In the region of 2500 people were present in Gougane Barra on Sunday 1st October for Rosary and Annual Mass for Gougane Sunday. Many of those present remarked that this was one of the largest attendances in many years and

the occasion was blessed with beautiful autumn weather. This was a unique occasion in that this year marks the 1,400 anniversary of the death of St. Finbarr.

People gathered from many parishes and different groups for the Rosary and Annual Mass.

Some of the groups in attendance were the Catholic Guides of Ireland, Guides and Scouts of Europe - Ireland, St. John's Ambulance Group, pupils and staff members from Mater Dei Academy, members of the Syro Malabar, Syro Malankara, Ukrainian Catholics and Polish Chaplaincies in the Diocese.

Cllr Frank O'Flynn, County Mayor was present and the Lord Mayor of Cork was represented by Cllr Dan Boyle.

Bishop Fintan was main celebrant for the Mass. The Ballingeary Church Choir sang beautifully and the Ballingeary Pipe Band also participated in the

Mass as well as leading the procession before the Mass.

In his homily, Fr. Bernard Cotter, speaking of St. Finbarr, said that 'what makes Finbarr a true missionary is not that he was a hermit here, but that he managed to leave this beautiful place, Gougane, loved by brides and grooms from all over the world, truly sceptred isle, who could leave this heavenly place but only a missionary with a message to share, Good News.

And so he went to Cork, so dismally described as "Corcach Mór na Mumhan", the great bog of Munster. Who but a missionary could make that transition!

But the harvest was rich and the labourers were few....So Finbarr had to become a missionary disciple - and so must you!

And how? Well parish life is changing. The parish which used to be so priest-centred has a new face - yours! What talents can you share in your parish community to advance the kingdom? What gifts can you make available that will turn your parish into a magnet, drawing people in, people who are searching for faith?

Evangelisation isn't standing in the middle of Patrick St with a loudspeaker;

it's a word of comfort to a friend facing an awful trouble;

it's sharing your own faith in life-without-end with someone whose own life is suddenly limited and

it's a word to someone in your family about what faith means to you, a kind invitation, a gesture of encouragement, a silent prayer.

Everyone who believes can evangelise, can share what is good about our faith, the hope it brings us, the joy we share.

The way to evangelise is to be an example of a Christian, loving , forgiving, tolerant, peacemaking, truthful, just - to be all that Finbarr was, that his Good News may shine through you! For the harvest is rich but the labourers are few.... so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to his harvest:

but be careful what you pray for — for he could just send you!



Kilmurry Active Retirement

Have you heard of 'blue zones'? No, they are not those extremities that on any cold winter's day surely make themselves known to you. The term "Blue Zones" was coined by Michel Poulain and Giovanni Mario Pes who had been studying longevity in Sardinia. Subsequently Dan Buettner, a National Geographic explorer and author, claimed to have had found regions in the world where people live significantly longer and have lower rates of chronic diseases compared to the global average. There are five such zones that researchers have since studied, hoping to find common factors contributing to longevity and well-being. These zones are Okinawa an island off Japan, a mountainous area in Sardinia off Italy, Nicoya in Costa Rica, Ikaria off Greece, and Loma Linda in California (home to a community of vegetarian Seventh-day Adventists). They are small communities, and often segregated or distant from the larger community in geography or culture. Some claim that these Blue Zones share some common lifestyle factors associated with longevity and well-being. They identify a predominantly plant-based diet, regular physical activity, social engagement, purposeful lives, and a focus on stress management and relaxation. They claim that while genetics may play a role, that primarily it's the shared lifestyle and cultural practices that contribute to the exceptional health outcomes observed in these regions.

