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

NATIONAL BRAVERY AWARDS

On Friday 10th November, Marc O'Connor, from Mountcollins Co.Limerick, son of Vincent & Mary (née O'Donovan, Clondrohid) received a Certificate of Bravery at the National Bravery Awards. This award was presented at Farmleigh House in the Phoenix Park by Ceann Comhairle, Seán Ó Fearghaíl TD to individuals from across Ireland who risked their own lives to aid others in peril. Marc was awarded this Certificate for his outstanding bravery and courage for aiding in the rescue of his mother and sister who were trapped in an overturned car at Keelnahulla Cross, in County Cork. Marc was 9 years old at the time and he was a passenger in his mother's car

when it hit black ice and left the road.

He climbed out a broken window with his mother's phone, called the emergency services and went to the road to flag down a passing vehicle to help his mother and sister who were trapped in the car. His actions were truly extraordinary for a 9 year old.

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Our last monthly meeting of the year took place on the 7th of November in the Hub. Topics discussed included Santa's Grotto, Treasurers Report and a meeting with Alzheimer's Ireland.

Our next monthly meeting will take place in February. In the meantime, members will be heavily involved in the erection of the Christmas Lights throughout the town.

The book of photos produced by Seán and Máire Mac Suibhne, 'Muskerry through the MacSuibhne lens' will be going on sale again shortly in selected outlets throughout the Lee Valley, it will be €15 a book and it would make an ideal Christmas present. Proceed from book sales will go towards the erection of a Famine Memorial on the riverside in Masseytown and work is in progress on this project.

November is the best time to plant bare root fruit trees. The time to plant and buy them is from November to March. As well as helping preserve some of our rare heritage fruit tree varieties, a small orchard can be valuable for biodiversity. They are made up of several habitats, including woodland, hedgerow and meadow. Over time these habitats can be home to a range of biodiversity, including bees, butterflies, birds, bats, beetles and fungi. Windfallen fruit is also a source of food in autumn and winter for a range of wildlife. Species Rich grassland beneath the trees can be a haven for pollinators and biodiversity especially if they contain wildflowers. Make sure to include a native crab apple in your orchard if possible. Pollinators like wild bees and moths have a vital pollination role in orchards, with almost all fruit resulting from pollination

through either bee or other insect. In turn, fruit trees provide nectar and pollen essential for the survival of these important insects. Sensory gardens are spaces that offer opportunities to connect with nature through the five senses. The five senses can be linked into biodiversity in a sensory garden through the following: 1) Smell pollen and nectar rich herbs like Lavender and Thyme. 2) Taste delicious homegrown fruit and vegetables like apples and tomatoes. 3) Look at colourful pollinator friendly flowers in recycled containers. 4) Feel grass beneath your toes, mow grass every 6 weeks to let clover grow. 5) Hear the sound of bees and birds in native trees and hedgerows.

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

Report from the Inspectorate of Schools:

Following the recent Whole Science Evaluation in Managing, Leading and Learning by the Department of Education, the Inspectorate returned to McEgan College on Thursday Nov 9th to deliver the report on their findings. Over the course of five days in October the inspectors met with BOM, senior management, core teaching & learning teams, support teams, DEIS teams, representative from parents' association and student body as well as observing 24 lessons. Outcomes from the evaluation are graded as very good, good, satisfactory, fair or poor. We are delighted to say McEgan College received very good in all categories.

Full STEAM ahead for McEgan College:

On Thursday 9th November 42 pupils from both 5th & 6th classes and their teachers Ms. Gleeson, Ms. O Callaghan and Mr. O' Laighin from Dromleigh and Coppeen primary schools. The pupils enjoyed experiences in both Engineering & Science for the morning. This workshop supports the ongoing Maths Collaboration between McEgan College and local primary schools. In science, 2nd years students from McEgan taught the primary pupils how to do some simple science experiments, highlighting the science behind each one, these included chromatography, chemical reactions, fingerprint reading (forensic science). In the Engineering room, the students, working in pairs, made a race car. They finished with their own personal key tag that was made on the laser cutter. 

