CHIEF COMMISSIONER'S AWARD 2023 -WILD COPPER WAY

Three intrepid members of MacEgan Senior Branch, Amy McCullagh, Emer O'Connor and Gemma Munro, took part in the adventure of a lifetime this past week with eleven other Senior Branchers (SBs) from various parts of the country. The Chief Commissioner's Award is a week-long challenge for teams of two or three, which involves hiking 60kms over 5 days in an unknown area, carrying all the team equipment; tent; sleeping bags; food; cooking equipment as well as maps, books for logs and projects, and instructions for the various challenges along the way. The SBs live on four euro each per day, from which they must produce nutritious meals to sustain them on the hike.

The week started off with all the SBs arriving at Kent Station, Cork, not having an idea of their final destination. After a short interview, each team had a bag check to ensure that they were not overloaded with unnecessary Niamh McSweeney did an excellent items.

job lightening their loads for the week ahead. Following a good night's sleep, all boarded the Macroom Garda Community Bus and headed off to destinations unknown. The excitement was high on the bus as one team after another were dropped off at various points along the Beara Way. Over the next five days, each team plotted their routes taking into account the challenges and projects they had to complete. The weather was very wet and windy at times but the sun did shine through often enough to brighten up spirits. They met and chatted to locals and tourists, gathered information, wrote up their daily logs and projects and immersed themselves into the spirit of the award. A number of teams had the opportunity to spend a day and camp overnight on Bere Island, thanks to the generosity of Edel Murphy of Bere Island Lodge.

At the end of the week all teams returned tobase and the work began for the assessors, reading all the logs and projects, checking maps, routes and distances, and ensuring that all criteria had been met. Each team then had two interviews with the assessing panels. The Chief Commissioner, Amanda O'Sullivan, presented all the awards at the ceremony, which took place at the Point in Berehaven Golf Club. The Chief Commissioner's Award 2023 -Wild Copper Way - was organised and led by Deirdre Henley, who is the current President of Irish Girl Guides and a sitting member of the National Senior Branch Committee.

Both Macroom teams were successful in achieving the Chief Commissioners' Certificate, woggle and Silver Award Pin - Amy McCullagh with Lauren Hogan from Naas and Emer O'Connor and Gemma Munro.

Thanks to David and Paula, Edel, Julie, Kevin, Flor, Colman and the many, many people in the communities on the Beara Way who made the award possible this year.

My friends and I would walk Pana, visiting Golden Discs, Burgerland, The Savoy Centre, Queens Old Castle, and stop off at O'Brien's for an ice-cream or Cudmore's for sweets. If we were dating, we waited at Easons hoping that we wouldn't end up being stood up. We went to the pictures in The Pav, Lee Side, The Capitol or The Classic. But once I made the important selection of a wedding dress in Les Jumelles and going away suit in Cash's in town I had made up my mind that I was moving out of the city and putting down country roots and I have never looked back since, except with nostalgia.

There are so many books available about whatever you consider the good old days. A lady recently returned a book 'Discover Dursey', and she said it was a great insight into island life in years gone by. There is a wonderful variety of great books across all age groups telling stories about life in various areas locally, around Ireland, and all over the world. 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MACROOM UPDATES



Our monthly meeting took place at the start of August in our Operations Hub in Masseytown. We are developing a new website which should be up and running shortly with links to social media accounts and it will contain pages for Men's Shed and Tiny Feet Fairy Garden. It will also link with the National Tidy Towns Newsletter which comes out every couple of months and which contains many interesting articles and stories.

As you might have noticed our latest project has begun at the riverbank downstream from the bridge, near the car park. This is a famine Memorial and a seating area to commemorate those who could not get into the Poor House at the time and camped by the river, some of whom died there and whose bodies were taken to Carrigastyra and buried in a Mass Grave. This memorial is being funded by proceeds of book by Sean and Máire Mac Suibhne, 'Muskerry through the MacSuibhne lens' which was sold in many outlets in the Lee Valley region. Copies of this book are still available from Macroom Tidy Towns.

Progress is being made on the New Mural on the Boathouse in Masseytown, a project that has recently commenced. The plastering of the walls is now completed, and the painting of the mural will begin shortly, weather permitting. A grant was received from Cork County Council and additional fundraising is

ongoing with collection boxes in Mary Anns Bar and Costcutters. Concern was expressed at the briars in the old Lidl Carpark which have overgrown onto the footpath. Hopefully this issue will be rectified with contractors beginning work soon. 

