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



Ava Ronan and Ruby O' Shea's project is titled "Does music effect your heart rate while sleeping?". The girls both have an interest in music and also wear smartwatches that help track sleep, steps and heart rate among others. They wondered if you listen to music while asleep will this have an effect on your heart rate. The girls will be carrying out their experiment on number of participants and it will involve a variety of music genres e.g. pop, rock, jazz, country and classical. Macroom Tidy Towns

2020, An outstanding year for Macroom Tidy **Towns and Macroom**

While many will see 2020 as a year to forget, this past year is arguably the greatest year ever for Macroom Tidy Towns achievements since the group came together in 1983, almost 38 years ago. This is a remarkable achievement considering that the majority of regular volunteers are over 60 years old, and early in the year we were saddened by the loss of one of our very popular regulars, Bill Barry RIP. Covid has restricted the work of others. There is no denying that current levels of activity cannot be sustained without an injection of young blood since the 3 officers on the top table, Martin Coughlan, John Lyons and Judy O'Sullivan are in situ since 1985, for the past 35 vears.

In January, a 6 metre by 12 metre concrete slab was built by volunteers with some help from asylum seekers from Riverside Park for our new shed. Temperatures as low as minus three degrees on one morning did not deter the volunteers. The new steel-clad shed was erected in February to store all our tools and equipment and this is now used as the Tidy Towns base to work from. During the year, internal shelving has been erected and security lighting, etc.

In February 2020 a public meeting was organised in the Castle Hotel and a presentation by Donal O'Leary on 'Food Waste and Composting'. During this month also the Tidy Towns had a stand in the Leisure Complex as part of 'Meet the Clubs' day.

The Church gate collection in March raised some funding. The main funding for Tidy Towns comes each year from the Co. Co. and the largest expenditure goes on the flower in town and the grass cutting in the estates. In future it is considered that an envelope collection, reaching on all residents and businesses is more appropriate than the church gate collection which was held every year. Various other sponsorships were received, the main

one being Optimal Chiropractic, who sponsor work on the Sensory Garden.

In the sensory garden the plastic tunnel was removed following damages and antisocial activity but is now turned into a new amenity area using recycled pallets as seating and with further work planned for 2021. A very attractive natural old stone wall has been built bordering the mill stream and steel door made and fitted here also. Dead evergreen Lawson Cypress trees were cut out and holly and ash are now returning naturally. Shrubs were transplanted out of the large circular bed in order to use this bed for sensory planting. A new concrete path was laid down weaving its way through the garden. The popular stepping logs for kids were made safer, with a covering of artificial grass. Two new 'tunnels' were built for kids to crawl through and proving to be most popular. A new elderly friendly colourful seat was also installed here.

In the Fairy garden itself extra recycled plastic seating was fitted, maintenance was ongoing, cleaning, treating benches, replacing items, etc and coping with the aftermath of two major floods that submerged the garden, in February and in August. A sale of goods took place on two weekends to raise funds also.

New seating was installed by the riverside. These multicoloured recycled plastic seats were sponsored by the Neville Family and Riverside Park Hotel and Sleaveen Montessori School.

Murals were painted on walls near the Greyhound Bar on Leary's lane leading to the Mart. The Tidy Towns helped out with power washing, with paints, and co-ordinated the painting. Various artists all contributed freely of their time to carry out these and enhance this area which is admired by people near and far.

Biodiversity now has taken centre stage. We watched the swift tower at the mart being actively used by sparrows to make their nests in. Further swift nesting boxes will be erected in 2021. Ducks were provided by the Gun Club and 50 were released into the river from Castle Demesne side near the bridge and were a wonderful sight as they swam about in groups. Good to see a few of them in this area at the beginning of December, while many of them had moved downstream sometime after release and resided near the towns' sewerage treatment plant. Four large fruit trees were donated by McEgan College and planted in the biodiversity garden in March. In December students from McEgan again returned and planted a horse chestnut tree under the guidance of Tidy Towns. Various initiatives are ongoing in estates where large amounts of grass were being cut and now these are managed differently. IRD Duhallow have support a training initiative for Tidy Town in advising on different aspects of biodiversity and potential projects. Two days were spent with Gortbrack Organics who came to Macroom and advise the group. Macroom has also been selected by Cork Co Co as a pollinator town, and an ecologist has been engaged to draw up a plan together with the Tidy Towns and the local council. A petrol engined mulcher has recently been purchased and this will help in disposal of branches and cuttings and provide chippings/mulch that can be used to good effect elsewhere.

While all of these specific tasks and projects were being carried out, the regular work was also ongoing, the litter picking, the emptying of doggie poo bins, pruning of shrubs and roses, some street sweeping, flower bed cleaning, etc. Trailer loads of rubbish were taken to the Civic Amenity Site on Killarney Road. All the large hanging baskets were erected using volunteer help and hire of a teleporter machine. These baskets required ongoing maintenance, with regular early morning watering and feeding at intervals. The shrubs at Oakwood had outgrown the tubs and were planted in the ground. Other ornate concrete tubs were put out at Coleman's Park entrance and at Gurteenroe. The management of the grass

cutting in all of the estates continued to be done also. A Heritage Brochure for Macroom is in the making and Tidy Towns are liaising with Cork Co Co. on this draft and hope to see it in print in 2021.

