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
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# EDITORIAL





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

Over the first couple of days of the new school year, with a promise in mind to keep my copy books tidy, I use to start by lining out the first half dozen pages or so. A ruler used to draw a neat line across the top in red biro and then one down the left hand side to provide a margin for the all-important notes and grades from the teacher - just how much of a margin does it take to write 'A'? I'm not sure, but about half an inch wide does a 'C' and accommodates an unwelcome 'D' too. I'd neatly write my name on the cover, the subject and whether it was for homework or essays, science or maths, and of course there was the homework diary too.

The first few pages would be filled with neat writing, colour coded headings and the allimportant essay titled 'What I did for my Summer Holidays' or 'Ag Piocadh Smeara Dubha'. I did some of my best work in September - it was fresh and exciting, new teachers and new subjects were a welcome distraction. Meeting school friends and making new friends. I always thought being the "new girl" must be so exciting until at the age of nine I experienced being the new girl in a new school and found it quite terrifying.

Unfortunately the good intentions seldom lasted into October. The handwriting became more untidy, the lining out of pages a hurried scribble using the side of a pencil as a ruler, the excitement of the new school year smothered by the dreaded spelling tests that were inevitable announced by the teacher. But for all that school was a wonderful adventure. It had its high points and low points and I was one of those children who got stressed out at exams and being the 'new girl' was, as I said, a terrifying experience but it passed. I made lifelong friends; I had some wonderful teachers who were really invested in their work. I know some people say that school was the worst period of their lives and I'm thankful that was not my experience. I've asked the children who have been visiting

to the usual return to school and so do they. I thought they would all just say they are looking forward to meeting their friends which they did. But they also expressed excitement at learning new things and meeting their teachers again. For some it will be their first time at school so there might be a little frisson of trepidation.

School stories have always entertained us from Tom Brown's Schools Days to the Enid Blyton St. Clare's and Mallory Towers series to Hogwarts School, that is central to the Harry Potter series thanks to JK Rowling. At Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne there is a big selection of books with school days and school adventures as a theme. It has been proven that reading for pleasure benefits you throughout your life and OECD research shows that reading for pleasure is the single most important indicator of a child's future success. So don't forget to make a library visit a regular occurrence once the children are back at school.

It's time to bring your completed Summer Stars reading Cards back to the library so that your certificate can be prepared and to make sure you will be included in the raffle. Bring back your card no matter how many books you have

read – whether it's one, ten or twenty.

# **UIBH LAOIRE NOTES**

### **Sergeant Daniel Maunsell**

One hundred years ago, on the 21st of August 1920, Sergeant Maunsell of the Royal Irish Constabulary, was shot dead in Inchigeela village in an ambush by volunteers of the local IRA. Daniel Maunsell was from Abbeydorney, near Tralee, Co Kerry. He was a Catholic, married with a young family and had been a farmer before joining the police. He was 49 years of age. Anti-British activity had been on the increase with the surge in IRA membership and the acquisition of arms and the police were seen by many as being part of the enemy and therefore legitimate targets. The following day, the IRA used the opportunity to hit at the investigating police party and their military escort, when they ambushed them at Lissarda. An IRA volunteer was killed and there were men seriously wounded on both sides. Seriously troubled times indeed. Move on ninety years and a group of people thought it was well time for reconciliation. Descendants and other relatives of the Inchigeela sergeant and of the local IRA volunteers were invited to meet in Inchigeela on the anniversary of his death. A Mass of reconciliation was said by the late Father Gerard Creedon and afterwards all met in Creedon's Hotel, where they chatted for a long time and all past differences were put behind them. Last week, in keeping with the

same spirit, on the 100th anniversary of the incident a commemorative plaque has been placed where sergeant Maunsell met his death. Due to Covid restrictions only a few could be allowed attend. One of the welcomed guests was Michael Horgan, Sergeant Maunsell's great grandson.

### **Storm Ellen**

Compared to other parts of the country, Uibh Laoire escaped Ellen's wrath. The waters of the Lee rose and fell a number of times but there was no serious flooding and all roads were passable. Reports reached us of damage done in Carrigbawn, Ballingeary, where there was a landslide and heavy rain cut a trench in a by road. Rain washed away a lot of soil in a newly reclaimed sloping land in Inchigeela. Some gardens were flattened but there were no electricity outages and life went on as normal the following day. Let's hope Storm Francis will be kind!





