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

On the 11th of July we had our monthly meeting in our operations hub in Masseytown. This was well-attended with lots of discussions. The future of the grass cutting in the estates and the councils plan to move away from this was discussed. The tidy towns manage the cutting of approximately 15 acres in the town's environs with three volunteers and this can be very challenging to reach all the allocated areas within a certain time frame. The machine used for the estate cutting is getting older and more expensive to maintain and in the next while it will eventually give up and with no funding available from the council to get one, it will fall on the residents to cut the green area. The council have the responsibility to cut the picnic area in Coolcower, Hartnetts Cross, and the road edges on the Millstreet Road and Killarney Road but with staff shortages this is not happening very regularly. Following representations from councillors at the recent council meeting, there is now a possibility of two seasonal workers being hired by the council to help with work

around the town, a small but welcome addition. As we start planning for the year ahead it might be an idea that all housing estates around Macroom leave some sections grass aside for a meadow which would help with Biodiversity. Meadows are one of Ireland's most important habitats. A Typical meadow can support thousands of different species including a vast array of bees, beetles, spiders, butterflies and worms. They support a huge number of Species above ground and in the soil. For those interested the National Biodiversity Data centre runs a Butterfly Monitoring Scheme, you can help by counting the number of butterflies in your garden. July is a good time to plant begonias, dianthus geraniums, nasturtiums and petunias. Lavender is a suitable perennial to plant in July.

This was always very popular and was greatly missed by parents and children while out of action. We would like to thank the Murphy sisters for the planting and minding the flowers in Dan Corkery Place. Finally, congratulations to our chairperson Martin Coughlan on his golden wedding anniversary and to John Lyons for representing Cork in the Munster Fleadh Cheoil Competition on the mouth organ in Tralee recently.


53% REDUCTION IN NITROGEN DIOXIDE LEVELS IN MACROOM

There was a 53% reduction in Nitrogen Dioxide Levels in the air in Macroom town since the bypass opened. According to the World Health Organisation (WHO) Nitrogen Dioxide and fine Particulate Matter have a major impact on public health and are the leading cause of strokes and heart attacks.

The attached pages details air monitoring carried out by Cork County County in Macroom Town. You can see that 7 different locations were chosen for the air monitoring in the Town, before and after the bypass opened. The results were very interesting!

At a Cork County Council Meeting yesterday, Councillors were furnished with Environmental Report from the Director of Environmental Services Louis Duffy. The attached are two pages from the Report.

I welcome the fact that the level of Nitrogen Dioxide has dropped dramatically in Macroom town since the bypass opened. The majority of the traffic is diverting around Macroom town now; leading to less traffic congestion, and less vehicle exhaust fumes.



Macroom Air Quality Monitoring

We can see the positive impact the bypass has on the businesses in Macroom town. We can also see more people coming into the town, whether it's shopping, tourism, or socializing. This dramatic change in the air quality in Macroom town, is another big positive, for those living, working and visiting the town. I

welcome it.

Great to see the air monitoring is to continue in Baile Mhuirne village too, so we will be able to see the impact of the bypass on the village, when it opens soon.



But phones can offer great advantages too. Do you know that you can download the Borrow Box app to your phone? Borrow Box is an online service that allows you to access e-books and audiobooks on your smartphone, tablet, PC or Kindle Fire e-reader. This service is available free of charge to all members of Cork County Council Library and Arts service, all you need is your library registration number and PIN. You can use Borrow Box to search for e-books and audiobooks and to borrow titles and read or listen on the go. So if your baggage allowance doesn't stretch to taking a few books with you on holidays you can still read while you lounge by the pool by using Borrow Box on your phone or tablet. Borrow Box has great features which make it suitable for dyslexic users and visually impaired users and, with an adjustable playback speed, listeners can enjoy audiobooks at their preferred pace. For more information just call in to your local library and ask for a Tech Steps Guide to Using Borrow Box Leaflet.





