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

The school year is nearing an end, and like previous years, the sun has made an appearance just in time for the leaving cert.

What a pleasure it is has been to be able to bring the kids down to the river for a swim. I always feel it's a real missed opportunity that a food truck is not allowed by the weirs, it would be a lovely incentive for people to stay local on hot days. But I digress, I again wanted to discuss the development plan. I'm sure you are sick of me harping on about it, but public consultation and understanding of the development of our town are of social importance. One aspect of the plan which I do greatly love is to update the Sullane River Corridor, a similar concept to one I had mentioned back at the start of the year. The plan states (4.3.40) North of the Castle Street bridge is Masseytown Park which is a well maintained public park, however, it would benefit from a more visible entry point. It provides additional walks/potential walks along the River Sullane which can be further developed particularly along the southern bank. There is also a small park located along the northern bank not far from the bridge. Following on from this (4.3.41) there is a clear opportunity to reinforce and promote this linear park as a formal green corridor along the Sullane river and integrate it into the future redevelopment of the town, particularly through enhanced accessibility/connectivity. It has the potential to be a valuable asset to both residents and visitors to the town, particularly as much of it is within public ownership. Although not the same in terms of scale it could operate on a par with a facility such as the Regional Park in Ballincollig. Riverside walks should be developed sensitively incorporating appropriate setbacks from riverbanks to minimise impacts on freshwater habitats and species. Promoting the biodiversity value of this area also brings potential opportunities to enhance this value through sensitive management.

Just imagine begin able to walk/run/cycle/ rollerblade/skateboard from the Weirs the whole way along the river right up to the R618 bridge to Coachford. Imagine local children enjoying a new native woodland, wildflower meadows and a dog park. Imagine a place where teenagers can rent kayaks, paddleboards, paddleboats or enjoy a skate park or BMX track. Imagine a park that would enable a full-blown recreation of the Brian Bru battle at the confluence of the rivers Sullane and Laney near Macroom to mark 1100 years since its passing, the High Kind of Ireland and head of the O'Brien clan. Could the Protestant church act as a coffee shop and facility hire to support the development of the Sullane as a stand-alone tourist attraction? Those things are all within reach. I do feel the Lee Valley would benefit from its own stand-alone tourism trail, similar in concept to the Munster vales and the Sullane Corridor would feature as part of that. Your input and say in Macroom's development matters. As mentioned in a previous editions, the Macroom Development plan is public consultation up to midnight on Thursday 1st July 2021 via Volume 4 - https://www.corkcoco.ie/en/corkcounty-development-plan-2022-2028

Everyone is delighted with our newnfound freedom of travel, and we have had some sunny days. It is sometimes difficult to come up with new ideas to entertain children and adults alike. Recently I was fortunate enough to come across two 'new' places of interest.

The first is Gáirdín Ghobnatan, Ballyvourney. This lovely area is situated between the Abbey Hotel and the Naomh Abán GAA pitch in Ballyvourney, on the right-hand side of the main Macroom-Killarney Road. On the way you will pass a section of the By-Pass in operation. The space was developed by the local Tidy Towns committee under the able direction of Sue Morton.

The area is divided into a sensory garden that has beautiful smells, an area for relaxing and childrens' climbing and playing area. Very unusual and enticing are sections for story-telling and outdoor musical instruments. The young and nimble can wonder through tunnels and there is a table for table tennis. Entry is free and the only thing requested is respect for other visiting at the same time. The Abbey hotel is nearby, and two local supermarkets will supply ice cream and the obligatory treats. Attached are some photos.

In contrast Nano Nagle Place is situated in the heart of Cork city, beyond UCC and near St. Fin Barre's Cathedral (Church of Ireland). It is a monument to Nano Nagle, the educational trailblazer of the 18th century. By the time of her death in 1784 she had opened six schools for destitute poor Catholic children in Cork. Born in 1718 into privilege, she dedicated her life to helping the poor by founding the Presentation Order of nuns and working in education. The Penal Laws were in operation at the time, and it was illegal to run schools for Catholic children. Despite the prohibition she opened her first school hidden behind a shop in the city, and she progressed from there. She used her family's wealth to fund her projects and later was in receipt of donations, and the destitute supported her efforts as best

they could.

