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
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
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

the For those interested in gardening, August is a good time to plant Dianthus, Geraniums, Marigolds and Verbena. Plant them about 15cm apart and cover the soil with Bark Mulch. 

We all have something new in common - we have lived through the wettest July in recorded history. It's not really something I will be listing as an achievement although the weather was so disappointing it was an achievement to get through it. Having said that, I am happier with the weather we had than the extremes that so many are enduring throughout Europe and elsewhere in the world. Have we lost our chance of a Summer this year or is there still time? That nice spell we had in late May early June was very welcome and it would be lovely to finish out the season in a similar way.

When I was going on Summer Holidays to West Cork as a child, I always included a good stock of books in case of bad weather. As we drove to where we stayed there was usually enough room in the car to include a pack of cards, a set of draughts and a few board games such as Ludo and Snakes & Ladders. I remember playing Snap and Beg of Your Neighbour with my parents and grandparents and these games could often get quite heated. There were three girls in the family on the farm where we stayed so even when the weather was good we often played cards and board games long into the Summer evenings as darkness was my

only deadline for getting back to my own house. We had such fun those evenings which often dissolved into laughter when we started to tweak the rules to stretch out the game. And there were snacks too of course, Quavers, Opal Fruits, dilute orange and rice crispy cakes, which we made earlier. When I had children of my own, we used to do the same when going on caravan holidays and pack in some board games. By this time we had advanced to Frustration rather than Ludo and it really was a case of frustration for my son – I don't think he ever won a game and to this day he does not like the game. So books, cards, board games and laughter were the antidote to bad Summers when I was growing up – I wonder what it is now? If your little one is starting primary school in September, it's not too late to collect a Little Library Book Bag from Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne where they are in stock in Irish and English. Each bag includes free library membership, with a specially designed Little Library card wallet, as well as information for parents to support children in preparing for the next stage of their learning journey.

Do you know that there is a Comfort Kit available on request for use while on a visit to Leabharlann Bhaile Bhúirne? The Comfort Kit includes basic sensory items such as: a weighted blanket, dark glasses, ear protectors, and more. The contents of the Comfort Kit have been carefully chosen to give children a feeling of security and to soothe the senses. Please ask at the library desk.

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MACROOM SOUTH DOC: ARE ITS DAYS NUMBERED?

Southdoc is an out-of-hours GP/Local Doctors' service that covers most practices in counties Cork and Kerry. It has operated in Macroom since 2002.

On Sundays, 30 July, and 6 August 2023, there was no doctor working from the Macroom

SouthDoc came about to:

- 1. Give GPs a better quality of life
- 2. To put in place an adequate and safe out-ofhours community service.

GPs are independent contractors, and agree to give medical care 24-hour a day, 365 days a year to their medical card patients by contract and their private patients by extension of that practice. It is the doctors' responsibility to provide out-of-hours cover for their patients. Now, local doctors service the midweek 6-8 or 9, and 9-9 on Saturdays and 9-9 Sundays and 9-8 or 9 on Bank Holidays. (Southdoc website, as seen on Sunday 6/8/2023 - see photo.)

The Macroom cell covers practices in Macroom, Ballyvourney, Coachford and Cloughduv; the area covered goes roughly from the County Bounds and Keimaneigh to Farnanes, Donoughmore to Kilmichael. It is based on cell doctors' patients and about 18-20,000 patients are served.

SouthDoc was first temporarily located in Castle Street before moving to Macroom Hospital Grounds and is now situated in Macroom Health Centre, in Fairgreen. A well equipped centre and car were/are supplied. In 2002, after much discussion, local doctors accepted the new arrangement on the understanding that a good quality out-of-hours locally-based service would be supplied (Corkman, 14 February, 2002). Initially a driver and secretary were employed - they and the doctor worked from the centre, saw patients there and did home-calls as needed. On moving to Macroom Hospital a nurse also attended for a while. Doctors' rotas changed from a 1-in-3 (in my case 1983-2002) to about a 1-in-10 (202-2014). Call involved a doctor being in the centre 18.00 to midnight, midweek and being on call from midnight until 9.00 a.m. the following day. Weekend duty was 1 p.m. - midnight on Saturday and 9 a.m.-midnight on Sundays. Later second-on-call duty was re-located to Bandon, with a driver supplied. Later again, locum doctors were employed for this shift.

