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
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Editor's NOTE



Upgraded Playground Officially Opened in Macroom

The Mayor of the County of Cork, Cllr. Gillian Coughlan has officially opened the newly refurbished Macroom Playground after the 25-year-old facility underwent a significant makeover.

The updated playground makes use of several original features which were renovated and repainted. New equipment suitable for younger and older children has been installed including a new spacenet as well as junior and senior mega multiplay units.

The Cork County Council project saw the entire surface of the playground replaced. The seating areas have been renovated and new signs have

Mayor of County Cork, Cllr. Gillian Coughlan was delighted to cut the ribbon, she said, "This playground is a fantastic amenity for the children and families of Macroom and its hinterland. It is wonderful that some of the original equipment is in such good condition after almost 25 years that it could be renovated and kept. That shows how well the local community has looked after this facility. It became a really important outdoor recreational space for locals during the Covid-19 restrictions. The newly renovated playground is attracting even more visitors which is superb with so much positive feedback about the new additions."

Chief Executive of Cork County Council, Tim Lucey, added, "Macroom playground has been a priority amenity for the Elected Members locally and it is great to see the reaction to the refurbishment. We hope it will enhance the lives of the people in the town. Macroom is undergoing a transformation at present with the €280 million Macroom Baile Bhuirne Bypass Project which will see the town of Macroom bypassed by 2024. The renovation and refurbishment of the much-loved Macroom Library and Briery Gap Theatre commenced in December 2021 and is due to be completed by June 2023. Coupled with these impressive projects there are a number of public realm projects currently in the

pipeline for Macroom. The economic benefit of these projects to the town of Macroom cannot be overstated."

Cork County Council funded the removal of the old playground, the design and construction of the new facility with an allocation of €20,000 through its Macroom Municipal District, together with funding of €16,131 secured from the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth (DCEDIY) under the Capital Grants Scheme 2021. The remaining costs of the project were funded through Cork County Council's Municipal District Operations and Rural Development.

Local company Browne Brothers Site Services Ltd were the main contractors. The playground was designed by one of their employees who lives in Macroom and is very familiar with the playground.

Presentation of Benemerenti Medal at Kilmurry Parish

On Sunday last (6/2/22) Tessie Buckley was presented with the Benemerenti Medal for her faithful and generous work as the Sacristan of St. Joseph's Church, Cloughduv, in the Parish of Kilmurry. She had just completed 50 years to the day of faithful service. The presentation was made by Mons. Daniel Kevin O'Callaghan, AP. The Chief Celebrant at the Mass was Very Rev. Canon Bernard Donovan, PP, assisted by Mons O'Callaghan, AP and former Parish Priest Rev. Timothy J O'Sullivan, PE. The Altar Society provided refreshments afterwards in the local GAA Centre.

The Benemerenti Medal is a medal awarded by the Pope to members of the clergy and laity for service to the Catholic Church. Originally established as an award for soldiers in the Papal Army, it is now a civil decoration but may still be awarded to members of the Pontifical Swiss Guards.

In 1925, the concept of awarding this medal as a

mark of recognition to persons in service of the Catholic Church, both civil and military, lay and clergy alike, became acceptable. Members of the Swiss Guard may receive it for three years of faithful service.


The current version of the Benemerenti medal was designed by Pope Paul VI. The medal is a gold Greek Cross depicting Christ with his hand raised in blessing. On the left arm of the cross is the tiara and crossed keys symbol of the papacy. On the right arm is the coat of arms of the current Pope. The medal is suspended from a yellow and white ribbon, the colors of the Papacy

Previous versions and variants consisted mainly of a round medal with the portrait of the reigning Pope on the front and a laurel wreath with an inscription "BENEMERENTI" or "BENE MERENTI" on the back



Macroom's Wonderful Charity Shops

Macroom's Wonderful Charity Shops

This subject is one which I hope will resonate with everyone as each of us can make the world a better place by the choices we make when buying clothes. Let's face it we all have to wear something and we could make good choices.

In 2020 the activities of Charity shops in Ireland were reckoned to have saved 106,000 tons of greenhouse gas emissions and their social value (employees, trainees and volunteers) was 42 million euro.

