

The Tidy Towns Awards Presentation ceremony takes place on the 11th of September in Clonaklity this year. Macroom has a silver medal now, so hopefully we have that retained. We are judged in Category D which is Ireland's tidiest small towns with a population of between 2,501 to 5000. Other towns in the area included in that category are: Clonaklity, Listowel, Bantry, Kenmare, Kinsale and Skibbereen. If Macroom's score is within ten marks of the National Winner then it receives a gold medal, within twenty it's a silver medal and within thirty it's a bronze medal. Native Hedgerow plants that blossomed in spring e.g. Hawthorn and Blackthorn will now be used by birds and mammals for a food source through berries. As flowers grow on old wood it's important to avoid cutting annually and instead use a three-year rotation to allow them to bloom. Native Trees or Shrubs such as Willow, Crab Apple are important pollinators as they support a huge number of Insects. Plant a young tree in the autumn or winter. Plant bulbs such as Snowdrop, Crocus and Grape Hyacinth in early autumn to provide early food for emerging pollinators the following spring.

Rainwater Planters have been procured for our hub in Masseytown. These planters divert rain from the roof that would normally flow into the drains, but instead it flows into these planters. A rainwater planter helps reuse water, improve local biodiversity, help pollination of plants, help local wildlife flourish. Depending on size they can be used to plant Small Trees, Shrubs, Herbs and Flowering Plants. They can be made from Concrete, Stone, Brick or Timber. The Planter in our Hub is made from Timber, lined with plastic. Plants chosen for a planter must be tolerable to Wet and Dry Conditions. Aquatic Plants are classed from Zones One to Four, Zone one been the driest and Zone four been the wettest. Choose Plants from Zones one and two as there the most tolerable to wet and dry periods. Further information will be available when these are up and running for some time.

The Teddy Bears Picnic had to be cancelled due to

unsuitable weather conditions and will now take place in the Tiny Feet Fairy Garden on the 16th of September from 1-3pm. All you need are Some Munchies, Blanket and your favourite Teddy Bear. For More information, contact 087-1434770.

Tiny Feet Fairy Garden was entered into this Year's Muintir Na Tire Pride in Our Community Awards for 2023. Judging took place from mid-July to the end of August. The winners will be announced at a ceremony in October.





### The New Knee

The relationship had been in trouble for some time, some days were better than others but overall the writing was on the wall, something had to give and it was going to be my left knee. One rarely realises how attached they get to their body parts until you have to make the decision to get rid of one. Three years ago I had parted company with my left hip joint having been dazzled by the shiny new titanium masterpiece of engineering that was on offer. My emotional attachment to my hip joint must have been quite weak though as I cannot remember agonizing over the decision to break up with it.

My left knee however was a different matter. Maybe it was because it was more visible on a daily basis because let's be honest, I rarely spent much time contemplating my left hip, or maybe it was because my knee formed a vital function in that my lap could not exist without it and let's face it, a lap is an absolute necessity when comforting small children assorted pets and balancing plates of biscuits over many years but mostly I think it was because everyone from the surgical team to friends who had already gone through a traumatic breakup with their knees all agreed that this was going to be extremely painful. So when D Day or as I liked to call it Knee day, arrived, I was overflowing with trepidation and that other wonderful quality, cowardice. On reflection I convinced myself that my original knee was really behaving quite well and should stay where it was, however being from the great Irish tradition of never liking to disappoint or put people out, I felt unable to ask the surgeon and his team to stand down at the last minute, so taking deep breaths of magic gas I slipped away in one direction while my left knee joint slipped away in another.

And so the honeymoon period began, in the early hours and days of this wonderful new union all was sweetness and light. Pain and discomfort was obviously what other people went through who did not have as high a pain threshold as my good self. Oh what adventures we had, taking long slow romantic walks to the bathroom, then practising going up and down stairs together, such fun. We couldn't wait to be alone together, away from the watchful eyes of nurses and physiotherapists who were constantly asking us to take things slowly.

The great day finally arrived when we could come home together but oh how quickly the honeymoon period soured, I wanted to go in one direction, knee refused, I wanted to climb into bed, knee refused. I would like to have a shower, knee refused. When I tried to meet knee's growing demands regarding exercise and recommended physical therapy the kicking and screaming really kicked in and boy could I scream.

