

ST. OLAN

St. Olan is the patron saint of Aghabullogue parish. His feast day is on the 5th of September and on that day, rounds are made to him. This tradition has been passed down through the years. Every year on the feast of St. Olan Mass is celebrated here.

This Holy man must have lived during an early century of Christianity of the Irish Church since his name is entered in the calendar of Aongus where he's designated as a "fair pillar" and "victory of piety". He was a preceptor of St. Finbarr.

The inscription on the Ogham Stone is nearly complete. It reads: "MADORA MAQI DEAG". There is evidence that the inscription is connected to The Clann Deaga who lived in the same era as The Red Branch Knights.



Macroom Artist Feature

Ann Mechelinck - Textile Artist

Coming from a traditional background where creative impulses were something to be pursued 'on the side', Ann spent decades working as an administrator.

It wasn't until 2005, when she moved from Belgium to Ireland, that she slowly began to realise how deep she had repressed her genuine passions and how she longed to recapture and fulfil that childhood dream of becoming an artist. In 2009 she decided to stop waiting for the 'right time' and set off on her creative journey, studying an Arts, Crafts and Design course at McEgan College in Macroom, followed by a Professional Painting course at St. John's College in Cork, to finally graduate in 2015 in Applied Arts - Textiles at the Crawford College of Art and Design in Cork. She lives in Macroom, co. Cork and has been working full-time as a self-employed textile artist since 2017. She has exhibited work as far as Japan, Ukraine and the USA.

Being confined at home during the lockdown, Ann was given the time to refocus on the beauty of where she lives – a rural area in West Cork, Ireland - and became, once again, inspired to explore natural forms and textures found in plant life in her immediate surroundings and neighbourhood.

In this series of work, tiny organisms and plants like moss and lichens became an inspiration and while looking for a way to explore and interpret their colours and textures, she learned how to stitch French knots and taught herself circular weaving by watching instruction videos.

She aims to create pieces that appear organic, uncovering the often unseen or overlooked beauty and diversity in the undergrowth by using a variety of yarns and threads in different thicknesses and tactility, kept to

a limited palette of mainly greens. She likes to hand-stitch or hand-weave: The slow pace and the repetitive movement of my hands become quite meditative and contemplative and often makes me withdraw in my own little world and thoughts, away from all the suffering that is surrounding us at the moment.

This work is all about going back-to-basics, to appreciate and embrace the small things in life, to appreciate nature and be inspired by her resilience and ability to regenerate.

Ann has worked in a variety of materials: paper, rope, fabrics....

The materials are, of course, part of the works' aesthetics but are primarily chosen to serve of the concept behind the work and because of certain qualities or possibilities of manipulation.

For the 'moss' series, the qualities of wools and yarns - soft, durable, natural – and connotations such as traditional, handmade, homely... fitted the concept - back-to-basics, appreciating and embracing the small things in life – perfectly.

She works with yarns of different thicknesses and tactility, sometimes combining 2 to 4 strands into one and keeping the colour palette limited, mainly working with various shades of greens to create a soothing, calming effect and representing hope, growth, harmony and safety.

De La Salle Doings

The last two weeks saw the return of all students and staff to De La Salle College. After communicating virtually for so long, it was great to see our students again. We welcomed two new first year classes, who seem to be settling in already! It is a challenging experience transitioning to second level education in our current 'socially distant' climate but the boys have taken it in their stride and we are very impressed with them.

We never thought leaving school in March that we would not see our sixth year class as a whole, face to face again. Teachers and students prepared assiduously online in March, April and May for a Leaving Cert exam that never came to pass. Had the exams taken place, we know the class would have done extremely well. We commend them on their hard work and determination in the face of such uncertainty. We are extremely proud of the young men that received their results this week and we wish them every success and happiness for their future.

