

hope you all enjoyed the lovely fine weather we had over the June public holiday weekend. It was great to get a stretch of a few days of really nice weather. Of course, the fine warm weather dictated our diet to some degree. Salads and barbecues were top of the list. My windowsill grown lettuce was the star of the show. Unfortunately, the tomato plants and cucumber plants have not produced any fruit yet. But I'm lucky to have a variety of shops to choose from and they have a great variety of salad foods in stock. I'm also very lucky to be able to consult the many cookery books available in Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne and several of them specialize in salads and barbecues. It's amazing to see the variety of salads that can be prepared. I oversaw the salads and himself got the BBQ out, positioned it in a sheltered spot and fired it up. This is a small charcoal BBQ not a fancy gas one, so it takes a little time to heat up and it has become a family tradition that sausages are the first thing to be cooked just to make sure it's hot enough for cooking on. Judging by the blackened condition of some of the sausages It was definitely hot enough. Next came the burgers and the chicken, he fancied a couple of burgers while my daughter and I were being very virtuous and just having chicken and salad. Food always tastes a little different, even better in the outdoors and I enjoy BBQ season because it gives me a break from cooking. We only got one opportunity to barbecue that weekend but at least I can tick that activity off my summer to do list. I think we're now in for a spell of warm humid weather with a chance of showers and some thunder and lightning. My mother never liked thunder and lightning, but my dad didn't want us to be afraid of it so he used to stand me at the window and say what a wonderful display of nature we were being treated to. Consequently, I love a good thunder and lightning storm.

Do you know that the library catalogue includes some wonderful books on Irish weather including Looks Like Rain: 9,000 years of Irish weather by Damian Corless; Climate, Weather and Irish Agriculture by T. Keane and Irish Weather Wisdom: signs of rain by Gabriel Rosenstock. There are books that cover every aspect of climate including climate history, climate folklore, climate extremes and climate statistics. Once you have become a weather expert and can confidently forecast weather you can turn your sights to the BBQ section in the library. There are books on how to build your own barbecues, what best methods to clean your barbecues and of course all the cookery books that are devoted to barbecuing recipes. You will also find a wide selection of books available in the library covering salads, how to grow various ingredients suitable for salads either in your garden, or in containers indoors or outdoors, and a myriad of recipes for salads of every kind including a vast selection of diverse ingredients.

I'd like to remind the younger readers to call in to Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne to register for the Summer Stars Reading Adventure. When you register, you'll receive your registration pack including a registration card where you can record the books that you have read. At the end of the summer everyone who returns a reading card will be entered into a raffle for some prizes and there will be a completion certificate for everyone also. Following on from last years very popular My Little Library Book Bags we will again have My Little Library Book bags to distribute to any child who will be starting school in 2023. I expect these bags to be available in Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne from Tuesday 13th of June, so please do come in to collect one. These bags are for all children beginning 'big' school, they do not have to be a member of the library but it would be great if they became members so you might consider enrolling them during your visit. The 'My Little Library Book Bag' initiative is a collaboration between libraries, the Department of Rural and Community Development, and the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth as part of the First 5 Strategy.

I know from speaking to customers that many of you have books of your own at home that you are finished with, and many people have asked it they could donate them to the library but unfortunately, I don't have the facilities to accept donated books. Corpus Christi Procession in Macroom



MR. PAT WALSH

The past few weeks have been filled with mixed emotions for the staff and students alike at De La Salle. While the teachers and students looked forward to the summer break and the promise of fine weather ahead, there was also a reflective mood in the air. This was borne out of the fact that one of our colleagues, after forty years of service, would not be returning next September.

Mr. Pat Walsh started teaching in De La Salle in September 1983. While Pat was primarily a Science and Chemistry teacher, his appointment was partially dependent on a separate set of skills. Interviewed by the Principal at the time, Br. Jerome Cooper, Pat was asked a couple of unexpected questions: "Can you draw a straight line?" and "Do you know what an angle is?"

As any young enthusiastic applicant would do, Pat said, "Yes." After the interview concluded, he was offered the position of Science, Chemistry, and Mechanical Drawing teacher at De La Salle College.