MACROOM INDIAN COMMUNITY CELEBRATES: Onam Harvest Festival and India Independence Day By Con Kelleher



Macroom Indian Community Celebrates Onam Harvest Festival and India Independence Day.

August, the first month of autumn, is synonymous with the harvest. It is the time when crops and fruit are gathered and stored, ensuring winter provisions for people and animals. Not only is it a time of hard work but also a time of celebration. Kerala, a southern India state celebrates harvest-time with Onam, and the Macroom Indian Community celebrated it and Indian Independence Day in style on 15 August in Macroom. India gained its independence from Britain and power was transferred on 15 August 1947 - that day is Indian Independence Day. India was regarded as the 'jewel' in the British Empire and it largely gained its freedom through non-violent resistance and civil disobedience orchestrated by Gandhi's leadership. Ireland's independence was the first major fracture in the British Empire and India's departure signalled the empire's demise.

The Irish word for August is 'Lúnasa' and means 'Lugh's Assembly'. Lugh was an important figure in Celtic/Irish mythology – he was a king, saviour, a true warrior and a skilled craftsman. Lúnasa, the autumn festival was held in his honour and marked harvest-time. The three other Celtic festivals were/are Samhain, Imbolc and Beltane and mark the other seasons. Festivals were important religiously and socially – people need beliefs, socialisation and fun. Onam is Kerala's equivalent.

Onam is celebrated throughout Kerala. During Onam, Kerala is marked by happiness, excitement and enjoyment among all sections. The origin of it lies in Hindu mythology and old agrarian practices. According to myth, King Mahabali (or Maveli) was once a generous and virtuous ruler of Kerala. During his rule, the kingdom became so prosperous that devas (gods of the Heaven) felt jealous, and, as well, King Mahabali was an asura - a member of the demon clan - devas' enemies. So the devas sent Lord Vishnu in the guise of Vamana (a dwarf) to King Mahabali. As an offering, Vamana requested from Mahabali three feet of land. At the time of measuring the land, Vamana grew so huge that he covered the whole

world in two steps. Since he had nowhere to place his third step, Mahabali suggested to Vamana to place it on his head. Pleased by his benevolence, Vamana blessed Mahabali before he was sent to the nether world and granted him permission to visit his dear subjects once in a year. His annual visit is celebrated as Onam. The other cause for celebrating Onam is because it is harvest-time in Kerala, resulting in plenitude and happiness.

Onam celebrations are held for ten days, beginning with the atham asterism in the month of Chingam (August /September) as per the local calendar. (Kerala Tourism, downloaded 19 August, 2023).

The Indian community gathered in the Macroom GAA Pavilion. Men and women dressed in traditional costumes and enacted mythical scenes. People danced and sang and had a great time. Delicious Indian food was provided. Kerala is famed for its spice, harvested from Kerala's lush fields. Keralan spices are exported all over the world. A beautiful Indian floor flower carpet was on display - Kerala's tradition was to have one outside every house during Onam. Michael Creed, T.D., was the guest of honour and enjoyed himself immensely. In his address, he said that he was honoured to be invited, rewelcomed the Indian community to Macroom and outlined Indian-Irish connections. He quoted an Onam blessing: 'May your life be beautiful and fragrant,

Like the bright flowers that fill the Onam flower carpet,

Like the elaborate Onam feast,

May the coming year only bring you the best. Happy Onam.'

According to Ms Melba Siju, former Matron/ Chief Nursing Officer of Cahereen Nursing Homs, since 2005, about 130 Indians have settled in Macroom. They work in as healthcare professionals, in IT, and pharmaceutical and engineering companies. Many come from Kerala. Melba reminded me that Kerala is 'the spice hotspot of the world since ancient times' and is renowned for its biodiversity. It is 'God's Own Country' evidenced by its lush green



landscapes, crystal clear bays and beautiful beaches which leave you awestruck. Members from the Indian community have made a wonderful contribution to Macroom, especially in the healthcare field. Their colourful clothes, pleasant demeanour and aptitude for hard work are huge bonuses for the town and area, and enhance the town's cosmopolitan culture. Long may the Indian community thrive and prosper in Macroom.



