Catholic Parish in the Diocese of Cork and Ross. It spans both sides of the main Cork-Killarney road for about 10 Km between Ballincollig and Macroom. It includes the villages of Farnanes, Aherla, Cloughduv, Crookstown, Lissarda, Canovee and Kilmurry. There are three churches, one priest, and an assistant Priest, four schools, three GAA clubs and approximately 3,000 parishioners. With an area of about 1002 Miles, Kilmurry is one of the largest parishes in the Dioceses of Cork & Ross.

Ireland has a very strong missionary tradition, and since the 1800s, many Irish missionaries have been travelling to all parts of the globe, spreading the Gospel message of love and working to improve the quality of life of those most in need. This is an attempt to record a little of the lives of almost 100 Missionaries, from the Parish of Kilmurry, ordinary Irish men and women who lived and worked far from home, giving the very best of the values that had been instilled in them from their childhood, to foreign communities in far off lands

The filmmaker James Creedon 1, a journalist based in Paris, who works for "France 24", and spent a year recording the memories of the late Sr. Paschal O'Sullivan from Cloughduv, said at a screening of the documentary he had made on her life "It struck me that there had been so many others like her, forgotten in the mists of time, who had been such marvellous ambassadors for our country. She also made me question the values that have been left to one side with the implosion of the Catholic Church's influence. A vacuum has now emerged in its place, society now encourages young people to seek wealth and success and the focus is on self-interest and entertainment." The documentary is entitled 'Thanks to Your Noble Shadow'

In 2002 my daughter, Siobhan did a project in Primary School under the guidance of her teacher Rita O'Brien, the title of the project was "The Missionaries of Kilmurry Parish" In it, she collected information on many Missionaries, Priests, Sisters, Brothers and Lay people who served as Missionaries both at home in Ireland and in far off lands. In fact these Kilmurry people ministered in many parts world, China, Japan, Australia, Tasmania, South America, India, South Africa and many other countries. When Lockdown began to bite, I pulled out the project, dusted it off and cleared away the cobwebs and attempted to update it. Unfortunately for me some of the key people who were instrumental in providing information for the original, had by now passed away. Mrs. Kathleen Murphy, Nora O'Leary, Kathy Quinlan and many others who between them supplied a long list of names and


much information.

I have by now almost hundred names, many fascinating stories; people Sr. Pascal O'Sullivan from Cloughduv who remembers shots being fired through the school windows in Cloughduv School during the Civil War and later as a teaching Sister being interred by the Japanese during the Second World War. She was to go on and teach English in Tokyo for the next 63 years; in fact she spent seventy five years of her life in Japan, and her School, the Denenchofu Futaba was to become one of Japan's most prestigious airls' schools.


Another parishioner, Sr. Kathleen O'Sullivan from Oldfort is a Medical Doctor working in Africa; she has worked in Uganda, and Kenya, and was awarded a Gold Medal by UCC acknowledgement in her outstanding medical contribution to the people of the slums of Kilbera, Nairobi. For 25 years she worked in the Order's hospital at Nsambya, in the Ugandan Capital of Kampala. During that time the city changed hands violently three times as successive Dictators overthrew their rivals. In one of these episodes the rival armies shot at one another for four days through the hospital grounds, while the Sisters operated on, and tended the wounded from both sides

parishioner. Another Jeremiah Joseph Doyle was born in 1849 and was ordained in 1874 for the Diocese of Armidale

in Australia and after an eventful sea voyage (he


Fr Michael Murphy parishioners knew nothing of his execution and waited for his return. In his absence they maintained their church, the altar, and even took care of Fr. Mike's vestments. They only found out about his death in 1946.





After the war the Bishop came to the parish to assess the devastation. On his arrival Fr. Mike's ciborium, was presented to him. The villagers had protected the 'Tabar Ciborium' in which the Blessed Sacrament was found incorrupt after four years.

was shipwrecked in the Bay of Biscay) he arrived in Sydney in November 1874. He was later to









become the first Bishop of Lismore, New South Wales in 1887. As a public figure Bishop Doyle's contribution to the Lismore community was extraordinary. Renowned for his organizational abilities he promoted the development of a water and gas supply in Lismore, helped establish a municipal government in the town, campaigned for the extension of the railway line, personally organized the installation of the telephone exchange, the establishment of Lismore Base Hospital, the School of Arts, the Agricultural Society and the acquisition of the reserve at Rocky Creek to ensure Lismore's future water supply. He gave evidence to Parliament three times on vital Public Works and economic development issues. Michael Murphy was born in 1911 at Shandangan near Lissarda and was ordained in 1936. Four years later he and three other Missionaries of the Sacred Heart (MSC) went to Papua New Guinea to minister to the people there. He spent the next two years working in local villages, celebrating Mass, hearing confessions, baptising children, and being with the people, who came to know him as "Fr. Mike". In June 1942, at the invitation of the Japanese Army, he travelled to source more medicine for his community. He was never to return. On September 11th of that year, Fr. Michael, greatly weakened by malnutrition, sickness, and months of captivity, was executed by the Japanese and buried on an uninhabited island.

