GREAT EXPECTATION FROM THIRD GENERATION!

The cattle drovers would arrive into town around 5 or 6 am and she would have been up since 4 am baking & cooking for them.

As the years went by Dan and Maureen had three sons, Gerard, Declan & Don. Gerard married Margaret Crowley, a teacher from Killarney & Don married Margaret O Leary, a neighbour's child from around the corner in the Victoria Hotel

Business grew over the years & so did the Castle Hotel, it's name having been changed from Ronans to The Castle Hotel to coincide with The Castle Gates in the square. What was initially a 10 bed roomed boarding house, grew to 16 rooms, then 26 rooms, then 42 rooms. And after the purchase of Mescals Café & Card Shop, The Castle Hotel is now a 56 bed roomed 4 Star Hotel, with a Leisure Centre, boasting just under 1000 members, Conference & Banqueting Facilities for up to 200 people, The Award Winning "Dan Buckley's" Bar & "B's" Restaurant & a thriving Coffee Shop called the "Next Door Café".

2019 and 2020 saw the wonderful additions of Jack and Rory to the team! Jack, a Ballymaloe Cookery School Graduate and Rory a UCC graduate, both will have a large part to play in expanding their family business and in particular the wedding business. Rory gave us a 60 seconds of insight to tell us about himself and his vision for The Castle Hotel, Macroom.

Q: What is your earliest memory of your family in the hotel?

A: For me it's probably the excitement of staying over for a night in the hotel with Nanny and being spoiled with all the lovely food from the kitchen. Another memory is playing football with some of the staff in the function room of the old hotel before it was renovated, don't think I'd get away with that now!

Q: What motivated you to join the family

A: I studied Commerce in college and then spent the best part of 7-8 years working in tech companies most recently with Salesforce in Dublin. I enjoyed the work and met some great people but in the last few years going back to the hotel felt like an itch that I just had to scratch. It's been in the family for almost 70 years and I've seen how hard everyone has worked to make constant improvements over the years and the motivation to continue that legacy was a big factor in joining the business.

Q: What aspect of the hospitality industry most excites you?

A: Making people happy is the most exciting thing for me going to work every day. Sometimes that can be something simple like friends or family catching up over a meal or a coffee, or it can be bigger occasions like christenings, birthdays etc but ultimately seeing happy customers is the most exciting part of the job. Trying to innovate and move with the times is also a buzz, our new online takeaway menu is a great example of this and something myself and Jack worked closely together on.

Q: How are you finding life after lockdown and working within the new Government **Guidelines?**

A: It's challenging and constantly evolving but after seeing the hotel closed for 3 and a half months it was just great to be able to open again. I stayed in the hotel when we were closed and it was so strange to see the building empty. I think it's all about finding the correct balance in trying to make everything feel as normal as possible, while also ensuring customer and staff health is our top priority. What I've found is that people really missed things like a night away, a meal with friends so they really appreciate being able to do that now in a safe and friendly environment.

Q: Describe your typical day?

A: Tough guestion as I've found nearly everyday is different! Most days I will get to the hotel around 10 in the morning. I'll normally check a few emails, catch up with the reception staff to see what bookings and enquiries have come through. Then it's over to the bar to make sure we're ready to go for the day and all setup for what I hope will be a busy lunch! The majority of my day is spent meeting and greeting customers or working behind the bar,



in a family run business the importance of being visible and meeting as many people as possible can't be underestimated. There's always a few different things that pop up during the day then like event enquiries, staff rostering, a wedding couple popping in to have a look etc. Two or three evenings a week then I've football training or matches which are a welcome release from work. I try to have one day in the week where I don't go near the hotel and switch off completely but that's not always possible!

Q: What do you hope to bring to the Castle **Hotel Wedding Experience?**

A: For as long as I can remember wedding days always bring a great source of excitement to the hotel and I hope we can continue that for many years to come. I've had a number of friends get married in the past few years so you're constantly picking up new ideas and trying to find ways to improve. For me I hope to keep all our traditional values of good food. a warm welcome and also keep innovating and modernising to keep up with customer needs.

Owner, Don Buckley said "It is so exciting to welcome both Jack and Rory on board and we look forward to working alongside them, exchanging ideas with a view to further developing our hotel". 

End of an Era: The petrol pumps that stood like sentinels at Murphy's Corner for over two generations have been removed. Roadside pumps are becoming a rare sight these days as most of us now fill up in the spacious and purpose built filling stations and forecourts and for health and safety reasons more and more petrol pumps are being closed and moved outside villages and towns. Murphy's pumps provided fuel for all types of motorists down through the years and were very welcome to locals who would get their cars filled every week by helpful staff before we all had to learn how to do it ourselves.

The pumps and the shop were a very welcome sight for those who found themselves running low on fuel as they travelled the highways and byways of the county. Many the American tourist called to the shop looking for a fill of 'Gas' on their way from Blarney to Killarney.

Over the years the pumps were revamped, modernised and changed in looks and in style, how they operated and how they measured our consumption from gallons to litres but they were a constant part of the street furniture throughout the last 60 years. Now, like the phone box in the village they too have succumbed to progress and a changing way of life. Thankfully we still have Cooney's and its modern filling station to cater for all our fuel needs for some time yet to come.

