



Aine is a Kerry artist and has been a member of the Tralee Art Group for many years, she has been involved with many local exhibitions in Kerry, including Siamsa Tíre, and the Great Southern in Killarney. She is a fluent Irish speaker, and often names her paintings with great pride. Aine works as a primary school teacher in Cork, but she takes inspiration for her art from Dingle, and West Kerry, her second home.

Her exhibition is titled 'Dóchas' and it is a collection of abstract, acrylic pieces. We would be delighted if you would call in for a visit to see her wonderful art before the end of the month.



On the 25th of April at 8.00 the AGM took place. This was the first one held since 2019 due to COVID. The Chairman spoke about the decline in volunteers, the rising age cohort, the grass cutting in over 20 estates that our organisation does and which will be finishing up in the next year or two.

Secretary report followed and went through all projects under the various headings. The Tidy Towns Committee was set up in Macroom 40 years ago this year and many improvements have been made since then. Volunteers meet every Saturday morning in the operations hub in Masseytown and the work is organised from there. Litter management is ongoing all the time and flowers were maintained every week and still are at the present.

The Masseytown Upgrade Developments being planned by the council was discussed. The Famine Memorial Project near the car park at the bridge was discussed, with works hopefully to begin next year. The organisation is very reliant on Grants, Sponsorship and other funding, with the lack of local businesses and residents involvements makes the future of tidy towns activities at current levels very uncertain. In 2022 a heritage brochure was launched in conjunction with Cork County Council. This is likely to be the last year that grass cutting in over 20 Estates will be co-ordinated by Tidy

Towns and next year there will be a transition whereby residents themselves will arrange the cutting, possibly through contractor. More information will be handed out closer to the time. Since 2019 our volunteers have participated in many informative talks and training from IRD Duhallow who have supported various initiatives such as Smart Village training and Leader meeting. Council organised a meeting on wellbeing through their PPN. Communication took place with Bus Eireann to install a swift box on their refurbished building, where the swifts were known to have nested. Bird callers are used in some cases and a licence for this is procured each year. A meeting with Cork County Council was held to discuss a whole range of items and to get updates on progress.

The Fairy Garden had a very busy four years. Masseytown Park now has also got a Sensory Garden, Biodiversity Garden and the Zoo, all of which require ongoing maintenance. In recent years there has been outdoor entertainment in the park with poetry readings and shows like Fionn McCool and Cú Chulainn.

In 2022 for the first time Santa's Grotto took place over 7 days in December, with nearly 400 kids visiting Santa, Mrs Claus and the elves.

We liaison with the schools throughout the year. Bishop McEgan plants and maintains the tulips in the square. St Marys, De La Salle, St Joseph's Primary School and St Colemans Boys national school send us on a report every year with all their activities that they have done throughout the school year. Particularly in relation to their Green Flag awards.

Lisa Manning presided the chair for the election of officers. Martin Coughlan was elected Chairman, Judy O Sullivan was elected Treasurer and Lisa Manning was elected Secretary taken over from John Lyons, who stepped down this year. Brian O Sullivan was elected Assistant Chairperson and Joseph Cronin was elected Assistant Secretary.

On a final note, Macroom Tidy towns committee would like to thank John Lyons for all the work he has done over the last 40 years, 38 of which he spent as secretary, but he will continue to be an active committee member.

Positive Relationships and Friendships skills Programme. First year students recently completed the "Get Up! Stand Up!" programme, seven session social skills learning programme developed by National Educational Psychologist Service, [NEPS], specifically for young adolescents in school settings. The overall goal of this programme is to develop appropriate social interaction skills of each student according to his/ her individual capabilities. Using social awareness and interpersonal skills for initiating, building, and maintaining positive relationships and friendships. Demonstrating an ability to prevent, manage, and resolve interpersonal conflicts, in particular bullying, in constructive ways. Practising of techniques such as role play, goal setting, problem-solving, modelling, and rehearsal, both within the social skills group, and generalising to natural, everyday situations. Upon completion of the social skills learning programme, it is hoped the young people will have enhanced knowledge and skills necessary to better interact socially with peers within various situations. The participation of the students throughout the weekly sessions was very interactive with lively debates, videos, weekly goals etc. It also provided a great forum for the students to express their views and gain valuable insights & coping skills. In tandem with this programme the first-year students have been following a programme in Guidance class in relation to bullying. The programme includes identifying several types of bullying, how to avoid cyber bullying and what to do should they experience bullying.

