
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
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#### Has the Lee valley caught the creative bug?

Our history would tell us, we have always been an area of strong-willed creatives but a recent upturn in artistic endeavours has not gone unnoticed. This month has already seen a stunning new mural in Killmurry Independence Museum, alongside a wonderful art display by local artists in Macroom townhall, Gluckman artists can be viewed in Ballyvourney Library, coupled with a massive open day in Chapel Hill School of Art on the 21st of August. We have two new murals in town, one behind the castle gates depicting the destruction of the castle and another on Betsy's flower shop! Art hasn't been limited to canvas, Ballingeary has its own literally painted the village every colour under the sun!

As Picasso said, "Art washes away from the soul the dust of everyday life."

### How we as a community can tackle climate change?

The drastic impact of climate change was announced by the IPPC report last week and it sent shockwaves through the world. It's easy to brush off this news sometimes and point the finger and the big culprits such as China. But how does it affect us, here in Ireland, in Macroom?

Hotter summers increase the risks of wildfires and water restrictions while wetter winters increase the chance of flooding and crop failures to name but a few. How can we as a community tackle such a global issue?

We can open conversations with local councillors and TDs to develop a green strategy. We can start by aiming to become a single-use plastic-free town. We can switch to smoke less fuel. We can open conversations with local councillors and TDs on the development of a green strategy. By increasing local public transport infrastructure (which is minimal at best, I can never understand why we don't have a town school bus to deliver local children to school every morning). The establishment of safe walking and cycling routes around town would greatly reduce our need as a community to rely on cars. Other towns are changing their mindset about the power of cars such as Mallow.

"Thomas Davis Street in Mallow is set to be pedestrianised every Saturday afternoon for six weeks as part of a new pilot project. Under the scheme, vehicular access will be restricted at set times and the street will be made available to pedestrians and for on-street dining during that time. Cork County Council is introducing the temporary measure following consultation and active engagement with local businesses. Feedback to Cork County Council showed that 84% of businesses on Thomas Davis Street and William O'Brien street were in favour of the pilot pedestrianisation." Cork County Council

We could encourage the use of our public green spaces such as the Castle Grounds and the Town Park to be no-mow zones used to plant with native wildflowers and trees initiative thus reducing the reliance on petrol-fuelled mowing and harmful chemical weed killers. Increase our Leave no Trace signage in local dumping hotspots. Local housing & commercial developments could have a mandatory green scaping (The concrete landscape of the Mart and two lidls devoid of green spaces,

springs to mind)

It is said to achieve a sustainable lifestyle, either at home, or at work, we must adopt these five principles, Rethink, reduce, reuse, repair, recycle. As locals we can opt to shop locally where possible, purchase our fruit and veg from local growers, we can reduce our red meat intake, we can buy second hand and our international travel. We already have a great collection of second-hand stores.

We could push for greater protection of our native woodlands which surround our town such as the Gearagh, Toon Valley woods and Codrum woods. It's all well and good to enjoy a week of hot weather but let's face it, do you want to live in a wetter Ireland, with increased flood risk? Because this is the future we are currently sowing for our children. I would love to see what you have to say about how we as a community can tackle climate change.

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# TRACE MACROOM'S HISTORIC MILL RACE By Kevin Corcoran

Please use recognised footpaths and do not enter private property or into the mill race at any point.

1. START; Mill Lane entrance to Fairy Park.

Straight out of a Constable painting, the great edifice of Walton's oatmeal mill at Mill Lane, Massytown, Macroom, stands three stories high above an expansive cellar. Timber framed and shuttered windows without glass, peer down from its massive stone walls that are painted in brilliant white, lime-wash. A timbered ladder leads up to the principal first-floor door, until recently, a large stone step allowed access to the roadside entrance, while several steps lead down to the adjacent cellars. High up on its northern side, directly above the road, a great beam-andpulley once projected out over the top-floor door, this to facilitate the import of grain for storage. All about were supportive mill structures, including my birth home, which was built as a granary store in 1915, while another stood further up the lane near Mary Anne's public house.

