



Reader pens are useful for all age groups in the promotion of independent reading and would be of particular use to people with dyslexia or aphasia. They are also of use to anyone learning a new language or who might be experiencing problems with their vision. The pens would be useful at home, in school or in your local library. The Pens are straightforward enough to use and each pack contains a user manual with further information. 



WE-CONSENT, A NEW THREE-YEAR CAMPAIGN, IGNITES A NATIONAL **CONVERSATION ABOUT CONSENT**

- Dublin Rape Crisis Centre launches first National Consent Campaign aimed at driving a cultural shift and behavioural change in Ireland.
- 70% of people see a problem with sexual consent in Ireland
- · The campaign will inform, educate, and engage with all members of society about consent.

Dublin, 22 March 2023: Dublin Rape Crisis Centre (DRCC), alongside the Minister for Justice, Simon Harris TD, and Community Foundation Ireland, has today launched We-Consent, a long-term national campaign to inform, educate and engage with all members of Irish society about consent. It is among the first national consent campaigns targeting all demographic cohorts to be launched across the alobe.

This campaign will ignite an open and meaningful conversation about sex and relationships and build a greater understanding of consent. We-Consent will work broadly with groups and stakeholders from across the country across all demographics to ensure a non-judgmental conversation that is inclusive and rooted in the lives and experiences of real people.

Research undertaken by DRCC illustrated that 70% of people think we have a problem with consent in Ireland, while 1 in 3 people are embarrassed to talk about sex. The research also showed a misunderstanding of consent, with 1 in 5 people agreeing that sometimes people say no to sex when they want convincing.

According to the same research, 84% of people in Ireland agreed that we need age-appropriate sex education in school and 60% say consent is a responsibility for all society and needs state action. The qualitative research illustrated a strong desire amongst parents to empower their children when it comes to consent.

The research also suggested that moving the conversation towards sexual equality

will empower both men and women, leaving people feeling valued, respected and accepted. We-Consent is focused on positive thinking, encouraging everyone to participate in a meaningful and engaging conversation to achieve a cultural shift for the better.

We-Consent is funded by the Department of Justice and the Community Foundation Ireland. Speaking about the campaign, the Minister for Justice said:

"I am delighted to support the We-Consent campaign, which focuses on achieving a cultural shift and significant behavioural change. It's time for all of us to talk honestly and openly about consent, sex and relationships. We all have a role to play in this national conversation, regardless of age, gender, sexuality or relationship status. This campaign adds to the work that Government is doing in our Zero Tolerance Strategy on domestic, sexual and gender-based violence to achieve a society which does not accept these crimes or the attitudes which underpin them. My Department was very proud to support DRCC in undertaking the extensive research which has informed their approach to this and I would like to congratulate DRCC for bringing forward this ground-breaking campaign which I believe is representative of an evolving Ireland."

Noeline Blackwell, Chief Executive Officer, DRCC said:

"Sexual violence blights so many lives in Ireland - around a third of us have been directly harmed by it. Our aim in this campaign is to emphasise the positive values of consent which in turn can help reduce the levels of sexual violence. We believe a greater understanding of consent will make our society more equal, happier and healthier - as well as safer. Every one of us has capacity to learn more and do more when it comes to consent and this campaign will need every one of us to come on board to create a real shift in our society - not only for the next generation, but also for here and now. We believe this campaign will spark long overdue conversations about the kind of values we want to define us and the meaning of equality within our culture - Ireland is ready for these conversations."

Denise Charlton, Chief Executive, Community Foundation Ireland added:

"We-Consent marks the start of a long overdue conversation on sex and relationships. The Community Foundation Ireland was proud to partner with DRCC two years ago for ground-breaking research which showed that while 70% of people believe Ireland has a problem with consent, there is also a huge lack of understanding. With this campaign, we will together bridge that information gap. Conversations will be sparked in homes, workplaces, pubs and clubs bringing a spotlight on an issue which has been ignored for too long."

The We-Consent campaign will run for the next three years with workshops and communication initiatives planned nationally to help inform and engage the population. Information will be provided with the aim of informing open, inclusive and progressive conversations.

JERRY SDR WISH



Oliver O Shea, his wife Emma and their family are looking for your help. This is their story.

Our son Jerry was born at 29 weeks, weighing a tiny 1.6kg and spent the first 6 weeks of his life in the NICU. He was diagnosed with a brain injury (PVL) at 4 weeks old, which led to a diagnosis of right hemiplegic spastic cerebral palsy. It is difficult for Jerry to use the muscles on the right side of his body, making many daily tasks much harder. He wears an AFO (brace/splint) on his right leg by day and a cast on it by night, he also wears a splint on his right hand by night.

