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
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Editor's NOTE

Macroom's Christmas Lights were switched on at the Town Hall on Friday November 27th by Lily Healy, Flower of Macroom.

Pat O'Connell Chairman of the Lee Valley Enterprise Board said that this was the 20th year the lights were being erected. The lights were first purchased in 2000 as a millennium

project and this year the board have spent in the region of €10,000 in the purchase of new festoon lighting and street crossings. He also thanked Macroom Municipal District Council for their financial support towards the erection of the lights and Martin Coughlan who co-ordinates the whole project and all the workers who help

with the erection of the Christmas Lighting. He also appealed to everyone in Macroom and the Lee Valley to support their own shops in order to help keep businesses open.

Martin Coughlan Chairman of Macroom Municipal District Council stated that this year's event had to take a different format due to Covid 19. Our Christmas Market and fun and entertainment for children all had to be cancelled but he said it was great we were able to erect the Christmas Lighting and hopefully it will give the businesses and the people of the Lee Valley a lift as we head into Christmas. Martin also thanked the Municipal District Council for purchasing new Christmas Lights and all the workers who were engaged in the erecting of Christmas Lights.

Lily Healy said she was delighted to be asked to switch on the Christmas lights and thanked all those who were involved in putting the lights together. She also said that despite the Covid 19 restrictions Santa has got permission to deliver all the presents to the children of Macroom this Christmas.

Cllr Michael Looney and Cllr Ted Lucey stated that it is vital the people shop local this year as businesses have had a difficult year due to Covid 19 lockdowns and they wished everyone a Happy Christmas.

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Macroom Tidy Towns

Nostalgic photographic collection - Muskerry through the Mac Suibhne lens - to raise significant funds for Macroom Tidy Towns' Riverbank Project







A much-anticipated photo book featuring a collection of images cataloguing life in the entire Muskerry Region from 1983 to 1989 is due out in the coming days with all proceeds going to Macroom Tidy Towns' Riverbank Project.

The 160-plus page Muskerry through the Mac Suibhne Lens photographic collection features nostalgic images taken by local photographer, Seán Mac Suibhne, over that era. It includes GAA, soccer and basketball teams, images of local characters and sports stars as well as pictures taken in local schools, at election counts, musicals, of scouts and guides, social gatherings in parishes in the region, hunts, St Patrick's Day parades and so much more.

A brief synopsis of key local and national events compiled by Seán's late wife, Máire Mac Suibhne, is also included, making the long-awaited publication a fascinating social history of the extensive mid-Cork area and a timely trip down memory lane as the Christmas season approaches.

The fund-raising publication, which is supported by the IRD Duhallow LEADER Programme, has taken over a year to compile and every cent raised will be ploughed into the Macroom Tidy Towns' Riverbank Project.

The entire €20 charged per book will help finance the widening of the pathway from the carpark at Macroom Bridge towards the Woodland Amenity area containing Fairy Garden, Sensory Garden and Biodiversity plot. The proceeds will also help fund the development of permanent seating in the area and the erection of a fitting memorial to the men and women of the locality who perished here along the riverbank as they were turned away from the workhouse during the Famine era.

It's Seán Mac Suibhne's first time to publish a book of his own images. Several years ago, he and Máire worked voluntarily together for a number of years to publish an extensive collection of the late Dennis Dineen's images. It sold out within weeks, raising significant funds for Macroom Senior Citizens in the process.

Speaking ahead of the launch of Muskerry Through the Mac Suibhne lens, Seán Mac Suibhne paid tribute to his late wife, adding that this collection was all her idea. Both Seán and Máire worked side by side as voluntary Editor and Photographic Editor of the Lee Valley Outlook for over 17 years.

"This was very much Máire's project. It's a publication we worked on together as a family for over a year. It's heart-breaking that Máire is not here to see its publication and that we didn't get to have an official launch. But we know she's with us in spirit and we're delighted to remember her and pay tribute to her in this book and to raise funds for such a worthy project which was so close to her heart. Máire loved books, loved history and she loved Macroom and the Muskerry region and both will benefit from this publication."