When the 2008 crash came, cutbacks followed and involved losing the nurse and secretary from the service. Over the past number of years the hours of SouthDoc opening in Macroom have diminished. It is my understanding that Macroom SouthDoc has been without a doctor for several days this year and last. Ironically on Sunday, 30 July, three pharmacies were open in Macroom but the town was without a doctor. Pre 2002, on Sundays several doctors were on duty but no pharmacy was open.

It is a given that medical cover should be available 24/7. Patients are advised to report immediately in cases of chest pain and possible stroke - remember the slogan 'Act FAST'. Cardiac arrest demands immediate attention, and anaphylaxis - a severe life-threatening allergic reaction - needs urgent treatment. If strokes caused by clots receive 'clot-buster' treatment early, patients can recover fully or at least better. Meningitis needs early diagnosis and prompt treatment. The list of illnesses that need immediate attention is long. Most serious emergency cases need rapid transfer to

hospital. The Macroom-centred area covered by Macroom SouthDoc is long and wide. Sometimes our ambulance(s) has/have gone to Cork or been retained there and is/are not immediately available – perhaps not for hours. There are many causes for the reduction in service; money, personnel, GPs' scarcity and workload, life- work balance, graduates emigrating soon after qualification, doctors working part-time or not at all etc. Whatever the causes, doctors are absent from Macroom occasionally and the service is reduced. Kanturk and Skibbereen SouthDoc centres have been reported as closed and there is a strong suggestion that Macroom's may too be closed.

It's a far cry from what was there before 2002 and what was there in the earlier versions of SouthDoc. SouthDoc was originally and reluctantly accepted by doctors and patients in its original and better form.

Is the current (and occasionally absent) service good enough and safe enough for Macroom, and all areas bereft of doctors out-of-hours?

MASS ROCK

The annual Mass at the Mass Rock on the South Lake Road was con celebrated by Father Anthony and Father Diarmuid on the 25th of July, the feast day of Saint James. A large crowd attended. It was a lovely evening with the setting sun flooding the enclosure where we are told our ancestors risked their lives by attending the forbidden Mass of penal times. Nearby is the hill called Cnoc na Feadaíle (the hill of the whistle) where a local would position himself and whistle a warning if soldiers were approaching. The plaque on the altar tells us that the place was used for worship from the end of the 1600s to about 1800. There are many Carraig an Aifrinn all over Ireland but there can be few so well constructed or preserved as this one, about a mile south west of Inchigeela. It is also one of the best loved and respected landmarks in our parish. Father Anthony's sermon reflected on the feast day we had, that of Saint James, regarded as being the first martyr of the church. He drew our attention to the many unknown martyrs, like many of our ancestors, who risked their lives to follow their beliefs and that we should not forget them or : that we stand on the shoulders of those who have gone before us. The poignant reflection, the choir singing outdoors, the fine summer evening made the occasion very pleasant and memorable indeed.

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Wild Gardens

Hi! Chris Barrett back talking once again with my good friend Tom Jordan.

He is taking a look at the historical context of gardening and asking if we can see another kind of beauty.

The great artist Claude Monet famously said: "My garden is my most beautiful masterpiece." For those of us lucky enough to have a garden of our own, it can become

a delightful obsession. A garden is a personal paradise, a land over which we have the right to rule as we see fit. There is nowhere else we can enjoy the freedom to create natural structure with leaf-dappled shade, bright flowers and lush green vistas. It's the sculpting of a living landscape, the realisation of a vision that takes many years of dedication, patience and at times heartache, to achieve. In short, it's an opportunity to express our personality and indeed, a garden is a reflection of its owner's very philosophy on life. Recently there have been many calls for people to rewild their gardens, to the consternation of some celebrity gardeners like Monty Don, who called it "puritanical nonsense." Of course not everybody wants a wild garden. The terminology is even frightening to some. People like to maintain control over their surroundings and rewilding is, they might say, the antitheses of control. But there are other ways of seeing it and indeed, if we called it diversification, it might be a more apt term.

