St. Colman's - The Old Protestant Church in Castle Street, Macroom Has been allocated €215,847

The Heritage Council, along with Ministers Malcolm Noonan TD and Darragh O'Brien TD today (2.3.22) announced that 13 historic towns will share €1.75m funding under the 2022 Historic Towns Initiative.

The €1.75m in capital funding will help to provide jobs through heritage-led regeneration and will aid the rebuilding of local economies with heritage as a focal point. Today's announcement follows the launch last week by Minister Noonan of Heritage Ireland 2030, the new national heritage plan, which will strengthen the management and protection of our built, cultural and natural heritage and provide supports to those responsible for caring for that heritage.

The Historic Towns Initiative is a joint initiative between the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage and the Heritage Council and this year's scheme follows on from highly successful projects during 2018 - 2021. A new aspect of the HTI this year is a call for proposals that encourage the specific re-use of historic buildings. The awards in Monaghan town, Enniscorthy and Tipperary town will address residential and business reuse. This follows a competitive process inviting local authorities to propose projects for heritageled regeneration.

In 2022 funding will be awarded to the relevant local authorities for eight conservation projects in: Listowel, Co Kerry Ballyshannon, Co. Donegal Ballina, Co. Mayo Macroom, Co Cork Tipperary town, Co Tipperary



Naas, Co Kildare Monaghan town, Co Monaghan Enniscorthy, Co Wexford

For the first time under this programme in 2022 funding has been awarded to the relevant local authorities for five heritage-led regeneration plans in: Callan, Co Kilkenny Drogheda, Co Louth Wexford, Co Wexford Ballymote, Co Sligo Carlow, Co Carlow

Commenting today Minister of State for Heritage and Electoral Reform Mr Malcolm Noonan TD said "As set out in the recently launched Heritage Ireland 2030 national heritage plan, we wish to put built, cultural and natural heritage at the front of both Government policy and the recovery of the country as we emerge from the pandemic and so I look forward to working with the Heritage Council on similar initiatives over the coming months and years."

Speaking today, Minister for Housing, Local Government Mr Darragh O'Brien TD said:

"As many people know, I am committed to the heritage-led regeneration of our towns and villages, so I am truly delighted to congratulate the thirteen successful towns that will benefit from the Historic Towns Initiative 2022.

"In keeping with the new government policy Town Centre First these heritage-led regeneration projects will bring economic benefits to our historic towns thereby helping them to prosper once again.



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St Marys 2ND YEARS ON THEIR HISTORY TOUR

SECOND YEAR HISTORY TOUR OF WEST CORK'S FAMOUS HISTORICAL AND COMMEMORATIVE SITES As we are in the era of centenaries, it was pertinent to visit some of the local commemorative sites in preparation for the 2nd Year History students upcoming Classroom Based Assessment on local history. The St. Mary's students accompanied by their teachers Mr. Quill, Ms.Gray, Ms.Kane and Mr.Galvin embarked on a local tour of Kilmichael Ambush, Kinneigh Round Tower and Béal na Bláth. Local historian Michael Galvin of Kilmurry Historical Society met the group in Kilmichael and gave a fantastic overview of the ambush there and provided context as to the mood and morale among the local people in a war scenario before and after the event. The success of Tom Barry and the West Cork Flying column at Kilmichael acted as a turning point in the War of Independence. The military genius of Tom Barry and the valiant efforts of his inexperienced volunteers at Kilmichael as well as events such as Bloody Sunday in late 1920 eroded the sense of invincibility among the Auxiliaries, boosted morale among the IRA and changed the attitude of the British towards the war in Ireland.

Next stop was to Coppeen where tea, sandwiches and scones were provided for the entire group. The tour then proceeded to Kinneigh Round Tower which provided a snapshot into a very different era of living and the efforts made in defending one's lands. This impressive structure acted as a defence mechanism against raiding parties. The large tower's engineering and architecture which was built around 916 AD is an ample reminder of the degree of skilled craftsmanship that existed over 1000 years ago.