Macroom Tidy Towns' Committee Secretary, John Lyons, said copies of the book will be distributed across the Muskerry region over the coming days. He urged everyone to support the initiative. "We all know the value of shopping local and supporting local this Christmas. We're urging people from across this region to buy this book and support a very worthy local project. The images are fascinating and several of the scenes captured will never be repeated. "Seán and Máire spoke to us on several occasions about their wishes for the funds this book will raise. Work is already underway to make these plans a reality. The riverside area leading to the Woodland Amenity area containing Fairy Garden, Sensory Garden and Biodiversity plot is a fantastic resource in the heart of our town and we're delighted that the Mac Suibhne family chose our project as the beneficiary of the entire funds from the sale of this book. We are also very thankful to IRD Duhallow LEADER Programme for their

COLLEGE AWARENESS WEEK

College Awareness Week took place in McEgan College recently. All Subject departments participated in the event. Many students got to investigate college courses related to the different subjects they are studying at school. In normal times, it is a week where the school community look forward to welcoming back past pupils to share with students their experience at the various colleges. However due to covid, past pupils returned 'virtually' sharing their experiences and many challenges of online learning. Students heard online presentations from past pupils studying in Cork Institute of Technology, Colaiste Stiofain Naofa, University College Cork, University of Limerick among many more. Much of the advice highlighted the importance of following your passion and how it is possible to succeed with supports such as The Higher Education Access Route (HEAR) regardless of what barriers may be presented to you along your journey. Many of the presentations highlighted different advice to all year groups. There was great evidence too of the benefits of taking PLC courses after the Leaving Cert. We heard from one student who began her studies doing a PLC in Colaiste Stiofain Naofa and who has progressed through the QQI route and currently studying an Arts degree in UCC. First-hand information was given by past pupils to current students on their areas of current and previous study, college accomodation, The HEAR programme, SUSI grants, deferring a course among much more. It is hoped that students got as much from this as the teachers did who felt great admiration as to growth in not only the academic but also personal development of the school's alumni.

Much focus this year was put on the growing opportunities in the area of Apprenticeships especially now that so many new ones have been introduced such as Accounting Technician, Auctioneering and Insurance Practioniner. Those students who feel they would like to enter the workforce immediately on completion of the Leaving Cert were encouraged to look at this area as combining such work with study will increase not only ones qualification status but earning potential into the future.

All teachers throughout the week shared their own college experiences with their classes, something which is always a highlight for the students. The advice for parents is that they have a major role in influencing their childs educational progression and it is never too early to start having the conversation at home.

The Kilmichael ambush centenary has come and gone and much continues to be written about it. I had the great honour once upon a time to have met the heroic few who as the song says "fought 'neath the green flag of Eireann". When I was young, on Ambush Sunday, the volunteers of Kilmichael held their commemoration Mass at Castletown-Kinneigh and afterwards Tom Barry would march them along the road at the site of the ambush. Then after speeches and National Anthem, they headed for Creedon's Hotel in Inchigeela where, along with families and friends, they dined, sang, danced and reminisced for the evening. My friends and I being young did not appreciate the significance of the special day, nor that without knowing it "we walked among giants" although now they were old and some limped along. And, strangely, though we lived 5 miles or less from the site, at school we were not told about the ambush, that historians now regard as a most significant turning point in our history. The state, the Dept of Education or the media gave little credence to its importance. I still don't know why. And even TG4 news coverage of the centenary, on the day(on the 28th day of November) gave it about 3 minutes, although a reporter and camera spent all day interviewing and filming at the ambush site and in Inchigeela. Strange also though, that

in recent years, the crowds thronging to the commemoration from all over Ireland have increased dramatically "So, forget not the Boys of Kilmichael ... ".

SUNDAYS WALK

This "tidy" walk is number 4 in the walks marked

out by Croi na Laoi and is my favourite stroll. We begin at the centre of Inchigeela and head southwards over the Lee bridge or better known as the Big Bridge by local people. Shortly, having crossed into Cappanclare (meaning the flat potato ridges), turn left on the Dunmanway road where the road rises gently until you are past Cooroloch Lake. At the next cross-roads (Bohanes Cross) Turn right and onto a lovely narrow quiet road or bótharín, which will take you to the south Lake Road. This little road winds through unspoiled wooded countryside of mainly oak trees giving us a glimpse of what Ireland once must have looked like, although the present oaks may not be as impressive as their majestic ancestors. The walk is nicest when the leaves are on the trees. Next the village, the Cork /Kerry mountains and the western part of our parish comes in view. Follow a gurgling stream downhill at Céim Daunt and you are out on the south Lake road and head right for Inchigeela to complete the loop. Some more energetic people may take in the River Island loop on the return route to Inchigeela. The walks are well marked by signposts. Enjoy.