Litter on the rise again: The amount of litter being left at the Cork County Council recycling bins in Coachford is on the increase again. There was a marked improvement in the area when the council had cameras installed there but since they were removed people's dirty habits have resurfaced. Coachford Tidy Towns are once more appealing to people to take their litter home with them and to keep the area clean and tidy and are looking for the cameras to be installed there as a permanent fixture as a deterrent to litter louts.

Road safety issues for schoolchildren: Local residents at the Glebe have expressed concerns around the safety of children as they walk to school. The absence of a footpath from Beechville and Fr. Patrick Sheehan Place housing estates continues to be a major concern for many families as well as the amount of traffic and the unsuitable road from the village to the two schools in Coachford.

Once again this year the children from the estates at the Glebe and those from the village have to walk to school on a busy road without any footpath in one section of the road and only a partial footpath in another section. As Coachford College expands and the number of pupils attending the school increases so has the traffic. However there has been no upgrades to the footpaths or roads in the last 20 years.

Peter Dineen of the local Community Council said, "This is an accident waiting to happen. It is an absolute disgrace that that there is still no footpath from the housing estates to the national school and the very fact that we don't even have a pedestrian crossing from the village footpath to the one to school means children are taking their lives in their hands every morning as they try to get to school.

This is an issue that Cork County Council are well aware of but refuse to do anything about. The council must take responsibility to upgrade the road and footpath infrastructure as this area of Coachford develops. We cannot move the schools but we surely can improve the roads and make it safe for our children to get to school. The council are continuously harping on about the environment and how we should be walking to school but anyone wishing to try getting to our schools on foot has to take their lives in their hands. That can't be right in this day and age.



History The Mills Inn

The Mills Inn was established as a stage-couch stop-over by James Colthurst in 1755 and was originally part of the Colthurst Estate, of which Blarney Castle is still included. Colthurst would later have a chequered history with the local community who, for the most part, were not sympathetic to the ideals of the landed gentry. The premises may have got its name from two Millraces built adjacent to the site on the River Sullane and may have earlier origins if we consider its location in relation to the nearby Early Christian monastic site of St. Gobnait.

Throughout the many turbulent times in Irish history, public places such as hotels and other local landmarks would play host to many famous people and the Mills Inn was no exception. For instance, during the early 1800's, the Inn was often used as a stop-over by the Irish liberator Daniel O'Connell while travelling from cork during the struggle for Catholic emancipation. However during other more tempestuous times, places such as these would also suffer the consequences of conflict during periods of unrest. During the Fenian Rising of 1867, the adjacent tower, known locally as 'the courthouse', was used as a prison during this historic event and the holding cells can still be seen today from the lawn.

On another occasion, during the height of the Land League troubles in 1881, Charles Colthurst married Jane Morr and held the celebrations at the Mills Inn where a great feast was prepared, accompanied by many barrels of porter! At

midnight, a shot rang out and a gang of masked man attacked the wedding party where a number of people were shot. Mr. Coulthurst and his new bride fled to Blarney and were never to return to

During the War of Independence (1919-1921), the 'Great House' as it was known and the tower in the grounds of the Mills were empty for a period. On the 9th of June 1920, the local Flying Column of the Irish Republican Army decided to burn into the ground to ensure it would not fall into rival hands. And so, the ruins of the great house and tower are what remain today.

Restart Grant now available for B&B's in non-rateable premises

Bed and Breakfast Owners who do not pay local authority rates will now be able to claim grants of up to €4,000 following the opening of applications under the Restart Grant Plus for B&B's. The scheme which is part of the Government's July Stimulus Plan is worth up to €8 million and aims to help B&B owners with the cost of reopening and operating their business during the ongoing Covid-19 Pandemic.

The grant will be administered through Fáilte Ireland on behalf of the Department of Business, Enterprise and Innovation. B&B's that are covered by the tourism quality system, the National Quality Assurance Framework (NQAF), will be able to receive grant approval directly from Fáilte Ireland.

Welcoming the announcement Macroom County Councillor Eileen Lynch said "The confirmation of the availability of the Restart Plus Scheme to non-rateable B&B's is a necessary help to an industry that has been so hardly hit by Covid-19. The funds will help owners to continue to operate their businesses in these tough times. I'd like to highlight also that B&B's that do pay local authority rates can already apply to Cork County Council for the equivalent of their 2019 rates bill, excluding arrears, subject to a minimum grant of €4,000 and a maximum of €25,000."

"The Restart Plus Grant is open to all commercial trading entities who operate from a rateable premises, have suffered a loss of 25% or more in turnover from 1 April 2020-30 June 2020, employ less than 250 people and have a turnover of €100,000 or less per employee. I would strongly encourage all eligible businesses to apply before the deadline of 30 September 2020; please note if you applied for the Restart Grant earlier in the year you can still also apply for the Restart Plus Grant."