A four-part documentary series is currently on Netflix, where Buettner is returning to these zones. It indeed makes very interesting viewing. But is it all true? We need to be careful when we humans are being offered what we want - the elixir of life. We tend to have 'confirmation bias', we find it easier to believe what we would like to believe. It is claimed that these zones have a much higher percentage of centenarians. Some scientists are sceptical. People over one hundred in 2000 were born in the late 1800s, a time when birth statistics may not have been reliable in isolated communities. I recall from my youth that there were people in my community that didn't know what age they were. In addition, there are too some practical reasons why people may lie about age, particularly in communities that attribute much respect and status to age. On the other hand, in Catholic countries baptisms are a reliable source of independent verification, and in

Sardinia for instance the claim is that men reach one hundred at ten times the average rate. So poor statistics are unlikely the full explanation.

Scientists, in so far as they can agree on anything, are pretty well agreed on the benefits of the Mediterranean diet, regular physical activity, social engagement, purposeful lives, and a focus on stress management and relaxation. However, even where these correlate with a high proportion of centenarians, it is not proof of causation. We could say that we have evidence that most Kerrymen speak with Kerry accents, and evidence that their culture produces successful footballers, but a Kerry accent may not be the cause of being successful at football!

In many of the blue zones they are partial to a good night dining with friends and having a glass or two of good local wine. My bias thinks that is good news. However, scientists say alcohol is not good for us. Some indeed assert that there is no safe level. Maybe the scientists and these wine drinkers are both right. The benefits of a good time with friends may more than compensate for the detrimental effects of alcohol. However even if so, not more than two glasses of wine with a meal socialising with friends is not the same as three glasses without food and being all alone.

Science is science and good television is good television. I'd like to do some more research. I am wondering, now that we are enjoying our coffee crawl, would we be up for a blue zone crawl? They are mostly islands close to the equator. We could add years to our lives, or alternatively we could contaminate them with our decadent ways.

9 Signs Your Spine May Need Attention

1. The soles/heels of your shoes wear out unevenly.

This can be due to uneven leg length or stress along the length of the spine.

COMPOSTING INITIATIVE CLUTIVATES A GREENER FUTURE FOR **CORK COUNTY SCHOOLS**

Ten schools from Cork County have completed the Composting for Schools programme, designed to help them start or improve their composting systems, to reduce waste, save money and combat climate change.

The programme, delivered by Composting Ireland and supported by Cork County Council, was set up to help students learn about composting and gardening using a variety of fun interactive activities to create a better understanding of the principles of ecology and biodiversity that underpin all life on our planet.

Welcoming the programme, Mayor of the County of Cork, Cllr. Frank O'Flynn said, "By equipping students, teachers, parents, and school staff with the tools of composting, waste reduction, recycling, and environmental awareness, we're cultivating a generation that will not just appreciate nature but actively safeguard its health. Congratulations to each of the ten schools who have taken the time to participate in this year's programme."

Participating Cork County schools included Colaiste na Toirbhirte Bandon, Scoil Fhiachna Glengarriff, Ballymoney National School, Scoil Phádraig Naofa Bandon, Gaelscoil Charraig Ui Leighin, Scoil Mhuire Naofa Carrigtwohill, Kilcolman National School, Timoleague National School, Bweeng National School and Carriganima National School.

To enhance their composting facilities, Cork County Council provided each participating school with a €250 voucher to spend on a variety of composting systems and tools including secateurs, pitch forks, watering cans and thermometers, in-school collection caddies and instructional signs.

Of the ten participating schools, eight schools have already opted to install a composter, improve their

existing systems or add new composting units such as leaf mould cages, garden composting systems and wormeries to provide both a means of composting leftovers from school lunches and a resource for nature education.

The schools are also supported by site visits from Composting Ireland, to establish their needs and receive assistance to set up and maintain their new composting regimes. Donal O'Leary, Composting Ireland added "We are thrilled with the response from Cork schools. The teachers have been enthusiastic and committed to learning about composting and bringing best environmental practices to their schools."

