

Macroom GAA Colm Casey, Keel, Macroom, R.I.P. (29th August 2020)

A Tribute by Tadg Sheehan, Macroom, GAA Club.

It was with great sadness that Macroom GAA Club learnt of the sudden death of our former players Colm Casey. Colm began playing at Under-8 level with his great friends and buddies Darren, Conor, and Padraig. From the very beginning they always arrived together at the Castle Grounds for training and matches; as they got older and began driving, they continued to turn up for training, now in the one car. One could see that there was a fantastic bond between them.

Colm played in successful Macroom winning teams at U-13, U-14, U-15 and U-16 at Juvenile level, winning Mid- Cork titles and City League title. With St. Colman's Boys' National School Colm played a huge role in winning Sciath Na Scoil. For Macroom the highlight was winning the U-16A Muskerry Football championship in 2007, beating Blarney in the

final and having knocked-out favourites Éire Óg in the semifinal. This was the top grade at the time, and Macroom have not won it since.

At adult level Colm continued to play at and won a Muskerry Minor Football Championship in 2009 and in later years, he won Junior C Championship and League medals. He also played at Junior A and Intermediate level with Macroom.

From his U-8 days he was quiet and most unassuming, and he was always a gentleman. Colm left his talking on the pitch and when you asked him to do a certain job, he would go about it in his own quiet fuss-free way. You knew he would not let you down.

Colm's untimely and unfortunate passing is an enormous loss for his parents Sean and Bernie, his brother Daniel, his sister Michelle and his relations. Macroom GAA Club offers sincerest condolences

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ENJOYING LOCAL HISTORY AT MCEGAN COLLEGE

Recently students at McEgan College were given the opportunity to sample some local history during the recent fine weather. They were first of all taken to see the old walls at the back of the school and it was explained to them that these would at one time have constituted part of an outer defence wall. Then the monument to the victims of the 1798 uprising was shown and explained to them.

Next was the entrance gateway which is the only part of the old castle buildings that is standing and maintained in good repair. Its function was explained to the students and they were then told about the cannon facing outwards from the castle entrance. It was explained to them that these were a gift to Lady Ardilaun's mother from the Earl of Bantry when she married him. It was also pointed out that they were intended for use as naval guns. After crossing a busy street, the students arrived at what is known locally as 'The Old Protestant Graveyard'. While here they got an opportunity to distinguish between primary sources and secondary sources. They were allowed to explore the area before being shown the grave of a British soldier, killed in 1920 and who was, presumably, a casualty of the Irish War of Independence.

They were also told that Burke's Garage was once the stable yard of the old castle and that it also allowed people from the Castle quick and easy access to the Church of Ireland building. It is planned to take students out again in the coming weeks to explore further aspects of their local history. They are very lucky to have such a wealth of ancient artefacts so near to the school, especially as they are not allowed any bus trips to places of historical interest due to Covid-19 restrictions. These trips are being organised by Ms Condon with the assistance of Mr Healy, a native of Macroom.

Why Study History At Secondary School By Mr Michael Healy

Mc Gegan College History is not just another subject: it is a story, a wonderful story, a magical tale of faraway places, of people afraid of sailing too far out to sea in case they fell off the edge of the world but also of other braver people who sailed right around the world and discovered places like America and Australia that no knew existed.

In fairy tales you'll read of kings and princes but in history you will read of

ordinary everyday people like you and me; of people trying to cut down trees using stones and thinking there must be an easier way until they finally discovered iron and knew then they had found an easier way. It is a story of both ignorance and knowledge: of people who thought that people in other countries had no heads – just eyes in their chests and mouths in their bellies and of others who realised that blood circulated throughout the whole body and that the earth revolved around the sun.

It is the story of a man who became almost a hunchback from spending years lying hunched over on his back painting the Sistine chapel. It is the story of great evil like Hitler and of great good like Florence Nightingale.