We have installed hand sanitizers and safety procedures and signage all around the grounds. We have trained up COVID coordinators for each team and we will be spraying all our equipment, including the goalposts with sanitizer before and after each activity. While it's disappointing that spectators are not allowed at games for the moment, we completely understand and support this measure as it's in the best interest of the health of everybody and the defeat of the coronavirus", siad Liam Casey chairperson.

During the closed season the club has been busy in improving their pitches, with the help and support of Cork County Council and the Macroom Millstreet Municipal District amenity grants. The very hard working club committee have beens preparing the excellent playing pitches for what hopefully will be a busy few months ahead. The Coachford club have continued with their ambitious investment in their dressing rooms and training facilities and they are looking to further upgrade what is now one of the top grounds in the Cork AUL.

During the off season the club's players also came together and organised a fundraiser for the Irish Kidney Association. The lads raised over €11,000 by running over 300KM between them. The teamwork that the Premier and U19s displayed every week on the pitch transferred easily to this challenge as everyone supported and encouraged each other.

"Like every other club, fundraising during Covid-19 has been a challenge for us. We are unable to run our weekly lotto so we have replaced it with an online 50/50 raffle. 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

# KILMURRY HAA

We at Kilmurry Historical & Archaeological Association (KHAA) have had a very busy few weeks, with our third annual Rebel Rally Car run, a book launch for 'Lissarda Ambush, 22nd August 1920", and the opening of the exhibition on the 'Lissarda Ambush' to commemorate it's 100 year

The Rebel Rally Car run included both vintage and non-vintage cars this year, in an effort to include as many people as possible in the event. Our calendar of events was greatly reduced due to the lockdown and restrictions, so it was a delight to see people partaking in our event and enjoying the opportunity to catch up with old friends, see some of our locality's great historical sites, all while adhering to the public health guidelines.

Over 50 cars were registered for the rally . First stop of the day was at the Crossbarry Ambush site where historian Sean Crowley gave a fascinating account of the ambush that occurred on the 19th March 1921. After some light refreshments, the convoy headed to the Dripsey Ambush site, via Kilumney. KHAA's own Mary O' Mahony gave a gripping and engaging account on the ambush that took place there in January 1921. The final stop of the day was at the picturesque village of Carrigadrohid, where historian and well known photographer Peter Scanlan gave a very entertaining and informative talk on the history of Carrigadrohid Castle.

The following weekend, the 100th anniversary of the Lissarda Ambush was commemorated by the KHAA with the launch of Mary O' Mahony's book 'Lissarda Ambush, 22nd August 1920', and an exhibition on the ambush which also includes exhibits and information on the locality. Once again, the current restrictions changed the usual format of these events. The book launch was a small private gathering of Mary's family and friends, with remarks by UCC's Gabriel Doherty recognising the hard work and perseverance by Mary in delivering this very important historical work. The book is on sale at the Independence Museum Kilmurry and in Sheila's shop in Kilmurry village, retailing at €15 with all proceeds going to the IMK.

On Saturday 22nd August, relatives of those involved in the ambush were given a preview of the exhibition, which was then launched and open to the general public on Sunday 23rd August. exhibition contains a wealth of information on the ambush , including a more in depth look at some of those involved in the event and a chronicle of their lives, detailed account of the ambush, local



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# History Missionaries of Kilmurry Parish (Part 2)

In the last edition of the Lee Valley Outlook, I gave an overview and some information on the Missionaries of Kilmurry Parish. In this edition I tell the story of one of the hundred or so others, whose names I have collected, and their many fascinating life experiences.

Marian O'Sullivan was born in 1932 in Classis not far from Canovee Church and School. Her father, Pat farmed where the Lee family are now. Her mother, Joan, taught at Canovee School all her life. Marian had three sisters, Marie, Helen, and Kay. Her teachers were, besides her mother, Lena Buckley, Mrs. Healy and Dick Young. After finishing Primary school, she went to St. Marys Secondary School, Macroom for three years and then went on to Sion Hill as a boarder for another two years. After finishing her Leaving Cert in 1951 she decided to join the Dominicans and spent three years in the novitiate in County Kildare and after another few months in Belfast she went to South Africa, at 21 years of age in 1953. She travelled by boat to Holyhead and on by train to London, from there by boat to Cape Town which took seventeen days.

Even though not yet a qualified teacher she began her teaching career, in a school owned and run by the Dominicans. Springfield School was for boarders and was for both primary and secondary pupils. She settled in quickly in a community of sixteen, all Irish, teaching was her main occupation, but she began immediately to study the Language which was Afrikaans. Afrikaans Language is a West Germanic language spoken in South Africa, Namibia and, to a lesser extent, Botswana and Zimbabwe. It evolved from the Dutch vernacular of Holland, spoken largely by Dutch settlers and later by the native Africans who associated with them.

