
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

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

MINNESOTA MUSICIAN WINS SEÁN Ó RIADA GOLD MEDAL

Joe de Georgeo, from Minneapolis, Minnesota in the USA was the winner of the prestigious Seán Ó Riada Gold Medal traditional music competition on Friday night. Joe was one of fourteen fiddlers from across Ireland and the US who competed in the competition final, presented by musician and broadcaster Peadar Ó Riada live on RTÉ Raidió na Gaeltachta from the Rochestown Park Hotel in Cork.

Joe, 20, began playing classical violin at the age of four. His family moved to Galway for a year when Joe was five in 2007, where his father started tin whistle lessons with the legendary Mary Bergin, and that was his first exposure to Irish traditional music.

After returning to the US, Joe and his sister began taking lessons with local fiddle player Jode Dowling at the Center for Irish Music in St. Paul, Minnesota. By the time Joe was in high school, he had moved away from classical music and was focusing exclusively on traditional music and began participating in various fleadhs. Joe has played with and

Joe took home the Seán Ó Riada Gold Medal and €2500 prize money.

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

THE LAWS CONCERNING PESTICIDES

Today I have the pleasure of talking with James Walsh who will clarify the laws concerning pesticide use for us.

All herbicides, insecticides, fungicides, mosskillers and slug-killers are classed as pesticides and they are covered by the pesticide legislation mentioned below.

The current S.U.D Legislation (Sustainable Use of Pesticides Directive, 2009) is the European Legislation, which required every E.U. Country to make it's own laws concerning the safe use of pesticides, and brought into Law by the Irish Government in 2012, (SI 155/2012).

Much of it can be summarised by Articles 12, 14, and 15 of which clearly state there should be no spraying in public places.

SI 155/2012

ARTICLE 12 states that no person can apply pesticides in areas used by the general public, and that priority must be given to non-chemical methods. If these alternatives to applying pesticides (i.e. The use of non-chemical methods), have not been followed, then the party using chemical spray in a public area must produce a documented risk assessment to prove why no non-chemical method was available.

ARTICLE 14 states that a person must apply the principals of I.P.M (Integrated Pest Management), and keep records to demonstrate that, under Principle no. 4, Organic methods must be given priority.

ARTICLE 15 states that a person has to apply the principles of G.P.P.P., (Good Plant Protection Practice, which places a legal obligation on pesticide users). and that they must demonstrate this.

Page 5 of GPPP states that it is illegal, and therefore never considered G.P.P.P, to apply P.P.P (Plant Protection Products), otherwise known as pesticides, where they can drift from the treatment area towards adjacent sensitive areas such as residences, schools and parks.

(N.B. Under E.U. Law, a sensitive area is any area used by the general public).

On page 4, of G.P.P.P of it states that spray drift

can cause deleterious effects on wildlife and cause a nuisance to neighbouring residents and adjacent landowners and is therefore considered to be illegal.

Article 22 of SI 155/2012 states that

Where it is found that a person has contravened Articles 12, 14 or 15 of SI 155/2012 they are liable on summary conviction to a Class A fine. If there is a breach of G.P.P.P., as stated under Article 15, there could also be a disallowance under the Basic Payment Scheme as well as the Fixed Payment Notice.

It is a common feature in rural areas that roadsides are being sprayed by residents and farmers.

This is clearly ILLEGAL (Articles 12 and 15, SI 155/2012)

In the new European legislation, the SUD Legislation mentioned above, will be replaced with the **SUR** Legislation.

This Legislation has already been passed by the European Commission and in accordance with the new stricter and clearer Pan-European approach, the Department of Agriculture has said that it will be implemented in the next few

The new SUR directive which replaces the SUD directive, allows member states to lay down very heavy penalties for non-compliance and also requires a distance of at least 3 meters from a public road and other public areas.

I am in no doubt that this will be to the benefit of nature, our children and our grandchildren and I am really grateful to James for sharing his time and knowledge with us.

If you come across sprayed roadside or other public places that have been sprayed such as schools, churches or car parks you can take photographic evidence along with the location details and send it in to the pesticide control division at DAFM and quote breach of article 12 and 15 of S.I 155/2012.