Eventually an uneasy truce was restored with the help of a romantic cocktail of chemicals. However, this was short-lived as once the drugs ran out the misery returned with a vengeance, the constant bickering and fault finding went on into the early hours. On the upside, counselling has now gone some way towards acceptance of our new normal but only as long as drugs are part of the solution. Are things once more, rosy in the garden? Not yet but we are getting there.





## MACROOM SCHOOLS HISTORY EXHIBITION 2023: A PRESENTATION.

Macroom History Group (MHG) this year invited : DLS, St Mary's and Macroom Youthreach to exhibit presentations on historical topics about Macroom and District. Youthreach's subject was the Gearagh and its history; the presentation had a very interesting film with interviews, posters and an explanation. In contrast, DLS and St Mary's presentations were compiled by small student groups. The groups covered many topics from Bishop McEgan's hanging to Kilmichael Ambush to the life of Molly Cunningham and more. The Junior Certificate History course now has a project

element and this was the source for the many fine presentations. Many of the young researchers have family connections to their topic.

The standard of all exhibits was very high and the students, their teachers and schools deserve great praise. The exhibits were of such a high standard that MHG has invited the presenters to submit their work to the Lee Valley Outlook. What follow is hopefully the first of a series that will be presented here. I emphasize that the students are young, 13-15, and this is their first experience of researching, presenting and now publishing their work.

With persuasion and encouragement, Chloe Lehane, St Mary's, has very kindly agreed to present her project to a wider audience. She writes very well and movingly of the summary killing of Michael Dineen, her great great-grand uncle in 1921 by British forces during the War of Independence. This hidden story captures the horror of the War and how many people, but especially young men, were brutally and cruel

### THE DEATH OF MICHAEL DINEEN: AN UNTOLD TRAGEDY FROM THE WAR OF INDEPENDENC

My name is Chloe Lehane. I am a student at St. Mary's Secondary School, Macroom and will soon sit my Junior Certificate, and part of the first students in Ireland to partake in the New Junior Cycle Course. Part of this is to complete Classroom Based Assessments, or CBAs, for each of our respective subjects. Last year we completed the first of these CBAs - CBA 1. The theme of our History CBA 1 was 'The Past in my Place'. It was a small project focusing on a local history event. Macroom's and surrounding areas' enriching and exciting history provides many opportunities for research. However, I wanted to undertake a more personal project - one that could be handed down to future generations so that they would get a better glimpse of their family's heritage. That is how I discovered the life and horrifically violent death of Michael Dineen, my great-great granduncle.

Michael Dineen was born to Michael and Mary Dineen near Rathcoole, Millstreet on the 26th of March 1898 and was the youngest of five brothers and three sisters. The road to Michael Dineen's death began in 1918 following that year's general election which had an overwhelming vote for separation from the UK. Many, including Michael, expected that the result of the election would be honoured by the British Government, but it was not. Hundreds of thousands across the country were angered and among them was Michael who volunteered for military action and became a member of the Kilcorney Company (Millstreet Battalion), Irish Republican Army (IRA).

The War of Independence began on 21 January 1919 the same day that the First Dáil met. A Royal Irish Constabulary (RIC) patrol was ambushed in Soloheadbeg in Co. Tipperary. Two RIC constables were killed by a group of volunteers, led by Dan Breen and Seán Tracey. The ambush was not authorised by the Dáil. The attack was followed by years of Guerrilla Warfare between the IRA and the British forces. During this time, Michael and his companions adopted a policy of not sharing information on his activities, leading to a lack of detailed sources. However, what I found indicated that he was heavily involved.

On 16 June 1921, Michael was preparing for the Rathcoole Ambush. He was among some of the men who 'cut the roads' before the ambush. Cutting the roads involved digging trenches across roads leading to the site to prevent traffic interfering with the action. It was done by the IRA in ambushes they carried out including the Kilmichael Ambush. The ambush at Rathcoole was one of the IRA's most successful actions during the War of Independence.