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

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MY GRANDMOTHER AND THE KILMICHAEL AMBUSH

Born in 1889, my grandmother was Ellen (Nell) Cahalane from Ahakeera, Dunmanway. May 1918, she joined the Aultagh Branch, 3rd Battalion, 3rd Cork Brigade of Cumann na mBan and was, shortly after, appointed Treasurer. Amongst the many duties of the women of Cumann na mBan were practical activities such as knitting socks and scarves for the Volunteers, fundraising, purchasing shirts and cigarettes to supply the men. As Treasurer, Nell carried the extra responsibility of keeping money and first aid supplies hidden in safe places due to frequent raids by the RIC. She was also involved in helping the Flying Column 'which were often billeted in the area.' Cumann na mBan were also engaged in potentially dangerous duties such as carrying dispatches, concealed weapons, intelligence gathering and send food or clothes parcels to the men in prison.

In the months leading up to the Kilmichael Ambush, as the Cahalane home was situated near headquarters, my grandmother catered for active service units, providing meals and clean clothing for the Column who were regularly in ambush positions on the Manch Road. For instance, on the 12th May 1920, arrangements were made to ambush a military cycle patrol. Approximately 40 Volunteers, nearly all armed with shotguns, took up position behind a roadside fence north of the road and were extended over a distance of about 100 yards. They remained in position from 2 am to 7 am but the patrol did not arrive. Amongst those present was Nell's brother, Jeremiah Cahalane. In her thesis in Local History, Mary O'Mahony of Independence Museum Kilmurry, demonstrated the familial links between the Volunteers and Cumann na mBan, i.e. girls who had brothers actively involved in the armed struggle, were most likely to share their political and military views and to join the women's wing. The Cahalanes were typical in that respect. O'Mahony drew attention to the escalation of the 'gender specific roles' of 'catering, nursing, fundraising and providing food parcels for volunteer prisoners' to much more dangerous activities. Delivering dispatches between the Brigade and Battalion Headquarters was a risky duty, as was concealing and maintaining weapons and ammunition and providing and equipping safe houses for volunteers on the run from British forces.

Kilmichael Ambush itself has been well documented so I am not going to go into the details of the controversial engagement, except as to my grandmother's role on that historic but tragic night. 'Our three casualties were taken away on improvised stretchers', Volunteer Patrick O'Brien in his Witness Statement recalled and that 'Jim Sullivan, ... was killed instantly, Michael McCarthy who died soon after and Pat Deasy who lived only a few hours. They were taken out of the Company area to the townland of Ahakeera. The local Company there took charge of the dead and they were temporarily buried. When coffins were provided in Inchigeela, Charlie Hurley, Brigade O/C, came immediately to the area and took charge of the dead. He also had the local Company armed to defend the area in case of reprisals during the three

following days of the ambush. He arranged the funeral and for a priest to be at the burial at Castletown.....where it was carried out at night.' Nell's account is very similar and her words are quoted from her military pension applications: 'On the night of the 28th November, volunteers were continually calling during all hours for food and bedding.' Following the ambush, she was summoned to a farmer's house three miles across country to where the dead and wounded had been taken. On her arrival, 'the bodies of Jim O'Sullivan and Michael McCarthy were there and young Pat Deasy was in a critical condition.' She and other local Cumann na mBan did all they 'possibly could for him but he died within an hour of our arrival'. In Kilmichael Through The Ages, it is stated that Pat Deasy died at 10pm on the night of the ambush. Nell then assisted the local volunteers in 'preparing the three bodies and coffining them for removal, then accompanied them to the place of concealment about two miles through bogland.'

At least two members of the Boys of Kilmichael had close connections to the Cahalane family. Nell's brother, Nelius, married Anne Cotter of Curradrinagh in 1929. Anne was the sister of Nelius Cotter, one of the Boys of Kilmichael. Indeed it was in the family home of the Cotter's mother, Collins of Kilnadur, where the planning for the ambush took place with Tom Following the ambush, it was Nelius Cotter who was assigned the responsibilty for removing the injured Pat Deasy and the bodies of the dead to Buttimers of Gortroe, where they were later buried in the bog. It was Tim O'Connell, a neighbour and close friend of the Cahalanes in Ahakeera, who initially organised temporary hastily made coffins from Bill Good of Shanlaragh and a couple of nights later, he and Nelius Cotter retrieved the bodies from the bog and placed them in coffins bought from Casey's of Inchigeela for burial at Castletown.

