anta's Grotto still takes place on the 9th, 10th, 16th and 17th of December from 11am – 5pm and bookings can be made by contacting 087-1434770. With over 250 kids booked in they will surely be kept very busy. Dec.3rd from 3-5pm it was dedicated to Walk-Ins only. For Santas big arrival some of our volunteers dressed for the big occasion wearing their best Christmas Jumpers and posed for photos with the special quests.

December is a great month to keep the colour going in the garden, that will last all winter with cold hardy plants. Plant pansies, violas, heucheras and Primroses. They will grow just as well in pots or hanging baskets as in beds in your garden. The Christmas Rose, Helleborus Nigger, is one of the few perennials that flowers in white and purple colours this time of the year. They also provide a food source for any active pollinators. They do very well in pots, as well as in beds. They like heavier wet soil, in partial shade and sheltered from the wind. Best to plant bare rooted fruit trees this month, Apples and Pears been an example, in a large pot, for fruit next autumn. Plant two different varieties of both to ensure they pollinate. If planting in a pot, go for a dwarf varietv.

The Men's Shed would welcome any new members that might light to join their activities. If you are interested in meeting up on a regular

basis for a chat and have a look at what they do why not come along and see. They are open Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday from 2-4pm at their base in Masseytown Road. So why not call in and see for yourself.

The tidy Towns volunteers have been busy over the last few weeks preparing for Christmas, with Santas Grotto, erecting Christmas lights all over town, as well as Christmas Tree and the Crib in the square. Regular work continues such as litter picking and general maintenance around town. Flower beds have been cleared, soil enriched with leaf compost which was made in our biodiversity garden. Donations from the Crib are going to the Senior Citizens so why not donate a few euro if you are able to, to another brilliant local cause.

# A MACROOM TIDY TOWNS PROJECT - Garden Composting, and making leaf mulch -

Firstly, composting is a process that involves many different organisms and, like all life forms, these need (1) air and (2) water if they are to survive and thrive. This could mean having to aerate the material or add water, so choose a shady spot to begin with and cover the material with something like an old carpet which helps prevent getting too wet or too dry.

A mix of 'greens' and 'browns' produces a balanced nutritional compost, with the organisms thriving on the nitrogen-rich green and high-carbon browns. Separately these will not compost as well, since the fresh grass clippings particularly in larger quantities can turn gooey and starve the organisms of oxygen, while leaves on their own may be slow to breakdown so a mix is good.

Variety is the spice of life! This can be items like vegetable or fruit waste, weeds, plants, cut flowers, lighter hedge trimmings, pine needles, sawdust, bark, or cardboard if torn up into smaller pieces.

Next thing to be aware of is the particle size, which should be as small as possible which gives a larger surface area for the process to work better. When leaves are collected off the lawn using a mower this is ideal for composting as they are well broken

up and might also be mixed with some grass. Making Leaf Compost. So many of us love our trees and then have a problem when the leaves of deciduous trees fall in large quantities. This can be turned into a positive very easily resulting in the finest of mulch being made in the garden, free of charge.

Macroom Tidy Towns have been composting

leafs for the last few years, gathering them in our cleanups around the town and then needing a place to deposit them, so we made our own composting area in our biodiversity garden from used pallets. The council also deposit some of the leave that sweep up in the streetscape around Macroom town.

This has 3 sections, one for each years crop of leaves, and the material is shifted from Bay 1 to Bay 2 and out to Bay 3 to be bagged and have ready for use after two or three years. As the leaves breakdown, oxygen is used up and if there is not enough air, the process slows down so the compost should be turned or fluffed up to aerate it. A simple hand held tool, like a screw auger was purchased and is ideal for this purpose.

This leaf mulch has proved to be a valuable resource for Tidy Towns in recent weeks, enriching existing beds throughout the town.

Leaf Composting is a simple process and something that very many home gardeners can do themselves and take pride and pleasure in managing their leaves and producing a useful end product. IT takes a little time and management.





Now the thoughts would turn to winning another county championship. Lisgoold and Castlemagner were summarily dismissed on the path to the final where Mayfield would provide the opposition. In a magnificent display of attacking football Canovee overpowered Mayfield by 4-14 to 1-11.

In a rural club like Canovee the winning of a county takes on many guises. For the players themselves it

is the achievement of the ultimate goal. What they don't realise at the time is that their names will be revered in the annals of Canovee and the '23 team will be spoken of as long as football is played in Canovee.

For the surviving members of the county winning teams of '68,'73 and 2007, and all the many others who played in the intervening years without success, there is a massive sense of pride. A pride that the black and amber jersey they were so proud to wear is now worn by a wonderful group of young men with that same sense of pride.

For the many underage players in the club, they now have a set of role models that they can aspire to emulating and one day hope they too will will march over the bridge in Carrig with a county themselves.

Finally, for the local community a county final win has rekindled that togetherness, neighbourliness and sense of place. It provides sustenance to everyone.

An unusual condition is that the school must provide funding for 3 pedestrian crossings to the tune of over €250,0000 so that pupils can safely access the school, however with construction for the school not due to start until at least 2026 this means that Coachford village will be without pedestrian crossings until at least then and the people of the village and those visiting it will continue to risk being knocked down, injured or even killed as they try and cross this busy village.

When the move is complete the village can also look forward to the promised revamped Credit Union building which the GPs shared and Macroom Credit Union are anxious to develop once they are the sole occupants.