UCC+Awards Through the School Connection with UCC Access programme, six 2nd yr. students spent a day in UCC. The day included a range of activities including a Chemistry magic under the guidance of Dr. Declan Kennedy.

UCC also presented awards to 8 2nd year students who have excelled in a range of subjects including Maths, French, Gaeilge and English. We congratulate all students and their families on this achievement.



This year's work placement marks the fifth year with some learners participating with Heritage Specialist Ted Cook, on two designated sites within the towns Castle Demesne. This year we had a wonderful diverse group from Macroom, Ukraine, Syria, and Afghanistan. Introducing skills to our learners, (with the assistance of translator apps). 

The Macroom and District Environmental Group Think Globally, Act Locally



Hi! Chris Barrett back with you.

Today, I have the great pleasure of talking with Diarmuid Wolfe, who was representing WeCan (West Cork Architectural Network) a non-profit organisation who can be contacted on info@ westcorkarchitecturenetwork.ie.

I first met Diarmuid in Macroom town centre in the Summer of 2022. He and his two fellow directors, of the WeCan network, all of whom have graduated as architects), were running a series of pop-up events as a Summer Road-Show and I was fortunate enough to speak with them.

The aim was, and remains, to engage various communities throughout West Cork, asking them to share their thoughts and ideas on perceived issues and opportunities in their town's architectural environment.

They set up their road shows prominantly in the main square or street of these West Cork towns.

The community in each town was what they wanted to engage with. These road shows aimed to break down barriers commonly found in conventional architectural practice and take full account of genuine community needs and wants. To this end they built a 'drawing cart' (imagination station), which was both unusual and eye-catching. Communities in each town were provided with hundreds of metres of rolled-paper, pens and markers; and were encouraged to draw write or express their ideas in any way they saw fit, in relation to their architectural community desires.

It was predominantly a discoursive event, run to encourage people to think seriously about possibilities within their communities.

The idea for the project came to WeCan during the pandemic, when the Directors saw an exodus from



major city centres, such as Dublin and Cork, into rural towns and surrounding areas. This influx has brought with it a new dynamic energy.

At the Macroom event which lasted about 7-8 hours on a sunny market day, about a few hundred people contributed their hopes, concerns, frustrations and potential solutions.

WeCan understand that as architects they cannot and would not want to enter a town and independently research it's multi-factoral and multi-layered issues within a few days, as could be done conventionally.

They are acutely aware that locals who have spent their lives in an area will have a wealth of living knowledge on the non-immediately obvious complex situations which affect their day- today living. In Macroom as in all places visited by WeCan, the findings were very encouraging and showed great insight. To put it all in a time context, the impending by-pass formed a back-drop to the conversations and contributions. One of the most mentionned issues was the vacant under-used and sometimes derelict properties. These properties were discussed in the light of the war in Ukraine, a major community housing crisis, economic downturn and unexpected redundancies.

Encouragingly, the results showed that people really want to live in and support town centres like Macroom

If we consider our new opportunities since the by-pass, we can do no better than look at small successful market towns, like ours, in Europe which have been bypassed. The traffic flows around the centre of these towns, rather than through it.

This encourages pedestrians and bicycles to fully support and enjoy the centre of the town.



The town centre becomes an attractive destination leading to a demand for more cultural, leisure and culinary activities.

I can't help feeling how much more I would support and enjoy the local cafes if I could sit outside away from car exhaust, as I have done so happily while chatting over coffee or tea in Europe.!

Diarmuid reminds me that towns such as Macroom would go on to develop their own wonderful identity and 'buzz', once free from passing traffic.

He suggests vehicular traffic could pass in front the AIB on one side of such a prioritised pedestrian area, which could extend as far as at the turning towards the Cattle Market.

This, with the help of the by-pass would enable locals and visitors to truly enjoy their town square. There were so many varied and eclectic contributitions that time and space within this single article will not allow me to do justice to them at the moment.

I look forward to seeing WeCan back in the square in Macroom where contributions old, and new can be discussed. I find this a really exciting project and urge readers to learn more by following their website address. I would like to thank Diarmuid who fitted in our chat despite an iminent root canal treatment and birthday, and I really look forward to speaking more with WeCan in the future.



