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

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

Tidy Towns volunteers met on the 6th of June at 8pm in the Operations hub in Masseytown for its monthly meeting. The Anti-Litter Competition was discussed. In the 1st judging Macroom was placed 6th with 942.6 points, and likewise in the 2nd period, with 937.8 points. On

both occasions the Main Street lost a good number of points. The focus is totally on litter and the judges even count the number of cigarette butts they find and marks are lost accordingly. Over the last few weeks our work has been litter picking around town and general maintenance. The Main Street and Chapel Hill was cleaned before the Corpus Christi Procession. There was a new Willow Tree planted in the church Grounds. A lot of work has been carried out to have the town presented well ahead of the music Fest. The Bridge area was brushed, cleaned, the large hanging baskets all the way from the Grotto to Oakwood, smaller hanging baskets were put up over businesses along the square and Main Street. Tidy Towns liaised with Macroom Castle Demesne in relation to the cleaning of the Castle entrance with the help of Lissardagh Cleaning and Finbarr O Connell's teleporter and it was a job well done. Volunteers assisted in putting up the Bunting and signs for Macroom Music Festival, a new venture for Macroom in 2023.

# MACROOM MOVES TOWARDS A DEMENTIA FRIENDLY STATUS

On April 20th, The Alzheimer Society of Ireland (The ASI) in association with AIB Macroom hosted a Dementia Friendly Community Information evening in the Castle Hotel, Macroom. People living with Dementia are among the most marginalised, socially excluded and highly stigmatised. To address the exclusion of People living with Dementia, a new initiative has emerged on the landscape in the form of Dementia Friendly Communities. The evening aimed to mobilise businesses, community services along with People living with Dementia and their families in Macroom to create a more accessible environment for the area where People living with Dementia feel included and involved and have choice and control over their day to day lives.

The ASI was very pleased to see such robust support from attendees during the evening and are delighted to announce that a number of local people have agreed to become Leaders for the Macroom area. Along with ASI's support the Leaders will encourage the community to make progress and coordinate the activities. Taking action is the most important part of any Dementia Friendly Community and following the first Leaders meeting an initial action plan has been produced to identify what the



priorities should be.



It's Festival Season! Macroom was quick off the mark to take advantage of the reduction in traffic, due to the by-pass, to launch the Macroom Music Fest while giving a nod to The Mountain Dew Festival which ran from the latter half of the 70's into the early 80's. I was a bit young to have travelled 'all the way' out to Macroom for a music festival at that time but with headliners such as Rory Gallagher, Elvis Costello and Horslips amongst other big names I am sure the place was literally rocking. I do remember going to Siamsa Cois Laoi in Pairc Uí Chaoimh in 1980 when The Dubliners and Joan Baez headed the bill and the following year it was Bagatelle, Don McLean, and The Wolfe Tones. I can still hear the words of the Bagatelle hit ... "I remember that summer in Dublin, And the Liffey as it stank like hell,...' ringing out across Cork and the (sweet smelling!) river Lee that July in 1981. It's amazing how a song can bring you right back to a place and time.

In the years just before I left Cork City, I got involved with a Set Dancing Group. We danced for pleasure not for competition. We had great fun travelling around festivals in the Cork and Kerry area. In fact it was set dancing that brought me to Ballyvourney for the first time. A busload of us arrived into the area one Saturday evening and descended on what was then O'Connell's Bar in Ballymakeera. We wanted to learn the sets that were danced locally. The local people were quite happy to impart their set dancing knowledge to us. There was a young local fellow there with his parents and little sister and I ended up dancing the Ballyvourney Reel Set with him. I suppose you could say that that evening marked the beginning of a new chapter in my life. This young local fellow was working in Cork city at the time and decided to join our class on Wednesday nights for a couple of weeks so that he could teach us the Ballyvourney Jig Set and the Ballyvourney Reel Set. The first week he arrived he

asked me to dance with him so that he could show us the different figures of the set. I danced with him, he kept coming to the set dancing classes even after we had conquered the incredibly fast moves of the sets and after a couple of years, we ended up married and living back in Ballymakeera. That was forty years ago, and we are still talking!! To really top it off, six years ago I landed a wonderful job in Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne and every day is a festival since.