The town has never looked better this Christmas, and many business have contributed to this also

Covid19 has had its influence on all activities but has left many positive legacies in relation to the town centre upgrade and inputs from the Council. The cobble stones at the Castle Gates were re-pointed in June. The Town Hall itself was cleaned, windows and doors painted, some wiring and signs upgraded, railings painted, pump and nearby street furniture painted, using local contractors. Two new canopies with the tables and willow surrounds have added to the street-scape also. New additional Christmas lighting has been erected this year together with a new tree on the square, again with the

help of several volunteers who worked many nights with the hire of a teleporter. Likewise, the crib beside Town Hall was erected with the help of Volunteers.

This Christmas, the Tidy Towns are working with the MacSweeney family, Killarney Road, in the promotion of the book of photographs from the 1980's 'Muskerry through the Mac Suibhne Lens'. This was compiled by Seán and Máire and the profits will go towards the upgrading of the path from the council car park at the bridge to the Fairy Garden, and the erection of memorial on the riverbank in memory of those who could not gain admission to the workhouse and died here on the riverbank.

Macroom in General.

There are other major works of interest happening in Macroom that make this an exceptional year, work on the bypass, housing developments along Millstreet Road, in Meadowlands and Oakwood as well as work

on the Hospital and the Garda Divisional HQ in Gurteenroe. Major works have also taken place on riverbank stabilisation and car park upgrade at the bridge.

Macroom has also been selected as a service town for the Gaeltacht which will benefit the town and surrounds. Overall, the future looks bright.

Thanks to our loyal Tidy Towns volunteers and to so many other people who contributed in their own way, the council, those on schemes, all that have contributed in any way to making Macroom beautiful. We are lucky to have such a nice town with such wonderful natural amenities, something that was commented on by many while in lockdown earlier this year.

Macroom Community Hospital

Extension and Excavation

Macroom has possibly never seen as much concurrent building as before. Apart from the Bypass, there are four new estates/estate extensions under construction – two new estates in the Millstreet Road, and extensions in Oakwood and Meadowlands. As well, work on extending Macroom Community Hospital has begun and that of itself is brilliant news. When preparing the foundation, many walls and other structures were found and these were part of Macroom Union Workhouse, 1843-1921.

The hospital was developed on the site of the old Macroom Union Workhouse which first opened in 1843, just before the famine. The workhouse was burned-down in 1921 by the IRA to prevent possible use by British Forces. Later the damaged building was used by the Free State army. In the late 1920s most of the old structure was demolished and the only surviving section is the one that now houses the ambulance crews and storage area. The Dental Clinic operated from that building.

A new hospital extension is being built on a site behind the current hospital and adjacent to the extant portion of the old workhouse. Early work revealed existing underlying structures, and these include walls, recesses, pits and passageways. Because of the finds, archaeologists were called, and they are now examining the site, and recording all

The work of the archaeologists is aided by plans, drawings and photos from the time of the workhouse. More than 400 workhouses were built in Ireland before and during the Great Irish Famine (1845-1852), and were geared to cater for 1% of a population of more than 8 million people. Macroom Union (roughly seventeen surrounding parishes) had a population of about 58,000 and the capacity of Macroom Workhouse was 600. The vast majority of all workhouses were built to a set plan and varied mostly in size and site; capacity ranged from 200 to 1,200. Some original plans survive. Thus, the archaeologist will be able to work out pretty accurately where the various sections were. For example, at the back there were three sections for what the authorities termed 'The Infirm, Lunatics and Idiots', and these section are readily identifiable on

Hopefully the archaeologists will make their findings known and available. We would thus have a better record of what occurred in Macroom Union Workhouse and the fate that befell our ancestors.



Macroom Mart and Covid (2020)

Last Saturday Macroom Mart allowed sellers and buyers into the premise again for the first time in seven weeks. While adhering strictly to guidelines, both the staff and attendees were delighted to see a return to a more normal way of doing business.

Macroom Co-operative Livestock Sales Yard Ltd. (1962) was its first manifestation, and later it became Macroom Co-operative Mart Ltd. Uniquely the beginning of the mart was a joint venture between town and country with ten members from each side making up the first committee, with Harry Murphy, Chemist, R.I.P., and Dan Murphy, R.I.P., Coolalta, Chairman and Vice-Chairman respectively. The late Jerry Cotter, Main Street, exchanged land to facilitate the introduction of the mart. Later again it became part of Cork Marts. Apart from the Foot-and-Mouth outbreak (2001), the mart has never been as restricted as during the current pandemic. During the Foot-and-Mouth outbreak, cattle were the source of contagion: now it is people who carry and spread the sometimes nasty and fatal Corona virus.