Pat has seen some huge changes during his career. He started out in the newly extended, state-of-the-art building in 1983 with a total of thirteen staff. The staff numbers now are in excess of forty, and while the main building still remains pretty much as it was, three new buildings are on the campus now, and Pat's experience of teaching has been a constant evolution.

Despite the constant changes in the classroom from the blackboard and chalk to the overhead projector, to the computer, to the whiteboard and marker, to the visualizer, and most recently to the interactive screens, tablets, and remote teaching, he has never failed to adapt and has managed to meet each new development with the utmost professionalism.

From the outset, Pat's professionalism shone through, and his drive to perfect his teaching skills remained up to the present day. He dealt with huge changes to the curriculum throughout his career. Intermediate Certification became the Junior Certificate, which was recently reformed to the New Junior Cycle. Despite the ever-changing landscape,

Pat strove to ensure that his exam classes were well prepared. Year after year, he would make sure to be in school on the day of his subject exams to meet his students and offer a calming word of advice. Pat was always only interested in making sure that his students were happy in the classroom and well prepared for exams. It must be acknowledged that when compared to the national average, Pat's students always surpassed those figures.

Pat is such a knowledgeable person with a keen interest in music, languages, rugby, and basketball, to name but a few. Outside of the classroom, Pat always engaged with students and staff in a meaningful way. He would always lend his support and give advice to his colleagues and was always patient and helpful with newly qualified staff. Pat's generosity with his time led him to train school basketball teams, organize Junior Cert. Science quiz teams and Chemistry quiz teams for national competitions. He was always willing to offer his services when it came to cultural and language exchanges to both Italy and Bordeaux. Taking a large group of students abroad can be a daunting task for any teacher. Being the lead teacher on these trips did not weigh heavily on his shoulders. As is his way, he conducted his duties with professionalism and attention to detail that ensured the trip ran smoothly.

As has been mentioned, Pat always endeavoured to do the best he could by his students during his career, always aimed to perfect his teaching practice. He published his own Junior Certificate Science textbook and has been involved in the corrections for the State Examinations Commission. Pat's diligence and commitment to his subject have led to his appointment as an Advising Examiner for the Leaving Certificate Chemistry examination.

If you meet past students or staff of De La Salle, it won't be long before the conversation turns to fond and often humorous memories of times in Mr. Walsh's presence. The past couple of weeks in the school reflect how he was able to build such a lovely rapport with everyone at De La Salle. As the summer exams came closer and the students learned of Pat's retirement, the farewell cards and gifts started to appear in the

staffroom. It was clear to see from Pat's reaction to each gift or card that they really meant a lot to him.On Thursday, 1st June, Pat's retirement function was held in Randel's Hotel in Killarney. A presentation was made on behalf of the staff by Mr. Fergus Ryan. School Principal, Mr. John Murphy, spoke so well about Pat, but the forty-plus staff that were in attendance were all looking forward in anticipation to Pat's speech. Pat is known for his guick-witted humour, and while it was woven into his speech on the night, it was lovely to hear Pat speak so positively about his time. There was a particular message in Pat's words that rang true for all in attendance. He described a sense of community in the school where all the students are known to all the staff and how the staff work together to ensure that each student is well looked after outside of the classroom as well as inside. Pat described De La Salle as a "fabulous school with fabulous students." It is clear on reflection that this heartfelt description of the school was actively nourished and lived out by Pat every day.Mr. John Murphy concluded by describing Pat as a gentleman and an exceptional teacher. This description is defined by a recent discussion Mr. Murphy had with a 2nd. The students explained how Pat's sense of humour made each class fun and enjoyable. For a teacher to be able to make a strong connection with such a young class, 40 years on from his first class, is truly exceptional. 



KILMURRY ACTIVE RETIREMENT NEWS

ISOLATION'

Sheep would prefer to eat sweet grass than be warned of a prowling wolf. And so too it is with us. There is a strong tendency to ignore much of what is unpalatable so we can continue just as we are.