You see in Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne every day is a festival of books and all the services available from your local library. You can get books about music festivals and literary festivals, art festivals and wellbeing festivals. There are books about artists, musicians, singers, and story tellers who appear at festivals. There are books about camping and cycling, Wild Atlantic Ways, and walking routes to get you to and from festivals. If you want some company on your journey you can download an e-audio book to shorten the road or check out some books to read while you are waiting for your favourite act to appear on stage or if you don't want the extra baggage just download an e-book to read on your tablet or phone.

Meanwhile at the library our younger customers can join in the Summer Stars Reading Festival. Summer Stars is the public library national summer reading festival for children that runs from the 12th of June until the end of August. All children throughout the country are invited to join the adventure and to enjoy the fun and pleasure of reading over the summer. Summer Stars is noncompetitive and every child who reads even one book or e-book is regarded as having completed the programme – and it's all completely free! Libraries Ireland, in partnership with Monaghan Libraries and the FAI, have launched a new World Cup Activity Book. The 28-page book, featuring player profiles, puzzles, games and lots more is available, free of charge, in Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne as part of the Summer Stars reading Festival registration pack. Make sure you visit Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne to register and receive your pack, including the World Cup Activity Book, while stocks last.

The 'My Little Library Book Bag' initiative is a collaboration between libraries, the Department of Rural and Community Development, and the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth as part of the First 5 Strategy. As part of the initiative, a 'My Little Library Book Bag' is available free for every child starting school in 2023 to help them to prepare for this big step. Children and their parents or guardians can collect the bags from their local library. Each My Little Library Book Bag contains:

- · Three books on starting school, making friends and being comfortable to be yourself
- A story card on going to the library
- · A postcard the child can write or draw on and send to their new teacher, or bring to give to the teacher on their first day at school
- · Their very own 'My Little Library' library registration card cardholder

Book bags are available in both Irish and English. I hope that when you visit to pick up a book bag that you will take the time to register the child, and other members of the family, as library members. Then you can come back regularly to keep your bag filled up with borrowed books and to take part in storytimes, classes and all the other events that are on offer at the library.



# Treacing it out in standard MACRONNEST

# On the weekend of the 10th and 11th of June West Cork Trec and Trec Ireland held a full roster of events in Macroom!

Trec or Le Trec is an equestrian sport that originated in France. Perfect for all levels and ages of riders who want something a bit less intense than show jumping or cross country, Trec is an opportunity to test your everyday riding skills whilst enjoying some lovely locations. The aim of Trec is for riders and horses to have fun and enjoy themselves. Riders pick the level they compete at to suit their ability and confidence. For more of a challenge, riders can then move up the levels if they wish.

Trec consists of three events. The PTV or "Parcours en Terrain Varie" is an obstacle course. Set on courses usually between 1km and 5kms, it consists of 16 obstacles. The obstacles are designed to test you and your horse's partnership and recreate what you might meet out and about in the countryside with your horse. There's a mix of obstacles to ride or lead your horse over. From the simple, such as navigating through a straight route between poles, to the more complex like navigating a figure of 8 with one hand, route between poles, to the more complex like navigating a gate on horse back to the more and from the every day of opening and closing a gate on horse back to the more unusual of riding under or between bushes, there's a lovely range of obstacles you could meet. Nothing is mandatory, and every obstacle has a route around it if the rider (or horse!) does not want to take it on.

The MA or" Maitrise des Allures" is the Control of Paces. This is basically a long corridor that you ride up and down. You are asked to slow canter in one direction then fast walk back the other. Points are awarded by how quick your walk is and how slow your canter is. Whilst this sounds easy enough, anyone who has ridden it will tell you it's harder than it looks!

The POR or "Parcours d'Orientation et de Regularite" is Orienteering on horseback. Riders don't know the map in advance and are given time just before they set out to copy down their route. There are checkpoints on the route riders should meet but they aren't told the location of these checkpoints. With a route of up to 15km for level one, all the way to a max of 45km for level 4, this a day out on horseback, often through lovely countryside not accessible by car.

# History

Tradition, these days, is often seen as embarrassingly old-fashioned, isn't it? Lars Fredrik Händler Svendsen, a Norwegian philosopher, shrewdly observes that, in many cases, tradition has been replaced by lifestyles. And yet, tradition is something that enables us to be creative, not something that stifles us. Nowhere is this more evident than in Ireland's song tradition, as the man behind what is often regarded as Ireland's first Irish language pop song, An Poc ar Buile (The Mad Puck Goat), understood very well.