Jerry has been accepted to St Louis Children's Hospital in the U.S for SDR surgery. Selective Dorsal Rhizotomy (SDR) is an operation used to reduce spasticity (muscle stiffness) in some children with Cerebral Palsy.

Spasticity has an impact on motor function and quality of life. It can affect gait, cause pain and contribute to muscle contractures which can lead to deformities. It leads to premature aging. Nerve fibres running from the muscles to the spinal:

cord play a major role in maintaining the typical muscle stiffness seen in spasticity. SDR is a surgical procedure performed on these spinal nerve fibres to reduce levels of spasticity in the legs. SDR is not available in Ireland. We will need to stay in St Louis for 4 weeks. To get the most benefit from SDR, Jerry will need intensive physio for 2 years post surgery. https://gofund.me/b86d6f15

To help us reach the huge target of €85,000 we started a gofundme at the start of February. We have been blown away by the support this has received, the kindness of our community, friends, family and total strangers will never cease to amaze us. 

Some light was shone on the matter in a recent article in the Irish Examiner which was worryingly entitled 'Barrier at Macroom's water treatment plant may not keep out microscopic https://www.irishexaminer.com/news/ munster/arid-41056445.html The article seemed to ask more questions than it answered and so I decided to speak with Michael, an inhabitant of Macroom and also a keen fisherman, who has researched in some depth the water issues which involve Macroom, and is willing to share his knowledge with readers. Many readers will be only too aware that the situation regarding the water in Macroom has not started recently. About 10 years ago, Michael first noticed changes in the water in Ballyvourney, about 200 yds downstream of the Co-op towards Macroom. It was around August 2012. He spotted something which could not have beeen a natural occurrence. The water had turned white. He monitored the situation and made his father who was also a fisherman aware of it. They were able to see that trout were turning white and were so sluggish that you could reach down with your hand and catch them. The spot involved was 200 yds downstream of the pumphouse in Ballyvourney. The next Spring, in April or May 2013 many locals sighted unfiltered-waste from the water treatment unit behind Coleman's Park, Macroom, which was entering the Sullane. It was apparent even then that the pump-house was out of date and totally inadequate for various reasons. People with knowledge concerning the capacity of the water-treatment plant say that it is simply not sustainable for the rising population in the town of Macroom. Unfortunately, it has so far been nearly impossible for an individual to follow the trail and find out exactly who is responsible for maintaining

known is that the water system is being patched up on an emergency basis, rather than being resolved with a long-term sustainable solution. People may be shocked to learn that there is also a barely visible pump-house/containment unit just behind the Fairy Garden. It is unlikely that this will ever be able to deal adequately with the needs of the expanding Macroom population. In October when most of the children have left the Fairy Park and the fishing season is over, a different kind of activity takes place. Pump trucks appear every half hour or so to pump out the slurry which at times can clearly be seen to turn the river white around the Fairy Park outlet. When it rains, the outlet pipe is mysteriously openend and the excess waste water gets released into the Sullane. It is this which causes the river to look white or grey. This contamination is very dangerous to the environment and it is very worrying to think our young children could be playing so close to such a health threat. By cleaning the unit after heavy rains, the white water then gets washed away into the Sullane. If there is any doubt as to its deadly contents, baby wipes and toilet paper can be picked off trees at the height of a man. These can remain for weeks on the river bank until the next flood. A bare tree with toilet paper on it is not a Christmas tree, nor an asset to the children in the Fairy Park. Urgent action is needed. So what can we do? Inhabitants of Macroom can keep an eye on thes water-outlets and record illegal events with their cameras. The outlet at the Fairy Park is hard to spot. You will need to come out of the gate of the Fairy Garden going towards Macroom town. You will find the unit in line with an old building underneath the river bank. Every riverbank in Ireland is public, unless privately owned and so these units are available to be monitored by local people, dog-walkers, fishermen, parents with