Very kindly Macroom Mart allowed me to take some pictures and they are, I think, of interest and may be of more interest in times to come. Hopefully with appropriate behaviour and the effect of vaccines, and the hope of improved and novel treatments, these scenes will not recur in the future.

The Mart has been a very important facet of Macroom life for the past fifty-six years and like almost every other person, business and institution

in the country, Covid has interfered. However, after the initial shock of the first lockdown, the mart adapted and coped. First, they matched buyers with sellers and the latter went to farms to do the deal. As there was only one buyer, this was advantage to the dealer/buyer. Online sales then came into play and this was much better for the farmer. Fortunately, the price of cattle held up and Bord Bia's turnover is even set to increase a little this year. Farmers' profit margins are thin and luckily the end of the pandemic's worst effects is in sight. Of course, that other 'monster' Brexit is rearing its head and Britain and Boris Johnson's actions are truly bewildering. But that is a topic for another day. No doubt Irish farmers and marts will find a way and flourish.

While principally a business, the mart serves a very important social function. Farming can be a lonely and tough world and the mart provides a very important social outlet. Life is more than about money, as the Bible has it 'Man does not live on bread alone'. On re-opening the farmers, buyers and staff were thrilled to get out and meet again and get back to something approaching normality. With the prospect of early safe vaccines, hopefully the end is nigh for the pandemic



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'Foreign Games' in Macroom 1900-1999, Hockey

Cusack, co-founder of the GAA in 1884, decried hurley as 'antiseptic' as opposed to 'the dash of hurling'. 1880s' Ireland had the mix of Land Agitation, possible Home Rule and the beginning of the Irish-Ireland movement. In England the Hockey Association was formed in 1886 to codify and control the game. As Trinity's ethos was Protestant and Unionist, a hockey club was formed there in 1893, firmly in the tradition of being Irish but within the UK and the British Empire. Paterson's example of forming a club was shortly followed by King's Hospital, a Dublin Protestant school, and others. The Irish Hockey Union was formed in 1892 and the Irish Ladies Hockey Union (ILHU) in 1894, in Alexandria College, a Protestant girls' school. Like tennis, hockey in Ireland was as an elite, establishment and imperial game. It was played mostly in Trinity, Dublin and other Dublin clubs, later in Belfast, and then in provincial towns. The advent of railways facilitated the spread of all sports. Associational culture in the second half of the eighteenth century saw an explosion of the numbers of sports clubs of many types - including cycling, swimming, golf, tennis, hockey and GAA clubs. Upper-class women played golf, hockey and tennis and enjoyed cycling and competitive swimming. Rouse notes that non-GAA clubs in provincial towns had overlapping membership which often shared religion, facilities, interests, loyalties and social life, and clubs were frequently places where people met partners. Hockey was gradually adopted by some schools secondary education then was for the privileged few and underscored hockey's elitism. Irish boarding schools were modelled on English public schools and copied their structure, ethos and games, and hockey fell within this cachet. Elite Catholic schools were founded to 'match' Protestant ones. to provide secondary education for children of socially advanced Catholics, and to train priests and religious. Often schools used games to inculcate good habits and to open pathways to social advancement. In Where Finbarr Played Murphy remarks that the 'similarities in ethos between rugby and ladies hockey in UCC were striking'. Hockey, rugby, cricket and soccer were 'banned' by the GAA as 'foreign' games. This forms the background of hockey in provincial Irish towns

Macroom is a rural town but had a hockey club and Macroom hockey was referenced in March 1902. North Muskerry beat South Muskerry 2-1 in a ladies' match in Macroom with teams composed of Mrs and Misses: Colonel Broderick was the referee. A subsequent Southern Star article contains the following:

Since its introduction to Macroom hockey has evoked some curious freaks and men of the greenest hue have undergone, chameleon-like, a complete change of colour through its influence. Some people forget that this is Ireland, and that the present revival makes for nationalisation in all our surroundings, and to set up an alternative pastime, which, to say the least of it, is not racy of the soil, for the modification of the youthful generation is to aid in the process of Anglicisation, and to undermine nationality.

The next fixture reported was a Church of Ireland-Macroom tie in April 1923. Macroom's 1923 24 season opened with a 3-1 defeat in Clonakilty. Cork Independent Ex-Service Men's Club was scheduled to play senior and junior matches in Macroom on St Stephen's Day. The club held a Fancy Dress Ball, (tickets were 10/6 each), the following month. Photos of Mallow and Macroom mixed teams, together with names, appeared in the Weekly Irish Times. Macroom beat Mallow 2 1 in the Charity Cup semi-final, with Hannoefy and Shea scoring. The club arranged another Fancy Dress dance in 1924. Macroom recorded a win when a mixed XI overcame Youghal 4-0 in the Bolster Cup, first round. Mallow and Macroom drew 2 2 in 1926, and a Macroom team-photo was in the Leinster Express. After a Bolster Cup win over Waterford 3 2, the writer regrets that Macroom was 'not as representative of the town as I would wish it to be'. Just 2.2% of Macroom's population in 1901 was Protestant. Macroom Hockey Club is last mentioned when it lost a final to Church of Ireland, which 'boasted not a few internationals'.