Carriganima National School have already set up a composting system and have gained invaluable learning from the programme. Lavinia Sheahan, teacher at Carriganima National School said "The Composting for Schools programme has been a very positive experience for our school. Donal has been a wealth of knowledge and a huge support in improving the composting systems in our school. Since joining the programme, we have set up a wormery. The children have taken responsibility for the wormery by collecting classroom waste and setting up rotas for feeding the worms. We are using the voucher from Cork County Council to install Leaf Mould Cages. An abundance of autumn leaves fall on the school grounds every year, we are really excited to turn what was a nuisance into a learning experience which will result in a sustainable supply of our very own leaf mulch and compost".

AWARDED PAPAL BENEMERENTI MEDAL

Nora McCarthy was awarded the Papal Benemerenti Certificate and gold medal by Pope Francis for her outstanding service as Sacristan Ballinagree Church for many years.

Most Rev. William Crean D.D. made the presentation at a special Mass on 29th of October Benemerenti Medals are bestowed to individuals who have merited special recognition by the Holy See. The Medals are Pontifical decorations instituted by Gregory XVI in 1832, and are conferred to people for distinguished service to Catholic principles, the Church and society - to

those who have shown an active fidelity to and love for the Church. The medal is worn on the breast, suspended by ribbons of the papal colours. In 1925, the concept of awarding this medal as a mark of recognition to persons in service of the Catholic Church, civil and military, lay and clergy alike became acceptable. Members of the Swiss Guard may receive it for three years of faithful service.

The current version of the Benemerenti medal was designed by Pope Paul VI. The medal is a gold Greek Cross depicting Christ with his hand

raised in blessing. On the left arm of the cross is the tiara and crossed keys symbol of the papacy. On the right arm is the coat of arms of the current Pope. The medal is suspended from a yellow and white ribbon, the colors of the Papacy

Previous versions and variants consisted mainly of a round medal with the portrait of the reigning Pope on the front and a laurel wreath with an inscription "BENEMERENTI" or "BENE MERENTI" on the back





The Macroom and District Environmental Group Think Globally, Act locally WASPS! Environmental Citizenship means practicing Mercy

Hi! Chris Barrett back talking once again with my good friend, Ted Cook, Although it is tempting to choose the more cuddly, beautiful or convenient aspects of nature to protect, Ted's article reminds us of the importance of all aspects of nature and its interconnectedness. Another friend reminded me that hive bees are friends who make wax and lots of honey, other bees are friends who are extra fuzzy and really love flowers, while wasps are friends who pollinate, eat pests but need a little more personal space. Ted spoke to me after the "Environmental Citizenship" Green Flag had been awarded to St. Colman's BNS Macroom. He told me how the Principal Martin Clancy offered MDEG member, Ted Cook, the singular distinction of hoisting St. Colman's seventh Green Flag in the company of the whole school community on 23rd June 2023. As it was both the last day of school and the final class of their education. Ted was invited to address the 6th Class and Teachers, Mr. Cronin and Mr.Canty. The scholars were familiar with Ted, having participated in field outings since 1st Class; tree planting and propagating Hazels Oaks and Spanish Chestnuts in their




school Tree Nursery which was initiated by Ms Anne O'Dwyer (Green Flag Committee Teacher) during the 2016-2017 school year. Ted talks of how lively interactive discussions, ranging from the benefit of fresh greens and fruit fibre, dodgy artificial sweeteners, stretching the spine, focused breathing and our relationship with the Animal Kingdom, turned to our 'Foiche' or common wasp. He tells us that 'Beacha Oibre' translates as 'Hardworking Bees', which he believes may offer us this precious insect's truest description. All known 'Bees' evolved many millions of years ago from our Wasp, and that includes Ireland's 21 Bumblebee

species. On a lighter note, Ted reminds us that wasps don't wake up, cross themselves and pray for a juicy 6th Class scholar. Their venomous stings are designed to control Bee populations. Their target prey also include Green Fly and additional pest insects that attack the Plant kingdom. They feed their vast bounty in 'paper nests' made of chewed wood. Ted ascertained that three of the thirty five scholars from the two 6th Classes had experienced wasp stings. The students have since learned to drop the acquired habit of swatting and have learned that wasps are attracted to ultraviolet colours (blues -violets) and sugar. 'Wasp Recipes' including unwashed jamjars or sliced apple or orange were shared by them. The pictures of wasps were provided thanks to our local soap maker, Peta. It has been enlightening as always to learn from Ted Cook, and I thank him once again for his time and enthusiasm. 