Nano Nagle Place is situated in the former South Presentation Convent in Douglas Street, Cork, and is beautifully restored. You will be greeted by the friendly reception staff with Aghabullogue nobly represented. Tours of the grounds take place regularly. Not only will you see and hear the story of Nano Nagle's life and how the nuns lived, but you will also see her grave, the convent chapel, an informative display of Cork as it was in the 18th century and an account of the wonderful work done by the good nuns. In addition, there is a lovely bookshop that contains many Corkoriented history books. A visit to the awardwinning cafe, The Good Day Deli, will cap an interesting and rewarding day.

The entry fee is modest, and it can be booked online, on the Nano Nagle Place website.

Macroom town and the surrounding district are 'full' of history. Kilmurry Independence Museum has reopened and has many interesting items and features. Macroom itself has a long and interesting history that includes the story of the Castle, Cath Bealach Leacthna, The Battle of Macroom (1650), Art Ó Laoghaire's exploits and the famed Caoineadh, Macroom Union Workhouse, the an t-Athar Peadar Ó Laoghaire connection, The Kilmichael Ambush involvement ion - before and after, the story of Dr Jeremiah Kelleher (South Square) and his son's assassination in Longford in 31 October 1920, the Kilgobnet kidnappings and murders and the visit of Major Bernard Montgomery in May 1922 - yes he of the North African campaign against Rommel in WW2. There are of course many other historical happenings associated with the town. Hopefully conducted historical tours will soon be available.

These are just a few suggestions on how to pass some idle summer days.

Since 2018 CDYS work placement module has included Macroom Castle Demesne as an optional venue for our learners. Our 'Town Park' laid out during the reign of Edward 3rd., (c1350) offers our learners a wide skillset in wildflower ID, Tree ID & planting within a designed landscape. The project commenced on Good Friday 2021 and our concluding activities on June 16th included an introduction to the Double rank Beech Avenue flanked by lime trees. Our mission to date, is this 'Ornament in Glory' of Muskerry. While the entrance archway from the town square was recorded and mapped nearly 400 years ago, the Double rank marks the original entrance to the manor house itself. CDYS learners measured the circumferences of some of the remaining 13 Beech Trees (there were likely to have been as many as 75 per row) which were recorded to have a circumference of 350cms. Others along the rank measured an impressive 5.6 metres circumference. And assigning 1.5 cm per year of growth, CDYS estimate the Double Rank dates from 1788 to 1802. The Double Rank is a haven to wildlife, with wild honeybees warms settling in the cavities of the ancient beeches. Bats, Red Squirrels, Badgers and warrens of Rabbits have all made it their home. We would like to thank the trustees of the Castle Demesne for their consent in facilitating.

'Case' by Con Kelleher.

When recently researching a sports star of the past, a case full of newspaper clippings about him was loaned to me. This was precious and was given only on the absolute condition that it would be safely returned. It was with relief that I gave it back. The brown case measured 14 x 10 x 4 inches and, by today's standards, was modest. Its value lay in its age, the memories it captured and as an insight of times past. A doting older sister had carefully collected and stored the material, dating from the 1940s to the 1980s. It is now in the possession of a younger generation and will, no doubt, be passed on again.

'Case' is a short ordinary and unglamorous word that everybody knows. However, on further thought it has multiple meanings and uses. As cited above, it can denote a container, a box. But the word may also be used in a court 'case', a medical 'case' - on Saturday May 1st there were 567 new cases of Covid confirmed. Accountants use 'case' to categorize various subdivisions of income for tax calculation purposes. A briefcase is a specialised carrying case for documents and often used by legal professionals in ferrying and perhaps glamorizing their briefs or 'cases' or themselves. F-mail addresses can be case sensitive which means it makes a difference whether capitals are used or not; joebloggs@ gmail.com is not necessarily the same as JoeBloggs@gmail. com. Those who learned Irish will remember the declension of nouns into 'cases' - Irish has 'an sagart' but 'tig an tsagairt' (the priest, the priest's house). Latin also declined nouns: mensa (table) was a feminine words, and was declined as mensa, mensa, mensam, mensae, mensa and mensa for the subjective, vocative, objective, genitive, dative and ablative cases. Polish, like many other languages, declines nouns: In Polish 'Lekarz' means doctor but 'I am a doctor' is rendered 'jestem lekarzsem'.