On 23 and 24 June 1921, in response to the Rathcoole Ambush, the British Forces began the 'most extensive and concentrated comb-out of an area ever undertaken in the South'. It was also described as the 'biggest round-up attempted by the enemy [British] anywhere.' An area of about 5 square miles was cordoned off from Rathcoole towards Mushera. The area had a reputation of being a training ground for the Volunteers. The round-up was a futile exercise as the wanted Rathcoole Ambush leaders were all safely hidden in different areas.

The Auxiliaries were the main force involved. They were a separately recruited emergency 'corps of gendarmerie' hired to root out and neutralise the IRA. Despite officially being an Auxiliary police force formed to help the RIC, they were an independent force made up of highranking officers demobilised after World War 1. The officers had come home following the end of the war expecting to be hailed as heroes; instead many had to join this Auxiliary force in return for enough money to feed their families. They were responsible for the burning of Cork City and afterwards wore burned corks in celebration on their tam-o-shanters (brimless, bonnet caps).

On 23 June Michael returned to the house of his brother and my great-great grandfather, Dan Dineen. The house was near Rathcoole, within the area cordoned off for the Mushera round-up. The next morning they were awoken by loud knocking and when Dan Dineen opened the door he was met by 2 to 3 Auxiliaries, smelling strongly of alcohol, looking for Michael.

Michael Dineen was seen as a suspect as he was of the 'right' age (23), 6 feet 3 inches tall that would be consistent with that of a soldier.

When interrogated as to his movements on the day of the Rathcoole Ambush, Michael explained he was thinning turnips in the field beside the house, which was, of course, not true. The Auxiliaries convinced themselves that Michael Dineen was not in bed all night, thereby breaking the curfew. because he had been training or in active service. Two of them ordered him away from the house, along a cow path. They brought him approximately 300 metres down the path before they killed him. The Martial Law Area Report forbade the Court to view the body and to obtain further details at the scene of death, as 'such action would have risked lives unnecessarily'.

Neither the Press nor Dublin Castle reported the murder. Such crimes on the part of the British forces had been so numerous that eventually both the press and the public began to regard them as normal incidents in daily life. Dublin Castle, whose agents were involved in the murder, were careful to conceal what had happened.

Therefore, the details of Michael Dineen's death relied on eye-witness accounts that differed from and often appeared contradictory.

Using the work of a historian, I cross- checked these sources and concluded that:

As the Auxiliaries led Michael down the cowpath, he had been told to run by the soldiers, giving them a more substantial reason to kill him, or he ran of his own accord

Michael's arm and legs were broken by the use of a rifle-butt or gunshots; however when the body was recovered it was so mangled by bullet holes that viewers could not specify.

The Auxiliaries shot Michael in the back multiple times using different guns including a bayonet, a rifle, or a machine gun and dum-dum bullets

On Sunday, 26 June Michael's funeral was held and attended by leading members of the Volunteers despite many being on the run. It was a huge demonstration in support of the fight for Independence and a great boost to the morale of the Volunteers. It was the 'largest funeral ever seen in the locality'.

Less than a month after Michael Dineen's brutal murder, on 11 July 1921, a truce began between the IRA and British forces. Both sides recognised that peace was needed after 2 years of ferocious fighting. Ambushes such as those at Rathcoole and Kilmichael proved to the British that the IRA was more organised than they had believed and taking a toll on their forces.

Negotiations began in London in October 1921. On 6 December 1921 the Anglo-Irish Treaty was signed where Ireland became a dominion (a selfgoverning country within the British Empire).

In conclusion this project has been such an eyeopener for me in terms of the crimes committed throughout the War of Independence and how the lives of innocent young people paid for it. Had the truce been just one month earlier perhaps Michael would have survived the War of Independence? Had the Auxiliaries responsible for Dineen's death been better treated upon returning home from WW1 perhaps Michael would have not have been killed. There are many ways that Michael Dineen's death as well as the deaths of so many like him could have been prevented.

Michael did not die in battle, nor did he die for a crime he had committed, but he died for the freedom that we enjoy today.

I am so proud to say that I am related to him and I believe he, and so many others like him, deserve to be greatly remembered.

# TP COTTERS PUBLIC HOUSE

(Original February, 2016 and updated August, 2023).

Last Thursday, 17 August, TP Cotter's public house was advertised for sale and featured in the Examiner. When it is sold it will end the Cotters' ownership of the premises after 121 years that spanned three generations. The pub has become a great Macroom, where drink and food was invariably good snd patrons were meet with a greeting and pleasantness. It is both wise for Jack and Breda but very sad for the town and area. They and TP's, as it was, will be very badly missed. The updated article follows.

