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

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DETAILS OF MACROOM ST. PATRICK'S WEEK FESTIVAL

11TH – 17TH MARCH 2023 ANNOUNCED

The St. Patrick's Week Festival Committee which is by a combo from the Woodland String Band is a sub committee of the Lee Valley Enterprise Board announced details of this year's festival which starts on Saturday March 11th with the Flower of Macroom contest taking place in the Castle Hotel Ardilaun Suite at 8.00pm. The contest was last held in 2020 and was deferred in 2021 and 2022 due to Covid restrictions. The last winner of the Flower of Macroom was Lilly Healy and she will hand over her crown to the new winner on the night. All the contestants will be presented and interviewed by Alf Mc Carthy formally of RTE and the winner will receive a cheque for €500 and will have the honour of being the Grand Marshall of the 2023 St Patrick's Day Parade. While the judging is taking place music will be provided

Thickets costing €10 for this event will be on sale shortly. Macroom will be buzzing for the whole week with the arrival of 125 Americans from Philadelphia who will be accompanying a strong 30 member Woodland String Band for this year's parade.

GREEN SCHOOLS PROJECT, NEW CYCLE **PARKING**

McEgan College has started work on their twoyear cycle to achieve the Travel Flag as part of the Green Schools Programme. In September, Ms. Murphy and the school committee applied for a cycle rack shelter. We recently received the news that McEgan College will

receive a 20-space toast rack and shelter from Green-Schools. The total cost is €9,545 and An Taisce - (National Trust for Ireland) will fully cover the costs. McEgan College aims to increase the percentage of students and staff who use cycling as a sustainable means of travelling to school. The bike rack will provide a safe dry space to park bikes and scooters. The bike rack will also be open to use for all bike users who wish to park their bikes while they are in the town. Works on the project will start with a site visit in February 2023 and ground works will hopefully commence toward the end of spring 2023.


FOOTBALL NEWS

What Alternative is there to using pesticides?

Hi, Chris Barrett back again. Readers may remember I recently spoke with James Walsh who helped clarify the laws concerning pesticides for us. I believe he left readers in no doubt as to the many results of illegal spraying, and showed how there will be an even stricter pan-European approach very soon. So we growers, need to be ready to move on for the sake of our country and the planet.

It is with this information in mind, that I am fortunate to be speaking with Caroline Robinson who is showing us a successful alternative to pesticide spraying, both on the farm and in the garden.

She reminds me that one of the issues which has encouraged the use of spraying, has been our overfocusing on tidiness and a desire to control rather than work in tandem with nature. The dangers of spraying to try and control have been mentioned in the article with James Walsh.

Caroline believes that it is our mindset that we need to change. We would do well to relax and appreciate all of the variety in nature. What were once regarded as "weeds" could be best regarded as wild plants, or simply plants in the wrong place.

I am reminded by her, that the timing of weeding is critical. The secret is to weed like mad when the crops are small; and once they are big enough to fight their corner let them be.

What are the Advantages of not using Pesticides?

*The wild plants cover the ground and prevent soil erosion.





*The wild plants will provide nutrition for wild animals and

*The parallel growth occuring between the wild plants and

crops, enhances the growth of the crop. This is because wild plants attract different bacteria. These release nutrients which the crop takes up and by doing so, gains improved growth.

*Wild plants will invariably send their roots down deeper which allows them to draw up different nutrients, which in turn will become available to the crop.

*Wild plants will aerate the soil to a deeper level and useful creatures such as earhworms will benefit from this aeration.

*The wild flowers and their seeds will attract beneficial insects such as beetles, hoverflies and ladybirds which will help the grower by eating such pests as greenfly.

*There will be an increase in birds who also consume a large number of pests and are paricularly attracted by wild plant seeds.

Growers of crops e.g grain without the use of pesticides, (as we all should be doing now), need to be aware that they will need to use taller



varieties which will grow up above the weeds. Another way of reducing pests is to plant a mixture of varieties rather than a monoculture... It is not so long since the 1800s when a single variety of potato, the Lumber, was planted all over Ireland and easily succumbed to blight.