Springfield school was attended by mainly Catholic Children, but like all other Catholic schools worldwide, it was open to all faiths and none, therefore it should come as no surprise that about fifty percent of her pupils were Protestants. At this time formal government education policy for all schools in South Africa was that each school should be rigidly segregated according to race. African, white, Asian, and so-called Coloured (mixed-race) students went to separate schools. White children were further segregated by language: English-speaking and Afrikaansspeaking children were sent to different schools. After two years in that school, she spent four years in Stellenbosch University, just outside Cape Town where she studied African Languages such as Afrikaans, Zula and Sotho.

After seventeen years in Springfield, Sr. Marian went to teach in a school in Pretoria in 1972. In this school, teaching was done through the medium of the Afrikaans Language. The school had been set up to bridge the gap with the Calvinists; Dutch reformists and the Catholics. They were the descendants of the Dutch Colonists who first arrived in South Africa in 1653 and founded a Colony there, which was later taken over by the British. At that time Sr. Marian and the Dominican Sisters deliberately broke the law and the rules and began to open their schools to all races. This caused major problems for her and her Congregation, parents started to complain to the Department of Education, inspectors began to arrive and threatened to close the school, they even demanded that they be given the names and the addresses of the African students who were attending her school, which of course Sr. Marion refused. This went on for the remainder of that school year, which by then Sr. Marian had become Regional Superior, and the decision was taken, that all schools belonging

to the Dominicans would

be open to all students irrespective of race. When this happened, to quote Sr. Marian "All hell then broke loose, the press were on the job, up on the trees photographing the children, mixed races, going into the school, it was all over the papers, big headlines...." The interesting thing was that because there was so much opposition, the parents rallied around the Sisters, because they certainly didn't want their school closed.

It is worth noting here that, Sr. Marian and the Dominican Sisters in South Africa had the support of the Association of Women Religious (AWR), and the support of the Southern African Catholic Bishops' Conference (SACBC). The opening of all their schools to students of all races was of course a direct contravention of apartheid law. This radical action was informed by their dedication to the Dominican motto 'veritas' (truth) and by the desire 'to give practical Christian witness to social justice' in a revolutionary situation. In opening



their schools, the Dominican Sisters joined the broad liberation movement that helped to crack the façade of the apartheid state and ultimately led to its dismantling.

From 1977 onwards, the Mercy Sisters also opened their schools to all races. On one occasion when Sr. Marian was at a meeting with the Director of Education in Cape Town, and while they were speaking his phone rang, when he finished the call he said "Do you know who that was? It was the State Department in Washington, asking what we are doing to the Catholic Schools" The treats to close the schools continued, followed by meetings, followed by even more treats. On another occasion there was a meeting with the minister of Education, Mr. Koornhof, four Arch Bishops, Sr. Marian, a Mercy Sister and a Marist Brother, and after more than five hours of talks, the authorities were still insisting that Sr. Marian and the other Catholic Schools were breaking the law, and that their schools would be closed.









Sr. Marian left South Africa in 1986 and during all that time negotiations were still going on, and it was not until 1987 that the first private school was set up which would be multiracial, more than ten years since Sr. Marian first opened her schools to all races.

South Africa is a very beautiful country but politically it has had a very troubled history. Because it is home to so many different African peoples the White Government had tried to impose a system, now known as Apartheid, by which each tribal group would have its own 'homeland'. The theory was that if people who are different from one another in language or culture were kept apart there would be no friction. Hence the term 'Apartheid' which means apartness that of course is not true. Difference is a source of enrichment if properly handled. The other problem was that the cities including the gold and diamond mines were to be kept for white people. So, there was a constant unrest in the country. Those who supported the cause of the African majority were harassed and sometimes killed. Fortunately, all that has changed. The changeover to African rule happened peacefully

thanks to great people like Nelson Mandela, the first black president. It is also nice to know that Sister Marian O'Sullivan, who as young girl left her home in Canovee to become a Dominican Sister, played her part in the fight for civil rights and the fight against racism.

Sr. Marian returned to Ireland in 1986 and began working on another project. They have an organic farm in Wicklow and have developed it into an Ecology Centre "An Tairseach". It was set up to teach people about the need to care for the earth. In June of this year Sr. Marian, as Director and Chairperson of An Tairseach's Board published a book "The Story of An Tairseach"

It is often said that some people never retire, Sr. Marian at 88 years of age is surely one of those.