It is the story of years of oppression, of wars

against a people who did not want their land to be taken from them or to be ruled by another country. It is the story of great suffering like the Irish famine or the extermination of the Jews. It is the story of people struggling to be free of this suffering and oppression like they did in Easter 1916 or in the French Revolution of 1789. It is the story of great armies moving out to conquer other nations, but it is also the story of mothers wailing uselessly over the dead bodies of husbands and over the dead bodies of sons killed in wars.

It is above all a story about YOU – your family, your parish, your town, your people, your country, your continent, your world. Without history none of us would even exist!

Services: Study spaces, newspaper/magazine reading and events are not currently available.

Access to newspapers online is available through PressReader on your phone/tablet or on using the library PCs or Wi-Fi. There is a full list of newspaper titles on **PressReader**.

I.T Services: 20 minutes sessions will be available only for Internet/ Wi-Fi. It is advisable to book in advance. Printing and Photocopy services will be available but please make sure that you have exact change.

Please remember to sanitize your hands as you enter the library and perform good respiratory hygiene. Remember to social distance at the entrance, the public counter and throughout the library at all times. Do not visit the library if you or someone in your household **has symptoms of COVID -19 or you are a confirmed case.**

New Book Stock – We have new book stock arriving weekly in the library – Please see our new Quick Pick stand inside the front door on the left as you enter. **Great News! The Online Requesting System** is now open again. You can search the online catalogue, place requests on items from libraries across the country and have them delivered to Macroom library for collection.

If you always wanted to try a musical instrument, now is your chance. **Cork County Council Library's Sound Initiative** has a wide selection of **instruments to borrow from for free** – violin, guitar including electric, keyboards, mandolins, bodhráns, banjos, ukuleles and of course bongo drums.

collected at your local library.





So what's next in the library? Well The Libraries Ireland Children's Book Festival will run throughout the month of October and although we cannot have events in the library we are really excited about taking the festival online. 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
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KILMURRY HAA

We are hosting the Third annual Terence MacSwiney Weekend on 16th to 18th October. This is especially significant this year, on the 100th anniversary of the death of the former Lord Mayor of Cork. Terence MacSwiney's grandon **Dr. Cathal MacSwiney Brugha**, will provide the opening address, at 8pm on Friday 16th October in St. Mary's Church, Kilmurry

On **Saturday 17th October**, we have a series of lectures from eminent historians:

Dr. Finola Doyle O'Neill : "The Making of a Martyr: Media, Spectacle and the death of Terence MacSwiney"

Dr. John Borgonova : 'Terence MacSwiney and Revolutionary Cork' John Mulcahy 'The Cork hunger strike of 1920'

Gabriel Doherty 'Catholic ethics, the hunger strike, and the struggle for Irish independence: from Ashe to Murphy, Fitzgerald & McSwiney'

These lectures will take place in Crookstown Hall, with registration from

10:30am, lectures commencing at 11.00. Lunch will be provided on the day.

On Sunday 18th October, ticket holders will have access to our exhibition 'Dying For An Ideal: Hunger Strike at Brixton and Cork 1920' at Independence Museum Kilmurry.

This exhibition is dedicated to Lord Mayor Terence MacSwiney and over 60 other prisoners at Cork Gaol who went on hunger strike as part of Ireland's struggle for Independence. This exhibition will include the stories of Michael Fitzgerald of Fermoy and Joe Murphy of Pouladuff Rd Cork who also died, and the others who continued to refuse food until November 11th 1920- Joseph Kenny of Grenagh, Tipperary natives Thomas Donovan, John Power and Michael Burke, brothers Peter and John Crowley, Christopher Upton, Michael O'Reilly, and John Hennessy from Limerick. There will be 2 time slots available from 11 am.

Ticket price is €20, which includes entry to the above events and lunch on Saturday

All Public Health Regulations and Guidelines for Covid19 will be in place for this event. Due to these requirements, we recommend that tickets are pre-booked to ensure entry to these events as places are limited for social distancing purposes.

