





MACROOM AND DISTRICT LIONS CLUB HAND OVER €11,890 TO IRISH COMMUNITY AIR AMBULANCE, FUNDS RAISED FROM THEIR 'BALL RUN ON THE BYPASS'

n the lead up to the highly anticipated opening of the new Macroom Bypass last month, Macroom and District Lions Club members saw an opportunity to organise a unique fundraiser... and they seized it. In a few short weeks, the Club had distributed and sold thousands of tickets for their 'Ball Run on the Bypass' which took place on Saturday, 3rd December ahead of the official opening of the new road. The Ball Run involved 12,000 brightly coloured and individually numbered plastic balls being released at the same time from a point on the Bypass and racing to the 'finish line'.

Cork County Council, and Bypass developers, Jons Civil Engineering got behind the fundraiser, along with some incredible sponsors (Delforno Tiles and Timber; TK First Aid and Hygiene Supplies; and Matt Murphy's Pharmacy). At the cheque presentation, Club member, James O'Sullivan wished to acknowledge the impact the service has on communities and how deserving it is of the funds raised. James also acknowledged the tremendous support shown for the fundraiser and thanked the many businesses, retailers and individuals who helped to sell and buy balls for the Ball Run.

HOLLY - Medicine Plants of the Hedgerow

Hi! Chris Barrett back with you, hoping everyone had an enjoyable Christmas and wishing readers a very enjoyable 2023! Today I have the pleasure of speaking again with Ted Cook, Our local Heritage specialist. In previous talk now available online, see L.V.O. Nov.17th 2022, we traced the scientific discovery in 1828, of Salicin, (an active chemical in our Willow Tree) to the French pharmacist Henri Leroux. Salicin, Ted informed us, is the painkilling molecule in asprin. Since that article was published, a University academic, researching Irish herbal medicine has translated a 15th Century manuscript written by a Feargeal O Ce' (O He'), hereditary physician to the McDermott kings in Co. Roscommon. O Ce' describes the pain relieving qualities of willow's cambium, or inner bark. Rosario Kingston, an aclaimed Cork herbalist, has described the 'Expulsion of the Earls' in September 1607, from Lough Swilly's western shores. The 'Expulsion' from Ireland included those hereditary Gaelic families, including their libraries which had for centuries provided pharmacy and surgery for the Gaelic nobility. The gathering and garlanding of our hearths with holly branches, from Ireland's only evergreen broadleaf, continues a tradition which has lasted for thousands of years. In a translation from french, we learn from Palaiseul that decoctions of fresh or dried Holly leaves were prescribed in ancient times for, catarrahal complaints and engorgements of the human respiratory tract including persistent cough, bronchitis, pneumonia and influenza'. Ted has kindly left me Palaiseul's Recipe for the use of Holly leaves, so I can provide it to anyone who is interested. I have chosen not to publish it here as my research has led me to a few sites on the Internet which say that Holly leaves have been known to cause diarrhoea, nausea, vomitting and stomach and intestinal problems. However, I also





read that both English Holly and American Holly have been used to make medicine in the past. I am reminded by Ted who tells me from personal experience, that the mixture, once made, will be exteremely bitter and dry if it is not sweetened with honey, and that the berries must NOT be used. There is evidence everywhere that the berries are poisonous. Ted reminds us to leave the berries for the birds. Ted continues by telling me about Diana Beresford, a U.C.C. chemist and nuclear botanist graduate who has recently published her insights, together with peer-reviewed research from numerous analytical laboratories. Beresford claims that from the time of gathering, before the Winter Solstice, up to about 6th January, these holly garlands released powerful health-giving aerosols into the atmosphere of the home. This complex outgassing 'edges down high fevers encountered by bronchitis' by protecting and expanding both the movement and expansion of our capillaries, i.e. oxygenating the body. In 2019 exploration of a fungus, unique to the 'plumbing', water transport pipes of Holly, was advancing. Interestingly, this fungus which functions to keep Holly healthy i.e. resistant to decay, is being trialled as a new |Cancer Therapy. Mature leaves with intact terminal spines, which are found further up the Holly bush, are more concentrated as a tonic. Originally known as the Holy Tree, Holly still holds its place in our winter solstice celebrations which Ted reminds me have been borrowed for Christmas. I have been fascinated to hear how ancient and cutting-edge learning are working together regarding our understanding of the wonderful bush that is Holly.

I thank Ted for his contribution, and look forward to hearing more about Medicine Plants of the Hedgerow in the future. MEP Kelleher calls for common EU approach to procurement and distribution of core medicines

pan-European shortage of critical medicines to treat patients suffering from respiratory infections is proof positive that EU countries must continue to work together in terms of the procurement, purchasing, storage and distribution of key medicines.

Kelleher was speaking ahead of a debate in the European Parliament this week on this very important and timely issue.

"All EU member states, and not just Ireland, are suffering from shortages of common Over the Counter (OTC) medicines used to deal with the symptoms of respiratory infections.