There is a role in America called the Surgeon General. On the 2nd of May, Dr Vivek Murty, who occupies that role, published an advisory. The advisory was titled 'Our epidemic of Loneliness and Isolation'.

This advisory was carried in newspapers all around the world and indeed our own Ryan Tubridy picked up on it and gave it extensive coverage over the following days. You may have heard or read something about it, but chances are you did not. Even if you did you may have considered it not of great relevance to you, as you have already a much too busy life. I am afraid though it impacts all of us.

Advisories are reserved for issues deemed to be significant public health challenges that 'need the American people's immediate attention'. The wolf caller and his extensive team of experts have seen the wolf a prowling.

The report finds that about half of adults in the United States reported experiencing measurable levels of loneliness. Perhaps so, but we may think that it is no big deal. Not so, he says. The practical physical consequences of poor connection can be devastating, including a 29% increase in the risk of heart disease, a 32% increase in the risk of stroke, and a 50% increase in the risk of developing dementia in older adults. We then add to this the extensive human suffering that it entails, and to that the loss of productivity, opportunity, community engagement and resilience. Worse still, while the older groups are heavily affected, they are not in fact the worst affected by the decline in social connection that has been ongoing now for decades. Our children, and our grandchildren are becoming less socially connected at the fastest pace. Social networks are getting smaller, and the levels of social participation are declining, and dramatically so since the turn of the century.

We may think that this affects our society but not us directly. We may never feel lonely, we may only wish that things would slow down so that we could. But the surprising finding from the meta-analysis of all the relevant research carried out in the English-speaking world, regardless of whether people report that they are feeling lonely or not, as we become more isolated the risk to our wellbeing increases just the same. Indeed, we may be at greater risk if we do not feel lonely. Those that are lonely may be motivated to act. It is hard to understand why this is the case. I would like to see more

'OUR EPIDEMIC OF LONELINESS AND research on this. Perhaps an element may be that we are not as good at looking after our own interests as we think we are. We may need a friend to tell us to go and get that lump checked, or to recognise that our lifestyle has become unhealthy. Perhaps a friend persists in pointing out to us that health and wellbeing is of greater priority than that report with the looming deadline. Perhaps we need a friend to pull us out of ourselves and to broaden our perspective. Research suggests that 90% of those that do not report loneliness or are objectively not isolated have at least three close friends.

Our own longitudinal study being carried out in Trinity College shows similar effects occurring in Irish society. What then is going on in western societies?

Dr Murty refers to the huge impact of the emergence of social media. He is not dismissive of its benefits. He insists though that it is not an adequate substitute for in person socialisation. Other factors include ageing populations, smaller families, less marriages/partnerships, and more choosing to live alone. Consequently, many have less informal supports in times of need.

It is significant too that Dr Murty points to less community involvement. Membership in organisations 'that have been important pillars of community connection have declined significantly in this time'. He indicates that following decades of research, the cumulative evidence shows that higher levels of social connectedness suggest better community outcomes, 'ranging from population health to community safety, resilience, prosperity, and representative government, while lower levels of social connectedness suggest worse outcomes in each of these areas. These studies establish that social connection is vital not only to our individual physical, mental, and emotional health, but also to the health and well-being of our communities'.

Dr Murty goes on to make suggestions for a new national strategy to tackle the problem.

1. Strengthening social infrastructure, which includes things like parks and libraries as well as public programs.

2. Enacting pro-connection public policies at every level of government, including things like accessible public transportation or paid family leave.

3. Mobilizing the health sector to address the medical needs that stem from loneliness.

4. Reforming digital environments to "critically evaluate our relationship with technology."

5. Deepening our knowledge through more robust research into the issue.

6. Cultivating a culture of connection.

÷

While these are suggestions for national

government intervention, in my opinion, it is the more local level that will matter most. It will be whether we ourselves decide to prioritise engagement with others, and crucially whether we decide to support, engage with, and build up our community organisations. We will need to do so to have any realistic prospect of reversing this worrying trend and its effects, that I think, are also already apparent in our country.