Cill na Martra were level on the quarter-hour as Danny Ó Conaill's delivery from the right allowed Maidhcí Ó Duinnín to get there just before goalkeeper Michael Casey and poke the ball to the net. Three more points followed in quick succession, two from Ciarán Ó Duinnín and one from Maidhcí, had them in a commanding position. Cill na Martra struck for a superb goal from Daniel

Ó Duinnín in the 35th minute to lead by 3-6 to 1-6. However, Bantry then came back strongly and two points were followed by a goal of high quality from Rory Deane. They then drew level, took the lead and went three clear but Cill na Martra did not yield and finished like champions.

Canovee head the Mid Cork Junior Football Roll of Honour with 17 divisional titles to their credit but their team and supporters greeted their latest triumph at Ovens on Saturday evening last with as much emotion as if it was their first. It is 2007 since Canovee last won the Ross Oil Mid Cork Junior Football championship, which they augmented with Cork, Munster and All Ireland crowns, and after relegation back to junior in 2013 they started to build again for the future. The past few years have brought heartaches and disappointments but memories of all those were banished as a very young Canovee side overcame the severe early setback of conceding two goal to claw their way back into contention against a fine Inniscarra side who were outsiders entering the contest but who made a major contribution to a very entertaining and exciting final. Canovee had a range of forwards who could score, Inniscarra had only two, and this ultimately decided the contest.

There was a very big attendance present, the weather was perfect and the ground conditions remarkable after so much rain in the previous days. Jack Kelleher got Canovee off to a good start with a point in the 3rd minute, Dylan O'Sullivan equalised three minutes later as the game was being played at a hectic pace. A Canovee attack was halted by Jack O'Dwyer on his own half back line, the ball was sent on to Liam O'Connor and the Inniscarra man made a dash of forty metres through the Canovee cover before unleashing a pile driver to the net. This rocked Canovee but they were really dismayed when in a little over a minute later, Dan O'Connell got possession and with a sweetly judged hand pass put Dylan O'Sullivan clear, bearing down on goal and the full forward billowed the Canovee net from close range. In arrears by 2-1 to 0-1 after only eight minutes, this was really putting it up to the young Canovee team!

Between here and half time Canovee outscored

Inniscarra by 0-7 to 0-1 to be level at the interval. The Inniscarra attack did get a reasonable supply but the Canovee rearguard tightened and the attackers could not get shots on target. Canovee began to control midfield through the hard grit of Evan Dodd and Aidan Murphy despite the presence of Cork hurling captain Seán O'Donoghue for Inniscarra in this area and the speedy movement of the Canovee attack had the 'Scarra defence frequently stretched. Evan Dodd got the Canovee revival under way with a point in the 11th minute after Jack Kelleher's shot was blocked down, Kelleher converted a free three minutes later and a fine score from Conor O'Neill made it 2-1 to 0-4 at the end of the opening quarter and Canovee were clearly back in contention. A well hit Evan Dodd '45' was followed by a Dara Cronin point before 'Scarra interrupted the sequence with a point from a Dylan O'Sulllivan free on 24. The Canovee mentors, worried by the threat of Dan O'Connell and Dylan O'Sullivan up front for Inniscarra, introduced Michael Dunne from the bench and re-arranged their full back line to good effect and the winners finished the half with two excellent points, one each from Conor Dodd and Darragh McMahon, to be level at the break at 0-8 to 2-2, a fine recovery from their earlier position.