There has been a bit of a battle going on in Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne recently. I have done my best to keep the peace, I have tried to be fair and impartial but when you get three Saint's feast days falling within 14 days of each other the battle for window space and dominance can be an issue. So the triumvirate of Brigid, Gobnait and Valentine are holding court together at present.

I spoke about Brigid in the last issue and by now we have all enjoyed the new public holiday associated with her. Second to feature on 11th February is Gobnait. I know that while Brigid is now enjoying national fame, Gobnait is celebrated more regionally, mainly on the Aran Islands, in West Kerry and she is beloved and venerated by the people of Ballyvourney. As a blow in I am still, 38 year on, learning about all the stories attributed to and featuring her. But I know that 11th February is a very special day in the area. There are three depictions of St Gobnait that I find very interesting. I am particularly fascinated by the Medieval carved oak statue of St Gobnait that has been lovingly cared for through the passing of over 150 decades and still made available to the public on 2 days of the year. Imagine how many people since Medieval times have seen this statue, touched it, put their faith in it. It's fascinating to think that generations upon generations of past Ballyvourney people are tethered to the present through this statue which their own descendants might now view this year. A second statue of St Gobnait appeals to me. Seamus Murphy the sculptor created the stone statue of Gobnait which was erected where it was imagined her iron works was sited, because Gobnait was an iron smith. It is said that it was one of his finest works and his personal favourite. That Gobnait had an iron forge is not a guess as when the site was being excavated prior to the statue being erected evidence of iron smithing and smelting were found. It is no co-incidence that Gobnait is the patron saint of iron workers. Bees feature prominently in this statue and the stories about Gobnait and her army of bees are retold in the area and to each new generation of school children. She is also the patron saint of beekeepers. My husband's great grandfather was involved in erecting this statue and is buried within site of it, which is fitting. But if I had to choose my favourite depiction of Gobnait it would have to be the one that isn't in Ballyvourney at all but in Cork City. In the Honan Chapel, consecrated in 1916, on the UCC campus there is a stunning depiction of Gobnait. Harry Clarke, Ireland's most renowned



stained-glass artist, crafted an exquisite stainedglass window representing Gobnait in vivid colour. Her bees are included, and she is carrying a honeycomb. The colours are rich and vibrant and everything in the window has meaning associated with Gobnait. It's well worth seeing if ever you find yourself in UCC with a few minutes to spare. Completing the trilogy is St Valentine and I'm sure I don't have to explain to you what Valentine's Day is about. Suffice to say there will be lots of flowers, chocolates and cards changing hands that day!

Some great news for the village of Ballymakeera now as it becomes one of the newest WiFi4EU hotspots. Free WiFi is now available all along the street in Ballymakeera as Ballyvourney Library is included in the European roll out of free WiFi4EU hotspots to ensure access to connectivity for all. This means that you can log in to the FREE WiFi4EU from anywhere on the street where you are within a sightline of the transmitter mounted on the wall above the library. Anywhere from what used to be O'Connell's Pub all the way down the street to at least the national school can avail of this free service. On your device, phone, tablet etc go into settings - connections - WiFi, search available networks, click on WiFi4EU and log in and from your car or just strolling along the street you can use all online services

Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne is continuing to work with Tuismitheoirí na Gaeltachta in 2023 by providing the venue for their excellent activity groups. Tuismitheoirí na Gaeltachta is a national Gaeltacht organisation that supplies support, assistance and advice to families who are raising their children with Irish in the Gaeltacht or those parents who wish to do so. Their next activity group in Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne is from 1.30 to 2.30

This event is run from time to time on Saturdays in Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne for parents with young children. It lasts about an hour and a half and parents can talk and drink a drop of tea, together with singing rhymes, colouring pictures and reading a story to the children. Volunteer helpers are always appreciated.







GP GETS MORE TIME TO FIND NEW PREMISES

The Coachford GP Family Practice has been asked to vacate the premises which it shares with Macroom Credit Union in Coachford. Initially the GP was given 6 months to find a new premises but after consultation with Macroom Credit Union this time frame has been extended. The Credit Union currently opens the sub office in Coachford one evening a week on each Thursday but has plans to expand credit union services in the village. Meanwhile Dr. Kingston is exploring every local avenue to try and get a suitable premises as soon as possible.