De La Salle looked very different on return this August. The principal, deputy principal, care taker, cleaners and other staff worked tirelessly in previous weeks to get the school ready for a safe return. A massive amount of work was done and staff, parents and students are very appreciative. The brand new temporary accommodation was built over the Summer and is in action for the start of this school year. It has come at the perfect time! The building holds four general classrooms, a high spec science laboratory, two ASD classrooms, two special education teaching rooms, a sensory room, a toilet block and 25 additional parking spaces. This has helped alleviate the pressure rising second level numbers has put on school facilities in recent years. We are very hopeful that outstanding technical issues relating to our proposed green-field site can be addressed in the near future helping to pave the way for a new 500 pupil school to meet the 21st century needs of Macroom town and its hinterland.

The students all participated in a 'Covid 19 Induction' last week. This

was to ensure students were fully aware of all the new safety and health measures the school has put in place this year. These can be found on the school website. Social distancing is in effect in the school, both in class and at lunchtime. The students and staff have been doing a great job in making sure the show goes on, with as little disruption to learning as possible but in an extremely safe manner. A reminder to any parents of the four main symptoms of Covid 19: temperature, cough, shortness of breath and loss of taste/smell. Any student with the onset of any one of these four symptoms should not attend school but should contact their GP for further advice.

As I have explained in previous editions, our parish gets its name from the O'Leary families who once ruled in this area of the Lee Valley for about 900 years. Many of their descendants, who still live in the parish, or are scattered all over Ireland and the world have congregated here on a yearly visit every autumn for the past 25 years. And despite this year's Covid virus restrictions, it will go ahead still- but this year by ZOOM! an internet application which can connect many people in the world at the one time. The list covers O' Learys from the USA from California to New York, England, Australia and of course Ireland. It will be a challenge to cover so many time zones at once.

For rainbows and for flowers,
For colouring books and crayons
That keep us going for hours.

The days are definitely getting shorter and more autumnal. I noticed the holly berries are starting to glow a little more orange daily and soon will be scarlet. The leaves are changing colour and floating to the ground or in some cases when the wind is more blustery there is quite a flurry of leaves falling. There has always been a bit of discussion in our house about when does autumn actually begin. According to Met Éireann autumn begins on the first day of September and continues until the end of November. I think our ancestors thought differently and the hint is in the Irish language equivalent of September – Meán Fómhair. This translates to middle autumn or middle harvest which indicates that our ancestors considered it as the middle of autumn or the middle of the harvest season. So autumn was considered to be August, September and October.

Now I wonder what is being harvested from all those gardens that grew up during the spring time when local travel restrictions were in place. I know we had a bumper crop of sugar snaps and peas – well we hadn't planted that many but peas fresh from the garden are very tasty as are freshly pulled onions. Unfortunately I think the best crop from my garden will be blackberries and this is due to absolutely no input whatsoever from me!! More dedicated gardeners will be storing onions, potatoes, turnips, carrots and many other vegetables to be used during the winter months. Fruit bushes are producing fruits to be made into jam or frozen to be put into pies and crumbles at a later date and of course the orchards will be sharing their bounty too.

Hopefully you will be reading this on a nice bright, fine, sunny autumn day similar to the day I'm writing it. There has been a constant stream of customers to the library all day and all were in agreement that it was a lovely day, back to school weather, as many put it. But as I said at the beginning the days are getting shorter and don't forget the ideal pastime for the evening if you can't get out in the garden is a good book. History

Kilbrennan Abbey

Strawhall formally Kilbrennan is a townland in the eastern side of Kilmurry Parish, situated not far from the village of Cloughdub. Kilbrennan Abbey was founded in the eighth century by Saint Aedus or Aedh Mac Bricc, or Saint Hugh of Rahugh (or Rahue). His feast day or the date of the saint's death is the 10 November 789. The Annals of Ulster places the event in 589 and/or 595 which would place Aedh Mac Bricc as a pre-Finbarrian saint.

His father, Brocc, was a member of the Ui Neill; his mother, whose name remains unknown, came from Munster, and Aedh Mac Bricc himself became renowned in the midlands where his principal foundation was at Cill Air or Killare in Westmeath. He was a great grandson of Niall of the Nine Hostages. Tradition tells us that a holy man came to his father's house one day and foretold to a little maid that her mistress would soon bear a son, and if he were born at daybreak, he would be great in the sight of God and of man. The maid reported the prophecy to her mistress, who, being a woman of determination, decided that the necessary condition would be fulfilled. When her labour started, she sat on a large stone and decided that the child would not be born until daybreak.