In phrases 'case' can be used in a variety of ways: 'in case of' expresses the idea of a possibility, or 'in the case of' meaning if 'x' happens 'y' or 'z' may follow. One could suggest that 'the case' for Brexit was falsely put, 'case' here meaning 'argument'. 'Níl cás na náire ar/uirthi' is an Irish phrase meaning that he/she is quite unashamed. To thicken the Irish plot, 'cás' as Gaeilge also means 'honour' or 'reverence'

Currently some are putting the 'case' for a poll on Irish unity, marshalling their argument and outlining the positives and possible problems if that were to occur. Some think that the risks and problems are greater and make the counter 'case' or counter argument. Other similar uses are the urgent case for sending aid to India during its unfolding tragedy, and the case for prosecuting Bolsonaro, the Brazilian President, for mishandling the Corona pandemic in his country.

The root has other forms such as 'to case'; to 'case' a house means that another, often a burglar, reconnoitres his intended target. 'Casing' also denotes the immediate frame of an object and encasement means enclosing. A case of beer bottles or cans, denoting the container and contents, is now commonly referred to as a 'slab' - twenty-four, I think. Ornate boxes or 'cases' were used to hold jewellery or pistols or wine and vouched for the wealth and status of the owners. Getting back to the 'container' aspect of the word, the use, quoted above, of such a case was common in Ireland in the twentieth century. Most houses didn't have safes and filling cabinets were items of the future. Various stratagems were devised to keep valuable documents or items. Often letters from loved ones were stored in cases as were paper clippings, especially of matches or other public events or accomplishments. My older brother remembers using similar cases to bring altar-boy clothes when serving. These consisted of a black soutane with red edges and a white alb. The alb had to be perfectly clean and starched.

In other instances, the case was kept under the bed and contained valuable documents such as wills or, deeds and so on. It sometimes held money too, especially 'emergency' money that could meet unexpected bills. Sometimes it held family heirlooms, even secrets. At times 'the case' was located in the parlour, the best room in the housed, but often only used for the rare occasions of 'stations', or the priest's visit or a wedding breakfast, or a 'hauling home' or other such occasion. Occasionally the treasured case was buried outside, in a hidden location on the land. Emigration was a huge feature of Irish life in the nineteenth and twentieth century and it is thought that at least 8 million Irish people left Ireland from 1800 to 1921. After independence in 1921 the pattern continued and in the 1950s about 500,000 (of a population of 3.5 million) left Ireland (26 counties) and there was mention of the 'vanishing' Irish. Most emigrants left with nothing or very left materially, a national school education only and mostly without training or skills. The less unlucky had small cases to carry their few belongings. Brooklyn, the book and film, poignantly captures this scenario.

In our large family of ten the children took various paths, and eight boarded away. The suitcase was an indispensible companion and in our family one cream case, with red lining, saw service in Cork, Bundoran, Fermoy, Dublin, Maynooth and Waterford. Ironically some who didn't go rued that fact too. Going away also often meant that new towels, clothes, slippers and dressing gowns - the latter two rarely used at home - were bought and packed. However, the new goods came at the price of leaving home and would gladly have been relinquished for being allowed to stay. How sad it must have been for those emigrating to Britain or the U.S. or elsewhere, perhaps never to see home again and maybe never to be seen by their family again. The term an 'Irish Wake' was appropriate. How fascinating it would have been if cases could have recorded their stories.

Many book titles use the term 'case' and include Sir Arthur Conan Doyle (creator of the Sherlock Holmes character), C.S. Lewis and Nancy Drew. In many titles 'case' is used as an instance or incident and the story is told. Medical journals often contain 'case' histories of unusual or new presentations of illnesses and describe the age, gender, occupation of the patient and relevant details, and the course, treatment, and outcome of the illness. Patients are never named.