# Eileen Barrett (née O'Connor): Good athlete but could and should she have been better? (An elegy to lost potential).

Eileen Barrett (née O'Connor) was a very good athlete when young and won Mid-Cork, Cork, Munster and All-Ireland medals. Although she continued to compete until seventeen, she won her last major medal in 1974 at age 15. Born in 1958, Eileen is married to Billy Barrett, lives in Lissarda, and they have five children and twelve grandchildren. Her parents were Paddy and Kathleen O'Connor (née Foley), Marian Terrace, Coolcower, Macroom and her siblings are Anna, Mary, Kathleen, Stephen and John. Her sons Eoin and Kevin won athletic underage medals and her daughters Miriam and Catarina won county and Munster medals with St Val's Ladies Gaelic Football team. Her sisters Kathleen and Mary were also good runners and won local races and played soccer with Crookstown and Cork. Brothers Stephen and John were very good footballers, and John played for Cork U-21s and captained the 1990 Macroom county intermediate-winning team. Nephews are accomplished golfers.

Eileen attended St Joseph's Primary School, St. Mary's Secondary and McEgan College, all in Macroom. She worked for Denis and Breda Murphy, Spar, Macroom, and she managed the wool section of the shop.

In her youth Eileen ran with Macroom Athletic Club (B.L.O.E.) – a sub-division of Macroom Youth Club and represented Cork at under-age level. 1 Later she was a member of Kilmurry A.C. (N.A.C.A.I.) under the dynamic Mrs Hinchion. With the honourable exception of (Dr) Edward Fitzgerald and Mrs Hinchion, when young she (Eileen) got little or no help with structure or coaching, and she did not represent competitively her schools. Her family was hugely supportive but appropriate club help was not there when needed. Her success was despite this lack of support and underlines the current fantastic coaching work that is done in local GAA, soccer, athletic, judo and other clubs. Much Macroom talent in many spheres was 'born to blush unseen, and waste its sweetness on the desert air, and this is especially true of female athletic ability in Macroom for most of the twentieth century. 1 B.L.O.E. stands for Bord Luthcleas Óg Éireann and N.A.C.A.I. for National Association of Athletics and Cycling, Ireland.

In 1972 Miriam Warren, North Square, representing Ursuline Convent, Waterford, set a new Munster Schools' record of 16' 11" in the senior long jump, and was second in the 100m and 200m and third in the 100m hurdles. At the same meeting Chrissie Kelleher, St. Mary's, was third in the intermediate high jump when she cleared 4'6". On the following day Eileen won a bronze U-13 100m medal at the B.L.O.E U-15 county championships in Rochestown

As a child Eileen enjoyed playing with her siblings and neighbours' children, boys and girls, in the lawn at Marian Terrace, and while always competitive, she didn't realise how good she was. Her first recollection of taking part in an official sport came when one was held in Macroom in the late 1960s. That weekend her family visited her aunt Pauline Foley in Dublin, a big event in itself, and many were crammed into her father's Anglia for the trip. However, the family had to come home early for the sports. They duly returned in time and the sacrifice was well worth it as Eileen won many events, and a cup for being the best overall athlete. A year or two later she again won a Perpetual Cup for the Best All-Round athlete, retained it the following year, and the trophy was won by Mary, her sister, the next year. (The cup was donated by Eugene O'Riordan, Macroom Engineering, and for whom her father worked). Following her exploits, she joined Macroom Athletic Club, and other good contemporary athletes were Miriam Warren, Catherine Hourihane and Chrissie Kelleher. Some years before Betsy Lynch, South Square, won a 400 metre race at Clonakilty sports in 1968 and David Casey was a very good long-distance runner. The club had been founded by Br Francis, a De La Salle brother, some years before but, unfortunately for the town and especially

the athletic club, he was transferred to Skibbereen in 1969. In 1970 a 'large attendance' was present at the AGM, and chairman Br Stanislaus bemoaned the lack of interest of parents in the club. In contrast the 1972 AGM had 'a very small crowd' and Eileen (14 years old) was elected to the committee. Thereafter the club was left to younger members to run and while they did a good job, it proved difficult. Eileen recalls many evenings when training was done by the athletes themselves with no coach present, and no coaching. The officers had work or study to attend to, and Edward Fitzgerald was a medical student in UCC from 1970 77 and based in Cork city. Despite this he provided great help and support to Eileen, and he attended Eileen's competitions when possible. Eileen and her sisters Mary and Kathleen did well in a first leg of the Mid-Cork League when between them, they won four events and were placed in others.