The modern garden, as opposed to a site for growing food, can be easily traced back to the seventeenth century when the first pleasure palaces were built around Europe, notably Versailles which was hugely influential on garden designers in other countries. The British developed a special love of lawns and were among the first to master them. A lawn is useful for various leisure activities and 'taking tea on the lawn' was a popular high society pursuit. Evolving sports like golf, tennis, cricket and bowling depended upon firm, level, consistent surfaces which a lawn could provide. At a time when the only tools available for maintaining perfectly pruned grass were hand-held shears, it followed that the larger your lawn was, the richer you must be. There's no doubt that this idea has taken hold of people's imagination. Even in hot countries today, millions of gallons of water are commonly diverted to feed the sprinklers that fulfil this expectation of a presentable green, neatly trimmed lawn. Through television programs and advertising, the impression is constantly reinforced that successful, respectable people live ordered





lives generously-appointed behind freshly painted gates, surrounded by green lawns and well-behaved plants. We're conditioned to admire manicured landscapes and decorum demands that vegetation should be maintained in this way.

Ireland wasn't always known for being neat and tidy. I remember growing up in the 1980s when a lot of country people in particular, had no time or inclination for maintaining show gardens. With interest rates through the roof and the country in permanent economic crisis, gardens were focused on sustenance. The ones I recall were nevertheless very charming, with climbing roses, old ivy-clad walls hiding birds' nests and endless other surprises for a curious child. Useful herbs were grown near the house, as in the song, "parsley, sage, rosemary and thyme." Most people had a small orchard with a variety of apple trees and perhaps a few plums with further space devoted to blackcurrants, gooseberries, raspberries and maybe a few strawberries. Quite a few people still grew their own vegetables so little plots of potatoes, carrots, onions and cabbages were a common sight. A beehive or two was not uncommon. Some lucky folk had a glasshouse and could produce rarities like tomatoes and peppers. Otherwise you might see a little bit of ruffled lawn in front of the house, sometimes grazed with a few lambs or a donkey and most frequently used for playing football. There might have been a lofty oak or more often an ash with over-hanging branches that made it an easy climb for strengthening the limbs of adventurous children. A few shrubs, often old and messy, with lots of thorns that'd burst your ball, because for many people a native roadside hedge was good enough. After all it kept out the wind and it had its own beauty, as well as providing timber, food and medicinal plants like elder-flowers, blackberries, sloes and hazelnuts.

In essence, country gardens were practical places. How things have changed. With the Celtic Tiger boom came a new self confidence that belied our old insecurity and like the post-famine eagerness to throw off our native language, a certain shame permeated the Irish consciousness. Again, we no longer wished to be associated with poverty and want. The old-fashioned country gardens alongside the vernacular buildings many of us grew up in, were abandoned, bulldozed and forgotten. Young couples set their standards higher, desirous of showing the world how successful they were. They built

fine large houses and their style of gardening changed radically too. Instead of growing vegetables, most of us now shop for them at Lidl or Aldi, paying much less indeed than it might cost in time and effort to produce our own, though with hidden impacts on growers and the environment. Without the need to shelter food crops, new houses have themselves become the focal point. They want to be seen, so they dominate their surroundings as status symbols, with entrance walls, pillars, fancy gates, tarmacadam driveways and acres of rolling lawn. Sometimes a tree or two might be planted, but not much else. In these alien environs a lone dandelion is a conspicuous interloper, while a nettle is a fugitive from justice.

The Irish architectural historian Robert O'Byrne has said: "All gardens represent the struggle for dominance between man and nature." While once all aspects of gardening were very labour intensive, so dedicated leisure gardens were the preserve of the very rich. Today, solar powered drone lawnmowers can commonly be seen patrolling the wide expanses. Motorised hedge-cutters quickly subdue any untamed bush and a knapsack sprayer will take care of the rest. One day of action knocks it all into shape, leaving the lairds and ladies to pursue other objectives. Professional gardening companies have mastered these simple interventions and so a small team of workers can carry out all maintenance work in jig-time, while offering their services at affordable rates. But all of this comes at a cost to wildlife, most of which cannot survive very well on empty lawns and bare verges.