There are of course many advantages to wild plants and the article concerning the stinging nettle with Majella O'Riordan showed us the many benefits of nettles. There are, of course, many other plants such as dandelion and chickweed which have proven cleansing and healing properties. By stopping spraying we can enjoy cooperating with nature rather battling against it. It is as Caroline has shown us, a win-win situation for all! I would like to thank Caroline for sharing her time and knowledge with us and look forward to speaking with her in the future.

recently visited the house I grew up in from the age of 9 to the time of my marriage at 22 years old - so young!! I imagine it will be my last time in the house, so I was a little nostalgic and of course I have a lot of memories from that time. There were around 10 or 12 children around my own age living in the immediate area - around the green. Our childhood games were punctuated with what was happening around us at any point in time. There was a large green area in front of our houses with a big tree to one side. So, when there was formula one racing on T.V. we had our own formula one track around the green on our bicycles where we would peddle furiously in the hopes of passing the flag first (who ever was youngest usually was the flagman). During the show jumping season we built our own jumps, fences and water obstacles out of whatever we could find in gardens and garages and the green became the RDS arena and we launched ourselves over those jumps to shouts of encouragement although there were a lot of stewards enquiries as to whether the jump was badly constructed or knocked. In July, clutching our tennis rackets, we became Billie Jean King and Jimmy Connors as we rewrote Wimbledon. And then there were the battles, each time the grass in the green was cut, the green became a battle zone. We built grass forts from which we launched battles on the forts of the others. Our fort building became quite good with some resembling grass igloos with tunnels and escape hatches. If you needed to discuss something of importance or interest with just one or two of the gang we would meet, under the tree, in the tree, around the tree



- and by the time one or two gather as planned, the whole gang would descend in support. The Summer Holidays from school were long and the craic was mighty, and you didn't have to go home until the streetlights came on which was latish during the Summer. We survived without, phones, tablets, computers etc. We went home with splinters, green stains on our clothes and lots of cuts and bruises and big smiles on our faces. Well at least that what it seems like thinking back and I like that version of my memories.

Of course on the days that the rain came I kept company, with Julian, Dick, Anne, George and Timmy the dog – a.k.a The Famous Five, Nancy Drew and The Hardy Boys and I mean the books not the TV series which were never as good as the books! We had comics too - now known as graphic novels – and we used to pass them around to all our friends. There was a library within walking distance and in the mid-70's it was quite safe to leave us 10 to 12-year olds wander down to the library in Douglas village all by ourselves either walking on in our formula one cars (remember? the bicycles!). But that's a story for another day!

Whether it's a wet day or a sunny day you are always welcome to visit Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne where you will find a great selection of books, DVD's, newspapers and events to keep you busy. 



A LOCALS PERSPECTIVE "Macroom Needs a Bypass" – We got one, so what's next?

As a kid, I remember being warned of "the road". I was born in the early 80's and grew up in the heart of Macroom, close to the bus station on Railway View. My 4 siblings were always told not to let me out of their sight in case I wandered anywhere near it, which was guite possible since we could see if from every window in our house. The road was made out to be this deadly monster that would swallow kids alive if you turned you back on it. It struck the fear of God in me. You were not left outside the front door unless you were holding someone's hand. As I grew older, the traffic got worse, and I began to understand just how deadly it was. As my nieces and nephews grew from babies to toddlers to kids I became nervous of them every time they left the house in case one stepped out. My mother petitioned the council for years for bollards to be put outside our front door to stop cars, lorries and busses mounting the footpath and taking one of us out.

The road was a constant in our lives, our homes were only separated from the main Cork to Kerry national route by a 3-foot-wide footpath (less in places). It completely divided the street in 2, you could be ages trying to cross so why even bother. I can remember when the first set of traffic lights and pedestrian crossing came at the bottom of chapel hill - what a godsend! The crossing at the bridge and the square soon followed and gave people some chance to cross the deadly monster.

Every day, hundreds of students would get off busses and walk to one of the 3 secondary schools in Macroom. Some had a short stroll to St Marys, others a bit longer to Bishop McEgan College and the rest, the longer jaunt to De La Salle. No matter what school you went to if you got to town by bus or from my side of the street you had to cross the road at least once. In the case of De La Salle you'd have to cross it twice (in the times before the new pedestrian bridge)! I can remember those years of walking to school and crossing the main bridge in Macroom - 300 teenagers on what seemed like the narrowest footpath ever. You'd try to walk 2 abreast but, every now and again, the wing mirror of a car or truck would hit you a slap. Lads being lads, one would pretend to push the other onto the road to give them a fright but hold them back. I honestly don't know how there wasn't more serious accidents on that bridge.