A picture captioned 'Macroom Hockey Club' appeared in the Cork Examiner in 1998. The 'club' operated from Macroom Sports Complex, never affiliated and never played a competitive game. Due to injuries, it ceased within months. Local schools did not feature hockey and the only Macrompian hockey players thereafter attended hockey-playing schools or played at university or with outside clubs. Bandon and Cork-city hockey clubs were nearest to Macroom.

Mary Purcell (now Quain), Macroom, played twice for Ireland's senior hockey team in 1973 and was a substitute on other occasions. Instead of receiving 'caps', she received a silver broach to mark the achievement. Mary boarded in Ursuline Convent, Cork, where hockey was the main winter game, and played on successful teams there and at University College Cork. She played with the Combined Universities and regularly with Munster. Good play with successful teams brought her international selection. Having qualified in UCC she attended Loughborough, England, for her Physical Education degree, but as a non-resident in Ireland, it ended her Irish career. On return to Ireland she taught P.E. at her alma mater, coached school hockey teams and played successfully with Old Ursulines. Mary regained her Munster place and played for several more years. Many teammates subsequently played golf. Mary's sisters Veronica, Elizabeth, Jean and Deirdre attended Ursulines and were accomplished players. Deirdre played hockey for Munster.

Mary O'Sullivan, North Square, Macroom, played

with UCC and was on an Irish hockey team that toured Holland in 1956. She qualified as a doctor and was the daughter of Dr Timothy O'Sullivan, a General Practitioner in Macroom.

Traditionally hockey was

a niche sport in Ireland, played within Anlgocentric circles and by the upper- classes. The sporting revolution in Ireland coincided with late nineteenth-century Land Agitation, and the Home Rule and Irish-Ireland movements. Cusack's abilities as a journalist and polemicist exploited the situation by forming the nationalist GAA but this ensured politics and sport in Ireland were thereafter inevitably entwined. Divisions in sport were on confessional, political, loyalty, economic, class and status lines. They caused antipathy between Catholics and Protestants, and within Catholicism, between the socially advancing and those lagging behind.

Despite Irish Hockey's attempts to broaden its base, divisions persist in Ireland, North and South, as evidenced by many fee-paying and Protestant-run schools featuring hockey and rugby rather than GAA games or soccer.


Hockey ceased in Macroom because of the changed political climate after 1922 and the reduced numbers, status and profile of Anglophiles who played. Macroom girls' schools featured sports very little until the middlelate twentieth century, and then they played/ did principally Gaelic games, athletics and basketball. Hockey was not played as far as I can establish. Protestant and some Catholic schools, and clubs feeding-off them, maintain hockey in the Twenty-Six Counties. There were insufficient numbers to support hockey in Macroom.


Macroom internationals are rare, and it is a great achievement to represent one's country. Mary Purcell's feat was not acknowledged publicly in Macroom. Attendance at a hockey-playing school allowed her talent to blossom and governed much of her life. Mary's sporting and teaching career reflect the interaction of class, education, gender, employment and sport. This section captures some aspects of life and sport in Macroom in the twentieth century.



Johnny Creedon

All Ireland Bowling Champion by PO'C

Continued from Ed23 Apology - The Editor would like to apologise to the Creedon family & Paddy Corkery for failure to include the second part of this wonderful story in the last

edition.

Competing with the Best: Although residing in London Johnny made regular trips home to play in the Senior championship. This generated great excitement in Clondrohid and when we young enthusiasts saw himself and his friend Tony O'Shea outside the church after first Mass on Sunday morning, we knew that Johnny had a big Score that afternoon.

Success came quickly and in 1960 he was crowned County and Munster champion defeating Donie Lehane in the Final on a very wet day at The Miles Road near Clonakilty by three bowls of odds. He won all of his five Scores that year by at least two bowls of odds. This was the most convincing victory ever in those championships. Ten months later on Sunday August 13th, 1961, a huge crowd assembled at Crookstown to see Creedon defend his Title against Mick Barry. Barry had won the Senior championship in 1955 and 1959 so the stage was set for the battle of champions. This Score was over two miles in length with each player throwing a total of 29 shots. Some incredible bowling by Barry powered him into a lead of nearly three bowls of odds at the halfway stage. It was from here that Creedon showed his lion heartedness to fashion a remarkable victory and win an enthralling contest. Barry and his followers were stunned by Creedon's comeback. It was his backer's darkest day. They lost more in this Score than they had won in any Score before that. They lost the substantial stake the "bets on two bowls", "on one bowl", "on the lead again" and even some of them "on the three bowls.

Unfortunately, two weeks later Creedon was involved in a car accident which put an end to his championship aspirations in 1961.