MCP are one of the largest employers in the locality both directly (employing 100 staff) many of whom are local to the area (over 40% of staff live within a 5 mile radius) and indirectly through timber mills, transportation and other services etc. This year MCP celebrates 45 years in business which is a huge achievement for any company. "Key to MCP's operations has always been our staff, some of which have been with us 45 years and still have many years left!!!" smiles Johnny. Things haven't always been so positive as "Back in 2011, one event a lot of locals remember and one of the hardest days for our company, on a Sunday just before Christmas, was when the company suffered a devastating fire, which destroyed over half of our factory and stocks, both pallets & packaging. Fortunately, our main pallet manufacturing machine was saved, thanks in no small part to the fire-fighters and our staff trying to contain and break the fire," Johnny Lehane reveals and "As a result, we were back up and running and manufacturing on the Tuesday morning again and haven't looked back since." Furthermore Aidan Harty, Managing Director of MCP explains "Being in business for 45 years doesn't just take luck, it takes a lot of hard work, determination and surrounding yourself with the best staff and loyal customers,". "Our experienced staff engage with our customers' evolving needs to provide them with expert advice, quality products, and reliable delivery, all combined with excellent customer service" remarks Aidan.

One thing is for sure, the future for MCP is bright as they are currently expanding their production and storage and distribution facilities even further with the commissioning of their third custom-built, leading-edge pallet manufacturing machine later this summer, and the addition of two new warehouses at their Clondrohid and Dunboyne facilities, with an additional capacity of 20,000 pallet spaces.

MEDICINE PLANTS OF OUR HEDGEROWS

Hi Chris Barrett back with you. Today I have the pleasure of speaking once again on the subject of Plants from our Hedgerows with Ted Cook, our local Heritage specialist. Ted starts our conversation by sharing a translation from Abbott Kneipp c.1867. "In the good old days the Elder stood close to every dwelling. Nowadays this shrubby little tree is rooted out everywhere- yet it deserves to remain the closest neighbour and faithful family friend of every homebecause every part can be used:- leaves; flowers; bark and roots". Otherwise and better known as the 'Granny' of the Forest, the ancient Celts named our Elderberry, 'Crann Tromm'for the heavy weight of fruit it bore, (Tromm translates as weight). Ted tells me that in Ulster, it is known as 'Boortree'. He says that in Scots Gaelic and Ulster Irish 'Borb' signifies crooked, bandylegged, and gnarled. Ted apologises to all Grannys. I think he forgets how young some of them are! He goes on to remind me that only a month after the flowering Maytree/Whitethorn, our 167,000kms of roadside and field boundaries dress in the eye-catching creamy white Elder flowers, like flat topped pancakes which are 20 cms across and can outgas their mesmerising fragrances for scores of metres, ambushing walkers, cyclists and our treasured pollinators. Ted likens them to a forest people without their natural forest. Deep prehistoric resonances still persist, from mid-Ulster to the deep south, rural people never burned Elderwood in bonfires, 'because the flames would scorch the souls of the spirits that inhabit this small untidy tree.' Lost wisdom has been reconstructed and interpreted in relation to the Elder, by modern biochemistry. Toxic hydro-cyanide fumes are released when Elder is torched, and this is equally true of Laurel and Rhododendron. Elder's scientific name 'sambucus nigra', attests to the complex resinous molecules named sambucin which are uniquely associated with our 'Granny'. Modern medicine uses it in the treatment or amelioration of blindness in mammals, specifically night blindness, and Homeopathic medicine prescribes elder extracts for spasms. Ted would like to acknowledge Margueritte McQuaid for the following 'Secret Family Elder Tonic Recipe' handed



down through generations from her forebear Mary Alice Connolly of Rossinver, Co. Leitrim, a herbalist and midwife. Despite the Elizabethan prohibition of 'Indigenous Medicine' and the forced expulsion of herbalists, (which was mentioned earlier by Ted in an earlier article in this Hedgerow series), the pre-Christian territory of Breffny still produces the most competent Organic Growers with Rossinver being the birthplace of modern Irish Organic Husbandry almost 50 years ago, in 1976 which spawned the I.O.G.A. (Irish Growers Association). Ted now includes a recipe;

WEST CORK ELDERBERRY TONIC Ingredients

- 450 mgs elderberries (destemmed) 1 thinly sliced apple 1 thinly sliced lemon A thumb of grated ginger 150g of raw (brown) sugar
- 3 star anise spice
- 50mls brandy (mead/honey or poitin was used in place of the brandy in medieval times)
- 200 mls of water (strictly non-flouridated/ clorinated)
- Method:

Simmer, (Never boil) the berries and apple, spice, ginger, lemon and sugar for 30 minutes.