KILMURRY NEWS: NINTH BOOK FOR KILMURRY AUTHOR

UCC's Dr. Aodh Quinlivan, who lives in Kilmurry, has published his ninth book. First Citizen, cowritten with John Ger O'Riordan, tells the story of Seán French, Cork's longest-serving Lord Mayor. French was a legendary Cork figure in the 1920s and 1930s. He was first elected to Cork Corporation in January 1920, with a mere seventythree first preference votes. In the tempestuous period that followed, he worked steadily in the Corporation, earning a reputation as a forthright and honest talker at Council meetings. He entered public life at a time of national trauma, but the circumstances also presented opportunities and he did not lack the ambition, or the confidence, to take them. However, his ambition was initially halted by the Anglo-Irish Treaty and the Civil War. His staunch anti-Treaty stance led to his arrest on 12 September 1922 and he was sent to the Newbridge Internment Camp and, later, Mountjoy Prison.

French returned to Cork Corporation thirteen months later, with renewed determination, and he took the Mayoral chair on 30 January 1924, defeating Councillor Barry Egan by a solitary vote. Bar two years from July 1930 to July 1932, French served as Lord Mayor until he suddenly died in office on 12 September 1937. At a personal level, Seán French was quiet, studious, and unassuming, occasionally austere and even dour. However, when in the company of family and friends at social occasions, he came alive and could be gregarious and charming, often demonstrating a wicked sense of humour. He took a keen interest in sport, especially rugby, rowing and cricket. Undoubtedly, Seán French was an outstanding figure in public life who was held in high esteem by all. His contributions in the Dáil, Cork Corporation, the Harbour Board and numerous other public bodies and charities of which he was a member, were consistently eloquent, intelligent and passionate. A keynote of his character was his straightforwardness, integrity and unyielding fidelity to principle.

The office and status of Lord Mayor lives on in Cork city and many great men and women have held the position, but Seán French has the unique distinction of being the longest-serving First Citizen (twelve terms). For that alone, he warrants a prominent place in the rich history of Cork, the city he loved and served unconditionally throughout his life.

The political life of Seán French is captured in a new book by Aodh Quinlivan and John Ger O'Riordan, entitled First Citizen. The book forms part of Cork City Council's 1920-1923 Commemoration Programme and is published by Cork City Libraries. It will be launched by Lord Mayor, Councillor Kieran McCarthy, on 14 November.

The Toy Soldier Factory has been part of the local community since the 70's, the owner Lars Edman moving production from Sweden to Ireland. When signs were put up on the roads so that delivery trucks could find them, interested passers-by and curious tourists started turning up. A gift shop was started to cater for this interest. Over the years this was significantly expanded and in 2015 a huge replica of the Battle of Waterloo was imported from Germany. It was created by one of their customers who had used their moulds to cast 15,000 miniatures to populate this extensive display. It was there on loan for five years until 2020. Now that space is used for workshops. If you are a participant at their workshops you can choose from a great selection of miniatures, and your favourites are then cast and then you are taught how to paint. You can paint under their supervision. If I remember correctly the classes are for everyone from eight-year-old up, and I think cost fifteen euro for the hour. We were confined for time and couldn't do that on the day but enjoyed the free demonstrations and viewing the wide array of miniatures in the factory as well as some other Irish manufacturers giftware. We then had the tea and coffee, and some availed of the opportunity for early Christmas shopping while others, like Arnold Schwarzenegger - promised they would be back. I'm guessing there will be some happy grandchildren come Christmas, though maybe I'm wrong, maybe it will be some happy grandparents with a new hobby. Thanks to all at the Toy Soldier Factory for your great hospitality in accommodating our group, and particularly appreciated as at such a busy time of the year for you.





THE DAYS OF THE LITTLE GREEN APPLES

The above title is taken from a wonderful little story book by the former Cork Olympian Athlete and Writer Dave Guiney. An old and dear friend of his in Cork once declared "Wud'nt it be lovely to go back again to the days when we used to look at the little green apples in May". In many ways lots of old stories and reminiscence are some of those little green apples.