Built about 1822, the mill was initially used as a 'carding mill', whereby wool was washed and prepared before being sent to the weavers of cloth. Using water that exited from the older, family corn-mill in Walton's Lane, (which has its origins back in the early seventeen hundreds), this passed under Mill Lane and then went straight through the carding mill, the water exiting on the Cooleyhane road side, and where the dried up channel is still visible. Near this latter point a stone stile, on the roadside's right, leads down to the very last original stone footbridge that passes over the mill race, just before it flows into the river Sullane. Now very overgrown, the stile and footbridge once gave access to the river side walk and the present fairy park.

### 2. North boundary of Fairy Park:

Walk up to the back entrance of the tidy towns yard and note the mill race. Here, a two hundred year old stone-footbridge recently lead across to the yard but this was removed in 2020 by the Tidy Towns people and replaced with a concrete one! It was one of many footbridges that originally allowed rear access to all the adjoining houses in Mill Lane and Massytown Further to the left, the mill race disappears under the grounds of Massytown House to reappear out on the street.

3. Return to the river bank and walk up to the bridge, pass through the car park by O Riada's old nightclub, using the pedestrian crossing to reach the open mill race at Lower Massytown.

This is the section that CCC proposes to fill-in and replace with a foot path. Here the water of the mill race crossed under the road at the start of New Street, via a stone-arched conduit, it exiting here on the Massytown side. A beautiful old stone wall runs up Massytown road that separates the open mill race from the footpath and the road on one side, and the grounds of Sunnyside House on the other. This runs all the ways up to Massytown House, where it passes under the road and exits, as seen earlier, in the Fairy Park.

Originally, the gate-lodge entrance to Sunnyside House (the present home of Inland Fisheries Ireland) stood near here. Much later the Constabulary Barracks was established on the avenue (the present police station), as was the limestone decorated Court House. Both are worth visiting to see their architectural details. When



passing the present entrance gate to Sunnyside House (IFI), note the design of the gates. The tops of the bars are crafted as shepherd's crook. This is because the man who built the House was none other than a Mr Crooke, the head doctor in the old 'work house' during famine times (Macroom's present hospital). He also had links with the village of Crookstown village, thus its name!

**4.** Cross the bottom of New Street using the zebra crossing and enter

the Town Park, there to walk beside the overgrown mill race on the right-hand-side. Originally laid out as part of Macroom's Castle Demesne, no dwellings were ever allowed to be constructed on the parkland side of the river if they could be seen from the Castle. Then the river was banked and landscaped like a decorative canal, which must have created a beautiful landscaped scene from the Castle apartments. Post WWII, it was the towns favourite swimming spot for adults and had a diving board and access steps to the river to facilitate swimmers, the remains of which are still visible near the so-called 'exercise machines' that are, strangely, never used!

5. Shortly, the first over-flow channel and water sluice are reached in front of Sandy-Hill House, which still retains its own private, footbridge entrance from the park. Interestingly, note how the mill race still flows up to this point. From here the flowing mill race continues for 50m beneath the shade of ancient trees, that were planted to decorate the park, until it reaches a wider footbridge that leads up Sandy Hill avenue onto New Street. Beyond this are the old chestnut trees that every child in Macroom descended on in autumn to collect horse chestnuts for the game of conkers. The nails we used to drill the holes being those used for horseshoes and obtained from the Blacksmith that once operated out of the forge that stood where O Riada's former nightclub now stands. Down from Sandy Hill House, the section of the river was known as 'The Three Rocks', formerly the most popular bathing area for Macroom's youth in the sunnier times of the

**6.** Continue along the sides of the football pitches and at the next footbridge that leads into the 'Tom Creedon' section of the present grounds, you will see the second exit stream from the mill race. Now inaccessible due to the undergrowth, this also has a working water-sluice, structures that were used to drain sections of the mill race and so allow its annual cleaning. As kids we always delighted in having to jump across what to us was a miniature Niagara Falls, the water gushing out in a frothing, hissing torrent and within which we would surely drown if we failed to make the leap.