In 1902 T.P. Cotter opened his pub and it is part of the soul of Macroom. Jack and Breda Cotter took over the premises in 1988, and, together with their family and staff, run a very successful house that is characterized by friendliness, good food and drink, and enjoyable conversation. Jack was kind enough to relate the history of T.P.'s.

Timothy Patrick Cotter (TP) left Gortnahuchtee, Inchigeela, for America as a young man in the 1890s and did well. When home on holiday in 1902, he was invited to attend an auction for a Main Street public house; his function was to make a bid but he had no real interest in buying. Much to his surprise, TP was the highest bidder, and the property fell to him. Accepting the outcome, he became the owner, and the bar is still run by the Cotter family.

TP's bar looks deceptively small from the front; it is a long structure with many buildings, outhouses and sheds to the rear and it has an entrance from Barrett Place. These buildings and access facilitated the development of a mill, where meal, flour and ration were ground and bagged. The Cotters also sold tea and sugar. At that time, these items were delivered in bulk, and the merchant then had to package and sell the products. The businesses thrived. He married Miss Elizabeth Horgan, Kilcorney. They had five children: Maisie (Coughlan), Betty (Neville), Ann, Kay (Moroney) and Jerry (born in 1910). So successful was T.P. that he was able to buy other pubs and three of his daughters had bars in Cork city. Maisie married Pat Coughlan, lived in Railway View, and they had two children - Tom and Jane, both engineers. Jerry Cotter remembered the War of Independence and recounted that shots were fired in the bar, and that he heard often gunfire in the distance. TP almost bought 'The Western Star' - he was next highest bidder - and the plan was, if successful, to leave Macroom. Happily the Cotters stayed, and sadly the once prestigious and bustling 'Star' is no more.

In 1948 Jerry took over the business. Though medium in stature, he was adept at carrying two-and-a-half hundred-weight bags of ration or flour on his back, often up poor, rickety and slippery stairs or steps to elevated lofts. Jerry married Kathleen (Kay) Browne in 1948; she too was from Kilcorney. Kay trained as a nurse in The North Infirmary, and she really enjoyed her work. Some years after qualifying, her mother became ill and Kay nursed her at home in Kilcorney in her final years. Jack thinks his parents met at a show dance, were married in Cloghroe and honeymooned in Dublin, where they were photographed by the 'Man-on-the-Bridge'. Jerry and Kay continued to prosper in both sides of the business. At one point Jerry had a lorry - plate number IZK 814 -, a van and a car. Ted was born



in 1951, Jack in 1954, Colman in 1955, followed by Frank and Liz (Browne), whose husband, Kevin, has passed away. TP died in 1954, one month before Jack was born. Liz is a nurse, Ted is a national teacher, Colman is an engineer and Frank works in Nutricia. Chest problems affected Jerry's health and reduced his ability to run the mill. Jack's father was very progressive, did up the bar in 1960, and again in the 1970s, installing a coffee and soup vending machine. He also facilitated the establishment of Macroom Mart by swopping fields, and this in turn was sold and became the site of Four Homes. The 'by-pass' was then also a live issue, and there was a suggestion that this ground may have been used. Jerry was good to the Mart, and the Mart was very good for business.

Many teams used Cotter's as their dressing rooms. The Duhallow connection was strong, and Millstreet as well as Dromtarriffe, Cullen and Knocknagree togged there. Jack recalls the great excitement in town when Millstreet and Carberry played three games, and he remembers one of the Millstreet players taking a 'shot' of whiskey before the match, and paying later. And the teams always left the rooms spotless. Jack recalls Joe Gallagher installing a colour television, one of the first in Macroom, for the 1970 World Cup (Mexico) and he left a sign saying 'Supplied by Joe Gallagher'.