Siofra O'Donovan, a grand-niece of **Kevin Barry**, has written a book 'Til Hell Freezes: A Memoir of Kevin Barry which has been published by Currach Books and is now available to the public. Siofra has visited Independence Museum Kilmurry during her research for the book. See the book press release below. It certainly looks like an interesting read.

The 1st of November marks 100 years since young Kevin Barry was hanged by the British Government during the Irish War of Independence. He was sentenced to death for his part in an attack upon a British Army supply lorry. A young lad of only 18, he was the first to be executed since the Easter Rising in 1916 and his death sent a ripple through the independence movement, galvanizing revolutionaries like Michael Collins to retaliate. Kevin Barry's sister Monty married Jim O'Donovan, a man of action himself. Síofra remembers staring at his hand where he had stubs for fingers as he regaled her with stories of his bomb-making exploits. Her father Donal had a portrait of him hanging in the study where he wrote a biography on him in 1989. Síofra grew up among her granduncle's belongings, listening to his heroics from those who knew him best, and it led her to pen this very intimate biography of an Irish martyr who was first a son, a brother, a friend.

He may have died young but Síofra shows us he lived a long life indeed.



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

History MACROOM CASTLE

The following is based mainly on James N. Healy's book: The Castles of County Cork (Cork 1988) by Mr Michael Healy, McEgan College.



Macroom Castle in days gone bye

There is some dispute as to when the castle was first built and by whom. The date given by James N. Healy is 1260 and it was said that it was built by the O'Flynns whose principal seat was near Skibbereen and the name Muskerry is derived from the descriptive "Muscraighe-O-Floinn (the pleasant country of the O'Flynns). It also states that there was a castle on this site built previously by the De Cogans (a Norman name; the Normans are principally associated with building the first castles across Britain and Ireland) but after the Battle of Callan the castle was burned and it passed into the ownership of the O'Flynns who rebuilt the castle. The McCarthys took over the castle and lands the following century.

In the middle of the fourteenth century Dermot More McCarthy defeated the clans of Muskerry, put their chiefs to death and settled in the district. His father, Cormac, was given a grant of Macroom and other lands in Muskerry at an annual rent of twenty shillings or one hawk!

The castle was 'repaired and beautified' by the father of Sir Cormac Mac Tighe MacCarthy who died in the castle in 1565.

In 1602 the castle was accidentally set on fire. It was under siege by Sir Charles Wilmot at the time. We must remember that, at the time, there was an outer defence wall and that the area inside the wall was called 'the bawn'. (Some traces still exist as the back walls of houses on Castle Street.) Some men within the bawn had killed a pig and not having any hot water to scald it they decided to singe it with straw, feathers and so on to burn off the hairs. As a consequence of not keeping a close eye on the fire, the thatch of a cabin that was built against the wall of the castle took fire. The fire then spread into the castle itself through a window where it ignited some tallow and this combustible material soon had the castle in flames. The people inside had to leave the castle and gather in the bawn. There they realised that they hadn't much hope as the outer walls would not withstand a prolonged attack and so decided to try and leave the castle and regroup in the nearby woods. However, before they could do so they were intercepted and about fifty of them were slain while the rest escaped under the cover of darkness. Soon after Cormac MacDermot made an abject submission after which he was pardoned. He then regained the castle and repaired it 'in a more modern manner'.

In 1642 after the start of the Confederate War Cardinal Rinnuccini came to Ireland as a

Papal Legate. He landed in Kenmare and started to journey overland to Kilkenny. He spent four days in Macroom castle where, among other people, he met Father Boethius MacEgan whom he consecrated as Bishop of Ross.

