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
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Last week saw a petition published online about Cork County Councils decision to remove the proposed outdoor dining from the historic town square to another location within the town, due to planning complaints.

Imagine the irony of having to petition the right to enjoy our Market Square as an actual Market Square rather than a glorified car park. It would be nice to see the Square becomes a multi-use zone with a particular emphasis on a pedestrian priority space. A place where people can sit, mingle, eat, drink, and enjoy the town centre to the benefit of our local community and businesses alike. I did see some children play soccer there a few days ago and thought it harked back to more bygone times, but alas it will remain an uncommon sight.

From an outsider's point of view, it does seem like community engagement and consultation is floundering somewhere, generating a great divide between business requirements, and pitting that against the needs the wider community. It leads

me to ask how both businesses and community can maximise a shared space collectively? How great it would be to have a local community development team which would allow for shared goals. This could include improved living standards, quality of life, prosperity, competitiveness, and environmental sustainability. Genuine partnership amongst key stakeholders is a prerequisite for any town's success, that includes the council, groups, businesses, and the public. In an article in the Corkman by Concubhar Ó Liatháin, on June 5th, Marie O'Leary, the Municipal District Officer, said "All the information which has come from Government suggests the priority is placemaking and vibrancy of town centres and, you know from being in Macroom, the only thing that's vibrant in Macroom is the traffic, it's in your ears, it's the noise that you hear and the congestion that you see." Alas without your input and say in Macroom's

Alas without your input and say in Macroom's development, the power of the parking spot and a nauseating fumes from the HGV's will prevail.

THE DANIEL KINGSTON MEMORIAL RUN 2021 FINAL RETURNS

goes and because of the on-going Covid pandemic this year's Memorial event could not be held in the normal fashion of running/walking around Coolehane, with hundreds participating. Daniel lost his young life in 2009 to Hodgkin's Lymphoma and the Kingstons received great help from Arc, the Cork-based charity dedicated to helping patients and their families in dealing with cancer. To commemorate Daniel's memory and to raise much needed funds for Arc, the Kingstons had, until 2019, organised an annual run/walk.

'Necessity is the mother of invention' the saying

David Neville, Daniel's nephew, conceived the idea of doing a smaller private run this year. As a Lenten challenge he decided to run five kilometres a day for forty days with the purpose of honouring Daniel and raising funds for ARC. (This had the added benefit that he could still enjoy his 'treats' for the duration). He recruited his De La Salle, Macroom, first-year chums, Ruadhan McKenna (Macroom) and James Cuddihy (Aghinagh) to accompany him.

In all weathers, fair and foul, the boys completed their trips. Facing the elements every day, despite sometimes feeling tired, was not easy but they persevered and prevailed.

Initially their target was to raise \in 300 – they realised \in 13,100.

The boys and their families were surprised, delighted, and overwhelmed with the degree of support. Moral sustenance was supplied by messages from sporting heroes such as Briege Corkery and Rena Buckley who sent, personally

and virtually, good wishes. Arc was equally thrilled with the boys' efforts, and its fundraiser, Hillary Sullivan, said 'Arc was blown away by what the three young boys achieved' and 'that Arc was very grateful'. Again because of Covid many voluntary fund-raising events were cancelled and charities were left short of monies. The more than €13,000 raised was very welcome indeed.

The Daniel Kingston Memorial events since 2009

have raised more than €250, 000 for Arc.

At a brief presentation on Tuesday 1st June, 2021, David, James and Ruadhan handed over the cheque to Hillary Sullivan, Cork Arc.

It is heart-warming to see young people undertaking such great projects and receiving the community's support.

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MACROOM CITIZENS ADVICE

National Carers Week June 7th Citizens Informa re supports available for carers

National Carers Week is a key event in the calendar year, a dedicated time to celebrate Ireland's 500,000 family carers. The aim for this week is to raise awareness of family carers, so their work is properly recognised, supported and empowered. The importance of this week and what it represents is a great opportunity to highlight some of the information, advice and support Citizens Information can provide to carers.

Carer's payments are made to people who are looking after someone who needs full-time care and attention because of age, disability, or illness, including mental illness. They include, Carers Allowance (means-tested), Carers Benefit (PRSI based), Half-Rate Carers, Carer's Support Grant and the Domiciliary Care Allowance. If you qualify for Carer's Allowance you may also be eligible to qualify for Free Household Benefits and a Free Travel Pass. If you qualify for Carers Benefit you may be eligible for a GP visit card.

If you don't qualify for a weekly Carers Allowance or Benefit payment but are caring for someone full-time you may be eligible for the Carers Support Grant which is paid annually in June -

Citizens Information can give you all the information you need and discuss if you meet the eligibility criteria set out by the department. They can also help you with the application process and give you some guidelines on what to include with your application to give you the best chance of a successful outcome.

If you feel that you have been wrongly refused a carers payment, or you are unhappy about a decision of a Social Welfare Deciding Officer about your entitlements, Citizens Information may be able to support you to appeal this decision.