Johnny won his next Munster Senior championship in 1968 defeating Denis Scully in the Semi Final and Mick Barry in the Final, both Scores played at Nadd. The All-Ireland championship was now in place and Danny Mc Parland from Armagh provided the opposition again at Nadd. Creedon won this contest at ease by three bowls of odds.

That 1968 victory is recalled by author Brian Toal in his excellent book "Road Bowling in Ireland". "The 1968 Senior campaign in the South resulted in John Creedon Clondrohid and Mick Barry Waterfall coming through to contest the Munster Final. It was the first Munster Final to be played at Nadd in the North East region and Creedon emerged with a fully deserved win in a year during which he was bowling better than at any period since he last won the Provincial Title in 1960. The All Ireland Final that year, on Sunday 1st September, was also played at Nadd and it provided John Creedon with a home venue

advantage. It was an All-Ireland Final Danny Mc Parland will have no wish to recall. Only once in the lead, and that on the first shot, the former National Title holder never looked like winning as the consistent Creedon with few errors apart from his opening throw continually added to his lead to win by three bowls of odds".

In 1979 Johnny won his third Munster Senior championship beating Donie Coveney in the Final at Beal Na Blath on July 22nd by three bowls of odds. However, he had to give best to Pat Mallon of Armagh in the All-Ireland Final played on the Blackwatertown Road on 5th August. 1979 was a great year also for the young Pat Creedon who defeated Doire O'Duinin An Gaeltacht at Togher Cross and later Ciaran Hennessy at Ballyshonin to capture the Munster Title. Again, we quote for Brian Toal "Guided by the intuition and practical experience of his father John Creedon Clondrohid All Ireland Senior champion 1968, it was obvious that Blackwatertown Road would pose few difficulties in his guest for National Juvenile honours on 4th August. Pat Creedon adapted perfectly to the course. It was probably his best ever performance to then and with it he gave little hope to Philip Rafferty who was very soon into a shot deficit and struggling to prevent further loss. Pat Creedon went on to win rather easily and gained the All-Ireland Juvenile Title for

Finally, in 1987 Creedon beat Tim O'Halloran to capture the Munster Intermediate Title at Ballyshonin and went on to again play Pat Mallon in the All Ireland Final on the Tassagh Road Armagh on Sunday 2ndAugust. Johnny was 60 yards "hind bowl" for the last shot up a very steep hill. However, he unleashed a bulletlike shot covering over 220 yards to win the Score by 30 yards. This was a fantastic result for Creedon and his supporters and it was also sweet revenge for 1979. The following extract from the Southern Star newspaper describes Creedon's last shot "They'll talk about Creedon's last bowl at Tassagh for years to come and its certainly one for posterity to recall. It is only those of us who know Tassagh can fully appreciate what a difficult bowl it is and where the Cork man got the strength of speed to deliver this exceptional throw left us all completely puzzled".

Brian Toal describes that Final as follows: "In 1987 Pat Mallon Grangemore went one better than 1986 when he won the Ulster Title over Paul Grimley and that provided for a repeat pairing of the 1979 National Senior Final when it was learned that Johnny Creedon had won the Munster Intermediate crown. He had beaten Tim O'Halloran by a bowl of odds at Ballyshonin in the Provincial Final and the All-Ireland Final contest was scheduled for Tassagh on Sunday 2nd August. Creedon had been showing renewed resilience and dedication during that season and he needed it at Tassagh. Pat Mallon had a 60-yard lead for the final throw and with Creedon bowling first he unleashed a tremendous shot against the rising ground. Despite an excellent final effort Mallon fell short of the mark by 30 yards".

Throughout his career Johnny threw numerous exhibition Scores with other top-class bowlers. One of the most famous of those was a Gold Medal Tournament at Skibbereen. Creedon and Denis Scully played Mick Barry and Derry Kenny who were a bowl of odds with two shots to go. However, Creedon with a tremendous shot knocked the bowl of odds and Scully with an unbelievable throw of 500 yards secured victory.

Wearing the Green: 1969 was a landmark year as it featured the first International Bowling Series which was played in the Netherlands. It featured teams from Ireland, Northern Ireland, Holland plus two German teams. The competition was divided into three different sections Road Bowling, Moors Bowling and a Lofting competition. Johnny had the great honour to Captain the Irish team and also don the Green Jersey in 1970, 1972, 1974, 1977 and 1980 a total of six years.

In 1972 he threw a record shot of 550 yards. This was along a narrow track of roadway with canals of water running along both sides. In doing so he won the International Title for Ireland which was truly a magnificent achievement. Injury finally brought an end to his illustrious career in 1989.


Celebrations: Back in those days of Johnny's long bowling career, to be in his company for the after Score celebrations were great occasions full of stories, songs and high spirits. We recall great evenings at The Tavern, The Bell Inn, The Mons Halfway House, O'Regan's Ballyshonin, The Diamond Bar and many more.