# Kilmurry Active Retirement

#### On Death and Dying

About a half dozen members from our association and many more from our neighbouring associations attended the excellent talk given by Frank Purcell, partner at Michael Purcell &Son LLP Solicitors, on the new Assisted Decision Making Act and on the Fair Deal Scheme, in the Castle hotel. This was organised by AIB, and James Stanton, Manager with AIB Vulnerable Customer Support, outlined the extensive range of supports available from the bank. Macroom branch manager, Alberto Martin, summed things up well, if you want help with financial arrangements, just ask them. Our banks have been justifiably criticised for past failures, but it is important to acknowledge too when they take initiatives such as this that provides a most important and valuable service to the community. Well done AIB.

I won't try to summarise the content as it was extensive, and the advice needed is particular to each person's circumstances. One of the issues mentioned was the Advance Healthcare Directive (AHD). An AHD is a written statement about the type of medical or surgical treatment you want or do not want, if in the future, you are unable to make these decisions. An AHD is only used if you lose capacity, and you can no longer communicate your wishes yourself. The conversation on it prompted a memory that I still struggle with from time to time. A few years after I had retired from paid employment, I decided to study philosophy. One of the optional modules I chose was the philosophy of death and dying. It was a course run jointly by UCC philosophy and medical departments. The module was full-time and confined to one week as designed to suit the medical course students undertaking further training, mostly senior palliative care nurses on release from their duties for further studies. On the Monday morning about six of us attended and about twice that from the medical course. They couldn't cope with our pace. They wanted to get answers and fast from our philosophers on practical matters that they were dealing with and would be again the following Monday. We on the other hand were used to the leisurely pace which we had been accustomed to, and which we conveniently understood was a necessary precondition for indepth consideration. As the week went on, and their stress reduced, that which we were learning from the various lecturers was greatly enhanced by our chats with these nurses during the break periods. One conversation stays with me. I asked one nurse 26 Outlook 5 07.12.23

how many patients she had nursed through their deaths. As it was over fifteen hundred, I asked had she noticed patterns, and that which influenced easier and more difficult passings. She had. I also enquired about her concerns about how we handle the death process in this country. What I took away from our conversation was just how reluctant our culture is to address issues surrounding death. It is still such a taboo subject. Conversations are quickly closed. How morbid, let's talk about something else. Death is not an issue we like to talk about, but I think it is important that we begin to do so. There has never been such an increase in longevity as has occurred over the past twenty years. We are aware of this great news and rejoice in it. But what is less well known is that there has been a significant increase too in the death span. The function of our hospitals is to extend lives and our doctors are obligated to do so. Previous generations may have had a typical death lasting a few days while now it may be weeks. Is this what we want? Perhaps it is, but perhaps it is not. As things stand, at some stage of the death process, many will lose capacity and the decision will be made for us by default to use modern methods to extend life. That's fair enough you may say. Everyone had the opportunity to opt out of the default and could have chosen to do so by putting in place an Advance Healthcare Directive. But in a society that treats death as taboo, and many do not address their end-of-life financial affairs, and are not well informed, can it be fair enough? Is it not time that our society should do more, and at least have a conversation about it.

I have often considered setting in place what was called a living will, now called the advance healthcare directive. I have not done so. This is because I am conflicted. I do consider that I have more of a right than anyone else (including doctors) to decide for a future Aidan that has lost capacity to decide. However, just because I may have a legal right does not mean it is right to do so. Every such decision affects my future self, a person whose then interests I don't feel competent yet to determine, and it also affects others, and our society. A matter of substance that affects everyone, others, and society would normally elicit at least some public debate. I could do with the elaboration and clarification that public debate provides. Perhaps politicians and editors have read the public mood correctly. Constituents, viewers, and readers are unconcerned. It is no surprise to me to learn that the Assisted Decision Making Act was on the instigation of the United Nations in pursuance of the rights of those with a disability. Most of us had never heard of it, as most have not heard of an Advance Healthcare Directive. We sanitize realities. Rather a Death and Dying Directive could have at least given us a hint. Death issues need not be such a lonely affair. We can do better.

#### **Christmas celebration**

Fifty of us had a great night on Sunday 26th November at the Lee Valley Golf and Country club. We are very grateful to Sgt. Kelleher for facilitating us again this year with the Garda community bus. The jury is out, was it just as good as last year, or was it even better, that is the question. Many thanks to Lee Valley for looking after us so well in every way. And where could we get entertainment such as our own members provided? Certainly, a night that will be remembered.

#### **Upcoming Activities**

We are coming to the end for this term's ongoing activities, such as the ceramic art and Zumba. On December 8th Margaret Bolster is providing a Christmas themed cookery demonstration in Lower room Crookstown hall. On the 13th in Kilmurry 2pm, Rose McCarthy will be doing her session on Tai Chi, Yoga, and meditation, though calming as all that may be, I wouldn't be surprised if some festive cheer breaks out at some point.

We are then taking a break for family time over the Christmas, and we won't be organising activities in January, as some don't trust the weather, while others do and are escaping it to warmer climes. We will be starting back in February and will be having our AGM then and new members are always welcome.