The tour then proceeded to Béal na Bláth where Michael Collins, the First Chairman of the Provisional Government and Commander in Chief of the Irish Free State Army was killed on August 22nd 1922 at the age of just 31. This site is undergoing development at present to facilitate the 100-year anniversary this coming August. Michael Galvin provided a very in-depth analysis of the events leading up to the Civil War and the tragedy that unfolded on that fateful day. The question was posed surely as to who shot Michael Collins? Whatever the answer to that question is possibly irrelevant given the context of war at that time. One would reasonably ascertain however that Collins' loss was felt by all sides of the conflict. His immense talents, abilities and charisma which enabled him to become the first leader of a devolved, constitutional Irish government at just 31 meant he was a huge loss to the new state. Those that opposed him deeply regarded him for his role in Finance prior to the treaty signing and in directing the War of Independence effort against Britain. In that context and poignantly so, we learnt that there may have been a peace meeting organised that same evening to bring about a resolution for all sides in the parochial house in Kilmurry; just down the road from the ambush. This may have been a reason also for his two visits to Macroom on two consecutive days and his meeting with neutral Florrie O'Donoghue in the town.

The last stage of the tour brought the group to Cloughduv Parochial House where Collins' convoy stopped with their dead leader on board on that fateful night to get the body anointed by Fr. Gerimiah Murphy. They were in obvious distress after the trauma of being ambushed as they tried to navigate their way back to Cork. When Fr. Murphy came out and saw the body, he went back into his house for his oils. A soldier thought he was turning his back on them and fired a shot at the departing priest and missed after his rifle was pushed to one side by another soldier. A second tragedy was avoided and the convoy returned to Cork to deliver the tragic news to the world.

This was a fantastic tour for the students where it highlighted some of the amazing remnants of our storied past in our immediate area. A big thank you to Michael Galvin who gave up his time to give a tremendous talk on all of the sites visited.

CHARLIE BIRD AND NORA'S **SOLIDARITY** WALK

Motor Neurone Disease, Pieta House and Macroom. Charlie Bird, the well-known former RTÉ chief reporter and broadcaster, has come back into prominence over the past year and, unfortunately, for a sad reason.

He contracted Motor Neurone Disease and has bravely appeared on The Late Late Show and other platforms to talk openly about his illness. He expects to die in the near future. His plan is to climb Croagh Patrick, Co. Mayo on 2nd of April 2022 to raise awareness and money for this awful and presently incurable disease. Charlie has acknowledged, savoured and used his strong Macroom connections. Nora Murray-O'Leary's (Sleaveen), daughter of Denis James Murray is connected to Charlie and will lead the walk.

The Disease: Motor Neuron Disease is a progressive disease of the Nervous System and reduces and, eventually, prevents movement of muscles, voluntary and involuntary. {To move one's finger voluntarily, the brain sends a message via the spinal cord to the relevant muscles. Involuntary muscles are involved in swallowing, blinking etc.}. Unluckily in Charlie's case, the disease seems to have advanced rapidly. The disease knows no boundaries and has affected several other people locally.

The Macroom Connection: Charlie's grandfather, Timothy, born in Bermuda and of English stock, came to Macroom in the early twentieth century and, pre-ESB, was involved in local electricity production. (Macroom was one of the first towns in Ireland to have electricity). Having converted from Protestantism, he married Miss Jane O'Shea, (Mineral Waters) and they ran Bird's Railway Hotel near the entrance to the then railway and now bus station. Professor John A. Murphy, as a child, met Charlie's grandmother. Timothy and Jane had four sons and one daughter. The boys boarded in the prestigious Clongowes Wood College. Charlie's three uncles did well and Charlie's father Jack became a seaman and travelled the world. He married Delia Murray whose family were cattledealers - her brother was the late Mick Murray - his daughter Sheila still lives in the family home. Delia's sister Mary Murray (Charlie's aunt) was married to Ned Neville ('the Colonel') who was an uncle of Nora's father, Denis James Murray. Nora's late brother Pat Murray is buried in the Old Church Yard in Castle Street, with Charlie's Aunt Mary and Ned Neville (the Colonel).

Jack and Delia Bird settled in Dublin; he continued to work as a seaman and was absent from home for long spells: Delia raised the children and was the dominant domestic influence. Charlie always maintained his Macroom connection, and when reporting for RTÉ he used it to meet Dermot Desmond and Ben Dunne, prominent figures with Macroom connections. He was Grand Marshall for the 1999 St. Patrick's Day Parade, after which he was reported as drinking a 'pint' in all 23 of Macroom's then 'hostelries'. He last officially visited Macroom when he launched his autobiography, 'This is Charlie Bird', in Macroom Bookshop in 2006, an appropriate location as it was formerly Bird's Hotel. The Reason: In respect for and in honour of Charlie's plight and bravery, and because of her family's connection, Nora Murray- O'Leary has the idea of doing a simple walk-in solidarity, to coincide with Charlie's Croagh Patrick climb. The plan is to walk from Bird's Corner (now Fitz-Gerald's Bookshop) up Chapel Hill, to High Street, the original home of Charlie's mother; then continue around the turret, up Sleaveen Hill, down Sleaveen Road (a route well-travelled by both of Charlie's parents and grandparents) and ending at the entrance to Macroom GAA Club's car park.