Dónal Ó Mulláin was born on 1st February 1880 in Scrahan, Cúil Aodha, to stonemason Seán Ó Mulláin and his wife, Síle Ní Laoghaire. He was one of seven children, with musical talent in his DNA. A farmer, he could play the violin and concertina, in addition to being a singer and songwriter. Apparently, he was also a good dancer, with Lesa Ní Mhunghaile noting in his biography on dib.ie that he reputedly danced a hornpipe for composer Seán Ó Riada on his kitchen floor a couple of weeks before he died, just before his 85th birthday!

A photo of Dónal, sitting down, in side profile, captures his energy. There is strength of mind and body in that photo, two qualities needed for being the lifelong farmer he was. The photo also suggests someone who is curious about the world, intelligent, and has a sense of humour. Aren't black and white photos wonderful, in terms of what they capture? They are rather like poetry, revealing as much by what is left out, as by what can be easily seen. Light and shadow add to the dramatic effect and it seems Dónal could be quite dramatic!

He married Siobhán Ní Thuama from Kilgarvan, Co. Kerry and they had three sons and three daughters. Involved with Dámhscoil Mhúscraí (The Muskerry Bardic School) from when it began in 1925, Dónal's songs were popular. The topics dealt with national and international current events, with amusing stories he'd heard locally. A misconception about rural people, both then and now, is that they neither know nor understand what is happening in the world, yet nothing could be further from the truth.... as we shall see.

Well-known songs of Dónal's include: Amhrán na tae (The tea song), Amhrán an bhacaigh (The beggar 's song), Halla Chúil Aodha (Cúil Aodha Hall), An Sputnic (The Sputnik), An cailín donn (Brown-haired girl), and, especially, Na táilliúirí (The tailors):

Dónal's best-known song is However, undoubtedly An Poc ar Buile, composed around 1940. The origins of this song are unclear. A song with the same title and tune had existed prior to this, but Dónal's version replaced it. A few meanings are possible, though the most commonly understood meaning is probably the most likely one. It is the quintessential

definition of a rebel song, a patriotic song that uses a fierce goat as a symbol that the Irish will never be conquered, their spirit will never be broken. It tells the tale of Cromwell's (1599-1658) invading army disturbing a herd of goats on a mountain, scattering most of them away in fear. One male goat ran down the mountain, into Killorglin, thus alerting the people, who quickly banded together to protect their herds and their community.

By 1652, Ireland was a country worn down by war and famine. With many Irish soldiers going overseas to earn a living, and more being killed in war, numerous women and children were rounded up by the authorities and either massacred or sold as slaves to work in the sugar plantations in the West Indies. Many Catholic priests were either executed or also transported to the West Indies. Cromwell's method of gaining control of Ireland was through plantation, clearing the country of Catholics and Protestants who had remained loyal to the king, and giving their lands to his supporters. It was a project to make Ireland in a different way, the creation of a new world, a new order, through population growth, through the deliberate plantation of numerous settlers from Britain, displacing those whose land it was – classic divide and conquer tactics. Whereas Catholics owned 90% of the land in 1600, a hundred years later only 15% of the land remained in their hands (Finbarr O'Regan, The Lamberts of Athenry, 1999). Of course, none of this could have happened without the assistance of certain key individuals of the pre-existing society, the gombeen men, or shady businessmen and political figures. This gives the context for Dónal's song, warning of an army with a reputation for pillaging being

Dónal used the symbol of a goat because goats were seen as an animal of the poor and marginalised. Many landlords prohibited tenants from keeping goats, restricting their ability to eke out a meagre living. Where they were allowed to keep goats, this was strictly regulated, which made life just as difficult. Killorglin survived the attack by Cromwell's army, and the event is commemorated every year on August 10th, when a wild goat is raised to the top of a scaffold tower and presides for three days over the festivities - Puck Fair. The fair itself is supposed to date back to ancient times, to the Celtic festival of Lughnasa, which symbolised the beginning of the harvest season, but can only officially be traced back as far as 1613, when King James I issued a charter granting legal status to the existing fair in Killorglin. (Of course, many will remember the controversy over Puck Fair in 2022 - for those who are not familiar with this, there is much information available)

Dónal's cleverness with the song lies in the language used. Language is often a means of resistance, even more so when it is amusing. Colourful turns of phrase, particularly those in rural areas, stem, not from a lack of finesse, but, rather, from a finely developed sense of disrupting the language of those who oppressed. Far from being archaic and backward, this is resistance at its most humorous. Ireland has a long tradition of satirical ballads and protest songs. Of course, 'official' Ireland was not particularly amused, with a correspondent for Comhar in November 1950 being most disapproving of An Poc ar Buile's inclusion in a concert held for Oireachtas na Gaeilge, the annual Irish cultural festival, believing it to be better suited to less respectable surroundings. The correspondent, sadly, seems to have entirely missed the point, engaging in paternalism, believing that officialdom knows what is best for us. Doesn't culture also contain humour? Humour can be wonderfully subversive!