Our association is open to all, and our membership fee is just  $\in$ 20/calendar year or  $\in$ 30 for a couple. Our philosophy is that age makes no difference, but health does. We try to do what we can to keep healthy and challenged in body and in mind, and together that is easier. You will be kept as busy as you choose to be and positively engaged in your community, and we think you will enjoy it. There are several active retirement associations in the Lee valley. 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

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# The Macroom and District Environmental Group Think Globally, Act locally HOME MADE CHRISTMAS

Hi, Chris Barrett here as we look at what really matters at Christmas. Today I am sharing with you a conversation I had with Chrissie Dervin. Chrissie, works in the Cork College of F.E.T., Sullane Centre, Macroom. (That is the centre which is directly across from Ouinlans in New Street). For over a decade Chrissie has facilitated local Art and Craft classes. These have grown from Painting, Drawing and Craft classes, and now also include Mozaics, Print-making, Candle Making, Ceramics, GlassPainting, Textiles, Weaving and Seasonal Crafts. All classes and materials are free, and she tailors them to meet the ranges of ability and preference of the people she encounters. Chrissie offers Christmas Craft classes, all of which are very popular and it is these Christmas classes that I feel will be of most interest to readers of the Lee Valley Outlook, at this time of year. I was particularly interested to hear of ideas which are easy on the environment and which readers can be inspired to try at home. One of the Christmas decorations which Chrissie is currently making with her groups involves the use of something we are all likely to have around the home, glass bottles of any kind, or wine bottles which have a more sophisticated shape. Using Empty Wine Bottles. These need to be cleaned first, and then painted with white acrylic paint. While the paint is drying, Chrissie presents her group with an array of Christmas-themed paper napkins. The next task is to choose the most inspiring images, cut them out and peel off the back layers of paper, leaving only the very thin top pieces of decorated paper, (1 ply). PVA is painted on the bottle and the fragile images need to be very carefully placed around the sides. The images are slightly translucent and can be layered to overlap, and thus can make a wonderful collage. Finally, the whole covered bottle needs to be delicately coated with PVA which acts as a protective varnish. Once dry, the final result gives a very painterly effect, and the bottles make beautiful table decorations in themselves, or can be used for candles or dried flowers. At other times of the year, these bottles can be covered with images which reflect the Seasons, or can be made using Communion napkins, or maybe include numbers for special birthdays. In this way they can become a more personal permanent keepsake than say balloons, and involve the use of materials which can often be found around the home. It seems to me that this is a wonderfully inexpensive and worthwhile project to do with your children as the results are really effective, and each bottle becomes a one-off piece. Making wreaths out of used material. What better way to use once loved materials? Fabrics from around the Home can be used. These delightful Christmas wreaths can be made using worn-out material from curtains, sheets, shirts, dresses etc. Chrissie says that you could particularly look out for materials which do not fray unduly, and which are transparent, as they often work best for this project. Initially, the materials should be cut roughly into 50cm by 5cm strips. A purpose made wreath-ring





can be used, but a wire coat hanger pulled carefully into a circle or even the metal rings from broken/ worn-out lamp-shades can be used. The pieces can then be knotted or tied into bows, working around the hoop in this way, paying attention to choosing Christmas colours if possible, and mixing the colours and textures of the fabrics. The whole effect can be further enhanced by the re-use of short pieces of broken tinsel, or lightweight Christmas decorations. To create a more robust wreath, the fabric can then be snipped all round. Using items found on your walk in the woods or on the beach. Using collected pine cones. These can be wrapped in wool to complement your decor. They can be left natural or just the tips painted in Christmas colours, or tiny beads glued to their ends with PVA. These could be attached to driftwood or interesting branches brought back from your walks, and decorated with Christmas ribbon to be used as a table centrepiece. You can also enhance your runner or Christmas table-cloth in this way. Using old Christmas Cards. Assuming that only the backs of last year's cards have been used for shopping lists, you may have some lovely Christmas pictures left which can be used to make special tags for presents. The base could be made from something like a cereal box, cut into a Christmas shape like a star, and covered on the front with the cutout Christmas card, and backed with brown or plain paper which will provide space for a message to be written. If you have a hole punch it could make a hole through which could be threaded wool, ribbon or brown string. But a hole can be pushed through with a nail or careful use of a knife, (making a tiny cross shape) and it is possible for any narrow fabric to be used to attach the gift-tag to the gift. You can even make use of destroyed felt bags or woollen jackets. You don't have to use locally bought small squares

of felt. Once you have recovered from the shock of moths destroying your favourite felted woollen items, you may feel happier if you can reuse parts of these items by stitching them together with simple stitches joining two simple shapes e.g circles, birds or leaves to create Christmas-tree decorations. They can even be free-standing if you give them a base. They could even be stuffed with that small person's odd sock, (you may have given up looking for its partner and now find it is too small for its owner). Your children can get involved in making finger or glove puppets to accompany a favourite story, and maybe even be inspired to make up their own. The possibilities are endless and I feel that I have just touched the tip of the iceberg of Chrissie's skills and knowledge and I am very happy to hear that she will facilitate a diverse amount of classes at the F.E.T. centmre starting in the New Year, which will include Ceramics for beginners. Recycling remains an important part of her ethos, and as she looks forward to next September, she is talking of making patchwork quilts. Chrissie reminds me how touching it is to be handed a hand-made gift at Christmas. The person who will receive the gift is constantly in the mind of the person who is doing the creating. When you make a special card for someone, or you create something which takes you out of your comfort zone, you are epitomising the real truth of giving at Christmas. You can give no better gift than share your time and skill this Christmas. That is what Chrissie has done and I am truly grateful to her. ### MEP KELLEHER WELCOMES PROVISIONAL POLITICAL AGREEMENT ON INDUSTRIAL EMISSIONS DIRECTION AT EU LEVEL - NON-INCLUSION OF CATTLE IS AN IMPORTANT CONCESSION -

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that the conclusion of the Industrial Emissions Directive negotiations is a welcome development and will reduce air, water and soil pollution leading to a healthier environment for European (Irish?) citizens. Kelleher was speaking following the announcement of a provisional political agreement between the European Parliament and the European Council.

"There's no two ways about it. This has been a difficult file for both the Council and the Parliament negotiators. Both sides needed to make concessions to ensure that a deal could be agreed.

"For Ireland, one of the most important outcomes from this agreement is the non-inclusion of cattle under the scope of the Directive. This issue, along with the issue of a reciprocity clause, will be reviewed by the European Commission by December 2026. "This is something that will be welcomed by dairy farmers in Ireland. It would have placed them under a lot of pressure financially and administratively.