ST. ENDA'S NS, KILNADUR LEADS THE WAY IN REDUCING CARBON EMISSIONS BY ALMOST 90%FA

St. Enda's NS, Kilnadur, in Kilmichael, has achieved a significant milestone by becoming the first primary school in Ireland to successfully transition its heating system to Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil (HVO) - a renewable and environmentally friendly energy source. The school, that was originally built in 1865, completed its move away from being fuelled by traditional oil - a fossil fuel - to HVO last week - a move that is projected to yield a remarkable 88% reduction in carbon emissions, positioning St. Enda's as a model for primary schools and other institutions throughout the country.

The primary school made the decision to switch to HVO after it was found earlier this year that its boiler was operating at only 70% efficiency. It was Concubhar McCarthy of CMcC Services, Dunmanway who initially advised the school of the availability of HVO as a climate-friendly alternative to traditional heating oil and then carried out the necessary installation to industry standards, having particular regard for the age of the building (it being 158 years old). The school's management recognised that HVO offered it with a realistic, effective and affordable alternative to other options, including the retrofitting of the building which would have caused prolonged disruption.

The conversion of the boiler at St. Enda's to HVO forms part of the school's broader efforts to uphold its status as a green school, having received Green Flags for Litter and Waste, Energy, Water and Travel.

It is expected that St. Enda's switch to HVO will offer further evidence as to how advanced, synthetic and biofuels can accelerate Ireland's journey towards hitting its emissions reduction targets by 2030.

Commenting on the news, Liam Cotter, Principal at St. Enda's NS, Kilnadur said that the decision was motivated by cost effectiveness, minimal disruption and environmental friendliness: "We are very excited to pioneer this transition to Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil, and we believe that the carbon emissions reductions we will achieve will lead to St. Enda's becoming a blueprint for schools across the country. Our goal is to not only reduce our carbon footprint significantly, but also to educate our students about the importance of climate responsibility and empower them to make environmentally conscious choices. When we discuss the transition with pupils in September, we will be using it as an opportunity to illustrate the need for each and every one of us to contribute to Ireland reducing our carbon footprint over the coming decades, and the different ways that this can be done. The pupils have worked hard for many years on our Green Schools status and it's now great that the school management has been able to back up this hard work by installing an environmentally friendly system such as this"





Observed Environmental Differences Between Ireland and Poland Hi!

It's Chris Barrett here, sharing a talk I had in Poland with my very good friend Edyta Bodnar, who has spent over 15 years in Dublin and about 5 years living in and around Macroom. She has recently returned to Poland for personal reasons, and when

we recently stayed with her there, I took the opportunity to hear about environmental differences, both good and bad, between Poland and Ireland. The landscape was where we started. Edyta feels there is an aesthetic continuity in the rural Irish landscape. She has noticed that planning restrictions help modern architecture to fit within the landscape. She says that in Poland, beautiful environments can be ruined by a building which is built in the style or position of the owner's desire, with no regard to the surrounding landscape. A good example she cites is that in Ireland, there are generally no large billboards or tacky signs in areas of local beauty. This, she feels, allows the beauty itself to show its value, and economic desires do not get to dominate nature. She is aware that there are complaints about new holiday homes being built in some beautiful parts of Ireland, but she feels that the Irish planning system helps address this, and that the situation in Poland does not allow for such protection. One of the features of picturesque villages in Ireland is that they often offer small, charming and interesting coffee shops within the town centres. These seem to Edyta to be welcoming places in which to sit down, meet people and relax. In Poland it would be harder to find such cafes within small coastal villages for example. Edyta mentions how when she was in Ireland she could donate to many different charity shops. This allowed her to support charities, and recycle. Irish charity shops commonly deal in crockery, toys, books, jewellery etc as well as bedding and clothes. In Poland similar shops tend to be run on a commercial basis and deal mainly with clothes. Sadly a good rural transport system is lacking in both countries. In her village in Poland, there are two buses a week leaving for the nearest town at 9am and returning at 1pm. Edyta really misses and appreciates how two strangers can salute, acknowledge and start a conversation easily in Ireland, whether waiting at a bus stop or when out walking a dog. The willingness of the Irish to see the best in a stranger and greet them with a smile, is very special for her, because in Poland you would often pass a