N22BBM NEWSLETTER

Welcome to our N22BBM Newsletter

The Doire na Sagart Local Road L-9908 was reopened to general traffic on Friday 26th May following a road closure from the 7th February. This was a small but significant milestone on the project, which gives persons using this Local Road access to a new roundabout on the former N22, which is much safer than the previous situation where the only access was by way of direct access onto a highspeed section of the N22. Another significant milestone on the project has been achieved with the completion of the rock removal from the deep cut at An Sliabh Riabhach. The cut itself measures 28m at its deepest point, with most of the excavated materials having been processed and reused on the project. The challenging profile of the rock in the deep cut at An Sliabh Riabhach necessitated the use of rock anchors and soil nails to ensure that the necessary slope stability could be achieved. These processes have now been completed with the high-level bridge, which gives access to local farmland, also nearing completion. The concrete drainage channel which runs along the sides of the mainline alignment has now been completed. This in turn facilitates the laying of the road construction layers. Road pavement works have progressed well as far as the high-level bridge at An Cheapach Thiar, over the Local Road L-7418. The period of fine weather in May and June has enabled the contractor to make good progress with this aspect of the works. The specialist contractor Motorway Care has completed the installation of the VRS (Vehicle Restraint System) along both

edges of the new road as far as Tonn Láin. The installation of the posts for the central median barrier has commenced and is progressing well. The access road at Carrigaphooca which gives access to lands south of the new N22 road west of the castle has recently been constructed. The permanent fencing of the new road and the installation of field gates between Carrigaphooca and An Tonn Láín is nearing completion. Our most recent newsletter was no. 11 which was published on 19th April 2023 and since then significant progress has been made with the works. between Carrigaphooca and Tonn Láin for a date in August. This will involve a short closure of the Macroom By-Pass Road to facilitate the removal of the temporary Roundabout at Carrigaphooca. Once this roundabout has been removed, traffic will be able to travel on the new N22 road all the way to Tonn Láin, Baile Mhic Íre. The remainder of the project between Tonn Láin and the Western Tie-in at An Sliabh Riabhach will be progressed with: Pavement Works on the mainline alignment Installation of the edge barriers and central median barriers Completion of the Environmental Barriers Fencing works Road lining and installation of road studs Road Signage Foundations for the 2 No. "Per Cent for Art" pieces will be constructed in July, with the art pieces themselves lifted into position in August. Looking forward to what can be achieved in July and August. Finally, we would like to mention once again our gratitude to property owners and residents in the area where the works are taking place, and to the motoring public, for their patience and understanding with these works.



Think Globally, Act locally

THE NATURE RESTORATION LAW

Hi, Chris Barrett back with you. Today I am speaking with Tom who is speaking at a moment in time when politicians have the opportunity to work for the future of our natural world, or to put short term gains first. The decisions we make today will be pivotal in the future course of history. While we all have some little influence, much of the burden rests on the shoulders of our political

leaders. As I write, MEPs are about to vote on whether or not to scrap the proposed Nature Restoration Law (NRL). There's no way for me to know the outcome of this vote, but there have been strong voices of opposition from certain farming representatives and politicians. Unfortunately, much of what is being said by those in opposition to the NRL is in accurate. It has been framed as an attack on the farming sector, when in truth it is probably the only means of securing the future of European agriculture. The stakes could not be higher. June 2023 was the warmest ever recorded, both in Ireland and worldwide. This year, the North Atlantic ocean has shattered temperature records, at one point hovering 4°C above expected norms. Meanwhile Antarctic sea ice is at a record low, despite it being mid-Winter in the southern hemisphere. Rising temperatures are making the Mediterranean unbearable, while fierce rains have caused havoc in northern Spain, Italy and the Netherlands. There's no doubt about it, our climate is changing. The whole world is experiencing unusual weather events on a more regular basis but, worryingly, this is just the beginning. Higher ocean temperatures lead to supercharged storms, which means increased flooding, wind damage, coastal erosion and general mayhem. We have gone beyond the threshold and the question is no longer, can we stop Climate Change, but how bad will it get before we respond? While most of us are supportive of measures intended to achieve lower emissions, a few people still refuse to accept that what is happening is even real. Others acknowledge it, but resist changing industry practices, pointing to other polluters in other industries. Nobody wants to make the first move. Agriculture and transport, Ireland's main emissions sources, are in a deadly standoff, with vested interests vying for political capital and hoping to carry on as normal for as long as possible. In tandem with the looming threat of Climate Change, habitat destruction across the EU and around the world continues to result in declines of almost all species of flora and fauna. It is in this context that the EU Commission recently set about bringing in