On Friday 28th February 2014 a day of celebration to honour the achievements of bowl player Johnny Creedon was organised. It began with a trip to Crookstown to revisit the scene of his famous victory over Mick Barry. That evening The Bell Inn Tavern at Church Cross Clondrohid was full to the rafters where supporters and bowl players from all over Cork County gathered for a night of nostalgia, song and story. Local poet Con O'Riordan composed a poem in Johnny's honour and an appropriate song entitled The Mullenroe Boy, with words and music by Derry & Rosie Healy was launched. This song was played many times on the airwaves including on the programme of his namesake John Creedon of RTE.


Conclusion: Despite his many successes over the years Johnny always remained loyal to his own neighbours and friends. When he stepped out on the bowling road he was always representing his family and the Parish of Clondrohid and throughout his long career he never forgot his roots. He will always be remembered as one of the greats of the game and the legend will live on as long as people discuss the game of bowl playing.

Footnote: In compiling this article I received much support from the Creedon family especially Pat and Michael, both of course are steeped in the bowling culture and both were "Road Showers" for their dad from the tender age of 12 years.





















It is not those who inflict the most, but those that endure the most, that shall prevail

A most powerful and striking viewpoint that is quite relevant to the year 2020. The above headline is taken from the former lord mayor of Cork Terence Macswiney, it is also the first phrase that welcomes you to Independence Museum Kilmurry, Co. Cork. Covid 19 is now the enemy and has hit society and people's lives and turned the world we live in today upside down and inside out. Many people up and down Ireland have felt loss and pain and a sense of shock towards how everyday life has changed in 2020. 2020 is definitely seen as a year of reflection, to slow down and pause. A re-evaluation of life and probably more than ever identity, values and behaviour are key to "What is important".

Historical and Archaeological Kilmurry Association main goal in 1965, when the organisation was founded was to preserve and protect historical and archaeological sites and artefacts. To quote Terence Macswiney" The liberty for which we today strive is a sacred thing". The items the museum preserve are key to yours and Irelands Independence. The museum story tells the extraordinary struggles and endurance that your ancestors fought and won, ordinary people doing extraordinary things.

Former president South African Nelson Mandela and Terence MacSwiney have a lot of comparisons. Both men endured a lot of pain and suffering to see freedom for their respective countries. Mandela once remarked" Real leaders must be ready to sacrifice all for the freedom of their people". This sums up Terence Macswiney life, as on 25th October 1920, Terence met his ultimate faith by taking his last breath and sacrificing his life for the freedom of Ireland by going on hunger strike for 74 days.

MacSwiney's hunger strike had a huge international effect. The British government was threatened with a boycott of goods by the America's, countries in South America pleaded with the pope to intervene. More than 30,000 people paid their respects, at MacSwineys funeral. Terence MacSwiney coffin against the wishes of the MacSwiney family was brought directly to Cork instead of the planned Dublin route. Even in death the British government interfered with the wishes of the family. Terence MacSwiney funeral was one of the largest funerals ever seen in Cork

The MacSwiney family to this day have, a close and deep connection with Kilmurry museum. Maire Brughda MacSwiney (Terence MacSwiney's daughter) officially opened Kilmurry museum in 1965. Independence Museum Kilmurry holds a wide range of items belonging to Terence Macswiney.

On 28 November 1920, an ambush was carried out in Kilmichael by the IRA during the war of Independence. Thirty-six local IRA volunteers commanded by Tom Barry killed seventeen members of the Auxillary division" They had gone down into the mire to destroy us and our nation and down after them we had to go" famously quoted by General Tom Barry. The Kilmichael ambush was seen a major blow to the British armed forces. The wheel of the Crossley tender is in place in the museum, alongside Tom Barry's suitcase, which Tom Barry presented to the museum.

As we head into 2021, there is light at the end of the tunnel, although it could also be an oncoming train. Seamus Heaney simply put it" If we winter this one out, we can summer anytime". There will be summer days ahead, where we can meet family, friends, go to events and get our freedoms back. Theses freedom have been hard fought by our fallen hero Lord Mayor Terence Macswiney and General Tom Barry. The hunger strike in Brixton prison by Terence Macswiney and ambushes in Crossbarry and Kilmichael lead by General Tom Barry were key events which lead

to the freedom and Irish Independence. Independence Museum Kilmurry is solely run by volunteers. In normal times the community gets behinds and supports our fundraising events like concerts, bag packing and coffee mornings. Healy's Spar were doing home deliveries with many willing to call to the elderly as they were

all housebound in the initial stages.

The GAA also had messaging service and had the slogan 'We need Team Players', and Team players they got. They appointed contacts for each town land, so if anyone needed assistance with whatever, all they had to do was make a call. Fr. Joe put all church activities on the laternet.

All the businesses and individuals in Clondrohid and surrounds who worked tirelessly during the first lockdown providing essential services deserve our appreciation.

Great to see our Creche and schools seeing after all our young folk in a safe environment, giving their parents the opportunity to return to work if required.