Kilmurry Active Retirement

The wisdom of our oldest

I had a conversation recently with what many would consider an old woman. What I mean by that is a woman in the age bracket of those that distinguish themselves from the rest of their sex by revealing their age and do so with satisfaction. It is a privilege to speak with such women of maturity and wisdom. You would think therefore that I would have asked her to bring her wisdom and precision to those issues of the day that I struggled with. No better woman. But instead, perhaps unconsciously or instinctively, I steered our conversation to things past. I have been pondering why I did that. I have come to realise that for me there is a magnetic attractiveness to reminiscing. I suppose I hope to gain another's insight. I hope to get a deeper understanding of what we took as normal, but which has passed by and has proven not to be so at all.

Looking back at the past can be a dry conversation topic for many. Some find it difficult to make a meaningful connection with it. Stories that old relatives and acquaintances might tell may not be of importance to you. Navigating the present may be just difficult enough, and it is in the present that you find your meaning.

Many of us find it beyond us to understand the complexity of our world. Re-remembering the past helps me to get at least some grasp on understanding our present world. When we examine the past, we can see what has stayed constant and what has changed. It can guide us in distinguishing between persistent values and fleeting fashions. Our culture changes as our thinking changes. We come to value this more so, and that less or not at all. We can in retrospect get some idea of what gave rise to the changes. We evaluate the efforts and outcomes of earlier generations. We can be both forewarned by their errors and inspired by their overcoming. The past retains relevancy, captured in what is often attributed to Mark Twain, 'history doesn't repeat itself but it rhymes'. Seeking an understanding of the past therefore helps us to understand and navigate the present.

On occasions when we are chatting about our shared past, we may, if we pay close attention, notice the objective facts are softened and broadened. The subjective interpretations both past and present now intermingle, bringing the events very much alive again, but with new meaning. The essence and the colouring of a long-gone experience or event can change for us, bringing shared insight in a surprisingly delightful

way. For some, reminiscing with others on our earlier days is a process of personal self-discovery. We hope to understand and reinterpret the social context that has produced us and our quirks and idiosyncrasies. This can have a transformative impact for us personally. Where shared past is reremembered in communities or in public discourse it can be transformative for societies.

Our culture, when at its best, represents the culmination of the learning and the wisdom of humanity. We greatly value knowledge and so we should. But knowledge does not of itself generate wisdom. It requires reflection on what has been learned. Wisdom can take time to accumulate and is augmented by lived experience.

If this is so one would think that those with the longest-lived experience would be among the most valued by society. This was so in many cultures down through the centuries but perhaps an imbalance has occurred in our culture. Economics has always been a key driver of the world of business, increasingly the world of education, and more recently the world of sport and culture. Our generation is a hungry one and devours the new and fashionable. New knowledge yells out and is often priced to sell. Wisdom on the other hand seems to be a shy creature, it does not blow its trumpet, nor can it be priced.

One lesson we can take from Covid is the extent to which the young generously inconvenienced their lives to protect the old. We know too that many older people are willing and waiting to convey their reflections and their wisdom. Nonetheless our present normality is that our young, and even those they would consider old, are far too busy with their lives to be interested in chatting with those who are the oldest among us. While some would value a meaningful chat sometime with their elderly relatives or acquaintances, most will never do so.

The world of our oldest has passed away and so too will ours. When we engage with our oldest, it can stimulate us to question our society and our role within it. We can see the tendency to mindlessly follow the trend that has dominance. We disregard the fact that present normality might appear most strange to the generations that follow.

Our old have lived for only a snippet of time. Nonetheless, the wisdom they have gleaned is a unique part of the human story. Wouldn't it be an unwise society that would let them go without hearing their wisdom. Listening to our oldest can help us rebalance education and wisdom. Seeking that balance is prudent as it is together that education and wisdom empowers and liberates. Now to the news! Our AGM is on Monday 13th

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



Cork County Council Community Water Officer, Catherine Seale-Duggan, visited Ballinagree N.S. on World Wetlands' Day. She visited each classroom and spoke to the children about the Láine river and how the Láine catchment is classed as a Blue Dot catchment, which means the river is in good health. Children from 1st to 6th class visited the river with Catherine where they did a 'kick sample' of the river bed to discover what invertebrates were present. The children were enthralled to see Stoneflies and Mayflies at nymph stage and a juvenile Lamprey in the samples. Catherine explained that the Laine is known to have freshwater pearl mussels between Ballinagree and Macroom which is another sign of a healthy river ecosystem.