"However, the non-inclusion of cattle does not mean we should rest on our laurels. All of us need to redouble our efforts to reduce all forms of emissions from our farms - it is the right thing to do in general, and we shouldn't be waiting for EU legislation to do that.

"On the area of pigs and poultry, new lower thresholds have been agreed which will bring more farms under the scope. For pigs, exemptions will be given to organic producers and farms operating under extensive farming production methods. This will be challenging. Support must be put in place to enable the transition and to allow them meet their obligations.

"All of our economic activities generate emissions of one form or another. I believe the right balance has been struck between putting downward pressure on emissions while

also recognising that we cannot overburden the owners of businesses and farms. This is a balanced text, and I will support it when it comes before the Parliament next year," concluded Kelleher.

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History

### PROF. TOM DUNNE'S TALK, 13 NOVEMBER, 2023 ON PROF JOHN A MURPHY

#### Despite inclement weather caused by storm Debi, Professor Tom Dunne, together with Dr Claire O'Halloran, travelled from Greystones for the talk.

Prof. Tom spoke brilliantly on 'Professor John A. Murphy, The Public Man'. The presentation was very well received by a crowd of about forty. It was a pleasure to see and hear an expert at work.

Professor Tom hails from Wexford, the son of a farmer and his mother had a shop. For a while he taught as a Christian Brother in Dublin – his superior disapproved of him not using corporal punishment and Tom left the order. Having obtaining a B.A in UCD, he did his Ph. D. in Cambridge. Subsequently, he became a lecturer and then professor in UCC where he developed a deep friendship with and appreciation of Professor John A. One of Tom's books won the Ewart-Biggs Prize.

Tracing John A.'s life, Tom referenced 'The Piano in Macroom', a John A. essay on family life and growing-up in Macroom in the 1930s/40s. Singing was important in the household and singing out of tune was totally unacceptable. John A. had won a scarce Cork County Council scholarship to UCC in 1945 and graduated with fist-class honours in Latin and History; he particularly impressed History Prof. James Hogan, John A.'s later mentor. Having procured his first job, John A. taught happily in Farranferris/Farna for ten years, and reported that some priests were quite radical (privately) in their views. Hogan persuaded him to do a History Masters after which John A. became a UCC lecturer that began a sixty-two year connection with the College. In Farna he learned to teach, and as events unfolded his republican and other opinions and stances evolved. The Troubles in the North saw Murphy expressing his views publicly and forthrightly, condemning the violence perpetrated in the name of Ireland. His fame and influence spread when he wrote a weekly column in the Irish Independent for over twenty years – demonstrating his clarity of thought and his ability to communicate his ideas. Consequently his life became difficult as he received death threats, bullets in the post and hate-mail. All the while he continued to attend Munster hurling finals.

Another issue on which Murphy developed his stance was the 'Humanae Vitae' Catholic papal encyclical (1968) that pronounced against the use of contraceptives within marriage. Fr James Good taught Medical Ethics in UCC and opposed the cyclical but was subsequently removed from his teaching post and transferred to Kenya, at the behest of Cork's Bishop Lucey. The idea of episcopal interference in UCC or any university appalled Murphy and disillusioned him with the Catholic Church, and was another step on his path to humanism.

Professor Dunne recalled that Murphy always asserted that the first duty of a university teacher was to teach but academics also needed to leave the 'ivory tours' and reach out into the community – 'gown and town'. Murphy's subject, events and his personal qualities of wit and his skills in debating, singing and communicating enabled him to perform this role effectively and brilliantly. His period as a senator gave him a stage on which he garnered many headlines. So effective was Murphy in slowly changing minds that Prof Dunne described him as 'a player' in the history of the period and predicts that his contribution will merit scrutiny and study.

John A.'s final academic work, when he was nearly ninety, was a chapter he wrote on the

1916 Proclamation as part of the very prestigious 'Atlas of the Irish Revolution'. As well as this final contribution to scholarship, Murphy received many other accolades in his lifestyles. He has a statue, cast by his friend, sculptor Seamas Murphy, in UCC. He also engaged with Queen Elizabeth when she visited UCC – he was 'given' three minutes but she stayed for eleven. Perhaps the honour he appreciated most was being granted the Freedom of Macroom in 2006, when he spoke elegantly and sang well. (A Dan Joe Kelleher Youtube clip of the occasion is available).

Above is but a sample of Prof. Dunne's presentation which was delivered with affection, clarity and insight. The audience, which included many of John A's relatives, appreciated the insightful, perceptive and thought-provoking talk.

Seosamh Ó Críodain hosted the evening very well and thankfully, all passed without mishap. He thanked Cope for help with publicity and the hotel for providing a lovely venue. The lecture is recorded and will soon be available on Macroom History Group's website. James O'Callaghan's posters embellished the occasion.

Macroom History Group was delighted with Prof. Dunne's presentation and many enjoyed a welcome 'cuppa' at evening's end.



## Citizens Information C

### Your Rights when you Buy in a Shop

The Consumer Rights Act 2022 introduced new rights when you buy in a shop. They only apply if you bought something in a shop on or after 29 November 2022. You have slightly different rights if you bought on or before 28 November 2022 or bought something online

Before you buy, you have a legal right to the following information:

- The seller's business name, address and phone number
- Product details (if not already clear)
- Total price, or how it will be calculated
- Length of the contract
- Any extra charges, for example, delivery or postal charge
- Your right to cancel, where it applies

The information must be clear, understandable and given to you before you buy. Sellers must not make false claims that would influence your buying decisions. A seller who makes a false or misleading claim about a product is committing an offence and can be prosecuted.