Living on the road was a nightmare - constant traffic during the day and when the road surface wore down we had to live with the resurfacing works by Cork City Council which would generally start at 10pm and go right through the night until 5am. It was like clockwork, every 4 years or so and would last a week. Try getting up to go to school when you've been listening to a tarmac roller all night.

When I moved to the city in 2001 to study Engineering in UCC, there were 2 things that struck me the most: 1. the amount of Kerry people in my class and 2. how every single one of them reacted when I told them I was from Macroom. "That bloody place, I'm stuck in it every weekend" and "I never stop there, I just want to get through it as fast as I can which is usually an hour". It was then I began to realise that Macroom didn't just need a bypass so the people of the town could breathe again, it was needed for the entire Cork and Kerry region. It was also around that time I started noticing the signs on the side of the road either side of the town - "Macroom needs a bypass".

Fast forward 10 years to 2011 and when I started my current job in the city and the narrative didn't change much - "Macroom? When is that place ever getting a bypass". It was sad how my hometown had just become synonymous with traffic and negative connotations - I might as well have told people I'm from the Jack Lynch tunnel at 4pm on Friday or the M50 on a rainy morning. I used to sweeten everybody up by saying "Ya I know it's shocking, but you know the short cuts don't you"? I would then draw them a map of the unofficial bypasses of Coolyhane or Raleigh and I would be their new best friend (sorry to everyone who lives there but I wasn't the only one at it).

I've lived in the city since I left for college in 2001 but moved back to Railway View in September last year while our house in Cork is getting some work done. I had completely forgotten of how bad the traffic was. When we moved back 6 months ago before the bypass opened we rented a van to move our stuff. I left it until late on a Friday evening so the traffic wouldn't be too bad and parked on the only parking spaces across the street. I'm not exaggerating when I say we had to walk out in front of cars to make them stop to let us cross - it's amazing how people wont stop when you're trying to cross with a couch in your hands!

Having lived on the side of the N22 for the first 20 years of my life I now found myself back there again 3 months before the bypass was due to open. It was like I had never left - the house still shook through the night as the trucks barrelled through town. Even going for a walk in the dark evenings was not giving the desired stress relief after a long day's work- the constant traffic at your shoulder, fumes, noise and splashes along the route to the Auld Triangle and back was not pleasant. Then 9thDecember came - the day the whole town had been waiting for, the bypass finally opened. The difference was night and day. So, what's next? Since December there are no longer traffic queues either end of the town, no constant streams of cars passing through from Kerry on a Sunday which would

start at hotel check out time and go right till late evening as people made their way back to college, work, or home after the weekend. No more of the estimate 700-1.000 artic lorries a

Macroom no longer feels like a road but like an actual town. We can breathe, hear each other, and plan our days without having to worry about traffic. Someone complained to me recently that there's still traffic in Macroom, but cars were never going to disappear altogether. What we are left with is good traffic, its local people who live in and around the town coming to Macroom which keeps a market town ticking. Local businesses have said they are busier since the opening and for some unknown reason there is always loads of available parking all of a sudden.

Unfortunately, since the bypass opened speeding has become an issue as cars can move freely. It's obvious that the road needs to be re-surfaced - anyone who has walked the street on a rainy day will testify to that. But we will have got it all wrong if the road is just resurfaced and nothing else is done as what we need is a full public realm upgrade. Pedestrians, businesses, and residents need to be given their town back. We need to slow cars down and reverse the trend where priority was given to cars passing through over the years. We need wider footpaths, safer raised pedestrian crossings (and more of them), narrower junctions, flashing speed warning signs, outside dedicated spaces for cafés and restaurants. Full public realm upgrades like what we see in Ballincollig and other towns and village reinvigorate core town centres. It will be controversial, but the speed limit needs to be reduced to 30km/h (it soon will be in most towns and cities in Ireland anyway and the tend in Europe is to reduce it further to 20km/h in town centres). People comment that the night-time economy is dying in Macroom. When you look back at how bustling the town used to be you can see that the potential is there to give it a kick start again. Years ago, over 20 pubs and restaurants were packed every Thursday to Sunday, 2 nightclubs rocked, and multiple taxis moved people back and forth to Rylane, Coachford, Clondrohid, Kilmurry and loads in between. Slowly a lot of the pubs have closed but the population of Macroom and surrounding villages have grown so opportunity exists. There is leakage from Macroom as people now travel elsewhere to enjoy themselves. There are plenty of other, smaller towns that market themselves as food or pub or live music destinations and it works. We just need to find our opportunity and help it grow.