"While this current situation originates from a unique coming together of three serious viral infections - influenza, Covid 19 and RSV, at the same time, it demonstrates to us the weaknesses EU countries have in terms of accessing medicines at critical times.

"I firmly believe that Member States, led by

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that the i the Commission, need to agree to common procurement in terms of these and other important medicines. This is similar to how we dealt with the Covid 19 pandemic when it came to vaccines

> "We cannot allow a situation to arise where we see different national health systems competing with each other to buy the same limited stocks. We also need to ensure that there is a centralised database of who has what type of medicine, and who does not, to allow sharing of medicines between Member States if, and when, the need arises.

> "At present, the EU Treaties do not allow for the EU to take the lead on most issues related to healthcare. I think it's time to review this, as I do see the value in a European Health Union to ensure value for money, easier procurement and sharing of resources at times of need.

> "We cannot have any more winters where basic OTC drugs are simply not available to citizens," concluded Kelleher.

Snow can be a delight and a frustration all at once. I must say I love the whispery silence that surrounds us after a fall of snow. To look out at such a white vista, with its little pops of colour from taller shrubs and dwellings. Seeing various animal footprints highlighted in the snow and being amazed that so much wildlife surrounds us. Knowing that children are delighted with the opportunities it creates - no school, lots of snowmen and snowball fights. Remembering the fun we had as children ourselves and years later recreating that fun with our own children. Seeing some of our furry friends, the cats and dogs who are our indoor pets, totally bemused by this strange cold, white carpet. But on the other hand, if you live rurally at any little bit of an elevation it's quite a different story. How to navigate the weather to get to work, appointments, even to get to the shop for basic necessities takes planning. It's such a frustration and it can be nerve wracking and the roads can be quite dangerous. It can be very stressful knowing that you are so near 'civilisation' but yet you can't get beyond your own lane. It's not so bad on a bright, snowy day when the sun reflects on the snow and creates a lovely clear light. But during this last stretch of snow we had fog that lasted all day. It was dull and gloomy and if you can't get out of the house it can be very disheartening. So although snow does bring a certain amount of joy we are usually quite happy to see it receding from the landscape leaving only a white cap on high ground to remind us that it is still Winter.

Although it is still Winter, I know the gardeners amongst us are busy. Now is the time to plan your vegetable plot, your plant containers to provide colour from Spring onto Autumn and of course there is pruning to be done. Ballyvourney Library has a very large selection of books on gardening from how to plan and layout a garden down to what plants to choose for the various aspects of your garden. There are books on patio design and container gardening and a great selection on gardening for self-sufficiency. There are books to suit complete novice gardeners up to experienced gardeners.

If gardening is not your thing Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne has many other topics to chose from and of course if the book you need isn't available in the branch it can be ordered in if it is available on the national catalogue.

If you prefer reading fiction, there are circa nine thousand fiction titles to choose from in Ballyvourney Library and of course the option of ordering from the national catalogue is open to you also as it is for DVDs and CDs. All the popular authors are represented and many series by authors can be availed of.

Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne has a great children's section. There are lovely board books, touch and feel books and pop up books that appeal to very young children and babies. There is a large selection of easy readers in English to get your little scholars off to a good start with basic reading and similarly in Irish there are books to suit every age. Children can then advance through the picture book stage onto easy chapter books and then onto longer chapter books and there is a great teen section as well as a young adult section for those transitioning between children's books to adult books.

Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne will be closed on Saturday 4th February as it is a Public Holiday Weekend. St Brigid's day, which falls on 1st February annually, was chosen as Ireland's new public holiday honouring our pandemic heroes, heroines. I'd like to think it also remembers those we lost during the pandemic, who didn't get traditional Irish funerals, like my own Mum. The Celtic Goddess Brigid was known for her gift of healing, strength, resilience and hope therefore, I think St Brigid's Day is a good choice for this new holiday and it's great to see an Irish woman at the forefront of it. The ancient Celtic festival of Imbolc which marks the first day of Spring in Ireland also falls on the 1st February. The National School I went to was St. Brigit's, so we used to get the day off. For a few days in advance of Lá Fhéile Bríde we were kept busy picking rushes to make St. Brigit

Why Do I Wake Up With Neck Pain?

Sometimes described as a "crick" or "kink" in the neck, pain on waking in the morning is a common complaint from patients that come into our office.

The result is not only pain but an overall decrease in the range of motion of the neck. **So, how does this happen?**

The main cause of neck pain upon waking is poor sleeping position. People who sleep on their stomachs typically have the most issues with their necks. While sleeping on the stomach for 6-8 hours each night the head is rotated to the left or right when laying on the pillow.

So, imagine standing or sitting with your head rotated in either direction for up to 8 hours. Another way to develop the "kink" or "crick" is by sleeping on more than one pillow or a pillow that is too large. This

will cause the neck to either be pushed forward or to the side too much where it is not aligned with the rest of the spine resulting in misalignment, muscle pulling and pain.