According to the Concise Oxford Dictionary, 'case' meaning an instance comes via Middle English/ Old French from Latin, casus which means 'fall', and thus 'happen'. The 'box' meaning of case comes via the same route and is derived from casse, chasse and ultimately the Latin word capsa (capere = to hold). 'Capsule' has the same idea.

I rest my case for the word 'case' – a word that is simple and complex, all at the same time.

JOSEPH STAFFORD GIBSON BY KATHY O'SULLIVAN





Originally built in 1724 as Cork city's customs house, Crawford Art Gallery is home to a collection of national importance, featuring works from the 18th century to the present, and welcomes nearly a quarter of a million visitors a year.

As the regional art museum for Munster, the Crawford Art Gallery has a permanent collection of over 2000 works, with a bequest made by Joseph Stafford Gibson, born in Curraclough House, Lissarda, in 1837, at the heart of the gallery.

Gibson was a philanthropist in the truest sense, never seeking the limelight or recognition, being a veritable international man of mystery, and only coming to prominence after his exceedingly generous bequest of upon his death in 1919 - at the end of the 'Spanish Flu' pandemic, now being looked at anew, in light of recent events - of £14,790, "for the furthering of art in the city of his boyhood. To put that into perspective, £14,790 in 1919 would today be worth close to €750,000. In his will, he also bequeathed his collection of ceramics, coins, engravings, miniatures, silverware, watercolours an extensive collection that brings together cultural significance and Joseph Stafford Gibson's personal touch. Gibson kept Cork and Ireland close to his heart even as he travelled abroad for much of his life.

Joseph was born to Ann Stafford and Captain William Gibson. His father, who came from a family of noted Cork silversmiths, served in the 68th Light Infantry during the Peninsular War (1807-1814). The Peninsular War was the military conflict fought by Spain, the United Kingdom and Portugal against France for control of the Iberian Peninsula during the Napoleonic Wars. It is regarded as one of the first wars of national liberation.

Joseph grew up at Curraclough House, Lissarda. Following the death of his father in 1848, he moved to the home of his guardian aunt, Anne Ballard, at Academy Street, Cork. Here, he was just around the corner from the Cork School of Design on Emmet Place (now Crawford Art Gallery). It had a profound influence on him and he would always maintain the connection, despite spending much of his life in Madrid (1877-1919). An amateur watercolourist himself, he often sought artistic advice from James Brenan (1837-1907), artist and headmaster of the school (1860-89). Gibson's watercolours demonstrate his extensive travels in the UK, France, Germany, Switzerland, Italy, and Spain. He died at Calle Aduana, Madrid on 3 February 1919.

An amateur artist, Gibson found success to be somewhat elusive, writing in 1889: "Think that everyone should have an occupation, mine is painting [...] never able to exhibit a picture." That James Brenan, headmaster of the Cork School of Art (1860-1889) gave him encouragement nad mentoring, as Gibson made regular visits to Cork, and he steadily mastered his techniques over a fifty-year period.

For all his perceived lack of success, Gibson has a chapter devoted to him in the 1952 book "Gente del '98; Arte, Cine y Ametralladora" by artist Ricardo Baroja - a one-time colleague of Pablo Picasso entitled "José Stratford Gibson, pintor inglés desconocido" (unknown English [sic] painter).

What is perhaps Gibson's best-known painting, however, was not a depiction of a Spanish scene, but, rather, a French one. In a letter to British MP Arthur James Balfour dated 8 February 1894, Gibson explains that he "lived in France from 1862 up to the Franco-German war & afterwards till the year 1877 when I came to Spain." The Franco-German war (1870-71) significantly altered the balance of power in Europe, leading to a more dominant Germany, and partly laid the groundwork for World

Gibson painted a street scene of Asnières-sur-Seine in the aftermath of La Commune de Paris (Paris Commune). In 1871, Gibson evidently bore witness to the radical two-month government that emerged from the Franco-Prussian War and collapse of the Second French Empire. An image of destruction that holds contemporary resonance, this is one of over 300 watercolours by Joseph Stafford Gibson, which were bequeathed to what is now Crawford Art Gallery after his death in Madrid on 3 February 1919.