FUNDS TO HELP STOP FLOODING

Cork County Council announced last week that €60,000 has been allocated under the 2023 Climate Change Adaptation and Resilience Works to address some of the flooding issues that continue to affect Coachford village. €30,000 will go towards trying to sort the major flooding issues by the GAA pitch while another €30,000 will be spent on addressing the flooding issues in the village centre. Community Council chairperson, Maighread Ní Buachalla welcomed the funding saying "unfortunately flooding is an ongoing issue in Coachford and while improvements have been made over the years the village and its residents and businesses remain at risk of being flooded when there is prolonged heavy rainfall. The recent issues near the GAA pitch has meant people are unable to walk to the village along this stretch as the footpath has been submerged and the road and footpath remain in an appalling state with the last month as a result of the flooding. We welcome the funding for the council to carry out these essential works and would ask them to work as quickly as possible in making sure the works are implemented."









EU POSITION IN NORWEGIAN FISHING TALKS HARDENING IN IRELAND'S FAVOUR - MEP KELLEHER

- NO NORWEGIAN ACCESS TO IRISH WATERS WITHOUT A DIVIDEND TO IRISH FISHERS -

Fianna Fáil MEP, Billy Kelleher has said that, over the past week, he has felt a hardening of the EU position, in favour of Ireland, in the negotiations with Norway over fishing access.

Kelleher, an MEP from Ireland South, was speaking after repeated engagements with Irish fishing organisations over the past number of months.

"In discussions with officials from various Commission Units and MEPs from other Member States such as Denmark, Netherlands, Belgium and Germany, it's clear that there is growing solidarity with Ireland.

"Furthermore, Norwegian access to Irish waters cannot happen without a corresponding payment to Ireland.

"This is a good position for Ireland to be in, and a testament to the strong position the Irish Government, led by Fisheries Minister, Charlie McConalogue, and Irish fishing organisations have taken since before Christmas.

"The 5th round of negotiations are currently ongoing, and I am urging the Irish Government to "Irish fishers need a reciprocal payment, including additional quota, if Norwegian boats are to get access to more Blue Whiting in Irish waters. It's that simple: No Norwegian access

KELLEHER CALLS FOR IMMEDIATE INTERVENTION FROM THE EU TO REDUCE FERTILISER COSTS TO AVOID FURTHER FOOD INFLATION

INVESTIGATION NEEDED INTO POSSIBLE PRICE MANIPULATION BY SOME FERTILISER MANUFACTURERS AND IN WHOLESALE SUPPLY CHAIN

Ireland South MEP, Billy Kelleher has said that while an EU long term fertiliser strategy is needed; immediate intervention is needed in 2023 to avert a food security crisis and further food inflation for

Speaking in the European Parliament, Kelleher, a Fianna Fáil MEP, urged the EU Commission to address the excessively high input costs farmers are facing as they begin the 2023 planting season.

"Ultimately, many farmers are unable to purchase fertiliser at these excessively high prices. Nitrogen, phosphorus and potash prices are unsustainably expensive.

"Farmers who don't have the cash or the ability to secure credit to buy fertiliser will see reduced yields. At the end of the day, this ends up with higher food prices for consumers adding fuel to the fire to the inflation woes already facing the European Union.

"The EU has plenty of long-term plans - the Farm to Fork, Biodiversity, Sustainable Pesticides strategies, for example, but no short-term plan to support farmers reduce their input costs.

"Time is running out if we are to avoid food prices continuing to rise based on high input costs.

"Additionally, I have requested the Commission to investigate the possibility of price gouging and manipulation by some fertiliser manufacturers and in the wholesale supply chain. We need fair practices in the EU Single Market and if improper activities are unearthed, the Commission and Member States must act," concluded Kelleher.