Growing up in Clondrohid in the 1950's and 60's, we had gained our hard won Independence some thirty years before and as a nation we were slowly finding our feet. Agriculture plus lots of manual labour were the order the day. I started work in the local Clondrohid Co-Operative Creamery on August 4th 1966 at 2.30pm. I had travelled to the local fair day at Macroom and was on my return journey with my dad Denis and brother Tom in our blue jeep registration number IN 9673. While making a brief stop outside the Creamery offices at Clondrohid the General Manager Tim O'Riordan came running down the stairway and approached me saying "Do you want a job?" to which I replied "Of course I do". "Will you start now"? he gueried to which I gave another positive response. He instructed me to "Go down the road there to the Creamery where Connie O'Sullivan is off-loading 1lb packages of butter into boxes and give him a hand". Connie was a true gentleman, a keen fisherman and interested in all forms of sport. Along with the Dairy Maid Noreen O'Leary from Ballydesmond, they produced lots of high quality butter. The butter was then stored in 56lb boxes which were kept in the "cold store" until required. It was then transferred into one pound and half pound packets with their distinctive White Deer

My work required quick hands and lots of concentration. We packed the 1lb packets in 28lb boxes and the time passed quickly. Before long it was 6pm and my day's work was over. When leaving Tim O'Riordan asked me "would I come again the following day" and I was delighted. I had ioined the work force.

At that time the creamery at Clondrohid was a flourishing enterprise with branches at Kilnamartyra, Ballymakeera, Coolea, Carriganima and Bawnmore. Each branch, including Clondrohid, had its own identity and each milk supplier had his own creamery number. Each morning the creamery lorries with their large milk tanks took off to the various branches. All returned to base at Clondrohid before midday and any surplus

milk was delivered to the Fry Cadburys factory at Rathmore or the Ballyclough factory at Mallow.

Back to August 1966 I enjoyed my days with Connie O'Sullivan and Noreen O'Leary. The job varied from helping at the butter wrapping machine to making large churns of butter. This was a slow process as the butter was expertly sampled and tested to ensure top quality. When the churn of butter was eventually ready a large timber spade was used to carefully transfer the butter into the 56lb boxes which were kept in the nearby store and used as required.

Later on in the month another kind gentleman Eoin O'Sullivan took his two week holiday break and I was detailed to take up his post of taking milk samples from the milk suppliers for the methylene blue test. This necessitated taking samples from all the branches. So each morning was a different destination and included boarding the lorry to the outside branches. The month passed quickly and on Thursday September 1st I got my first pay packet. That time we were paid monthly and I got the huge sum of £26 which was a lot of money in those days.

I was overjoyed and later in the week I travelled on my trusty bicycle to Macroom where I bought some new clothes, opened a Post Office account and made arrangements at Jerry Twomey's TV shop to get a TV for our home at Baratanaknuck. After many years with a new look team Cork had qualified to meet Kilkenny in the All Ireland Hurling Final at Croke Park on Sunday September 4th. It was the talk of the County. On Friday evening September 2nd a local friend and kind neighbour Con Walsh called at home suggesting that I would travel to the Hurling Final with him and that we could board the train at Millstreet. In my youthful

naivety I declined his generous offer stating that we had a new TV and I could watch the game in comfort at home.

On Saturday evening I can still recall the film shown on our one station black and white TV "Houdini" starring Tony Curtis and Piper Lourie. On the following day Cork had a famous victory over Kilkenny on a scoreline of 3-9 to 1-10. Eire Og star forward Colm Sheehan was the hero of the hour with three great goals and his former schoolmate at Farran National School, Ted O'Mahony from nearby Cloughduy, was also part of that great team panel. My life time friend Dermot O'Connell from Coolavokig called to our home to watch the game and later joined my brother Tom and myself to kick football and play hurling with our improvised hurling sticks!! On Monday morning I cycled the three miles to work with a spring in my step and I was to enjoy the next 16 years in the company of great comrades at Clondrohid creamery.

Magic Manure!

Hi! Chris Barrett here. Today I have the pleasure of speaking with Judy Wigham from Gee-up. She is going to tell me about a simple no-nonsense method which provides humus to the living soil rather than killing that soil with nitrates. Soil which has been treated with nitrates is dead, powdery and has lost structure which can cause it to blow away. Even before that, life in the form of essential micro-organisms will have been destroyed by the nitrates. Gee-up! horse manure offers a viable, honest and natural alternative.

Gee-up is a local business within the Lee Valley. Judy started this business twenty years ago with her husband Billy.