On his birth, the baby's head which had been pressing on the stone presumably with some force due to his being held back for so long, had formed a hollow in it. The water that collects in the hollow is said to contain a cure for many ailments. Indeed, if the head of a person suffering from a headache is rested in the hollow, instant relief ensues. The stone can still be seen to this day near the ancient monastery of Rahugh and is known locally as the headache stone. He is chronicled as *sui-liag*, the master-physician, in a fragmentary story of the life of St Brigit; He is reputed to have miraculously cured Saint Bridget of a headache.

Aedh grew up then working on his father's farm. When his father died, Aedh's brother refused to give him his rightful inheritance. Aedh planned to kidnap a girl from his brother's household to force the issue, but Illathan, bishop of Rathlihen, Offay, talked him out of it. Aedh then stayed with the bishop to study and start a new life. When he grew to manhood, Hugh entered a monastery near Kilcormac where he studied theology and scripture. He then spent some time in Munster where he founded this monastery at Kilbrennan, eventually returning to his native Rahugh, where he founded another monastery, after being consecrated bishop.


He travelled extensively in Westmeath and converted many of his kinsmen (something St. Patrick found next to impossible). He also established a monastery at Slieve Liag in Donegal and may also have founded the monastery at Killare. He died in 588 AD and is buried at Rahugh. His crozier was in the possession of a family in that area for many generations. It passed to the Nagles of Jamestown House, but what happened to it after that family died out, is not known.

Tradition attributes many journeys to Aedh which make interesting reading but contribute little to authentic history. Aedh Mac Bricc's fame, is more personal and general than monastic, while his reputation for sanctity and as a patron through whose supernatural intervention headaches might be cured, ensured him lasting fame. The length of Aedh's sojourn in Munster is not known. It is possible that the abbey of Kilbrennan was founded by him on one of his journeys and that it was entrusted to one of his disciples. Nothing has come to light concerning the subsequent history of this abbey, but some of its ruins were still visible when Smith was compiling his history in 1780. Kilbrennan, which was earlier known as Enoch mid Brenin or Brevin In 1939 it was described as "a rectangular building, 58 by 22 ¾, with walls 2 ¼ feet in thickness. The walls of the chancel end stand to a height of 7 feet but it is doubtful if they are original. While to the south has all the appearance of being ancient, being of uncoursed masonry with rough lime mortar, the northern wall in its more regular courses and better selection of stones, looks much later. In the eastern gable there are slight traces of a window opening. The walls of the nave have been erased to the levels of the foundations, and there is a mound of debris at the western end. There are no traces of lateral buildings"

Only a short crumbling bit of a wall remains today of what was once Kilbrennan Abbey. Looking at the layout of the fields surrounding the Abbey, one notices that, they are in the shape

of the letter "T" and most probably the shape of a Cross in days gone past before one field fence was removed, with the Abbey in the centre of the map (See the attached map)

There statues of two Bishops over the Alter in Cloughdub Church, I believe that some years ago when painters were cleaning the statues for painting, they discovered that St. Aedh, was inscribed on the base of one of those statues. Unfortunately I can't confirm if this is fact.

MACROOM IDENTIFIED AS A POTENTIAL GAELTACHT SERVICE TOWN

Macroom has been identified as a town that could get status as a Gaeltacht service town because of the many links that it has with the Gaeltacht community and because of the strong Irish language community in the town.

To this end a language planning process will soon begin in the town so that Irish speakers will have more opportunities to use the language and the town can to add to the services available to the community through Irish.

The current language planning process began under the Gaeltacht Act 2012. Under the act funding and support are provided to areas to prepare and implement language plans to increase the Irish used in that area in various realms including the education sector, the arts, the business sector and the community as a whole. Areas are given two years to prepare language plans, which are implemented over seven years.