Eamonn de Valera was a frequent visitor to the Cotter home and amongst Nelius Cotter's possessions was a wheel of a Crossley Tender from Kilmichael. He also had a bicycle which Leslie Price - future wife of Tom Barry - had left in Cotters when visiting the local Cumann na mBan of which she was a leading member. Which would suggest that my grandmother would have met Leslie Price on one or more of those visits to the area and, most likely Tom Barry, also, as my granduncle, Jeremiah, was at times a member of the Column.

One Sunday in July, just four months short of a century since the Kilmichael Ambush,

I was amongst a group which gathered to visit a number of sites associated with the ambush. Organised by the Coppeen Historical, Archaeological and Cultural Society (CHACS), it proved to be an extraordinary day. Led by local man, Denny Healy, so mesmerized was everyone present, by his unequalled knowledge of the events and places central to that 28th day of November, that hours slipped by in the blink of an eye. So, too, did the intervening one hundred years. Denny has been listening to the stories of the ambush since a small child, speaking to those in the know, learning and absorbing every minute detail and in so doing we found ourselves travelling narrow boreens, familiarising ourselves with lookout areas and buildings central to the ambush.

Maybe it was fitting to end our unforgettable day at Buttimers, Gortroe. It was arriving into the old farmyard that became, for me, the most emotional of all. There was the farmhouse and the short flight of steps leading to the doorway my grandmother entered that night, little changed in the intervening century. The scene she witnessed was all too tragically easy to imagine, the dead bodies of O'Sullivan and McCarthy and young Pat Deasy's lifeblood streaming from his body as she and her Cumann na mBan comrades battled to save his life. Shortly after her arrival, young Pat Deasy's battle was lost. It is astonishing that the small building across the yard, opposite the dwelling house, has been restored. This was the car house where the Buttimer's kept the horse car when not in use and across it that dark November night were lain the three bodies of their fallen comrades. Standing in the farmyard and imagining the traumatic scenes imprinted in the very stone of those buildings, I became acutely aware of the palpable presence of my grandmother and granduncles as if standing with us in remembrance. The past and present blended into the recreated reality of that awful winter night 100 years ago and the privilege I had been granted to now whisper a silent prayer in their memory.

I regularly think of my Cahalane great grandparents and the trouble their revolutionary children could have brought to their door. Another son, Dan, the youngest of the eleven siblings, was also active. He was interned for over a year at Newbridge during the Civil War, aged just 17 years. Of course it is also possible that their children developed their nationalistic views right there in that Ahakeera home. Either way, Cornelius and Mary Cahalane must have been possessed of great courage and conviction in those days and weeks after the Kilmichael Ambush. This pivotal event in the War of Independence was right on the family's doorstep and locals lived in fear of retribution. The consequences of the Volunteers actions on that night were extremely serious for everyone in the area. Should any of those actually involved been apprehended by the British forces, they faced being shot on sight. If afforded an actual trial, it was highly likely they would die by execution, having first endured severe beatings and torture.

Revenge was swift. In the following days, the









Auxiliaries burnt the homes of the O'Donoghue and Kelly families, adjacent to the ambush site, and struck terror into the local population. By then the ambush party were hiding out in a preprepared abandoned house at Granure, having marched cross-country at night, seeking to put a safe distance between them and the Auxiliaries bent on revenge. Nell spent the night following the ambush catering for members of the Column who had mobilized quite close to her home at Ahakeera to resist reprisals expected after the ambush.

On the previous night, the bodies of the three men were removed from Gurtroe bog, placed in coffins and shouldered to a furze brake at Hourihan's, Curradrinagh. The following night the graves were opened at Castletown. The coffins were again shouldered from Hourihan's to Cotter's lane where they were placed on waiting horse and carts. The route to Castletown took them through Ahakeera. On reaching the Chambers house in Ballaghanure, there the horses were stabled, the Volunteers shouldered the coffins the remainder of the sad journey to Castletown, arriving there at midnight, where Very Rev. Fr. O'Connell, PP of Enniskeane, was waiting. 'Sean Murphy, Commanding Officer, was present with a full muster of the Ahakeera Volunteers - the Buttimers, O'Neills, the Cahalanes, the O'Connell brothers, Hourihans, Jim Buttimer, Johnny Healy, the Cotter brothers of Curradrinagh, Pat Buttimer, Ardcahan, Jerome Hourihan, Neaskin.'

application grandmother's pension continues: 'several men from the local Company were on the run during this period, sleeping in an unoccupied cottage in a mountain about a mile across country from my home. I supplied them with bedclothes and all necessities to keep them as comfortable as possible.' Eventually the dug-out was discovered by the Black and Tans and burned as were the clothes which she had provided them.