The Walk: The walk will take place on Saturday the 2nd of April at 3 p.m.: the starting point is Bird's Corner/Fitz-Gerald's Bookshop. The purpose of Nora's walk is to acknowledge Charlie's great achievements in broadcasting, his current plight and bravery and his Macroom connection.

Donations: All donations received will be shared by The Irish Motor Neurone Disease Association and Pieta House, the charity that helps with terminal care and bereavement.



Local Food for Local People

Chris Barrett here again. Today I have the pleasure of talking with Caroline and Eddie Robinson who own a 30-acre farm one mile south of Cloughduv. They bought the farm in 1998. It had previously been a stock farm, and when they got it, they found it was effectively a blank canvas with no trees.

It contained a rushy field which they turned into a lake surrounded by trees. This was to improve the biodiversity and provide a water reservoir for summer irrigation. Like the trees they planted, the lake also raises the water-table of the farm. It has proved to be very popular with their growing children and visitors alike, and has become a refuge for wildlife. Eddie tells me that if wildlife is given a chance it will come to such a haven when their habitat is destroyed elsewhere.

Eddie used to farm 400 acres of wheat and barley in Kenya. Caroline was a teacher and they realised they could not make ends meet with this kind of farming. So, for three years they managed a saltworks in a remote area along the Tanzanian coast but they knew they always wanted to get back to farming. They reckoned the only way to achieve this was to become a different type of farmer and control everything themselves.

So, they devised a plan which comprised three main points.

1.BUY LAND. This would save them from paying rent 2.USE NO CHEMICALS. This would cut their costs 3.SELL DIRECT TO CUSTOMERS. This would cut out

the middle man and maximize their income. These then were the principles they brought with them back to Ireland and they were lucky enough to start growing and experimenting on Caroline's father's land without incurring debts.

It took them three and a half years to find land that was relatively fertile, south-facing and within 20 miles of a major market. i.e., Cork city.

The farm they bought meets all these criteria, but is a little bit high. Caroline reminds me that for every 200 feet in height you lose a degree in temperature. Because they are 500 feet up, they lose 2.5 degrees compared with someone growing vegetables at sea-level. It means in effect that their farm is two and a half to three weeks behind one at sea-level. The way they get round this is with polytunnels which they use particularly heavily in the Spring.

When they bought the farm there were no prominent hedge-lines and they had to plant hawthorns, alder, birch, etc for the shade and shelter that is essential for growing vegetables and protecting their tunnels from the wind.

They have always felt fortunate with the way selling worked for them. They joined the Coal Quay Market in Cork city when it started on Saturdays in 1996. Then when they bought their farm in 1998, they started selling in Macroom on Tuesdays as well, and they continue in both locations to this day.

From the start the farm had to be run viably because there was no money. This meant they had to follow a stream-lined business model with very low costs. This is where their complementary skills proved to be most useful. Caroline has good business acumen and Eddie is particularly talented at fixing machinery and inventing implements for weeding and harvesting on a field-scale.

They realised that holistic management of their land would take time and a certain mind-set and they were prepared to work with both. They decided to grow a variety of crops. This was advantageous as if one crop was to fail there would be others. Different years suit different crops and a wide range keeps customers interested.

The demand for good fresh vegetables grown locally is increasing and this small business is filling



a gap in the market, particularly by producing crops that are not available in supermarkets such as Purslane, Lamb's lettuce, Stir-Fry Greens, Jerusalem artichokes, etc

Over the years, they have really appreciated their loyal customer base and have been very open about their growing methods and sharing their knowledge freely. They host annual farm walks, which are always well attended, where they can show everyone where and how their vegetables are grown.

I have been on several of these farm walks and have always been made to feel most welcome.

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History

Michael O'Leary By Kathy O'Sullivan

The Celtic fighting men of yore Faced fearful odds, and bravely bore Their proud shields to the kill. Today O'Leary's daring shows The blood of old Cuchullin flows In Erin's warriors still.

(Cited in Fadó Fadó: More Tales of Lesser-Known Irish History, by Rónán Gearóid Ó Domhnaill, 2015, Troubadour Publishing Ltd.)

The Victoria Cross is one of the world's most wellknown awards for bravery "in the presence of the enemy". Instituted in 1857, to honour acts of valour during the Crimean war, this simply designed bronze cross with a crimson ribbon and motto 'For Valour' has been awarded less than 1400 times. Due to its nature, it has most often been awarded posthumously. Michael O'Leary (1890-1961), from Inchigeelagh, was one of those who survived to receive the award, for bravery shown on the front in France during the First World War in 1915.