Interestingly, Joseph also bequeathed us two annotated editions of Don Quixote (1796 and 1833). It should be noted that An tAthair Peadar Ó Laoghaire (1839 -1920), renowned Gaelic scholar from Carriganima, translated an abridged version of Don Quixote into his local dialect of Irish. These two Corkmen understood the significance of Don Quixote, which holds the distinction of being the second most-translated book in the world, after the Bible. It has become known for its central message that individuals can be right while society is quite wrong and is seen as one of the foundations of modern literature.


The two editions of Don Quixote bequeathed by Gibson, on display in Crawford Art Gallery.

To carry out the terms of Gibson's will, the 'Gibson' Bequest Committee' was set up in 1922. It included the principal of the Dublin Metropolitan School of Art and the head of the National Gallery of Ireland. Daniel Corkery, later professor of English at University College Cork, also sat on the committee and played a key role in the choice of the acquisitions.

The second element of the bequest was the creation of the Gibson Bequest Scholarship, which allowed the trustees to offer gifted students a travel grant to develop their understanding and appreciation of art. Gibson's will stated that he wanted to help









"a student of unusual talent and good habits . . . to travel on the Continent of Europe for a period not exceeding one year to study oil-painting or sculpture". Joseph stated that the recipient must be a native of Munster and that the money should only be sent to them once every month or every two months. He said "it is not advisable for young people to have too large a sum at one time – they squander it".

One beneficiary of Gibson's gift was the stone carver and sculptor, Seamus Murphy. He travelled to London and then on to Paris in 1932 where he developed his skills and understanding of the art of stone carving and sculpting. Examples of Murphy's work can be seen in churches, graveyards (for example, the headstone for the Tailor and Ansty in Gougane Barra) and public spaces all over Ireland. Several of his bronze busts of past presidents line the corridors of Áras an Uachtaráin.

Gibson also bequeathed his coin collection and antiques, including Spanish ceramics and silverware. Many of these items are now housed in a cabinet in the gallery. Two bronze plaques on either side of the cabinet, one in English and the other in Irish, tell visitors the story of Gibson's kind donation.

The earliest purchases made under the Gibson Bequest coincided with a tumultuous time for Ireland – the Irish War of Independence and the Irish Civil War framing the emergence of the Irish Free State. Art is often political, with even everyday scenes holding political undertones, such as Jack

Butler Yeats' Off the Donegal Coast. His depiction of the Irish landscape as he saw it in 1922, a year after the ratification of the Anglo-Irish Treaty that established the Irish Free State, confirmed a young national identity. This is but one of many interpretations of the Irish landscape and the people who are so much a part of it, which adorn the gallery walls.


Perhaps informed by the international life of Joseph Stafford Gibson himself, works collected in his name demonstrate a distinct awareness of life abroad and appetite for British and French contemporary artists, as well as those from Ireland. The artwork itself strongly refutes the notion of

Ireland as disconnected from international affairs that resulted from the government's insistence on the country's neutrality during World War II. The chasm between a government and its people is often great, as art illustrates.

A visit to Crawford Art Gallery (entrance is free) is highly recommended. Should you decide to do so, please take a minute to remember Joseph Stafford Gibson, whose legacy is one for generations. He epitomized everything that philanthropy should be, as good deeds should be done with intention, not for attention.

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County Cork Towns **Embark on Pollinator Plans**

Following the successful development of a Pollinator Plan for Midleton, Cork County Council has commenced the roll out of Pollinator Plans for the towns of Carrigaline, Kinsale, Bantry, Macroom, Kanturk and Fermoy, with community workshops hosted by ecologist Tony Nagle.