GENEALOGY - OR IN OTHER WORDS THE TRACING OF ANCESTORS

Since my recent publication, Fallen Leaves, I am regularly asked what the book is about. However, when I say, it is based on my genealogy research, I am met with quizzical expressions. Perhaps it sounds too like geology and, therefore, I can hardly blame anyone for wondering why I have written a book about rocks and stones!

Yes, the term genealogy is relatively recent in Ireland, although Americans have been interested it for a very long time. It is a subject about which many of our grandparents, their parents and all the generations before them were experts. In fact, when I was a child, genealogy was regularly discussed around the fire at night with relatives and friends. It wasn't called genealogy then but 'tracing' relatives. Our forebears didn't have the luxury of computers, smart phones, websites and databases but many had an incredible knowledge about the people that went before them and some knew as much about the ancestors of their neighbours as well.

Simply put, genealogy is one's family tree - 'the study and tracing of one's line of descent' - our ancestors. Indeed the Irish were well ahead of most of the world in having a hereditary surname and had devised a very simple method of explaining an individual's family line. For instance, the late John B. Keane wrote about the matchmaker, Dan Paddy Andy O'Sullivan, which most probably refers to three generations: Dan's father was Paddy and Paddy's father was Andy. The family belonged to the Gaelic clan of O Súilleabháin.

The tracing of ancestors has become a hugely popular pastime in recent years, with any amount of information online and specialist websites, usually subscription. It is now also a recognised university course. Recently, I availed of a free online UCC weekend course which was wonderful and I was just one of over 100 participants from across the world. Like many of you, I have never been inside the door of a university but have been able to access and explore countless records and historical information through a number of good websites and in order to understand much of what I wanted to write about, every topic was available in books or online. Be warned though, once you become interested in tracing your family line, it can become quite addictive. As each generation is revealed, you will automatically want to go back to the generation before and the generation before that, as far back as records will take you, generally in Ireland about 200 years.

Most of us remember at least one of our grandparents. When my sister and I were very young, our grandmother came to live with us when she became too feeble to live alone. Remember the expression 'you can't put an old head on young shoulders?' Perhaps most of us will admit to being guilty of this in our youth, I know I most certainly was and how much I now regret not having an interest in my grandmother's life when she was here to tell us about it. However, even having a vague knowledge that she was a member of Cumann na mBan in her youth was sufficient to make contact with the Department of Defence. I previously wrote an excerpt from my book in the Lee Valley Outlook about her connection to the Kilmichael Ambush. By submitting evidence that I was a descendant of Ellen Cahalane (birth

and marriage records linking her to me), I was astounded to receive a folder of documents relating to my grandmother's application(s) for a military pension which revealed various duties she carried out as a member of the Aultagh Branch of Cumann na mBan of the 3rd West Cork Brigade. Through this information, I subsequently discovered that her three youngest brothers joined the Volunteers. Seven older siblings were resident in Massachusetts while the younger were rebels back home in Dunmanway.

If you are interested in finding out about the people from whom you are descended, my first piece of advice is, go ask your parents and grandparents if you're lucky enough you may even still have a living great grandparent.

When I first became interested in genealogy, I never envisaged writing a book based on my findings. My grandmother was just one of a number of individuals whom I found myself dwelling on and the times they lived in, the many obstacles they encountered and the events which shaped their lives. Having a great love of history and an understanding of how history shapes our lives now, it seemed only natural to begin thinking of my ancestors in the specific circumstances and events in which they found themselves. However, what was totally unexpected as a result of revealing all these names and dates in my family tree was the overwhelming love and understanding I began to feel for these people I had never known, something which I still feel deeply. It is as if there is this invisible umbilical cord which links me to dead ancestors. Neither is it unusual for me to find myself consulting with and talking to them too! In delving deeper into my ancestry, stories began to emerge which just begged to be told. For instance, one of my grandfathers had a particularly tragic young life and found himself 'sentenced' to an industrial school for five years. Yet my late mother never once mentioned this astonishing fact about her father and to this day I wonder if she even knew. If she did, such was the stigma around his childhood history that it was never mentioned. A man misunderstood and traumatised by events of which he was entirely innocent, the uncovering of Danny Healy's story and other ancestors has been life changing. Writing about these pivotal people in my ancestry has greatly helped me to understand and love the people from whom I'm descended.