"When forming one of the storming party which

advanced against the enemy's barricades he rushed to the front and himself killed five Germans who were holding the first barricade, after which he attacked a second barricade, about 60 yards further on, which he captured, after killing three of the enemy and making



prisoners of two more. Lance-Corporal O'Leary thus practically captured the enemy's position by himself and prevented the attacking party from being fired upon."- Victoria Cross citation in The London Gazette, February 16, 1915.

Though 37 Irishmen were awarded the Victoria Cross during this war, O'Leary was the one who became the most famous. The medal was presented to him by King George V at Buckingham Palace, and hundreds of thousands of people came to see him at a reception in Hyde Park, London. There is even some brief video footage available on You Tube of this (https://www.youtube.com/ watch?v=TtaA2fFN4qE or type 'London's Welcome - Sqt O'leary Vc' in the search bar).

Michael was also the subject of much patriotic writing, including poems, as well as a song, Michael O'Leary VC, penned by the man who wrote It's a long way to Tipperary, Jack Judge. Accolades poured in from such luminaries of the day as Sir Arthur Conan Dovle, author of the Sherlock Holmes stories, who said that "No writer in fiction would dare to fasten such an achievement on any of his characters, but the Irish have always had a reputation of being wonderful fighters, and Lance-Corporal Michael O'Leary is clearly one of them." Many years later, Cónal Creedon, whose book, The Immortal Deed of Michael O'Leary, was published by Cork City Libraries in 2015, describes how he found the story of Michael's story featured in a May 1979 issue of Victor comic.

For his part, Sergeant O'Leary was anxious to get home to see his parents, as he was concerned that the rumours that existed of his death might have upset them. It is said that the first casualty of war is truth. His reception was repeated in Macroom, as well as in Cork and Dublin, when he visited Ireland,

with crowds turning out to applaud him. Daniel O'Leary was interviewed in a local newspaper regarding his son's exploits, and, with typical bravado, commented: "I am surprised he didn't do more. I often laid out twenty men myself with a stick coming from Macroom Fair, and it is a bad trial

of Mick that he could kill only eight, and he having a rifle and bayonet."

The story of his exploits didn't meet with universal acclaim, however, as it led to a satirical play, O'Flaherty VC, by Nobel laureate Bernard Shaw, George with the titular character



based on O'Leary, being deemed too provocative to be premiered in Dublin's Abbey Theatre. Did war result in the censorship of freedom of expression? Michael was also booed when he went to Northern Ireland on a recruiting drive.

Even before winning the Victoria Cross (VC), Michael proved himself to be both brave and resourceful. He worked on his father's farm after leaving Kilbarry National School, before serving in the Royal Navy as a Stoker on HMS Vivid from 1909, and being invalided out on 29th April 1910, with rheumatism in his knees. After a period in the Irish Guards, he emigrated to Canada, joining the Royal North-West Mounted Police Force (RNWMP) in Regina, Saskatchewan, in 1913. Following a twohour running gun battle, he captured two robbers and was awarded a gold ring, which he proudly wore for the rest of his life. Michael was granted a free discharge in 1914 and re-joined the Irish Guards. Having been posted to the 1st Battalion, he went to France as a Lance Corporal, being promoted to Sergeant after the incident in Cuinchy, near the Belgian border, which saw him awarded the VC. Michael served for a time in France with the British actor Stanley Holloway (who starred as Alfred P. Doolittle in My Fair Lady opposite Audrey Hepburn in 1964, winning a Best Supporting Actor Oscar for the role). After the war ended, they remained close friends and Holloway often stayed in The Mayfair Hotel where O'Leary worked as a concierge.

In 1917, Michael returned to the front in Salonkia, Greece, with the Connaught Rangers, again being mentioned in dispatches (a report by a superior officer that mentions those who have been extremely brave & recommends them for a medal). He was promoted to Lieutenant and moved to Egypt shortly afterwards, hoping to join the flying corps. However, recurring bouts of malaria instead meant the medical board recommended he return to England. He ended the war having attained the rank of Captain.