nature restoration legislation, which would aim to rehabilitate damaged ecosystems. Studies have shown that diverse landscapes have much higher resilience and can stand up to extreme weather events better than intensively managed land. The hope is to encourage more diversity through incentives for small areas of trees or scrub, maintenance of surviving wilderness and restoration, where appropriate, of damaged habitats like water bodies, bogs and upland heaths. All this would be done through consultation, dialogue, remediation and financial support. Those drafting the legislation know very well that this plan needs to work for everybody, so every contingency must be addressed. Yet stern opposition has come from numerous sources, many of them using incorrect assertions to project their arguments. Billy Kelleher, Fianna Fáil MEP for Cork South, has been an outspoken critic, saying "it will impact food security", that it will lead to rewetting of "the entirety of peatland in Ireland". But implementation of EU law has always been the prerogative of member states. The proposed NRL contains specific clauses that consider the importance of rural development, while questions of rewetting or rewilding are decided by individual countries. In short, Mr Kelleher, amongst others, appears to be mistaken. Has he himself been misled? Kelleher's position is amplified by the European People's Party (EPP) Group, a centre-right alliance of political parties that includes Fianna Gael, and forms a powerful voting bloc within the European Parliament. EPP Group is opposed to the nature restoration goals because they fear it would reduce "productive land, forest or sea areas without any consideration of the social and economic consequences". This is not accepted by environmental NGOs. Sabien Leemans, senior biodiversity policy officer with World Wildlife Fund said: "Droughts, floods and forest fires are regularly gripping Europe and threatening farmers' livelihoods. Instead of looking for solutions to make farming more resilient to these recurring events, EPP rejects the one solution we have at our disposal nature restoration." Indeed, nature restoration,

in tandem with reform of farming policies, could boost food security in Ireland. Despite ranking high on the Global Food Security Index, we are hugely dependent on imported inputs like fodder and fertiliser, leaving us vulnerable to shocks in other parts of the world. A recent study published in Nature estimated international food security to be dangerously exposed,

as global heating is happening more rapidly than previous estimates. We are conditioned to believe a strong economy is the lifeblood of the nation, dependent on hard work and a willingness to make sacrifices. Wildlife is not high on everybody's agenda and for some, its relevance is merely trivial. Others care for it, but understand 'the way of things'. I once worked on a farm with a river running through it, and a couple of acres beside the river, recently seeded with grass. "We took out a bit of a wood there", said the farmer with a sad smile when he saw me regarding the scene, "sure we needed to make it pay." The hope is, we won't always have to make such choices. Farmers are aware of these issues much more than those who claim to represent them. As ever, there is divergence between realities on the ground and so-called leaders. We need the insulation of a strong natural world to support our food production capabilities. Without it, our very soil will be washed away by the powerful storms to come. By the time you read this, the Nature Restoration Law may already be lying on the scrapheap of historic failures. If it has survived the vote of July 12, it will go on to be negotiated, line by torturous line by those who support it, with those who do not. Therein lies hope. 

Connie in an interview with his family...

Connie, what would you say leads to a long life? Sure it has to be Gods will really, I've no say in the