Finding a famous ancestor is something we would all love to discover and, no, I didn't find that movie star or inventor. However, I did discover a greatgrandaunt, Kate, who was born in Dunmanway in 1850 but went on to own a hotel in Cork City in the late 1800s, which was very unusual for a woman at that time; a distinctive building I had always admired but never knew we had a connection to. The newspaper archives have been invaluable in discovering so much of this information. Kate's grandson, whom I met but once, served two terms as Lord Mayor of Cork and was a well liked and respected politician whose involvement in the arts and culture of the city is well attested. No, not famous, but far more importantly, someone whom I've become very proud of for his contributions to his native city. Sustaining a disability in childhood, yet, despite this, he worked tirelessly for the disadvantaged and handicapped of Cork. It is this family line which I am led to believe stretches back to the 1500s and to particularly im pressive West Cork tower house (castle). 'High notions like the goats in Kerry', I can hear my late mother mutter! Perhaps the most puzzling



discovery was of Nora Cahalane White and children

two granduncles

that left the beautiful countryside of Kilmurry to work in the mines in Butte, Montana. Together with their first-cousin and a friend, I still cannot fathom how they departed 'The Flourishing States' to work in one of the most dangerous occupations in the world, thousands of feet underground in a maze of dark tunnels, inhaling toxic fumes and particles, falling rocks and horrendous working conditions. For one of these adventurous young men, it ended in calamity.

Strangely, we actually know more than we realise. Snippets of conversations or remarks from decades ago, come back to you and when you start piecing it together, armed with the actual names, addresses and significant dates you've uncovered, everything can just slot into place. Even if your parents are deceased, there may be a relative or elderly neighbour still alive who may know more than you realise. Just ask. Generally, you can expect to find Catholic Church records from the 1820s and, in some instances, even the late 1700s. Civil records began in 1864. Joining an ancestry DNA database has been instrumental in matching with several close relatives in the United States, the UK and Switzerland -some of whom we still have to figure out just how we're related. Now, too, I can name most of the people in my grandmother's folder of old photographs from over a century ago. I cannot recommend tracing your ancestors enough. More than a list of names and dates, it is the stories of their lives that will impart a deep understanding of your roots and the people who's DNA you share. From these people you inherited your looks, eye and hair colour, traits, skills and interests. Quite literally, they are of you and you of them. What's more, my experience on this journey is an unwavering belief that long dead ancestors want to be found. In order for their stories to be told, it was often uncanny how information came to hand and like a jigsaw, pieces just slotted together. For ten years, or more, I've kept company more with the dead than the living but it has been a privilege to do so.

There is another bonus in embarking on this quest and that is discovering living relatives for the first time and in some cases finding an instant bond and an ease of rapport as if we have known each other always. One of whom, Drew, a 2nd cousin, became crucial to getting Fallen Leaves over the line. Two others have written several history books between them. Bloodlines are extraordinary: an invisible thread reaching to earliest mankind and right up to the present because of our shared DNA. DNA is an entirely other story which I may tell you about soon!

Mixing it with "The Lilywhites" - Newbridge or Nowhere By PO'C

For me there was something special about football games between Cork and Kildare, perhaps it was their all white jerseys or their popular name "The Lilywhites". Apparently one of their first contests was in 1928 when Kildare had a decisive victory 3-7 to 0-2 in the All Ireland Senior Football Semi Final played at the Cork Athletic Grounds, I can recall the first time I heard Miceal O'Hehir and his famous commentaries on the radio in the month of August 1956 of the Cork v Kildare game in the All Ireland Semi Final. With my brother Tom, we walked the two miles of roadway to the Lucey family Curraleigh to hear the story of that great encounter.

Jerry Lucey and some neighbours including Con Walsh had been out Road Bowling on the untarred road and I can recall them entering the kitchen and placing the Bowl in a special corner for safe keeping. Mick Gould, from nearby Macroom, played an outstanding game at wing back and in the second half he moved upfield with the ball. Miceál duly commented "Mick Gould has the ball, he takes a long kick but it goes over the line and wide", Cork won the game on the scoreline of 0-9 to 0-5 but were unlucky to lose to Galway in the Final by 2-13 to 3-7.