On the 4th January 1921, Tim O'Connell, a neighbour and friend of the Cahalanes in Ahakeera, was arrested near Coppeen and taken by the Auxiliaries to the British Headquarters in Dunmanway for interrogation. He endured horrific brutality inflicted on him while in custody and was beaten unconscious. It took a month before Tim could even swallow food. During the several months he spent in various detention centres, he was subjected to severe beatings, sustaining head, face and eye injuries, lifelong hearing loss and health issues. When the Auxiliaries pulled out of Dunmanway after the Truce, they left behind a notebook which contained the name of Tim O'Connell. Like the Cahalanes, Tim found himself on the losing side of the subsequent Civil War and felt he had no option but to emigrate. It appears likely that was the reason, too, that my granduncle, Jeremiah Cahalane, left Ahakeera to join his brothers and sisters in Boston. The fledgling Free State became a cold place for anyone who had vehemently disagreed with the terms of the Treaty. Jeremiah Cahalane and Tim O'Connell are examples of how ideals can turn to conflict, pitting comrade against comrade. Yet, they loved their country too.

In my grandmother's collection of very old photographs is one of Tim O'Connell taken when Jeremiah returned to Ahakeera on holiday from Boston in 1933, an occasion when old friends, neighbours and IRA colleagues were briefly reunited. During the Truce, many of those involved in the armed conflict took advantage of the ceasefire and married. As did Nell, in September 1921, when she married Daniel Healy, a shoemaker, and moved to his home in Coolduve, just outside Kilmurry village. She died in August 1981, aged 92 years.

The subsequent decades following the War of Independence would see the role played by women largely written out of history. In recent years this situation has finally been rectified and the essential role which these brave women undertook is the subject of in-depth research and a wealth of publications. The women of Cumann na mBan were an extraordinary political and military movement whose vision for freedom and equality was, sadly, greatly suppressed by both state and church. But that's a story for another day.....

A devil may care sort of fellow that might have been you or me. Who poured his young soul out for Bowling, I saw him beat Pat Sullivan at Renaniree. The years are going quite fast now, and sure we can't stop the clock. But I saw him win another great score against Dermot Sullivan, on the road coming in to Danganasillagh. I'll take you back to his younger days when I was a boy just of ten. When he won his first Senior Final its spoken of again and again. His opponent that day was Donie Lehane, a man that could bowl with great style. But he had to give way to Johnny that day on a road they call The Miles.

He was a son of Clondrohid, in fact to me a God, and every score that he threw that year he won be over two bowls of odds. Against Barry he defended his title on the road up from Crookstown Cross. And at the half way stage it looked shady, as he was down almost three bowls of odds. The first mile of road was windy, some paid their bets and thought he was beat But they should have waited longer to see how he bowled in the straight. At this stage Barry was

well in the straight and Creedon had peeping



sight don't you see. And Barry's supporters were shouting "Barry to win it by three". But Timmy Cronin put his hand in his pocket and a big ball of notes he pulled out. And his brother Denis followed suit and between them they took up every bet that was out. Creedon was hitting the bowl on the road and he rose to his feet with a grin. Saying Creedon "I'm not here three bowls for to save, I'm here the score for to win"

They disputed the shot at the next turn, some said play it wide, while others said play it tight. But Joe Buckley said "Blast it any way Creedon, come out here and see who is wrong and who is right". Creedon then said to the crowd and he was'nt very polite "For God sake please cross the road I'm going to play this bowl very tight"

He played the shot to perfection and it covered half a mile of the straight. Then he turned to Barry and said "Now you have a bowl for to beat" I was up on the ditch with my father in a short pants and so very shy. Yet I can hear Paddy Callaghan and Sean Jersey shouting

"I would'nt doubt you Creedon old boy".