Ballinagree National School's 4th class team of Aoibheann Kelleher, Kayleigh O'Sullivan, Aoibheann O'Brien and Mia Noonan were named as runners-up of 'Manufacturing a Healthy Future' - a 3D printing design challenge recently. The

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
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

Transport is a hot current topic in Macroom and the 8th December, 2022 By-Pass opening should prove a boon to drivers, Macroom and the 'Healy-Rae' county. Chris Larkin's book deals with transport of a different kind and in a different era but even more momentous than our by-pass. His book deals with the history of railways in West Cork - their origin, benefits, beauty and demise. The Cork-Macroom line is referenced in his book. Larkin's train of talents includes carriages of

enthusiasm, a deep well of knowledge, in-depth research, a great eye for photographs, a precision for dates, an appreciation of context, an artist's dexterity and a the skills of a great story-teller. His book is divided into three parts: the first outlines the beginning and development of the railways and deals with the effects of trains on farming, animals, tourism, socialising/pubs and he charts various incidents. These include the carriage of The Prince of Wales, Gregory Peck, Robert Mitchum and Billy Fury whose stage act in Cork offended the late Bishop Lucey, Cork.

While all sections have an abundance of beautiful black-and-white and colour photos, part two, 'Beauty', lets the photos 'speak' for themselves. Among these is a photo of Macroom Engine No. 5, nicknamed 'Andrew', pp. 78-79. Other gems are pictures of Albert Quay Station, the viaduct and snaps of various smaller stations such those at Crossbarry and Waterfall.

'Betrayal' is the title of the last section and outlines the demise and closure of the railways. Starved of investment and under pressure from the motor industry, trains were neglected, reduced in importance and finally closed. Was this another example of 'short-termism' and 'state vandalism'? In view of our present dependence on oil and our planet 'burning', one can say for certain that it was a wrong decision to close our rural railways. With regard to Macroom, the flooding of the Lee Valley in the 1950s for the Carrigadrohid Dam was an added local factor.

As well as the photo, there are many references to the Cork-Macroom line. To quote a few: The line was opened in 1865 (other sources claim 1886) and according to Larkin, closed in 1955 (again other sources claim 1953). In its later years, it was freight only. The railway was a lifeline to the town from its inception. For example, it allowed for the rapid transport of eggs, butter and other goods rapidly to Cork city markets. Newspapers reached the town more quickly and people's range of travel extended. Sport, and in particular the GAA (founded in 1884) took advantage of relatively

cheap and guick travel that enabled matches between distant clubs to take place. One of the first organised official GAA events - an athletics meeting - took place in Kilmichael in 1884, almost immediately after its founding, and the location depended on the presence of a nearby train station to facilitate access. The Bork-Macroom line had 'stops' at Crookstown and Dooniskey, and at Bandon, Enniskeane and Dunmanway on the Bandon-Cork line. During the War of Independence trains brought British soldiers, supplies and arms to and from Macroom, and they were frequently attacked on route by the IRA.

If you are looking for a lovely book for yourself or a loved one, then this book would make a splendid choice. Happy 2023.

AUNTIE SHEILA'S PUB OR 'SHEILA BABES', NEW STREET, MACROOM

I grew up in a farm in the country but my Mother's sister, Sheila Murphy, lived in Macroom. It was exciting visiting her, as she owned and managed a public house at 29 New Street. The pub was previously owned by Julia O Leary (Auntie Sheila's Aunt) hence the name that was over the door.... O Leary's. Sadly, I have no idea of when the pub first opened and all those who might know are long gone. I can see it all in my mind now. It was a bit dark and dingy but cosy and warm at night when the lights were on. The main entrance door was a solid wood door which led into a small space. This space had small double opening doors into the main bar and a smaller door to the left which led into a tiny room. This was called the "cábús' I never found out what that means but it sounds like it is derived from the Irish language. It was also referred to as "the snug". Only three people could sit comfortably there. There was also a hatch from here to the main bar through which drinks were served. This was generally used by females who did not wish to enter the public bar. The main bar had a long counter to the left as you entered the main bar. Patrons (all men) stood at the counter or sat at one square table further back . About 6 men could sit