Jack went to St. Joseph's Convent and later The Boys' National in Macroom. However he spent 5th and 6th classes in Ring, with Johnny Warren and Eamon Murphy, Coachford. He attended Rochestown for one year, and then transferred to De La Salle, Macroom to complete his secondary education. Classmates included Paudie Murphy, John O'Callaghan (Palfab), Paddy Casey, Seán Bradley, Pa Goold, Tim 'Bonzo' O'Sullivan, Chris Cronin, Jimmy Lynch, Joe 'Fudge' Moloney and the deceased Dónal Lucey, The Bridge. He sat his Leaving in 1971 and resisted family pressure to do 'something' after school. Jack was adamant that he liked the bar and wanted to stay at home in the business. He has been 'home' since, for more than 44 years. Work was hard but he liked it, and he was always able to enjoy the 'craic'. For entertainment, he went to the cinema several times a week, enjoyed a few pints, played (and won at) basketball in The Youth Club/Castle Ballroom and he did some cross-country running. The Tops of The Towns was a big event in town, and he participated.

1988 and 1989 were defining years for Jack. The business was transferred to him following Jerry's death in November 1988. In 1989 Jack married Breda Lynch, the love of his life. Sheila Lynch, Breda's mother owned The Castle Bar in the North Square, and Breda worked in the office of Neville's Bakery. Liz, Jack's sister, married Kevin Browne the same year. A year later Jack and Breda did their first major refurbishment of the pub. Italia '90 was on, the country was soccer crazy, and this delayed Billy Casey, the builder, from starting the job; Schilacchi's goal put an end to the magic and the madness. Business continued during the renovation as they were able to use next door - the former Post Office - as a bar, as they had bought it some years before. Macroom won the Intermediate County in 1990, and Paul Kingston's bike was painted green and white when he left it outside the pub. David, John and Maeve were born in due course. A second major renovation was done in 2002, and this time they installed a kitchen, changing the business to a bar-cumrestaurant. The bar remains the core activity but serving food is also essential. They also have an annual tribute gig to Rory Gallagher, and they cater for private functions as well.

Jack has endless stories about the bar, the town and the area. He tells one yarn about an election, and Bobby Molloy, then Fianna Fáil Minister for Local Government, being introduced by Willie O'Brien, an ardent FF supporter, to 'Ma' Cotter, a great Fine Gael woman, and, in jest, signing a bit of paper, giving her permission to build any size house anywhere in Ireland! Unfortunately the evidence is gone.

Recently T.P.'s was visited by the' Sunday World's pub spy and got 5 stars, a very high rating.

In their long tenure, Jack and Breda have seen many changes. They recall the recession of the '80s, the Celtic Tiger years and again the downturn. The drink driving laws and smoking ban have radically changed the bar business, but they learned to adapt successfully with the times by introducing food. The bar continues to do well and they employ, up to 10 people. TP's continues to be a place of a warm welcome, good drink, excellent food and congenial company.

Breda and Jack enjoyed their work, and enhanced the rich history of 121 years serving the people of Macroom and its environs.





# Think Globally, Act locally

#### WE ARE SWIFTS - WE ARE IN TROUBLE

Hi! Chris Barrett here, and today I am sharing with you knowledge that I have gained from speaking with Noel Linehan, who is associated with both Swift Conservation Ireland and BirdWatch Ireland. I started by asking Noel why we should be interested in Swifts in particular. His view is that all species have a right to live and we should have to justify why we do not want to protect them. He reminded me that we all benefit a lot from the existence of birds. He mentioned four areas of particular importance. These are, Food, Biomimetics, Medical and Feathers.

FOOD: We need to look no further here than the domestic chicken.

There are over 10.000 species of birds of which 2,000 are pollinators. In the Amazon RainForest, 3,000 species of trees have been named which rely on birds and mammals for pollination.

BIOMIMETICS: This is the study of life for Human Technology e.g. planes, drones, bullet trains (which are based on a kingfisher's beak), shock absorption equipment such as is worn by U.S football players (and influenced in design by the manner in which woodpecker's skulls absorb

MEDICAL: The most common form of vaccine is called egg-based vaccine manufacturing technology.

(A virus needs a host to replicate).

FEATHERS: People have yet to invent a material as good and versatile for insulation. For example, a real down jacket will be able to be squashed right down.

I like to remind myself that birds are living dinosaurs closely related to T. Rex, but it is swifts in particular that this article is concerned with. So a little clarification here.

Swifts should not be confused with swallows with their long tail streamers, or house martins which build mud nests under eaves and unlike swifts, perch on wires.