#### What you can expect from your product

When you buy a product, you make a contract with the seller. The seller must always provide products in line with the contract. Under consumer law all products you buy must meet certain conditions. The product must: • Be fit for any purpose you brought to the seller's attention

- Be fit for all purposes which it is normally used for
- Have the qualities and features of similar type products
- Fit the description, type, quantity and quality agreed in the sales contract
- Be durable and of expected quality for normal use
- Meet the quality of any sample or model you were shown
- Match any advertisement or labelling
- Have the necessary functionality, compatibility, interoperability and other agreed features
- Come with all accessories mentioned in the sales contract and with the correct instructions
- Have the spare parts covered in the contract
- Be installed correctly by the seller (if applicable)

Have information on digital updates that support the product, if applicable. You can get updates once or continuously

You have the same rights when you buy at full price, reduced price (for example, in a sale) or buy a secondhand good (if bought from a business).

#### What happens if things go wrong?

Under current consumer law you are entitled to certain remedies when something you buy does not meet the conditions outlined earlier. A remedy can be a:

- Repair
- Replacement
- Refund
- Price reduction
- Short term right to cancel
- What are my rights if I change my mind and want to return something I don't want?

You do not have an automatic right to a refund when returning something you bought in a shop because you have changed your mind. If there is nothing wrong with the item (for example, there is no fault) you have no legal right to return the goods. Whether or not you can get your money back depends on the seller's returns policy.

However, many sellers voluntarily allow customers to return or replace goods during a certain time period. The seller may offer a refund, exchange or credit note as a goodwill gesture. Check what the seller's returns policy is before you buy.

- If the seller accepts returns, you usually must:
  - Make sure the items are in good condition
  - Keep the original labels and tags attached
  - Have proof of purchase (for example, a receipt)

What are the steps to make a consumer complaint? You have rights if the seller does not meet their obligations to you. If things go wrong you should bring the product back to the seller with original packaging (if possible) and proof of purchase such as receipt, bank or credit card statement, or invoice. You should explain what the problem is and how you want it corrected. If needed, follow up with a written formal complaint

You should always approach the seller first, to give them the chance to put things right. Always keep notes of what happened, including dates and times of conversations, the name of the person you spoke to, and what was agreed. Keep previous correspondence (for example, email, web chat, and online contact form) safe as you may need this if you want to take your complaint further. Try to sort the problem with the seller as quickly as possible. A delay could affect the outcome you get (for example you might only be entitled to a repair instead of a refund)

If the issue is still not resolved, you should put your complaint in writing (letter or email) stating all the facts of the case so far. You should include copies of any relevant documents that support your complaint.

Keep a copy of the complaint letter or email as you will need this if you decide to take your complaint further. It is a good idea to send the letter by registered post or attach a read receipt to your email. This means you have proof that you sent the complaint and it was received by the seller.


#### What is the small claims procedure?

The small claims procedure (also known as the Small Claims Court) is a service which provides an inexpensive way for consumers and businesses to resolve disputes without employing a solicitor. The service is provided by the local District Court offices. To use the service, the claim cannot exceed €2,000.

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### Hints Tips and Ideas for submitting photos for Publication (Part 2)

#### Sending in Images by email

If you are just sending one image, just send it, and the Caption all in one email. If you are sending more than one image, it may be best to rename each image i.e. 1, 2, 3 etc and use this numbering in your captions i.e.

Image No 1 Joe Blogs and his cat..... Image No 2 Mary Blogs and her dog etc

Every Image you take with a Mobile Phone or a Camera has its own number.

However, Phones and Cameras use a different numbering system.

If you are using a Photo from a Digital Camera, you can use the existing number as it is usually short with probably 3 letters followed 4 digits, or you could rename the image with a different number, right click the mouse over the existing name/ number and from the menu that appears click on 'rename' and then type in the name/number that you want.

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If you don't feel comfortable changing the Image names, by all means send them in as they are, but only send one image and its caption per Email

**How to send** The best way to send images is as email attachments in the same format as they came off your camera or phone. Lastly images inserted in MS Word documents are very difficult and time consuming to convert, so send the images separately.

Lastly, your images are always welcome in whatever form they are in but do try to have them in early, at least by the end of the week prior to publication. The earlier they come in the better chance they have of being published.

#### To recap:

• When taking photos indoors, turning on the flash or the room lights, will usually result in a better image

Always try to hold the camera steady, particularly mobile phones

• When you have the photo ready to send, think about a caption? A caption gives you a golden opportunity to promote your club, School or Organisation.

• Always make sure that you have the name of your Club, School or organisation included in the caption

• If you are just sending one image, just send it, with the Caption all in one email

 If you are sending more than one image, consider renaming them, and include the new name in the caption

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


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
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
Welcome back dear student. Here is a verse from one of my favourite songs.... 'When my heart is racing deep inside my chest, when I'm underneath the weight of anxiousness. When fear is raging, and I can't catch my breath; I will remember - You are Faithful still. You have carried me through deeper waters - walked beside me through the fire. Faithful still! You have closed the mouth of bigger lions, conquered even greater giants, gone before me and You always will. You are Faithful still...' These beautiful lyrics are from the worship song 'Faithful Still' by Kings Porch. You can find it on YouTube. The line 'when fear is raging, and I can't catch my breath' resonates with many of us I'm sure. In fearful situations people often gasp for breath. It's a reaction to stress and fear. When things calm down people exhale deeply – a signal that the pressure is easing or over, and the body starts to relax again.