Interestingly, the chorus of Dónal's song was used in another song, by Donegal man Seán Bán Mac Grianna, in 1963, a song called Christine Keeler, once again showing how rural people have a most sophisticated understanding of current affairs (Lillis Ó Laoire, 2014. Seán Bán Mac Grianna and Christine Keeler. Scottish Studies, 37 (1):174-182). Christine Keeler was involved in the Profumo Affair, a scandal that led to the fall of the British government. Keeler became a national outcast after her affairs with both the then War Minister, John Profumo, and a Soviet naval attaché, Yevgeny Ivanov, became public knowledge, in 1963. Profumo, as politicians have done all over the world, and continue to do, human nature being what it is, told his fellow MPs: 'There was no impropriety whatsoever', but later, after a police investigation exposed the truth, admitted that he had lied. Only when found out, did he resign. Largely due to the scandal,









the Macmillan government was voted out of office within a year. Mac Grianna's song is witty, just like Dónal's, though the subject matter is complex.

There have been many wonderful recordings of An Poc ar Buile over the years, with what is seen, perhaps, as the definitive one, being recorded by Seán Ó Sé in 1962. This stands out because composer and music arranger Seán Ó Riada arranged it for a recording, in his newly formed group, Ceoltóirí Chualann. Seán Ó Sé recalled meeting Dónal, in a 13th January 2021 article in the Irish Examiner: I heard Dónall Ó Mulláin sing it. It's a very catchy song and it remained in my mind.

Finally, An Poc ar Buile reached a wider audience, far beyond the audience that Dónal sang to when he performed it at Oireachtas na Gaeilge, even if he did win a prize. Numerous recordings have been made ever since. One of the most innovative recordings is by an Australian punk-folk band, The Rumjacks, who recorded their fourth studio album, Saints Preserve Us, in 2018. It is such fun to listen to (available on YouTube), a completely novel take on a classic, proving that tradition can generate creativity. It doesn't have to remain static, while being respected. One is struck by how Irish culture and tradition are sometimes valued more outside Ireland than within.

Dónal died at his home on 12th January 1965, working on the farm right to the end. He seems to have had such a zest for life, unselfconscious, yet totally aware of the world around him. He is buried in St Gobnait's cemetery, Baile Mhúirne. Cúil Aodha, known for honouring tradition, has not forgotten him, unveiling a plaque commemorating him, in 2011. One can imagine how Dónal would have enjoyed that, regaling all and sundry with one of the stories he was renowned for entertaining the community with, being the storyteller he was. He deserves the commemorative plaque, and so much more. There is also a wonderful wall in Cúil Aodha that has plaques commemorating the numerous notable people from the area. Dónal has two plaques celebrating him on

that wall, with one of those plagues being the chorus to An Poc ar Buile. It is a superb community gesture.

Dónal touched people's lives in many ways, for many reasons, one being because he understood something fundamental about tradition – it is a necessary element of continuity of existence. As a result, he was secure in who he was, secure in where he came from, secure in what he wanted to do with his life. Tradition didn't weaken him, but, rather, strengthened him.

To return to our Norwegian philosopher: one

has to able to place oneself in the world and build a relatively stable identity. The founding of such an identity is only possible if one can tell a relatively coherent story about who one has been and who one intends to be. By this yardstick, Dónal knew exactly who he was, where he had come from, and told the story well. Do we know who we are and where we have come from? Then maybe it's time for us. too, to stand up and tell our stories, to continue a longstanding Irish tradition....

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


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






# Successful Vegetable Gardening the Easy Way

Hi! Chris Barrett here again.

This week I have the great pleasure of speaking with Francis, a man in his 80s with a wealth of knowledge.

Francis has been growing vegetables successfully without spending huge amounts of money for more than 60 years.