Mash the mixture, allow it to cool and then strain it through a jelly bag.

Bottle it and top it up with brandy.

The tonic is loaded with vitaminC and powerful anti-viral anti- oxidants.

For alcohol averse readers, Ted says you could leave out the brandy.



I would like to offer my own recipe for Elder-flower cordial which is wonderfully tasty and does not contain alcohol. It has been made by me with local elderflowers from Muinefliuch and Clondrohid for over 25 years now and has been stored for use at Women's Christmas and other celebrations throughout the year! I record the recipe as it appears in Time to Cook with Muinefliuch Recipe Book 2014 Chris Barrett's Elderflower Cordial Ingredients

30 Elderflower heads

2 pints of water

2 tbsp white wine vinegar

4lbs sugar 2 lemons zested and quartered

Method: Add sugar and water to the biggest pan you have. Dissolve sugar by heating . 2. Add everything else. Cover. Wait 24 hours. 3. Sieve mixture through muslin. Dilute 1:8 with still or sparking water. 4. Serve with ice and lemon. Leftovers can be stored in sterilised bottles. To do this place bottles in a low heat oven. I finish with a quote from Ted and thank him again for sharing the wonders of the Hedgerows with us. "How Blessed can we let ourselves beln the midst of the chaos of our





KELLEHER WELCOMES EP'S PROPOSED REDUCTION IN RESTORATION/ RE-WETTING TARGETS BUT CALLS FOR FURTHER IMPROVEMENTS HOUSING MINISTER CONTACTED CONCERNING 'NO NET URBAN GREEN SPACE LOSS' RULE

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that changes made in the European Parliament's Nature Restoration Law text, in particular concerning the re-wetting of drained peatlands, are an improvement but still must go further if we are to avoid undermining Ireland's agricultural sector.

Kelleher was commenting as the final version of the ENVI Committee compromises were made public. The committee vote on these proposals will take place on Thursday 15th June, and will, if adopted, be voted upon by all MEPs in July.

"I welcome the progress made over the last week. The ENVI negotiators have now accepted that their original targets for restoration and re-wetting for drained agricultural peatland were too extreme. They are now reverting to the original Commission proposal of: • 30% of such areas by 2030, of which at least [a quarter] shall be rewetted

50% of such areas by 2040, of which at least [half] shall be rewetted
70% of such areas by 2050, of which at least [half]

 70% of such areas by 2050, of which at least [half] shall be rewetted

"This is, of course, better, but from Ireland's perspective, we still need to see more progress towards reaching the same targets as those that the Irish Government are supporting at the Council of Ministers.

"The Commission's targets would require the rewetting of farmland even with Ireland making full use of Bord na Móna and Coillte lands. From an Irish perspective, this cannot be on the table.

"As a substitute member of the ENVI Committee, I retain the right to table alternative amendments,

reflecting the Council's targets, when it comes before the full Parliament in July. I expect and hope all Irish MEPs will support the tabling of these amendments in line with Irish Government policy.



"Separately, I have written to Housing Minister, Darragh O'Brien TD concerning possible

planning issues contained in the Nature Restoration Law, namely the 'No Net loss of Urban Green Areas' rule. We need to be certain that this will not affect the construction of homes in our towns and cities," concluded Kelleher.

BBQ TIPS FROM SAFEFOOD

With the sun here to stay, Nico is demonstrating using a meat thermometer to ensure that BBQ meats like burgers, chicken and sausages are cooked to 75 degrees Celsius for the safest and tastiest food.