It is sobering to realise that since you were born that there are over 40% fewer swifts visiting us. The swift is now a red-listed bird of conservation in Ireland.

These amazing swifts eat millions of insects (such as flies, mosquitoes, midges and greenflies), drink, preen, sleep, even at 3,000 metres, and mate while flying; only landing to breed between May and August each year.

They approach their nest site at more than 64km per hour and come to a stop without slowing

The chicks stop eating and lose weight before they leave the nest - you cannot fly if you are too fat

They need to be no more than 40 g and not only do they stretch their wings, but they practise press-ups on their wings and tails to make them strong enough for flying. Young birds can be 100s of miles south only 2 days after leaving their nests. After they leave their nest they can keep flying for



up to 2-3 years until they are ready to make a nest, find a partner and raise a family.

Swifts mate for life. A day or 2 after fertilisation, an egg is laid. Both parents contribute equally to the rearing of the young

They will fly around 800kms a day, about 2 million miles in their lifetime, the equivalent of more than 4 trips to the moon and back! They don't normally land on the ground because it is very difficult for them to take off, and they cannot perch on wires or branches.

Swifts have incredible eyesight with the highest density of light-sensitive cells, (fovea).

They are one of the few animals with a double fovea.

The double fovea is used when they are catching insects in flight, and seems to be used to enable them to distinguish between stinging and nonstinging insects.

The swift is the fastest self-powered level-flying bird, (i.e. not assisted by gravity). It can reach speeds of 69.6 mph in a wind tunnel.

Their old nest sites in old buildings are often pulled down and new buildings have no nooks and crannies for them. They are 100% faithful to their nest sites and return there every year.

We don't yet know how they navigate their way home and if when they find their nest sites gone, when they return from Africa, they are homeless. So how can we help these amazing birds?

Leave existing nest sites undisturbed.

If you repair old buildings, make sure new access holes match exactly the location of the old ones. Build new nest boxes into the walls of new buildings or put up external nest boxes. (Swifts don't leave a mess under their nests).

Don't use insecticides because swifts feed on

On further discussion I discovered that Noel spends his free time planning, organising and arranging nest-box projects. He tells me it is of paramount importance that the dimensions of these boxes are absolutely accurate. Swifts cannot excavate their own hole or make an entrance larger. They need our help.

The entrance hole to the nest needs to be 28 to 30mm high and 60-65mm wide, and no bigger. This ensures that the swifts will have an entrance which will not be invaded by crows or starlings. The nest box also needs to be 5metres above the nearest horizontal surface.

(Unfortunately, it appears that swifts don't take to swift poles.)

A creative carpenter could make nest boxes from wood, e.g using the Zeist template which is on the internet. The box would need to be 400mm wide, 200 mm high and 200mm deep, with an entrance hole 28 -30 mm high and 60 - 65 mm

Nest boxes don't have quality control. If you do make/buy a suitable box ( i.e. one which is fit for purpose for the species), you need to ensure that it is also erected in the correct place. For this you can get advice and guidance from the RSPB Birdwatch Ireland or Swift Conservation Ireland. To get swifts to come to your completed, perfectly positioned box it is necessary to play a recording

Noel or I can send on a 10 minute recording to play. Low volume is essential. If you can hear it from 5 metres away, it is loud enough. You need to have the correct call i.e that of a pair of swifts duetting within a nest, not of birds calling in fliaht.

of adult swifts which they can follow.

Noel has kindly offered to send information to people who are thinking of putting up Swift boxes and he can help you source people who have experience at erecting and building these boxes for about 25 euro an hour.