Sr. Marian O'Sullivan was born in Canovee in 1932 and joined the Dominicans in 1951. In 1953 she went as a teacher to South Africa and the school she taught in was attended by mainly Catholic Children, but like all other Catholic schools worldwide, it was open to all faiths and none, therefore it comes as no surprise that about fifty percent of her pupils were Protestants. At this time South Africa as a country, had White Schools for the White privileged, Black Schools for the native children and Coloured Schools for mixed race children. In this present time when we hear a lot about racism, it is worth noting that in 1972 Sr. Marian was appointed to a school in Pretoria, teaching in what had been once a Dutch colony, here she broke the rules in order to educate both coloured and white students during the

apartheid struggle. It became national and international news.



The Goff Kellehers

by Johanna Goff

The Goff Kellehers earned their nickname from the fact that they came from the top of Goff's Lane in Clondrohid, in between the Bell Inn and the village of Clondrohid. The earliest records of this family stem from baptism records from Clondrohid parish in 1809. These show that Daniel Kelleher and Julia Dennehy had 8 children: -

The death certificates for Daniel Kelleher shows that he died on 22/08/1865 at the grand old age of 99, if this is correct it would mean that he had been born in the year 1766. His wife Julia died on 21/12/1876 aged 90 which means that she would have been born in the year 1786.

It appears from the Tithes Applotment books that the Townland of Clashmaguire at that time in 1834 were dominated by the Kelleher family, apart from one other family of Sheas. Other Kellehers in Clashmaguire at this time and possible brothers to Daniel were James, Michael & Patrick. Other Kellehers not mentioned in the Tithes also had children baptised in Clondrohid, as noted below:-

Daniel and Julia Dennehy where my 3 x Great grandparents from the records it is evident that whilst they started their married life in Clashmaguire they eventually moved from Clashmaguire to the nearby Townland of Garranenguppal (Gurrane, Clondrohid Village). There was a Dennehy family living in the Townland of Gurrane in the early 1700s and this Dennehy family had a Cornmill in the area by the river Foherish, it is possible that Julia Dennehy may have come from this family and the family moved from Clashmaguire to Garranenguppal (Gurrane) to take over some of the land from the Dennehy family.

As noted from the Baptism records of their children. Daniel's will from 1865 listed his address as Clarder Hill, Garranenguppal alias Creenderry. Creenderry must have been a much older name for Garranenguppal, but alas this name has now disappeared from all records. Land records show that the family held lots 8 a, b, c totalling 81 acres. Daniel's will showed that

he held a lease of the land from Henry Morgan Earlberry Crofton Esq, for "lives not yet expired" for the sum of £31 and 3 shillings and 10 pence per year. He had 7 Milch cows; 2 calves a mare, as well as farm equipment and household furniture. Daniel left everything to his wife Julia for her lifetime and then for everything to go to his grandchildren, John, Catherine and Daniel Kelleher, the offspring of his son Hugh. Daniel for some reason did not mention any of his children apart from Hugh and bypassed all of his children, leaving them nothing, in his will.

Daniel and Julia's son Hugh was my 2x Great grandfather born around 14th October 1829, Died on 3rd March

1906. Hugh married Mary Corkery from Bawntanaknuck, their son Daniel was my great grandfather. According to the 1911 census Hugh and Mary had 5 children, 1 of whom had died. In the 1901 census, it showed that Hugh Kelleher was living on annuities, indicating he was receiving an income from somewhere, this may explain why his father Daniel left him nothing in his will, if he had an independent income. Another interesting thing was that Hugh's son Daniel aka Dan Hugh. Dan born around 22/11/1861 was Head of household and that in the 1901 census, completed in English it was reported that none of the family could read or write and they all spoke Irish and English but in 1911 the census was completed in Irish, by Dan Hugh Dan and reported that Dan Hugh Dan and his mother Mary only spoke Irish and not English. An explanation for this emerged later in the records. It appears Dan Hugh Dan became involved in the volatile politics of the age.