I see many signs around saying, 'Staff Wanted – Immediate Start'. For many reasons it's hard to find staff. 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

#### AIB Club Championships

#### Munster Intermediate Football semi final Cill na Martra 0 – 13 Milltown-Castlemaine, Kerry 0 – 10

Cill na Martra, Cork C ounty Premier Intermediate champions are now into the final of the AIB Munster club intermediate football championship and are there on merit after this memorable win over Kerry champions Milltown-Castlemaine in the provincial semi final at a throbbing Cill na Martra. There was strong vocal support for both sides in the huge attendance (2000 plus) and the teams responded by providing a thoroughly enjoyable encounter, the players giving total commitment and displaying massive courage. Both sides finished with 13 men aside after a hectic closing guarter in which referee Derek O'Mahoney was busy flashing cards of all three colours, black, yellow and red, but it was not a dirty game by any stretch of the imagination, rather full blooded, and there was never any doubt but that both sides wanted to win this one. For Cill na Martra coach Kerryman John Evans, and his management team of Donal Ó Buachalla and Gearóid Ó hÉaluithe, it was a glorious victory, possibly unexpected because of the different ways teams are graded in the two neighbouring counties, but fully deserved after a display that had the local supporters still cheering loudly long after the final whistle had sounded.

The opening minutes saw Cill na Martra on the offensive but without reward as the quick tackling Milltown defence frustrated their every effort. The Kerry champions opened the scoring with a Brendan Casey point in the 7th minute and the first yellow card followed for a Milltown defender before they doubled their advantage with a point from an Éanna O'Connor free in the 10th minute. Cill na Martra still found it difficult to penetrate the Milltown defence, with over elaboration at times, but at last centre back Sean Ó Foirréidh showed the way with a point, after coming forward out of defence in the 12th minute and his brother Cianie then added another immediately to level the scoring at 0-2 each. Cill na Martra took the lead in the 20th minute when Damian Ó hUrdail pointed a difficult enough free from the right wing but Éanna O'Connor, son of the Kerry manager Jack O'Connor, equalised from a free kick on the 45m line. Seánie Ó Foirréidh kicked a massive point to

put the home side back in front in the 24th minute and another defender Tadgh Ó Corcora made it 0-5 to 0-3 with an equally impressive score in less than a minute. Cathal Moriarty got a point back for the visitors but Damian Ó hUrdail punched over in the 28th minute and the home side led by 0-6 to 0-4 at the break and were not flattered by their lead.

A reaction was expected from the Kerry men after a blistering halftime dressing down and it came in an explosion of scoring which yielded four points in as many minutes on the resumoption. Gavin Horan took a point within 30 seconds of the resumption, O'Connor pointed a free to level matters, Cillian Burke took a lead point and Cathal Moriarty put the Milltown men two points clear, 0-8 to 0-6, and the Cill na Martra supporters were reeling from the sudden change in fortunes. To its credit, the home defence held in and in the next Milltown attack forced a turnover, with the ball sent forward to the very effective half time substitute Mike Ó Deasúna and the burly full forward kicked a super point to rally the home support once again. Danny O'Conaill levelled matters in the 36th minute with a shot that could have yielded a goal and in the 41st minute Cill na Martra went back in front when Mike Ó Deasúna pointed a '45'. Again Milltown equalised, Cathal Moriarty the scorer after a jinking run, but Cill na Martra were on fire now driven on by the huge home crowd on the bank and Maidhchí Ó Duinnín took a super point from play on 47. A minute later Damian Ó hUrdail pointed a free, brought nearer the goal for dissent, and then got black carded but a Milltown defender followed within a minute, both for impeding opponents. The atmosphere was electric now and when Milltown got a point from Conor Spillane in the 56th minute the tension was unbearable. Maidhchí Ó Duinnín with his second point opened up a two point lead on 58 but the winners lost their captain Gearóid Ó Goillidhe to a red card as the referee was working overtime to keep the lid on proceedings. In the 61st minute Maidhchí Ó Duinnín took a pass from Mike Ó Deasúna and fired over his third point and the home side were not going to concede a goal now and saw out the remaining time with lead intact as each side lost a man to a red card, Tadgh Ó Corcora after a second yellow and Milltown's Kieran O'Carroll for a straight red.

#### AIB Club Championship Munster Junior Football Semi Final Kilmurry 4 – 16 Feenagh-Kilmeedy 0 – 2

Cork standard bearers Kilmurry will meet Listowel of Kerry in the AlB Club Munster Junior Football championship final on December 9th after both clubs enjoyed facile wins in their respective semi finals. Kilmurry were 'at home' to the Limerick champions at Cloughduv and had big support but alas there was much satisfaction but little excitement for the home crowd as their favourites simply tore the opposition asunder, thus ending any prospect of the Feenagh-Kilmeedy club doing a Munster double before their hurlers met St Catherine's in the hurling final.

Conditions at Cloughduv were excellent at the end of a week of fine weather. Kilmurry dominated from the start but in the early phase wasted some good scoring chances, thus ruining fine approach work. Kyle Kelleher and James O'Mullane were already prominent at midfield backed by fleet footed defenders in Brian Hinchion, Gearóid O'Mahony and Tomás Collins, and up front Liam Wall led the line with dash, Seán Warren and Lawrence Aisling very active also. Liam Wall put the first point on the board after four minutes and doubled his side's advantage in the 8th minute and already the signs were ominous for the Limerick side as the game was being played in their half of the field and Kilmurry were very sharp and well focussed. Seán Warren set up Rory Duggan for a point in the 11th minute, corner back Brian Hinchion made it 0-4 to nil two minutes later and Warren immediately added another.