7. Follow the mill race along the right-handside of the Tom Creedon Park until you arrive at the changing rooms (avoid if a match in progress). Here, another wide footbridge leads up to Gurteenroe, this exiting by Mc Carthy's garage. Although presently occupied by GAA football pitches that state it is PRIVATE PROPERTY, following the burning of Macroom Castle the entire park was bequeathed to the people of New Street and every former tenant there and in lower Massytown were allowed to graze their cows here. Theoretically, you still hold that right but someone, we shall not say where, deemed otherwise.

8. Follow the footpath up to the weir. On reaching the weir you will discover the main entrance to the mill race on its right-hand-side. A footbridge now links the park to the gated, rear entrance







of the Sullane Weirs housing estate. Built using gigantic slabs of stone, the weirs construction is quite impressive. It has withstood the worst of floods over the last two hundred years and hopefully, it will survive many more. No present Macrompian has ever, not swam here. It is part of all our souls. The backed up water above the weir forms the large pool known affectionally as 'The Gazebo' . This is because, when the Walton Family were given the rights in 1822, by the head landlord Hedges of Macroom Castle, to construct the weir in order to take the water from the river Sullane to their mill in Mill Lane, it created a delightfully, deep swimming pool area. Back then it was used exclusively by the Castle residents and their visiting guests, the charming stone 'gazebo' or decorative folly, acting as a changing room. This can be viewed from the housing estate side of the river. Sadly, little is known about this impressive little building but it also should be sensitively restored and preserved, just like our historic Macroom Mill Race.

9. END. Return to the Park and cross the river using the GAA metal bridge that leads into the Castle Demesne. Follow the trails back into the Town Square and if agreeable to you, give the CCC office a visit and share your thoughts with them about the destruction of the Mill Race.

To all of you Macrompians, new comers and old, that will actively engage in demanding the protection and restoration of our unique mill race and weir, rather than their destruction, I applaud you and am proud to stand beside you.

**Do NOT** borrow from the library if you or someone in your household has symptoms of COVID-19 or you are a close contact of a confirmed case. **Library membership** is completely free of charge for everyone. In order to join the library, you need to complete an application form, either online or in person at the library. If you choose to submit the form online, you need to visit any library & produce photographic identification & proof of address to activate your membership. You can join at any age.

Children & Young People under the age of 18 years must get permission of a parent or guardian to join the library. Parents/Guardians are responsible for their children in the library, their children's selections & use of library materials & services, including access to the internet.

Once you become a member you will get a library card & a PIN will be issued with your membership card at the time you join the library. The number will be required to use the online services.

Chapel Hill School of Art was founded in 2020 by Killarney Sculpture Joe Neeson and John Mc Cormack. The school is based in the historic Mercy Convent on Chapel Hill in Macroom, Co. Cork, designed by Architect John Pyne Hurley in 1860. Joe Neeson is the sculptor who created the Sea Eagle which is situated on Main Street in Killarney. In partnership with Cork Craft Month and Heritage Week, and kindly supported by Cork County Council Heritage Office, a series of Heritage based workshops and demonstrations will be held on the spacious grounds and buildings on Chapel Hill.

"The Open Day will promote an awareness & appreciation of the benefits of creativity to the



community. There will be events for the whole family to enjoy along with live music and food stalls. There will be opportunities to meet the Artists Educators & sign up for classes, tour Chapel Hill grounds and enjoy family fun all while celebrating the arts & traditional customs and heritage crafts that link the community to one another and the locality", Bernadette Tuite the Programme Coordinator at the School of Art told Lee Valley Outlook.

The Art School endeavours to engage with the community by offering social improvement through Art education while successively contributing to meaningful culture, heritage and celebration of the visual Arts in the area.

They offer a range of Art programmes for all ages from fun have-a-go creative opportunities to the Master class experience.