children and all those who care about nature. It is obvious that EU legislation is being broken, and also Irish legislation regarding the preservation of water quality in rivers. Nutricia has already been fined for releasing contaminated water which goes via the Gearagh through the Lee into the Reservoir. If local people wish to make a complaint, the EPA, Environmental ProtectionAgency, IFI, Inland Fisheries Ireland, (01 8842600) but particularly The Water Framework Directive is where they should start. The European Water Framework Directive is available to be contacted by phone (0761 065 262) http://watersandcommunities.ie It was adopted into Irish Law in 2003 and provides a comprehensive framework for water quality management across the EU. It is concerned with the protection of all our waters. Since speaking with Michael I have been made aware of two relevent pieces of information in an article written by Odile Evans in THE FARMERS JOURNAL 12/05/2018 ...and Nutricia Infant Nutrition which is owned by Danone, has been fined for water pollution this year. In the same period Irish water has also paid in the region of 80,000 euro for pollution offences." More generally Odile Evans also says in the same article "Irish Dairy processing companies have paid out 78,451 euro in fines this year as a result of water pollution investigations carried out by the EPA." I am very grateful to Michael, and thank him for the help he is giving us in trying to solve the water situation in Macroom. WALKING PACE

I think we all know that walking is a wonderful exercise. It benefits the body in so many ways, the muscles, the joints, the brain and much more. You may have taken up walking for exercise purposes and you may try to walk most days, or at least a few days a week. If you have, you may have wondered if you are walking briskly enough. Why is brisk walking particularly beneficial, and what is brisk? While walking at any pace is good for us, if we are

interested in promoting our cardiovascular health, it is better to walk at a brisk pace so that it raises our heart rate.

I have come across an article from Harvard Medical School which addresses the question of pace. They say new research suggests that a pace of about 100 steps per minute qualifies as brisk walking for most people. Of course, people are different, and unfit people will raise their heartrate sufficiently walking at a much slower pace. Older people will too, so it's only a rough guide taken from a review of 38 studies. If you have a mobile app that can count your steps it is then easy to divide the steps taken by the minutes walked. If you don't have an app you can count your steps while counting to ten and multiply by six.

Doctors often recommend a different method, the "rate of perceived exertion". This is related to what is called the 'modified Borg scale'. It is more widely known as walking while talking. The walking intensity levels are 1) Extremely easy - you can sing. 2) Very easy - you can easily speak in complete sentences. 3) Easy to Moderate - speech becomes broken. 4) Moderate - breathing becomes heavier. 5)Moderate - talking is difficult. While there are more levels 5) is fast enough for our purposes. Including a hill on the route will probably get most people to that stage of exertion especially if you don't drop your pace.

If you have a Fitbit (that you trust), it can provide : you with a measure of your heart rate.

The rule of thumb is that we calculate our maximum heartrate first, by taking our age from 220. I am 66 so my maximum heartrate is 220-66 =154. My target should then be to reach about 70% of my maximum for a short period while exercising. So, in my case 154 X 70% = 108. A short period in that range is sufficient. As I get fitter I may have to work harder to get my heart rate up to that pace. You may be thinking that is too technical. If so, just go with a friend, have a good chat, and notice the conversation becoming sparse on that hill!





COTTON & CHURCHILL: THE FASCINATING EXPLOITS OF CLONDROHID'S JAMES QUILL BY TIM O'SULLIVAN

As previously written about, James Quill (1891-1949), originally of Clondrohid, was the eldest brother of early Labour TD, insurance businessman, IT&GWU figure-head, large farmer, co-operative pioneer, and honorary secretary of the Cork Trades Union Council, Timothy Quill. Another younger brother, Daniel (a lifelong resident of Macroom), a champion angler and nurse, also followed his brothers into political organising with roles at a local and national level in the Labour Party and IT&GWU. Moving to Hyde, Cheshire, England as a teenager, he later became vice-president of a textile plant during the twilight years of British Imperial might, and would go on to become one of the most influential people in Great Britain during the course of his lifetime. A member of several local and national commercial and non-profit boards, it is James' role in the British trade union movement in which he packed his greatest punch. A natural-born leader, James broke through the deeply ingrained sense of anti-Irish and anti-Catholic prejudice across all classes of English society, and served as a trustee (legislative council) and executive council of two of Great Britain's largest trade union federations at the time, the first of these being the British Cardroom Amalgamation. He was one of the signatories to the National Apprentices Agreement in 1926. Spending almost three decades in the national spotlight, he frequently negotiated with British government ministers in Greater London for improvements to the working conditions and quality of life of millions of workers. A practical, astute, and highly intelligent man, he was a skilled negotiator, and nearly always reached agreements with the Master Cotton Spinners' Federation (the representative body of mill employers) to the satisfaction of ordinary rank-and-file members. Nonetheless, he was never afraid to turn to strike action, and shut down one of Britain's major industries on several occasions.