I love to do yoga, but I was shocked to learn that to make yoga pants, which are polyester, crude oil must be taken from the ground and refined. Then polyester polymers are made, melted and extruded as filaments. Machines spin the filaments to make yarn and yet more machines knit the yarn to make fabric. This fabric will be dyed and treated with chemicals to make it softer, and fire and stain resistant. People, sometimes children, cut and sew the fabric to make yoga pants which are then transported to the consumer, often travelling long distances. The pants would be less heavy on chemicals if I bought organic cotton pants, but there would still be huge energy required for spinning, dying, cutting and making, and of course, transport. If after all this I was only to use my yoga pants a few times and discard them, they could end up in huge clothing dumps in Africa or South America. These dumps are primarily composed of cheap clothes. Fifteen million used garments pour into Accra, Ghana each week. Luxury brands burn their unsold goods to retain their fast-fashion and exclusivity through scarcity. It is also their cheapest option. Some unbought items are used for flocking for car seats and stuffing for couches.

To me this makes purchasing new single use or little use clothes a very poor choice, but there is another wav.

Apart from repairing, updating or re-styling an item, I have found that I can often find a well-made item, second-hand, in far better material, even such as merino wool or silk, than I would pay for otherwise. So, let's look at the shops

THE SHOPEEN

If we can buy well-made clothes, they are much more likely to last, and better still, if we can buy locally, we can avoid further transport costs. This is exemplified by 'The Shopeen', next to the entrance to the NCT centre in Lucey's Lane. Here you will receive a warm welcome from Terry Kelleher, the Manager, or one of her other volunteers who will tend to your needs with the charm and cheerfulness so long gone from many larger stores. The money you spend will go straight back to support the Macroom Senior Citizens.

The shop is also supported by local craft donations and the whole circle of trading is local, sustainable and voluntary. We are so fortunate to have the likes of Terry Kelleher her in Macroom as part of this hands-on success story. Thank you, Terry!

SELF HELP AFRICA (S.H.A)

This shop which was previously known as GORTA, is managed by Geraldine O'Gorman.

It is open from 10am -5pm, Mon- Sat, and also open at lunchtime. Locals are very familiar with its position at the corner of the square.

The shop accepts all clothes, shoes, handbags, books, curtains and bed linen, excluding used

Geraldine prioritises making the shop user friendly and well-organised, and stock is put out on a daily basis. SHA prides itself in selling good quality stock at reasonable prices.

Geraldine tells me that the shop is always delighted to receive cash donations and small change, and would like to say how grateful she is to all those who have generously donated to the shop, and to the customers who have supported the shop over the years, especially during Covid.

National Council for The Blind of Ireland (N.C.B.I.)

This article came about as a result of speaking initially with Valerie Maout in NCBI.

She is the Manager of NCBI (National Council for the Blind of Ireland). I was interested to hear how she came to work in NCBI. She told me that she started becoming very aware of her own over-consumption in around 2015, and became very pro-active in reducing her own waste from about 2017. She even initiated a Low-Waste group in Ballyvourney at that time. When she saw the job at NCBI advertised, she was very interested because she wanted her job to make a positive difference to the Environment as well as helping the community around Macroom, where she feels very much at home. Being from France, she really appreciates the second-hand market culture, and she used to volunteer at NCBI before becoming the manager. She realised early on that she could bring her background and knowledge to the NCBI shop to enable it to thrive, and she wanted to see what went on behind the scenes of a second-hand shop in Ireland. Valerie's aim is for all the Charity shops to thrive. The accepted business model is that shops thrive by having shops with common links nearby. Valerie would particularly like people who would not, in the past, have thought of darkening the door of a Charity Shop to give it a try. She would like to promote the style and value of the secondhand market and for people to realise that you can get great long-lasting quality for the price of High

"Second-hand", does not mean that clothes are worn-out, smelly or old-fashioned. The secondhand market allows you to buy good quality, even designer clothes, at affordable prices. In addition, your money goes to a good cause. As you also help the Environment, it is a win-win situation. After a while, a novice in second-hand shopping will begin to realise their own style rather than have it dictated by the High Street, and have the confidence to choose and buy clothes which suit their style. Once this happens, they will no longer be at the mercy of money-orientated trends. Clothes that go to charity shops have passed the test of style and time. Valerie also reminds me that when items are not in a good enough condition for resale, they are recycled, so that only the best items reach the shop floor. NCBI also sells small items of furniture and electrical goods, that have been tested, books, textiles, crockery and jewellery.