Dan Hugh Dan Kelleher married on 11/02/1893 the daughter Johanna (Hannah) of another well known local Kelleher family, the Mons Kellehers who were previously mentioned in a Lee Valley Outlook Article a few years ago. Johanna was the daughter of John and Norry Mons Kellehers the original owners of the Mons Bar aka The Halfway Tavern in Lissacreisig. Sadly, Dan Hugh Dan and Hannah were to have a short and sad married life together. Dan and Hannah had 4 children, 1 of whom had died as a young child, the youngest child was Julia who was 2 in 1901 born 20/09/1898 and staying with her paternal aunt Julia Kelleher Mahony and her husband John Mahony in a neighbouring house in Garranenguppal. By 1901 Hannah was not living with her family and it appeared that she was in Macroom Hospital, by 1911 Hannah was still not living with her family and there were no more children born to the couple after Julia. Sadly on 27/12/1911 Hannah passed Away in Cork District Hospital from Liver cancer, she is buried in the old Clondrohid Cemetery with her husband and his family.


Dan Hugh Dan was very involved in local and National Politics, he appears in local new articles as being present at numerous local Land League meetings, He appeared to be involved in the Local Gaelic League; he was also mentioned in the book "A Time There was in Clondrohid"

Dan Hugh Dan died on 25/01/1937, it appeared that in his own way he was a bit of a rebel and it appeared that he refused to complete the census of 1901, claiming he could not read or write and as a protest in 1911 completed it in Irish in 1911. I am so glad that he lived to see a free Ireland.

Dan Hugh Dan and Hannah's eldest son was my grandfather Hugh (Goff) Kelleher B. 20/04/1895 D. 28/03/1972, he had a brother Michael B. 14/07/1896 died at the age of 23 on 09/03/1920. I have been informed by a well-known local historian that Michael was a great GAA Football player and he used to

play for both Clondrohid and Kilmichael Football teams. I was informed by this person that one day there was a match being played at Macroom Mills and that Michael suffered an injury and that this local man's 2 uncles had been at the match and ended up carrying Michael all the way home to Clondrohid. I was told that Michael never left the house after this and died almost 1 year later. Michael's death certificate gives his cause of death as Tubercolosis of the spine.

Hugh and Michael had a sister Julia Agnes Kelleher. Julia and her 1st cousin Annie Mahony where both in the Cumman Na Mban, during the war of Independence. After the war in 1929 Julia married a man named Robert Buckley and they moved to run a shop called The Clondrohid Stores, in Barrack Road, Cork City. They went on to have 6 children, 5 girls and a boy called Larry, some of Robert's Buckley family are still living in the local area. Their only son moved to Charleville and as far as I am aware is still living there now. Hugh Goff was a very colourful local character;

he was known in the district due to his tendency

to present recitations and he had a number of recitations he would present at the Threshing parties that were common in the area at the time. Some of his favourite recitations where "Bingen on the Rhine" and "The day I took the shilling in Mullingar". I was told that as well as giving these recitations he would also do the actions of kneeling on one knee with is cap held out.

There is mention of him doing this in the book "The time there was in Clondrohid"

He was also mentioned again, due to the noise of his milk cart coming down the lane:-

Hugh Goff was also credited with being the first person to bring a tape recorder into the Village of Clondrohid and everyone from the village would have a great time using this, recording their voices and playing it back. My grandfather had picked the tape recorder up on one of his many visits to London to visit his family. **Hugh Goff Kelleher**

My Grandfather Hugh (Goff) was married to Johanna Kelleher nee O'Riordan B. 03/11/1895 in Cooldorihey, Nr Tarelton in Kilmichael and she died at a young age on16/04/1944. At the time that my grandparents met Johanna was living in Moanaflugh, with her sister Elizabeth Riordan McCarthy. I was named after my Grandmother who died when all her children where young. My grandparents had 4 children.

My aunt Mary Bridget was born 14/02/1934 she was the eldest child to Hugh Kelleher and Johanna O'Riordan. My aunt Johanna (Joan) was next born in 1935, my father Daniel (Donal) Kelleher was born on 28/03/1936 and the youngest Michael James was born on 21/02/1939. All this branch of the family moved to London during the late 1950's, my grandfather Hugh remained in Gurrananeguppal but would travel backwards and forwards to visit us in London. Eventually the family sold the land in 1970 and my grandfather moved permanently to London. This land now has other houses built on it with the original farmhouse having been restored. I believe that there is no one from this line, left in the home area and it is unknown where the rest of this family

My grandfather Hugh Goff, died in London on 28/03/1972 (my father's birthday), he was returned to Ireland and is the last of these Kellehers buried in the Family grave in the old Clondrohid cemetery.