James also served as a trustee (legislative council) and an executive council member of the United Textile Factory Workers' Association, a federation of eight trade unions. Quill was heavily involved in an overhaul of the UTFWA structure in the early 1940s. as, according to the 'Manchester Evening News,' "the Legislative Council says that the problem of the reconstruction of the industry gives rise to the question of whether the trade union movement is up-to-date." These changes were made in response to widespread changes that occurred in British heavy industry during the course of World War II. A devout Roman Catholic, Quill, using his immense federation influence, oversaw anti-communist purges within the textile and factory unions during the 1930s and 1940s. At the 1943 annual conference of the UTFWA, held in the borough of Blackpool, north-west England, in May of that year, James put forward a motion to prohibit affiliation between members of the federation's affiliated unions with Communist organisations. The motion passed by over ninety-nine percent, as only nine members of affiliated unions within the entire federation voted against the ban, according to the 'Western Mail.'

The structural changes occurring in the industrial world in this decade would see some of Quill's most significant contributions take place. In November 1943, the 'Birmingham Daily Gazette' reported that the UTFWA had, during the course of the previous 18 months, produced a 50,000 report titled The Cotton-workers' Parliament, calling for the socialisation of the cotton industry, and "drastic reorganisation to meet post-war foreign competition and provide security of employment." In close co-operation with the two successive British governments of the 1940s, many of these measures would be implemented over the course of the next few years. The 'Aberdeen Press' reported in May 1945 that Quill had invited the the Trade Union Congress (TUC) and the National Council of Labour to explore the possibility of forming a Government Ministry specifically for the textile industry. Around this time, he also presented detailed plans for restructuring of the textile industry, based on The Cotton-workers' Parliament, to war-time national coalition figurehead, Sir Stafford Cripps MP, of the British Labour Party. Occurring two months ahead of a monumental general election, Sir Winston Churchill, the Conservation Party (Tory) Prime Minister of that coalition government, was outraged by this meeting, and argued with Quill on the matter at the Government Buildings, Whitehall, Westminster, Central London. Churchill allegedly did not wish for any radical overhaul of the industry, for fear it may effect the fortunes of mill owners who exported large amounts of cotton to the British Raj (India). Following the general election victory of the British Labour Party in July 1945, the new President of the Board of Trade (equivalent to the Minister for Enterprise), Sir Stafford Cripps MP, appointed James to the newly established Evershed Commission, chaired by Justice Raymond Evershed. Published in November 1945, it recommended major changes to the wages, arrangements and methods of work in the cotton industry. George Alfred Isaacs MP, Minister for Labour under Prime Minister Clement Attlee, speaking in the House of Commons, declared that "this report will be of the utmost value to the industry." It perhaps was beneficial to both stakeholders that Quill had been a chief organiser for the British Labour Party in northwest England, and that both the British Cardroom Amalgamation and the UTFWA sponsored several of their parliamentary candidates throughout the years, with most of them winning seats. Later, Quill was one of the negotiators of the Aronson Agreement, which became the wages structure for his section of the industry. In 1946, Quill was one of the signatories to the landmark forty-five hour national week agreement in the British cotton industry (reducing the working week from six days down to five days). Fighting until the very end, the day before his unexpected death, which occurred on Christmas Eve, 1949, Quill had been involved in contentious negotiations with cotton spinning and manufacturing employers.

MAKING A WILL

If you die without making a will, your estate will be distributed according to the law on succession. This means that your estate will be distributed between your surviving family members in the way that is set out in law. However, if you want to have a say over who inherits all or part of your estate, vou should make a will.

How do I make a will?

You can write a will yourself, or have a solicitor write it for you. There is no set cost for having a solicitor write your will, & you can get quotations on prices on a solicitor's website or by calling their offices. You may be able to save money by shopping around.

A solicitor can advise you about your will and can make sure that your will is legally valid. If you write your own will, you should make sure that it is valid.

What should my will contain?

You do not have to have your will in any set format. However, it is important that the will has the following:

- Your name & address.
- A statement that says you revoke or disown all earlier wills or codicils.
- The appointment of one or more executors, or people who will carry out your wishes in your will after you die, along with their names and addresses.
- Your will should be dated and signed by you and your witnesses.

What are the requirements about signing your will?

You have to sign your will in the presence of 2 witnesses. They have to sign the will to attest (witness) that you have signed the will. They do not have to see the contents of the will.

If you are unable to sign your will because you cannot write, you can make a mark that should be witnessed like a signature.

If you are physically disabled and are unable to sign or mark your will, you can direct an agent or representative to sign your will for you. Your agent must sign the will in your presence and on your direction and your two witnesses must be present.

The witnesses or their spouses/civil partners cannot benefit from the will.