There are sixteen towns in Ireland recognised as towns that could achieve this status as Gaeltacht service towns. The process is already well developed in Gaeltacht planning areas throughout the country including in the Múscraí Gaeltacht. Measures are set out in these plans to support business to provide more services to customers through Irish, to provide more social opportunities for people in every age group and to provide more learning opportunities for people at every level.

Macroom already stands out as an area with a wealth of culture and heritage and a language plan will greatly add to the tourism offering in the town, increasing the number of visitors to the town. There will also be many benefits for people in the town with more social, commercial and learning opportunities in Irish becoming available.

The language plan belongs to the community and language plans are stronger and more effective when the community is heavily involved. Therefore, in the coming weeks Foras na Gaeilge will be contacting people in the town in different sectors to share more information with them about this language planning process.

To give the entire community a chance to take part in the process an online public meeting will be held and everyone will have an opportunity to get more information about the process and to ask questions of representatives from Foras na Gaeilge and from the Department of Media, Tourism, Art, Culture, Sport and Gaeltacht. Keep an eye out for more information about this meeting soon.

Kelleher calls on Irish Govt to secure additional EU support to police Irish fishing waters

Ireland South MEP, Billy Kelleher has called on the Irish Government to reach out to other EU member states with a view to securing support in policing Irish fishing waters.

The Renew Europe MEP was responding to concerns from the Irish South and West Fish Producers Organisation.

"Quite rightly, Irish fisheries organisations have called into question the potential of the Naval Service to adequately patrol Irish waters once Brexit comes into play.

"Irish waters are a rich spawning ground for many species of fish. They must be rigorously protected if we are to secure future stocks and future employment for Irish fishermen.

"Until the Naval Service is strengthened, we must look for support from our EU colleagues," said the Fianna Fáil MEP.

"Longer term, Minister Coveney and the Government in general, must commit to restoring the Naval Service, and indeed the wider Defence Forces, to their full operational capacity. As an island nation, our Naval Service is incredibly important and it must be given the resources needed to protect our waters.

"However, we face an immediate threat if Britain restricts access to their waters in the event of a no-deal Brexit. We will see an influx of other European fishing vessels into Irish waters.

"We must have the policing capacity to ensure that quota rules are adhered to, that illegal fishing does not take place and that the potential income of Irish fishermen is not drastically reduced.

"I am appealing to the Irish Government to prepare for this possibility and ensure that if it happens, Irish fishermen will have their rights protected in their own waters," concluded Kelleher.



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: HELP TO BUY

I'm planning to buy my first home, how do I qualify for the Help to Buy Scheme?

As a first-time buyer, if you buy or self-build a new residential property, you may be able to claim a refund of income tax and DIRT that you paid over the previous 4 tax years. You cannot claim relief on the PRSI or USC you paid.

The maximum relief has been temporarily increased until 31 December 2020. Now, you can claim enhanced relief on the lesser of:

- €30,000
- 10% of the purchase price of the property
- 10% of the completion value of a self-build
- The amount of income tax and DIRT you paid for the previous 4 years

To be eligible for the enhanced relief, you must sign a contract for a new house or draw down on a self-build mortgage between 23 July 2020 and 31 December 2020.

To qualify, the property must:

- Be a new-build property or a self-build
- Cost under €500,000
- Be bought or built as your first home (it cannot be an investment property)

You must also:

- Live in the property for 5 years from the date that it is habitable
- Be fully tax compliant for the 4 years immediately before your claim

You do not qualify if you:

- Are a cash buyer
- Are buying with someone else who is not a first-time buyer
- Have previously bought or built a property, either individually or jointly with anyone else, even if you are now separated or divorced from that person. If you have inherited or been gifted a property previously, it does not affect your eligibility.

You must **take out a mortgage** of at least 70% of the purchase price (or, for a self-build, 70% of the valuation approved by the mortgage provider). This is known as the loan to value ratio. You can have a guarantor on the loan.

Kilmichael are through to the semi final stage of the MJK Oils Mid Cork Junior hurling championship and a meeting with Inniscarra after this exciting win over Donoughmore at a cold and windy Grenagh. 