It was immediately obvious to me that growing vegetables was more a passion than a hobby for Francis, and that he has a huge amount of practical hard-earned experience to share with us. He is constantly curious and wanting to learn which sets an example for us all

To start, he told me how he had read Ted Cook's article on Holly. He told me how he himself had been advised to hang up male and female holly branches in the cattle-house when cattle were suffering from ring-worm, and how it had proved to be a successful treatment.

He was interested to know if any Lee Valley Outlook readers had followed this treatment protocol and had also found it to be successful. He is also fascinated to learn how and why it worked.

Francis says he will start at the begining as that is the time when many parents dream that their young offspring will go to college and be successful. However Francis is concerned that the growing youngsters are not learning many needed practical life-skills. In olden times many would have gone on to learn a trade. Mechanics and engineers nowadays may have problems getting apprentices because all youngsters are encouraged to think of college first. As a result they fail to learn adequate practical skills such as vegetable gardening. Whether gardening skills are adequately taught in schools very often depends on the practical skills of an enthusiastic teacher, rather than following leadership from the Department of Education. Vegetable gardening is a hands-on experience and cannot be learned from a book.

Francis feels that there are three areas which we fail to pass on to our youngsters at our own cost. Youngsters may be taught baking, but there is often not enough encouragement to learn to cook using fresh vegetables. Practical money management may not be adequately covered and so many young people are unaware of how to prioritise the essentials, which is a vital skill. Francis feels that one of the most important skills which young people are lacking is vegetable gardening, which could help with their food budgeting in current times.

In terms of mental health, being outdoors



and growing a plant from a seed, gives a huge satisfaction which is being missed by many young people. It is also very healthy to eat home grown produce straight from the ground, rather than vegetables that have been transported round the earth and may be eaten weeks or months after they have been picked. The tastiness of a freshly picked home-grown carrot, lettuce or peas is an experience which no supermarket can touch, no matter what the advertising. Some lettuces, such as the wellknown 'Butterhead', can be grown and picked all year round. It has completely different health -giving properties and taste compared with for example, the ubiquitous massproduced 'Iceberg'.

Francis reminds me that everybody's tastes are different, and that if you are are home-grower you can grow to your own liking. He suggests experimenting over the years with a variety of seeds to find out what suits you. You may well end up growing items which are not available in the shops.

It is, as Francis says, a learning process. Francis hates the idea that you could go away and book-learn about gardening. You will learn best by experimenting for yourself and speaking with people who have been gardening in your area for a while. You will learn about which positions various crops like best in your garden, and those positions may not be what you expect. You will learn to watch the seasons and keep in touch with nature. You will learn that what was a good time to plant or harvest last year, may not be a good time this year.e.g. Last year was good for growing early on, then everything went dormant due to the cold weather and as a result a lot of crops went to seed. Cabbage and onions are prone to go to seed quickly if the weather turns cold. The weather controls everything and you cannot control the weather. It is far better to work with nature, and for example cover potatoes with fleece if it is unexpectedly frosty in May.

Your equipment does not need to be expensive. You can use scafolding planks or boards made from old pallets to create raised beds. Raised beds will allow you to manage your vegetable plants more easily. Seed packets will give instructions as to when to plant seeds, but you can use your judgement and local weather forecast to help you decide when.

Your aim is to have dark friable or crumbly soil which is nice to handle. You may need to add compost sand or grit to achieve this.

A word of advice is never to stand on your raised beds because you will compact the soil and water will run off.

Beds are best rotated and Francis leaves a couple of beds fallow as part of his rotation.

You will enjoy learning to be constantly in tune with what is going on in your vegetabe garden. Last year Francis dug his pinks, his field potatoes, in August because they were getting too big; and his Golden Wonders in August because they were so early.

It is essential to keep a close eye on your crops and respond to their needs. As a vegetable gardener, you will learn to tune in to your plants, the Irish weather and your local climate. Regarding strawberries, Francis produces different varieties for early medium and late eating. He uses a barrel with holes in the sides, and produces a long-lasting run of delicious crops. Early on, when Francis was also farming, he only grew a few vegetables, but one day he was given home-grown tomatoes and from then on he started to grow his own under cover. Francis reminds readers that the tastiness and goodness of any vegetable decreases after you pick it. Francis gardens high up and enjoys the clear fresh air as he works. He feels this has great effects on his health generally. He feels fortunate to be able to work outdoors away from car-fumes, a treat for his body and soul.