Michael married Margaret (Greta) Hegarty in 1919 in Ballyvourney, Co. Cork and they had six sons and a daughter. They lived initially in Ireland, before in 1921, Michael returned to Canada where he worked as a lecturer and worked for a publishing company. O'Leary joined the Ontario Provincial Police, charged with enforcing the prohibition laws (however, banning alcohol created a situation where organized crime thrived). In 1924, with his family recently arrived, O'Leary left the Ontario police force and became a police sergeant with the Michigan Central Railway in Bridgeburg, Ontario. In 1925, something most out of character happened. Michael was arrested twice, for smuggling illegal immigrants and for smuggling bootleg. Although acquitted both times, he spent a week in prison following the second arrest and lost his job with the railway. Many have said that he was likely set up in attempts to discredit him. Several months later, the municipal authorities loaned him the fare for him and his family to return to Ireland. Michael, being in straitened financial circumstances, felt his prospects might be better in England, and so they went there instead.



The British Legion gave him a job in a poppy factory to help him out. He then became head linkman at the Mayfair Hotel, London.

In World War Two, he was appointed Lieutenant in the Middlesex Regiment and was Camp Commandant of HQ III Corps and went to France. He was invalided home prior to Dunkirk due to diabetes. He was transferred into the Pioneer Corps in 1941 and then served on the staff of POW Camps in the south of England. At his final retirement from the military in 1945, O'Leary was an Army major in command of a prisoner of war camp. The proverbial apple didn't fall far from the tree, as his twin sons, David and Jeremiah, both won the Distinguished Flying Cross (DFC) in the same war.

O'Leary lived out the rest of his life in England. Returning to civilian life, he worked in the building trade until retiring in 1954. Michael died in 1961. He is buried in Mill Hill cemetery in north London. His medals are displayed in Wellington Barracks, London. In 2015, one hundred years since his famed exploit on the battlefield, O'Leary was remembered with a plaque in Glasnevin cemetery, Dublin.

Michael conformed to the stereotype of the fighting Irish. There are some who say he fought in the wrong war, yet he fought, along with approximately a quarter of a million Irishmen, most of whom believed that in fighting for the freedom of small nations, they were advancing Home Rule in Ireland promised by the British. Similarly, many in India, by 1914 seeking independence, also fought. The Middle East likewise - with Arabs, including those in Palestine, promised liberation if they rose up against the Turks. Disillusionment followed in many geographic contexts.

Tellingly, perhaps, while in Canada, Michael was among those working to help create a Canadian version of the American Commission on Conditions in Ireland (a published account of oral and written testimonies from witnesses in Ireland dating from the end of 1920 and beginning of 1921, detailing the events and circumstances in Ireland) when the Truce of July 1921 was agreed, to bring an end to hostilities of the War of Independence in Ireland.

Despite all the acclaim he received, brave Michael O'Leary had no wish to ever talk about war or being a soldier. That, in itself, says it all.

"War is sweet to those who have not tried it, but anyone who knows what it is, is horrified beyond measure if he meets it in his heart" - Pindar (ancient Greek poet, c. 518 BC – c. 438 BC).

Town Centres First Policy

The Government has published Town Centre First – a major new policy that aims to tackle vacancy, combat dereliction and breathe new life into our town centres. Town Centre First contains 33 unique actions which will give towns the tools and resources they need to become more viable and attractive places in which to live, work, visit and run a business.

The policy is underpinned by multi-billion-euro investment spread across major Government schemes such as the Rural Regeneration and Development Fund (RRDF), the Urban Regeneration and Development Fund (URDF), Croí Conaithe (Towns) Fund and the Town and Village Renewal Scheme. For the first time, designated towns will gain their own dedicated Town Regeneration Officers, who will be crucial to driving future development. The policy also contains a range of actions designed to achieve key objectives such as social and economic revival in towns, the provision of housing, as well as addressing challenges like vacancy and derelict buildings. The actions also support the protection of our environment, as well as the heritage and culture of our towns.

Town Centre First was launched by the Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD, the Minister for Planning and Local Government, Peter Burke TD, and the Minister for Heritage and Electoral Reform, Malcolm Noonan TD. Announcing Town Centre First, the Minister for Rural and Community Development Heather Humphreys TD said: 'Town Centre First' represents a new approach to revitalising communities the length and breadth of this country. This is about bringing together our businesses, our local authorities and our town teams - so that they are at the fore when it comes to planning for the future development of their communities. It's about ensuring our towns have the tools, resources and investment they need to tackle major issues such as dereliction and vacant properties. We know that so many of our towns, particularly in rural Ireland, face considerable challenges. But they also have extraordinary potential. With investment under the likes of the Rural Regeneration and Development Fund and the Urban Regeneration and Development Fund, we will ensure our towns become even better places to live, work and raise a family. 'Town Centre First' will arm our towns with the ability to map out and deliver on their own unique vision, helping to revitalise Rural Ireland and deliver on the objectives of 'Our Rural Future'. The Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien TD, said: "This Government is determined to act on the fact that many of our town centres, unfortunately, are underutilised for housing, and have limited housing choice. That is why this 'Town Centre First' policy is so important. It will support different types of development proposals so that there is a greater and more mixed supply of private, affordable and social housing in our towns. It will also help reduce vacancy and dereliction in our towns, converting empty buildings into housing. It is another contribution in our absolute commitment to increase housing supply."