Sadly, my father Donal died very young on 09/06/1981, my aunt Mary Bridget died on 17/03/1998 and my uncle Michael died on 13/08/2018.

It would appear that after its formation in 1888 the club would have been given much attention by the police authorities. At the time there were fears that the new organization was being used for revolutionary purposes. The National league club in Clondrohid was suppressed in 1887, yet held a meeting in October. "The police stood outside the door and, as the members of the League entered, they were told of being liable to six months imprisonment with hard labour... Sub-constable Allister appeared at the door and said he had a duty to perform." Dan H. Kelleher, Gurrane, answered, "You are not a member of this branch and cannot be admitted. We too have a duty to perform and it shall be done." The police then took the names of those present. When Ballyvourney G.A.A. club was formed in May, 1888, two members of the Royal Irish Constabulary supervised the meeting.

goll call was always taken at 10 o'clock, a big brown book was passed along from room to room. The attendance at school varied between 66 and 72 and this was written on a blackboard on the side of one of the walls. During roll call, one particular incident always springs to mind. Hugh Kelleher who lived north of the school kept a few cows and supplied milk to the creamery in the summer time. His mode of transport was a big heavy butt with iron wheels. When he started off from the house heavy but the Master would look at his watch. Hugh made so Roll call was always taken at 10 o'clock, a big brown book burns dancing in the butt he could be heard all over the parish e but he's late this morning, he'll never make it. Or if he but he Master would say he must be going to town.

He was also mentioned again, due to the noise of his milk cart coming down the lane:-

milking.

But the best part of the year was the threshing. After school we went to every threshing in the area. My favourite threshing was Danny Callaghans. It was there that I first tasted cold beef and loaf bread. But the best part of the threshing was the night. Usually a second keg was collected for by the drinking fraternity. There was a great sing song at Callaghans. I will never forget Hugh Kelleher reciting a recitation. "The day he took the Schilling in Mullingar." Paddy Desmond gave the Rose of Mooncoin. Everybody contributed something. Larry O'Leary directed the whole operation from a seat in the corner.

Lissarda Ambush 100 years on

On 22nd August 1920 a group of Irish volunteers under the command of Patrick O'Leary attacked an RIC patrol just outside Lissarda Village in Mid Cork. The only fatality in the ambush was Michael Galvin, Quarter Master with the Irish Volunteers. Michael was a local man, married with two voung children, and his memory is honoured with a monument on the Cork side of Lissarda village. The special 100th anniversary of the ambush is being commemorated this August by Kilmurry Historical & Archaeological Association with the launch of both an exhibition in Independence Museum Kilmurry and a book about the ambush by local historian Mary O'Mahony. The exhibition will educate the

audience about those involved in the ambush as well as local events at the time and will be open to the public from 2pm Sunday August 23rd 2020 at Independence Museum Kilmurry . The book 'Lissarda Ambush' gives an indepth account of the ambush and those who participated on both sides. It will be available for sale from that weekend also. The exhibition will be on display from launch date throughout September. Museum opening times are Thurs to Sun 2-5pm but can be visited at other times by prior request. 



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: HOW TO DEAL WITH SCAMS

Question: I think I've been scammed, can I get my money back?

If you've been scammed, you have been tricked into parting with your money.

The scam can come in many forms. You may be sold fake tickets that don't exist. You may get a missed call from a scammer and when you phone back you could be paying a premium rate. You could get a bogus email pretending to be from your bank, trying to trick you into sharing your personal and financial information.

If you suspect you've been scammed you should act immediately:

- · Stop all contact with the scammer
- · Do not send any more payments
- · If you paid by credit or debit card, tell your bank or card provider immediately
- Report the incident to your local Garda station —scamming is a criminal matter
- Gather any records you have about the scam (emails or other communications)
- Protect your devices by resetting your passwords and update your anti-virus software
- Report the incident to consumer protection agencies such as the CPCC, for advice and to help stop other people being caught in the same scam

You may be able to get your money back depending on what happened and how you paid the scammer.

You may get your money back if you:

- Notice money has been taken from your account without your authorisation, and you contact your bank immediately. In most circumstances, you bank must refund you for an unauthorised payment.
- Bought something from a scammer with your debit card, credit card or PayPal. You can ask your bank or credit provider to reverse the transaction through a process known as a chargeback.

It's unlikely you will get your money back if you:

- · Paid by bank transfer. It can be harder to get money back, but the sooner you contact your bank the better.
- Paid by money transfer services such as MoneyGram, PayPoint or Western Union.
- · Paid by vouchers or gift card

To protect yourself in future, you should not share your personal information if you don't know who are dealing with. Trust your instinct and always ask yourself'is it safe?'