A new series of the programme Cartlann Bhóthar na Léinsí has kicked off with the autumn schedule on RTÉ Raidió na Gaeltachta. The popular series draws from RnaG Munster archives, housed in the station's Kerry studio in Baile na nGall, and will be presented by Dáithí de Mórdha.

The programme will bring listeners some priceless recordings from all over the Munster Gaeltachtaí in Kerry, Cork and Waterford, dating back to 1972. These will include folklore and storytelling, songs, music and history, and will offer a window on Gaeltachta society and community in years past.

Presenter Dáithí de Mórdha is an ethnographer with a passion for his subject, and has written a Doctoral thesis on the relationship between the Gaeltacht community and RTÉ Raidió naGaeltachta. Previous to joining the station, he worked in Ionad an Bhlascaoid, the Blasket Island Centre, for sixteen years. Dáithí is a member of the RTÉ RnaG newsroom staff.

Of the series, Dáithí says:

"We're very lucky in the Gaeltacht that we have one of the most rich and extensive sound archives in the world in RTÉ Raidió na Gaeltachta, and it would be a terrible shame to leave it silent. It will be a great privilege for me to be able to share some of the gems in the Munster archives with listeners in this new series of Cartlann Bhóthar na Léinsí. If they would like to hear particular recordings, or material related to a certain topic, I'd love to hear from them, and I can go delving into the archives then to, hopefully, locate it!"

Cartlann Bhóthar na Léinsí can be heard every Sunday morning from 9.30 am to 10 am on RTÉ Raidió na Gaeltachta, and you can listen back to the programme on the RTÉ Radio Player, www.rte.ie/radioplayer. 





KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: STAY AND SPEND TAX INCENTIVE

Question: I have booked a hotel break in Kerry in October. What is the new Stay and Spend scheme and how does it work?

The new Stay and Spend scheme allows you to claim tax back on accommodation, food and non-alcoholic drink (known as qualifying expenditure) bought between 1 October 2020 and 30 April

You can check if a business is participating in the scheme by looking out for the 'Stay & Spend Tax Credit' logo or you can check Revenue's list of qualifying service providers.

Under the terms of the incentive:

- You must spend a minimum of €25 in a single transaction on qualifying expenditure and submit the receipt to Revenue
- You can submit receipts up to a total of €625, or €1,250 for a jointly-assessed married couple Revenue will provide an income tax credit of up to €125 per person, or up to €250 for a jointly-assessed married couple

You can claim expenses on:

- Fáilte Ireland registered accommodation, including hotels, guest houses, B&Bs, self-catering, caravan parks, camping parks and holiday camps.
- Food and non-alcoholic drink served in a café, restaurant, hotel or pub.

You cannot claim expenses on takeaway food, alcoholic drinks, drinks (either alcoholic or non-alcoholic) served without food or amounts below €25.


You do not need to be on a 'staycation' to avail of the scheme. You can also claim for expenses you paid in your local area if they meet the definition of qualifying expenditure. You must have receipts to prove your claim for Stay and Spend expenses.

You can make your claim in two stages:

- 1. Submit your receipts to Revenue using the Revenue Receipts Tracker mobile app or using the receipts tracker service in Revenue's myAccount
- Make an electronic claim for Stay and Spend tax credit through your Income tax return Form 12 make an electronic claim to stay and specific tax Credit through your income tax returning in myAccount (if you are a PAYE taxpayer) or Form 11 in ROS (if you are self- employed).

A Word of Victory

Welcome back dear reader last week we saw how Jesus gives us His Peace. We carry out this authority by arming ourselves with and standing upon God's Word. Jesus had to do this, so if He needed to overcome the enemy with the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God, we definitely need to do the same (Ephesians 6:10-18).

Irish MEP lodges formal objection to Commission proposals to ban lead shot over wetlands

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has today lodged a formal, written objection to the European Commission's proposal to ban lead shot over wetlands

Kelleher lodged the objection in his capacity as a member of the European Parliament's Committee on Environment, Climate Action and Public Health (ENVI).

"I have been inundated by messages from farmers and gun sports enthusiasts in Ireland who are aghast at this proposal. While I fully understand and appreciate the environmental and wildlife concerns, the Commission's proposal as currently drafted and when applied to Ireland, is too expansive.

"Ireland would, I believe, be disproportionately affected due to the high number of designated wetland areas. A more balanced, middle ground approach needs to be found.

"Our country has the highest proportion of wetland coverage, according to the EU, at 4000 square kilometres or 5.6% of total land area. When you add in the Commission's proposal to extend the ban to anywhere within 100 metres of wetland, Irish farmers and gun enthusiasts will be severely restricted.

"The Commission's answer is always the same. Switch to steel cartridges. What they fail to understand is the cost that would be incurred to adapt the shotguns - estimated at approximately €2000 per gun - is very prohibitive.

"According to a Parliamentary Answer, the Irish Government, while requesting a longer lead in time to allow for the transition, voted in favour of implementing the current proposals. This is very disappointing.

"I believe, at the very least, a longer lead in time is necessary to allow gun owners to make the transition. However, Ireland's unique position must be taken into account - a blanket ban is not the best solution," concluded Kelleher.