The Minister for Planning and Local Government, Peter Burke TD, stated: "Local authorities will play a vital role in assisting towns shape their futures. Town Regeneration Officers and technical expertise will assist local Town Teams in formulating their local responses and accessing regeneration funding. The National Town Centre First Office will help drive this new approach to revitalising town centres and bring together the stakeholders who can help towns realise a vision for their future."

I know there is great enthusiasm within local government, and among community, voluntary and business groups, for the 'Town Centre First' approach. I look forward to seeing towns across Ireland producing ambitious Town Centre First Plans focused on delivering regeneration projects that can transform communities for the better. I want to thank all on the Town Centre First Advisory Group who helped shape this policy and all who will help to put the policy into practice."

The Minister for Heritage and Electoral Reform, Malcolm Noonan TD, added: "Architecturally, culturally and socially, the Irish town is unique in European terms. For far too long, we have turned our backs on this important heritage. The Government's 'Town Centres First' policy seeks to support, enable and inspire communities to be active participants in the heritage-led regeneration of their towns and villages. This in turn will reinvigorate independent retail and promote town centre living, supporting local economic resilience through the co-creation of liveable, vibrant, nature-friendly urban spaces."

Among the specific actions contained in Town Centre First include:

• Town Centre First Plans: Support for towns in producing their own Town Centre First Plans, produced by a local Town Team drawn from local community and business representatives. These will identify challenges, actions and integrated responses across a number of themes (business/ commercial; community/cultural; housing; built environment; heritage)

· Investment: Implementation of plans will be supported by a targeted investment programme across Government, including through the Rural Regeneration and Development Fund (RRDF), Urban Regeneration and Development Fund (URDF) and dedicated funding streams to tackle vacancy and dereliction in particular.

• A network of Town Regeneration Officers: who will bring a coordinated approach to Town Centre First delivery across the country and support local Town Teams

• A National Town Centre First Office: that will drive implementation of Town Centre First actions and coordinate stakeholder engagement at a national level and across the local government sector. This office will also be a forum for best practice • Capacity building programmes for Town Teams

• Health Check Programme: a national, integrated and scaled-up programme for towns • A Town Centre First toolkit (including web portal): this will provide access to all resources, funding information and best practice models for developing Town Centre First Plans

• Identification of 'pathfinder towns': to act as demonstrators of the Town Centre First approach and lead best practice. Towns requiring more support with local stakeholder collaboration and access to investment programmes will be identified at an early stage

• A Town Centre First National Oversight and Advisory Group: the group will ensure crossgovernment focus and policy alignment. It will monitor and guide policy delivery and annual implementation plans.

 Impact assessment methodology: this will help assess the impact of development and investment on town centres. It will be applied to the statutory planning system.

• A research and evidence platform and agreed data measurement requirements: these will relate to key social and economic outcomes and ensure there is an evidence base for the ongoing evaluation of the Town Centre First policy. 

Cork play Dublin in their last league encounter and could yet qualify for the semifinal stage.

Cork, the winners of the National League Division One title for the past two seasons, are through to the semifinal of this year's competition after their defeat of Dublin at Pairc Ui Chaoimh.

Fintan Goold and Sean Kiely of Macroom, Nollaig O Laoire of Cill na Martra and Paddy Kelly of Ballincollig all saw action for Cork. Cork now play Down in the semifinal at Croke Park. That game will be preceded by the other semifinal between Kerry and Mayo.

Allianz National Football League - Semi Final Cork 2 – 17 Down 1-12

Cork are through to another National League final - their third successive Div. One final and fourth consecutive league final if one counts in the Div. Two final of 2009. They had an easy win over Down at Croke Park and now meet Mayo, who surprised Kerry after extra time in the other semifinal and who, it will be remembered, beat Cork in the All-Ireland quarter final of last year. Mayo are the only team apart from Kerry to have beaten Cork in a major fixture at Croke Park since Conor Counihan took over in 2008.