matter at all! I'm very lucky & thankful, I don't think I'm deserving of it really, I smoked a lot & got away with it, so God's will or genetics . . . or both i suppose!! But i will say plain eating like having porridge for every breakfast must be of some benefit. I never touched alcohol but I do have a sweet tooth, though I keep that in moderation now! For a while there I was fairly addicted to mint sweets after the cigarettes. I'd tried to give them up so many times after Lough Derg and at Lent & the like, tried the pipe for a time too but eventually I managed, thank god. They're awful things really! The mileage is high on the clock now but, when I was more able, a walk every night up to the highest hill in the parish did me good, fresh air into your lungs whether a smoker or not is very important for anyone. You can see 4 or 5 counties from this hill you know, 'Barna'. You see the tip of the Comeraghs, a bit of the Galtees, McGillicuddys, our own Mullaghanish, Mushera & there's Sheha to the South. And then on any really clear night you might see the different lighthouses shine a beam into the sky with their various light pulses, Fastnet, Old Head, The Galley & so on. I used to know the different light patterns one time. All my working days I could look out my front door to see Torc & the Reeks - sure how bad is that! My father's people came from a wonderful part of Kerry and so I have a certain Grá for the place of course. We've a beautiful country overall. They tell me now there's wind-vanes over that way, but my sight is gone, I can't see

them at all. But that's technology for you!

The mounting years have prevented me getting shocks anymore, anything goes now! You acquire a certain tolerance (or maybe immunity!) after a long life. I suppose there were some at the time. Sure tis 20yrs since my 80th! I'm impressed when I hear my grandchildren's news & the amount of travel they've notched up to date, what they can do on computers, on these iPhone things & so on. But also the enthusiasm & interests they have in so many, many things. They're such a joy to talk & listen to, they really are! We had none of those opportunities! Life was definitely tougher i suppose. We were effectively quarantined during the war years, you could be stopped &questioned, there was food coupons & rationing and only the doctor or priest had access to fuel for a car - but people were very good to each other. I still have great neighbours but every one of them is much younger than me now of course! When I stayed in digs while in UCC in the early '40's the landlady had to dry out the used tea-leaves on the corrugated roof of her shed each day - so the cupán tae was a bit on the weak side alright by Friday! A hard life but you managed, we were all in the one boat.

You've always had a great interest in cars/ motors/& engines - when did you first drive?

My uncle & ourselves had 2 grand strong horses called Slievenamon & Dolly, when we got a trap we had more comfort as it had a basic suspension & rubber on the wheels. Before that 'twas donkey & car, you had a rough oul' journey in that I can tell you - but it was better than walking for miles all the same!

Our first motor at home was bought the year after I was born, 1924, a Ford Model-T, 2-seat-cab Truck with a wooden frame. It had 3 pedals, the left one for neutral or low gear, middle for reversing - no gearbox remember - and the right pedal was a brake, the brake wasn't on the wheels at all now, but on the transmission!! No heater, no accelerator but a throttle-lever on the steering column. Being a General Merchant's we then went onto a Model B truck about 1931, this had twin rere wheels much like today's ones with a 4 speed gearbox, crank handle to start it, a big improvement as we could carry more goods, transport pigs, crates of eggs & the like.

In 1929 didn't we also get a car, I remember the registration, PI 4984, I recall them all in fact. This was a Ford Model-A 14.9 horsepower 4door with wheels that had wire spokes - this thing was "mod" altogether, it had a gearbox, handbrake, had 2wind-up windows, you could lock the doors, had a mileometer and it even had a wiper (for the driver only) if you don't mind! It had a turning handle if needed but 'twas self-started by battery. The height of comfort, sure! We had it til 1940 but the roads were bad, no maintenance you see, there was always broken springs & burst tyres to fix. All vehicles of course were grounded during the war & mostly sold off. As we were in General Business most of the carriage of goods was done by train to & from the boxcars in Dooniskey station, it was a case of load up your horse & trap or donkey & car & draw goods, before we got the truck. Like many places we were lucky in Cork County to have a great rail network, I remember them all in working order, steam locomotives, very hard work onboard but wonderful to see & hear! It was a shame to see it all hauled up really. Sure the viaducts in. say, Mallow (they tell me that was opened the year i was born, 1923) the Ballydehob one, the Viaduct out the Bandon Road & so on, all the beautiful stone built stations - all out of use now - were great feats of engineering that served us well. At that time, say the early 1930's, the 'Oueen Maeve' steam train did the Cork-Belfast route in one go. You could be in Dublin itself in 3>r hours, even then! But it meant 2 strong sweating men shovelling coal continuously for that time. Hard going.