Citizens Information can also discuss how to maximise your income if you are;

- · You are already on a social welfare payment and
- You are caring for more than one person
- You are sharing the care responsibilities with another person
- · You wish to continue to work part-time
- You wish to take carers leave

Speaking about National Carers Week, Anne O'Donovan, West Cork's Citizens Information Manager, said, "As we reflect on the past year, one of the most striking aspects of it all has to be the commitment, dedication and resilience of our healthcare workers and carers. National Carers Week is the perfect time to come together and celebrate these individuals for their hard work and the unimaginable challenges they have faced during the pandemic. Our goal is to let every carer know that we are here to advise and support them, regardless of your query, call your local centre and we will guide you in the right direction."

For anyone needing information, advice or have an advocacy issue, you can call a member of the local Citizens Information team in West Cork on 0761 07 8390, they will be happy to assist and make an appointment if necessary. The offices are staffed from Monday to Thursday from 10am to 5pm, and 10am to 4pm on Friday. 



There were kind neighbours, wonderful parents, lovely children and great colleagues, all of whom became family friends, Elizabeth especially became a valued part of our family.

On my first morning, I think the principal, Paddy Casey and I looked askance at each other. Paddy seemed to me a very serious man who wore glasses and a hat, I was of a frivolous disposition, it didn't look like a marriage made in heaven. Well, appearances are deceptive. At 'small sos' I found that he had a wicked sense of humour and by evening we became friends. Indeed, he became a family friend, adviser and support. He was wise, funny, very generous and kind. He taught me many valuable lessons.

In my early years, I was what we now know as 'cocooned'. My school world consisted of the children, Mr. Casey, Dan Mc Carthy and Johnno, Ellie Vaughan and Lehane's shop next door. We each had our well-defined roles. Dan Mc Carthy brought the letters and the news, Vaughans were our go-to in times of crisis – such as a 'cigire'. I taught my 'seomra beag' and taught the older girls to do needlework. I boiled the kettle to make tea or coffee for big and small 'sos'. Paddy did everything else. He arrived with the lark, checked the toilets, opened up, lit the two fires, dealt with mail and the occasional parent or visitor. I had no idea what we'd do if he didn't come. He served Renaniree well. Go ndéana Dia trócaire ar a anam uasal.





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Recently, we published an article about Codrum house, which triggered a mixture of memories for me. As children, we used to play near the ruins, much to the farmer's chagrin. In Autumn, amongst the old famine cottages (which have since been knocked) we used to collect conkers from the ancient horse chestnut tree. In spring, the woodlands behind the house, were a blanket of untouched bluebells and wild garlic and even more special, because they seemed, to our small minds, to be a secret to the outside world.

The house, however, we didn't go near. It was a degenerate figure on the landscape, its large size, the only indication of its former grandeur. The coo of pigeons and the murder of Colonel Hutchenson were enough to scare the beiesus out of us. In 1789 it was said that Colonel Hutchenson was awoken during the night by a servant, to alert him of intruders. He went immediately to confront them. Upon recognising one of the men Malachy Duggan, he shouted "you rascal, what brings you here". As a result, he was shot dead. As children, we were told

that his blood could still be seen on the stairs. And with much peeking through empty windows, we settled on the servant's staircase for the scene of the crime, a macabre game for innocent children, I'll admit. The following article is an excerpt from Schools' Collection, Duchas.ie and relates to the murderous ringleader Malachy Duggan and his fellow culprits.


"An Incident in Connection with the Death of the Late Colonel Hutchenson, Codrum, Macroom


The story of the murder of Col Hutchinson is too well known to relate here, but I am giving an incident which I got from some very old inhabitants. Canon Peter O Leary refers to the trí liathróidi dubha, in other words to the three men who were hanged, drawn and quartered for the murder - through the perfidy of Malachy Duggan, who himself was the instigator of

The three men were being brought from Cork to the Place of Execution on the square of Macroom. On their way they had to pass through the main Street. It appears that one of the condemned men, he was only twenty years of age, had bought some purchases from an old lady in the street to the amount of sixpence. Just as the men and their escort were passing, she ran from her doorway and halted the procession She demanded the sixpence, which of course the man was not able to give her. The cortege proceeded on its way. When questioned shortly afterwards as to why she had done so. The answer she gave was that as it was a lawful debt unpaid, he might have to account for it in the hereafter"

























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






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Mechanical Automation and Maintenance Fitter (MAMF)

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What is an emergency medical card and how do I apply for one?

An emergency medical card is a medical card that you can get without a means test in certain emergency situations

You can get an emergency medical card if you:

- Have a terminal illness and have been told you have 24 months or less to live
- Are getting end-of-life treatment
- Need urgent ongoing care and urgently need a medical card

Only a healthcare professional (for example, a doctor or consultant) can apply for an emergency medical card for you. They will send the application to the HSE.

If your application is approved, it can take up to 10 days to get your medical card in the post. However, your card will be active within 24 hours of your application being processed. Your GP, pharmacy and hospital staff will see your card is active on their systems. This means you can access medical card services while you wait for your card in the post.