Noel O'Leary of Cill na Martra, Fintan Goold of Macroom, and Paddy Kelly of Ballincollig all started for Cork and Daniel Goulding of Eire Og, coming back after injury, made an appearance for Cork as a substitute late in the game.

Allianz Football League Division I Final: Cork 2-10 Mayo 0-11

Cork gave a masterful second half performance to claim a third successive Allianz Football League Division I title at Croke Park. Having been outplayed for long periods of the first half, the Rebels went into the break 0-9 to 0-5 down, but with the wind at their backs in the second half, Conor Counihan's side outscored their opponents by 2-5 to 0-2 to secure the first three-in-a-row since Kerry managed the feat in the early 1970s. Cork hit 1-3 without reply at the start of the second half to wipe out Mayo's lead, with Colm O'Neill scoring their opening goal in the 47th minute, before Aidan Walsh's second killed off Mayo's challenge nine minutes later.

It was yet another miserable afternoon for the Westerners in Croke Park, losing their 11th national final in the last 12 they have contested. Both sides started nervously and struggled with a strong breeze that was blowing straight down the pitch into the Davin Stand end, favouring Cork in the first half. Pearse O'Neill was gulity of one of Cork's early wides before he steadied himself and hit the opening score of the game after six minutes.

Mayo were reliant on the free-taking prowess of Cillian O'Connor in the first guarter – a mostly stale affair – and the Young Footballer of the Year had the Westerners 0-3 to 0-2 ahead on 16 minutes, with Fintan Goold getting Cork's second. O'Connor nudged Mayo further ahead with another wellstruck free from his hands before Goold responded for the champions, scoring their third from play in contrast to Mayo, whose first four scores came from frees. Keith Higgins' point after a trademark foray upfield was Mayo's first from play, before two more followed in a minute. O'Connor scored his fifth and first from play, but he probably should have had greater reward for his endeavour, choosing to go it alone and blast over the bar when a pass inside to the unmarked Barry Moran might have reaped a greater dividend. When Donal Vaughan broke upfield and slotted over another Mayo point, James Horan's side had stitched together three scores without reply and led by 0-7 to 0-3, having played the sharper football.

Two quick frees brought Cork to within two points – the second a long-range effort from Graham Canty which bounced before going over and nearly embarrassed Mayo goalkeeper David Clarke – but it was a temporary reprieve. Mayo were dominant in the first half, and Andy Moran opened his account in added time, finishing a flowing move with a fine score. Mayo, however, were still not finished, and when Barry Moran

claimed a towering catch from a kick-out, he fed the rampaging Vaughan, who was stopped abruptly in his tracks with a shuddering tackle by Pearse O'Neill, who was booked for the challenge. O'Connor sent over the resultant free, landing his sixth point of the half to leave his side 0-9 to 0-5 ahead at the break.

That gap was down to a point within three minutes of the restart. Alan O'Connor, Paddy Kelly and Pearse O'Neill showed just how significant the breeze was by hitting just as many scores from play in three minutes as Cork had managed in the entire first half. Cork were level on 43 minutes when Donncha O'Connor flashed over a point. O'Connor then played a pivotal role in Cork's goal, finding Colm O'Neill in space on the edge of the square and the Ballyclough man hammered home his fourth goal of the campaign, leaving Clarke with no chance. It was 10 minutes before Mayo managed a shot in the second half and five more before Kevin McLoughlin checked the Rebels' progress with a point.

But Mayo's hopes of a first league title since 2001 were dealt a hammer blow when Cork scored a lucky second goal. Goold's angled shot struck a post and fell kindly for Aidan Walsh, the Kanturk man making no mistake with an emphatic finish despite the attention of two defenders. Cork led by 2-9 to 0-10. A Conor Mortimer free and a brilliant Daniel Goulding point rounded off the scoring with five minutes left to leave five points between the sides in the end.

In the All-Ireland semi at Portlaoise, Cork with Kevin Hallissey again in the half line of attack, were deservedly beaten by a very powerful Dublin team and so for the second year in a row Cork, after a thrilling Munster campaign, lost out in the All-Ireland semifinal.

It was 2-8 to 0-2 at half time and CIT could afford to wait until the second half before introducing a fine hurler like Aidan Walsh into the action. Ray Carey, Paudie Kissane, Colm O'Neill, Cian O'Riordan of Mallow and sharp shooter Teddy O'Shea of Ballyclough all stepped up to the mark and Avondhu with four unanswered points in the

final guarter were deserving winner at the final whistle. It was a major disappointment but a reality check for the Cork supporters. The road back to the top will be a difficult one but the team is young and all are good hurlers and must be persevered with. No Mid Cork hurler figured on the county team in this final.