And not the thing at all these days of course!!

I was aged 12 when I first drove! Well, I knew how it all worked at aged 8 being honest, from observing my father & my uncle Johnny! I drove til a short few years ago. I was born 11 months after



We were some of the first children to do Irish in school, in fact my older sister would've been in that first class, 4 yrs ahead of me.

Homework was done by candle, pen & inkwell - you just couldn't get the oil in the War Years for 'Tilly lamps', there were better times before WW2 but yet the economic war of the early '30's meant farmers had cattle selling for little or nothing, it was a hard life, very, very tough. In that way the effects of WW2 changed things, i suppose where there was then a great need so prices were a bit healthier - we also exported tons of eggs by both train & ship to Wales & places, it was actually a currency in itself! And sure didn't they have grand fresh Tarelton eggs for breakfast the following morning! We lived by trading food coupons, in our own business at home, little or no cash was used. A penny was a decent thing, & by God but the people of the time knew its value - we had to!

When the war ended, things got worse if anything, worldwide a lot of destruction had happened, we were lucky here in Ireland but dealing with other countries was of course difficult. Absolutely no shipping was happening as the fear was they could still be torpedoed, then, while things began to improve, Ireland was only given a mere 2nd thought as we were this small incidental island at the side of Europe but eventually things got a bit better again - only slowly though - by around 1948/'49. But it took that long. By the 50's cars were now out & about again yet rare enough, greater ownership didn't happen much til the 60's. Oil was still scarce, but thankfully we grew most of our own foods & of course we always had dairy. Most families had a pig or laying-hens for household use. Economic recovery was slow & a lot depended on shipping like I mentioned. Huge changes have occurred of course since then, in a good way, central heating, medical care, the quality of food & all that has to add into our chances of living a healthier & longer life. I mean a toothache in 1930 as treated by an injection of - believe it or not now - 'cocaine'! I'm sure it wasn't the stuff of today but it knocked out sensation in the gum alright, god knows!! I have great chats with my grandson - he did engineering too but it has all progressed way beyond me now - I was telling him about when in 1946 I bought a 2nd hand ex-Canadian army generator, a 32V 'lighting set' & a coil of strong cable from England to wire the house. I was always interested in that sort of thing. It was shipped to the local rail station here, I started at it with high hopes, long nights after work in the candlelight - and to my amazement it worked! 'Twas grand to see that first bulb lighting! This was before rural electrification by the 'Lee Scheme' about a decade later. It was to be a lifelong job. Well it lasted til this year anyway & my neighbour Seamas - his mother Mary was in my class at school - did a mighty job rewiring it earlier in the year!

Best decision you ever made?

That's easy - to marry my Noreen. Up til last year we were given nearly 57 years together, having met on the Easter Sunday 60yrs prior to the week she died. She was the best & we miss her terribly as you can understand.

Future plans?

Well I'll try & stay around for another bit hopefully!! If the man above sees fit, that is! I have good people around me. Every Friday I meet up with others the same vintage as myself – mind you I'm still the antique even there! The 7 grandchildren are a wonderful treasure, they're just the best & they'd keep you positive, I have home-help with great hearts, I get mass on TV every morning, a neighbour brings communion once a week. I really miss reading as my sight is so bad, 'tis nearly gone really, but I listen to the radio all the time & listen to the matches too they're fierce exciting! I can't dial out on the phone any more but people are great to phone me & chat. I love the 'oul chat! I'm very lucky & I'm very thankful.

The Year You Were Born

Born on a Saturday 28th July 1923 - the 2023 & 1923 calendars are just one day out, your birthday this year is on a Friday! There are entries on a ledger in Tarelton by your mother Julia on July 28th 1923. Strong woman, determined but there she was, working away on the day her 3rd child would be born!! Approx 490 citizens are aged 100 in Ireland this year of which just 80 are men! Being born in 1922, the average life expectancy was

58 years old for men, and 61 years old for women!
In 1923 also, in Ireland an order is signed creating the Revenue
Commissioners. The Provisional Government of Ireland takes
office. The Nobel Prize for Literature is awarded to poet and
playwright W. B. Yeats. Amongst his gems: "The world is full of
magic things, patiently waiting for our senses to grow sharper"
and "Education is not the filling of a pail, but the lighting of a fire."