The Autumn leaves they were falling, the background was amber and green. The cattle were grazing contented and the bowling it was supreme. It was Barry's turn to deliver, how far it went, I don't have a clue. All I could hear was Pat Shea throwing his cap in the air

Saying "Johnny the odds are down under two" Now it was Barry's turn to throw and see what odds would be with the bowl. His backers were



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not very happy as soon they would hear the night owl. He just covered Creedon's long shot and then there was a bare bowl. Creedon's next shot was like a bullet, it was like it came out of a gun. It covered six telegraph poles, so we knew the odds would drop under one. Barry took two bowls to cover this throw, there was five feet between the two Kings. So with three shots left in the score it was Creedon's turn again.

Come on Creedon!!!!

Creedon lined up for the next bowl, he played it with courage and speed. And the roars they could be heard down in Brinny, for we knew that he would take the lead. Barry was "hind" for the first time, the excitement then it grew higher. It was dusk, and the bats were flying over our heads, the height of the telephone wire. Micky Tom was sold out in his mobile shop and he had all the money in a biscuit tin. I saw him myself, he counted it out, and he put it all "down" on Creedon to win!!!!

Micky Tom he doubled his money because Creedon he won the score

The rumble in the jungle was over and Barry's backers were sore

Why? Because they lost the bets on the "three bowls", the "two bowls", the "one bowl", the "lead" and the "score"

'Foreign Games' in Macroom 1900-1999, Hockey

Association football (soccer), rugby, cricket and hockey were banned by the GAA as foreign (= British) games and it admirably suited Cusack's efforts to publicise the infant nationalist GAA organisation. The entwining of politics and sport reverberates in Ireland even to the present day. The GAA games/'foreign games dynamic forms a useful framework for examining sport in Macroom over the century. Apart from cricket, hockey, rugby and soccer were played in Macroom in the twentieth century. Competitive hockey and rugby were played before 1925 and 1959 respectively and soccer after 1964. Macroom Hockey is discussed here.

Hockey in Macroom in the Twentieth Century.

The quotation is taken from Professor John A. Murphy's Where Finbarr Played, a history of sport in University College Cork from 1911 2011 and refers to the social class of students who played rugby and hockey in UCC.

While sport has been practised for millenia the 'development of modern sports, as we recognize them now, was primarily a product of the second half of the nineteenth century'. Hockey's evolution in Ireland is part of that story.

Like tennis, hockey was an upper-class game played by men and women. In Ireland it remained mostly so for the twentieth century and was part of Ireland's Anglo-centric section of society. Along with rugby, soccer and cricket it was 'banned' by the Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA).


The origin of hockey in Ireland is interesting, sharing so much in common with hurling's beginning that Dagg's Hockey in Ireland introductory chapter 'Hurling and Hurley', could preface hurling's history. He notes that 'stickand-ball games were played the world over from time immemorial, but developed along different paths. A French silver cup (1333), in Copenhagen's National Museum is evidence that hockey was played in fourteenth-century Europe. Burton's The Anatomy of Melancholy (1660) mentions hurling as one of the common recreations of English country-folk. Hockey was played in fourteenthcentury Ireland, as it was forbidden in the Statutes of Kilkenny in 1366 - as were 'horlinge' (hurling), football, handball and other games. It underlines that hockey and hurling were distinct games. Hurling and hockey sticks dictated whether the ball could be 'carried' on the stick and marked a key difference between hurling and hockey/ shinty. Lord Barrymore arranged hurling matches in Kennington Common, London, around 1816. Blackheath Hockey Club was formed in 1840. Hockey, like rugby and association football, was codified in the late nineteenth century, with the formation of the Hockey Union in 1876. Hockey, hurley and hurling were chips off the same 'balland-stick' block, but location and history changed their evolutions.

Trinity College Dublin Hurley Club published rules in 1870 which allowed hitting from one side of the stick only, restricted catching of the ball, and had an 'on-side ' rule. The stick was called a 'hurl'. An Irish Hurley Union was formed in 1879. However 'hurley as played by these rules had practically ceased to exist' by the mid 1880s 'but a few years later (1892) the game was revived in the form of hockey'. At a meeting of Dublin Hurling Club in 1883 a set of hurling rules was drawn up. While similar to hurley's rules, it allowed 'lifting and striking', carrying the ball on the stick, though there is no mention of points.