REMEMBERING THE LOVE STORY OF ART O' LEARY OF RALEIGH ON THE 250TH ANNIVERSARY OF HIS DEATH

Art O'Leary and his wife Eibhlin Dubh Ni Chonaill were great Irish people who loved the Irish language it's heritage and culture. Art O'Leary was shot in Carriganima on the 4th of May 1773 in the prime of his life at just 26 years of age.

His only crime was that he was catholic and owned a horse exceeding 5 pounds in value which was against the penal laws of the time. He was shot by a group of soldiers led by the local magistrate. His wife Eibhlin heard the horse kicking the courtyard door in Raleigh she was filled with foreboding, the young pregnant mother fled at once to find Art in Carriganima. On finding Art's dead body the distraught Eibhlin reached into her very soul and on the morning of Art's death she delivered the lament to her dead husband. The 390-line lament became one of the most passionate love poems in the Irish language and it is a tribute to their love. 

RUSSIAN NAVAL ENCROACHMENTS HIGHLIGHTS INCREASED RISK TO CRITICAL UNDERWATER INFRASTRUCTURE IN IRISH WATERS

NATO has previously reported that Russia is: Irish waters which are the most accessible waters in: other EU Member States. The fact is that Ireland's preparing to attack critical infrastructure in an effort to destabilise the West

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that the latest encroachments by Russian naval assets has once again highlighted the precarious position of critical underwater infrastructure passing through Irish territorial waters.

Kelleher, an MEP for Ireland South, said "Last week, NATO issued a warning that Russia is preparing for an attack on NATO's submarine infrastructure.

"Ireland is clearly not in NATO but the fact remains that a significant proportion of the cables linking the US and its NATO allies in the EU are located in terms of a potential attack.

"NATO now believes that Russia is currently mapping critical infrastructure, including undersea cables. It is clear that this is what they were doing off the South Coast in Jan 2022 in advance of the invasion of Ukraine. With Russian vessels now operating in Irish waters, we need to heed NATO's warning.

"Their objective would be to cause major damage to the West's financial services and ICT capabilities. This is something that would really impact Ireland and the Irish economy.

"Last week, I wrote to An Tánaiste seeking an update on the Government's plans to work with

Atlantic waters are the EU's soft

underbelly with little or no surveillance being carried out by Ireland. It would be a very obvious location for a Russian attack on critical infrastructure.

"We cannot stick our heads in the sand. Russia doesn't care about our neutrality or our non-aligned status. It only

cares about its own interests and de-stabilising the West is its primary focus," concluded Kelleher.



Unable to support any law that includes mandatory rewetting targets

Proposal would serious hamper economic development including housing construction and energy production.

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that he is unable to support any form of an EU Nature Restoration Law that includes mandatory rewetting targets on Member States.

Kelleher was commenting as details emerged on the latest version of compromises currently being negotiated amongst the European Parliament's political groups.

"Put simply, what is on the table in Parliament is more damaging than the Commission's original proposal with regards to restoration of agricultural land. I do not see any way back in terms of Parliament's position.

"At present, the Parliament's negotiator is proposing that 30% of previously drained agricultural land will be restored with at least 50% to be rewetted by 2030. By 2050, they want 50% of previously drained agricultural land restored including 66% rewetted.

"This would have a devastating impact on Irish agriculture. Thousands of farmers have, over the last 60 years, reclaimed land from peatlands for use as farmland. If this land were rewetted, we would imperil their farms and livelihoods, and further drive up the cost of land in this country.

"I firmly believe that the drafters of this proposal truly do not understand the unique circumstances of Irish land usage.

"Furthermore, my opposition to the Nature Restoration Law goes beyond agricultural issues. I have very deep concerns about how the current proposals would affect our ability to build homes and develop our economy in Ireland.

"There needs to be greater flexibility for national governments and local authorities in terms of green spaces and housing. We are in a very difficult position here in Ireland concerning home construction. We cannot have a situation where nature restoration targets could inhibit the building of homes for our citizens.

"Quite simply, this current proposal should be withdrawn and the European Commission should start from scratch.

"What I cannot understand is why no detailed impact assessment has taken place on how implementation of this proposal would affect agriculture, urban planning, energy production, and a whole host of other crucial issues. The mind boggles how the Commission could entertain such a proposal," concluded Kelleher.