here. In my child's eye, the bar was big, but it would be regarded as small and basic today. As well as whiskey, stout (Murphy's, Beamish and Guinness) and minerals, tea, sugar and biscuits were also sold. The biscuits came in large tin boxes and were sold by weight. I remember Marietta, Mikado, and Kimberley. Tea and sugar was also weighed on a very old fashioned scales and sold in strong brown paper bags tied with string. I remember mirrors and boards advertising whiskey, and stout. Glasses were kept under the counter and were washed as soon as the pub closed. The barrels containing the draft stout were also under the counter. Money was kept in a drawer on a shelf opposite the counter. This was the era pre cash-register! Off the main bar there was another small room called the 'Tap Room'. This was a really cosy room in winter as there was a small open fire there. As it had no door it afforded a certain amount of privacy while also being part of the public bar. I remember my Aunt being very careful that the grate wasn't too full.... she had a fear of coal falling out and setting fire to her pub. Most of the patrons were regulars who lived on New Street (also referred to as Pound Lane) and the surrounding streets. They all knew

each other. The only exception to this was when there was a funeral in St Colman's cemetery and attendees called in for a drink afterwards. Life seemed simpler than and nobody ever seems to be in a hurry. Auntie Sheila was a frail looking thin lady who lived alone in the private quarters at the back and above the public bar. However she had the reputation of being strict and she would not tolerate rowdy behaviour, over-indulgence or even singing! She was, I suspect, respected by her customers who knew her well and knew that there was a line they could not cross. As children during the nineteen sixties my sister and I often stayed with Auntie Sheila . We liked standing behind the counter, giving change and standing at the front door watching the daily happenings in New St. This world was very different to life in the countryside. Our Dad and his friend and neighbour came every Sunday night for a few drinks. The Pub closed in the late seventies and was subsequently sold. Our lovely aunt died on 14th November 1989 in Nazareth House in Mallow. She is buried with her parents and aunt in St Colman's cemetery, Macroom.

Allianz National Football League 2023

Importance of league for Cork: To qualify for the All Ireland championship (Sam Maguire) series, Cork footballers must qualify for the Munster final or failing that, to have some chance of qualifying, they must at least finish very near the top of Division Two of the league In the Munster semi finals, Cork play the winners of the Clare v Limerick quarter final: Kerry play the winners of Tipperary v Waterford game. Kerry v Cork is the prediction for the final but one can never be sure of anything in championship football.

There will be 16 teams in the All Ireland (Sam Maguire) series.

The 16 counties that will compete are to be seeded in the following way:

First seeds: The four provincial champions.

Second seeds: The four provincial runners-up Third seeds: The next four highest ranked teams at the conclusion of the league Fourth seeds: The next four highest ranked teams at the conclusion of the league There is one exception - the previous year's Tailteann Cup winner (Westmeath, 2022) if not already qualified as one of the teams, will be eligible instead of the lowest ranked fourth seeded team following the conclusion of the Allianz Football League.

The remaining 16 teams, who don't advance to the All-Ireland SFC, will compete in the Tailteann Cup. New York will enter the Tailteann Cup at the preliminary quarter-final stage.

All-Ireland SFC

During the Round One group phase (16 teams - 4 groups of 4) the schedule of matches is predetermined with each team playing one home and one away game in the opening two rounds. Round Three fixtures will be played at neutral venues.

Game 1: Seed 1 v Seed 3, Seed 2 v Seed 4: Game 2: Seed 3 v Seed 2, Seed 4 v Seed 1 Game 3: Seed 1 v Seed 2, Seed 3 v Seed 4 Twelve counties (Top 3 in each group) will advance to the All-Ireland SFC knockout stages.

The preliminary quarter-finals will consist of the second placed teams being at home to third place teams. At the quarter-final stage the four group winners will meet the preliminary quarter-final victors.

Cork 0-19 Meath 3-14 - Round 1

The concession of three goals proved disastrous for Cork's chances in their opening game in Division Two of the Allianz National Football league in Páirc Uí Chaoimh. Cork had started well, but conceded a goal early on against the run of play yet recovered to deservedly lead by 0-11 to 1-6 at half time and had been playing against the wind. Two goals for Meath in a devastating nine-minute burst in the second half turned the game on its head and Cork were a beaten outfit long before the final whistle. It was a bitterly disappointing outcome for Cork who had entered the game full of confidence after

their successful run in the McGrath Cup but defeat brings some reality to the present standing of Cork football in the overall national picture.