By chance, when I was speaking with Valerie, two Transition year students from the Convent were doing their work-experience. They feel that trends come and go and that what was once unfashionable, can become the latest go-to item. As young people, money is a real issue, so they feel it is good to get value for money. One of them admitted that in the past she had thought that charity shops were of poor quality, unclean and unfashionable. However, a friend encouraged her to go in and try, telling her of the great value to be had in Charity shops, and now she has started shopping in Charity shops. Having been used to big expensive shopping centres, she finds this way of buying, a bit of an adventure. The other student commented how she had come into the shop daily with her friends over the Summer and was happy to be complimented on her clothes. She said it was lovely to be made to feel welcome in the shop even if she wanted to browse but did not buy anything. They agreed that the NCBI shop takes pride in making each customer feel valued and safe. They commented on the lovely atmosphere in the shop, with a fresh smell as you walk in. The music and the colour-coordinated clothes help make the shop harmonious and

welcoming. The dressing -room means that you can try items on, with no compulsion to buy, and you can return full-price goods with a receipt within seven days for an exchange or a credit note to avail in the Macroom shop.

The shop works on a four-week cycle, which means the stock is changed around every four weeks.

There is a 50% sale rack and 30% discount on other clothing. What's not to like?

VINCENT'S (S.V.P)

I also spoke with Anthony O'Sullivan, the manager of Vincent's, the St. Vincent de Paul (S.V.P) charity shop. Anthony made the decision that he wanted to work for S.V.P. because he had experience working as management for large fast fashion retail stores and felt he needed to move on. It was Covid which completely changed his perspective. He had felt very constrained by his last job, even though it brought him a very good salary. He left the job in September to go travelling and came back to Ireland in the new year. On his return he determined to use his time working towards something with more of a sense of purpose than previous employments. He had become acutely aware that time is too important to spend working in a job where he was endlessly unhappy or indifferent, sacrificing time, health, relationship and so on for a paycheck didn't feel like an appealing or fair deal and working with the SVP allows him to achieve this healthier worklife balance.

Searching online, he found the S.V.P Manager position. The idea of working with a charity offered him a better sense of purpose. He had got into management very young and he felt he could utilise his skills towards helping people, rather than making big corporations even richer. He tells me that it was his travelling which gave him this insight. Whilst he worked in fast fashion for a decade, he had become aware of the hugely damaging environmental impact it causes. In contrast, as a

Charity Shop Manager, he is happy to re-sell and re-profit fast fashion rather than see it go to waste. As regards his future plans as Manager of S.V.P., he would like to continue the tradition of a welcoming atmosphere and he really appreciates the wonderful volunteers he works with. There is a lovely sense of community and a friendly social atmosphere atmosphere associated with the shop.

On a practical level, he will be able to use his knowledge to re-merchandise and re-order the interior of the shop to make the shopping experience easier for his customers. However, he is acutely aware that at the end of the day, the shop is totally reliant on its volunteers and he would like to attract more people to volunteer within the shop by using means such as Facebook.

He believes potential volunteers have a lot to gain. Not only would they get involved with a great social group, but they would be achieving new skills, such as learning how to do merchandising, customer care and much more. More importantly, he feels they would get a sense of satisfaction from working towards something bigger than any individual.

He then explained to me a little about the S.V.P organisation. The charity was established to fight poverty in all forms through practical assistance. It is set up with eight Regional Offices where people

can go to get support.

It works in many areas and supplies money and resources to different activities. The main focus would be on personal visits. e.g., person to person contact with people who need help. It works with Social Housing, Resource Centres, Child Care, and Educational Courses. There is also a Youth Development programme. Holiday breaks are provided for the elderly and disabled and people who are in financial need. It's the biggest volunteer charity in Ireland.

All these factors drew Anthony to the charity. It was established in 1844 around the time of the famine. The famine was at its worst between 1845-1852, so, it started in very demanding circumstances. It is one of the oldest charities in Ireland and has remained very much based on its volunteers.

At this point Anthony would like to give a massive thankyou to his volunteers because without them, there would be no shop. He would also like to sincerely thank the community who support the shop.

Personally, Anthony feels that this change into charity work has been like a spiritual calling.All around him he sees people stressed about the future and factors out of their control. He wants to share his feeling that this perceived future never arrives, we only have the present moment and wants us to use this time we have now by doing some good.

He leaves us with a quote from Oscar Wilde:

"The smallest act of kindness is worth more than the grandest intention".

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

100 MILLION CANCER SCREENINGS POSTPONED ACROSS EU DUE TO COVID 19 - MEP KELLEHER

- POTENTIAL 1 MILLION DELAYED DIAGNOSES -

- HSE AND DOH MUST SEEK EXTRA DIAGNOSTIC CAPACITY IN PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SYSTEMS -

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has echoed concerns raised by the EU Health Commissioner, Stella Kyriakides about potentially one million delayed cancer diagnoses across the EU due to the Covid 19 pandemic.