The All-Ireland Champions are Galway(hurling) and Dublin (Gaelic football). The Civic Guard" was renamed Garda Siochána na hÉireann on 8 August 1923. A selection of others born in 1923:

Brendan Behan, poet, novelist and playwright, Patrick Hillery, sixth President of Ireland, the actress Siobhán McKenna.

WORLDWIDE

The Egyptian king Tutankhamun's burial chamber was found by archaeologists in 1923. Richard Attenborough, Henry Kissinger, Hank Williams Snr, Actor Charleton Heston & the singer Maria Callas were born. Insulin is introduced for the treatment of diabetes - marketed by Eli Lilly! The first dinosaur eggs were discovered in 1923. The "Hunchback of NotreDame" was released in film. In 1923 the future King George 6th got married to who we remember as the 'Queen mother'. Roy and Walt Disney founded The Walt Disney Company.

The Yankee Stadium opened in The Bronx hosting its first Baseball game. The World's population was just 1.94 billion.

The single-year car model sales record has remained unbroken since 1923 when Ford sold 2.011,125 Model Ts.

The Firestone Tire and Rubber Company started producing inflatable tyres.... while also in 1923 'Goodyear Tire' created a subsidiary known as the Goodyear Zeppelin Company to manufacture airships, and between 1923 and 1995, it made over three hundred zeppelins. Time magazine began publication (a subscription to which John Burns Snr, Connie's father, made in the early '20's and which was still being delivered to his house til recent years when Connie's sight then failed, still under the address of "J.Burns Esq. Postmaster Tarelton"!).

'The Prophet' by Kahil Gibran was published. In 1923, Wembley Stadium opened. Coca-Cola invented the six-pack in 1923! In 1923, the "HollyWood" sign is officially dedicated in the hills of Los Angeles. It originally read "Hollywoodland" but the 4 last letters are dropped after renovation in 1949. The sign itself was designed to only stand for 18 months! Sayings like the Bee's Knee's were new to the vocabulary in 1923. A whooping cough vaccination was found. German Shepherd Rin Tin Tin became film's first canine Star. Women's one-piece bathing suits begin to

be worn. 1923 Inventions:The cotton swab, Bulldozer,
Instant camera. Ever had Birds Eye frozen foods? It was Clarence
Birdseye who developed this system of preserving fresh foods,
frozen. Airway beacons replace bonfires to guide pilots at night.

MEP KELLEHER CALLS ON IRISH GOVT TO CONSIDER REQUESTING EXTENSION TO BREXIT ADJUSTMENT RESERVE FUND

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that it may be necessary for the Irish Government to request an extension to the Brexit Adjustment Reserve (BAR) to provide Irish applicants with enough time to spend their allocation.

Kelleher was speaking after being contacted by at least three different enterprises over the past number of months who have expressed concern that they may not be able to spend their allocation in the required timeframe.

"Ireland is the single largest beneficiary of the BAR with funding of over €920 million being allocated between 2021 and 2023. It's an incredibly useful fund to support businesses who have been

materially affected by Brexit, and to enable some of : timelines. them to diversify away.

"Many companies in coastal Ireland have applied, and have been successful in their applications, for funding under BAR. These communities have suffered due to long-standing fisheries policies, which Brexit made even worse. BAR is a chance for them for a fresh start. The incredibly tight timeframes are putting their new enterprises and activities under threat.

"From discussions with my colleagues in the European Parliament, I am led to believe that other Member States would welcome an extension. They too have enterprises that are struggling to meet the

"We cannot leave any more on the table. It's too important to the enterprises and the communities who have been badly hit by Brexit," concluded Kelleher.

PACKAGE HOLIDAY CANCELLATIONS

I just booked a holiday online, how do I know if it is a package holiday?