If you get a medical card because you have a terminal illness and have been told you have 24 months or less to live, the HSE will never review your card and your card will never expire.

If you get a medical card because you are receiving end-of-life treatment, the HSE will never review your card and your card will never expire. End-of-life treatment means you have been told you have less than 12 months left to live.

If you get a medical card because you need urgent ongoing care and urgently need a medical card, your card will expire after 6 months. You will need to complete a means assessment before your emergency medical card expires. The HSE will write to you to remind you to do this.

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



GOVT SHOULD CONVENE AN AVIATION TASKFORCE TO CHART FUTURE OF SECTOR AND PROTECT REGIONAL CONNECTIVITY - KELLEHER

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has written to An Taoiseach and the Minister for Transport seeking the convening of a high-level aviation taskforce to address the challenges our regional airports are facing resulting from the aftermath of the Covid 19 pandemic.

The Ireland South MEP made the request following representations from those working in, and managing, Cork, Kerry and Shannon Airports.

"Ireland's connectivity to the world is essential to our prosperity as an economy but also to our wellbeing as a society.

"Next Friday's announcement on international travel is vital importance in the long-term. We need our skies to re-open to allow for the restoration of family ties and for the reopening of our tourism and

hospitality sectors - sectors that will bring muchneeded economic benefits.

"However, we also need to think about the longterm futures of our regional airports. We must address the challenge of climate change, and how it will affect how we travel and work.

"Ultimately, we need to find a way of reducing the carbon footprint of air travel while also still keeping peripheral regions connected to mainland Europe and the UK

"The task force should conduct a full assessment of the significant challenges facing these areas and to ensure that regional connectivity is at the heart of its mission.

"Without a clear pathway forward for our aviation sector we risk losing our attractiveness as a destination for Foreign Direct Investment and our place as a tourism hotspot - all of which the Irish exchequer is heavily dependent on.

"Additionally, I have also written

to the EU Commissioner for Transport, Adina Valean requesting that a pan-EU approach is taken when looking at connectivity of our peripheral regions, especially the EU's islands.

"Now is the time to start the conversation about the Irish aviation sector by bringing all the stakeholders together and charting the future together," concluded Kelleher.

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
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PENALTY POINT THRESHOLD FOR LEARNER AND NOVICE DRIVER LICENCES

The Department of Transport has written to a number of Learner and Novice Drivers to inform them of a legal clarification on the penalty point disqualification threshold for these licence types.

New legislation introduced on 1st August 2014, as part of the Road Traffic Act 2014, created the concept of a novice driver and changed the penalty point disqualification threshold for learner and novice drivers. Instead of the standard 12 points disqualification threshold, this was changed to a 7 point threshold for "...a person who at the time such points are endorsed is a learner driver or a novice driver". The interpretation by the Department, based on legal advice received at the time, was that this new threshold should be applied only to people who entered the driver licensing system on or after that date. Those learner drivers already in the system before the new legislation was introduced on 1st August 2014 should continue to be subject to the standard 12 points disqualification threshold.

As a result of further, revised, legal advice, the Department is now applying the 7-point threshold to people who were in the system before that date on the following basis -

If someone who is a learner or a novice receives 7 or more penalty points while a learner or a novice on or after 1 August 2014, they should face disqualification;



Also, if the total of points held before that date plus points received after that date reaches or exceeds 12 points, they will be disqualified.

No driver will be disqualified immediately as a result of this change. This is because a driver is legally entitled to be advised of the disqualification when they are notified of the offence that causes the disqualification threshold to be breached. Should any affected person incur additional penalty points from six weeks after their notification date, which results in them having 7 or more points on their licence while still a novice or learner driver, they will then be disqualified.

All drivers affected will be contacted personally in writing by the Department of Transport, to notify them on the impact of these changes. The Department estimates that just under 3,000 drivers will be receiving letters as a result

of this change. Out of 3.1 million drivers, this

equates to just under 0.1 % of drivers.

The Department of Transport has found no evidence that the affected drivers have been involved in a fatal or serious collision while they should have been disqualified.

DRIVING CAREFULLY AROUND AREAS WITH LOOSE LIVESTOCK

With almost 91,000kms of regional and local roads in Ireland, it is not uncommon for motorists to come across loose livestock. Livestock have been mentioned in many an AA Roadwatch radio report over the years with "horses loose" or "geese waddling" a common occurrence. It may make for a light-hearted listen whether it is deer, swans, cattle, horses, sheep or goats but they all pose a danger for

motorists.

Animals don't usually cause that many single vehicle collisions but motorists must be aware how to behave if they do come across livestock. If motorists come across loose livestock or farmers moving animals; it is imperative that motorists be patient and do not startle the animal.

Always slow down and be prepared to stop when approaching or overtaking animals. You must obey any signal to slow down or stop given by the person moving animals. Motorists should avoid using their horn if an animal is in front as it might frighten them. A warning sign will be in place on roads where animals are common.