In 1650 Bishop MacEgan had assembled a force of 300 horsemen and 4,000 foot soldiers which he intended to march to Clonmel that was under siege by Cromwell at the time. One of Cromwell's commanders, Broghill, was dispatched to prevent Bishop MacEgan from doing so. The two sides met outside the castle in Macroom. The garrison in the castle, fearing that they would not be able to hold out against an attack, decided instead to set fire to the castle and join with the Irish forces outside. (Later in these wars of 1642 - 1649 the castle was again burned by Ireton, another butcher like Cromwell.) Although smaller, Broghill's force was better trained and better equipped and they routed the Irish forces, slaughtering 700 of them. Bishop MacEgan and the Sheriff of Kerry were captured. The sheriff was immediately executed while they took MacEgan to Carrigadrohid where the rest of his force was garrisoned. Broghill told MacEgan to call on the them to surrender but instead he called on the garrison to continue fighting whereupon Bishop MacEgan was hung within full sight of the garrison using the reins of his own horse. His death however was in vain as Broghill shortly after tricked the garrison into surrendering by getting tree trunks and dressing them to look like cannon. When the garrison saw these they thought that further resistance was pointless.

After the defeat of the Confederation of Kilkenny the castle and lands were granted to Admiral William Penn. He was later arrested and imprisoned in the Tower of London by Cromwell, his former friend. He was released in 1656 after which he settled in Macroom. There is a tradition in Macroom which James N. Healy disputes, that his son, William (who founded the state of Pennsylvania) lived there for a period of time. What is not disputed is that he was influenced as a Quaker while in Macroom by William Lee.

In 1660, after the restoration of Charles II as king, Donogh MacCarthy was rewarded for his faithfulness to the monarchy by being allowed to regain the castle and lands while Penn was compensated by being given Shanagarry. By 1691 the castle had again been rebuilt.

Because of their loyalty to James II the MacCarthys had almost all of their lands in Muskerry confiscated while the castle and lands in and around Macroom were auctioned off, being bought by the Hollow Sword Blade Company of London who sold it to Judge Bernard who in turn sold it to the Hedges-Eyre family. (The wars between James II and his opponent, William of Orange - a region in Holland - were religious wars. James II was the rightful king but was rejected by the English because he was Catholic, and the throne was offered to a Protestant cousin who became William III. William III, or King Billy as he is better known in Northern Ireland, is still commemorated each year by Orangemen for his victory over King James at the Battle of the Boyne.)

In 1750 Smith described it as two tall square towers, each sixty feet in height with a modern building in between. An American, William S. Balch, toured Ireland in 1848. In his book, 'Ireland as I saw it' he describes stopping off in Macroom for 10 minutes or so during which he walked through the village [of Macroom]. He describes the castle as being between 80 and 100 feet in length and 40 or 50 feet in depth. He wrote:

"The castle, except for the tower and turrets on one side, is no more than a large stone house, the keep of the ancient Macromp Castle the outworks having been demolished. It is completely covered with ivy, closely matted to the sides to the very roof, and nicely cut away about the windows. The grounds are remarkably beautiful, stretching along both banks of the Sullane, a small clear stream, which washes its base. A large plantation of fine luxuriant trees stretches off on one side, laid out with winding gravel walks, with beds of flowers interspersed." He also wrote of the poverty he saw and of more than a 100 men and boys standing about in tattered clothing with "haggard vacant faces". He remarked how rich the land in the surrounding countryside was, but all wealth was concentrated in the hands of a few and, he wrote: "beauty fades when looked at with an empty stomach."

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HISTORY

A daughter of Robert Hedges-Eyre, who died in 1840, married Richard White, 3rd Earl of Bantry. He gave her the two naval cannons now situated at the castle entrance as a wedding present. Their only son, William, died in the castle which he left to his sister Olivia who married A. E. Guinness, Lord Ardilaun.