stranger without eye contact. And now to the contentious issue of the weather! The weather in Poland changes more dramatically from season to season, which allows farmers to plan with a reasonable expectation of suitable weather. When gardening at my place in Ireland, Edyta was shocked to find her recently planted Kohlrabi had been lifted by the wind and dropped on the path! This differs from Poland where, on the whole, the wind does not have the force it has in Ireland; where she knows of cases where trampolines and even polytunnels have blown away. When we talked about building, Edyta felt Ireland could learn from the sympathetic post-war building in beautiful cities which have been razed to the ground. There is, however, another side to the argument as Warsaw's centre has been partially rebuilt from a pulled-down castle in Edyta's village. Warsaw is Polish and Edyta's village was once German and therefore not valued as much. I note that in Macroom, the Protestant church has similarly been devalued over the years. It is good to see that it recently has begun to be more appreciated. I am impressed by the way Polish people try to minimise buying from Supermarkets. In rural areas in Poland people keep vegetable gardens which they use to support and sustain a natural diet. Many of them keep hens. It is common for people to have their own smokers which are used mainly for meat and sausages. This attitude goes to ensure that there are very proud Polish housewives who also have their own gherkins, jams and fruits in jars. Natural food is appreciated and mushroom picking is a big thing, mainly in the Autumn. Most Polish people would be able to identify which mushrooms are safe to dry and pickle. This culture of growing and storing your own food does not occur in the cities, although there you can find a culture of owning allotments, which people might have to drive to. These would commonly contain a vegetable garden, a small building and a social area used for overnight sleeping and partying. This way of life brings city dwellers into a closer relationship with nature. If we look at trees we notice that Ireland is only about 11% forested, of which conifers make up 71%, making it one of the least densely wooded Member States of the EU along with Malta, and the Netherlands. Only about 1% of Ireland is covered by native woodland. Poland on

the other hand has about 29% mixed forest. These forests are unfenced and have a welcoming feel for walkers and sometimes cyclists. Forests are a source of mushrooms and blueberries which are commonly picked by locals. These forests are also home to wild boar, deer, hares, foxes, lynx and sometimes bison. There is an occasional risk to humans from over-enthusiastic hunters and sadly geese get shot for 'fun'. When driving through Polish forested areas the roads are continually lined with trees, appearing beautiful for mile after mile. As a driver, you do have to watch out for wild animals particularly at night. These rural roads can often have a poor surface but they do have more pavements than the equivalent roads in Ireland. And there is also among rural people in Poland, an attitude to woodland which we Irish would do well to more fully emulate. Native hardwoods are verv often treasured. The local people love to see the new green leaves on white birch trees, which are sadly being cut down. They need to have achieved a certain diameter to be protected. There are however, protests in Poland against expanding tree-felling by the Government. In Poland, most rural dwellers would own a bicycle. This ownership increased after the pandemic in Edyta's area of N.W.Poland. Local councils are investing in increasing cycle paths which are being promoted to locals as well as to foreign tourists. Although it is a challenge for a country like Ireland, these Polish cycle paths are being connected to the German and European network. Other differences include banking. There is a modern system in Poland because it had to take the place of a very poor system. It is now said to be one of the most modern systems in the world. The bank guarantees a Polish person's identity, in a similar way to the Irish system, which is also efficient but exposes citizens to a lack of privacy. Within houses, a mixed tap providing both hot and cold water is ubiguitous, saving on installation and hardware costs. Polish people still proudly retain the skill of repairing rather than replacing. By way of example, our van's power-steering hose was remade with

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great accuracy and skill with a hardly used : Ireland, the ability to purchase, and throw : digger-hose when we were unable to find the specific hose that we needed. This culture of repair comes from a past history where people had to rely on their own skills such as gardening. Yet it is under threat and Edyta is saddened by a growing enthusiasm among the young for paying for a perfect make-up or manicure. Unfortunately Edyta feels that in Poland, as in

away, is becoming more prevalent among the young, at a time when the world needs everyone everywhere to reduce, reuse and recycle. I was very happy to stay with Edyta and get totally spoilt in her beautiful home in Poland. Whilst there I was able to experience the main differences between rural Irish and Polish living, and I hope I have been fair to both

MÁIRE O'DONOVAN By Kathy O'Sullivan

Picture the scene. It's sometime around 1914/15. You want to join Cumann na mBan, the Irishwomen's Council, because you want Ireland to be free, and are asked to fill in an application form, which contains, among others, the following questions:

History

Can you clean and load firearms?

Can you drive a motor? If so, do you understand its running repairs?

Have you opportunities for acquiring useful information about the enemy?

What do you answer? How can you contribute? What did Máire O'Donovan answer?