Many Men's shed members will also be able to assist and there is never a problem with asking. I am really grateful to Noel for sharing so much of his knowledge on swifts. He is particularly interested in working with schools and he has very kindly allowed me to share his details. noellinehan@hotmail.com 085 7257534

Welcome back dear student, continuing on how 'bad news sells.' The Gospel of Jesus is Good News but unfortunately most people don't know much about it (Hosea 4:6). This lack of knowledge of God's Word allows the devil to deceive and groom folks into adopting negative mindsets, causing them to believe and focus on the pessimistic news and sensational social media instead. It's a subtle form of warfare aimed at the destruction of people's joy and mental wellbeing, and ultimately their destiny, completely opposed to the Spirit of God. "Lord, who has believed our message? And to whom has the arm and power of the Lord been unveiled and revealed?" (John 12:38 Amplified Bible). It's often much easier to accept an evil report than it is to believe a good one. God revealed Himself as 'Alpha and the Omega' — meaning He is the Beginning and the End; the First and the Last (Revelation 1:8). The Lord knows the end from the beginning. We stress and worry about what's going to happen — developing and magnifying negatives, but God knows it all. Pressing in to learn His wisdom takes effort and means trusting Him when we don't see the whole picture yet (Proverbs 3:5-8).


When Joshua sent in two men to spy out Jericho they stayed in Rahab's house (Joshua chapter 2). It was a strongly fortified city that looked impenetrable. Amazingly, Rahab revealed to the Hebrew men how the people of Jericho had heard of God's mighty power that defeated Israel's enemies, and that as a result of what they heard, their hearts were melting from fear. Now this was a very different tale to that of the ten spies whom Moses had earlier sent into the land with Joshua and Caleb — twelve men in total, but ten of them brought back an evil report that cost the Israelites forty years in the wilderness (Numbers chapters 13&14). In that situation only Caleb and Joshua believed that God was with them, and that they would succeed in their endeavours because of His power and promise to go with them. The other ten, while admitting that the land looked great, focussed on their human shortcomings, causing all the people to believe their negative account instead! It's amazing how a bad report spreads, and people believe it without question. Later, when they crossed over into the promised land, they saw God's grace and favour defend them and bring them great success. How sad though that it was delayed by forty years of wilderness wandering because they were too stubborn to believe Caleb and Joshua's initial testimony. God is not limited in Power, but we limit His power by our unbelief.

Psalm 112 speaks of one who trusts in God. His active faith brings protection, deliverance and blessing upon himself, and upon his children and future posterity. And he remains rock solid no matter what the circumstances - "he will not fear bad news; his heart is steadfast, trusting, confidently relying on, and believing in the Lord. His heart is secure — he will not fear" (Psalm 1126-8). There is so much fear in our world. People are afraid of all kinds of things. But fight and resist fear we must - because it's not from God! Focus on the good report (Philippians 4:6-8). "What time I am afraid I will trust in You" (Psalm 56:3).

#### THE LOVE STORY OF MICHAEL COLLINS AND KITTY KIERNAN

Michael Collins was engaged to Kitty Kiernan, and they were to be married in the Autumn of 1922. But he was shot at mBeal Na Blath on the 22 of August 1922. He was 31 years of age when he died. Over half a million attended his funeral in Dublin. All parties to the conflict both British and Irish were temporarily united in grief. In Michael's brief lifetime he had fought the British Empire to a stalemate, negotiated the Treaty of Independence for Ireland and overseen its transition to Democracy. He died paradoxilly in an attempt to finally remove the gun from Irish politics.

The beautiful song "Michaels Lyrics" by Johnny McEvoy. It explains more than I ever could about Michael Collins and the Ambush at Beal Na mBlath.

The Curlew stood silent and unseen, In the long damp grass, And looked down on the road below him. That wound its way through Beal Na mBlath. Just as quickly as it started the firing stopped, And a terrible silence hung over the valley A lone figure lay on the roadside in the drizzling August rain, Dressed in a green cape coat, leggings and brown hobnail boots, That would never again set the sparks flying from the kitchen flagstones,



As he danced his way through a half – set.

A hurried whispered Act of Contrition, And the firing breaks out again. The curlew takes to flight, And as he flies out over the empty sad fields Of west Cork with his lonesome call, he must tell the world that the Big Fellow has fallen, and that Michael is gone.

Young men in ambush lay on a roadside, on a hill where flowers grow, so much hate for one so young, who was right and who was wrong, through a thousand years may pass we'll never know.

Candles dripping blood they placed between your shoulders, Rosary beads like teardrops on your fingers, Friends and comrades standing by their grief they wonder why, Michael in their hour of need you had to go.

And when evening twilight came, Gently fell the August rain, Oh but you lay still and silent on the ground, As we hung our heads in prayer, Our sorrow and despair, We wondered was it friend or foe, Who shot you down?