It came into being in 2003 because they were keen gardeners and were unable to get hold of good quality manure.

The manure they received from their local farmers was invariably filled with weed seeds and would produce a great crop of nettles, which though perfect for butterflies and other insects in a wild environment were a disaster when they were trying to create a beautiful garden.

They thought there would be plenty of people like themselves who wanted to work with nature rather than against it, and so they decided to do something about it. As a result Gee-up was born. They started off with two shovels and a secondhand onion-bagging machine, which Billy cleverly converted to a manure bagging machine. They gradually went on to build bits of machinery which would help with sieving the manure. From that they built up the entire system with second hand loaders while Billy set to work inventing machinery to exactly suit their needs.

Then like now, compost arrived as an unwanted product of horse riding stables and commenced a composting process which was closely managed over a period of approximately two years.

First of all it is composted by aerating it in windrows which are long narrow rows which are



the best shape for optimal composting.

When it is ready the compost is then brought into the barns in the yard by tractor and trailer. This allows it to dry, so it is ready for bagging.

By taking away material that stables have no storage or use for, Gee-up provides a service for the stables and turns it into pure magic for gardeners. The manure reaches 60 degrees Celsius, at least, during the composting process. As a result, weed seeds and pathogens are destroyed, leaving friable, odourless and healthy fertiliser for the garden. It is an environmental soil-enricher which has absolutely nothing added to it. It is certified as organic by the Organic Trust.

Nowadays when people are realising the benefits of no-dig gardening, here is the answer.

All you have to do is spread this onto your beds and plant into it.

This organic soil enricher is full of good native worms that will draw it down deeper into your soil which will benefit hugely from all that humus and nutrients.



KYR re Benefits and entitlements following a death

After a bereavement you may need financial support. The Department of Social Protection (DSP) provides certain once-off payments to help out families during this difficult time. Your local Community Welfare Officer deals with some of these payments.

You must have made a certain number of PRSI contributions to be eliqible for some social welfare payments. You may be eligible for other payments, if you pass a means test or if you are in urgent need. Time limits apply for many payments, so apply as early as is possible.

You cannot be expected to do everything right away, but if the deceased was getting a social welfare payment or you were claiming for them as a dependant or you were getting a Carer's Allowance to look after them, it's important that you notify the Department within the first few days of the death.

Notifying the Department does not mean the payment will be taken back immediately. In many cases, the spouse, civil partner, cohabitant, parent or carer may continue to receive a payment for 6 weeks following the death

What happens when a person being cared for dies & carer was in receipt of Carers Benefit/ Allowance?

Payment of Carer's Allowance (full or half-rate) continues to be made for 12 weeks after the death of the person you were caring for while payment of Carer's Benefit continues to be made for 6 weeks after the death of the person you were caring for.

If you are getting Carer's Allowance (full or half-rate) on behalf of a spouse, civil partner or cohabitant and that person dies, you can continue to get Carer's Allowance for 12 weeks plus the State Pension/ Invalidity Pension/Disability Allowance etc (if in payment to that person) for 6 weeks after the date of death. If you were getting Carer's Benefit, you continue to get it for 6 weeks and any payments your spouse or partner was getting.

Domiciliary Care Allowance continues to be paid for 3 months in cases where the child being cared for has died.

Is there any help available with funeral costs?

You can get help with the cost of the funeral in certain circumstances. The Widowed or Surviving Civil Partner Grant is a once-off payment to widows/widowers/surviving civil partners with dependent children. This grant is a once-off payment of €8,000.

If someone dies from an accident at work, a Funeral Grant is available. To be eligible for this grant, the death must have resulted from an accident at work, an accident while travelling directly to or from work or an occupational disease. It amounts to €850.

Whether you qualify or not for one of the above grants you may be eligible for an Additional Needs Payment to help with funeral costs if you are on a low income. Each case is decided on its merits. The Community Welfare Service prefers if you apply before the funeral takes place, but in practice, most people apply afterwards.

In many cases a payment or a grant cannot be paid until all the necessary documentation is received. If you are claiming the grant, you are responsible for the production of certificates, documents and any information required, for example:

- Death certificate
- Birth certificate
- Marriage or Civil Partnership certificate (to prove your relationship to the deceased)
- The deceased person's Personal Public Service (PPS) number
- Your PPS number may also be required

What social welfare payments are available to the bereaved?