Cork led by 0-11 to 1-6 at the end of an entertaining first half, Steven Sherlock was the standout figure, and Cork had enjoyed plenty of possession, attacking at will and earning a high return in the shooting stakes, registering just one wide. It took a while for Cork to resume their scoring flow on the restart but three in a row, from Chris Óg Jones, a Sherlock free and Powter, had them 0-14 to 1-8 clear only for Meath to come roaring back for a deserved victory.

Allianz Hurling League - Round 1

Shane Kingston scored an 80th-minute winner as a strong second-half revival saw Cork take the points in their Allianz Hurling League Division 1 Group A opener against Limerick at Páirc Uí Chaoimh before a fine attendance of 19,516 patrons.

Cork were eight points in arrears at half time but hugely aided by goals from Robbie O'Flynn and Declan Dalton managed to hit the front by the three quarter stage before they lost Robbie O'Flynn to a serious ankle injury which caused 10 minutes of injury time to be added and on resumption four points moved Limerick into a 0-22 to 2-14 lead. Cork battled on however and Patrick Horgan's tenth point was followed by a first from Conor Lehane. Late in time added (79th minute!) Horgan provided the pass for Shane Kingston to create space and shoot the winner.

Both sides had seven of the same starters as in their last 2022 championship outings - Cork's All-Ireland guarter-final loss to Galway and Limerick's final win over Kilkenny. In the first half Limerick looked to be the better team by far and led by 0-16 to 0-8 at the break. Limerick had availed of their chances, Cork had not done so with nine wides in the half, and the contest looked to be destined to be going the way of the All Ireland champions. Patrick Horgan was the outstanding Cork forward but even the Glen Rovers star had wasted some scorable opportunoties.

Within 11 minutes of the restart, delayed by the non emergence of Limerick to the annoyance of the huge attendance, Cork were back on level terms. After a Horgan point from a free, Robbie O'Flynn fired home a great shot, David Reidy had his sixth for Limerick in reply, Horgan had two more Cork points and then Declan Dalton lashed a ground shot to the net. Points were exchanged, Ciaran Joyce landed a huge point from distance to put the home side in front for the first time to the delight of the home following. Another from Horgan left it 2-14 to 0-18 before another Reidy point and then the long injury delay. When the action resumed, Limerick levelled and went two clear but Cork came back for a memorable victory. Cork were not perfect but they did turn in a fine spirited second half performance urged on by the enthusiastic supporters and should benefit in confidence from the win.

Cork captain Seán O'Donoghue, playing well, had to retire with a leg injury after the opening half hour, Blarney's Shane Barrett came on in attack in the second half and was effective.

Next up for Cork is Galway in Salthill.

1982 - A MEMORABLE YEAR FOR MACROOM

Forty years ago Macroom GAA was celebrating a unique and historic year for the club. Macroom were 1982 County Intermediate (now Premier) Football champions and to complete an historic double, the Macroom Under 21 footballers won the County U21 Football Championship.

Macroom had made a very disappointing first round exit from the 1981 championship but the team held together and won the league title by defeating Nemo Rangers in January of 1982. In the first round of the county intermediate championship in May, the Mid Cork side were too strong for Adrigole and won well on a 3-13 to 1-5 scoreline. In the quarter final, played at Coachford in late June, a very strong St Finbarrs team with then current Cork seniors in Christy Ryan and Tadgh Reilly in its ranks, was defeated on a score of 0-9 to 1-2 after a fine display from Macroom. Michael Moloney and Tom Creedon wre dominant in defence, Colman Corrigan and Mickey Browne starred at midfield as Macroom went into a 0-6

to 0-1 interval and remained in control all though the second half. This game was played at Church Road, a very determined Macroom dominated from the start and led by 1-7 to 0-2 at half time. Within nine minutes of the restart Grange were only three points adrift as the rains poured down but Leo Goold halted the slide with a point from a free after a foul on Conor Goold. In the 43rd minute a fast Macroom movement saw Leo Goold and Tony O'Sullivan combine to release Gerry Fitzgerald and the latter's well placed shot hit the net and restored Macroom's dominance. In the final, played at Cloughduv on October 31st , Macroom were in top form and defeated Bandon by 1-12 to 1-8, a thoroughly deserved victory on the day. Macroom led by 0-6 to 0-4 at half time, Leo Goold in scoring form and on the restart Leo finished a move started by Eamonn Goold, progressed by Barry Lynch, to shoot a goal which ignited Macroom once again. Macroom were not going to be caught thereafter and a late 1-1 for Bandon only improved the appearance of the scoreboard.