Cork people love hurling and Cork hurlers are dear to their hearts. They love the game because it is wonderfully entertaining and is never over till it's over, they love the county team because they normally fight to the last minute.

Cork v Tipperary is a rivalry built up over a century of inter county hurling, Cork the purists, Tipperary the dour hard hitting physical team. Their latest meeting at Páirc Uí Chaoimh provided the attendance of 36,765 with brilliant value on a sunny evening with Cork on top at the start to go four points clear, then Tipperary took over, led by two points at half time and later got into a position which appeared to put them on the road to victory leading 2-23 to 3-17 after 68 minutes. Then in the final stretch, Cork came back with a burst of scores including a Brian Hayes goal, which almost brought them a win but in fairness to Tipperary that would have been a cruel result. Now Cork must beat either Clare or Limerick to stay in the competition and with both these games away, they will need all their skills and resolve to survive in this Munster championship.

A Declan Dalton goal gave Cork a 1-2 to 0-1 lead after five minutes but gradually Tipp got on top and Cork did well to be only two points in arrears at half time, 0-14 to 2-6, a situation largely brought about by a smashing Robbie Flynn goal minutes before the break.

Seamus Harnedy (two), Shane Kingston and Dalton (free) were on target as Cork clawed their way back in the early stages of the second period and it was 2-10 to 0-16 after 45 minutes.

Tipp's response was emphatic as Gearóid O'Connor got possession close to the Cork goal, shook off three defenders, and fired home a lead goal, Jake Morris's point making it 1-17 to 2-10.





Welcome back dear student continuing on the commands of God (Exodus chapter 20). Last week we saw how they are like a spiritual compass to help us navigate life. "No, O people, the Lord has told you what is good, and this is what He requires of you; to do what is right, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God" (Micah 6:8 NLT). God's commands are our instructions for living a happy and successful life. Here He lists three requirements that are central to having His character displayed through us. Firstly we are to "...do what is right" (another version says 'to act justly'); secondly to "love mercy" which means to show mercy to others to the same extent that we want to have mercy shown to us; and thirdly to "walk humbly with your God" which means humbling ourselves before God - coming to Him in reverence and the fear of the Lord - acknowledging that we rely on Him for everything. When we obey God's requirements life gets much simpler. Because then we only have to please God, and not man. The apostles Peter and John faced this dilemma. They had healed a man who was crippled from birth in the Name of Jesus. The religious leaders were not amused and commanded that they never again heal or preach in the Name of Jesus. But Peter and John answered them brilliantly. They said.... 'who do you think we should take our orders from - you or God?

It's no different for us today friend. Doing the right thing can feel scary or too complicated because the devil tries to control people and situations through fear of man and dread of disaster (2nd Corinthians 4:4). He is the 'god of this world' - note the small 'g'. But Satan is a liar; he is nothing like God - Yahweh the Creator of the Heavens and the earth, the Glorious Lord of Hosts - our Father Who loves us (Jeremiah 10:6). So, when faced with decisions of what to do we should follow God's command and 'do the right thing'. Act justly and see that justice is carried out. Even if it costs - and it most certainly carries a cost (Luke 14:28). But the reward is worth it - to grow in the knowledge of our beautiful Lord, producing fruit that lasts, all for His Glory (Colossians 1:10; John 15). The apostles discovered that following Jesus had a cost. They were beaten, persecuted, and hated for preaching about the Risen Jesus our Healer, by those who did not want to see God's Kingdom demonstrated. But they didn't give up, and we believers are here today because they said 'yes' to God and 'no' to man (2 Corinthians 4:16-18). Praise God!

Doing what is right, showing God's mercy and love to others, and dying to self to please God and honour His name will bring His manifest Presence and Power into even the darkest of situations. Meshach, Shadrach, and Abednego found this to be true when they were faced with obeying God or man (Daniel chapter three). The Babylonian king Nebuchadnezzar demanded that all his subjects bow down before his golden image and worship him. The three boys refused, declaring their allegiance to the Living God of Heaven only. The king was enraged and condemned them to death in a burning furnace. But he didn't figure on God Himself being in the fire with them, and delivering them out of it alive, so they did not even smell of smoke after. Read it yourself you will enjoy it!