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

It was appreciated and acknowledged by all in attendance, including Gene who for once was speechless. I would like to thank the Awards Committee for their work and their ability to keep a secret!

Our annual in-service course was held in

Coachford in late January and was extremely helpful in respect of the new football rules our thanks to our Inter-County colleagues for their input on this.

Once again, a huge thanks to Aghabullogue GAA for the use of their facilities to hold our meetings in the early part of the year, and a special thanks to Sheila and Mary for providing the refreshments.

Unfortunately, as events unfolded, we were unable to continue our regular meetings, nor were we able to hold our annual Pitch & Putt outing in Kilmichael in March. We trust that this will come back onto the calendar in 2021.

As usual the appointments for the Muskerry Finals were evenly distributed and we compliment the Muskerry Board for their fairness in this regard. Our congratulations go

Ted Haves – Junior A Football Final Jerry Masters - Junior B Football Final Brendan Barry Murphy – Junior A Hurling Final David Murnane - U21 A Football Final Hopefully the outstanding championships will be completed at some point in the future.

We would like to place on record our thanks to the outgoing members of the Muskerry Board, Pat Malone, Willie Buckley and John Crean. Their support for referees during their years in office was greatly appreciated.

We would also like to wish the incoming officers the best for their tenure and we look forward to working with them into the future.

Unfortunately, the Cumann Reiteoiri Mhuscrai Hall of Fame award has been postponed, as has our Christmas event. We hope 2021 will bring this back to the calendar.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to remind the Muskerry Clubs that abuse of referees will not be tolerated. Referees are being strongly encouraged to report all instances of abuse.

There was at least one serious issue in this shortened season, and incidents like this must be prevented from occurring. Mentors and players will not always agree with refereeing decisions, but referees play a vital role within the organisation. No referees = No games.

The number of people taking up refereeing continues to be alarmingly low and this needs to be improved. On that point I would ask clubs to seek out any members from within their own ranks who are interested in becoming referees. Then advise myself or Colm of names and contact details so we can register them for the next refereeing course. Risteard Aynsley

Review of Championships

Our Junior A Football Championship with 14 teams is still the number one attraction. At last year's Convention I raised the possibility of a two-tier championship due to the large gap in standards in this grade. Having given my suggestion careful consideration, the clubs opted for the status quo. A look at this year's results show the gap is wider than ever. Iveleary played 4 matches to get to the final and their winning margins were 5 goals, 5 goals, 7 goals and 5 goals. Kilmurry also played 4 matches to get to the final and won two of these by 6 goals. This is a frightening statistic and is something that needs to be addressed. Maybe we should consider a format similar to the County Championships ie 12 teams in 3 groups of 4 so each team has at least 3 matches.


The Junior B Football championship had 12 teams competing this year and produced some very close matches with Kilmurry full value for their win against Macroom in the final. This grade has benefitted from the Boards decision to regrade a number of the weaker teams to C. The Junior C Football championship had 10 teams entered but this competition fell foul of the October closedown as only 3 matches had been played.

In U21 A Football we had 4 entries with Éire Óg and Ballincollig contesting the final before Éire Óg came out on top in a closely contested game. The county section never got off the ground due to the pressure of fixtures once play resumed which is a pity for a very strong Éire Óg team. The U21B and U21C competitions, both with 8 entries, were not completed due to the closedown in March. We have 1 semi-final and final to play in each

event, so we plan to complete these in 2021. Junior A Hurling is probably our best championship with most of the ten clubs competing fancying their chances. This is best illustrated by the fact that both the finalists, Inniscarra and Ballinora, were beaten in their respective first rounds. Also, last year's winners, Cloughduv went out of the competition in round 2. With 6 of the 10 teams being club second teams the standard is very even and

augers well for the future.

Junior B Hurling with 9 entries is starting to be dominated by the third teams of the stronger clubs. We were down to the final between Blarney and Inniscarra when the October closedown came in so, with the county championship still to be played in early 2021, we will need to play the final as soon as we can. However, there is a problem coming down the line as the gap between the stronger and weaker clubs means that we will need to consider splitting this grade or creating a Junior C event.

In U21 Hurling, we had planned a Premier competition in Muskerry with 6 clubs due to the problem at county level with this grade. We also had 8 teams entered in the U21B which, I think, was a record for this competition. However, once club competitions ceased in early October both these competitions fell.