The plans were developed in late 2020 and will help guide how the Council manages publicly owned spaces within the towns in a way which is sympathetic to bees and other native pollinators that are an essential component of a healthy

The populations of many of our pollinator species

are declining in numbers, and it is estimated that one third of our native bee species are now threatened with extinction. Like all animals, our pollinators need adequate supplies of food provided by a range of flowering plants throughout their life cycle. They also need places to nest. Pollinators can nest in long grass, in burrows in bare earth, or in crevices in old walls or wood, depending on the species. As landscapes become more intensively managed and tidied up, there is less food and fewer sheltering opportunities for many species.

What Youthreach offers:

Macroom Youthreach offers national accredited qualifications recognised by employers and colleges for young people who have left school and are aged between 15-20 years of age. Courses are full time, are delivered in small class-room settings and are available on a year- round basis. Financial support is available to all students over 16 years of age. Students have access to their own laptop while engaged on the programme.

Certification and Qualifications

The Youthreach curriculum consists of 3 main components namely,

- Academic Certification,


3. Life skills

Last Chance to have your say on the Cork **County Development Plan**

As the deadline approaches for submissions to the Draft Cork County Development Plan; the County Development Plan outlines the overall strategy for the proper planning and sustainable development of the County, taking into account national and regional level plans, government policy and statutory guidelines. The Draft Plan will replace not just the current County Development Plan from 2014 but also the current town plans and local area plans.

Submissions can be made by the public on-line at https://www.corkcoco.ie/en/corkcounty-development-plan-2022-2028 in writing to the following: Senior Planner, Planning Policy Unit, Cork County Council, Floor 13, County Hall, Carrigrohane Road until midnight on 1 July 2021. Once the public submissions have been reviewed by the Council, the draft plan will be amended to take account of these amendments and the plan will be open for public consultation on the amendments in January 2022. The new County Development plan will be adopted by the County Council in April 2022 and comes into force in June 2022.

The County Development Plan for Macroom forecasts 399 new houses in Macroom between 2022-2028 or a 33% increase in population, whilst the County Development Plan for Millstreet forecasts an additional 86 houses and 21% increase in population.

Whilst planning guidelines will largely remain the same, many village nuclei will no longer have "settlement boundaries" which means that more one off houses will be facilitated within village boundaries easily but multi unit developments will not be. The Draft County Development Plan is available on the Cork County Council Website.

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KNOW YOUR RIGHTS: BACK TO SCHOOL CLOTHING AND FOOTWEAR ALLOWANCE

I am getting the COVID-19 Pandemic Unemployment Payment. I have one child starting school in September. Can I qualify for the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance?

Yes, you can. To qualify for this payment which helps with back to school costs, you must be getting a social welfare payment or taking part in a training, employment or adult education scheme. People getting the COVID-19 Pandemic Unemployment Payment, the Working Family Payment or the Back to Work Family Dividend can qualify. Your application will be means-tested and your total family income must be below a certain level for your family size.


Your children must be aged between 4 and 22 on 30 September 2021. If they are aged between 18 and 22 they must be in full-time second-level education in a recognised school or college in the autumn of 2021. In general, you must be getting an Increase for a Qualified Child with your payment.

The Allowance is €150 for children aged between 4 and 11 and €275 for children aged between 12 and 22. It is paid automatically to many families. This means that they do not have to apply for the payment. If you qualify automatically, you will get a letter before 21 June 2021 to let you know.

You need to apply online for the BTSCFA, if you do not get a letter confirming your payment. If any of your children are aged 18 or over, you must apply for the BTSCFA for them and show evidence that they are in second-level education (even if automatic payments have issued for other children in your family).

From 21 June 2021, you can apply for BTSCFA online through MyWelfare.ie. You must have a Public Services Card and a verified MyGovID account to apply online. If you have difficulties applying online, you can contact the BSCFA section on 071 91 93318 or 0818 11 11 13. The closing date for applications is 30 September 2021. 