Two further points from Seán Warren followed before Ryan Leahy had a superb point in the 23rd minute and at last the Limerick men got a score on the board when Colm Ryan took a good point from 30metres out in the 25th minute. A minute later Seán Warren had his fourth point from play and Kilmurry led by 0-9 to 0-1 at half time and were clearly the much better side, the only blot on the performance being their tally of six wides, some from good opportunities.

Kilmurry introduced Seán Curzon and Pádraig Berhanu for the second half and the latter signalled his arrival into the fray with a point within a minute of the resumption. A superb raid involving five players ended with Liam Wall blasting home the first goal of the game in the 34th minute and with the outcome of the contest well decided the only matter of interest now was the margin of victory. Kilmurry defender Gearóid O'Mahony was rather unluckily issued with a black card but the team suffered no ill effects other than conceding a point from the resultant Colm Ryan free, the only score for Feenagh /Kilmeedy in the second half.

Given the sustained Kilmurry pressure and the clear difference in class between the teams, further punishment was inevitable and in the 46th minute Pádraig Berhanu cut through the Feenagh/Kilmeedy defence before delivering a perfectly time pass to Liam Wall who had merely to palm the ball home, 2-10 to 0-2 now the score. Only a marvellous save by Feenagh/Kilmeedy goalkeeper Dan Gayer denied



Berhanu of a goal in the 49th minute, the Kilmurry man having to be satisfied with a point after grabbing the rebound. Brian Hinchion helped himself to his second point, only desperate defending on the goal line denied Kilmurry of a third goal but it followed in the 55th minute, young Joe O'Mullane setting up Berhanu with a glorious chance which was clinically availed of.

Kilmurry, with five replacements now on the pitch, maintained the relentless pressure, O'Mullane again gave the assist for another Berhanu goal, Lawrence Aisling kicked a brace and long serving Greg Barrett and debutant Joe O'Mullane close the scoring with a point apiece.

There were many outstanding performances on the Kilmurry side and Liam Wall stood out from the start with his outstanding work rate, selfless distribution and lethal finish.

The winning margin of 26 points illustrates the difference in standards in the respective counties and Listowel Emmets inflicted a 5-17 to 2-2 defeat on Clare champions Killimer in the other semi final.

What's next?: Kilmurry, defeated by the Clifford brothers-led Fossa in last year's Munster decider now meet new Kerry champions Listowel Emmets in the final and given the different method of grading teams in the Kingdom will face a daunting challenge but should relish the opportunity of getting their hands on some silverware before Christmas!

#### County Junior A Football Championship Final: Canovee 4-14 Mayfield 1-11

Canovee footballers finished the year unbeaten in league or championship with another big win in the Cork CountyJunior A final when under the lights in Páirc Uí Rinn the outcome was never looked in doubt, the Muskerry men much superior to city champions Mayfield.

Hat-trick hero Darragh McMahon stole the show, as Canovee took the county title for the first time since 2007 and they will be among the favourites to add the Premier Junior title next season, neighbours Kilmurry being another team with similar ambition.

Canovee have had a painful climb back to prominence in Muskerry with very strong teams in Iveleary and Kilmurry to contend for the past decade but they now have a young developing team assembled and have had a wonderful season by any measurement.

They won the Mid Cork title after a stiff challenge from Inniscarra, learning a few useful lessons, and have steamrolled their way through the county championship.

Their dominant start here gave them a 1-4 to 0-1 after 10 minutes. The goal came from Darragh McMahon when he was set up by Conor O'Neill after a well worked team effort and he finished in style. Mayfield did get two back to bring Canovee's lead down to four, and after their goalkeeper made a superb double save Canovee took charge once again, as Conor Dodd pointed a superb effort from the 45. McMahon added their second goal in the 19th minute with an assist from Brian McNabola, the ball taking a deflection from a Mayfield defender. Mayfield responded with a fourth point, but they looked second best and already the outcome seemed assured with Canovee seven ahead. They outscored the city men four to two and went in at half time leading 2-8 to 0-5.

Early in the second half, James Moynihan set up McMahon, but the latter was brought down for a penalty and James Moynihan smashed the spot kick into the bottom corner, giving the new champions a 13-point lead after 33 minutes.

Mayfield responded with a brilliantly worked goal and added a point to give the city outfit a sliver of hope. They added a couple of more scores to reduce the gap to nine points, but McMahon's third green flag was the final nail in the coffin, with Canovee ahead by 12 with a quarter still to go, and they finished strongly.

It is being hosted this year by Cumann Achadh Bolg (Aghabul logue) home of our dual county Intermediate A Hurling & Football champions 2023 and we hope each club will have representation and takes an active part in proceedings.

It is my privilege to present my third report on the activities of Roinn Mhúscraí for the present year. We commenced the year in early January to confirm entries and formats for the league and championships in 2023. The leagues' structures and gradings were advised to all club delegates present and commencement dates would be submitted to al I clubs in the coming weeks. Delegates were disappointed that the U21 football championship could not be part of the commencement of the year competitions, but delegates were asked to speak at a county board meeting where it was discussed and not many clubs raised the issue. The county board advised divisional boards that it could only be played as a secondary competition between July & December. Junior Championships draws were made at our meeting in February and the round robin format was adapted once again. League structures were agreed at the previous meeting and fixtures sent out. As in the previous year some remaining positions to be filled were discussed and clubs were asked for nominations but unfortunately these were not filled again for 2023. Hopeful ly more of an uptake will be taken in 2024. We also had 9 new referees in the division for 2023.