Ireland has seen a revolution in terms of both housing and gardening, some of it for the better, but the wheel continues to turn. More and more property owners appreciate the importance of allowing biodiversity to flourish. Many now realise how effectively a well-chosen climber can soften the harsh lines of a building, embellishing it with scent and form, reducing its new-build glare. Beyond are layers of canopy, from a palate of vibrant wildflowers along the ground, through the thrilling taste of home-



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grown fruit bushes, to the stately presence of the great trees that would ennoble and enrich any fine edifice. Changing our gardening aesthetic does not impose much extra work. For the most part, it's simply a matter of having patience and doing less. Structured planting of trees behind smaller shrubs interspersed with hardy perennials, can result in the creation of new habitat, while presenting a type of beauty Monet himself would admire. Let us hope that

that future generations get to enjoy the fruits of nature and the wonders of gardening for generations to come.

DID YOU KNOW? Hall – Macroom - By Con Kelleher

'Hall' is a common, almost a dull word. However, delving deeper reveals more. My interest in the word was piqued by the erection of a new hall in Macroom, The Jehovah Witness Kingdom Hall in Barrett Place. The 'older' traditional religions in Ireland have seen attendances decrease while there seems an upsurge in religious groups previously small. Seeing the new building began a train of thought.

Like many words, 'hall' has multiple meanings. It can be an entrance passage of a house, a corridor or passage in a house, a large public room in a palace or big house, or a principal living-room of a medieval house. It can refer to a mansion of landed property, a university students' residence, a place of instruction, a dining area or a guild's headquarters. Macroom has a Town Hall, where the public can meet for various purposes – it is really a very large public room. Examples of various types are present in history and around Macroom.

According to the Oxford Dictionary, 'hall' or 'heall' was originally a roofed space centrally located for the use of a tribal chief and his people. It was an Old German word and transferred to Dutch, Irish, Norse and Swedish and thence to English. 'Valhalla' means heaven or more literally, the hall or place where warriors slain honourably in battle reside - the resting place of heroes. A punishment once in Irish schools was to put misbehaving students in the 'halla', a sort of internal public humiliation. If there, one hoped that the principal would not emerge or somebody, important or not, would not call to the school. It seems that 'hall' is related to the word 'cell' which originally meant a place where one hid something. But that's another day's business.

'Sam Hall' is a famous ballad. It originated in England and as 'Jack Hall'. It was adopted and adapted over time and in other locations. The version now popular in Ireland describes taking 'Sam' to Cootehill (Co. Cavan) for hanging. His crime was to 'rob the rich and pay the poor'. Marble Halls (I dreamt I dwelt in Marble Halls) is a well-known aria from 'Bohemian Girl (1843) where it is sung by Arline who is in love with Thaddeus, an exiled Polish nobleman; Poland was then divided and split among three empires - Russian, Austria-Hungarian and

German. Enya has a beautiful version available on Youtube and the late Sinéad O'Connor sang it as part of the soundtrack of 'Butcher Boy'.

Though Macroom's Jerry Hall is well-known, his American name-sake and former supermodel is famous world-wide. As well as being a supermodel, she was Mick Jagger's partner from 1977-99 and they have four children. Though wedded in a Hindu ceremony, their 'marriage' was declared null and void in England. After their separation, she married media magnate Rupert Murdoch in 2002 whom she later divorced. Perhaps the most famous Irish bearer of the Hall surname is Frank. He was a journalist and did an iconic interview with The Beatles in Dublin in the early 1960s. Perhaps surprisingly, he was also the film censor and acted conservatively. His great work was in creating and presenting 'Hall's Pictorial Weekly'. It is still very funny for those of an older generation. Who can forget Ballymagash Council meetings, the 'Minister for Hardship', Cha and Miah, David Kelly's and Eamonn Morrissey's portrayals, done wittily and very sharply? The Coalition government of all the talents' suffered bitterly at Hall's hands; some think it was a big factor in the Coalition losing the 1977 General Election. Despite his underlying conservatism, sharp tongue and pen, and being married, he had a long-term relationship with Frankie Byrne, presenter of 'Dear Frankie', the first agony-aunt Irish radio programme. They had a daughter and Frankie's travails may explain her insight and empathy on-air. Hall briefly presented 'The Late Late Show' and opened 'Macroom Mountain Dew Festival'