Kilkenny 3-21 Cork 0-16

Kilkenny fizzed through the opening period in Thurles like men who were expertly programmed

to impress on Cork's new-look team that there's a world of difference between routine league games and a final. Kilkenny led by 2-6 to 0-1 after 11 minutes, setting Cork a recovery target which was never likely to come anywhere close to being realised. By half-time Kilkenny were 14 points ahead (3-11 to 0-6), leaving Cork facing a further 35 minutes of torture. "From half-time on, we were fighting for respectability," said Jimmy Barry-Murphy in an honest assessment of a game where the warning lights flashed for Cork right from the off. "We'd have liked to get a few goals to take the bare look off the scoreboard but we couldn't manage it. "It's very disappointing to be beaten by so much — we didn't show what we're capable of." Kilkenny grabbed power in a manner which left Cork in no doubt that they were up against a much different outfit than the one they had beaten by two points at Pairc Ui Chaoimh. It was as if the sight of the trophy gleaming on the presentation podium concentrated Kilkenny minds to a degree that took them much closer to the championship pace than Cork. Their third goal arrived just before the break, when the Cork defence finally surrendered to the sheer weight of pressure of another wave of attack, allowing TJ Reid an unchallenged strike which whizzed to the net.

Cork scored only two points from open play in the first half, whereas Kilkenny landed 3-7, with the remaining 0-4 evenly shared off frees from Larkin and Paddy Hogan. There was never the remotest chance that Cork would peg back a 14-point lead so the only real target they could give themselves for the second half was to make some inroads into the deficit. They failed on that front too (the second-half was drawn on 0-10 each) and even when Kilkenny dropped the tempo, they still had the craft to close Cork down.



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MEMORIALS AND REMEMBRANCE



Welcome back dear student, I pray that you are growing with us as we study God's Word together. There are so many things competing for our attention at present. Some of the issues merit attention: for instance, the attack against Ukraine and her people - for whom we are praying God's hand of deliverance and protection upon every day. Other things are not worthy of attention, tactics spun by the devil to distract, bringing clutter and confusion into our overfilled minds. It seems like many people are suffering with A.D.D. type symptoms as a result of being constantly bombarded by negative news reports, widespread fear, and never-ending pages of social media posts. Never have adults and children had to deal with such information overload. A.D.D. stands for Attention Deficit Disorder. It affects physical learning hindering the ability to organise, prioritise and focus, but many also battle something similar even spiritually and emotionally, and find life exhausting and difficult as a result. Concentration is so essential to our learning, and planning, and completing tasks. Our lives revolve around a series of daily tasks that require our attention in order to be successfully completed. If we find it hard to focus, plan and prioritise then every part of life is adversely affected.


So, how do we untangle ourselves from unnecessary clutter, filtering out the garbage, yet retaining the important stuff in order to be able to move forward? By speaking out and meditating upon God's Word (Joshua 1:5-9; John 15:4-7). God wants you to overcome the problems that are blocking you from reaching goals by receiving and understanding His immense love. God is for you! He is not against you (Romans 8:37-39). Fear will rob you from entering into the destiny and plans that God has for you (Jeremiah 29:11). Fear is the primary weapon that Satan uses, and he is the one behind all confusion and chaos (John 10:10). "For the one who fears has not been made perfect in love" (1 John 4:18). Make a decision to get rid of fear - repent for allowing fear to influence and control you, and ask Jesus to come into your life as Lord and fill you with His Peace, because He is the Prince of Peace - the only One Who can still the storms and restore calm (Isaiah 9:6; Psalms 107:29; 1 Timothy 2:5).

To counteract the lies of the devil, let's study this further using these letters 'A.D.D.', beginning with the letter 'A' - for Attention. "My child, pay attention to what I say. Listen carefully to My Words. Don't lose sight of them. Let them penetrate deep into your heart, for they bring life to those who find them, and healing to their whole body" (Proverbs 4:20-22 NLT). Next, the letter 'D' - for Deficit, meaning loss or shortfall, "...when your faith is tested your endurance has a chance to grow. So let it grow, for when your endurance is fully developed, you will be perfect and complete – lacking nothing" (James 1:4). Finally the last letter 'D' for Disorder – "for God is not a God of confusion and disorder, but of peace" (1Corinthians 14:33). "You will keep in perfect peace all whose minds are stayed upon You" (Isaiah 26:3-4; Psalm 23). Write out these Scriptures and pray them aloud over your mind, and allow the Lord to restore your peace.

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


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
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