Hopefully one of the 'Good' side effects of Covid might be that we have created some better life values and appreciate the simpler things of life.





IRELAND'S POSITION AS ISLAND NATION MUST BE TAKEN INTO ACCOUNT BY ANY EU REVIEW OF ANIMAL TRANSPORT RULES -

KELLEHER

Ireland South MEP, Billy Kelleher has said that any review of animal transport rules at EU level must take into account Ireland's status as an island and the unique challenges that it brings.

Kelleher was speaking after he questioned the European Commission for Agriculture, Mr. Janusz Wojciechowski on his thoughts on animal transport and welfare at a recent meeting of the Parliament's Committee of Inquiry into Animal Transport.

"Previously, the Commissioner has stated, when he was a Parliamentary rapporteur on this issue that he believes there should be an eight hour maximum travel limit for live animals.

"Clearly, the Commissioner, when writing that report, took no heed of Ireland and the challenges we face in getting our animals to mainland European markets.

"There's an assumption out there, an incorrect assumption, that Ireland doesn't need to export its excess animals. Nothing could be further from the truth.

"Every year, nearly 300,000 animals leave Ireland for foreign markets adding hundreds of millions to the Irish economy and supporting hundreds if not thousands of jobs in rural communities.

"We do not have the population needed to sustain such an additional input into the domestic market.

"Put simply, it's the same as asking France to drink all the wine it produces every year instead of exporting it. It's just a non-runner from the get go. "Obviously, we can and must improve animal welfare standards, but that starts with implementing the existing rules, and sanctioning those who break them. Proper veterinary oversight must be part of the entire supply chain. "Investment is also needed in terms of the vehicles being used to transport these animals also. I think farmers and exporters are willing

to go the extra mile but what is not acceptable is an arbitrary time limit that would destroy this really important part of the Irish economy," concluded Kelleher.

Like every other club, society, business and individual, Macroom FC had an unprecedented and strange year. The beginning of 2020 feels like an awful long time ago now. The following is a summary of the some of the club highlights from a year like no other.

Of course not a huge amount has happened across 2020 but the Springtime was a very busy time for the club. In January we were involved in two massive cup games. First up the U13s took center stage when they reached the last 32 of the National Cup. Corduff FC from Dublin were the visitors to Murrayfield for a truly memorable occasion. A fine visiting side ran out 4-1 winners but Macroom gave a spirited, skilful and honest display in front of a large enthusiastic crowd. Coaches Peter Coleman, Gearoid Griffin and John Neville were delighted with the display. New sponsors Castle View Chinese looked after the catering post game and our Dublin visitors were very complimentary of the Macroom FC welcome. Thanks also to Macroom Community Leisure Centre for the sponsorship of this team. Macroom A (adult first team) travelled to Dooradoyle, Limerick on a bitterly cold January afternoon for a Munster Junior Cup last 32 tie, losing 5-4 on penalties. Macroom had a host of chances in this fixture. It finished 1-1 after extra time and the locals Regional Utd emerged from the shootout. A disappointing end but again it was a memorable day out with big numbers supporting the team.

We were delighted to have a lotto jackpot winner in January when Eliz Golden c/o Golden's scooped the €1,800 sum.

In February the U14 schoolboys were delighted to receive a new set of jerseys sponsored by Billy Murphy Taxi Services and this is greatly appreciated by the club. The schoolgirls awards night was held at Murray's Bar function room. Player of the year, most improved and top scorer trophies were given out to U11, U13 and U15 girls. It proved to be a memorable night for players, parents, coaches and supporters. Thanks to Denis and Tina Murray for their use of the function room and their continuing support of Macroom FC. Goalkeeper Molly Murphy represented the Cork U15s in a 3-0 win over Limerick while Peter Murphy was the goalkeeping coach for the Cork U11 girls. Another promising goalkeeper, Olan Buckley played for the Cork Schoolboys League U12s and gave a fine performance v Waterford in Carrigaline. Fixtures began to pile up as Storms Ciara and Dennis made their appearance-storm clouds of another kind were gathering as the first case of Covid 19 in Ireland was confirmed on Feb 29th.

Nothing could have really prepared us for the arrival of a global pandemic. All club activities were paused in March-no matches, training, committee meetings or lotto to name just a few activities. It was new territory for all. Plans for our fundraising race night were shelved and with the National lockdown announced on March 27th no one really knew what the future held. Macroom FC continued to provide supports for the local community. This was done in a

discreet way with no fanfare. Members of the community who required assistance received it or were pointed in the right direction. We would also like to compliment other groups and clubs in the locality, who did great work in looking out for people—the Macroom community spirit certainly shone through.

In May it was confirmed that all league seasons for 2019/20 In the Republic of Ireland were cancelled. As a club we began holding committee meetings through the online Zoom platform which was a new and interesting departure for most. These meetings proved very successful and are nowadays an excellent way to keep in contact with one another.