The Caseys live in 'Hanover Hall', Rusheen - Pat Casey has a Morrison-engraved wine bottletop from the seventeenth century. It was once home to Abraham Morrison (or Morris), foe and nemesis, perhaps killer, of Art Ó Laoghaire. One encounter between the two took place there and Art or one of his retinue allegedly shot one of Morrison's servants. Ownership of a horse in Penal Times caused the dispute - the Catholic Art was obliged to accept a Protestant's/ Morrison's £5 offer for his horse. Art's refusal cost him his life. In 'The Caoineadh', when Art's horse returns home after the shooting, his wife Eibhlín races from her hall in Raleigh House, jumps on the horse and speeds to Carriganima, the scene of the slaying. Her record of the event and her grief are immortalized in the poem. John Fitz-Gerald's (Lissarda) recent and fresh translation is wonderful.

Shandy Hall, Dripsey, was the scene of Dr Cross's murder of Laura, his wife and mother of his six children. Having fallen in love with his children's young governess, Evelyn Skinner, he almost contrived a perfect murder but was eventually brought to justice by a dogged detective, Inspector Tyacke. A Queen's University (now UCC) forensic scientist, Dr Charles Pearson helped to convict Cross, who was hanged. The reporting of his trial was sensational; that and the deed begot the book, 'Murder at Shandy Hall'. It was adapted as a musical and staged in Macroom in 2016. It starred Emmet Bergin, Geraldine Barry-Murphy and Stephanie Shine. Before, some pharmacies bore the name 'medical hall'. Harry/Matt Muphy's pharmacy, The Square/Main Street was once known as Murphy's Medical Hall. The title is a possible throw-back to the days when treatments and prescriptions were made-up from various ingredients in the pharmacy. 'Chemist' was another name given to a pharmacy and this probably relates to the composing of prescriptions, somewhat like a (real) chemist in his laboratory. The medieval alchemist was altogether different - he/she could 'magically' convert base metals into gold or other valuable goods. For them alchemy was a mixture of science, philosophy and mysticism and embraced a holistic approach.

There were several halls that were important in Macroom's history. None exceeds the Town Hall in this regard. The Ancient Order of Hibernians had a hall in Railway View and the Macroom Confraternity Brass band practiced in their hall in Bridewell Lane, next to the ex National Bank, now Bank of Ireland. Macroom ICA (founded in 1953) had its first 'Hall' opened in 1958; unfortunately it was damaged when the eastern wall of The Castle collapsed (1965) and caused irreparable damage. Legal, ownership and safety problems delayed its replacement but a second 'Hall' was again operating in 1974. The ICA was a wonderful organisation for

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women in Macroom and nationally. In Ireland until the 1970s, a women's place was in the home, bearing and rearing children. Pubs and sport were mostly male preserves. Girls/ young women could go to 'the pictures' and to dances' but often with dire warning of the 'dangers' out there. (In the 1930s, one local clerical gave court evidence that a waltz was 'a close dance'). The ICA provided an outlet where women met, discussed their own agendas, developed skills and had fun. New skills from debating to art appreciation to crafts, hearing lectures on athletics and Rome, and perhaps most importantly, having fun through singing, dancing, story-telling were appreciated and practiced. Serious issues the ICA addressed were rural electrification and domestic running-water, equal educational opportunities, inheritance issues, recycling and benign co-operation with other clubs and organisations. Macroom ICA co-operated notably with the GAA, Macroom Show, the Tidy Town's committee, and ran several bazaars and collections for good causes, locally and nationally. It cleverly achieved its radical goals under the cloak of being a conservative organization. As its slogan claimed, it made 'life better for women' in Ireland and specifically in Macroom. Macroom ICA's own hall was indispensible in its work and mission.

Macroom Town Hall merits a separate article and so I will park that topic for the moment. Opened in 1902, it has become the centrepiece of the town, and has seen, dances, concerts, pantomimes, feiseanna, Dáil courts, appropriation by the Auxiliaries, attacks and killings, political meeting by Sinn Féin, Fianna Fáil and the Blueshirts, and sports - badminton and judo. It continues to host Council meetings and is the local government administrative centre for Macroom and Millstreet. More another time.