It has been a real pleasure to speak with Francis and hear about his genuine enthusiasm for vegable gardening which has remained with him into his eighties. I hope you have enjoyed hearing from him as much as I have, and feel inspired to start growing a few vegetables of your own. Before you know it, you also will have gained in so many ways, by getting a closer relationship with nature.

Derry v Cork, Dublin v Mayo

Kerry v Tyrone, Armagh v Monaghan

It will be the first senior championship meeting of Cork and Derry since the 1993 All-Ireland final, which Derry won. Cork were forced to play much of the game with 14 players after the harsh sending-off of Cork's Tony Davis. In this year's Allianz Football League, a late rally earned Cork a draw with the already-promoted Derry at Páirc Uí Chaoimh.

#### CORK 1-14 MAYO 1-11

Cork recorded a marvellous victory over Mayo at Limerick in their final group stage game, scoring 1-6 without reply in the closing quarter hour to turn a six point deficit into the three point victory needed to secure a home preliminary quarterfinal.

The top three teams in the group ended on four points apiece, Kerry topped the group, Cork and Mayo had an identical scoring difference of +3 but the Rebels finished second with a better 'points scored' tally, 2-48 to 2-44.

Steven Sherlock (St Finbarrs) changed the game when introduced in the 40th minute for the injured Ruairí Deane. He kicked 1-5 from six shots in the final half-hour as Cork charged back from a 1-11 to 0-8 deficit. Sherlock accounted for the first 1-4 of that comeback, the goal from a penalty, to edge Cork ahead before fellow impact subs John O'Rourke and Iveleary's Chris Óg Jones gave them the necessary winning margin.

Cork were ahead 0-6 to 0-5 at the break but couldn't sustain such their breakneck pace and Mayo drew level and then went in front by three points before a Cork error allowed the Westerners to break through for a goal in the 57th minute to make it 1-11 to 0-8.

Cork hit right back from the kick-out. Éire Óg's Colm O'Callaghan drove at the heart of the Mayo defence and was fouled for a penalty. Sherlock sent the goalkeeper the wrong way and the Cork challenge was ignited. Sherlock had 1-5 within 25 minutes of his arrival, with his last point giving Cork their first lead in half an hour. When John O'Rourke added another, they led by two entering stoppage time and the signal was given in to the players, one more point would be enough. Mayo messed up their kick out, Sherlock pounced and the ball was worked on through Conor Corbett and Ian Maguire who put Jones in on goal and the Iveleary man punched over for the vital third.

John Cleary, Cork Manager: "I think the big belief comes from beating a Division 1 team. We needed to do that and there were a lot of doubters there - and maybe we hadn't done anything to deserve the plaudits. I can guarantee you that there's a genuine bunch of lads there who have put their shoulders to the wheel since last Christmas".

#### **CORK 1-14 ROSCOMMON 0-16**

A 73rd-minute point from substitute Kevin O'Donovan earned Cork a one-point victory over Roscommon and a place in the All-Ireland SFC quarter-finals. Cork had lost a five point lead in the home stretch as the big home support looked on in growing despair as Roscommon drew level in injury time and looked capable of getting another winning point but Cork won a vital free out on the wing near the half way line, Seán Powter fed Ian Maguire, who in turn found sub O'Donovan and he fisted the ball over the bar.

Following on from the Mayo win, it marks the first time since 2009 that the Rebels have beaten two Division 1 counties in the same championship.

Cork did not have a good first half, and Roscommon deserved their 0-7 to 0-3 lead coming up to half time. Then in the minutes before the break Cork fired over three points in a row to make it 0-7 to 0-6 at half time and the big home support in the 14,294 attendance gave them a rousing send off to the dressing rooms.

They were level immediately after the restart, goalkeeper Micheál Aodh Martin made a brilliant save to deny Diarmuid Murtagh, Roscommon goalkeeper Conor Carroll came forward to stroke over the resultant 45, but Cork scored five of the next seven points between the 40th and 51st minutes. Cork were on top and Steven Sherlock's fifth point gave them a 0-12 to 0-10 lead.

After Roscommon's Daire Cregg replied with a point from a mark, Cork struck for the vital goal, substitute Conor Corbett exchanged passes with Powter before sending a low shot over the line, the ball rolling in off the butt of the post. When Chris Óg Jones added a point, Cork led by 1-13 to 0-11 and they were flying.

Roscommon didn't yield and two Diarmuid Murtagh points cut the gap down to a goal. Three more Roscommon points followed to level the scores but there was to a happy ending for Cork and how the team and supporters loved it!