On her death certificate (she died on 23rd January 1961), she was recorded as the 'widow of a shop keeper', which sounds rather...bland, for this feisty, fiery woman who achieved much in the political arena. Máire O'Donovan was the widow of a shop keeper, it is true, yet she was also so much more. Many women of her time, especially those who played a role in the War of Independence, have been treated a mere footnote in history, when their courage and self-sacrifice made a verifiable difference to the fight for freedom. Whatever Máire O'Donovan was, she was certainly no footnote. Look at her face – it is a face not to be forgotten.

Máire was born in 1876, in Crossmahon, Lissarda, Co. Cork, to Julia (née Kelleher) and Cornelius Murphy, a blacksmith - and Fenian (dedicated to the establishment of an independent Irish Republic) activist. After primary school, she attended St. Angela's High School in Cork (founded in 1887, at the request of Bishop O'Callaghan, who wanted a day school for girls in the city. The first student to enter was Mary Ryan, later the first woman to be appointed as university professor in Ireland or Great Britain). She received a Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts at the Royal University of Ireland (founded in accordance with the University Education Ireland Act 1879, the first university in Ireland that could grant degrees to women on a par with those granted to men), followed by a teaching diploma in Cambridge, UK. After gaining her teaching diploma, Máire taught in Furness Lodge, Cambridge for a few years. Then came an invitation which would change the course of her life, with nothing ever being the same again.

The invitation came from Bishop O'Dwyer (1842-1917, who urged that Ireland remain neutral during the first world war, and wrote a letter to the British military commander General Sir John Maxwell, denouncing the repression of the Easter Rising 1916, as 'one of the worst and blackest chapters in the history of the misgovernment of this country'), who wanted her to teach in Limerick's newly established Mary Immaculate Teacher Training

College (founded in 1898).

In 1909, Máire married Jerome O'Donovan, a butter merchant and shopkeeper from Skibbereen, Co. Cork, resigning her teaching job upon marriage. Her post was then taken up by her sister Kate. Máire then became more active in the political sphere. She joined Conradh na Gaeilge, the Gaelic League, in Limerick. Many people from all walks of life joined Conradh na Gaeilge, wanting to promote the Irish language, but Máire upped the ante considerably by also becoming active in the Suffragette movement. In addition to this, she joined Cumman na mBan. Cumman na mBan, the Irishwomen's Council, was formed in Dublin on 2nd April 1914, in Wynn's Hotel. Their constitution had as its objectives:

1. To advance the cause of Irish liberty.

2. To organise Irishwomen in furtherance of this object.

3. To assist in arming and equipping a body of Irishmen for the defence of Ireland.

4. To form a Fund for these purposes to be called 'The Defence of Ireland Fund.'

Their work involved dangerous tasks, and, unlike the men involved in the fight for independence, who could go on the run, this option was not available for women, thereby leading to many raids on their homes by the RIC and Black and Tans, with precious possessions being destroyed, with the ever-present threat of physical and sexual violence. Cumann na mBan regularly organised prayer vigils as a form of public protest. Their expression of faith, of Catholicism, also served to give the lie to government depictions of the independence movement as extremist and communistinspired. Today, more than a century later, governments all over the world still try to portray genuine grassroots movements

that wish to safeguard their communities as extremist. One can imagine Máire, an independent, fearless woman, relishing her role. She didn't give a toss about what names she was called.

In 1921, Máire's life was to change markedly once more. On 7th March, her brother-inlaw, the former Mayor of Limerick, Michael O'Callaghan, was murdered, along with sitting Mayor George Clancy. As a result, Limerick City Council had two vacant seats, with Máire being swiftly co-opted to replace Mayor George Clancy, a month later, on April 7th. She was the second woman to sit on the council, following Emily Crowe, who won her seat in the local elections a year earlier, in 1920.

Just two months later, on the 21st of May, Máire found herself, probably to her astonishment, deputized to be acting Mayor of Limerick, in the absence of the Mayor, Stephen O'Mara, in the US, thus becoming the first female head of a Limerick local authority. Stephen O'Mara was sent to the US by Éamon De Valera, in connection with fundraising, the Republican Loan Fund. Three days later, on 24th May, her sister, Kate, widow of Michael O'Callaghan, was elected the first ever female TD representing a Limerick constituency. On the same day, in Dublin, Kathleen Clarke, a founding member of Cumman na mBan, and widow of Tom Clarke, the first signatory of the 1916 Proclamation, was returned as TD for the Dublin Mid constituency (Kathleen would continue to make history, by being the first woman elected as the Lord Mayor of Dublin, or, indeed, anywhere else in Ireland, on 27th June 1939).