Camogie was played in St Mary's during Eileen's time there and she played a little but was never a main player and often served in goal, a strange place to play a girl with obvious speed. After 1976 she was 'lost' to sport between work, marriage and child-rearing. However, she became re-involved when St Valentine's Ladies Football team was formed, and her two daughters became good players. Her sons continue to play successfully with Kilmurry.

Sport in Ireland in the twentieth century was mostly a male preserve and it was certainly true of Macroom and the surrounding areas. Camogie was played briefly in Macroom GAA Club in the 1930s, 1940s and 1960s, and none outside of St Mary's for the rest of the twentieth century. Canovee had a camogie team in the 1960s and Cloughduv from the nineties. Kilmichael ladies won a county junior football championship in the late 1980s. Macroom lady footballers first played in the 1990s and the club is now very active. Ladies' soccer was played briefly in Macroom in the 1980s, and that too is currently doing very well at underage level. Macroom Golf club has had lady associate members since 1927, have a beautiful cup that dates to that period, but ladies only attained full membership in the 1990s. The first lady-captain was Dr May Twomey in 1932. Two Macroom girls/ladies won Irish senior hockey caps - Mary O'Sullivan, North Square, and Mary Purcell (now Quain), Coolehane. Miriam Warren set a Munster Colleges' senior long jump record and was a very good sprinter. Catherine Hourihan was successful at longer distance races. Both Marie and Collette O'Riordan, Sleaveen, won many championships, including Irish, and ran for Ireland. Geraldine Galvin played off a handicap of 7. The Dunlea sisters, Lynn and Stephanie, Loughleigh, and Una O'Donoghue attended St Mary's and won senior camogie All-Ireland medals. Another St. Mary's past pupil, Briege Corkery, Béalnamorrive, emerged to become a shining star in football and camogie from 2000 to 2020.

'New' clubs like judo and Tae-Kwon-Do were much more egalitarian, and while more males participated, many females were involved. Females enjoyed full membership and full rights from the clubs' inception. Marcell Leahy and Nancy Murphy became taekwondo black belts and Marcell represented Ireland. In Macroom angling and Pitch & Putt were almost exclusively male. There are probably some/many more notable female players/athletes - I would be delighted to know - but compared to males they are much fewer. This indicates that many athletically-able girls and women were denied the opportunity to discover and develop their talents. The reasons are probably social, economic and an absence of sufficient volunteers and facilities to give girls a

chance and an opportunity.

Eileen is an example of someone with a natural talent who emerged in 1970. Despite great family support and help from Edward Fitzgerald and later Mrs Hinchion in Kilmurry, she was 'lost' to sport. There was no proper structure in Macroom or in school when her ability could have been harnessed and more fully developed.

Ireland has changed much in the last fifty years and female participation and success in sport is one of its better features. Hopefully the 'Eileen Barretts' of the future will be given a better chance and encouraged to take advantage of the opportunity.

I would like to thank Eileen for speaking to me and sharing her photos and memorabilia. Her sister Kathleen made the connection and provided extra information, and I'm very grateful to her for her help. Maura Leahy/Forde informed me of Eileen's success, and I appreciate her 'lead'. The Irish Newspaper Archive is a wonderful source of information and many references were found there.





### KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: WEARING FACE COVERINGS

This news item was posted on August 12, 2020

Now that face coverings are mandatory in shops, I am concerned as I can't wear a face

Face coverings are not suitable for everyone and the law recognises this. For instance, children under 13 do not have to wear one. Even in places where face coverings are now mandatory such as public transport and in most shops, pharmacies, hair salons and other retail environments, you don't have to wear one if you have a reasonable excuse.

If you have a reasonable excuse to not wear a face covering you should tell a member of staff in the shop or tell the driver or inspector on public transport. But what exactly is a reasonable excuse? You have a reasonable excuse not to wear a face covering if you:

- Cannot wear a face covering because of a physical or mental illness or a disability, or because it would cause you severe distress
- Need to communicate with someone who has difficulties communicating
- Remove your face covering to provide care or assistance to a vulnerable person or to provide emergency assistance to someone
- Remove your face covering to take medication
- Remove your face covering to avoid harm or injury

You don't have to wear a face covering in post offices, credit unions or banks, sit-in restaurants or cafés or medical or dental offices.

Certain people do not have to wear one. For example, retail workers and drivers of public transport do not have to wear a face covering when they are separated by a screen from the public. Members of the Garda Síochána do not have to wear a face covering when performing their duties.

Seán Warren had the final score, another Kilmurry point from a free kick, to wrap up a competent display and send Kilmurry through to meet Clondrohid in the quarter finals.