But we return to Macroom's most recent hall, The Jehovah Witnesses' Hall in Barrett Place. Its speedy construction reflects a characteristic enthusiasm for the cause and commitment. For those associated with the religion around Macroom, the excerpt below rings true. Members canvas on the street - the Square and the Mart-Dunnes areas commonly host them. THE thoroughness, unrestrained energy, and intense eagerness with which Jehovah's Witnesses* proclaim their message insure that almost everyone has had some contact with the literature or personnel of the group. It is practically impossible for a pastor to avoid coming to grips with these legions of the Lord when their precisely planned campaigns of witnessing make them invaders of his parish. Along with other minority religious groups, they draw their constituency chiefly from persons who are or who who have been members of a Christian church in one of the large, established denominations, rather than from the unchurched population. They are, therefore, of more than passing interest.

and collar-and-ties and the women smartly : and conservatively turned-out; their clothes are almost like uniforms. Recruiters are often in their twenties or thirties.

When I see JWs canvassing it calls to mind an incident that occurred in front of Macroom Dispensary about 1960, when I was seven/ eight. Two preachers - their cause/religion is not known to me - were addressing Macrompians, with their few listeners standing well back, and most probably out of curiosity. Shortly, some local businessmen appeared and told the preachers, in definitive terms, 'to move on'. Unless my memory is playing tricks, one businessman was armed with an implement. As a child, I was thrilled with the excitement and disappointed that an 'OK Coral' situation did not evolve. In contrast, the recent erection and presence of the Jehovah Witness Hall has not 'batted an eyelid'. Times in Ireland and Macroom have changed.

Why are adherents so committed and how do the Jehovah Witnesses (JWs)have the courage, vision and wherewithal to erect their new church in a small town such as Macroom?

Undoubtedly, the town is more cosmopolitan than ever before and the previously main Irish religions, particularly Catholicism has seen its practitioner numbers dwindle. Both leave an opportunity as many still feel a want for spirituality and a need for a clear message to direct their lives.

What the JWs have to offer is the other side of the equation. Pastor Charles Taze Russell initiated the movement in 1870 in Pittsburg, USA. He was succeeded as leader by Joseph Rutherford who refined doctrine and formed the JWs into a tight closely-run organisation. Later headquarters moved to Brooklyn, New York. Now it has many millions of adherents world-wide and has many halls in Ireland. If I understand it properly, the JWs base their beliefs on their interpretation of the Bible, and have their own translated version. They share some Christian beliefs but do not believe in hell or a Trinitarian God (three persons in the one God) - in other words, Jesus Christ was not divine. They believe in Armageddon, the (imminent) destruction of the current social order in a final battle between earthly powers and God, and in the victory of and coming of God's Kingdom. God will rule the world with the assistance of those in 'The Truth', that is devout JWs. 'The Truth' is the body of beliefs of the JWs. 1914 was once the predicted year of Armageddon but, due to JWs' reinterpretation of the Bible, that was acknowledged as a miscalculation. Strict orthodoxy is demanded of members. Noncompliance is dealt with by expulsion and 'shunning' (or ostracisation) from the group. This is severe because socialization with other members is strongly encouraged; often members' lives are centred on fellow members.

Some controversial JW practices draw attention. Refusing blood transfusion, even in life-saving situations, is based on their reading of the Bible. Members are reluctant to acknowledge national flags as they answer to a higher authority. The movement has rejected the use of the cross in worship, Christmas and birthdays. Because of the obligation of strict orthodoxy, members are sometimes accused of 'not thinking for themselves'; then again, this is common to many religions and 'causes'. One wonders if members supported the Irish soccer team in the World Cup in Australia.

Following request made months ago, and repeated weeks ago, a JW member contacted me on Monday 8, August and invited me to see the new building. My purpose was to confirm or at least get a JW perspective on my article. However he felt he was not able to comment on some of the above. He will get a JW their media persone to contact me. Hopefully someone will.

Times - they are a-changing in Macroom as elsewhere.