If you were living with or dependent on the deceased, any current benefits or payments you are getting may change, or you may be able to claim additional benefits. Depending on your income and circumstances you may be entitled to a social welfare payment in your own right. A Widow's, Widower's or Surviving Civil Partner's Contributory Pension and related social welfare benefits may be payable if either you or your deceased spouse or civil partner has enough PRSI contributions.

A Widow's, Widower's or Surviving Civil Partner's (Non-Contributory) Pension is paid to widowed people or surviving civil partners without dependent children, who do not qualify for a contributory pension and who pass a means test.

A Guardian's payment is paid to the child's guardian up to the child's 18th birthday or 22nd birthday if he or she is in full-time education.

A One-Parent Family Payment can be paid to you if you are parenting alone as a result of the death of your spouse, civil partner or cohabitant. If you also qualify for a Widow's, Widower's or Surviving Civil Partner's Contributory Pension you will have to choose which payment is of most benefit to you because you cannot get both.

If a person dies because of an accident at work or occupational disease, Death Benefit under the Occupational Injuries Scheme may be paid to their surviving spouse or civil partner.

Are there any other additional payments?

Bereavement can cause financial difficulties. The Supplementary Welfare Allowance Scheme provides financial support to people with low incomes. You may qualify for a weekly supplement payment under the scheme to meet certain special needs, for example, help with rent and fuel costs. In addition, payments can also be made for urgent or exceptional needs.

There are specific rules about taxation in the year of a person's death, for example, a tax refund may be due. There are also extra credits for parents in the years following the death of a spouse or civil partner. If you are a widowed person or a surviving civil partner, you can claim an increased personal tax credit. The amount of the tax credit depends on whether or not you have dependent children and when your spouse or civil partner died.

'T.C. Murray, Macroom's Abbey Playwright' By Jim Cooney.

T.C. Murray was one of Ireland's foremost playwrights 1900-1940, and had many of his plays performed all over Ireland including The Abbey Theatre, in England and America. He was seen as J.M. Synge's natural successor. Macroom's Briery Gap takes its name from one of his most famous plays. This is the 150th anniversary of his birth.

Thomas Cornelius, T.C., Murray was born in 1873 and died in 1959. He was the seventh of eleven children. His parents came to Macroom and had a business in New Street comprising a pub, grocery and selling flour and grain. Murray got many of his themes, and the language for his plays, from listening to customers in their shop. Raised in a devout Catholic ambience, he retained that strong Catholic sensibility all his life He attended national school in School Lane (now Barrett Place) and was a clever student, winning a scholarship to the National Teacher Training College. As an N.T., he taught around Cork before being appointed principal in Rathduff, near Blarney, in 1900. Here, life was difficult as his manager, a local priest disapproved of his writing. Eventually Murray was appointed to a teaching post in Model School, Dublin. He retired early to devote himself fully to writing and to literature matters.

When in Cork, he taught with Daniel Corkery who encouraged his writing. Murray became part of a group known as the Cork Realists who concentrated on writing about the real lives of Irish people as opposed to the Dion Boucicault's melodramas. Among his themes were an unmarried mother, rejected by the father of


her child, fraternal strife and murder over land inheritance and a priest without a vocation the priest was ordained under pressure from his mother . His plays were 'of their time' and lost popularity and relevance as Ireland advanced in the twentieth century. He also wrote a semiautobiographical novel, Spring Horizon (1937), and Spring Aftermath (1922), which effectively describes the Macroom of his childhood.

Among his plays were The Wheel of Fortune (later Sovereign Love), Birthright, Maurice Harte, The Serf, The Briery Gap, Autumn Fire, The Pipe in the Field and Michaelmas. He was on the board of the Abbey Theatre and was conferred with an honorary Doctorate of Literature by the NUI in 1949 and was in the Irish Academy. As well as having our culture centre named after one of his plays, a new housing estate, Páirc Uí Mhuireatha, bears the Irish version of his name. Although his

parents were native Irish speakers, they spoke English at home when they moved to Macroom and, as far as I know, Murray



Currently Castle Street and New Street are being 'renewed' and there is work on-going on his original home. The building has a plaque marking Murray's connection.