Kelleher, a member of the Parliament's Public Health Committee and a former Health Spokesperson for his party was commenting after a wide-ranging debate in the parliament yesterday on the Beating Cancer Strategy.

"The Commissioner informed us that due to Covid 19 over 100 million delayed cancer screenings, and up to 100,000 delayed cancer diagnoses, may have occurred. This is a major issue and one that requires a national intervention in every member state.

"While we all know the partial shutting down of elective procedures, including diagnostics, was necessary to protect our health system, the impact in Ireland will be profound with potentially tens of thousands of delayed cancer diagnoses in the country.

"I know the government is fully aware of this issue but I think we need a specific response from the HSE and the Department to ensure that any backlogs of people waiting for important diagnostic procedures such as X-Rays, CT scans or MRIs are dealt with as quickly as possible.

"If there is spare capacity in the private network of hospitals, the Department should investigate whether this can be utilised over the next number of weeks and months. Thought should also be given to expanding access to

diagnostic services in our public system into the evening and at weekends. "While this will require working with staff and unions to agree protocols and procedures, it is very much worth it, and I believe it should happen as soon as possible," concluded Kelleher.

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


Welcome back dear student, "there is no fear in love; but perfect love casts out fear: because fear hath torment. He that fears is not made perfect in love." (1st John 4:18). Fear involves torment. There are two things in the Bible that give place to torment - unforgiveness and fear, and both are linked to a lack of love. In John's first letter he clearly explains the answer to all fear - love. Specifically, the Love of God, not emotional love which often is not love at all, but merely a form of lust in disguise. The love spoken of here is 'Agape' which means unconditional love. God is Love - not that He has love like you have a laptop, or that He feels love like you love a bar of chocolate; but God's character and nature is Love. Love is Who He is! People seek love, but true love only comes from knowing God, because He is Love. "We love Him because He first loved us" (1st John 4:19; John 15:1-17). Human beings may leave you down, but God's love never fails (1st Corinthians chapter 13). People may love you today and tomorrow they love someone else, but God's love will never leave you (Hebrews 13:5-8). You may do something bad that makes someone stop loving you, but God constantly longs for you to be restored to Him — He loves you because He created you, and His greatest desire is for you to be forgiven and reconciled, safe in His love (Luke 15:18-24).

The world is not a safe place to navigate in our own strength. But God is our Refuge, our Strong Tower where total safety and peace exists (Psalm 61). In order to enter into that safety and peace we need to get to know God and His ways. We can get to know Him through His Word. His Word is not a book to read like you read a novel. God's Word is alive! (Hebrews 4:9-16) Jesus, the Son of God - is the Word of God (John 1:1-14). When we study and obey the Bible we enter into a relationship with Jesus, not simply skimming through some book filled with stories. Jesus gave up His Divinity and supernaturally was born as one of us. He grew up and experienced everything that we encounter, the good and the bad - but, He never sinned. And then He laid down His life willingly to fulfil God's plan of Salvation so every man, woman and child could be saved and restored to God, washed clean of all sin in His perfect blood.

This sacrifice had to be made in order to cleanse us from sin, because sin and God's Love cannot dwell together. So Jesus paid the price for our sins, and became the Lamb of God who took sin away, thus allowing us to be accepted into God's family by our faith and trust in Him (John 3:15-21). We trust in Jesus by inviting Him into our lives - making Him Lord over everything. As we renounce and turn away from sin, we need to instead tune into God's Word and His Love to fill the void. God's Love is the most powerful, holy and pure force, and when we invite Jesus in and obey His Word, His love in us drives out all fear and torment - forever.

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

In the 38th minute, a J.J. Murphy free kick caused havoc in the park box. The ball broke out and the incoming Tim Kelleher let fly and his shot sped wide. Park then countered and Macroom keeper Shane O'Leary courageously got down at the feet

Iveleary, Mid Cork 'C' champions in 2011 and with 15 of the 17 players who figured in last year's final still available, added the 'B' championship trophy to their collection with a well merited win over Canovee in an entertaining final at Macroom. Canovee forced the pace for much of the opening half but suffered a couple of body blows before the interval which left them with only a narrow two-point lead going into the second half when they would have to face the wind playing with a man short. 