The Founders of the Chapel Hill School of Arts are John McCormack and Joe Neeson who met and started working together in The National Sculpture Factory in 1997. In 2016 they acquired The Convent of Mercy in Macroom. The property has been a center for education and community engagement since 1865. Commenting on Chapel Hill, founder Joe Neeson and John Mc Cormack say:

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# **KILMURRY HAA**

The Independence Museum Kilmurry is proud to announce the official unveiling of a new mural for our courtyard space. The museum, located in Kilmurry village in Co. Cork, enjoys a sweeping view across the Lee Valley to the Derrynasaggart and Boggeragh mountains. The mural more than complements the natural beauty of its surroundings and successfully meets the creative brief for a site specific, public artwork contributing towards a transformative appreciation of place and story.

Designed by the Cork artist, Peter Martin, the piece is inspired both by the River Lee and the abstract qualities of the embroidered pattern used on the early 20th century Dun Emer Guild dress in the Museum's collection. The pattern is skillfully integrated with the unfolding landscape of the Lee Valley, woven organically through field boundaries and hedgerows and into the distance. In effect, landscape and pattern become one; creating a fluid rhythm that is not only true to the nature of the River Lee itself but also speaks to an idea of greater unity.

A textual element, 'The Beauty of The World is the Heritage of All', is taken from a line in the writings of Terence MacSwiney. In full, the quote reflects the principles of unity, universality and solidarity underpinning his vision of independence:

Reflect on the common origin of the human race, on the beauty of the world that is the heritage of all, our common hopes and fears, and, in the greatest sense, the mutual interests of the peoples

n Rilke Floyd, one of museum's curators, "so the words of the mural's message gain new meaning in the context of the interlinked concerns of global citizenship and environmental stewardship."

The Independence Museum Kilmurry is open to visitors Thurs-Sunday from 2- 5pm and others day by arrangement. The courtyard area is fully accessible and free to the public. The mural project was supported by the Cork County Council Arts Grant 2021.

Lissarda Ambush Exhibition which was launched to coincide with the centenary of the ambush in 2020 remains on display at the Heritage Room, Independence Museum Kilmurry.

# Cultivating an empty field 3rd to 31st of August, Macroom town hall.

The annual summer exhibitions organised by Cork County Council Arts Office and Macroom Municipal District Office return to Macroom Town Hall this August, marking another step in the reopening of cultural activity in county Cork

"Cultivating the Empty Field" is an exhibition of work by a group of artists living in the Macroom Municipal area that has been assembled by the exhibition's curator Dermot Browne.

The exhibition's title "Cultivating the Empty Field" comes from a book on Chinese Zen Master Hongzhi. Dermot Browne says his choice of this title aims to draw attention to common interests

and differences in the making of the works that can be seen in this exhibition.

"One pathway is artists' vast and never-ending occupation with the land and landscape. The second route or interest in framing this show, is the view that any artist facing an empty canvas, page or block of stone is in fact facing a sort of "empty field" of possibility.

The midpoint of these two positions could be somewhere between, for example, Bernadette Cotter's large ritualistic ink studies and Debbie Godsell's Contemporary printed/reworked images of the land.

Many of these works happily seem relatable to both this idea of "the land" and also our own

creative potential. But some works reflect a more contemporary engagement with these themes, like Sarah O'Flaherty's captured moments taken from the exterior of a disused polytunnel.

The artists taking part are Victoria Breathnach, Bernice Corcoran, Bernadette Cotter, Jill Denis, Sarah O'Flaherty, Debbie Godsell, Muireann Kelleher, John Philip Murray, Joe Neeson, Michael Quane, Robert Rasmussen, Denis O'Reardon, Pleun Volker and Maura Whelan.



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# **Alexander Charles O'Sullivan**

Dr. Alex O'Sullivan was born in May 1858, the oldest child of the Rev. Denis Mitchell O'Sullivan, rector of Macroom, and Lucia Maria née Swete. His father, from Clahane, Co. Kerry, was also rural dean of Muskerry, from 1885-1889. He had a brother, Arthur Warren, who died in the Indian Civil Service in 1903, and a sister, Elizabeth. His uncle, Rt. Rev. James O'Sullivan, was bishop of Tuam, Killala and Achonry. Very little is known about him, yet his contribution to medicine (and in particular, the field of pathology) in Ireland was immense.