Package holidays can be ready-made or customised packages. A package holiday is sold at a total or inclusive price, must last for more than 24 hours, or include an overnight stay. It does not matter if you are asked to pay separately for different parts of the package (such as, the flight or transport), your holiday is still a 'package holiday'.

Package holidays include at least 2 of the following:

- · Transport, like flights, a cruise, or train or coach journeys
- · Accommodation
- · Other tourist services, like tours, excursions, guides, or tickets for concerts or theme parks

What happens if I need to cancel my package holiday?

You can cancel your booking at any time before travelling, although you should try to give reasonable notice. However, you may have to pay a cancellation fee.

If there are unavoidable or extraordinary circumstances happening at or near your destination that will affect your holiday (for example war or a natural disaster), you may be able to cancel for free. Have I a right to transfer my contract?

You can transfer your holiday to another person once you give the travel organiser reasonable written notice (at least seven days) before the start of the package. You and the person you transfer the package holiday to are responsible for paying the balance of money due to the travel organiser. You are also responsible for any other costs the organiser has to pay to carry out the transfer.

What happens if the organiser cancels my package holiday?

If the travel organiser cancels the package holiday or changes a term of the contract, including the price or type of accommodation, they must give you the option of either:

- · A replacement holiday of the same or better quality
- · A lower grade holiday, with a refund of the difference in price
- · A full refund within 14 days

The organiser has the right to cancel the package due to factors out of their control. This includes an act of God, or where they didn't get the number of people they needed for the package holiday.

What happens if my flight is cancelled?

If your flight is cancelled, you are entitled to a choice of:

- · A refund with 7 days
- · Re-routing to your final destination as soon as possible
- · Re-routing at a later date that is suitable for you

You may also be entitled to compensation.

If your flight is cancelled and it is part of a package holiday, you have additional rights regarding the rest of your holiday.

You should contact your travel organiser to talk through your options for rearranging your flights. If this is not possible and your holiday has to be cancelled, you are entitled to a replacement holiday or a full refund. Read more about holiday cancellations on https://bit.ly/PackageHolidays

What are my rights if something goes wrong while I am on my holiday?

If something goes wrong with your holiday, the travel organiser must put the problem right. If significant parts of the holiday are not as agreed, you must be offered suitable alternative arrangements. For example, if the accommodation you agreed on and booked is no longer available, you must be offered an alternative that is of the same quality. If the travel organiser does not provide solutions (also known as remedies) within a reasonable period, they should refund you for any necessary expenses you had to pay. You are also entitled to a price reduction or, if you prefer, to end the contract. You may be entitled to compensation for inconvenience.

Does my travel organiser have to help me if I encounter any major difficulty while on

The travel organiser must give appropriate help if you are in difficulty. This includes:

- Giving you information about healthcare, local authorities, consular assistance (for example if you have had a serious accident)
- Helping with communications, for example helping you make long distance calls or other forms of contact so you can find other travel arrangements


GRENAGH 2-16 CANOVEE 3-5

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Welcome back dear student "come to Me all you who labour and are heavy laden and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28-30). Prosecco or Jack Daniels won't help. Many have tried that and woken up with the same or worse problems, and a sick hangover on top of it! God told Paul - "My strength is made perfect in your weakness" (2 Corinthians 12:9). Like the song says 'let the weak say I am strong" — well, we are made strong in relationship with Jesus (loel 3:10)

When a person comes to God in surrender - and confesses ... "Lord Jesus, I believe in You. I'm weak - I've tried doing things my own way to find success and peace. I've tried pleasing people to find favour in my search for happiness. I've tried rituals and religious activities and good deeds to feel satisfaction and completeness, but nothing has been enough to take away the emptiness, the loneliness, the fears or insecurity. Darkness still has the edge on me and threatens to engulf me. Lord Jesus, please come into my life and show me Who You Are; I'm desperate to know that You're real". This is an honest prayer and it's one God answers every time dear friend. Jesus said that He stands at the door and knocks, and if we open the door He will come in (Revelation 3:20). He waits to be invited in, and He needs to know He is wanted. No one feels comfortable around someone who doesn't want to be with them. What makes us think Jesus is any different? 