Máire remained in office until 30th January 1922. She presided over the ceremony in which Éamon De Valera and Kathleen Clarke received

the Freedom of the City in December 1921. They received the honour three years after they were nominated, as they were both in prison at the time. Máire also sat on the Committee of the Limerick Prisoners' Dependents' Fund, to assist families who lost their waged earner to prison as a result of the Irish Civil War. This committee raised over £1,400 in the first eight months of 1921. Her dedication to her role as acting Lord Mayor was recognized by The Southern Star on February 18th, 1922, in an article titled Distinguished Cork Lady, which stated Máire 'filled the chair of the Corporation with such conspicuous ability and success.' As Deputy Mayor in December 1922, she

refused to put a motion supporting the Treaty to Limerick Corporation. Máire always had the courage of her convictions. She retired from the council in May 1925. Máire was also the chair of the Limerick central committee of the Irish White Cross, established in 1921 to distribute funds raised by the American Committee for Relief in Ireland, itself established to provide financial assistance to Irish who had been injured or suffered severe financial hardship due to the Irish War of Independence. It was managed by the Quaker businessman, and later Irish Free State senator, James G. Douglas (James Douglas was a nationalist, which was unusual for a Quaker. He was a close adviser to Michael Collins during the War of Independence, who said: Truth is spread by the contact of one individual with another....l am convinced that political organisation is possible without violence and that it would work if a sufficient number of individuals in any State shared this belief).

The British Intelligence Office, in 1923, recorded that Máire was 'even more bitter' in regard to how she felt about the British forces, than her sister Kate. It strikes the reader as a rather curious statement, a little incongruous. One might ask, given all she had seen and endured, how she was meant to feel?

When Máire passed away on 23rd January 1961, aged 84, she was still the only woman to have worn the Mayoral Chain in Limerick. She was buried in Mount St. Laurence Cemetery, Limerick. Éamon De Valera, then President of Ireland, sent a representative, Col. J.J. Fitzsimmons, O.C., Sarsfield Barracks, Limerick. Though the president was apparently unable to attend in a personal capacity the funeral of one of Ireland's bravest women, the people of Limerick attended in droves. The people remembered, and the people paid their respects to Máire:

'They stand for the honour of Ireland,

As their sisters in days that are gone,

And they'll march with their brothers to freedom —

The soldiers of Cumann na mBan!' - written by Brian O'Higgins (1882-1963, who attended Irish-language summer college at Béal Átha an Ghaorthaidh, wrote this a week before the Easter 1916 rising. It is sung to the tune of The Men of the West).







Una Keating discovered felting in early 2022 and says it was a game changer for her. She describes herself as a primitive artist blessed to be living in a beautiful part of the countryside. She walks every day in places like the Gearagh, Kilmurray Woods and the network of small roads within easy access of her home. 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

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




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MEP KELLEHER CALLS FOR REFORM OF ECB TO EQUALISE EMPHASIS ON ECONOMIC GROWTH AND PRICE STABILITY

HOMEOWNERS AND BUSINESSES CANNOT TAKE ANY MORE INTEREST RATE RISES -

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that the current mandate given to the European Central Bank (ECB) in terms of price stability and the 2% inflation rule may no longer be fit for purpose.

Kelleher, a member of the European Parliament's Economics and Monetary Affairs (ECON) Committee, was commenting ahead of the Parliament's return next week.

"At present, Article 127 of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union (TFEU) states quite clearly that the ECB' primary objective is to maintain price stability. What this means, in essence, is the need to maintain inflation across the Eurozone at, or as close to, 2%."What we have seen over the past 18 months is the ECB increasing rates

to force down inflation. It's the only tool that they "T have as it's their primary objective. m

"Ultimately ECB decision makers are making macroeconomic decisions without really understanding the pressure they are forcing onto families and workers.

"Homeowners and businesses cannot absorb any more interest rate rises. It's severely damaging their ability to live, grow and prosper.

"We face the very real risk of killing the Eurozone economy by putting it into recession in an effort to curb inflation that is caused, in a large part, by external issues that the Eurozone really cannot control. "The ECB needs other mechanisms and tools in its arsenal. It also needs to move away from its sole objective of price stability and place more emphasis on economic growth, jobs and the effects its decisions will have on families and workers.



"Treaty change may be required. I know we are all scarred by European referenda in Ireland but the alternative is significantly worse, especially if we run the risk of a recession and growing Euroscepticism," concluded Kelleher.


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MEMORIALS AND REMEMBRANCE