Gate receipts and attendances were down on last year due to the covid 19 restrictions. However, the finances of the board are kept in a reasonably strong position due to the support of a dozen or so loyal sponsors. The board are very thankful for their continued support and this is vital to the continued well-being of the board's finances.

Scór is still struggling, with fewer clubs competing, which is a pity. It appears that this side of the GAA activity is now being neglected by clubs and performers. With the introduction of new rule changes, it should be easier to get more people involved. There are plenty musicians, singers, dancers and other knowledgeable people within the various clubs.

MUSKERRY TEAMS

Due to the new championship format where most clubs were playing for six consecutive weeks before the Inter Divisional section was scheduled, we took the decision to withdraw our teams for this season to be fair to the players and the clubs

CHAMPIONSHIPS

Junior A Hurling: In Junior A Hurling, ten teams competed in this championship, with some good matches being played. There was a nice mixture between the club first and second teams with Inniscarra's second team beating Ballinora in a very closely contested final. This was a remarkable achievement for Inniscarra as it was forty-five years since they last won this competition.

Junior B Hurling: Nine teams were entered in this Grade, with Blarney and Inniscarra's third teams in the final. This is due to be played early in the new year. The failure of two teams to field is worrying even though the tight schedule may have had a major bearing on this.

Junior A Football: Our Junior A Football Championship is still the number one attraction with fourteen teams entering the draw. Preseason favourites Iveleary and Kilmurry reached the final with Iveleary creating history by becoming the first team to win three in a row in this grade since 1948.

Junior B Football: Twelve teams were in the draw for this one, with Kilmurry and Macroom reaching the final, played in Kilmichael. Kilmurry went on to win a keenly contested final.

Junior C Football: Ten teams entered this competition, with only three matches being played before the October closedown.

U21 A Football: With four teams in U21 A Football, Éire Óg and Ballincollig contested the

final before Éire Óg came out on top in a closely contested final.

U21 B Football: Eight teams entered this competition, and all teams were guaranteed two matches. When the March closedown came, we were left with 1 semi-final and the final to play.

U21 C Football: Eight teams entered this competition and each team was guaranteed two matches. When the March closedown came, we were left with 1 semi-final and the final to play.

REFEREES

I would like to thank all our referees for their wonderful service and commitment to the Coiste during the past year, and to me during my five years as Rúnaí. They have always been very obliging and helpful when needed. They do a great job and without them there would be no games played. Our referees are highly respected at county level, getting nearly all the high-profile county finals in recent years. Also, 'Thank You' to Aubert Twomey, our referee administrator this year, for his contribution to the CCC in the appointments for Championship matches.

My thanks to all clubs who hosted our games during the year. Without your help, our championships could not run as smoothly as they do. Despite the huge amount of games that are now played, most clubs are always willing to accommodate this board.

Thus the concept of a 'Virtual Pilgrimage' was born. Initially the idea was that some of the 'Lourdes' ceremonies might be replicated in Churches throughout the Diocese during the May 29th -June 3rd period. Luckily a few years ago, in keeping with the changing times we live in, the Cloyne Pilgrimage and associated 'Lourdes Family' had developed platforms to share notices, memories, stories, and photographs. Áine Byrne who died so unexpectedly

in 2019 had initiated Facebook and Instagram accounts. Truly the work done by Aine laid the very solid foundations for what transpired this summer when the Cloyne Virtual Pilgrimage came about. Over a two-week period in May a small group came together and organised a brilliant programme. Bishop William Crean and Fr Toby Bluitt organised all the different ceremonies to go ahead in different Churches- all being broadcast. Meanwhile a search for individual 'What Lourdes Means To Me' reflections was put out with an amazing response. Extensive Photo Memories were put together. A Virtual Choir came together where 25 singers sang and recorded 'As I Kneel Before You' in their own homes and these were brilliantly combined together with a stunning result.

We weren't in Lourdes this year but the Virtual Pilgrimage was simply amazing and over 14,000 people viewed the Pilgrimage Programme online! There was an overwhelming feeling of joy and 'coming together while apart' and everyone involved derived a great deal from the experience. Now this Virtual Pilgrimage programme has been put together in a beautiful full colour book which contains hundreds of pictures and stunning images. All the ceremonies are recounted, all the memories recalled in a publication that run to over one hundred pages. The book also contains a unique QR code which means all the video postings, choral singing and 'What Lourdes Means to Me' items can be viewed again and again.