To have a "crick" or a "kink" is a term used when the bones, (vertebrae) in the neck are severely misaligned and putting pressure on the nerves leading to pain and decreased motion. Some people like to refer to this as a "pinched nerve". The misalignment of the neck will also cause muscle pulling over a period of time that can lead to spasm and inflammation resulting in pain.

How does the "kink" get fixed? As chiropractors we help to treat the problem in the neck with an adjustment. This will allow the bones to be restored to their normal position in the neck which results in reduced nerve pressure. After an adjustment, range of motion

and pain will be improved but inflammation is still taking place. The use of ice for periods of 15-20 minutes at a time will help with decreasing swelling and pain between adjustments.

Be sure to consult a chiropractor after feeling a "kink" or "crick" in the neck and do not allow the injury to try and heal over time.

Even if the pain subsides, the chances for re-exacerbation are high because the nerve pressure still exists.

It's important to remember, painkillers work to numb the pain but never resolve the underlying issue.

Chiropractic on the other hand will help relieve the pain and symptoms while also addressing the root cause.


CARRIGADROHID TIDY TOWNS 2022 REVIEW & AGM

2023 Munster Senior Hurling League

Cork 0 - 20 Limerick 1 - 16

St Finbarr's Brian Hayes scored the 74th-minute winner as Cork overcame Limerick at Páirc Uí Rinn to reach the Co-op SuperStores Munster Hurling League final.

Cork led for much of the first half but the All-Ireland champions moved into a three-point lead during the second period. However, poor shooting was costly for Limerick and Cork scored five of the last six points to win.

Cork had a good start, moving into a 0-4 to 0-1 lead by the 13th minute as Limerick had many wides. Conor Lehane had two of those early Cork points while Conor Cahalane, set up by Robert Downey and Brian Hayes, opened up that threepoint advantage but Limerick bounced back well. After a Shane O'Brien point, the visitors moved in front for the first time as a delivery from Darragh O'Donovan finished in the Cork net but the response was strong - Cormac Beausang and Hayes scores putting them back in front.

Points from Lehane and Luke Meade left Cork three in front again, 0-8 to 1-2, but Limerick tied the game again with three points in a row before Cork regained the lead, Beausang and Lehane on target, Limerick again levelled, but a fifth Conor Lehane point gave Cork a 0-11 to 1-7 half time lead. Limerick were much improved in the second half. and after the first four points after the restart were evenly shared with frees from Lehane and Reidy, the All Ireland champions hit Cork with a five-point burst to go four clear. Champions Ballinora showed that they are fully intent on retaining their Mid Cork junior hurling crown with a decisive victory over Inniscarra in the semi final at Ovens, a repeat of their victory in last year's final. Inniscarra were short a few regulars, out with injury, and did not perform as well as they had done in the earlier stages of the competition but Ballinora gave a very impressive performance.

January 2023

WELCOME TO THE 10TH ISSUE OF THE N22BBM NEWSLETTER

The most recent project newsletter was issued on 9th Oct 2022 and since then significant progress has been achieved.

In Section 1 at the western end of the scheme, the following items have been progressed during October, November and December 2022:

- · Soil stabilisation in the deep cut at An Sliabh Riabhach has progressed well with the majority of the soil nailing complete and the mesh facing installed. The Hydro-Seeding of the batters has also commenced here.
- · At Baile Bhuirne Junction, the diversion road L-92201 has been progressed with a view to having the diversion for existing N22 traffic in place from early February 2023
- · Good progress has been made on the last bridge on the scheme, the high-level accommodation bridge at An Sliabh Riabhach, with the bridge deck being poured and the concrete separation wall being advanced.
- Good progress has been made with the installation of Drainage and Ducting on the new N22 main line in preparation for the laying of the capping layer of the road
- pavement.

 2 kilometres of concrete drainage channel have been constructed.
- Work is ongoing with the installation of the various Environmental Barriers (Noise Barriers) and the barrier at Tonn Láin has been completed.
- · Construction works have been completed on the Tonn Láin Roundabout on the existing N22 and is now open to general
- Filling of the last main line embankment has now been completed.
- Significant progress has been made in the completion of Accommodation Roads for landowners with the completion of a number in An Sliabh Riabhach and in Tonn Láin

In this part of the project, we hope to focus on the following works in January and February 2023:

- Complete the soil stabilisation works at the deep cut at An Sliabh Riabhach.
- Complete the high-level bridge at An Sliabh Riabhach and opening of this structure for access by the two landowners affected.
- Complete the off-line works at the Baile Bhuirne Junction and transfer of N22 traffic onto the new diversion road
- Complete the rock removal from the deep cut at An Sliabh Riabhach.
- Progress the remaining Drainage and Ducting installation to the main line
- Substantially complete the installation of the concrete drainage channel
- Complete the installation of capping layer on the mainline between the Cill na Martra Road and Tonn Láin Roundabout.