In August 1920 a party of 150 Auxilaries took over the castle which they converted into their headquarters and 'hair-raising stories were told of the interrogations held there'. Some of these troops were ambushed in Kilmichael the following month. During the Civil War of 1922 the castle was burned down for the last time on 18th August by retreating Republican forces led by, according to Wikipedia, Erskine Childers and Frank O'Connor as they feared it would be taken over by the Free State Forces which were pursuing them. (Mount Massey, which had also been occupied by British Crown Forces, was burned down in December 1920.)

After the Civil War the remains of the castle and the grounds were bought as a park amenity for the people of Macroom. In 1934 a school was built near the derelict ruins of the castle and finally in 1967 the castle was entirely demolished when a part of it fell down during a storm. 

Re Sr./Mother Bernard Murphy, Presentation Nun, Macroom and Maynooth

Some months ago LVO published an article on Sr. Bernard who came from Macroom and was the eldest of a large family that included Con and Joe Murphy, New Street. She has many nieces and nephews and their children, and other relatives. Sr Bernard spent most of her life teaching in Maynooth where she was very kindly and fostered a love of reading and an interest in films. Mrs Joan Murphy, Celbridge, a former pupil spoke of her empathy and kindness and left her (Joan) with a lifelong love of reading which stood her well in good times and bad. Recently Sr. Margaret O'Callaghan, Presentation nun, Dungarvan sent me two photos and a resume of Sr. Bernard's religious life. It is as follows:

"Margaret Murphy of Macroom, daughter of Cornelius and Mary Murphy joined the Presentation Convent in Maynooth on the 8 September 1915. She received the habit on 26 April the following year and was given the new name Mary Bernard. At that time her age is given as 21 years and 3 months. This means she was born (in) January 1895. (She was baptised in Macroom Church). She made her vows on 3 April 1918. Her life's work was teaching in the Presentation school. She had qualified as a teacher at Limerick Training College before she joined the convent. She died on 14 June 1966. She is buried at Laraghbrien cemetery on the back road from Maynooth to Kilcock. 1

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

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My ex-partner has custody of our children and I have access to them at weekends. During the COVID-19 emergency, can they travel to my home?

The social distancing and travel restrictions in place during the COVID-19 pandemic mean that families are not sure about how access arrangements should operate. COVID-19 has also put additional stresses on families because access to the courts has been severely restricted. The President of the District Court, the Family Lawyers Association of Ireland and the Law Society of Ireland have published guidance on access issues during the COVID-19 emergency.

The key points are:

- Travel between parents' homes is allowed for the purpose of facilitating access. Parents are advised to have a copy of the court order with them when travelling for access.
- The best interests of the child or children involved is the most important consideration, particularly if the child has a compromised immune system.
- Parents are encouraged to come to their own arrangements for additional or alternative remote contact, such as telephone/Skype/Facetime/WhatsApp, to allow children to have extensive contact with the other parent while reducing the risk of the spread of COVID-19. Parents should make a note of any temporary agreement by text or email.
- Parents should consider the living arrangements of everyone involved, especially where a parent either is, or lives with someone, in a vulnerable group.
- Court orders in relation to access remain in place and should be complied with as much as possible, unless
 otherwise agreed by the parents.
- If there is no court order in place and an arrangement has been working between parents, this
 arrangement should continue, unless otherwise agreed by the parents.
- COVID-19 cannot be used as an excuse to ignore a court order.

Currently, the courts around the country are restricted to urgent business. Applications for breach of access or maintenance are not generally considered to be urgent. Family law cases that were given a hearing date in the Circuit Court after the Easter break have been adjourned. The relevant court office will be in contact with all sides when a new date has been set. You or your solicitor should contact the relevant court office if you believe the matter is urgent. Inniscarra are MJK Oils Mid Cork champions once again after a long wait since their previous title in 1975, when they also captured a county junior title. They consequently participated at junior level in Muskerry with their second side, contesting seven finals without success in the years 1982, 1983, 1985, 1992, 1996, 1997 and 2009. This latest win, their ninth in all, is a very noteworthy achievement for Inniscarra club. 



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