Director. Mike Ryan was born in Newport, Co. Tipperary, and has resided in Cork city for the past fifteen years. He has been involved in the arts his entire life, and studied Music and English at University College Cork, winning several national student and amateur awards for his sound and lighting designs for theatre. In 2016 he was selected for Fishamble's Director Mentorship Programme through the Belltable in Limerick. During this time, his theatre company, Ferocious Composure, was company in residence in the Granary Theatre. Ryan also worked as Commissioning Editor for UCC's annual alumni magazine, Independent Thinking. In 2017 he was assistant director on Corcadorca's Irish Theatre Award winning production of Far Away by Caryl Churchill, staged in Spike Island prison. He was then selected for Tessellate, an artist development programme, where he was mentored by Julie Kelleher from the Everyman, and Lorraine Maye from Cork Midsummer Festival. In 2018 he was marketing assistant for the Audi Dublin International Film Festival.

Over the past six years, he has fulfilled several roles across the arts, such as artist liaison for Cork Midsummer Festival, reviewer and journalist for The Thin Air magazine, judge for the Northern Ireland Music Prize, and script reader for the Abbey Theatre, the national theatre of Ireland. 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
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
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
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HERE AND THERE

Sometimes a team comes up through the ranks from Academy U10s to Schoolboys U14s to Youths U19s and to the Premier level of Junior Soccer and sweeps all before them. It is no freak of nature nor is it by pure chance but creating, nurturing and managing a group of players like the current Coachford Premier team for the last 14 years takes a huge commitment from the players, their parents, the coaches and the club.

Coachford AFC has had some unique talent playing in their ranks since 2009. Football talent comes easy to some, they are born with it but it takes dedication from the players themselves, their parents and their coaches to nurture this talent. It also takes extremely talented coaches to instil belief and skills in the players who don't show this talent at a young age to make sure that when it's their time to shine as they get older that the groundwork has been laid.


The current Coachford AFC Premier team are a product of this coaching style and system instilled at the club since 2006. The Double winning Premier League and AOH Cup champions for the last 2 seasons are mostly made up of players who have been together since they were u10s. They have added a few players along the way while a few have moved away or called it a day for various reasons but the core of the Schoolboys and Youths teams make up this unique team.

In the 2021/22 season, Coachford AFC Premier side emerged from the COVID pandemic to storm their way to Premier League success by winning 15 of their 16 games and having only 3 goals scored against them while hitting the net themselves a massive 60 times. The team also finished off their season by defeating Grattan United in the AOH Cup Final by 4 goals to one in an awesome performance at Turners Cross Stadium.

At the beginning of the 2022/23 season, the Premier League season had been extended to an almost unwieldy 21 games for some reason. Add to this a pre-season tournament and 3 cup competitions, and the guest to become back-to-back League and Cup champions again looked impossible. But yet again this Band Of Brothers answered the call of their manager, Donal Movnihan and once again took up the challenge to become a team to be reckoned with. When the last game was played in the middle of June 2023 Coachford AFC had for the second time lifted the Premier League title and AOH Cup. The extended league was a monster to contend with, especially as many of the Coachford team are also very accomplished GAA Players for Agahbulloge, Dripsey and Kilmurry GAA clubs and the dual demands put some players under a lot of pressure at both the beginning and end of an extremely long drawn out season.

with 18 wins, 1 draw and just 2 defeats speaks volumes for this unique team and its manager. Coachford's AFC Premier team scored 70 goals over 21 games and conceded just 13. The team also lifted the AOH Cup for the second year in a row. coming from 2 goals down to beat Watergrasshill in the final 3-2.

The Coachford AFC Premier team are giants of the Cork AUL Junior league and over the last 2 seasons have been the team to beat. Moving to the Munster Senior League (MSL) has always been on the agenda of the club's AGM over the past few years but the conflicting commitments that players in rural clubs face every year means that a The very fact that Coachford AFC ended the league : move to the MSL is often not a realistic option.

The 2023/24 season brings new challenges for the Coachford AFC premier team. The stepping down of one of the clubs most successful managers, Donal Moynihan is a huge blow for the team and club. The departure of some of the older and more experienced members of the team will also upset the finely tuned side but there are other talented and enthusiastic young footballers ready and able to take up the baton.