2020 County Senior A Football Championship Final

ÉIRE ÓG 2-13 MALLOW 1-7

The rise and rise of football continues in Éire Óg as the Ovens based club added the 2020 Cork County Senior A football championship title to the Intermediate (2014) and Premier Intermediate (2019) titles won in recent years. The club has been producing young players of quality for years and now look to be very well placed to make a mark in the premier senior football ranks in the years ahead. Their performance in this county final was outstanding from start to finish and Mallow were simply not able to cope with the athleticism, speed and football ability of the Éire Óg side who had to line out with Ciarán Sheehan and John Mullins, both injured, and lost inter county man Colm O'Callaghan to injury in the first half, but never faltered in their quest to play Premier Senior football later this summer, when they will be grouped with Castlehaven, Newcestown and Carbery Rangers, best two of four to advance.

in the net to wrap up the title in the 53rd minute. Points either side of this second goal from Cooper (0-2), Diarmuid Dineen, and Daniel Goulding (two frees) pushed the 2019 premier intermediate champions into an 11-point advantage.



GOVT MUST STOP PREVARICATING AND ROLL OUT RAPID ANTIGEN COVID 19 TESTING - KELLEHER

"The Government must stop prevaricating and urgently roll out rapid antigen testing as part of its overall response to the Covid 19 pandemic," said Fianna Fáil MEP, Billy Kelleher.

Kelleher was commenting following the publication of a HSE study produced by their Covid-19 antigen testing working group in recent days.

"I cannot for the life of me understand the hostility towards rapid antigen testing by NPHET, and by extension the Government. No one, I believe, is claiming that this form of testing is more accurate or better than PCR testing.

"It is however useful in certain contexts. Those opposed to rapid antigen testing claim that some people with Covid may be missed when using this imember states?

form of test.

"However, we need to look at the overall picture. What is the likelihood that any of these people would have received a PCR test in the first place? Every Covid 19 case detected is a positive.

"Sadly, it seems that NPHET take the glass is half empty view when it comes to rapid antigen testing. "It's high time that the Government made a decision on rolling out antigen testing in certain contexts such as high volume events, congregated settings, or the aviation sector for example.

"Ireland is an outlier when it comes to this diagnostic tool. Welcome back dear reader recently I heard the Lord ask this question 'where are the David's?' Twice in the Bible God called David "a man after My own heart." (1st Samuel 13:14; Acts 13:22) God sent the prophet Samuel to Bethlehem to anoint a son of a man called Jesse as King of Israel. God had observed intently this young teenage boy's worship and trust in Him. But when Samuel was commissioned to go to David's fathers house to anoint the new king, Jesse didn't even bring David out in the line up to meet him. He paraded all the other sons in front of Samuel first. None of them met God's requirements even though their handsome appearances fooled Samuel. God chastised him for looking at the outer man only - telling him, "for the Lord does not see as man sees; for man looks only at the outward appearance, but God looks upon the heart" (1st Samuel 16:7)

David had been keeping his father's sheep on the hillside. Jesse described David as being a companion to the sheep – a 'special friend' to them. It's interesting to note that David found hanging out with these animals a better pastime than being with his brothers because he had a different spirit and a different approach to life, living by his faith and trust - not in his own ability or power - but in God's power.

So anointed was he that when the current King Saul was afflicted by a spirit depressing him, David was brought into the palace to worship God in the presence of Saul and the oppressing spirit would depart once David started to play his harp unto the Lord. This is the effect of the anointing of the Spirit of God. Every unclean and demonic spirit will leave when someone anointed with the Holy Spirit and authority enters. This is why Jesus said it was better for Him to go back to the Father so that God could send His Holy Spirit to come and live inside those who would believe upon the Lord Jesus for Salvation, and they would be transformed into new life – born again and filled with God's Power bringing the Presence of God everywhere they went. (John 16:7; 2nd Corinthians 5:17).

This is what David did. When he worshipped God it flowed from his heart, and his anointed praise changed and cleansed the atmosphere. When David later ran out unto the battlefield to face the giant Goliath that had paralysed the entire army with fear, he did not take fancy weapons or back up with him. He just did what he knew, which was operate his slingshot, but as he proclaimed God's greatness into the face of the enemy, ignored his curses and slander and then took aim and fired, the stone hit that giant right between the eyes and killed him. Today dear friend, God is waiting for people with hearts like David to rise up and trust Him to demonstrate His power that no foe can withstand (Psalm 33; Psalm 91).