The "terrible twins" Sean Purcell and Frank Stockwell starred for the Tribesmen while Toots Kelleher scored two goals and Johnny Creedon, who had strong Clondrohid connections, scored the third.

In 1965 Kildare had a 2-11 to 1-7 victory over a strong Cork side in the All Ireland U21 Football Final. Former Kildare natives Larry Tomkins and Shay Fahy played a leading role in helping the Rebels secure the Sam Maguire in 1989 and 1990.

Shay was coach to the Clondrohid football team that won the Muskerry Junior Football Title in 1995. At the height of his career with Cork Larry was a frequent visitor to Clondrohid attending Summer Camps and presenting medals to our underage teams.

The most recent contest with the Lilywhites was at Newbridge on Sunday February 5th. It was a clear fresh Spring morning as I set out from Ovens on the 224 Kms. trip to St Conleth Park. After five minutes I was on the South Ring motorway and got safely through the Jack Lynch Tunnel and the intricate Dunkettle Interchange. Travelling on the motorway I bypassed Fermoy, Watergrasshill, Rathcormack, Mitchelstown, Kilbehenny, Skeheenarinky, Cahir, Cashel, Horse and Jockey, Urlingford, Durrow, Portlaoise, the Curragh Racecourse before I finally turned off for Newbridge and safely parked up on Main Street in ample time for the game.

I had left The Rebel County and passed through Limerick, Tipperary, Kilkenny and Laois encountering two Toll Bridges, the Golden Vale, The Galtees, The Knockmealdowns and much more beautiful scenery. I also saw many Cork registered vehicles on the roadway as far as the Thurles area but on Main Street Newbridge the famous Red and White colours were conspicuous by their absence. As I entered St Conleth Park I was a greeted with a large mural reading "Newbridge or Nowhere" (no doubt a reminder of the famous victory of the Lilywhites over Mayo to reach the All Ireland Semi Final in 2018). I quietly slipped into the unseated area of the Stand and positioned myself with the support of the crush barrier. (The seated area had been long since filled to capacity). I gently exchanged greetings to the surrounding hoards

of Kildare supporters - It was no day for making

The Rebels were first on the pitch and after a short while the Lilywhites emerged to a rousing reception. Conditions were perfect as referee Jerome Henry from the Castlebar Mitchell's club in Co Mayo threw in the ball. The Cork side played with great intensity and by half time led by 1-8 to 0-2. The second half had a similar pattern and we had a resounding victory 2-14 to 0-7.

The Cork lads and their few loyal supporters were delighted, none more so than the grandparents of mid-fielder Colm O'Callaghan namely John O'Sullivan and Donal O'Callaghan. Both travel to all his games, John from the Barony of Duhallow where he enjoyed his playing days and also gave many great displays in Gaelic Park New York. I well remember a strong sturdy good humoured Donal O'Callaghan coming to Clondrohid creamery in the 1970's with his blue Hyno truck from Brown & Gilmer Merchants Cork delivering ingredients for the manufacture of the "White Deer" feedstuffs some fifty years ago.

The journey home was very pleasant as I tuned into the various match reports on the radio. I made a few phone calls to review the game with some long time Cork supporters including Donal Holland and Jerry Barrett. Donal is a near neighbour and played many great games for his beloved Castletownbere. Jerry is another Duhallow native and is still an avid Rebels fan although residing in Mullinahone Co Tipperary for many years.

It was a great day for Cork football and here's wishing more bright days ahead. Rebels Abú.

Macroom GAA's Memorable 1982

In the previous edition of Lee Valley Outlook the outstanding achievement of Macroom GAA adult teams in completing an historic double in taking the Cork County (Premier) Intermediate Football title and the County A U 21 Football title in 1982 was recalled. The joy for the club that year was completed by the success of the Macroom U14

footballers who won the county title, defeating Inniscarra in the final at Coachford. Macroom had not won the county previously since 1967 and the trainer of that team, Bro Stanislaus Madigan, a De La Salle brother from St Colman's Boys NS, was present on this occasion to cheer on the new generation of Macroom footballers.

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

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
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MACROOM SOCCER CLUB

Mallow were the visitors to Murrayfield last week for the first home league fixture since November and the home side emerged victorious. 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

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Welcome back dear student, the power of prayer is misunderstood and faith is mocked in our 'woke' society.