Last season's mammoth 21-game league was a long and arduous campaign. The very fact that Coachford AFC emerged victorious considering the huge demands on the manager, the players and the club shows what a unique and amazing team they are.

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

KELLEHER URGES IRISH GOVERNMENT TO PUSH FOR ENHANCED NEWBORN SCREENING ENTITLEMENTS AT EU LEVEL FOR ALL BABIES

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has urged the Irish Government to take the lead at pushing for minimum neonatal or newborn screening entitlements for all babies born in the European Union. Kelleher, a member of the European Parliament's Public Health (SANT) committee and a former party national health spokesperson, made the call in advance of a potential Convention on the Future of Europe.

"The Convention, if given the go ahead by Member State governments, may look at potential treaty change and could recommend that the EU takes on greater competency when it comes to public health.

"At present, we have a post code literary in terms of

neonatal screening across the 27 member states.

"The test known as an 'heel prick test' is simple and cheap to perform, yet many countries, including Ireland do not make the best use of it. For example, Ireland tests for nine diseases or genetic disorders. France tests for six yet Spain tests for 24. In many Eastern countries, the numbers are even worse.

"Over the last six months, in my engagements with the pharmaceutical sector on the EU's new pharmaceutical strategy, I sense a willingness among them to support such a scheme.

"I see two major positives. First, children with rare diseases will be diagnosed and start receiving treatment quicker, and secondly, we will have a better understanding of the pan-EU prevalence of rarer

diseases and syndromes which stimulate better research into new treatments.

"Ireland must support the development of a European Health Union, and part of such a union would be standardised newborn screening practices across the entire European Union. It should also

in the first instance increase the number of diseases and disorders it tests for in Ireland and show leadership," concluded Kelleher.



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the heartfelt cry of a father who had brought his little son to be healed. The disciples had tried and failed to heal him. But when the Lord Jesus came there everything changed. The demon manifested causing the child to go into a seizure trying to kill him. Jesus tenderly ministered to the Dad first. And then He turned and cast out the demon that was oppressing his son. It was as the father got to know Jesus that his faith was strengthened, his confidence grew, and he was able to trust Jesus. Jesus ministered to the Dad's own heart initially causing healing to come for him first, and his child was healed as a result. "Believe in the Lord Jesus and you will be saved..." (Acts 16:31). Paul said this to the jailer who had beaten and imprisoned him and Silas, after a huge earthquake supernaturally freed them from their chains. They were singing - worshipping the Lord at midnight as they lay in the dark cold dungeon bleeding and sore and the other prisoners were listening, when suddenly the place was shaken. This was a miraculous deliverance for Paul and Silas, but instead of escaping they stayed put and ministered to their jailer, causing him to repent of his sin and asking to know their God. Not only were Paul and Silas delivered from their bondage, but God's Holy Spirit Power caused the jailer and his whole household to receive Salvation and come to know the Lord Jesus. The apostle Paul demonstrated the Love of God to this family, forever changing their destiny from darkness to Light. Last week we spoke on the difference between the heart that knows God and believes in Him as opposed to those who depend on good works as a pathway to Salvation and wholeness (Ephesians 2:8-9), God's Word is the same to us today dear friend. His plan of Salvation has never changed - for "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8). "This is the work of God: that you believe [adhere to, trust in, rely on, and have faith] in the One whom He has sent" (John 6:29). But how can you believe in someone you do not know? That is why we each must press in to know Him personally. When I know Jesus and learn to trust that He means what He says - that He doesn't tell lies, and that He will follow through no matter what, I have confidence in the promises in His Word. I won't doubt Him because I know that He can be trusted to fulfil His Word and do it - as He always has done (Revelation 1:8). The devil uses the power of suggestion to get people to waver and doubt which can cause one to be pulled in two directions. Lack of knowledge is why prayers go unanswered. We must hold fast to God's promises and trust Him by speaking to the mountains - those problems that try to overwhelm - in the Name of Jesus (John 14:6). Jesus said "I assure you and most solemnly say to you, if you have faith [personal trust and confidence in Me] and do not doubt or allow yourself to be drawn in two directions, you will not only do what was done to the fig tree, but even if you say to this mountain, 'Be taken up and thrown into the sea,' it will happen. Yes, you can believe Him!