Alex was educated at Tipperary Grammar School and then went to study at Trinity College, Dublin. Originally studying classics (1876), he tired of this and took up mathematics, obtaining a mathematical scholarship in 1879, and developed a love for pure mathematics that never left him. He graduated in arts in 1881, taking gold medals as first senior moderator in mathematics, as well as in ethics and logic. The British Medical Journal notes that the first mathematical scholar in 1879 was Dr. Bernard, later a Provost of Trinity College, who obtained his Fellowship in 1884, with Dr. O'Sullivan obtaining his in 1886.

In earlier days of university study at institutions such as Trinity College Dublin, University of Cambridge and University of Oxford, the study of mathematics (or classics) was often seen as a precursor to a career in other fields, especially medicine, law, or divinity.

Having obtained his Fellowship, Alex, taking the advice of Professor Samuel Haughton, turned to the study of medicine, and took his M.B., B.Ch., B.A.O. degrees in 1894. Prof. Haughton, who gained honorary degrees from Oxford, Cambridge and Edinburgh, was a most intriguing character to have as a mentor, having, for example, in 1866, developed the original equations for hanging as a humane method of execution. Additionally, in Trinity College Dublin, he moved the first-ever motion at the Academic Council to admit women to the university in 1880. Although unsuccessful, he continued to campaign for the admission of women to TCD, with his motion being finally passed in 1902, five years after his death.

Alex also took a special course of bacteriology in Vienna, Austria. Returning to Dublin in 1895, he was appointed lecturer in pathology in Trinity College. This appointment was welcomed in an address delivered at the Meath hospital in 1895-96 as one possible example of an antidote to what some physicians perceived as "the growing tendency to unprofessional conduct in our ranks". The Meath hospital, located in Dublin, was world-renowned in the 19th century because of its innovative teaching methods and research – physicians who worked there included Francis Rvnd (inventor of the hollow needle used in hypodermic syringes), Robert James Graves (uncredited inventor of the second-hand on watches) & William Stokes (who, with Graves, introduced bedside teaching to the western world, as well as creating one of the first treatises on the use of the stethoscope, and emphasising the importance of clinical examination in forming diagnoses).

Not only a brilliant scholar, Alex was also an accomplished athlete, rowing in the College eights and fours. He was a keen yachtsman and golfer and loved a game of billiards. He also enjoyed mountaineering. The British Medical Journal's obituary described Dr. O'Sullivan as "a man of the most lovable character: with simplicity he combined manly courage, as had frequently been displayed in his mountaineering adventures."

Dr. O'Sullivan, being a classical scholar, always kept in close touch with the progress of mathematical research, as well as research in philosophy and the classics, and was widely considered to be an expert in the field of cellular pathology. He was recognized as an inspiring teacher, with his laboratory considered an essential meeting place for medical students and newly qualified physicians, given that he was always ready to provide advice and guidance. In 1903 he was Vice-President of the Pathology Section at the meeting of the British Medical Association at Swansea. He was also an external examiner at the Universities of Belfast, Edinburgh, Glasgow and Manchester, and was a member of the Royal Irish Academy, for which he wrote many papers.

Distinguished honorary members of the Royal Irish Academy have included Edmund Burke, Irish statesman, economist, and philosopher ("No power so effectually robs the mind of all its powers of acting and reasoning as fear"), Charles Darwin, geologist and biologist ("A fair result can be obtained only by fully stating and balancing the facts and arguments on both sides of each question"), Albert Einstein, Nobel-prize winning physicist ("The only real valuable thing is intuition"), & Erwin Schrödinger, Nobel-prize winning Austrian-Irish physicist ("Never rely on an authority in science. Even the greatest genius can be wrong - whether he has one or two Nobel prizes, or none").