Jim Cooney, an expert on English literature and Macroom history will be the speaker and is sure to give a very interesting talk.

Hints Tips and Ideas for submitting photos for Publication

The Lee Valley Outlook is published once every two weeks and for most editions there will be emails with anything between 120 and 140 images, of which 70 to 80 will be printed. This is not surprising as nowadays, most people carry a camera with them at all times, something that was unheard of only of a few years ago. If you are involved in a school, college or organisation, this is a golden opportunity for you to publicise your activities by submitting articles and images. When taking photos that you intend for publication, keep three inches high, (7.62cm) and most likely will be printed like that or maybe smaller, (very rarely an image may be published in a larger size) so when taking photos, keep in close to the subject, to get the maximum benefit.

When taking photos indoors that you intend to send for publication, turning on the flash, will usually result in a better image, but you may need to move much closer to your subject, particularly if you are using a mobile phone. Mobile phones use a different system for flash, which is not as effective or as powerful as a traditional camera flash.

Always try to hold the camera steady, particularly with mobile phones, which by their nature are very difficult to keep steady, and is probably the most common reason for poor quality images when printed, (even though they may look ok on the screen). Some people may think that cropping an image will compensate for being too far away from the subject, but remember cropping drastically reduces the quality. If you must crop, maybe to make it easier for sending by email, leave lots of space around the subjects of photo, for further

Now that you have the photo ready to send, what about a caption? When sending images for publication, always try to keep in mind, that this is a golden opportunity for you to promote your club, school or organisation. Someone once said 'A picture is worth a thousand words', but a picture always needs a caption to convey that message, not just any message, but the specific massage that you want at this time. For example, this could well be a caption; Joe Blogs surrounded by his friends celebrating his victory in Murphy's pub'. Let's look at this caption a bit closer, you may know who Joe Blogs is and where Murphy's Pub is, others may not, above all What did he win? Who did he beat? Where was the contest? A more appropriate caption might read; 'Joe Blogs representing the Macroom Rock Breakers Club, who defeated Mayo man Michael Mogs in the national rock breaking competition held in Killarney, seen here displaying his trophy to his friends in Murphy's pub. This caption tells the story, it could easily be worded differently, but the message is the same.

Always make sure that you have the name of your club, school or organisation included in the caption, so if one or more of your images does not appear on the same page as the rest, having its own caption with it will make sense if it appears on the next page or indeed in a different issue of the Lee Valley Outlook.

AIB Munster Club Intermediate Football Championship Cill na Martra (Cork) 1-17 Kilmihil (Clare) 0-7

It was a great day for Cill na Martra GAA and the entire Gaeltacht Mhuscraí parish when the recently crowned Cork County Premier Intermediate football champions played hosts to Clare champions Kilmihil in the guarter final of the AIB Munster Intermediate football championship at Páirc Ui Chuana, named for a man who kept the flag flying for the then fledging club in days far less glorious than those now being enjoyed. It was Cill na Martra's first ever Munster championship game and there was a huge crowd present, most of whom were supporting the home side, and the players did not disappoint their loyal and enthusiastic fans. Cill na Martra played extremely well, defending magnificently and constantly breaking forward at a pace the Clare men could not cope with. Up front the Cill na Martra attack, with Daniel Ó Duinnín in marvellous form, fired over score after to score to have this game put to bed from early in the second half. Kilmihil had been under serious pressure from the 21st minute when Sean Ó Fóirréidh cleared up field to Ciarán Ó Duinnín who linked with his brother Daniel and then took the return pass to shoot the only goal of the game and give the home side a 1-5 to 0-3 lead at that stage. Ten minutes into the second half with Cill na Martra now enjoying a 1-12 to 0-7 advantage, the Claremen lost their centre back to a red card and thereafter it was really only a case of how much the Cork men would win

Ground conditions at Cill na Martra were excellent and the day was fine if a little cold. Kilmihil scored first through Shane Downes after five minutes but there was an immediate reply from Daniel O'Duinnín to level and after another lively and very even period, Cill na Martra took the lead in the 12th minute, Damien Ó hUrdail shooting over after a pass from his team captain Gearóid Ó Goillidhe. Two points in rapid succession for the

winners followed, Daniel Ó Duinnín and Cris Ó Meachair finishing bouts of combined play, but in fairness to the West Clare men, they hit back with two excellent scores, both from Ciarán Downes. A free for off the ball holding on Mike Ó Deasúna yielded a point for Dan Ó Duinnín from a free in the 20th minute and a minute later came the only goal of the game and the writing was on the wall for Kilmihil, even at this early stage. They simply could not match the all round assured play of the home side and struggled to put scores on the board.