Nico, together with Safefood, has put together his top tips for a safe and tasty BBQ this weekend:

1. Keep perishable foods like salads, coleslaw and quiche in your fridge until you are ready to serve them.

2. Burgers, sausages and kebabs, pork and poultry must be cooked all the way through – take your food off the heat, pop the thermometer in the thickest part of the meat and when it reaches 75 degrees Celsius, then it's cooked and ready to eat. Steaks can be served 'rare' as harmful bacteria are on the outside only (and not in the centre).

3. If you like to marinate your meat, make sure any marinade used on raw meat is not then used as a sauce to coat vegetables or cooked meat as it will contain raw meat bacteria.

4. If you choose to barbeque any frozen food, it must be firstly completely thawed on the bottom shelf of your fridge before you cook it.

5. When handling raw meat and poultry, wash your hands thoroughly and frequently, most importantly before going on to prepare salads and other ready to eat foods.

6. Once your meat is cooked thoroughly, make sure to keep cooked meat separate from raw meat and to use separate chopping boards, cooking utensils and plates. Harmful bacteria in raw meat, poultry and their juices can cross contaminate cooked food and lead to food poisoning, something your




family won't thank you for.

7. If there are leftovers from your barbeque, allow the food to cool before refrigerating, however make sure to refrigerate food within two hours of cooking. Cork lost out to Kerry in a thrilling Group 1 Rd 2 game at Páirc Uí Chaoimh. Cork played well, Kerry were not at their sparkling best, and the Kingdom were saved by a goal from a controversial penalty in the 46th minute which proved to be the crucial score. 



Welcome back dear student "see how very much our Father loves us, for He calls us His children, and that is what we are!" (1 John 3:1 NLT). Happy Father's Day to all the Dad's celebrating this weekend! May the Lord bless you and keep you and give you His favour always as you lead and cover your family (Numbers 6:24-27; Genesis 18:18-19). For those Dads who have found parenting difficult, it's never too late to start praying for your children and learning God's Word to bless your family. "If any man be in Christ, he is a new creation' (2 Corinthians 5:17-21). Call upon the Lord Jesus and He will help you. If you are a father who has abused or hurt your wife or children, you need to repent and get right with God before it's too late! God warns men to cherish and love their wives in the same way that Christ loves the church, and to tenderly love their children and not provoke them or wound them (1 Peter 3:7; Colossians 3:21). Men – this is serious. No-one knows the day or the hour we will meet God, and wronging your wife and children is an open door for generational curse and judgment.

Not every parent was able to love their children. Some died prematurely before they could. Others, for whatever reason were unable, or unwilling to show love to their children. For children who grow up without knowing a father's love it leaves a deep wound. It may be that a father wasn't able to tell his child how much he loved him or her, due to never having experienced it himself; or maybe he just plain treated his child badly by abandoning or abusing them. Whatever the circumstances, fatherlessness or abusive parenting can affect an individual to the point that sadly, it changes the way they view God the Father. People have no problem identifying with Jesus as Brother but God as Father? That can be a different story, and they never understand why, but it co-relates to the relationship with their earthly fathers. A father who wasn't there for his children may cause that child to see God as a far-off, cold entity who doesn't care either, or is someone to be feared as they feared their abusive earthly father. Nothing could be further from the truth!

When the disciples observed the power of God at work in Jesus, they asked Him to teach them to pray to God. Jesus said, "when you pray, pray like this: ...our Father...." (Matthew 6:9). It wasn't a method of connecting with a tyrant that Jesus was showing them, or a babbling repetitive prayer to a worthless idol, but He was demonstrating the power of God is encountered through relationship, with the One Who created us – our Father. Jesus came to restore that relationship with Father God by paying the ransom that was due for our sins with His sinless Blood, so that all of us could be forgiven and brought back into God's family as His sons and daughters, as if we had never sinned - and not only be saved and redeemed, but then used by God to demonstrate His Love to others - our families and children; and also we can be 'spiritual fathers and mothers' to those whose lives we impact every day, by building them up and loving them. "The Lord is like a Father to His children, tender and compassionate to those who fear Him" (Psalm 103:13-18). Good News - Your Father loves you friend!