The third quarter was very evenly contested as Inniscarra showed they were going to battle all the way. Liam O'Connor put them back in front in the 35th minute, Darragh McMahon equalised for Canovee two minutes later and then Canovee took the lead from a Jack Kelleher free on 41. William Ahern, another effective substitution in the Canovee rearguard, set up a point for Conor O'Neill but'Scarra replied with a point from a Dylan O'Sullivan free after Dan O'Connell was fouled. The teams were level once again in the 48th minute when Liam O'Connor kicked over confidently for Inniscarra, who then took the lead for the last time in the 51st minute when Dylan O'Sullivan took a fine point from play, 2-6 to 0-11 the score.

The game took a dramatic turn in Canovee's favour within minutes. James Moynihan dashed in from the wing to kick over an equalising point and Evan Dodd had Canovee back in front with a 55th minute point. Inniscarra made a hash of a short kick-out, Jack Kelleher pounced to get possession, advanced and buried the ball in the 'Scarra net from close range to deal a major blow to 'Scarra hope as Canovee now led by four points heading down the home stretch. Canovee finished out the game in style with further points from McMahon and James Moynihan and with the final whistle the pent up emotions were let run free. Canovee are back, and now face into the county championship campaign a battle hardened outfit after overcoming this severe test of their credentials.





Welcome back dear student "In the beginning was the Word, the Word was with God, and the Word was God...through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made.... In Him was Life, and that Life was the Light of all mankind. The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it...The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us. We have seen His Glory, the Glory of the One and Only Son, who came from the Father, full of Grace and Truth" (John 1:1-5 & vs 14). John the apostle clearly revealed that Jesus is the Son of God and is the One through Whom everything was created - the Word of God in Person! Now, with that in mind, let's continue our study from last week - looking again at this verse in Hebrews "...for the Word of God is living and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it pierces even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow. It exposes the thoughts and intentions of the heart. Nothing in all creation is hidden from God's sight; everything is uncovered and exposed before the eyes of Him to whom we must give account" (Hebrews 4:12-13). Because we know that Jesus, the Word of God was raised from the dead, this verse can be read like this ... Jesus is alive and active. Jesus is sharper than any double-edged sword - piercing even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow. Jesus exposes the thoughts and intentions of the heart. Nothing in all creation is hidden from Jesus, everything is uncovered and exposed before His eyes, and we are accountable to Jesus.

Last week we studied the soul and the spirit. Now let's look at the joints and marrow, and the innermost thoughts and desires of the heart. The Word of God — Jesus knows you inside and out — both good and bad. He was there as you were being knit together in your mother's womb (Psalm 139:13-16). Jesus understands you. The joints and marrow are intricately linked. The soft marrow is made in the inner part of the bone producing the blood cells for life, the hard joint holds the bones together so the body can move. Nothing is hidden from Jesus. People can project one image but what goes on inside their hearts behind closed doors can be quite different. Yet none of our pain or mistakes are news to the Lord Jesus. He knows it all and still He loves us and has already forgiven us, paid for our healing and longs for us to receive His transforming Love (Proverbs 3:5-8; Proverbs 4:20-22). Many people resist, foolishly thinking that once no one else knows then God doesn't either. But the Scripture is clear - we are accountable to God's Word — the Lord Jesus!

Jesus told His disciples that He had come to seek and to save the lost not to judge sinners, but to save them (Luke 19:10; John 3:17-21). But there is a day of judgement coming when we each will stand before King Jesus alone, and give an account of how we lived, how we handled His Word, and what we did with it (Romans 14:7-12; 2 Corinthians 5:10). The devil - the 'accuser of the brethren' knows this too (Revelation 12:10-11). He accuses us where we have broken the commands of God from the Word (Colossians 2:13). But the Good News is that Jesus paid for us to be forgiven and restored to God with His Life, taking our sins and giving us His right standing with the Father - Hallelujah!