Seán Mac Suibhne, Cork Co Board, presented the Cup to Macroom captain Tom Creedon. It was the first time ever Macroom have won this championship.

LEGAL IMPLICATIONS OF A BROKEN ENGAGEMENT

Most couples get engaged before they get married.

If the engagement is broken (called off) and there is a dispute between the couple over property or finances, the Family Law Act 1981 allows them to take legal action against each other. The Act also allows an involved third party (such as a family member) to take legal action. Before the Family Law Act 1981 came into effect, an engagement was considered a legally binding contract. This meant that, if the engagement was broken without lawful justification, the person responsible could be sued for damages for breach of promise. Since the 1981 Act, you cannot take legal action for breach of promise following a broken engagement. These rules relate to engaged couples. Cohabitation (living together) does not necessarily mean that a couple is engaged to marry.

What happens gifts which had been exchanged between the engaged couple? When two people who are engaged give gifts (including an engagement ring) to each other, there is a presumption that the gifts will be returned (if requested), should the engagement end. However, if the giver dies, it is presumed any gifts were given without

any conditions. In this case, the surviving fiancé(e) can keep the gifts.

You can contest either of these presumptions in court if there is evidence to the contrary. These presumptions only apply to gifts given during the engagement. They do not apply to gifts given before or after the engagement.

What happens gifts from a third party?

If someone gives an engaged couple (or one of the couple) a wedding gift, it is presumed that the couple are joint owners. This can be contested if there is evidence to the contrary. It is also presumed that the gift will be returned (if requested), should the engagement end and the marriage does not take place for any reason. This includes the death of one of the engaged couple.

If a third party gives a substantial benefit (not a wedding gift) to one of the couple as a result of the engagement, the third party can take legal action if the engagement ends. For example, if a relative carries out or pays for substantial work to improve a property which the couple had intended to use as their family home, the relative can apply to the courts for compensation.

Can somebody claim compensation for wedding preparation expenses if the wedding is cancelled?

Where an engagement has ended and one of the couple has incurred substantial expenses in preparation for the marriage (and has not benefited from the expenses), that person may apply to the courts for compensation from their ex-fiancé(e). Examples of expenses might include:

• Booking the wedding reception • Booking the honeymoon • Hiring a photographer or videographer A third party (for example, a family member or friend) who incurs expenditure on behalf of one of the couple in preparation for the marriage and has not benefited, may also apply to the courts for compensation.

What are the property rights of engaged couples when the engagement ends?

When a couple (whose engagement has ended) disagrees about the division of property, it is treated in the same way as disputes between a married couple who are separating or divorcing. This only applies to property in which either or both of them had a beneficial interest while they were engaged. It does not apply to property acquired after the engagement ended.

What are the options for legal action?

If your engagement has ended and you want to take legal action, you must do so within 3 years. Such cases are usually heard in the Circuit Court. However, if very valuable property is involved, you may ask that it be heard in the High Court. Legal actions in relation to substantial, non-wedding gifts from a third party (or wedding preparation expenses), can be brought in the District Court if the amount sought is under €15,000.

Christ is the Greek translation of the Hebrew word 'Messiah' - which means the 'Anointed One'. So Jesus Christ / Messiah Yeshua means: the Anointed One who rescues, saves. heals, delivers and restores. Yeshua is prophesied as God's Saviour throughout the Old Testament, and in the New Testament He is revealed as God's Son - the Lamb of God Who took away our sins and Redeemed us with His sinless Blood. "God decided in advance to adopt us into His own family by bringing us to Himself through Jesus Christ" (Ephesians 1:5 NLT) with the result that "....in Him we have Redemption through His Blood, the forgiveness of our sins, according to the riches of His Grace" (Ephesians 1:7).