Acknowledged as an outstanding figure in academia, medicine, mathematics, and pathology, it must have surprised everyone when in the autumn of 1915 Dr. O'Sullivan volunteered for service in World War I and went as a major in the Royal Army Medical Corps (RAMC) to Malta, where his work in malaria and dysentery obtained widespread recognition and universal acclaim. He was soon promoted to the rank of lieutenant colonel and became Director of Laboratories, Malta.

Malta was known as 'the nurse of the Mediterranean'. The development of the hospital accommodation of Malta was considered to be one of the most remarkable achievements of World War I. At the beginning of 1915 only a few hundred beds were available. Hospital

after hospital was opened, until, by the end of November 1915 the island accommodated 20,000 patients. In all, 27 hospitals and camps were established. The development of the hospitals and the fact that they were adequately staffed was due to the energy and skill of a small number of determined people.

Everything had to be imported into the rocky island(s), which, even in peacetime, did not supply enough food for its inhabitants, providing only vegetables, grain, poultry and goats. In the summer of 1915, the hospitals were staffed by 300 medical officers and almost 1,000 nurses. The sick and wounded did not lack any comfort (including a steady stream of visitors, to lift their spirits) which would aid their recovery.

The casualties from operations in Gallipoli (25 Apr 1915-9 Jan 1916), and Salonica (Oct 1915-30 Sept 1918), were initially treated in Malta and Egypt. During the summer and autumn of 1916, many cases of dysentery were admitted from Macedonia. Weekly convoys arrived with a number of sick varying from 718 to 2,587 per week. Hospital beds and convalescent depôts were gradually increased to 25,570 by adding tentage to the hospitals formed in 1915.

Lt Col Alexander Charles O'Sullivan RAMC, Director of Laboratories at Malta was one of five officers assigned to investigate and treat dysentery cases in Malta. They understood their primary function was to prevent unnecessary suffering and death where possible and to attempt to consider the effects of their treatments not just on the patient, but on the patient's family and wider community. By all accounts, they did magnificent work, infusing their patient-centred practice, often under the most difficult of war conditions, with integrity, as well as outstanding clinical, professional and ethical standards. Patients were treated with dignity. Though not all could be saved, a great many were, with treatment being afforded to all who needed it.

At the close of the war Alex was placed in charge of the Central Military Laboratory for Ireland. In 1922 he was appointed first Professor of Pathology at Trinity College. Later he was confirmed in that position as professor. Holding the position of registrar of the medical school (dean of the medical faculty), he came into contact with two generations of medical students and helped to shape the policy of the College. He was hailed as one of the outstanding figures in the life of the College.

Dr. O'Sullivan died on 18th February 1924 at his residence, on Ailesbury Road, Dublin, after an illness of only a few days. On Monday 11th February 1924, Alex demonstrated some postmortem specimens to his pathology class, by Wednesday he had a spreading sepsis in one hand, and on the following Monday he died. Alex was 65 years old. He left a widow, Constance, and four children. As his obituary in the British Medical Journal observed: "So ended the visible life of one who combined in himself a number of intellectual gifts which are rarely found together in one individual".

Ethical to his core, Alex lived a life in service to others. His personal and professional philosophy can be summed up as: First, do no harm ("Primum non nocere", attributed to the ancient Greek physician Hippocrates, from one of his works called Of the Epidemics). Facts over fear. Freedom over tyranny. Humanity above all.


#### **Rebels Bounty Internal Draw**



In order to receive God's salvation we need to 1) Repent of all our sins, and acknowledge to God that we could never save ourselves by doing good works


- 2) Call upon the Name of the Lord Jesus which is the only Name by which we can be saved (Acts 4:12).

- You are on an Employment support scheme such as Community Employment or TUS

To apply for a Springboard+ course, you choose the course(s) you are interested in on springboardcourses.ie and apply online, following the instructions on the website. You can apply to up to 10 courses, but you can only take one course.

If you are getting a social welfare payment, you should notify your Intreo Centre or local Social Welfare Branch Office and check what further steps (if any) you need to take.

If Springboard+ doesn't meet your needs, there are several other ways to go back to education.