In 2023 the division had a fantastic year with Muskerry Teams on the field of play with county titles and involvement in county finals. We had wins for Aghabul logue (Intermediate A Hurling & Football), Cill na Martra (Premier Intermediate Football), Canovee (Junior A Football) and other clubs involved in county finals were Blarney (Senior A Hurling) and Kilmurry (Premier Junior Football) and in county semi-finals we had Ballinora (Junior A Hurling) Inniscarra (Junior B Hurling) Ballinora (Junior B Football). We also had a league game to complete from 2022, the Junior B Hurling League – Blarney winners. Our Muskerry Sports Star Awards were also revived for 2023 under our new sponsors EPH Controls.

The Muskerry Board ran 19 competitions in 2023 and 311 games were played in both Football & Hurling League & Championship. Championship Review:

Our Junior A Football competition still dominates interest in the division. With Kilmurry promoted to Premier Junior this year, it left the competition wide open. This year Canovee and Inniscarra reached the A final. Canovee represented us in the county final against Mayfield and won with plenty to spare on the day. In Junior B Football we had Ballinora & Inniscarra contesting the final. Ballinora were the winners on the night playing with 13 men for much of the game. Plate competition was also held and Aghabullogue won this. The Junior C Football final was contested between Ballingeary & Inniscarra and Ballingeary came out on top after a very entertaining game by the narrowest of margins. A point to note is that Inniscarra contested al I 3 of the divisional finals in football but were unsuccessful in all 3 but this is a huge achievement for any club to accomplish.

U21 Football -3 grades – The A grade final involving Ballincollig & Eire Óg with Ballincollig winning. B grade the final pairings to be final with Aghabullouge, Inniscarra & Naomh Abán involved. In C grade we have Donoughmore v Bal lingeary to be played on Dec 2nd. Al I very competitive competitions.

In Junior A Hurling with Ballinora dominating this competition for the last few years we had a new pairing in Ballinora & Dripsey in the final. Once again Ballinora were winners. Junior B Hurling Inniscarra once again dominated this grade, but it took a replay for them to get over Aghabullogue in extra time this year. In the plate competition Blarney were the winners.

We had 3 groups - 1 x 4 & 2 x3. In the Quarter Final Grenagh v Blarney & Kilmichael v Eire Óg. In the semi finals Ballinora & Dripsey awaited the winners of the quarterfinals. The semi final involving two of our favourites to reach the finals in 2023 -Ballinora v Grenagh. It took extra time to separate these two teams with Ballinora progressing to the final in their quest for 3 in a row. Inniscarra progressed to the county semi finals and similar to Ballinora's fate Inniscarra also lost to a last-minute goal ending their county progression. In the secondary competition for losers of Round 1 (Plate) it was Blarney v Donoughmore who progressed to this final and an entertaining game in Grenagh where Blarney won.

Farho Intelligent Heating Ltd U21 Hurling A& B: - 4 teams entered the Premier grade Ballincollig, Blarney, Eire Óg & Inniscarra, 3 teams in A grade Aghabullogue,Cloughduv,Grenagh and 4 teams in B grade Western Gaels, Lee Gaels, Donoughmore & Inniscarra 2.

In the U21 Premier grade we had 2 semifinals and in the final, it was Ballincollig & Inniscarra played in Ballincollig. After some heavy rain the night before the pitch was in very good condition, the sun shone and there was a strong wind for the duration of the game. Both clubs gave a great display of hurling and despite Inniscarra's best efforts they were no match for the Ballincollig team who retained it for the second year. In the A grade with 3 teams, it was to be played in a round robin format Grenagh played Cloughduv in the first round and beat them well. Cloughduv withdrew before round 2 so we went straight to the final between Grenagh & Aghabullouge to be played on Saturday 2nd December. The U21 B grade (13 aside) had 2 semifinals and in the final, it was Donoughmore v Western Gaels (Kilmichael/Uibh Laoire) and in the final Donoughmore were victorious. It should be noted that for these competitions Ballinora & Cloughduv(dual players with Canovee) had to withdraw due to their Junior teams being involved in county championship. Also, we had to play finals in the venues of home/away due to unavailability of neutral venues and as a board we accept clubs want to preserve their pitches.

Ross Oil Junior A Football: - We had 12 entries for this competition with Kilmurry having won the championship and county in 2022 they are now in the Premier Junior ranks. This meant we would have new champions for 2023. The top seeds were Aghinagh, Inniscarra & Canovee so all favourites went into this championship. After the round robins we had guarter final with teams involved Eire Óg, Kilmichael, Aghinagh & Grenagh with Inniscarra & Canovee who topped their groups on better score difference into the semifinals awaiting the quarter final winners. This competition commenced in September but unfortunately, before this competition started 3 teams withdrew. These withdrawals were for different reasons. The final was contested between Inniscarra & Ballingeary which was the curtain raiser for the Mid Cork Football Final. A very entertaining game and Ballingeary won by the narrowest of margins on the day.

Macroom Motors U21 A, B&C Football: - We had 4 teams in our A grade originally but with Canovee & Ballinora in county Junior A Football & Hurling respectively they withdrew as they had some players playing in these competitions. We went straight to a final between Ballincollig & Eire Og playing in Ovens. A very good game of football on the day and with 20 mins of second half gone it looked like Eire Óg were going to succeed in overturning the result of 2022 but Ballincollig came back at them and as they say goals win matches and they retained their crown once again for 2023. In B grade we have 3 entries Aghabullogue, Naomh Aban & Inniscarra. We are awaiting the results of the round robins to see who reaches the final in this. In the C grade we had 9 teams entered but before the quarter final Blarney withdrew. In the final we have Donoughmore v Ballingeary on Dec 2nd. In this U21 Football championship Cill na Martra, Kilmurry & Canovee did not participate due to their involvement in county & Munster championship. We thank these clubs as it allowed us in the division to progress with our U21 competitions.

Leagues: This was the first year of our new format of Divisional leagues. 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
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