The FAI released the excellent 'Safer return to Training Protocol' in June and this has been a great help to clubs throughout Ireland. The protocol offers direction on how to prepare club grounds for training during Covid 19. It has been regularly updated depending on Government advice and advice regarding matchdays has been subsequently added. We also began our 'Like and Share' free lotto which saw thousands of people engage with our club Facebook page. Random weekly winners received €50 and in total €1,000 was won by the lucky prizewinners. Macroom FC announced in July the decision to switch affiliation from the Cork Athletic Union League to the Munster Senior League. Our two adults' teams would now take part in the senior and junior grades of the MSL. It brought an end to a 43-year association with the Cork AUL. Training (under strict guidelines) for all teams returned in July and this was hugely welcomed by our 500+ players in all age groups.

In August the new 2020/21 playing season began with plenty of games keeping dedicated club coaches busy. To comply with guidelines, risk assessments were carried out at club grounds. Covid 19 compliance officers were present (and continue to be) at all training and games. Our lotto also restarted, and Macroom Seniors played our first ever MSL game, beating Lakewood 6-0 at Murrayfield. Goalkeeping coaching with Sean McDermott from the League of Ireland took place. These ongoing sessions are a fantastic experience for all involved.

September and October continued to be

busy with all teams playing regular matches. Academy teams in particular saw loads of action with those from U7 to U11 having great fun. The girls club continued to go well with an U17 side now entered along with U11, U13 and U15. With more demand a new team for U9 girls has now been formed. There is massive work ongoing at schoolgirls level and well done to all coaches involved. The girls' teams have received great support from Railway View Pharmacy and Life Pharmacy, Macroom.

With cases rising nationally, matches were once again paused towards the latter end of October. Non-contact training is allowed to continue under strict conditions. A good number of Macroom FC teams are continuing to train. Some teams remain paused and each coaching group have decided whether it is possible for them to train safely or not. The top priority is the safety of everyone involved and ensuring full compliance at all times.

In November the U14 schoolboys team received a new set of jerseys sponsored by Macroom Opticians, many thanks for this.

As we approach Christmas, Macroom FC would sincerely ask our members and supporters to always support all of our club sponsors. It has been a truly difficult year for business with many still not allowed to reopen. We wish them all good luck and thank them for their invaluable support of Macroom FC. Thanks also to everyone single volunteer who contribute their time to run our successful club.

Macroom U-6s, 2020

Started on July 11th with about 13 players from a list of 18 and ended the season 13 weeks later with perhaps 21 – 22 players.

Each session was organised along the following lines: 1. Begin with having the players go around a circle and shout their names 2. Warm up with 'boss whislte' – coach shouts instructions to players – high jump, freeze in a funny position etc 3. Bulldog 4.

Split into three groups and go through three game type drills. Introduce one new drill each week so they have a chance to learn and

improve. Each game was covering one basic skill. 5. Split into two groups and play small-sided games. Award points for passes, bounces, tackles etc 6. Photo for COVID record.

1. Generally good atmosphere with the coaches; everyone gets on well with each other and the kids. 2. Having lots of Mams as well as Dad coaches is great in terms of engagement with the kids 3. Having under-age helpers was fantastic. The kids seem to listen to and respond to them better than they do the adults. 4. Coaches came early to go through the set-up which was essential.

1. Need to have 4:1 ratio of coaches to kids or better. It's chaotic even at that. 2. I would get a few more 'props' if I could such as obstacle course material, big hoops etc. 3. Lighter balls – lighter even than the Quick touch. Small plastic balls and sponge balls help with kids who are afraid of getting a ball to the face and so on.

Recommendations for next season: 1. Props and a selection of lighter balls. There are things like velcro fastening 'tails' that you can use for chasing games. They might be useful. 2. Every coach needs to know the set-up of the session in detail, so coaches need to meet 10 minutes before. With pauses in the session you can lose small kids' attention and might not get it back. Conclusion: It was a good if truncated season. It was a pity to end abruptly when they were just starting to look like playing a little bit of football, but everyone went home smiling so no complaints.

Kilmurry were short three regulars through injury, (Kyle Kelleher, Marco Healy and Seán Warren), lost Dave McCarthy to injury after only three minutes, yet still had the talent, spirit and determination to give the champions a real testing hour. Iveleary looked the better team at times but never could kill off the challengers. Managing only one point in the last twenty minutes, that a superb effort from Chris Óg Jones on 55, they were desperately hanging on in the closing stages. This victory was a significant milestone for the Uibh Laoire club, their first three in a row and their first final win over Kilmurry at the Macroom venue.

It was 0-3 each after ten minutes but in the 12th minute Iveleary struck for what was the vital score of the game, a goal from Seán O'Leary who took a pass from his brother Barry before running on and sending a bullet like drive into the roof of the Kilmurry net to break the deadlock and give his side a lead they were not to lose again. Iveleary were ahead 1-5 to 0-3 at the water break and led by 1-8 to 0-7 at the interval.