In the ten minutes before half time, Cill na Martra added four points to their tally, two from Dan Ó Duinnín and one each from Mike Ó Deasúna and Finén Ó Faoláin, to draw further in front of the Clare side who had two points from Ciarán Downes in reply and with the score a 1-9 to 0-5 at the break it looked likely that the home side would go on and take the laurels.

Two points within as many minutes of the resumption for the Clare side, David Lernihan and Martin O'Leary the scorers, gave brief hope of a revival but Daniel Ó Duinnín, with three super points on the trot, quickly killed off any such notions and with Cill na Martra leading by 1-12 to 0-7 the outcome was fairly predictable. It became certain in the 42nd minute when Kilmihil defender Dan Keating was red carded for an off the ball incident and thereafter the edge went out of the contest, though the home defence did not let up in concentration and kept the opposition scoreless for the final thirty minutes of the game.

'Dan Ó' and 'Damo' added points before the teams started to introduce substitutions with the outcome now accepted. Mike Ó Deasúna kicked two points, one from a long range free, and Shane Ó Duinnín, hero of the county final win, had the final score of the game in the 52nd minute as the teams played out time with the home supporters in buoyant form, pleased with the win and more than pleased with the performance.

This Mid Cork Ballincollig Credit Union Junior B Football championship final looked to be heading for a comfortable Ballinora win after the opening quarter they had dominated but then it took a rather dramatic turn and subsequently became an intriguing contest between a Ballinora team which played with 13 men for the final thirty minutes against an Inniscarra side with a full complement of players. Ballinora saw their lead of five points being whittled down point by point until only the minimum separated the sides with two minutes of normal time remaining. Inniscarra pressed forward in search of the equaliser but got caught on the break and Ballinora corner forward Andrew O'Sullivan went through to score his side's second goal and secure the title against the odds.

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








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IRISH ENERGY POLICY FAST BECOMING INCOHERENT AND INEFFECTIVE

- STATE BUYING GAS STORAGE SHIPS WHILE REFUSING PERMISSION FOR LNG TERMINAL IN

BALLYLONGFORD IS NEGLIGENT -

Ireland South MEP Billy Kelleher has said that Ireland's energy policy is fast becoming incoherent and woefully ineffective and that Minister Eamon Ryan needs to take his outdated, ideological glasses off or risk hurting Irish consumers even more.

Kelleher was commenting after it was announced that the Irish State would buy a ship for gas storage and moor it off the Irish coast.

"If it wasn't so damaging to our energy security, it would be laughable. Only recently did An Bord Pleanála rule against a private LNG terminal and gas storage facility in Ballylongford because the Government hadn't concluded its long awaited Energy Security Review and that there was a risk fracked gas could have been part of the mix.


"Now we have the State spending taxpayers' money, : people and businesses who are already paying through the roof for domestic and commercial gas and electricity, on something the private sector could have developed.

"Ireland needs gas storage capacity, and in my opinion, and in the opinion of countless energy security experts, we need the ability to import LNG into our country to allow us to diversify our supplies. Why the State, and in particular Minister Ryan, feels it should be the one to do it, rather than allow private industry to do it is simply mind boggling.

"Does the Minister really believe that when Ireland buys its gas on the private markets, it won't contain fracked gas? Both fracked and non-fracked gases are pumped into the injecting lines all over the world. There aren't separate networks in operation. It's just wishful thinking at this stage from the Minister.

"An issue as crucial as energy security and eneray supply cannot be jeopardised in such a way. As I have called for before,

Ireland needs an independent energy Czar to take ownership of our energy security. It's too important an issue for our country and our citizens," concluded Kelleher.