What is the legal right share which the spouse is entitled to receive?

If you have left a will, and your spouse or civil partner has never renounced or given up their rights to your estate, then they are entitled to a legal right share of your estate. This legal right share is:

- One-half of your estate if you do not have children
- One-third of your estate if you do have children

Your spouse/civil partner does not have to go to court to get this share, as your executor must give this share where applicable.

What happens when there is no will?

If you die without leaving a will, then your estate will be distributed in accordance with the law of succession. The order in which your estate is distributed in these cases is set out in the Succession Act 1965.

If you are survived by:

- •A spouse or civil partner but no children (or grandchildren): your spouse or civil partner gets the entire estate.
- A spouse or civil partner and children: your spouse/civil partner gets two-thirds of your estate and the remaining one-third is divided equally among your children. If one of your children has died, that share goes to his/her children.
- Children, but no spouse or civil partner: your estate is divided equally among your children (or
- Parents, but no spouse, civil partner or children: your estate is divided equally between your parents or given entirely to one parent if only one is living.
- Brothers and sisters only: your estate is shared equally among them, with the children of a deceased brother or sister taking his/her share.
- Nieces and nephews only: your estate is divided equally among those surviving.
- Other relatives only: your estate is divided equally between the nearest equal relations.
- No relatives: your estate goes to the State.

Cork had Shane Barrett and Pádraig Power, both of Blarney in action. Mark Coleman (Blarney) is recovering from a long term injury and team captain Seán O'Donoghue of Inniscarra has been out of recent action due to injury but should be ready for championship.

Cork hurlers have had several disappointing outings in Nowlan Park in recent years, this was another one. The Rebels, unbeaten in their group 1A, came up against Kilkenny who had finished second to Tipperary in Group 1B, and Cork appeared not to have the determination to withstand the aggressive challenge of the home side who simply bullied them out of contention. 



Welcome back dear student. "What time I am afraid, I will trust in Thee. In God I will praise His Word, In God I have put my trust; I will not fear what flesh can do unto me" (Psalm 56:3-4 KJV). Everyone faces trials and turmoil that can cause us to feel fearful, but when we know and understand the promises of God, even though situations may rock you, yet the seed of God's Word that has been planted in your heart will rise to the surface and bring stability in the same way that the stabilisers on huge cruise ships kick into action in rough seas (Jeremiah 17:7-8). This is what Jesus meant when He said 'the Truth that you know and understand will set you free' (John 8:32). There's that promise again – freedom! This week Jews celebrate the Passover where the body and the blood of an innocent lamb saved God's people from destruction, and death and set them free from slavery (Exodus chapter 12). Not only were the Israelites protected from the spirit of death because of the blood of the lamb on their doorposts but, as they ate the meat of the lamb, their bodies were healed from all disease and infirmity. "There was not one feeble among them" as they left slavery behind (Psalm 105:37). This blemish free innocent lamb was a foreshadow of the real Lamb of God - the Messiah Yeshua, Who would later come to save God's people by giving His sinless body and blood so that we who believe in Him can be forgiven, delivered and set free - saved from the bondages of sin, fear and death (Hebrews 2:14-15) and healed from every disease and infirmity afflicting the body (Isaiah 53:4-5). We meditate upon the suffering the Lord Jesus endured as He was put on trial and found innocent, yet brutally beaten and crucified by His own people (Luke chapters 22, 23 & 24). Jesus taught His disciples as they celebrated the Passover meal together (the last supper), that no longer would they need to hope for Salvation in the first Passover lamb (the ritual), because now the True Passover Lamb of God was here ready to accomplish God's plan of Salvation (redeeming them into relationship). Jesus' sacrifice was once for all time and for all mankind both Jew and Gentile alike (1st Corinthians 5:7-8; Hebrews 10:9-18). Many people focus on the death of Jesus only, but friends - 'Jesus ain't dead' as the song says, for God raised Him from the dead! His disciples testified of His resurrection because they saw Him alive again (John chapters 20-21; Acts 5:30-32). People in every generation since testify that Jesus is alive because they have seen Him intervene in their lives, tangibly felt His Presence, and watched problems that seemed totally impossible change when they prayed and sought the Lord's help by calling upon His Name (Romans 10:13). Those who have felt the healing power of Jesus in their physical bodies can testify that yes, it's true - Jesus is alive and well, and He is still performing miracles today as He always has. "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8). This weekend don't let Resurrection Sunday just be about indulging in chocolate eggs or empty ritual friend, for God has so much more for you - a real relationship with the One Who gave it all for you to live
